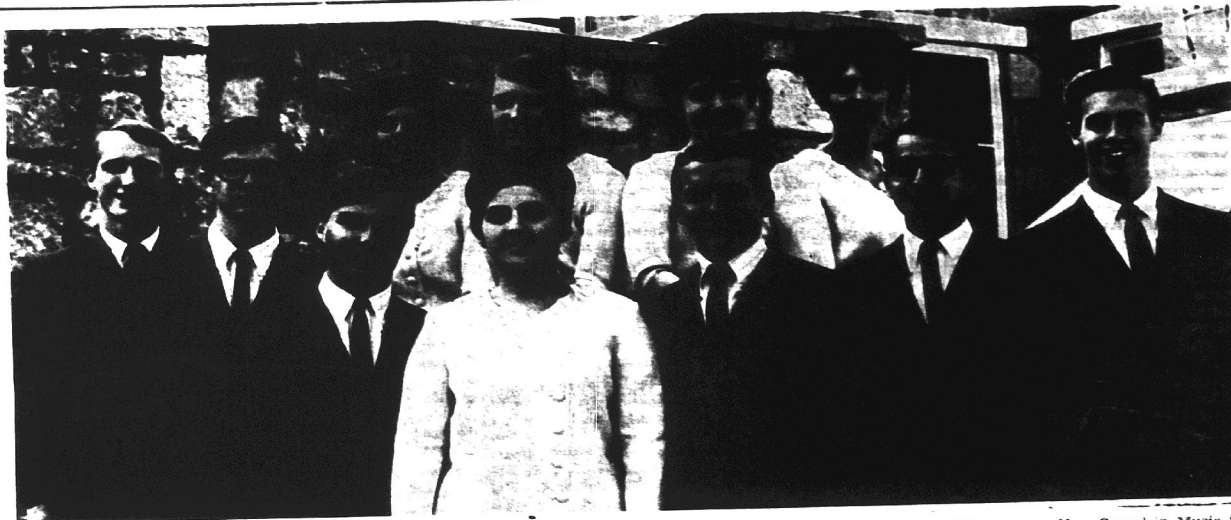

## Davis is TVSC board prexy

Ralph Davis, Akron, was elected president of the newly reorganized TVSC board Monday night after swearing-in ceremonies for new board members. Dr. Donald VanGilder and Richard Goshert, were held. Dr. O. L. McFadden, Mentone, was elected vice-president, and Dr. VanGilder, also of Mentone, was elected secretary. According to state law the treasurer must be a person other than a board member. Martha Thompson was re-elected to fill this post. The other board member, David Burkett, was absent. He is currently serving a short tour of duty with the U. S. Marines but ex-

pects to be back within a month or six weeks.

Jim Goshert, R. 1, Mentone, was present at the meeting as a spectator but asked about the advisability of re-opening the Beaver Dam school to alleviate crowded conditions. He was told that although the schools are crowded, no serious over-crowding is now visualized. This dovetailing of students and classes was a result of hundreds of hours of planning. Supt. Forbes reported.

Board policy was reviewed for three hours. Dr. Van Gilder, who had previously said whole sections of the policy manual needed revising, made several suggestions as did other members. A motion by Dr. Van Gilder to eliminate the policy that states: "A School Board member should honor the high responsibility which his membership demands by refusing to play politics in either the traditional partisan or in a petty sense" died for lack of a second. The other board members felt removing this policy would imply that they were free to play

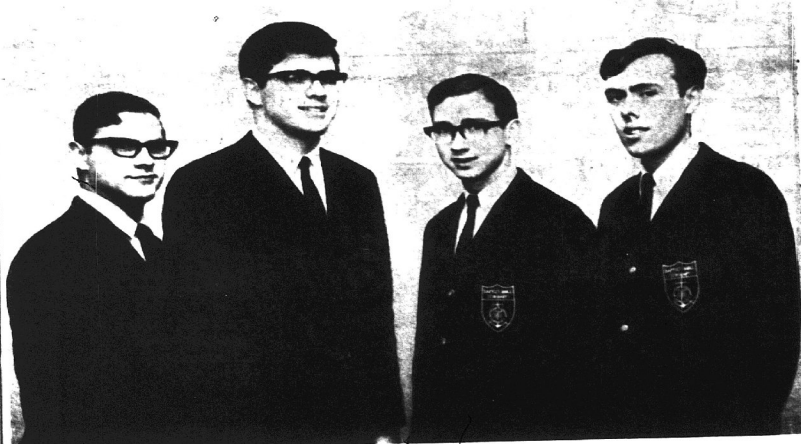

## Town board adopts "get tough" policy

Members of the Mentone Town Board met Monday night and decided to ask town marshal Gene Norton to start a "get tough" policy with all abandoned cars.

The board also asked Norton to warn the operators of a junk yard that they were violating an ordinance forbidding the establishment of a junk yard within the city limits.

Further board action included voting to erect no trespassing signs in the town park to avoid further vandalism. The board will ask the people who have already marred the park to fill

in the ruts and return the area to its former state of repair.

The garbage and trash collector asked the board to instruct people to keep brush out of alleys and to keep their garbage cans in good condition. The board also asks that all vacant lots be kept mowed.

Ordinance 179 was signed. It calls for erecting a 4-way stop sign at the corner of Yale and Harrison streets and a 3-way sign at Harvard and Jackson streets for the protection of school children.

All of the board members except Kenneth Bush were present. Other members are Bill Rathbun, Jim Whetstone and Jim Tibbets.

"Never have ministers of the Gospel turned their pulpits and their pastoral duties toward direction of the social order to the near exclusion of the salvation of order as abounds in our time."

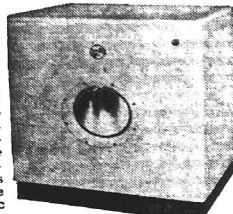

The first Hamilton production model (right) was introduced in 1938. While fewer than 6,000 dryers were in use before World War II, today they are considered standard equipment in the modern American home.

Now that we're all paying more for mail service, and the mailman is better paid, will the mail-carrying service improve? Probably not, although many businessmen complain that service has declined steadily as rates have gone up in recent years.

tee continuation of the postal deficit. To its critics, the Post Office can say, "Sorry, but we can't provide more service—we're operating at a loss now."

The postal deficit has become a fixture of the Federal economy, continuing even when rates are boosted with the idea of balancing the postal budget.

The deficit has mushroomed since the 80-year-old "penny postcard" passed from the American scene in 1952, to be replaced now by a 5-cent card; since the first-class letter went from 3 to 6 cents and since the air mail from 5 to 10 cents. Talk about inflation!

\*\*\*  
Congress could have eliminated the deficit recently when it increased rates and thus boosted post office income by about \$900 million a year. But it gave most of this to the postal workers in pay increases, so continues a postal deficit of about half a billion dollars a year continues not counting a big deficit due to government mail costs.

What is irritating too, is the likelihood that third-class bulk mail, "junk mail," which has been a losing proposition to the post office for years, will continue to be subsidized.

The third-class rate was increased but probably not enough to make it pay its own way. Nor enough to keep it from glutting post offices and mail boxes.

From 1947 to 1966, the junk mail volume increased more than 250 per cent, while all other classes increased just 80 per cent. Despite the public's apathy toward junk mail, advertisers have considered it a great bargain. And no wonder, with taxpayers footing part of its cost.

When the recent legislation was under debate, Congressman Ken Hechler of West Virginia gathered comments from postmasters to show how they feel about junk mail. Nearly all said it is disagreeable and bothersome to handle and often interferes with other mail.

One postmaster wrote: "Some patrons request us to do what we cannot do: throw it in the wastebasket and not deliver it. Those who get mail through boxes stand in the lobby and sort out the circulars and throw them in the wastebasket. This is another time we handle it... at the incinerator."

Another postmaster said that carriers deliver circulars to rural boxes one day, and then see the advertisements littering the highway the next.

Congress might have taken care of the postal deficit and contributed to the "Keep America Beautiful" campaign at the same time.

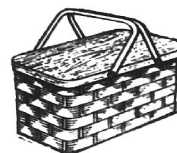

## The Bible Speaks

Question: What did Jesus mean when he said: "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven?" (Matt 5:3) The opposite of poor is rich. When people are full of themselves, when they are self-satisfied and self sufficient, they cannot be called poor in spirit. The opposite of the first beatitude would read: "Cursed are the rich in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of Satan." The man our Lord described in the first beatitude is a beggar. A beggar is desperate. His hand with shaking, grasping fingers is stretched. Hunger overwhelms his thinking. If there is no mercy he knows he must die. Jesus is saying: "Blessed are the ones who, in their self-estimate of their religious ability, are beggars." A man can be clean in his morals, honest in his business, liberal in church giving, and yet be spurned by the God of heaven. Why? Because he is proud of his goodness and his heart is not of estate. On the other hand, a man in the muck of sin, realizing his foul condition, emptying himself of every vestige of pride, is closer to the kingdom of heaven, is closer to being saved, is closer to God's heart than the other (Luke 18:9-14) A Bible reading government official was asked, "Understandest thou what thou readest?" (Acts 8:30) He was not insulted, because his heart was right and his spirit was poor. "How can I unless some man should guide me?" was his humble reply and invited the stranger to explain the Scripture. Had he replied, "Why do you think I am reading if I do not understand?", he would never have been saved. But the attitude of his heart led him to listen and he learned about the only Savior of the world. Had he thought he knew all the an-

swers, the message of Jesus would not have enlightened him that day. But, being gentle and easily entreated, he could be talked to, and on that his salvation depended. He realized the way of salvation is not in man, and that man cannot direct his own steps. (Jer. 10:23)

## 5% Government Loans Available

Mike Brown, Assistant County Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration, announces that the local FHA office is now taking applications from rural residents for Operating Ownership, and Housing Loans. Funds will be available for farm operating expenses such as feed, fertilizer, livestock and machinery. Ownership loans with up to a 40-year repayment schedule are also available. One of the fastest programs is that of Rural Housing. The Rural Housing program has up to a 33-year repayment period.

To be eligible for a FHA farm loan a person must be an established farmer in the community and be unable to obtain the necessary capital from other credit resources. To be eligible for a Rural Housing loan a person must also live in a community of less than 5500 population, and be unable to obtain sufficient capital from other lenders.

The FHA office is located in Room 1, Spohn Building, Goshen. They have a part time office in Warsaw at 114 West Market St. in the PCA office. They are in Warsaw every Monday between 1:00 and 2:00 p.m.

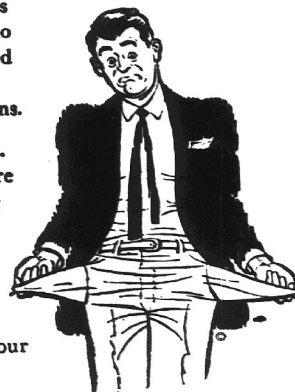

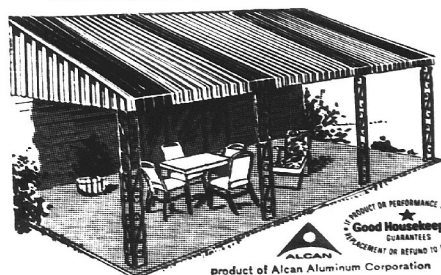

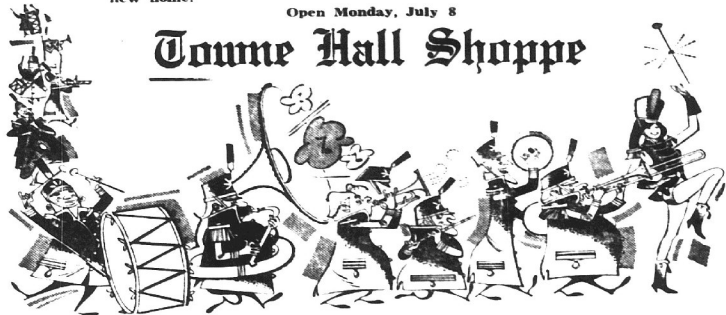

## The Bible Speaks

Jesus said: Blessed are they that mourn: for they shall be comforted." (Matt. 5:4) What did Jesus mean? Jesus again is talking about spiritual things. What was the result? "Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, 'Men and brethren, what shall we do?' They found out that they were sinners, and many of them were 'pricked in their heart', they mourned over their sins, their sins touched their heart, and they wanted to know what could be done to have these sins taken away. As we said before, 'godly sorrow worketh repentance', this is what was told to them. 'Then Peter said unto them, repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ, for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost'. (Acts 2:38)

The trouble with many of us is that we sometimes do not even realize when we sin and therefore do not grieve over the sin. If your conscience hurts when you sin, thank God that you still have a conscience. Then grieve over your sins and repent, change your way of living, and be baptized for the remission of your sins. If you already have been immersed and are still sinning as we all do day to day, mourn over your sins and repent. Ask God daily to forgive you of your sins. John told Christians, people who had already repented and had been baptized: "... If any man sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righte-

ous." (1 John 2:1)

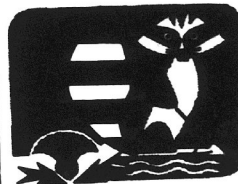

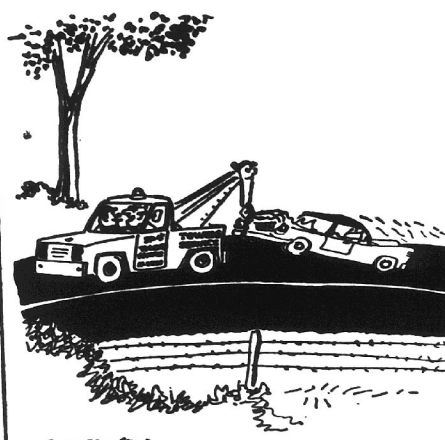

On June 23 an exciting week of unforgettable memories began. I arrived at Indiana University for Hoosier Girls State and like anyone else who tries something new I was nervous and a little scared. Would I like Girls' State? Would it be fun? Or would I hate it? Well, I loved it and the week went entirely too fast.

My city was Morris and we had 36 girls and two so-called aliens who were our counselors.

Sunday proved to be a rewarding day. We girls were all in the same boat, so we were very eager to make new friends.

The hours of activity were a lot different than at home. I found myself rising at 6 a.m. and usually not retiring until after 12 p.m. The reason I never got to bed early was because I was reporter for our city for the Girls' State paper. Since lights went out at 11, I usually found myself writing my news by the hell light.

Every day began with flag raising, the singing of the "Star Spangled Banner" and perhaps a patriotic reading. Each day brought a new experience of some kind. The most interesting events, during the day, were the Nationalists Caucus and the State Party Convention. I was a Nationalist, and at our caucus planned our platform, colors, motto, song and chose our cheer leaders and song leaders. But the state convention was really the greatest. All the candidates who were running for state offices had to give speeches. Then our city precinct women voted for our city. There were pages running all over the place, send-

ing and delivering messages. The girls running for county and city offices had until 7 p.m. on Tuesday to file. And exactly one hour later the confusion and campaigning began for the primary elections. If you were lucky and made it through the primaries you then had to carry on your campaigning to the general elections. Everyone had so many tags and signs pinned on them, you could barely see what color dress they were wearing.

I ran for state representative and won. Although it is a state office, you are elected in your city. There are four girls elected from each city to serve in the House.

On Wednesday evening, each party presented its candidates for state officers and was given five minutes for a demonstration. As I said, I was a Nationalist and our motto was "Nats Fly High in '68". Everyone cheered, sang and threw airplanes all over the auditorium. It was really something else!

Paula Parker of Indianapolis was elected governor of Girls' State. She was very smart and everyone just loved her. I might add that Paula is the first Negro in the history of Hoosier Girls' State to become governor.

At our evening programs we had some very distinguished speakers — such as Lt. Governor and Mrs. Rock. Mr. and Mrs. Ed Whitcomb. Mrs. Birch

Bayh and the Governor of the 1968 Hoosier Boys' State. Personally, I think everyone enjoyed the last one the most.

Suddenly it was Sunday again and a week of new friends, fabulous food, patriotic moments, tears of happiness and the singing of that great Girls' State song was over.

Now it seems to me that the week was a dream too good to be true. But it wasn't a dream and it did happen to me. I would like to thank the American Legion Auxiliary for selecting and sponsoring me. I would be very happy to give a report to any group after I have reported to the American Legion Auxiliary.

Smith has one sewing machine for sale. Cheap. Phone 958 after 7 p.m. and ask for Mrs. Kelly who loves with him."

And finally on Thursday . . .

NOTICE—I, R. D. Smith, have no sewing machine for sale. I smashed it. Don't call 958 as the telephone has been taken out. I have not been carrying on with Mrs. Kelley. Until yesterday, she was my housekeeper—but, she quit."

### SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

Q. — I am 68 years old and receiving social security retirement checks. I had a stroke last month which paralyzed my entire left side. Can I now draw higher disability benefits?

A. — No. Disability benefits are paid only to workers who become disabled before 65. There is no increase in social security payments if a person becomes disabled after 65.

Q. — I have been receiving social security benefits for my son ever since his father died 2 years ago. He will be 18 years old next month. Will these benefits stop?

A. — Yes, unless your son remains in school. If he continues as a full time student and does not marry, his monthly benefits can continue until age 22.

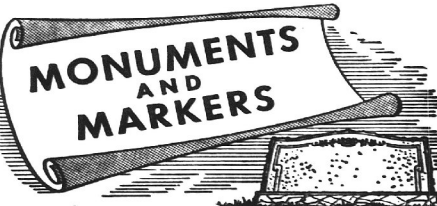

## U. S. Plans Birthday Celebration

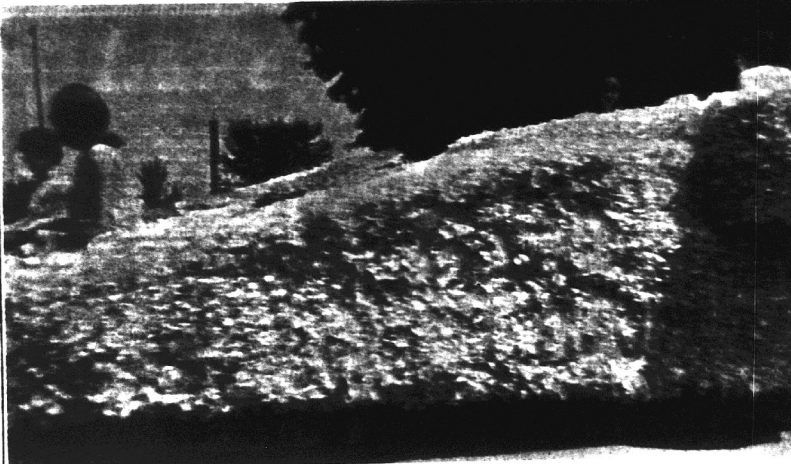
The United States is preparing for a monumental birthday celebration to be held in eight years in honor of its 200th anniversary.

## A. Nigo members see Liberty Bell replica

Mrs. Thomas Fugate, Mrs. Ray Linn and Mrs. Frank D. Smith of the Anthony Nigo Chapter, DAR, recently attended dedication ceremonies and the unveiling of a scale model of the Liberty Bell at W & D in Fort Wayne.

W & D hosted more than one hundred DAR members in a sixty mile radius at a dinner in their third floor tea room. Nelson K. Neiman, W & D president, attended the meeting, which had as its hostesses the Mary Penrose Wayne chapter.

Rex Potterf, librarian emeritus of Ft. Wayne, gave the dedication address and unveiled the bell. In his address he said, "Patriotic Americans will always cherish and venerate the Liberty Bell as a symbol of the American concept of freedom and independence."

"Now," he said, "when the foundations of liberty on which our Republic rests need to be shored up against complacency and indifference, what better symbol than the famous Liberty Bell now in Independence Hall. Its spirit rings out in these trying times as it represents the determination of American citizens against disintegration of their precious heritage of freedom and human dignity."

Potterf said, "In 1751 the Pro-

vincial legislature of Pennsylvania authorized its superintendents to procure a bell for the statehouse, stipulating that engraved on its shoulder should be the words from the 10th verse of the 25th chapter of Leviticus proclaiming liberty throughout the land and to all the inhabitants thereof. With all possible speed, the superintendents ordered the bell from White Chapel Bell Foundry of London. In September of 1752 the bell arrived in Philadelphia, apparently undamaged. It was mounted on the statehouse but unfortunately it cracked at the first ringing. It was repaired locally but cracked again in 1835 while being tolled during the funeral of Chief Justice Marshall. Further tolling became impossible."

Continuing, Potterf said, "The first frame of the bell was the State House Bell. Three years after the irreparable crack occurred, the Friends of Freedom, a group of abolitionists in Boston, gave it the name 'Liberty Bell.' The original Liberty Bell was installed to call legislatures to sessions of the Provincial Assembly and gradually was used to call the alarmed colonists to meetings of protest against the growing tyranny of George III's government.

"The bell was used in the 1765 Stamp Act protest, the 1768 mass support of legislative debate on England, 1773 Denunciation of the Tea Tar, 1774 Protest of the Closing of the Port of Boston, 1775 ringing out the news of the battle of Lexington and Concord and in 1776 when the Declaration of Independence was proclaimed. During the Revolution, the bell was removed to the Zion Reformed Church in Allentown, Pa. for safekeeping. After peace was restored the bell was enshrined in 1846 on the floor of Independence Hall in Philadelphia."

Workers of the 400-year-old White Chapel Bell Foundry in London which made the original Liberty Bell, now have descendants making bells on the same premises. They are handcasting to order a symbolic commemorative Liberty Bell for each month of American Independence, 2400, one one-fifth-size replicas

to be produced to commemorate the American Bicentennial Celebration. The bells are made of an alloy of 77 percent copper and 23 percent tin and will be offered for sale in this country to historical societies, patriotic groups and appropriate purchasers.

## SOCIAL SECURITY Question Box

Q — I am 70 years old and still working full time. I realize I am not entitled to my social security because of high earnings. Does this mean I will never receive monthly benefits?

A — No. You are entitled to a benefit check for the month you reach age 72 and all months thereafter, no matter how much you earn.

Q — I receive interest from a savings account. Does this interest count toward the \$1680 I may earn and still receive social security benefits?

A — No. Neither does investment income, rental income, dividends or annuity income. The retirement rule applied only to earned income.

"Indiana has held the line solidly against the legalization of any kind of gambling. The most persistent assault upon this posture has been the repeated effort to establish a PARI-MUTUEL BETTING system in connection with horse racing tracks. After several failures, proponents of pari-mutuels got to the floor of the 1967 General Assembly a bill to legalize such a wagering system in Indiana. Unable to secure passage, the advocates succeeded in getting through both houses a bill providing for a referendum on pari-mutuel gambling at tracks in Indiana. Hence, at the 1968 fall election on November 5, Hoosier voters will face the question: 'SHALL PARI-MUTUEL BETTING BE PERMITTED IN THIS STATE.' While such a referendum is not binding on the General Assembly, its results will certainly be highly influential in future legislative considerations.

Believing this to be an extremely important issue with highly significant moral, social, economic, and political aspects, the Pleasant Township Christian Association encourages every citizen who wants a better Indiana to vote against pari-mutuel betting in the November election.

## SOCIAL SECURITY Question Box . . .

Q - My wife died a year and a half ago. I was told at that time our son was not eligible for benefits on her record because she did not contribute one-half of his financial support. Did the new amendments change this?

A - Yes. If your wife worked long enough to be insured your child can now draw benefits on her record. You should get in touch with your local social security office.

Q - I am a 68 year old woman, never married, and worked only a few years during World War II. I signed up for medicare, but the social security office told me I was not entitled to monthly benefits because I lacked two quarters of coverage. Will the new amendments help me?

A - Perhaps. There is a technical change in the law which may help a few people. The only way to find out if you are now eligible is to file another claim in the social security office.

## "INSIDE MUTUAL FUNDS"

The common stocks of oil companies, office equipment firms and electronics manufacturers occupied top position in the portfolios of mutual funds last year, according to a recent Investment Company Institute survey.

The survey, covering 27 industry groups, was based on the latest financial reports of 40 major funds representing 75.3 per cent of the industry's total net assets.

It was noted that financial institutions and public utilities, in the top three in 1966 and ranking portfolio favorites for more than a decade, were in fifth and sixth position, respectively, last year.

The common stocks of oil companies were in first position with 12.5 per cent.

Office equipment companies followed with 11.3 per cent. The stocks of electrical equipment and electronic manufacturers were in third position. Chemicals followed in fourth with 8 per cent. Financial organizations were fifth with 7.1 per cent and public utilities were sixth with 6.2 per cent.

Others in the top 10 were drugs and cosmetics, metals and mining, aircraft manufacturing and aerospace, and foods and beverages.

The classical definition of liberalism is grossly distorted in the belief of many of the new-style liberals that government is the friend and protector of the people.

Mr. James H. Lorie, Professor of Business Administration at the University of Chicago, takes exception to the new liberalism: "The Constitution of the United States was based in part on the belief that people needed protection . . . from the government, and that free, competitive enterprise was the most efficient engine for promoting the public good . . . the intellectual climate of this country placed the burden of proof for the necessity of interference with the market process on those who would interfere. Interference was presumed to be an error unless an over-whelming case could be made for it. In the present intellectual climate, the reverse is probably true — actions by the government to regulate business are presumed to be beneficent and the burden of proof is on those who oppose."

## Plant Tissue Tests Are Available

Plant tissue analysis is available to Indiana farmers through the state soils laboratory at Purdue. The analysis is valuable for two types of information needed in crops production. One is to evaluate management and fertilization programs and this would be determined by testing normal crops. The other would be to test abnormal plants to determine cause of deficiency.

Tests are made to determine the presence or shortage of the major plant food elements and in addition will be made for nine common minor elements.

The cost of testing is \$5 per sample and instructions and mailing envelopes are available at the County Extension Office.

Fertilize lawns lightly in July if more grass growth is needed and irrigation is available. Light fertilization can maintain color, improve greenness, and aid in rejuvenating lawns after leaf-spot or insect damage, say Purdue University extension agronomists.

for an approved pilot school course or a combination of these. Crabill had 100% of his last ten students pass on the first try.

Crabill, a resident of Rochester, started instructing in December, 1946 and has logged 2900 hours as a flight instructor. He estimates he has taught seventy people to fly. He recently attended a Purdue University flight instructor refresher course.

students, Chris Phie's, Warsaw, Art Horn, Akron and Willis Willard, Rochester, recently soloed.

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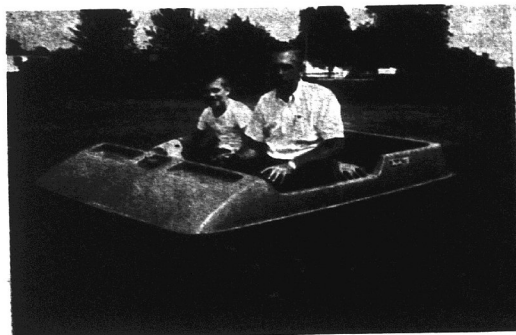

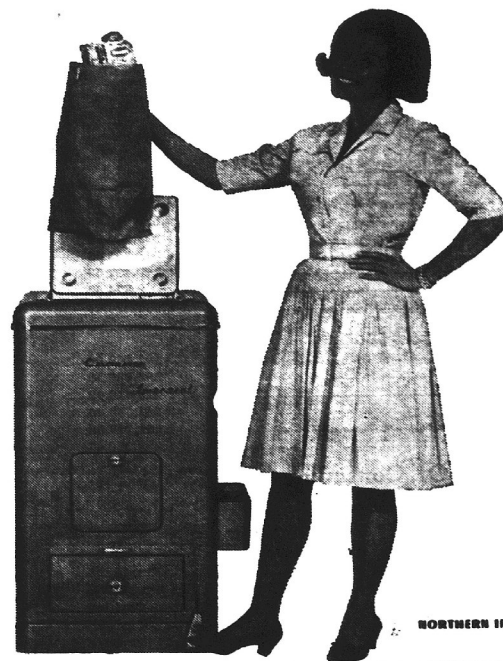

Nor can the fact be overlooked that it is the thousands of dedicated and skilled people of the electric industry who are responsible for the dependability of today's electric service. We submit that it will be these people, and not a federal agency, who will provide even more reliable electric service in the future."

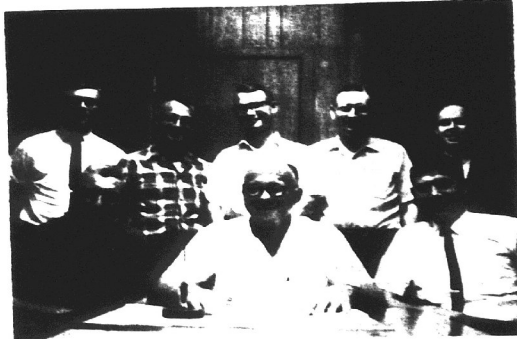

### Kiddies Parade

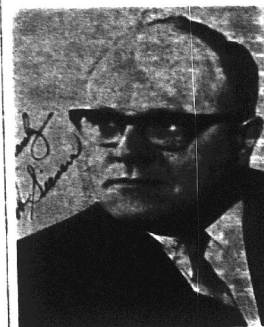

Bob Herendeen will enter world aerobatic competition in Madgeburg, East Germany on August 19. Herendeen, a TWA captain now living in Torrence, Calif., will be accompanied to the ten-day meet by his father, Allen "Chick" Herendeen of Mentone.

Bob will fly his new Pitts Special in the competition. The new plane was built to his specifications by Mr. Pitts. The old Pitts Special, familiar to local fans, was recently sold to M. A. Spinks Sr., president of the Aerobatic Club of America. Spinks, a resident of Ft. Worth, Texas, has a museum of noteworthy aircraft.

The Aerobatic Club of America raised funds for the German trip through contributions and air shows and is entirely self-supporting in its bid for world recognition.

Members of the team include Harold Krier of Kansas, Chas. Hillard of Ft. Worth, Tex., Herendeen, Art Scholl of Calif. and Mary Gaffaney of Florida. 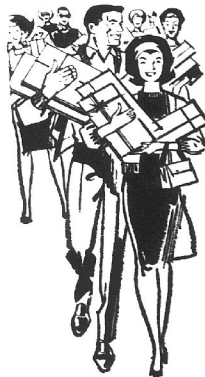

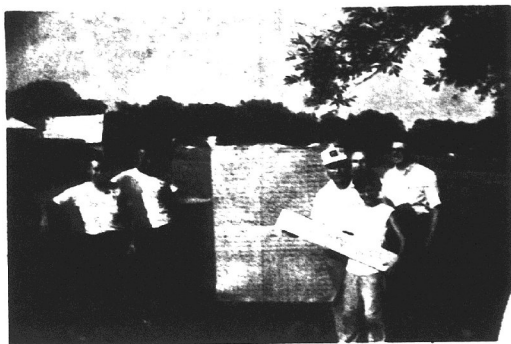
## Park-A-Rama is biggest, best, wettest yet

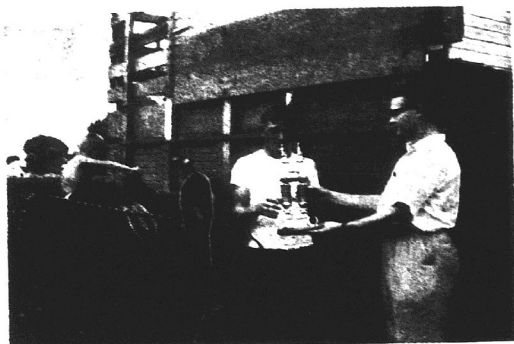

## Used Books Are Due at High School

Mentone school principal Ernest Holcslaw has announced that he will begin at once to accept used text books from any high school student wishing to sell his last year's books. The books will be accepted at the school from now until the morning of August 26.

The books will go on sale August 19 and the sale will continue through Friday, August 23 ending Monday, August 26 at 4 p.m.

Holcslaw urges students to have their schedules checked with him, because they must receive a card indicating the schedule has been checked and approved before they can purchase books. They may do this any day.

Children in grades K-5 will rent their books as will 8th grade students. However, eighth grade students may pick up their books by sets and pay their fees on August 19. The K-5 children will pay their rental fees to their teachers on the first day of school.

A meeting of the corporation's principals will be held this week to determine the rental fee, and it will be announced in next week's paper.

A general faculty meeting will be held Tuesday, September 3. Class organization day is September 4 and classes begin on September 5.

## School Board Votes 40c Tax Rate Increase

Board members of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation met Monday night and voted to raise the \$3.14 operation rate to \$3.54. Combined with the 82c cumulative building fund rate, this would make the corporation's tax rate \$4.41 compared to the \$3.96 of the past few years.

In making the motion to increase the tax rate, Dr. O. L. McFadden also moved that \$100,000 be appropriated to capital outlay, the purpose being to save the \$100,000 from the Beaver Dam fire loss. Dr. Donald VanGilder voted against the motion; Board members McFad-

den, Ralph Davis and Richard Goshert favored it. David Burkett, the fifth board member, was absent.

The rate will be advertised and a public meeting will be held on August 29 at which time the board will have its last opportunity to cut the rate. The taxpayers will also have an opportunity to express their views at this meeting. After the board adopts the budget, further hearings with the tax board will be held.

The budget will total \$141,941.00 with \$43,000 of it being earmarked for debt service.

In a statement released this week, the Board of Directors of the Kosciusko Community Hospital, Inc. stated they are ready and willing to cooperate with a "fact-finding body" which the County Commissioners said would be created by July 23rd.

On June 17th, the group had appeared before the Commissioners to request a \$2,000,000 county bond issue to help finance construction of a new non-profit hospital to serve the citizens of Kosciusko County. Although Commissioner Ray Ferreda of the Northern District voted in favor of the proposal, the request was denied; and Commissioners Fred Gilliam and Harvey Anglin voted to appoint

a county-wide fact-finding board.

The Kosciusko Community Hospital Inc. was informed at that time that a fact-finding body would be established within 30 days in order to review all pertinent facts in the case and report back to the commissioners by April 1969. To date no public announcement has indicated the group has been established.

President of the Kosciusko Community Hospital, Inc., Lawrence J. Castaldi, stated: "The members of our board have cooperated with the County Commissioners in every way that they asked, and we will continue

to do so. Our cause is the cause of improved medical and health facilities for the citizens of the county. We will continue to work for that cause until a non-profit community hospital is established."

Castaldi added: "We especially want to thank more than 5,000 county voters and taxpayers who signed our petitions and reply cards. These citizens are living proof of both the concern and need for additional medical facilities. Their support is greatly appreciated." The group had circulated petitions and direct mail questionnaires in response to the Commissioners request for a show of public support on the issue.

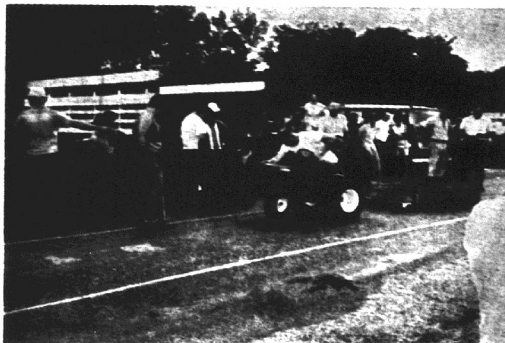

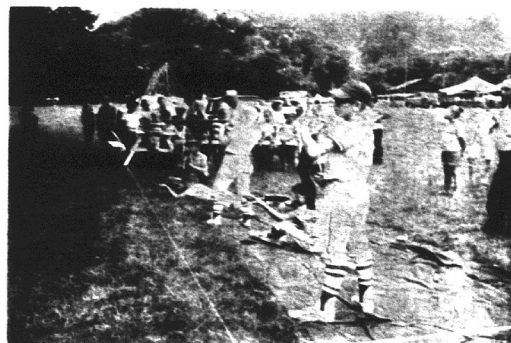
