#### Mrs. Roberts Seeks Coroner's Jury Inquest

# Geneva Roberts, wife of missing former Akron, Mentone and Claypool Mentone and Claypool businessman Clarence Roberts, has requested the Brown Co. coroner to determine whether or not her husband died in a fire behind their home in 1970.

A charred remains or a body was found in the ruins of a garage-barn behind the Roberts' Brown Co. home, and al-though the coroner's bound the coroner's office has not issued a death certificate in the name of Clarence Rob-erts, Mrs. Roberts believes that he did die in the fire.

Some law enforcement officers who investigat-ed the case claim that the corpse was not Roberts.

In the meantime, num-erous court cases invol-ving Roberts' property and insurance on his life are said to hinge on whether or port be

life are said to hinge on whether or not he died in the fire. Mrs. Roberts asks all witnesses be subpoend and worn to testify un-der oath with a full and worn to restrive un-der oath with a full disclosure of all the facts and that the ver-dict be filed in the Brown Co. courthouse along with other legal documents now on file by the Brown Co. coroner.

Mrs. Roberts said she was requesting the in-quest because "it has quest because "it has been almost three years" since the fire and she feels an official determination concering the identity of the victim is due.

infestation of corn bol-ers in the 1973 growing season and corn produc-ers are advised to be especially observant, Donald E. Frantz, area extension agent, said this week. He said dam-age will come from eith-er the first or second brood of the borers. The first brood burrows into the stalk, the sec-ond brood attacks the ond brood attacks the ears and shanks. It is in the later planted corn that most losses will occur. Controls with chemi-cals are effective but difficult because of the timing he could Is

the timing, he said. It is rarely practical to spray or use crystal forms of chemicals once corn reaches shoulder height. By that time the borers are in the stalks and are protected.

Treatment is justified when the corn is 36 inwhen the corn is 36 in-ches tall, with the leaves stretched up, if 60 or 75 percent of the stalks show feeding in the whorl of the stalk. At this time, the borers are of small size and are feeding in the tops of the corn. Within a are feeding in the tops of the corh. Within a week's time, they will have become half-grown and embedded in the stalk. It is then too late to do much good with sprays.

Sprays must be applied with the nozzles above the corn so that the insecticide is caught in the top of the corn plant. Granular appli-cations are usually more effective as they will lodge in the leaf sheath and in the plant whorl where the borers will be formed.

Two materials, Sevin and Diazinon, are recom-mended for corn borer control. Sevin is used at the rate of one and one-half pounds of act-ual toxicant per acre. This means three pounds of a 50 percent wettable powder of 1.9 pounds of

# School Board adopts budget

for operating Tippecanoe Valley schools for the Valley schols for the coming year was submitt-ed by TVSC superintend-ent Robert Forbes at Monday night's school board meeting and adopt-ed. It will require a general fund levy of \$3.10 and a cumulative building fund rate of 82 cents, an increase of 27 cents from last year's adopted rate. Based on an average daily attendance of 2145 students, the rate re-

students, the rate re-flects the \$36 per stu-dent allowable increase set by the Indiana Leg-islature but also inset by the instance but islature but also in-cludes a \$3,500 cut made last year by the State Board of Tax Commissioners.

The budget will be advertised in August and a hearing will be conducted on August 30. At that time, anyone havthat time, anyone hav-ing objections can ex-press them and school board members can make cuts in the proposed levies. They cannot, however, raise the levies since the budget has officially been adopted. In other action, board

members heard a progress from attorney report Frederick Rakestraw concerning the high school building program. He said everything had been cleared and that the bonds would be taken to Chicago Thursday by a member of the holding company and himself==re ferring to Continental Illinois Bank and Trust Co. of Chicago, the bank that recently bid 5.076 49 per cent interest when the bonds were sold. Rakestraw said the money would be deposited and actual construction could begin. He then met in separate session with members of

the building corpora-tion, Mike Nelson, Ed Creighton, Paul Fites, Creighton, Paul Fites, Maurice Peterson and Jay Swick, and Mentone banker Forrest Miner to finalize necessary paperwork. July 30 was tentative-

set for ground-breaking ceremonies.

Payroll claims totaling \$54,711.57 were authorized along with other claims. Summer baseball contracts for Robert Igney and Gary Teel were approved. Both had completed their duties

A \$1,502,206 budget but had not had contracts.

New teacher contracts for William Ruppel, a junior high school coach who studied at both Butler University and Manchester College, and for Marsha Teel, an elemen-tary teacher who recent-ly graduated from Manchester, were also ap-proved. The board signed contracts for returning teachers with Forbes estimating the combined salaries totaled \$723,-000.

School bus driver contracts tracts were approved. Alvin Finney quit, Forbes said, but the rest

of the drivers remained the same.

A discussion of salaries for principals, continued from the last meeting, was tabled for future discussion after the board failed to reach an agreement. Ri-chard Goshert was absent and lacking a fifth and tie-breaking memb-er on the board, several motions died on 2-2 votes.

The next regular meet-ing will be August 20, to be followed in ten followed days by the budget hearing.

The town of Akron has long been admired for its shade trees along its trees along Main and side streets. Officials of Kosciusko Community Hospital (KCH) learned last week that they have been awarded by the Executive Com-mittee of the State Board of Health a Federal Construction Loan Guarantee and Interest Sub-sidy under the Hill-Burton Act in the amount of \$5,000,000.

KCH officials have plans and specifications ready to release to con-tractors who will bid on the \$6.5 million project just as soon as fi-nal approval is receiv-ed under the Indiana Facilities Review Committee of the Indiana Advisory Comprehensive Health Planning Council and the State Board of

## Frank and Hazel Lukens combine hobbies

Flower drying and woodworking are widely divergent hobbies, but in Frank and Hazel Luk-ens' instance, there ens' instance, they com-bine happily, one comp-lementing the other. Hazel Lukens collects

and dries flowers, mount-ing and framing them attractively for display at area art shows. Frank Lukens, her husband of more than 50 years, de-signs and makes hand-crafted frames that his wife often uses to display especially attractive arrangements. Together, they attend the shows, welcoming ques-tions from interested persons.

and working with the dried arrangements and can of-ten create two or three a day, although she ad-mits there are those days "nothing looks days "notning rooms right." Starting with a fully

opened flower, she cuts out the stamen because this is too thick to dry properly. Exceptionally thick flowers are plac-ed between two plates to flatten before being to flatten before being placed in layers in pans containing silica gel. They are left in the silica gel until dry, the length of time de-pending on the flower. Thick flowers take up to two weeks to dry. The silica gel resemb-les fine sand. It com-pletely encases the fl-owers, giving the pans a resemblance of a

child's sand box toy.

Mrs. Lukens speeds the drying operation slightly by placing the pans of flowers and silica gel in the oven of her gas range. The pilot light creates a constant 90° temperature temperature, warm-the silica gel and ing the in turn drying the flowers

The flowers are wellfrom the silica gel and are at once ready to be made into arrangements. Some of these are mounton fabric, others on ed plainer backgrounds. All are covered with glass and framed, some with a frame made by her husband and others in antique frames.

The dried arrangements are used through the Lu-kens' home and merge kens' home and merge with another hobby, seed craft. A variety of these arrangements fills these arrangements lills one wall, adding con-trast to the flower ar-rangements and giving further evidence of the Lukens' creativity.
