McKee heads school board

Dr. John McKee was elected president of the Tippecanoe Valley school board at its reorganizational meeting Monday night, and Don Snipes and Fred Kindig were sworn in as new members and elected secretary and vice-president, respectively. Other school board members are Dr. Wymond Wilson and Richard Goshert.

Superintendent of schools Robert Forbes presented a report concerning extra-curricular accounts at each of the schools and also gave a progress report on the new high school, noting work will be done on the gym by November 1 but that some of the other building is behind

schedule. He said work on the pool and concrete floor will begin July 10, and reported no problems with the library or carpet. He said the kitchen equipment is ready and waiting but that seeding the football field is far behind, too late for this year.

Sheet metal work and sidewalks were reported ahead of schedule, and it was noted a plumbers' strike had slowed that part of the work. Installation of the sewage treatment plant has been slowed because of a mix-up, he said. He noted that a representative of the architect-

Mentone board outlines projected services

At the suggestion of attorney Lee Bazini, Mentone town board members Monday night adopted a resolution of projected plans for services to be extended to the areas currently proposed for annexation into the city. These included immediate police protection, street maintenance and sanitation, lights in six months, trash pick-up and sanitation in 30 days, and one and one-half years for extension of water mains. The latter was based on the fact some

services could not be started until the town receives taxes from the area, which it is not scheduled to get until 1976.

Attending the meeting were board members Kenneth Bush and Bill Boardman, clerk-treasurer Marie Coleman, Marshal Gene Norton, Bazini and town employees Harry Sullivan and Dick Peterson.

ural firm, Everett I. Brown, had told him inflation has hit the building industry so severely that if the school were to be rebid today it would cost fifty per cent more.

A report of the May 16 election conducted by the Indiana Educational Employment Relations Board to determine if local teachers wanted the Indiana State Teachers Association to be their exclusive representative in bargaining discussions revealed that 36 voted no, 34 voted yes and 17 votes were challenged because the teacher voted in the wrong place, was a part-time employee or had previously been terminated. Board members voted to appeal Donald G. Russell's decision to count the people no longer employed by the corporation and directed Forbes to take necessary action. Russell is a member of IEEERB and had set the rules for the election which were reported contrary to the way he counted local votes.

Robert DuBois was hired as athletic director for a combined salary of \$13,020, including his teaching duties, being assistant basketball coach and head of department.

Other contracts approved were for Stephen Kent Clark, Susan Schrader, Donna Lou Sandage, Rhonda Yazel, Janet Lea Straesser, Patricia Helman, Sherry Schinbeckler, Susan Marie Grossman, Michaelann Burkett, Mary Jane Burkett, Marjorie Ann Wellington and Wm. LaMar, the latter as librarian on a 10-month contract for \$11,000. Also approved were supplemental contracts for Rick Ralston, Jerry Eaton and Dave Creighton, all associated with the summer program, which this year does not include any remedial classes but concentrates on sports, driver education and auto mechanics.

Forbes reported he had hired all classroom teachers but had not yet obtained a speech and hearing therapist or a special education teacher, because he did not know if there would be enough money in the budget. He presented statistics to board members concerning forthcoming budget sessions in which he detailed how tight the money situation would be because of the freeze on tax levies.

During a policy manual discussion, board members tabled a suggestion to include an evaluation procedure until the next meeting, indicating they would reach a decision at that time so that the manual could be updated with the new board members and new officers included.

The bus driver policy manual was amended to include \$14.50 per day driver pay plus \$2.50 for extra trip and the amount of repairs a driver can authorize without approval was raised to \$50. Discussing fog and ice, board members decided no one could substitute for the drivers' judgment and voted to add a letter that Forbes mailed to drivers last winter as part of the policy.

The school calendar was discussed but not approved.

The next meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. July 15 in the superintendent's office, Farmers State Bank Building, Mentone.

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Dr. Clymer's Story Included In "Fulton Co. Folks"

"Fulton County Folks," the hard cover book being published by the Fulton Co. Historical Society has not yet arrived. "We hope it will be delivered before the Round Barn Festival, July 12-14," says Shirley Willard, FCHS president. "The publishing house called and said the book was all set in type, and they will try to have it here soon." "Fulton Co. Folks" will contain 236 pages and over 100 pictures of local history, as witnessed by 66 families who have lived in the county over fifty years.

Following is an excerpt from the story of Dr. Newton J. Clymer, who practiced medicine in Talma from 1879 to 1918.

"I can safely say that I have \$60,000 in unpaid accounts upon my books," Dr. Clymer said when interviewed by a Sentinel representative in 1916. The article described Dr. Clymer as the oldest physician in the county--he would be 79 years old on his next birthday. He retired from active practice years ago but insists on coming to his office every day to prescribe for a number of people who have been his patients for years.

"No man," said Dr. Clymer, "knows better than I that our customs and habits have changed in the last 50 years. The modern physician answers a call received over the telephone in a fast automobile, while 35 to 40 years ago (in the 1880s) when I had the largest practice in the county, I usually went to the bedside of my patient on horseback after some member of the family had made a quick trip in the same manner to call me. When I lived at Talma, after the Civil War, the roads were very bad and nearly impossible during the rainy season. For days once, I never took off my clothes, riding from house to house during a bad epidemic of fever; in those days the common illness was plague and intermittent fever.

"Speaking of work, in one week I had charge of eight cases of child birth. People never died of appendicitis then. We did not know of such a complaint and I really believe that people lived just as long then as they do now. They were just as happy and I don't think the social evil was as pronounced. Living was much cheaper. You could buy a good cow for \$7, but the average wage was 50 cents a day. Land around Talma in 1866 sold for \$15 to \$20 an acre and renters were unknown. Physician fees were about the same as today (1916) and I still maintain the same charges, \$1.50 for the first mile and 50 cents for each additional mile with the medicine gratis."

When "Fulton County Folks" arrives, it will be on sale at the News Stand and at the museum in Rochester. The price is \$7.50 if anyone desires to receive the book through the mail, he should send \$8.50 to Ruth Richardson, R. 2, Rochester.

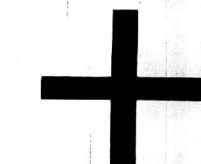

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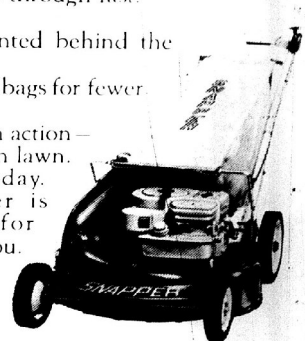

News Of Interest To Homemakers

The engagement is no sooner announced than the pots and pans salesman is at your door. Young brides are confronted with all colors, shapes, sizes, and designs of pots and pans to choose from. She may find a matched set that's exactly what she wants. But by and large, she would be better off to buy assorted wares to suit her needs.

Aluminum is practically unbeatable for all around use. It requires a bit more than average care to keep it clean and shiny, but it will more than compensate by giving even heat distribution which is especially important for frying. Stainless steel is somewhat more expensive but also a good serviceable metal. Stainless steel does not conduct heat as well as aluminum that is why it usually has copper bottoms.

Bright colorful enamelware and porcelain enameledware are popular with young women especially. Enamelware is glass fused on metal and consequently needs careful handling to prevent cracking, chipping or discoloring. Heat distribution is not even in this type of utensil or it is best not to use enamelware for puddling or white sauces. The widest use is in tea kettles, double boilers and small pans.

Cast iron is sturdy for skillet or Dutch oven use. It is not recommended since it is very heavy and rusts and needs to be seasoned. To season cast iron, spread melted shortening or salad oil on in-

side of utensil and on its cover. (Do not use any fat that contains salt). Place in a warm oven or over low heat for several hours, swabbing sides and cover occasionally with more fat. When cool wipe off excess fat or oil. The utensil is then ready to use. The seasoning is retained longer by washing with soap rather than a detergent.

Teflon coating is a nice feature for some pans. It makes clean-up surprisingly easy

and foods can be cooked without fat. The Teflon surface is easily damaged and must be protected against scratching.

If you are shopping for pots and pans remember that variety is important. There are some foods that are cooked nicely on Teflon and others that are beautifully crisp in cast iron. Each type of cookware has a specific function. Variety is the answer when shopping for pots and pans.

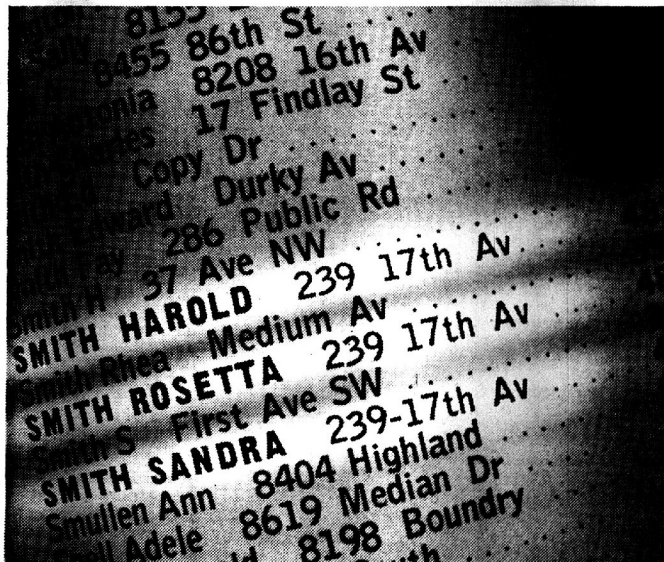

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Homemakers set style show

Homemakers of Fulton County who enjoy sewing for themselves and their families are preparing for the July 15 Homemakers Fashion Show at the Edison Room of the Public Service Indiana Rochester office. The 7 p.m. show is open to all Fulton county homemakers who may participate in one of four divisions: Classy Lassies--18 to 35 years of age as of Jan. 1, 1974. (An active 4-H member is ineligible.) Mod Mamas--36 to 55 years of age as of Jan. 1, 1974; Groovy Grandmas--56 or over as of Jan. 1, 1974--or Professions, anyone who is or has been engaged in active work and earning \$600 or more in any phase of clothing or construction, judging, modeling, etc. or a graduate home economist.

There will be seven categories:

A. Family outfit--mother wearing garments she has made plus any other family member or members wearing garments she has made for them.

B. Dresses - one or two-piece garment, any length suitable for the occasion.

C. Coats, which will be judged solely as a coat with its own accessories.

D. Suit or costume--suits being two or more pieces (skirt and/or pants with its own jacket, cape or vest, usually of the same fabric, shown with or without its own blouse.) Costumes can be a dress or suit with its own jacket or coat.

E. Separates--true coordinates. May be two, three or more pieces designed and put together for a complete look. However, each piece should be important enough to stand on its own for possible use with other garments. True coordinated separates do not depend on the number of pieces but on the type of fabric, pattern, color and effectiveness of coordinated complete look or looks.

F. Evening wear -- any costume, any style, any length suitable for after 5 p.m.

General rules are: garments modeled must have been made since Sept. 1, 1973; contestant must pre-register for participation; contestant may enter in only one category; contestant must reside in the county in which she participates; there will be one winner in each category for each division; any suitable fabric or technique such as knitting, crocheting, hand-weaving, etc. may be used; any length suitable for the occasion may be used in any category; and if the contestant is selected to go on to the State Fair she must

model the same garment that won for her at the county level. If desired, she may change accessories or improve workmanship.

Judging will be on a point basis with 35 points allowed for the constructed article, 30 for the contestant and 35 for the costume on the contestant.

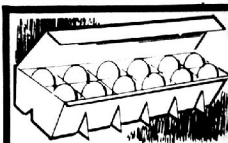

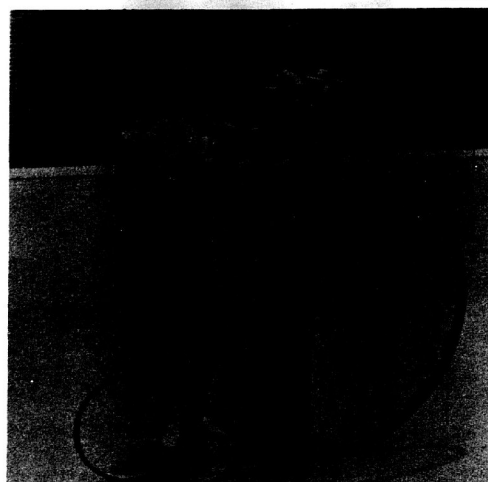

Spearheading the local show were Marilyn Kruger and Joyce Bascom. Mrs. Kruger demonstrated her mushroom painting skills throughout the day.

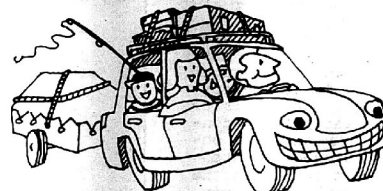

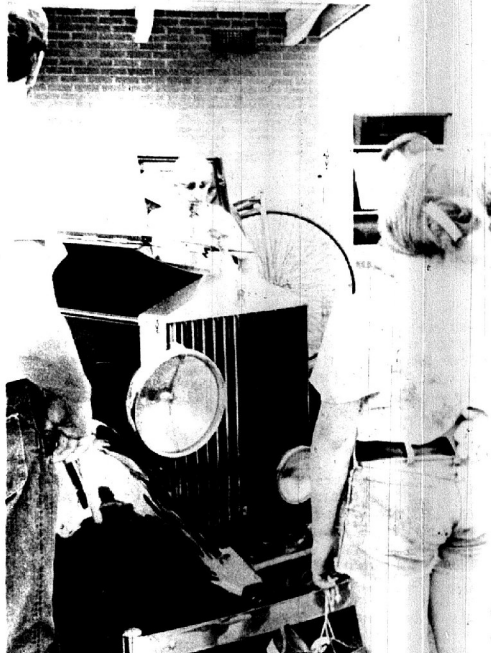

School Board sets budget, calendar

Describing the task of preparing a balanced budget as one of expansion and contraction, Superintendent Robert Forbes presented a budget to Tippecanoe Valley school board members Monday night that would call for a \$3,462,388 rate that combined with the 82 cent cumulative building fund would make the 1975 tax rate \$4,282,388 per \$100 assessed evaluation.

The budget, up \$81,705 from last year as allowed by the law that limits school expenses to increase \$39 per pupil and based on TVSC's estimated 2,095 enrollment, was approved for advertisement after much discussion and re-arrangement of fund allocations.

Fred Kindig questioned the lack of a speech and hearing therapist. Forbes said no provisions had been made for one because of the money pinch and because the one principal he had contacted said he doubted the value of the program on an every-year basis. This opinion was backed by Dr. Wymond Wilson and Richard Goshert who voted against a later motion to add this program. However, Kindig, Don Snipes and Dr. John McKee voted for the motion, and it carried.

Goshert questioned the addition of speech and hearing if it would jeopardize the counseling and guidance fund. Superintendent Forbes said the principal and assistant principal were both qualified and could do a fair job since both had been serving in dual roles as principals and guidance men at Akron and Mentone high schools, now combined as Tippecanoe Valley High School.

The need of expanding programs with a contracting budget prompted discussion of driver training fees and the need for summer school sessions that contain no remedial programs but no decision was reached.

In other money saving action, the board voted 4-1 (McKee casting the no vote) to cut the nursing account to \$500 and 3-2 (Snipes and Kindig voting no) to eliminate the community services account that pays \$1500 per year to the five townships' 4-H leaders.

Money from the cut or eliminated accounts along with a cut in the working balance will be used to purchase new school buses. Another cut in the working balance will be added to the instructional account.

Turning from budget

matters to evaluation, long a point of discussion, board members voted unanimously to require each principal to visit each teacher's classroom for 20 minutes a session three times a year. Within three days,

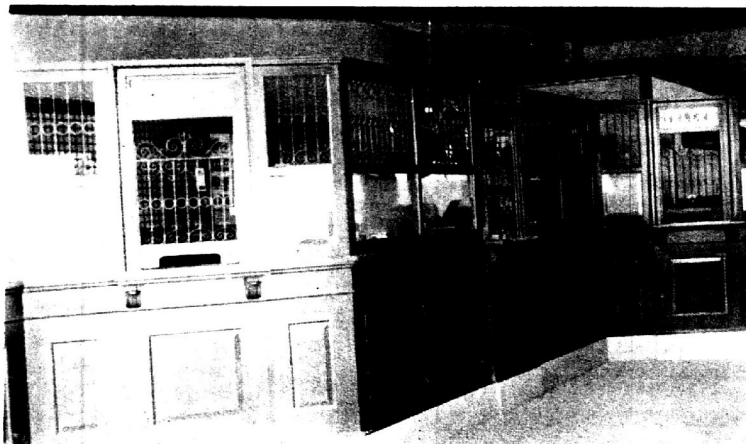


THIS GRACEFUL ELM silhouetted against an evening sky is more than just a pretty tree. It is a solution to pollution that starts at home. According to NEA garden columnists Sheila and Allan Swenson, evaporation from a single, properly-tended tree can produce an estimated cooling effect in its lifetime equal to ten room-size air conditioners running 20 hours a day. And trees don't use up electricity. Research reveals proper landscaping can reduce noise by 40 to 60 per cent. Plants break up sound waves, change their direction and muffle their intensity. Tree, shrub and plant leaf surfaces catch falling particles from the air, helping to reduce solid matter in the atmosphere. When it rains, particles are washed to the ground. In one test, dust count on a sheltered side of a planted tree belt was 75 per cent lower than a count on the windward side. Which side would you prefer to live on? The more plants and trees there are, the greater the oxygen flow, the reduction of noise, the cleaner the air and the water. This year, it pays as never before to plant.

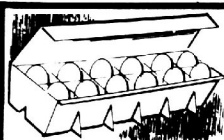

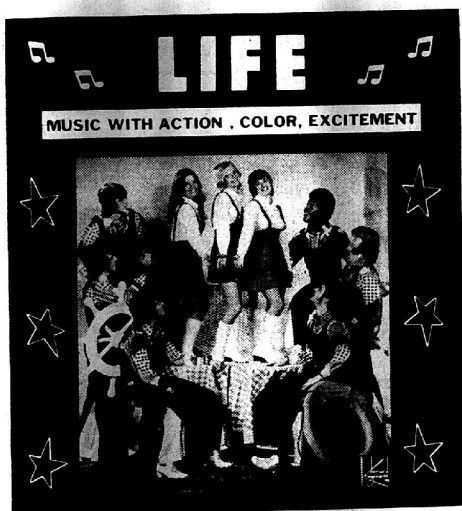

Paul Park suited up for action 50 years ago as Manchester College launched its first football team.

Paul Park helped MC initiate football

Pick a team, a sport, a year, anywhere, and you'll find a few players on the roster who get not a single shred of personal glory, who spend a career as second-stringers, or third, but who contribute something pretty valuable to the team--spirit--and who wouldn't trade their days on the bench for a seat in the stands.

Paul Park was such an athlete at Manchester College.

He played football in the mid-1920's when Manchester was just beginning the sport. By his own memory he was a "scrub", a third- or fourth-stringer. But he remembers those days as fondly as those who were more in the limelight, and his teammates have a host of "Paul Park" stories to delight the listener.

"We didn't know a thing about football," Park says of the 1924 team, the first Manchester ever put on a field. "We didn't have any equipment to speak of, because we didn't have the money for it. Even the coach--Carl Burt--was learning."

"It hustled us to have enough players to practice against. I was on about the third or fourth team, and we'd play the role of the opposing team each week in practice. I played a lot of that. It was cheaper than buying dummies."

Park is now retired and living in Silver Lake. He gets back to the campus frequently, to visit a few old friends, but admits he's lost track of many of his football teammates.

E. W. Hearne, a teammate of Park's and later a Manchester assistant coach, remembers Park as a free spirit "who drove an old Dodge which never failed to start" and who was always around to prop up a sagging morale. When Hearne had his football pants ripped off in a game against Defiance, it was Park who volunteered his own for a replacement so Hearne, a starter, could continue playing. And it was Park who once slipped into a sideline huddle to get some powdered alum being passed out to the starters and who explained to his coach that he, Park, needed the alum for the seat of his pants so he wouldn't slide off the end of the bench.

Park was a familiar figure at Manchester games for years. After his player days were over, he stayed on in the No. Manchester area in business and as an unofficial "assistant coach," offering his services in any way they could be used to help the Spartan football teams.

Campus sources aren't beyond speculating that Park will show up October 12, when Manchester

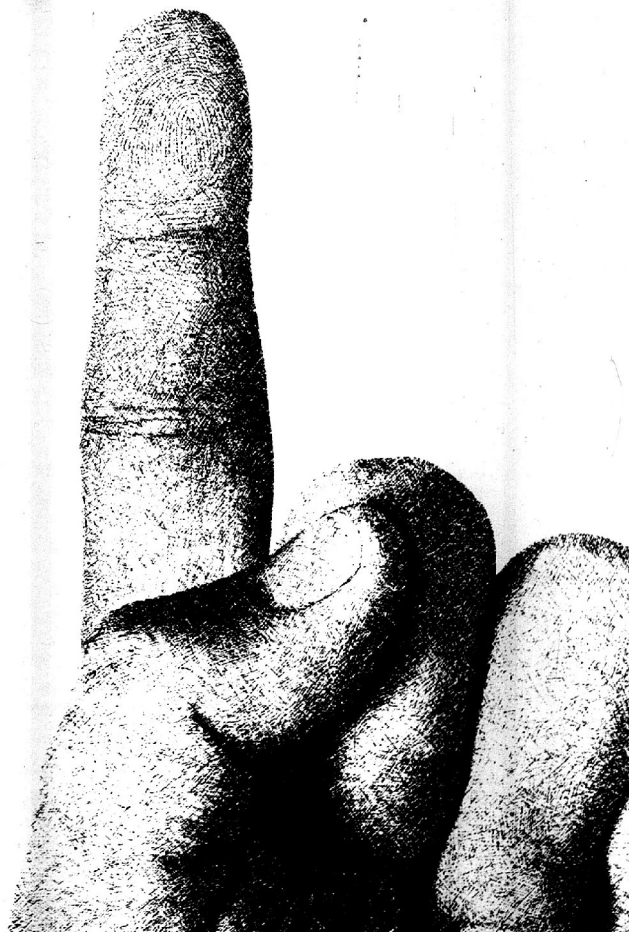

At ceremonies in the Chicago offices of Van Kampen, Wauterlek and Brown, financial counselors and underwriters for the new hospital, members of the Kosciusko Hospital Authority signed the bonds and lease agreement. Members of the KCH board then counter-signed the lease agreement and the

construction contract. Construction will be handled on a single contract basis in order to cut construction time and costs. The \$6.5 million job was awarded to Huber, Hunt and Nichols, Inc. of Indianapolis. Architects are Fleck and Hickey, LaPorte.

Jerry Helvey, president, and Carol Delp, secretary, signed for

Kosciusko Hospital Authority, while Robert Maish, president, and Marshall Estep, secretary, signed for KCH. The new hospital will be owned by the Kosciusko Hospital Authority and will be operated on a non-profit basis by Kosciusko Community Hospital, Inc. as provided by the Indiana state statutes. Construction will start immediately and is expected to take 24 months.

9. Care is taken to protect all articles exhibited, but the clubs are not liable for loss or damage of exhibits.

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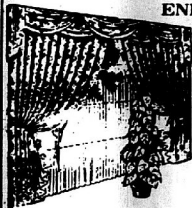

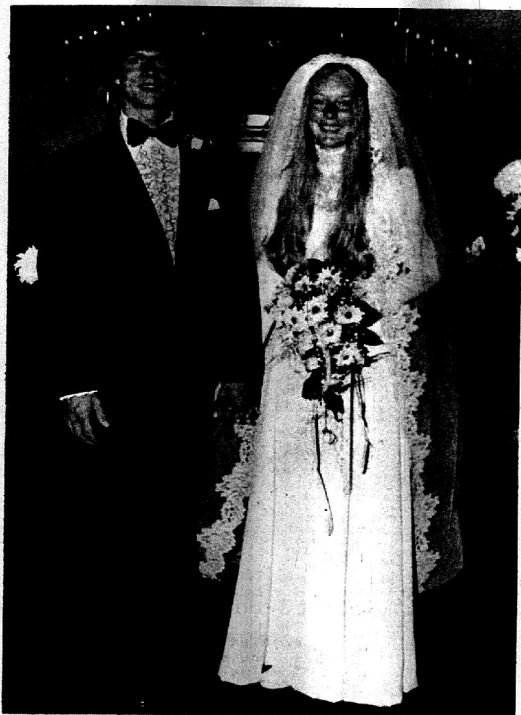

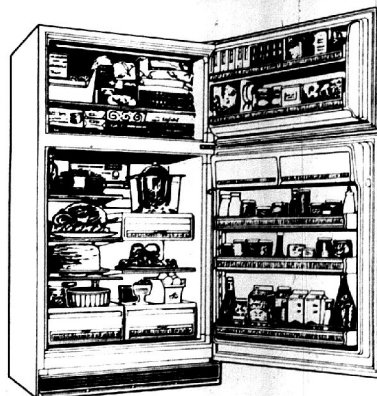

Set trial for accused Wallis slayer

Donald Lock, 27, accused of raping and slaying Nena Wallis, 30, a former Mentone resident, in her Ft. Wayne apartment last Feb. 20, will be tried for first and second-degree murder on Sept. 17 in Allen Co. Circuit Court, Fort Wayne.

Lock was originally scheduled to begin trial Monday but Circuit Court Judge Hermann F. Busse delayed the proceedings pending a hearing on a defense move challenging the constitutionality of a recently passed state law providing the death penalty.

Allen Co. Prosecutor Arnold H. Duemling is seeking the death penalty for Lock.

In an information report filed by Duemling, Lock allegedly killed Miss Wallis while raping her and then stabbed her with a pair of scissors. The report also states Lock was convicted on Jan. 8, 1963 for another, unrelated crime of rape.

Lock's attorneys, Public Defenders Barrie C. Tremper and Thomas L. Rayn, have filed a protective order seeking to suppress "any and all" proof of a prior conviction as alleged on Duemling's filed report.

According to the 1973 law, any person "killing a human being while perpetrating or attempting to perpetrate rape, arson, robbery or burglary by a person who has had a prior related conviction of rape, arson, robbery or burglary" should be sentenced to death.

Lock's defense attorneys have challenged application of the death penalty statute on the grounds that Lock was a juvenile under 18 years of age on the date of the alleged 1963 rape conviction. They further argue that Allen Circuit Court had no jurisdiction in Lock's 1963 trial and therefore the results of the 1963 rape trial are void. They also argue that Lock's juvenile records are confidential and therefore inadmissible in the proceedings relating to the slaying of Miss Wallis.

Akron Park Bd. sets \$26,000 expansion, elects officers

J.C. Rhodes was elected president of the newly formed Akron Park Board at a meeting Monday evening. Also elected were Clair Ellis, secretary - treasurer; Randall Leininger, fund raising chairman, and Channing Utter, publicity chairman.

After a lengthy discussion between park board and town board members, the park board elected to undertake the following projects for 1974-75:

1. Immediate improvement of existing park facilities to include total renovation of the present tennis court and backstops at an estimated cost of \$2,000.

2. Development of a long-range plan to provide the Akron community with complete recreational facilities for all age groups at a cost yet undetermined.

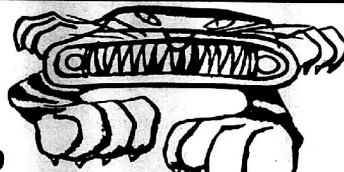

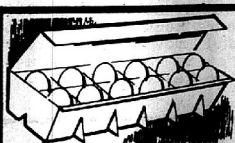

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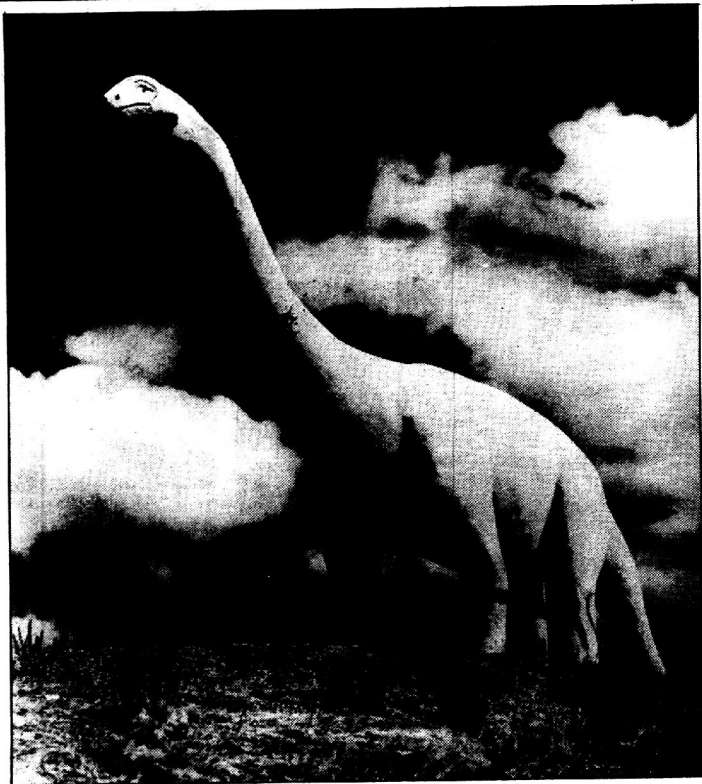

paper heritage, scattered in public and private collections, totals about 3,500 different papers. These rare newspapers are in jeopardy from natural deterioration and from the threat of disasters, especially fire.

A final goal of the project is the publication from computerized copy of a complete listing of Indiana newspapers that would help research scholars and libraries everywhere.

Persons willing to loan newspapers or contribute information to this project should write Newspaper Microfilming Project, Archives Division, Indiana State Library, 140 North Senate Ave., Indianapolis, Ind. 46204 or phone 317-633-6220.

Locally, the Akron Carnegie Public Library has been microfilming back copies of the Akron News and by the end of 1974 will have available all of the NEWS since 1896 plus a copy of the year 1893. The library also has a copy of an 1866 issue of the Akron Globe that is framed under glass.
