Fred Kindig heads TVSC board

Fred Kindig was elected president of the Tippecanoe Valley school board at Tuesday evening's reorganizational meeting.

Dr. Wymond Wilson was named vice-president and Don Snipes was re-elected secretary. Robert Forbes, former superintendent who Tuesday assumed duties as business manager, was named treasurer at the recommendation of new superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrell. Harrell said it would be easier for the central office to function if the business manager were also the treasurer and could sign checks as they were needed. He noted that present treasurer Judy Hively was on vacation, leaving no one to sign checks. Mrs. Hively, who had been treasurer for several years, was named deputy treasurer and will also be able to sign checks. Harrell said this would provide back-up for times one or the other is out of the office.

Dr. Harrell said he will be executive officer with major responsibilities to include personnel, curriculum development and negotiations. He said Forbes will assist him in the transition and will be responsible for preparing the budget, transportation and buses, buildings and grounds.

Dr. Harrell urged the board to decide a form of negotiation procedure and read a letter from attorney Fred Rakestraw

The parachute jump involving three jumpers is scheduled for 6 p.m.

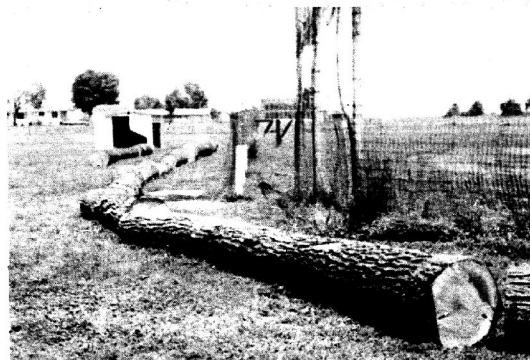
Both will be at the Akron school grounds.

Lyle Hoffer, librarians.

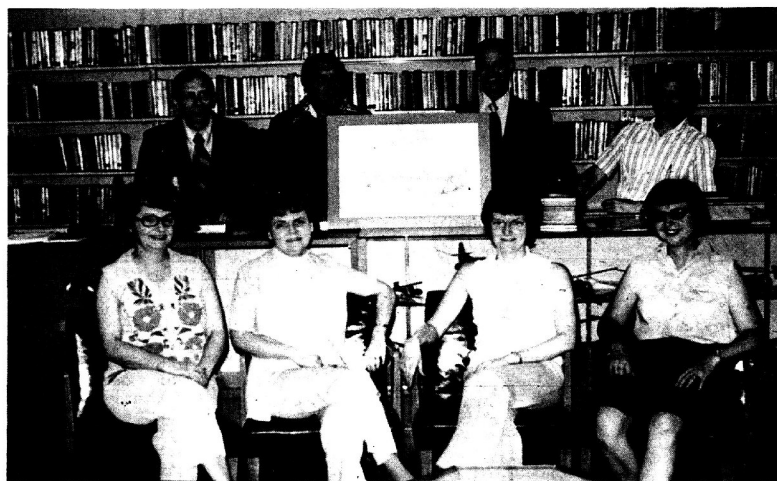
The band has been busy this summer with a round of parades. In addition to the Akron parade on Friday, it will be in Roann on Saturday to march in the Community Festival parade.



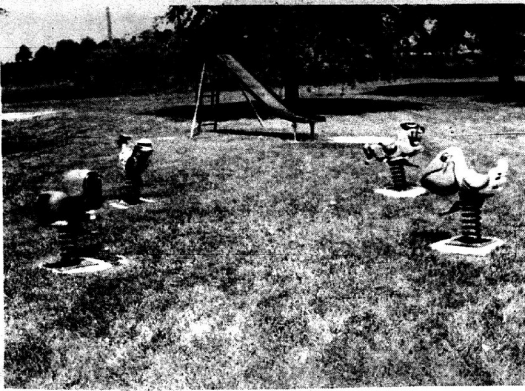

From crop to menace, marijuana's story in Kosciusko Co.

Back in 1912 to 1914, my husband, W. W. Stauffer, Akron, and his brother, Dr. H. R. Stauffer, Nappanee, bought a number of acres of muck land east of Akron, near Rock Lake. It is formally called a piece of Tamarack Marshland. After ditching and laying rods of tile, the ground was ready for a rough crop to mellow the ground for finer crops, such as potatoes and onions.

A crop which seemed very suitable was hemp. It is a crop which grows rapidly and is very beautiful as it grows very erect to a height of ten to twelve feet, with beautiful foliage, which looked much like the house fern with the feathery leaves as the rows were nearly touching each other and could not be cultivated like corn.

Not knowing how to harvest it nor market the crop, the brothers went to Kentucky where it had been raised for several years, and found that there was a special machine to run the long stalks through, breaking the core into small pieces as only the fiber was marketable.

A businessman from Versailles, Ky., brought five colored men up to teach the brothers and their employees how to prepare the hemp for the market, as hemp had been raised in Kentucky for several years. There was one stipulation and that was that the brothers were to take them back and see that they were in their respective homes.

The machine was bought and ready when the men arrived. They cut the standing crop with machetes (a heavy bladed

knife to be used in cutting sugar cane and as a weapon in Central and South America).

As the stalks came to the end of the machine, they would be taken off and shaken good to get rid of the broken pieces, then the fiber would be thrown over the open end and shaped into a head with the ends loose. When it was smooth it was tied under the hand and it was called a dolly. Then they were ready to be baled with the dollies at the end of every other layer and loaded into a box car and shipped to a factory to be made into rope.

Birds carried the seed until even now, you of-

ten see a lone stalk of hemp along the roadside, although now it is called marijuana. By using the dried leaves and flowers in cigarettes, many people become addicts. Hence, from the lowly hemp grown on what was considered waste land, it has become one of the most harmful plants in northern Indiana and especially in Kosciusko county.

For several years the brothers brought the men back to help at harvest time, and they never saw or heard them make any remark about using it as it is today. In fact, the brothers did not live long enough to know that the lowly hemp was such a menace.

in which the latter suggested the board either recognize Professional Teachers Organization as the exclusive bargaining agent or have the board adopt criteria for guidelines for salary, fringe benefits, etc., and authorize the superintendent to discuss these items indiscriminately with all teachers.

Con Shewman, who joined the board Tuesday night, said, "If we cannot talk and get along with people, we've lost human contact."

Dr. Wymond Wilson, however, said, "If we're going to go by law, which says we must negotiate with a bargaining unit, we should recognize someone. Let the cards fall where they may." Richard Goshert said he agreed with Shewman but, like Dr. Wilson, felt the board had an obligation to follow the law.

Having already posted notice of its intent to recognize PTO, the board voted to grant exclusive recognition to PTO as agent for certified personnel. Shewman abstained from voting.

Representatives of both PTO and Tippecanoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association were present, but only Lewis Shoemaker of PTO spoke during the audience session. He asked that a date be set to start negotiations between the board and PTO's negotiating committee. Harrell said, "We'll be in touch."

A contract for \$7,725 plus fringe benefits was approved for Debbie K. Hull as a mathematics and chemistry teacher. Also approved was a two-week supplemental contract for TVHS counselor Geo. Welch for \$800. He will spend the time combining Akron and Mentone high school records, according to Dr. Harrell.

At Dr. Harrell's request, the board set a two-hour work session to discuss long and short term goals, procedures, budget, etc. for 7 a.m. July 21, the morning of the next regular monthly meeting, which will convene at 7:30 p.m. in the superintendent's office.

Akron landmark removed

The large smokestack at the old Akron milk plant, a landmark in the community since it was erected in 1915, is no more.

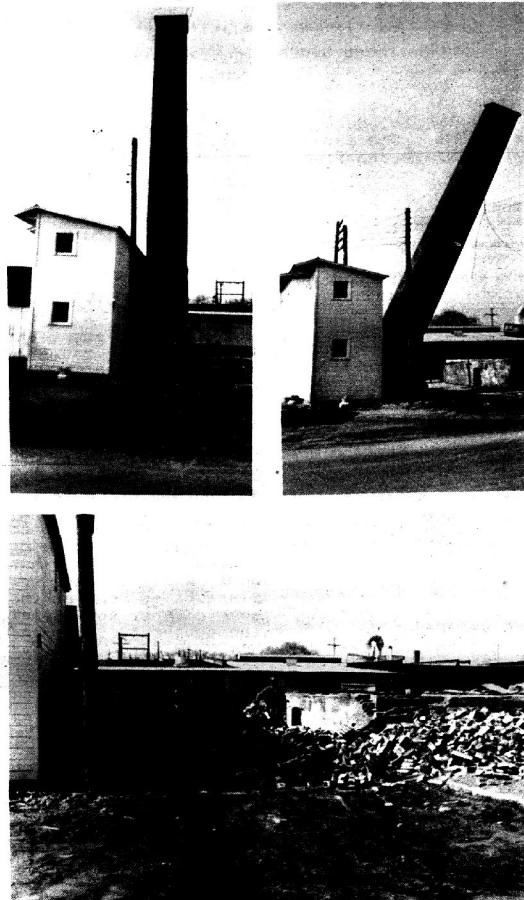
On May 6, workers from Pike Lumber Co., Inc., removed the 60' tall structure, felling it much as they would a tree.

Fred Hammond, a member of the family that constructed the chimney, notched the chimney, which was six feet square at the base. When the notching was completed, Warren Martin and Doug Grogg, who had earlier attached a cable from the chimney to a winch truck, pulled the chimney over. As the pictures taken by John York show, the chimney came down easily, completely disintegrating on impact, one brick landing 200 feet from the base of the chimney in Joe Bussard's yard.

Pikes purchased the old milk plant some time ago and tore down the east portion, salvaging the west part. The chimney removal was the last step in improving the area.

Also assisting with the work were Beecher Weida and Bob Harmon.

Fred Hammond noted that not only was he a member of the family that built the structure, the sand for the mortar had come from the pit on his farm.



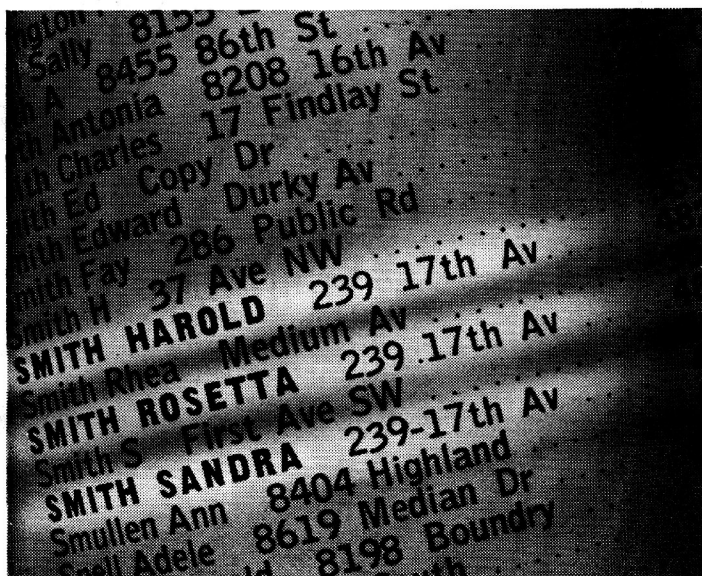

Erie House children hope for vacation invitations

It's Project Erie House time again in Kosciusko county. For the families already involved, it is an eagerly awaited time to renew a special friendship. For people who have not yet become acquainted with Project Erie House, here is a short explanation.

The Erie neighborhood is on Chicago's north side. It is a multi-racial neighborhood with blacks, whites and Latin Americans. They are confronted daily with all the attendant big city problems of overcrowding, racial tensions, poverty and broken homes. The Erie Neighborhood House tries to meet the needs of this neighborhood. One of its programs is co-sponsored this year by the Warsaw Optimist Club and the First Presbyterian church of Warsaw.

Now in its tenth year, the program tries to give city children a vacation from city living and exposure to country life and small town living. Local families offer two week vacations in their homes to a child between the ages of six and 14, although both younger and older children are available. Families may select the age, race and sex of their visitors.

Two visitations are scheduled, July 12-26 and July 26-August 9. An orientation session for new host families is planned July 8 at 7:30 p.m. in the First Presbyterian church of Warsaw. Interviews and special instructions regarding details of the program will be provided.

The professional staff at Erie House says the Kosciusko Co. Summer Visitation Project is one of its most important and appreciated programs.

In talking with host families from previous summers, the comment heard most often is, "Our family got as much or more from the visit than the child did."

Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Boyer, Burket, have been in the program before. Mrs. Boyer says, "The children have been very loving. Simple things our children take for granted, like having a yard to play in or a bike to ride, mean so much to an Erie House child."

Watching the sunset, walking on a tree-lined

street, seeing vegetables grow in a garden, going swimming, eating meals at regular hours, even having silverware and dishes for every person in the family, can be an inspiring experience for an Erie House child.

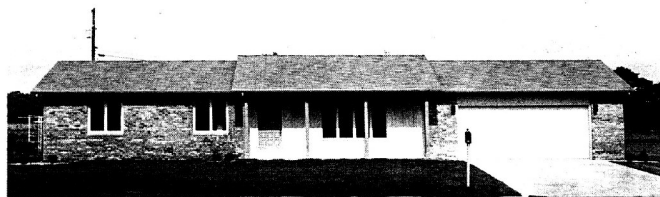

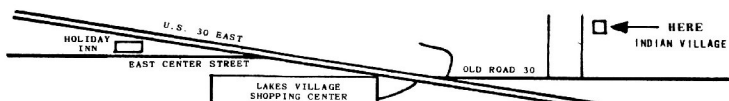

with the reminder of the need to eat, but the lust for "something else" remains.

But there are some people who manage to combine the best of both worlds. They function well in a normal routine and just as easily swing into a schedule that is less restricted. Eva and Dee Davis of Kokomo are such people. They'd likely say there are restrictions to their alternate way of life, too, but they'd be the first to admit it's a welcome change of pace from their workaday world.

For the past seven years, the Davises have taken to the road every summer week-end to sell their wares: depression glass, primitives, collectibles. Flea marketing has become their way of life, the life they spend away from the middle school in which Eve teaches and Dee works as head custodian.

Last year alone, the couple traveled more than 20,000 miles, crisscrossing Indiana and surrounding states. Even their vacations are spent at flea markets or in search of new items to sell. Comfortable in their motor home, they can watch the tables even at night, when a period of quiet can be more foreboding than a sudden noise.

Their flea market life hasn't always been that comfortable. "We were married just six weeks when Dee was stricken with paraplegic arthritis and rheumatic fever," Eve recalls. "The doctors told him he'd never walk again, certainly never race stock cars again."

Not only did Dee Davis prove the doctors wrong by walking, he has raced several times and keeps up an active pace in his daily work. But the time between being stricken and his full recovery was a bad period for the Davises. They needed money. Taking eight dollars of their carefully rationed cash, they went to an auction and bought some boxes of "junk" that gleaming proved to include some better items. Setting up in their garage, they had a garage sale, using the proceeds in part to restock their merchandise. The rest of the money was applied to their living expenses. It was a slow beginning, but it proved to be a way of life they liked, and soon they had a big enough stock to venture into shopping center flea markets. Travel was by pick-up truck with a mattress in the back for sleeping. It was later replaced by a truck camper until last year when they were able to buy the used motor home.

The motor home is big enough to accommodate

both of them as well as their wares unless they go on extended trips. Then they use a utility trailer behind the motor home. It was on such a trip that one of their most terrifying experiences occurred. "The utility trailer contained 22 cases of depression glass," Eve recalls. "It came loose, hitting the road with a thud. I couldn't bear to look; I just cried all the way home. But when we checked, we found we'd only lost one piece. Someone up there was really watching over us."

Like other business people, the Davises upgrade their stock as they can afford it. "Sometime we want to have some really good antiques," Eve says. "We've worked up to good glass, and we'll go on improving our stock." Their entire inventory still dates back to the original eight dollar investment, and they continue to draw part of the income for personal expenses. They moved into management this year, an experience they find challenging and rewarding.

Traveling with a Kokomo-based concessionaire who specializes in small town festivals, the couple has learned to pitch in and help him when needed. Eve was often seen selling tickets at the recent Mentone Egg Festival, and the tug of the carnival was felt by Dee who now owns bumper cars that proved to be a big attraction with the younger set.

The sparkling glass in Eve's booth also appeals to youngsters, but she finds adults break more than children. Wind, rain and bikes running into her tables are her biggest headaches.

How about people? Do they prove troublesome? "Rotten eggs just don't last in this business," Eve says.

Sleepy driver hides when police car hits pole he broke

ADVANCING ON THEIR TARGETS are these members of various Kosciusko Co. police departments who, under the instruction of FBI agent Virgil Ray Piper, Sidney, recently underwent a rigorous training program at Jim Beeson's Rifle Range, located northeast of Mentone in the Crystal Lake area. All shooting was at life-sized silhouettes with a diagonal line drawn through them so that each officer had to choose only half the target and hit it. Each also had to reload and fire at night. Safety was stressed throughout the course.

Choking deaths...how to prevent them

Choking on food is the seventh-leading cause of accidental death in the United States. Annually, more people die by choking than are killed by poisonous snake bites, aircraft accidents, lightning or electric shock.

When a piece of food, usually meat, lodges in the throat so that it prevents breathing, the victim has just four minutes before he will suffer permanent brain damage from lack of oxygen. In less than four more minutes he will be dead from asphyxiation.

Diners in restaurants often mistake the cause of a victim's collapse as stroke or heart attack, which is why a fatal choking accident is sometimes called a "cane coronary."

The first sign of choking is when a person suddenly becomes quiet and a look of alarm comes over his face. He may clutch at his chest or throat and attempt to rise. A PERSON EXHIBITING THESE SIGNS MUST NOT LEAVE THE TABLE ALONE. In a few moments he may collapse and he cannot save himself.

Stroke and heart attack victims, if they are conscious, usually can breathe and talk. A choking victim is unable to breathe or make a sound. He is now just minutes from a preventable death.

Two rescue techniques have been developed. One is to try to extract the object using fingers or tongs, the other is to attempt to force the object out by squeezing out air trapped in the victims lungs. The latter is called the Heimlich Manuever.

Both have worked on children and adults and both should be attempted.

Treatment must be immediate, according to the Fireman's Fund American Life Insurance Co. The following steps are recommended:

1. Send someone for help but don't wait for it to arrive.
2. Ask the victim if he can talk. If he is conscious but unable to make a sound, you can be reasonably sure he is choking. Don't bother to slap him on the back. It will not help and only wastes time.
3. Using a napkin to get a firm grip, pull the victim's tongue forward as far as possible. This should lift the obstruction to where it can be seen.
4. Using the index and middle fingers like tweezers, grasp the obstruction and pull it out.
5. If this fails, stand behind the victim and wrap your arms around his waist, as though to hug him.
6. Clasp your hands together against the victim's abdomen, just below the rib cage.
7. Press in forcefully

with a quick upward thrust. Repeat several times. This pushes the diaphragm up, compressing the lungs and may force the object out of the windpipe.

8. After the obstruction is removed, restore breathing by artificial respiration. Keep the patient warm and quiet until help comes.

The second method, the Heimlich method, is called the bear hug.

1. Stand behind the victim.

2. Wrap arms around waist.

3. Clasp hands together against victim's abdomen.

4. Apply pressure quickly and forcefully just before victim's rib cage. This forces the diaphragm up compressing air in the

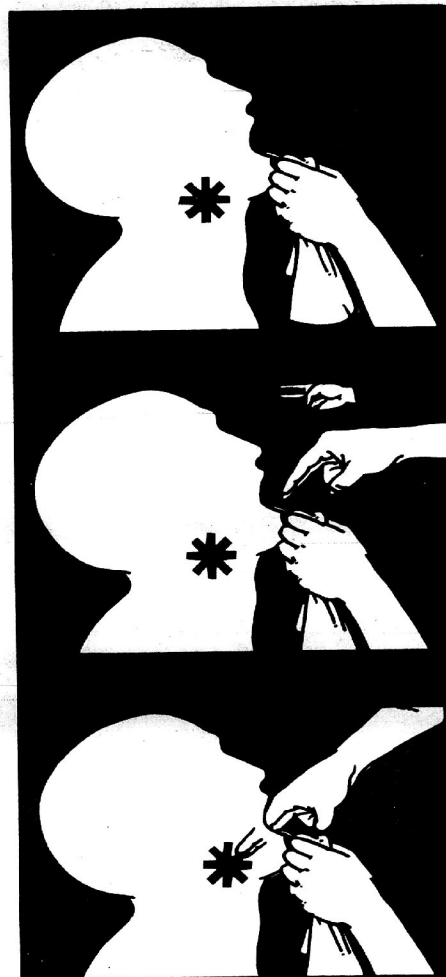
lungs to expel the object.

If the obstruction cannot be removed using any of the methods described, use a long spoon or other instrument to pry it out.

There is a danger in using spoons or other instruments to dislodge the food in a person's airway. It could cause a sore throat if tender tissues are injured in the rescue attempt. There is also some danger in the "bear-hug" method in that ribs may be broken and internal organs damaged. However, a choking victim will die if his airway is not cleared. A sore throat or cracked rib is certain to be the preference of the victim in this fatal emergency.

ODDS and ENDS

Israel and the United States have agreed Uncle Sam will provide up to \$1.8 billion in economic aid to Israel if a new interim peace accord is concluded with Egypt, according to a wire service news story.

So what else is new? Blackmail has been with us since Day One. Barter is certainly nothing new. A couple of Dutchmen and a band of Indians worked out a deal on Manhattan that drew a lot of publicity, but the idea was already old long before the beads and land changed hands. And the combination of both barter and blackmail? Well, that's really old. And the deals get better as the years advance.

Take business at our place, for instance. Barter-blackmail began there 11 years ago, the day Doug and I came home from the hospital and Todd ceased to be an only child. Doug's first words were directed at Todd: "I'll let you have the beads out of my rattle if you'll sneak me

some ice cream." In the years since, they have advanced through every form of the system: "I'll tell Mom you broke the window if you don't let me play with your toys." "You ask Mom if we can ride to the lake (knowing full well I didn't want them there when they were two and eight) and I'll pump up your bicycle tire."

Age makes a difference in bartering. For instance, bikes have nearly been ruled out since Todd, now a ripe-old 17, got his driver's license a year ago, and deals are more likely to be: "I'll take you to the ball game Friday night if you get me a Coke every night this week." Or, "I'll help you clean your car if you'll take me with you Sunday."

But bartering and/or blackmail doesn't end fights, and our government and Israel's should realize there can be repercussions. "Just because I gave in and let you go with me in return for your cleaning out the barn doesn't

mean I'm gonna do it again."

There's a lesson to be learned in bartering. The Indians picked it up too late, the U.S. government has come out on the short end of the stick on it too many times and the threat of further losses remains ever-present, unless, like our battling, bartering sons, you stay sharp. Or, as they would say, "You gotta hang right in there and fight for your share."

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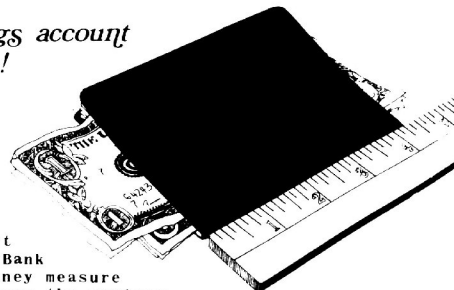

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Things I Remember

Apples, apples, apples! We had apples from the first Early Harvest almost until apples came again. It is quite a worry to me to know the old orchards are all gone and no new trees to replace them. Very few children will know the joy of picking up apples. Our evening chore was to pick up two bushels of big red cheeked apples for the pigs and a small pail full for "Mug."

Apples mean cider and cider means apple butter. When the days are cooler we made apple butter. It takes lots of stirring over a hot fire to cook apple butter. We picked up enough apples to make two barrels of cider and took them to the mill early. Early was Grandpa's alarm clock. Four gallons of cider to a bushel of apples and thirty gallons of cider to make a kettle of apple butter. We always had plenty to give to the neighbors or a cold drink for anyone passing by.

The cider was put in the big copper kettles this time. They had been washed and scoured until they shown like new pennies. The cats were all shut in the old brooder house and horses turned out to pasture so there would be no hairs flying around. The kettles didn't hold thirty gallons so we had to keep boiling and adding more cider. As soon as we could, we put in the peeled apples. The stirrer blade had holes in it and we pulled clean corn husks through the holes so the blade wouldn't scratch the copper kettles. Every one stopped by for a drink of fresh cold cider and the smell of wood smoke and boiling cider must have drifted as far as town because even the preachers, as many as three, stopped on pretext of helping stir. Occasionally our big, fat doctor stopped for a fresh drink. It was all fun and lots of laughing and joking went along with the boiling cider.

One of our good neighbors had a bad habit of swearing. How he did swear and we were always fearful when he and the preacher stirred apple butter together but they got along splendidly. Our neighbor knew good from bad and never swore when the preacher stirred.

Along toward evening, the butter thickened like real apple butter but Grandma said it wasn't ready yet. She always baked bread and had slices of warm bread spread with freshly churned butter and heaped up apple butter to give to the children when they walked past from school. Twenty pounds of sugar was dumped into the kettles

and as soon as the men finished chores and the big old moon started through the apple trees, the kettles were lifted off the fire and the apple butter was ready to can. The men helped dip and pour and the kettles were soon empty. Apple butter didn't cost anything. We left apples to pay for the cider making and sugar was one dollar for twenty pounds so we were very generous with apple butter.

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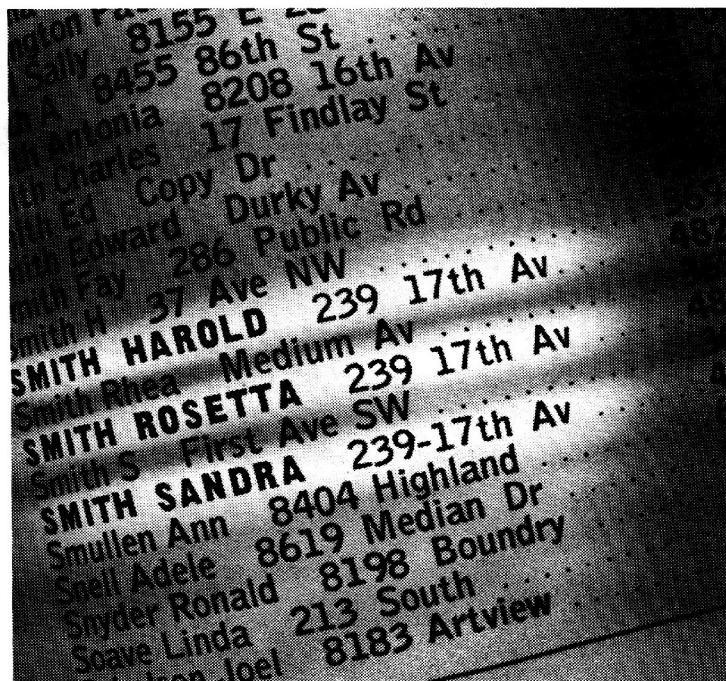

In his second meeting as superintendent of the Tippecanoe Valley schools, Dr. Lloyd Harrell made some sweeping changes Monday night that were favorably received by those attending the school board meeting. These included making available copies of both the agenda and the minutes of the previous meeting. In the future, this packet will include the claims, he told board members. "This is all public business," he said, "and anyone attending should know what is going on." He noted that school employee Judy Hively will attend the meetings to take minutes, freeing the superintendent or business manager from the need to take notes.

Using an agenda with a revised format, Harrell and school board president Fred Kindig needed only an hour and fifteen minutes to round out a business session that included appointment of the board's negotiating team and allowing salary increases to corporation teachers.

Appointed to the negotiating team were business manager Robert Forbes, spokesman; Dr. Harrell; TVHS principal Forst Dunnuck and Burket principal Oliver England. Six members could have been named, and this will permit no more than two school board members to sit in on any one negotiation session, Harrell said.

Harrell reported meetings on Friday and Monday with Professional Teachers Organization members, Lewis Shoemaker spokesman, had resulted in an agreement whereby teachers would be given ten per cent salary increases this year and seven and one-half per cent increases next year. Both of these are based on last year's starting salary, \$7,725. Other changes made in the agreement included increasing the amount of insurance the corporation pays from \$125 to \$250, extending sick leave days from 90 to 120 and adding the same 10 and 7½ per cent increases to the extra curricular duty schedule. Harrell noted the rule asking teachers to remain at their schools until 4 p.m. had been changed.

In addition to ratifying this agreement, board members

- Approved giving the administrative staff

permission to proceed with plans to build a new administration building on the high school ground and to move the central office, possibly by August 1, to the high school. Both Harrell and Dunnuck said space is available there that could be used as offices until the new office building could be constructed.

- Approved submitting a Title I proposal that will provide for two remedial reading teachers instead of one.

Program for Economically Disadvantaged Youth (SPEDY) that began late in June.

According to Roger Terrill, Warsaw, full-time Kosciusko County trainer, and Ted Carrao, Milwaukee, the county's part-time trainer, the program was started because of the nation's high unemployment rate. Especially hard-hit were

Paul Shereta seeks new life in Akron



Paul Shereta

The pursuit of life, liberty and happiness quite literally drew Akron's newest businessman, Paul Shereta, to the United States a scant year ago. At stake when he fled Brazil was his life. His liberty had already been jeopardized by a "friend." His happiness will come when he is again united with his wife and four sons who remain in Brazil.

For right now, Shereta is busy with his new firm, Pyramids Co., that specializes in emblems and signs, giving him ample opportunity to put into practice the art he studied in Italy and

Egypt and also English, one of the 12 languages he speaks.

Shereta's pursuit of life and liberty began in his native Egypt where for 12 years he was both minister of a Presbyterian church in Cairo and a sergeant in the army. Then came the Six-Day War of 1967, and he refused to kill. "I do not believe in the doctrine of war," he says. "I love all Arabs, same as I love Jews because the father of the Arabs and Jews is Abraham. The Arabs are sons of Ishmael and the Jews are sons of Isaac. Isaac and Ishmael are

Akron will be without ambulance service come December 31, according to a notice from local funeral home directors Dale Sheetz and Tom Haupt. In a memorandum to the Akron town board, Henry township trustee and Fulton Co. commissioners and council, they said:

"Due to the new federal and state regulations, we find we are unable to subject our-

selves to qualify with the mandatory rules.

"May we suggest you give this your utmost consideration to the gravity of this situation and work towards an appropriate solution effective on or before that date."

This action is in line with that in other communities, many of which have already gone to an Emergency Medical Service-type solution.

brothers, and they are sons of Abraham, and Abraham is our father."

In 1968, Shereta and his wife and sons, Adeline, now 13, and Raymond, now 10, fled to Brazil. There they had two more sons, Jorge, now six, and Emerson, a 16-month-old toddler. Shereta was minister of the San Paulo Presbyterian Church for Arabs and continued his active membership in Gideons International.

Suddenly, Paul Shereta was labeled a spy. The accuser was the man he considered his best friend, an officer in the immigration service. The man said Shereta was president of the San Paulo Gideons and that the group was spying in favor of Israel. "This

is false," Shereta protested. "Gideons are Christian people, distributors of the word of the Lord in 98 countries." Police took him to headquarters where three days of investigation revealed nothing to substantiate the spy charge.

Shereta was freed, but he was no longer a free man. "He will be angry and he will kill me," his former friend reasoned. "I am safe only if I kill him first."

With his life threatened, Paul Shereta fled to Chicago where he worked for a silk screening firm for six months before coming to Akron under the sponsorship of local Gideons.

Now active in the Akron Church of God as well as in the work of the Gideons, Shereta speaks to many groups, telling them of his escape and of his love of the Lord. "I now live in the United States in peace," he says. "I love the United States after my love for the Lord. The United States is a Christian country and there is no fanaticism here, only love for each other. I was speaker for the Lord in many countries in the Middle East, all of South America, Spain and Italy, and I'm sure the Lord loves me and has kept my life in His assurance to now. I only wait now for my family."

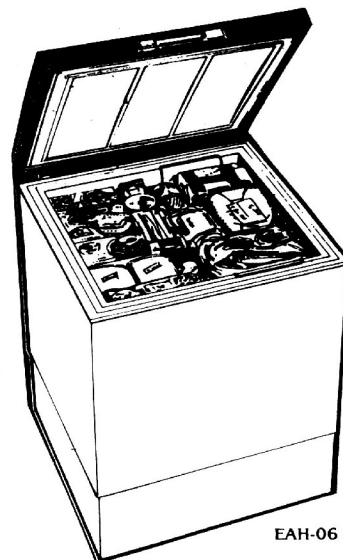

Mrs. John Gray, R. 2, Akron, and Mrs. Devon Dunnuck, Mentone, have been named chairmen of the two towns' 1975 Breath of Life campaign to fight children's lung diseases. Each will lead local volunteers in raising funds to benefit research and care for children with cystic fibrosis, the most serious of lung ailments, and other related lung-damaging diseases such as asthma, chronic bronchitis and bronchiectasis. The campaign, slated for September, will involve many volunteer

marchers collecting door-to-door in their own neighborhoods. The funds raised will help the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation support over 100 care, teaching and research centers across the United States, four of which are in Indiana.

Thus far an incurable disease, C/F is inherited when both parents carry the defective gene. It is believed one in 20 persons carries the C/F gene, usually without knowing it. One in every 1,500 children is born with C/F.

The illness is characterized by thick, sticky mucus which clogs the lungs and affects the gastrointestinal system. Because of improved therapy and con-

stant research, many C/F patients are living beyond infancy into their teens and young adulthood. That same kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of cystic fibrosis.

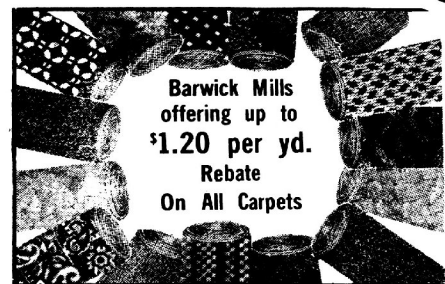

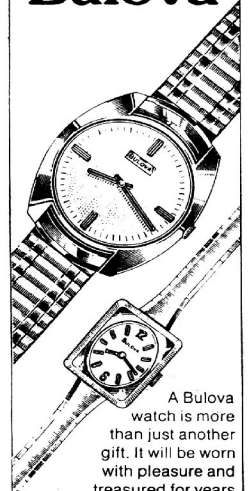

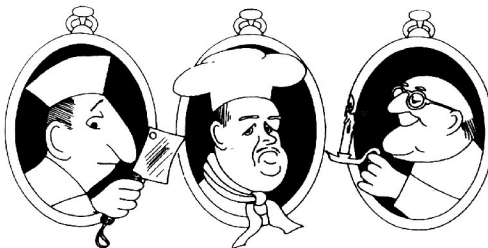

School board approves \$2,278,218 budget, \$4.42 rate

A \$2,278,218 budget with a total tax rate of \$4.42 was approved for advertisement by the Tippecanoe Valley school Board Monday night after a public meeting attended by 20-30 taxpayers. Of the total budget, \$307,600 was earmarked for debt service with the largest amount, \$1,960,011, going into the general fund. Eighty-two cents of the rate is cumulative building fund with the general fund levy set at \$3.60.

Taking the largest whack from the budget is the instruction account: \$1,170,727, up \$153,016 from last year. Administration, proposed at \$112,000, is up from \$58,000 last year, according to the budget that also calls for \$2,000 in health services, \$190,500 for transportation (a drop of \$1,000), \$347,811 in plant operation (up from \$291,000), \$50,500 maintenance (up \$30,000); fixed charges of \$74,550 (up \$30,000). Capital outlay and debt service remained the same at \$4,000 and \$307,600, and transfer accounts jumped from \$15,000 to \$18,530.

Presenting the budget was Dr. Lloyd Harrell who said TVSC's assessed valuation per pupil in 1976 would be \$11,554 as compared to a \$10,000 state average. Total corporation valuation, he said, is \$25,546,628.

Fielding such questions as "Why do we need both a business manager and a superintendent when one person was able to handle administrative duties during the time a new high school was constructed?" and "Have you ever considered going to an IBM date system to handle payroll checks as a way to save clerical costs?" Dr. Harrell was prepared with answers. One person could possibly do most of the work, he said, but something would be slighted. He also quoted new state laws such as the one giving students the right to privacy as a basis for needing additional personnel, and while he did not rule out the possibility the

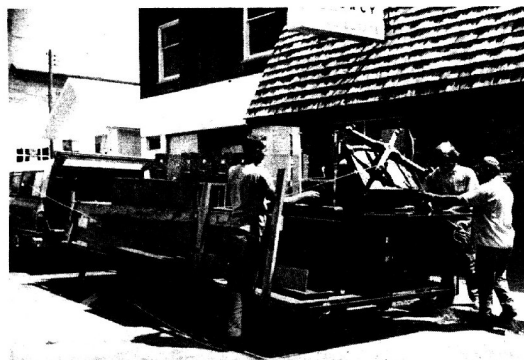
corporation might go to an IBM system later, he said that for right now it was simpler to continue as in the past.

Following the public discussion, board members moved from the lecture room to the teacher preparation room to study the budget. After some consideration, no changes were proposed and the budget was adopted for advertising as presented. It may be

read in its entirety in this week's NEWS.

No further action was taken although there was some discussion as to the possible future replacement of the Akron junior high building.

All future board meetings will be conducted in the teacher preparation area since administrative offices were moved this week to the new high school.

Produced by Ken Anderson Films, Warsaw, the film, which features three Warsaw young people, has been nominated for a Freedoms Foundation award. Underlying theme of the film is the religious heritage handed down to the present generation from ancestors

who founded the country.

In order for Mentone to qualify as the first Bicentennial town, it will be necessary to plan various programs, festivals and the restoration of an old building or construction of something new, all of which must be planned and completed and must be of lasting importance and value.

Forst Dunnuck and Kenneth Bush, principal and band director of Tippecanoe Valley High School, will head the first segment of the program—Heritage '76. School and public convocations will be planned during the fall.

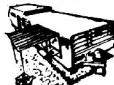

For the second and third times consecutively, Robin Secrist and Melva Smith will compete in the state demonstration contest at the Indiana State Fair.

Both girls, active members of the Mentone Merry 4-H'ers, have practiced for many weeks, changing dialogue while making posters and samples.

Although Kosciusko Co. was represented by several demonstrators at the Area 10 contest in LaPorte County, these girls were the only two in the senior division to receive blue ribbons at the county level.

Rainbow plans activities

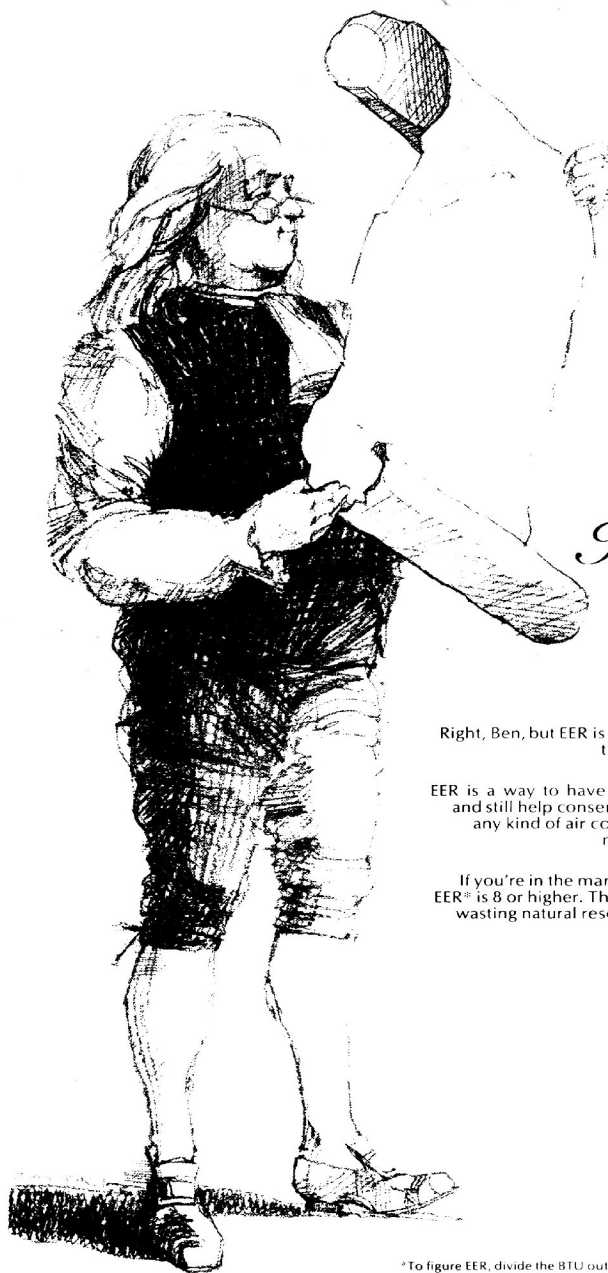

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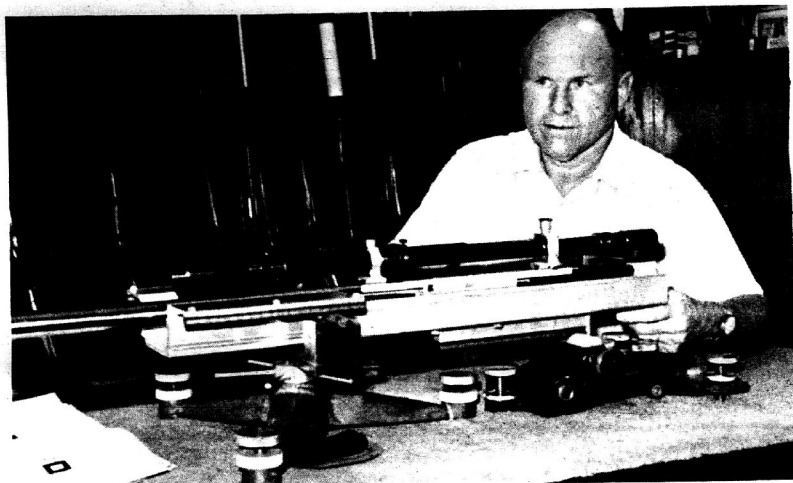

New books at Akron Carnegie Public Library

New books at the Akron Carnegie Public Library include the following:

INDIAN WOMEN OF THE WESTERN MORNING by John Upton Terrell and Donna M. Terrell. This is the first comprehensive study of the North American Indian woman at the time of the white man's arrival on the continent. The daily life of women in various tribes is explored: the complex religious and political power held by the matrilineal Hopi; the status factors of the wives of the polygynous Sioux; sex rituals and taboos in various tribes; the marriage and divorce laws; women as healers, as mothers, as cooks and as artisans. *Indian Women of the Western Morning* dispels the myths.

THE JOY OF THE SNOW by Elizabeth Goudge. Here is the story of Miss Goudge's own life and background to her writing. Four decades and more than twelve million copies after her American debut, the author of "The Child From the Sea", "Green Dolphin Street" and "The Scent of Water" has written an enduring, personal and inspiring account of her own progress from a sheltered childhood to international acclaim.

Beeson range booms

"Not too bad," the marksman says as he inspects the paper target. His five shots have left a hole no larger than a soup bean.

He is a bench rest shooting enthusiast, and like his fellow riflemen at Beeson's Rifle Range, located northeast of Mentone in the Crystal Lake area, he aims for absolute accuracy. His score will be based on the center to center distance of his two furthest shots.

This accuracy requires highly sophisticated weapons, most of which have never been aimed at anything except paper targets. Range owner Jim Beeson, who recently won the Mississippi Valley Regional unrestricted category 100 yard championship, for instance, fires a custom built 22-40" that weighs almost 45 pounds. Outside of the scope and the trigger there is little about it that resembles a gun. The weight of the guns re-

quires shooters to fire from a sitting position, hence the name: bench rest.

Bench rest shooting is divided by weight into four categories: heavy varmint, in which gun and sight can weigh no more than 13½ pounds; light varmint, gun and sight to weigh no more than 10½ pounds; sporter, sight and gun to weigh no more than 10½ pounds but limited to six millimeter or larger in caliber, and unrestricted. The latter may look like a shoulder rifle or the barrel and action may be shot off a mechanical rest, such as the weapon Beeson uses.

Built in 1950, the range was originally intended for the enjoyment of Jim Beeson and his brother Fred and their friends. They recall Dr. Donald VanGilder, Jack VanGilder, Robert Kinsey and Chester Smith were among the early shooters. It was an informal place, a

brooder house serving as the shooting house. Destroyed in 1956 by a tornado, the brooder house was replaced with a block building that was later converted into a gun store. Many young shooters joined in the fun at the range, and it continued to grow until it now includes 20 benches, all covered, with a covered loading area and modern restroom facilities. Until this year it was the only 100 and 200-yard registered shooting range in Indiana. Affiliated with the National Bench Rest Shooters Association, the range's matches are registered. This means that any time a shooter appears to have broken a world's record, the targets can be sent to a measuring committee for verification, the shooter automatically receiving credit if he succeeds in bettering an existing record.

While no world's records have been broken on the range, shooting there is as tough as anywhere in the nation, and one man, Perry Morton, Mentone, holds four world's records. He also has the distinction of having won the national grand aggregate (combined 100 and 200-yard score) in the sporter and three rifle (average of all three grand aggregates) categories two years in a row. In 1973 Morton was joined by two of his range mates in hauling home national championships when Gary Kinsey of Tippecanoe won the light varmint 200-yard aggregate and grand aggregate and Bruce Searfoss, of Leesburg, won in the 200-yard heavy varmint class.

"Almost anyone can hit a target in wind-still conditions," Jim Beeson says. "It's the ability to read weather conditions that makes

winners." He notes that a 10-15 mile per hour crosswind can move a bullet as much as an inch off course.

The range attracts shooters from 18 to 80. Because they sit to fire, many handicapped persons are able to participate. A few women compete and many more come just to watch.

Safety is stressed at all of the matches. A range officer makes certain there is no ammunition behind the firing line. Equipment cannot be placed on the line until the officers give the command and a shooter cannot leave without removing the bolt from his rifle. Beeson, who says he knows of no fatalities on any range, stresses gun safety at all times. He encourages young shooters by giving instruction in the operation of BB guns and opens his range free of charge to law enforcement officers for training programs. Some 60 area sportsmen have keys to the range, a privilege granted only to those considered safe.

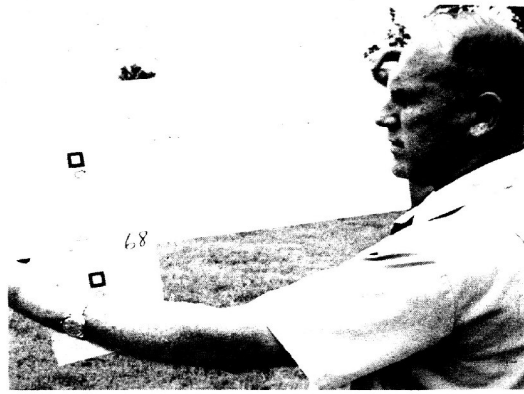
Monthly meets at the range draw large crowds as do matches sponsored by the American Single Shot Rifle Association that has leased it for three matches this year.

But is is the bench rest weapon that Beeson likes best. He hosted the state championship matches July 12 and 13 and is now preparing for his first national contest, August 5-8.

During championship matches, each shooter has seven minutes in which to fire shots for a record, unless he is firing in the unrestricted category which allows him 12 minutes

for ten shots. Each may have as many shots at the sighter target as he desires, giving him an opportunity to check the effect of a change in wind without detracting from his score.

"Fred and I made the range possible," Jim says, "but many other people have pitched in to help." This was especially true last year when a tornado again touched down, this time doing extensive damage both to the range and to the Beeson hog operation. The range reopened in time for use during the summer, and while some of the scars still show, it's a place that is literally booming with people having a good time doing what they like best.



WHEN SHOOTING IS ACCURATE, something other than a target is needed to determine if the correct amount of shots have been fired. Beeson shows a long card that moves slowly behind the target. Each of the contestant's five shots clearly shows. It would be impossible to determine how many shots were fired by looking at the target since all five filled an area about the size of a soup bean.

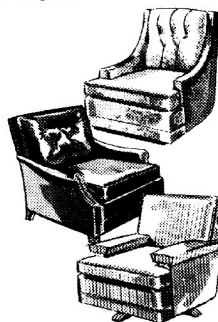

Bedelia Weirick is Manchester College's winningest coach

Bedelia Weirick is one of the winningest coaches in Manchester College's history, according to the college's July bulletin.

Over the past eight years, Miss Weirick, a Mentone High School graduate, has served as Manchester's one-woman coaching staff for the school's intercollegiate woman's athletic program.

During those years, her teams have compiled an impressive 133-71 record in five sports for a .652 winning percentage. Only three of her 24 teams have suffered losing seasons.

In her eight years as THE women's coach at Manchester, Miss Weirick notes the biggest change has been in the area of finances. In 1968-69, the women's athletic program received \$300 for the entire school year. During the past school year the program received \$2,500.

The daughter of Raymond Weirick, Mentone, and the late Mrs. Weirick, Coach Weirick received her B.A. degree in health and physical education from Wheaton College in 1952 and her master's degree in health from Indiana University in 1962. While

at Wheaton, she competed in badminton, volleyball, basketball and tennis.

She taught at the elementary and high school levels in Illinois and Michigan and at the junior high and high school levels in the Warsaw school system before joining the MC staff.

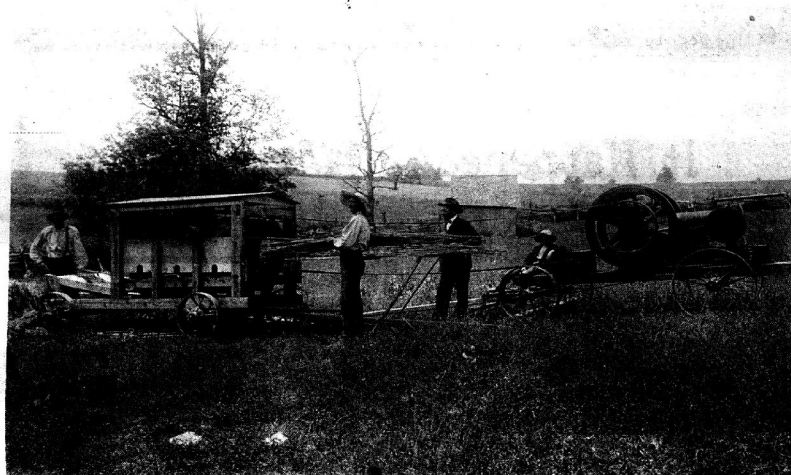

A HEMP BREAKER described in a recent NEWS article by Clara Yeaman sounded familiar to reader Betty (Mrs. Earl) Ellenwood, and she searched through family memorabilia to locate this picture of the machine invented by her grandfather, William Klauk, then of Winchester, Ky. He moved to Indiana after demonstrating his machine in the area and located at Nappanee. Like the Stauffers who originally grew hemp in the area, he had no idea the substance would later be called marijuana and would be considered a menace instead of a useful crop.

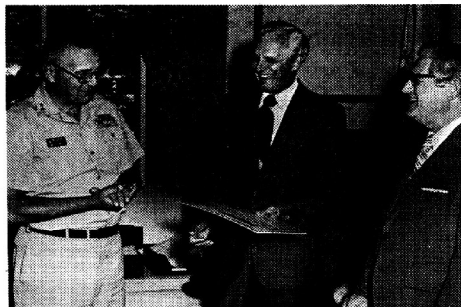
