Anti-secrecy

To The Editor:

A new state law closing loopholes in the state's anti-secrecy law takes effect Sept. 1. Under the law, most meetings of state and local government boards and agencies are open to the public. The new law, popularly called "The Sunshine Law," spells out the law more clearly and also stipulates what public officials must do to avoid violating the law.

One of the problems with the old law has been that very few people knew about it. Often school board members and other board members first learned of it only after they had violated it. The same often held true for their attorney. As a result their attorney often tried to "get them out of it," so to speak, compounding the problem. The new law also is aimed at making it easier to take action against those who commit infractions of the law. For that reason, it is important that anyone on a public board know of the provisions of the law and also make sure his board's attorney knows of the law beforehand, also. The old law can be found beginning on Page 334 of Title 5 of Burns Statutes. The new law can be found in the Acts of 1976 at the county clerk's office.

223-4911--the number to remember

Dear Editor:

A fully staffed Emergency Ambulance Service is now based in Akron. To obtain emergency medical service, you must contact the base station at Woodlawn Hospital. Within seconds by radio beeper communication, the hospital dispatcher will notify local Emergency Medical Technicians who will always be on call. They will in turn report to the vehicle and respond directly to the emergency. When the Emergency Medical Technicians reach the ambulance, the passenger EMT calls the hospital thereby notifying them that the ambulance is in route. If no such report is received within a few minutes of the first page to the volunteer EMT's in Akron, the hospital's unit will be dispatched as a backup unit.

Place this number on the inside of your telephone directory or in a very conspicuous place, 223-4911. Please call the ambulance service collect or if you prefer, call it directly and after the emergency ask for reimbursement. All telephone calls to the emergency service are free.

Remember, when contacting the hospital give clear accurate descriptions. Stay on the phone until the dispatcher accurately repeats the address and directions back to you. Do not worry about the lost time, the ambulance will be sent immediately, and the directions you give the dispatcher will be radioed to the ambulance in route.

Also remember if you are driving and an ambulance or any other emergency vehicle approaches that someone's life may be in jeopardy. The ambulance must have a clear road, therefore, safely pull over to the side and let the ambulance pass.

Services were Tuesday morning at the Haupt Funeral Home, Akron, with the Rev. John Moore officiating. Burial was in the Akron cemetery.

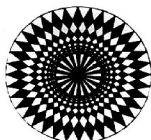

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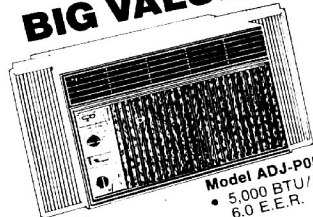

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Federal payments due for wheat

Unless there is an increase in wheat prices over the next four months, area wheat farmers will receive federal payments this fall, according to Sid Sadler, Fulton Co. ASCS executive director. He said deficiency payments are to be made to producers if the national average market price for the first five months of the marketing year is less than the target price of \$2.47 per bushel.

"The preliminary national average wheat price for all farmers was \$2 per bushel in June, compared with \$2.19 in May, he said.

Wheat farmers who would like additional information on the wheat deficiency payment provisions of the current program relative to their farm should contact the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASCs) office or an ASC county committee member.

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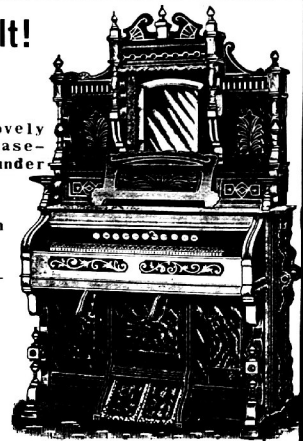

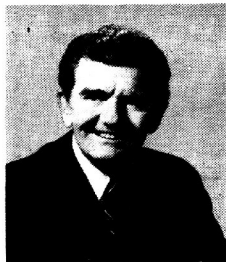

Mentone-Warsaw cable work begun

General Telephone cable installation crews have started work on a \$59,000 project to increase the number of telephone lines between Mentone and Warsaw.

According to General Telephone's district service manager, Ed Knafel, the project was initiated to meet new growth in the area. "Because of increased business and residential growth in the Mentone-Warsaw area, and subsequent increases in calling volume, additional facilities are needed to meet the long-distance requirements of these communities," said Knafel.

He said that the cable installation project will involve the placement of facilities needed for the installation of electronic call handling equipment called "carrier systems."

"This carrier equipment will allow the company to transmit and receive up to 24 simultaneous conversations over two pairs of wire which would normally be limited to only two simultaneous conversations," said Knafel.

"Consequently, installation of the carrier systems will increase the number of lines available for customer use between Mentone and Warsaw without the time required to physically install miles of additional cable and associated facilities."

General Telephone construction crews are presently placing more than 29,000 feet of new cable, with most of the cable slated for in-

stallation along portions of State Road 25, and County Roads 950 West and 200 South.

Knafel noted that the majority of the new cable will be buried, protecting it from adverse weather and maintaining the natural appearance of the landscape in the area.

Work on the project is slated for completion during the second quarter of 1978.

This could save your life

You could be enjoying a quiet conversation over a sumptuous meal at your favorite restaurant when your spouse or friend suddenly gasps for breath and quickly turns pale and then blue. What should you do? There are some emergency first aid measures you can learn that may help you save his or her life.

If the victim is not breathing or gasps for breath, something could be stuck in his or her throat. Try to remove the piece of food or other object from the throat by opening the victim's mouth and grasping

the object with your index and middle fingers. If this doesn't work, place the victim's head lower than the body and slap him or her on the back. If these methods don't work, stand behind the person who is choking and wrap your arms around the body, just above the navel and below the rib-cage. Lean the victim forward at the waist and let the head and arms hang down. Put one hand on your own wrist; make a fist with the other hand, and squeeze suddenly and firmly against the victim's abdomen. This will force air out of the lungs, and the air will push the object out of the throat.

This and other emergency first aid measures are outlined in a new pocket-sized reference guide entitled "First Aid" which costs 80 cents and can be ordered from Consumer Information Center, Dept. 120E, Pueblo, Colo. 81009.

Storm batters area

Kindig re-elected school board president

Fred Kindig was re-elected president of the Tippecanoe Valley school board at a special reorganizational meeting Saturday night. Con Shewman was named vice-president, and Vernon Meredith was elected secretary. At the recommendation of superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrell, they joined fellow board members Everett Besson and Don Snipes in appointing Judy Hively treasurer and Eleanor Hoover deputy treasurer.

In other action, the board approved forms designating the Akron Exchange State Bank and Farmers State Bank as depositories and heard a report from Harrell regarding the high school's vulnerability to lightning.

Harrell said the school's air conditioning system was hit during the most recent storm and said many electric motors have been destroyed by lightning. A team composed of an electrical consultant, an electrical engineer, an REMC representative, building and grounds supervisor Charles Fellers and Harrell met recently to investigate the matter. Their opinion was that there is a grounding problem that enables lightning to surge into the building. In an attempt to alleviate this, 20' grounding rods will be driven at the base of seven selected light poles and REMC will install a voltage meter that will permit better monitoring.

Harrell also noted the Burket

Members approved a two-year lease agreement with Cardinal Center, Warsaw, as part of their obligation as members of a five-corporation special education cooperative.

Mentone to get new speed limit signs

The Indiana State Highway Commission has completed its survey of the town and authorization has been signed for the erection of more speed limit signs, Mentone town board

president Frank Hardesty announced Monday night. He said a "school bus loading" sign will be placed at the east edge of town and also reported Northern Indiana Public Service Co. had moved a guide wire on North Morgan St. at no cost to the town.

Hardesty also reported the Tri-Township Fire Control Board met Saturday morning and voted to advertise for bids on a new tank and chassis. Board members agreed to accept the town's share, approximately \$8,300.

Repairs for the police care were discussed but no decisions were reached.

Frank Banghart, who will spend July 22 in Indianapolis taking state examinations for water operator certification, will receive a \$500

raise for 1977, effective July 1.

Water works superintendent Harry Sullivan reported the fire department has asked about placing a hydrant at Mentzer Park for flooding the ice rink in the winter. No decision was reached by the board.

Also discussed without reaching a decision was a suggestion that the town withdraw from the area plan commission.

Board members were to meet Tuesday night with Glen Albright of the State Board of Accounts to discuss the 1978 town budget. A special July 18 meeting is planned at 7:30 p.m. to discuss revenue sharing money with senior citizens. The next regular meeting will be Monday, August 1, at 7:30 p.m. in the town hall.

Law to be explained

On September 1, a new law will become effective that will have a profound impact on the workings of governmental agencies in the state of Indiana. Titled simple "The Open Door Law," the bill is the first major change in "open access" legislation since the Hughes Anti-Secrecy Act was passed many years ago.

A meeting to explain the new law is planned July 21 at the Holiday Inn in Michigan City. Publishers, editors and staff members from daily and weekly newspapers in northwest Indiana will attend in addition to key governmental leaders from cities, towns, townships, county, school and hospital boards.

Good forest management helps

Good forest management helps our timber industry and our timber owners. Owners can help implement this good management by knowing and following the following facts:

1. Woodlands need protection from grazing and fire. Both of these agents damage trees and seriously inhibit the forest's ability to regenerate itself or protect itself from insects or disease. Without protection, future crops of forest products will not be grown.
2. Woodlands need cultural work such as thinning, pruning, the removal of vines and cull trees to realize the maximum growth possible. Most woods are only producing one-half to one-third of their true potential and with timber becoming scarcer, this is a real waste!!!
3. Woodlands need regular harvesting based on growth rate and soil capabilities. Trees should be selected on basis of their condition, not on size. Harvesting complements the needed cultural work, and as utilization of trees improves, more and more of the cultural work will be accomplished by harvesting, benefiting both the timber grower and the industry.
4. Wise marketing of trees harvested will bring a fair market price to the grower. It brings a willing seller together with a willing buyer into an agreement that is mutually satisfactory.
5. Good forest management is a continuous application of silvicultural and economic principles to the woodland resources for the purpose of obtaining a sustained yield of forest products without the depletion of these resources or the loss of all the other benefits which are derived from forest by mankind. (It is like "Having your cake and eating it too!" Timber is a crop — A renewable resource is properly harvested and cared for.)

Conservation Club plans planting

President Robert Bradley said the plantings will consist of 240 pine seedlings to be installed along the west, north and east boundaries of the cemetery grounds and 24 eight-foot sugar maples along the south side bordering Third St. The trees will replace those

destroyed by the 1974 tornado and will be planted by club members with the approval of cemetery trustees.

as speech and hearing specialist was accepted. Mrs. Bormann and her husband plan to move out of state to work on advanced degrees, she said in a letter read by Harrell.

School board members signed the title for the building trades house sold at the last meeting and authorized the superintendent to get a card enabling the corporation to be notified when surplus government property becomes available.

"Lack of support and harassment" charges were leveled at Dr. Harrell by parents of special education students during the audience session. Many of the charges centered on a recent bus trip to Terre Haute in which students participated in the state Special Olympics. Parents said the bus did not have a full tank of gas when it left, as had been promised, and was not in good operating condition. They said they had been promised a credit card but were later denied it by Dr. Harrell. They said the bus broke down on the return trip and the students were ordered off by state police because the area was under a tornado

warning. Parents said Harrell chided the teacher for this action, which they felt was unfair.

Harrell apologized to the teacher, Linda Garver, but denied charges he had harassed any parents or had taken any "snipes" at them. "That is a gross untruth and absolute lie," he said of charges that he had used profanity in speaking with one of them. He agreed he had denied them use of a credit card but said he had told them to bring back their gas tickets for reimbursement. The latter action drew disfavor from the parents since they felt they would have to pay the money out of \$400 they raised to finance the trip. "Other teams don't have to buy their own gas," they said. "They don't have to beg for buses." Harrell, after a moment's hesitation, said the group would be reimbursed for the gas used without having to take it from the balance of their \$400, most of which went for shirts and entry fees for the children.

Other parents said their main concern was that students did not have proper materials. "My daughter has been in special ed seven years and this is the first year she's had a book of her own,"

one mother said. Others complained that 18 children had to share three books with much of the material being copied, often so illegally it could not be read.

Teacher Mary Behney was credited by parents for obtaining books for the second semester on a \$700 grant. She and Mrs. Garver said they had been told there was no money for books.

"There are books all over the Mentone school," Harrell retorted. "If these kids could read books other classes use they wouldn't need to be in special ed," a teacher replied.

"We want our special ed children to have text books and work books the same as any other children," one parent said. Another added, "It shouldn't be necessary for us to have to come to the board every time we want something. We shouldn't have to go through this all the time."

At the conclusion of the audience session, one mother promised, "We'll do our part if you guys will do yours." Kindig, who backed Harrell by saying he had done more for the local special education program than ten men, said, "We try to do as much for them as anyone else."

Newcastle township stories include the Ed Meredith farm, Alvin Finney house, and Briar Wood (old Haimbaugh house now restored by Terry Hammer).

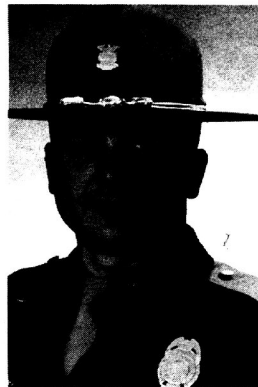

Needy families may get fuel bill relief

Fulton Co. residents may be eligible for federal relief from last winter's huge fuel bills, according to Volma Byerline, director of the Fulton Co. Development Council, Inc.

Mrs. Byerline said individual maximum qualifying income would be \$3,715.50; the maximum income level for a family of four would be \$7,312.50. In addition, the household must have an unpaid utility or fuel bill and be in danger of having home heating utilities or fuel supplies shut off.

Mrs. Byerline said the low-income householder would prove his utility bill dilemma by either

showing notice from the utility company that his bill was overdue or, what is expected will be more common, showing that he is unable to meet utility budget plan costs.

The procedure for seeking assistance will be for the family to visit the township trustee and seek assistance for the unpaid fuel bill. If no assistance or only partial assistance is available from the trustee, he will refer the family to the Fulton Co. Development Council to process their claim for a \$250 maximum benefit. If the family meets all eligibility requirements, a claim will be

submitted to the State Community Services Administration, which will make the payment directly to the utility company or fuel supplier.

The Special Crisis Intervention Program is designed to prevent hardship or danger to health because of utility shut-off or lack of fuel, but earlier initiation of the program during the winter months, for example, may have been more beneficial than the existing plans.

One of the stipulations in the Congressional Act is that all money allocated for Energy Crisis Intervention must be spent by August of this year. That means within the two months of July and August, poor families will need to qualify for the program and have their energy assistance vouchers submitted to the state or lose out.

Representatives of the Fulton Co. Development Council will visit Talma, Akron and Fulton at places and times to be announced later to take applications for the program.

Applications will be accepted daily through August from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Fulton Co. Development Council office, Civic Center, 7th and Pontiac Streets, Rochester. For appointment or further information, call 223-3701.

Kosciusko Co. Crisis Intervention Program begun

The Kosciusko Co. chapter of the American National Red Cross has accepted the responsibility for a Special Crisis Intervention Program for the county that will be coordinated by Lucille Koontz, longtime Red Cross volunteer.

The two-month program will provide assistance to low-income families that can be in the form of payments on delinquent fuel or utility bills, purchase of fuel, up to \$250 and/or a direct grant of \$50 to households showing dire financial need as an outcome of having paid excessively high fuel bills this past winter. Approximately \$62,000 has been allocated to Kosciusko Co. for this purpose.

Many persons are still feeling the pinch from the severe winter and have either had their utilities shut off or are faced with shut-off. Others, who use coal, heating oil, wood or propane gas, are faced with the possibility of discontinuance of deliveries due to bills in arrears.

The community Services Administration has set up income guidelines that must be met. According to the plan, income maximums for the program are:

School board recommends \$4.55 rate

A \$4.55 tax levy was recommended by Tippecanoe Valley school board members at their Monday night meeting. Of this, \$3.62 will go to the general fund and \$.93 is designated for debt service. A total of \$1,247,542.20 will be raised, up \$182,421.20 from last year.

A notice to taxpayers of tax levies will be published in the July 28 and August 3 issues of the NEWS. Taxpayers will be heard at a special meeting August 25 in the teacher's preparation room of Tippecanoe Valley High School.

Approved a five percent across-the-board pay increase for extra duty assignments and approved a list submitted by superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrell for these positions. Most of the duties approved fall within the area of sports although also included were play director, senior class sponsors and other non-sports personnel.

Adopted a policy manual. Harrell said most of the changes involved changing the role of the business manager, a job abolished several months ago, to superintendent. He said the meeting policy would be changed to reflect the new "Sunshine Law" requiring open meetings with advance notice if requested. The section of the manual pertaining to bus drivers stipulates that two reprimands will result in the driver's contract becoming void and 50-mile-per-hour speed limits will be enforced. In the event of bad weather school closings will be reported on WRSW, WOWO and WROL. Board member Vernon Meredith questioned Harrell about the success of a policy initiated last year that permits a high school student eight days' unexcused

absence. Harrell said former high school principal Forst Dunnuck ran surveys that indicated 96 percent attendance compared to 93 before the policy change. Meredith said he knew many students were abusing the policy but declined to make changes until it had been tried a second year.

Heard a report read by Harrell from Martha Bormann, speech and hearing therapist who conducted a four-week summer program. She said 11 students participated in four 45-minute

sessions daily with an average attendance of ten. She recommended the program be continued.

Heard a letter from the Silver Creek Church of God expressing appreciation for use of the Akron grade school during the church's remodeling program.

Accepted a signations from Martha Bormann and Donna Swanson. Mrs. Bormann recently moved to Plymouth and has a young child while Mrs. Swanson's

and vote on the same day on grounds it would invite wholesale fraud, the two House Republicans sent away to a mail order "ID mill" for seven color identification cards. Four of the bogus IDs were for Dornan and three for Symms. Each is for the Commonwealth of Virginia and each is very official looking with a name, address, and vital statistics. The phony ID's cost \$5 apiece.

ODDS and ENDS

I've never considered myself either a feminist or an anti-feminist. I think women should receive equal pay for equal work and should be given equal opportunities. Other than that, I'm very much a middle of the roader, favoring neither bra burners nor hearts and flowers ultra-conservatives. Mine was not a popular stance at the state International Women's Year meeting Saturday in Indianapolis.

The meeting, mandated by Public Law 94-167, featured speakers in a variety of workshops, including legal status of homemakers, employment, education, art, humanities and media, child care, health care, women in positions of influence, female offenders, racial and ethnic groups, older women, international interdependence and strategies for change.

Any woman who registered before 11 a.m. was considered a voting delegate and could help elect representatives to attend a November national meeting in Houston.

It was after 12 when my friend, Marilyn, and I arrived, but emotions were running high as we made our way past a white-suited minister riding up and down an escalator preaching that women were already men's equals. Pro life (anti-abortion) groups rubbed elbows with people selling buttons bearing the message "Hitler was Pro Life too." Some booths urged militancy, others volunteerism, and still others stressed the need for more education. We talked with feminists and anti-feminists, and we saw some of the most beautifully feminine women we had seen in years and some fat, braless, tee-shirt wearing demonstrators singing "We shall overcome."

My duty as an officer of Woman's Press Club of Indiana was to pass out membership information. It wasn't a militant job, and it certainly wasn't demanding. Still, it kept me in one spot while Marilyn was free to roam, and it was she who saw the homosexual who demanded he and his mate be given the opportunity to adopt a child. She listened to a debate between him and a heterosexual and heard a woman demand that her attorney, the security police and state police evict the preacher on the escalator.

Still, there was nothing boring about my position in the booth. Five thousand men, women and children make for a lot of people watching, and I was enjoying myself completely when a wistful voice asked, "Can I register a complaint?"

"Sure," I said, wondering what I'd done to offend.

"There wasn't enough information about this meeting in the papers. It was like they were trying to keep us homemakers out."

"I don't think so. I didn't know about it until a few days ago."

"I'm glad," she said as she moved to the next booth, home base for the Citizen's Review Committee for IWY. Stressing its view that there is no public issue or public matter that does not concern women, it was opposed to publicly funded and sponsored sex segregated meetings and any meetings purporting to deal with "women's problems" and "women's issues." It demanded the end of women's commissions, women's meetings, International Women's Years or national and world plans of action for women. "We want to participate as individuals in affairs that concern and interest us," their printed purpose stated.

"Right-wingers," some hissed. "Communists," whispered

others. Still, the booth was obviously busy, its workers exceedingly well-organized to the point of using walkie-talkies to marshal their forces. I scanned their purpose sheet closer and read: We reject the premise that all men are sexist, that our society oppresses all women, that all men have greater opportunities for health and happiness than women, simply because they are men, that our society does not provide opportunities for women to live happy, creative and productive lives with recognition of their contributions on all levels of life, that a price tag can be placed on the contributions a father or mother, or husband or wife, makes to a marriage, a family, a home.

"I agree with that," I whispered to Marilyn as she returned from watching a gay demonstration. "Me to," she replied. We turned to more of the group's information and read, "After voting for this slate, go immediately to the Citizens' Review Committee trailer outside the Convention Center and sign an affidavit that

you voted for this slate in its entirety."

"I never heard of having to tell anyone how you voted in a democracy," she said and before we could speculate if the group was afraid their vote would not count or if it was really so militant it demanded a non-secret ballot, someone who had overheard us said, "They're anti-American."

Whatever they were, whatever anyone else was, the pink ribbon wearing, pleasant-faced housewives one newspaper described as Bible belt anti-feminists, won the election, but that didn't come until hours after we'd made our way past the teaming line that snaked around the building as people waited their turn to vote.

Bible belt? Feminists? Anti-feminists? We still didn't know which we were, but we did know the Pro Life, Pro Family, Pro God, Anti ERA group was right on one point: There is no topic about which all women agree.

It's a shame they had to stand in line to prove it.

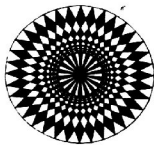
One of my favorite nephews is Bill DuBois of Muncie. He has been serving a four-year term as personal advisor and press secretary to Gov. Otis Bowen.

"Clearly, the potential hazard with this instant voter scheme is that an unscrupulous 'voter' could cruise from precinct to precinct, print phony identification, and cast his bogus ballot over and over again," Lugar said. "These votes would be counted even if fraud were discovered in later examination. The real tragedy of vote fraud - aside from its crippling effect on our election system - is that it nullifies the votes of honest citizens who try to make sincere and well-informed choices."

Lugar said he also is apprehensive about the instant voter plan because it would expand the federal government's role in the administration of elections. "The plan would spawn new federal procedures for auditing and enforcement, require reams of new federal guidelines and regulations, and absorb an estimated \$53 million in federal tax money during the first two years alone," he said.

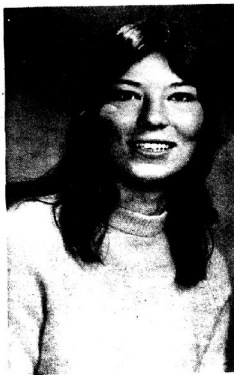

1977 acreage reports due

Fulton Co. farmers are reminded that they need to report 1977 acreages of wheat, corn, grain sorghum and barley to the county ASCS office—wheat before harvest and corn before September 1—Joe Kroft, vice chairman, Fulton Co. ASCS committee, said this week.

Kroft said 1978 farm program legislation now under consideration in Congress provides that if a set-aside is necessary next year, the amount to be set aside may be based on a percentage of the acreage planted for harvest in 1977.

Full seeded crop acreage must be reported prior to harvesting, if possible. Farmers who have already begun or completed harvest should contact the ASCS office immediately. Crop acreages and the crop use must be reported on a field-by-field basis.

Kroft emphasized that farmers who fail to report wheat, corn, grain sorghum and barley acreage will be considered to have no planted acreage and may be ineligible to participate in 1978 program benefits.

What's Cooking?

Is it safe to use old mayonnaise or pickle jars for home canning?

No. Packers' jars are one trip jars usually made of a thinner glass than standard canning jars. Since the thinner glass is less resistant to extremes of temperatures and mechanical shock, they may be more breakable. Often the necks of non-standard canning jars are not perfectly round or may have dips in them or lids do not fit properly. Therefore, a proper seal may not be maintained and the food will spoil.

How can I can my green beans? I don't have a pressure canner.

Green beans are low in acid and may be canned under pressure. A pressure saucepan or cooker can be used if it has a gauge that maintains 10 pounds of pressure. Twenty minutes should be added to the regular processing time.

If a jar doesn't seal, is it necessary to reprocess it the full length of time?

Yes. The entire process and processing time should be repeated. Check the rim of the jar carefully and use a new lid.

What is the difference between canning salt and table salt?

Canning salt has no additives. Table salt has something added to prevent caking and generally has iodine added. Pure salt is the best for canning, as the additives may make the jars cloudy. Iodine reacts

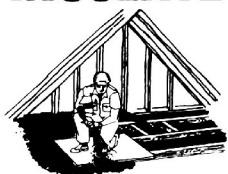
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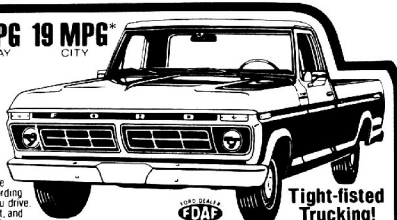

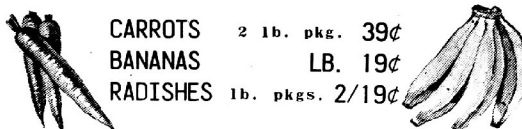

'Road under construction' signs popped up in the area this week as Indiana State Highway employees began installing new culverts along SR 19, the preliminary stage

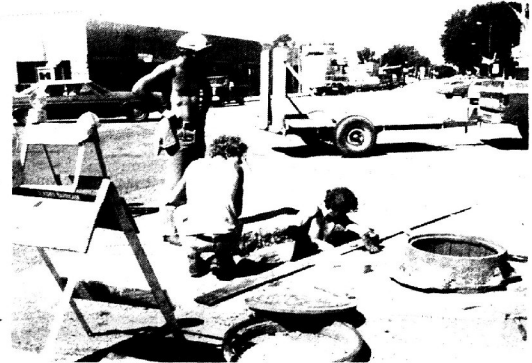
to a general resurfacing set to begin next week. Plans call for the stretch of road between Akron and Mentone to be recoated. Area residents had hoped the highway,

What's Cooking?

The familiar question many homemakers ask today concerns soft or wrinkled pickles. Many people try making pickles only to dispose of them because they have spoiled.

The first step in making good pickles is using good ingredients. There are two kinds of cucumbers - ones for slicing and ones for pickling. After growing the right cucumber, it should be harvested

when it's just ripe. They should not be too large or too mature.

The other ingredients that go into the making of pickles are just as important as the cucumbers. Pure granulated salt is the best for making pickles. Uniodized table salt can be used but may make the brine cloudy. Iodized table salt should not be used due to its tendency to darken the pickles. Vinegar should be of high grade, an acidity level of four-six percent and not be diluted. Use only fresh spices. Moldy spices can cause soft pickles.

The second step to making good pickles is accurate measurements. Accurate measurements are important for creating the proper pickling environment. This is especially true for fermented pickles. Shriveled and hollow pickles can be caused from too strong or too weak brine during fermentation. Soft or slippery pickles can be caused from too little salt or acid.

The third step to good pickles applies to fermented pickles only. Scum will develop on top of the pickling solution during fermentation. This scum should be removed daily and care should be taken in removing it so that it does not get mixed into the solution. Scum contains yeasts and molds that will lower the acidity and weaken the solution which allows the pickle to soften.

The fourth step is to process them. Processing means that the pickles are heated in a hot water bath after being placed in the jars. The heat destroys any microorganisms that would decompose the pickles upon storage and cause them to spoil. Processing pickles must be timed accurately or soft and shriveled pickles will result. Processing times and procedures for fermented pickles, fresh-packed, and regular pickles vary. It's important to follow procedures

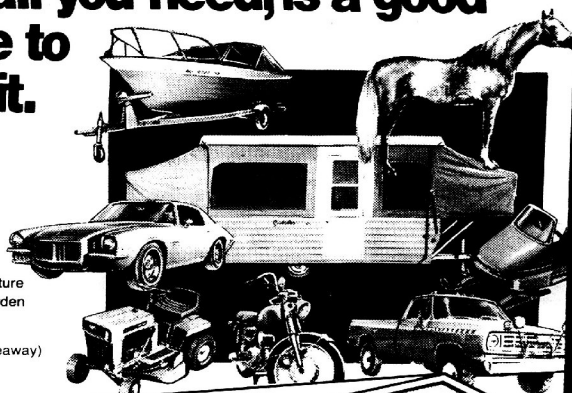

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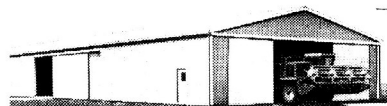

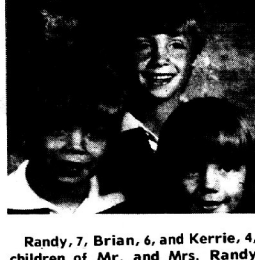
