Students take advantage of special summer programs

Although most children would grumble and groan about having to attend summer school to improve their math or reading skills, Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation made available a number of pro grams this summer that are both fun and beneficial. Some of the special summer "camps" or classes are already completed, some haven't started, and some will continue throughout most of the summer.

Basketball camp for boys in age groups ranging from sixth through ninth grade was completed last week. Coach Bob DuBois reports approximately 60 boys participated in the classes, which were designed stress the fundamentals of haskethall. They worked with footwork, shooting, dribbling, passing, rebounding and simply moving with the ball. As a special perk, the moving boys played four games with students at basketball camps from North Miami, Caston and Whitko, whom they played twice.

These classes, like baskethall camp, are open to boys who will be in next year's sixth through ninth grade classes at Valley. The swimming program also started vesterday, although it will be divided into two separate sessions. Coach Deb Thompson is holding classes for pre-school, beginner advanced beginner, intermediate and swimmers. The first session will conclude July 13 (with no classes on July 4), and the second session runs from July 16 - 27.

The new office is across the street from the senior citizen center and is wheelchair accessible. Representatives will continue to visit the site on the first Tuesday of the month from 9:15 to 3 p.m.

Those needing assistance can shorten waiting time if they come prepared for their interviews. Parents applying for their children's social security numbers need bring identification documents ilke report cards as well as birth certificates. Application forms can be picked up ahead of time at most post offices (contact Ma Billman, Akron, for forms). Marianne

If you're applying for retirement benefits, please bring an original or certified copy of your birth certi-ficate, W-2 forms from the last two years, your spouses's social security number and your marriage history. A disability claim is speeded up if you can provided a complete list of your doctors and hospitals with addressses, phone number and medical history. Proof of your monthly income and resources is necessary for a Supplemental Security Income claim Different representatives handle different programs and the interviewers specialize, so you may be called out of order when you arrive

for an interview. People in Akron and the rest of Fulton County can usually save themselves a trip by calling the South Bend office at 236-8300. It is usually easier to call later in a week or in the last half of a month, and have your claim number at hand Another way to save time is by writing to the Social Security Administration, Box 19, South Bend, IN 46624. If you include your daytime phone number, they'll call you.

NOTICE TO FRANKLIN TOWNSHIP PATRONS There will be no free library service offered to Franklin Township by any library as of December 21 this year. Franklin patrons will be required to pay for non-resident cards at any libraries they choose to utilize. These fees will be \$40 at both Akron and Mentone. An invitation to make Franklin a part of Bell Library's taxing base was turned down by the Franklin Trustee and his advisory board. A merger for next year would have meant:

Franklin would be paying the same rate for library ser-vice that others using Bell Library would pay. At present, Franklin residents pay less than half as much as Har-rison patrons. Harrison residents have never expressed displeasure over their library tax rate, but they do object to paying more for service than others pay.

The library budget would not increase. The library board feels that we have a good size library for a small com-munity and that the service is excellent. The tax rate would, however, drop five or six cents as the tax base broadens to include Franklin.

Using figures from the Kosciusko County Assessors Of-fice, we can predict that an average \$40,000 home would be taxed at \$27, a \$60,000 home at \$42, and an average 80 acre farm at \$57. Remember, we are taxed according the assessed valuation, not the true market value of our homes

The average costs of books are \$17 for novels, \$23 for a biography, and \$4 for a paperback. One wouldn't have to read many books to get one's money's worth at the above taxes. (Magazine subscriptions average \$20.)

The present library tax rate is .28 per hundred. This rate would drop to 22 or .23 per hundred of **assessed** valua-tion. (Keep in mind that we are assessed at approx-imately one-third the real value of property.) Since Franklin has been taxed .08 (to be divided between Akron and Mentone libraries) in the past, this would only mean an increase of .14 to .15 per hundred assessed valuation for library service.

The library would advertise a slightly higher rate, but would hold to the present general budget. Higher adver-tising ensures that should the area valuation drop for some reason, we could maintain our budget. When it does not drop, the State Tax Board makes the tax rate cut for us in the fail.

By being a part of the library's taxing base, Franklin would receive the benefits of the State Reciprocal Bor-rowing Plan. This plan allows any library card holder to use his/her card at libraries all over the state. This is ex-pecially convenient when one works or lives nearer to another library than to their "home" library. (For exam-ple, a Franklin resident working in Warsaw, Akron, Rochester, or even Elkhart or South Bend, could use those libraries at will. Even casual visitors to another town can borrow materials from that library.)

Monies in Franklin's budget previously earmarked for library services at Akron and Mentone would be available for other uses - Fire Protection, Poor Relief, etc. should the trustees so desire. The library tax is levied apart from the township rate.

These past years the library staff has made a con-centrated effort to better meet the needs and serve the libraries of this agricultural community. We invite you to visit and inspect the facility.



Angle's city won a special award for their city decorations. They chose as a theme, "City of Goddesses" and decorated their halls like ancient Greece.

By the second Sunday the citizens of Hoosier Girls State had acquired a sense of unity. but it was time to return home. Betty and Angie really appreciate the oppor-tunity for a wonderful week sponsored by the Akron Women's Club and Mentone American Legion Auxiliary Unit 425.

Ind. Newspaper Project receives grant

The National Endowment for the Humanities last week approved a grant of \$229,000 for the Indiana Newspaper Project, a cooperative effort of libraries, historical societies, newspaper offices and interested individuals throughout the state to locate, catalog and preserve historic Indiana newspapers.

The Indiana project is one of the first major state efforts of this type to be funded by the National to be funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities," said IU Libraries Associate Dean Sally Rausch who is project direc-"The total cost of this phase of the project will be \$367,000. Of that total, \$138,000 will be donated in the form of time and services by participating agencies, but \$54,000 must be raised outright from public donations.

The grant is awarded to create a statewide record of the existing collections of Hoosier newspapers The files must be located and catalogued before they can be preserved through microfilming. This bibliographical phase will take about three years; the preservation phase of the project will follow.

The aim of bibliographical phase of the project is to compile com-plete records for all the state's newspapers. The records will then become part of a national bibliography and will lay the foundation for future preservation.

The Indiana Newspaper Project has been initiated by the Indiana State Library, the Indiana Historical Society, the Indiana Cooperative Library Services Authority and the Indiana University Libraries.

The project is a part of a national effort, in which Indiana is a leader, to catalog and preserve the news paper heritage of America. Rausch said.

"Some of the major newspapers of Indiana have already been preserved on microfilm, but many more lie crumbling with age in bound volumes and loose stacks in scores of locations throughout the state. The Indiana Historical Society estimates that up to 10 million remain to be filmed." pages of Indiana

The work of newspaper preservation in Indiana is especially complicated because newspaper archives are scattered throughout the state. The major repositories are the Indiana State Library at Indiana polis, which holds about 1.500 titles, and the Indiana University Library on the Bloomington cam-pus, which has another 370 titles. The remainder of the 3,200 newspapers that still exist in Indiana lie archives in more than 200 different cities and towns. Most of those small newspapers "morgues" must be visited by those small project staff members or by local volunteers during the three-year phase of the project.

'Newspapers are especially vulnerable to the ravages of time," said Rausch. "The cheap woodpulp paper that newspapers have been printed on since the 1870s and quickly becomes yellowed brittle and eventually crumbles to Unless those papers are preserved through microfilming, they are lost forever.

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
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
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4th of July festival provides satisfactory day







kron Marshal offers tips on bicycle safety

With the warm days of summer upon us, more and more bikes are seen around town -- some being ridden safely and in accordance with the rules of the road, and others not so safely. Many youngsters on their bicycles for the first time aren't aware of what their responsibilities are, and all too often neither do their parents instruct them in safe riding. To help out new bikers, and to

refresh the minds of some "old-timers" the Akron Police Department has been asked to provide the readers of the NEWS with some safety rules

All bicycles and motorized bicycles (Mopeds) principally garaged or kept within the corporate limits of the Town of Akron are to

be licensed by the Police Depart ment. These licenses cost \$2 and are valid for as long as you own the bike. The purpose of licensing is to provide the Police with a description and serial number of the bike, the name and address of the owner, and to permit the Police to return the bike in the event it is lost or stolen. Persons who live outside of town who wish to register their bikes or Mopeds may do so also. This registration is for the owner's

protection. Bikes may not be ridden on the sidewalks within the business district (One block in each direction from the intersection of Rochester and Mishawaka Streets) of Akron. This is to prevent bikers from hitting car doors and/or pedestrians. Bikes may be walked on the sidewalk and should be parked against the buildings away from the doors to business establishments.

following items are The cerpts from the Indiana Motor Behicle Code which apply to hicycles:

Every person riding a bicycle upon the roadway shall have all of the rights and all of the duties applicable to the driver of a motor vehicle except those provisions which by their nature can have no application. This means that a bike rider must obey the same rules as a car driver. The bike must be ridden on the right-hand side of the road, must stop at all Stop signs and give proper signals for all turns.

No bicycle shall be used to carry more persons than the number for it is designed and equipwhich ped. This means no passengers on the crossbar, handlebars, or on the back fender. An exception would be a child in a properly designed and installed carrier.

No person on a bicycle shall hitch ride from a moving motor vehicle.

Persons riding bicycles upon a roadway shall not ride more than two (2) abreast

No person riding a bicycle shall carry any package, bundle, or article which prevents the rider from keeping both hands upon the handlebars.

No person shall ride a bicycle unless it is equipped with a bell or

other device capable of giving a signal audible for a distance of at least one hundred (100) feet except that no bicycle shall be equipped with, nor shall any person use upon a bicycle any siren or whistle.

Every bicycle operated on a public highway from one-half (1/2) hour after sunset until one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise shall be equipwith a lamp on the front ped exhibiting a white light visible from a distance of at least five hundred (500) feet to the front and with a lamp on the rear exhibiting a red light visible from a distance of five hundred (500) feet to the rear; except that a red reflector meeting the requirements of this act may be used in lieu of a rear light.

Every bicycle shall be equipped with a brake which will enable the operator to make the brake wheels skid on dry, level, clean pavement.

The parent of any child and the guardian of any ward shall not authorize or knowingly permit any such child or ward to violate this chapter (of the Motor Vehicle Laws). These regulations applicable to bicycles shall apply wh enever a bicycle is operated unless upon any highway or upon any path set aside for the exclusive use of bicycles.



National Survival Games

There's been a rising popularity during the past couple of years in military-oriented objects. For example, one of the fastest-growing fashion "looks" is "cammies," aka camouflage outfits, complete with army surplus hats, boots, belts, canteens, ammo belts and sheaths. Is it any wonder, then, that a game based on survivalist skills is gaining popularity nationwide?

Bill Dodson, Rt. 2, Silver Lake, is what I call a "survivalist master." That is, he carefully choreographs weekend games for teams of men who want to put their survivalist/ woods skills to the test. And although he only began doing this last February in Muncie, he now orchestrates weekly games, sometimes locally, sometimes traveling to Fort Wayne, Albion or Mun-

The game is set up for two 12-man teams, although Dodson sometimes has more players and sometimes fewer. Each team has a flag base in an area of about 35 acres, and the object of the game is to capture the other team's flag and return safely to home base. Props

for the game include cammies, skin camouflage and CO2 powered pistols which shoot water-soluble paint pellets. Dodson revealed some players also use slingshots to shoot pellets, but a player would need to be fairly skilled to hold his own with only a slingshot. If a player is shot with a paint

If a player is shot with a paint pellet, he's out of the game. For the sake of realism, red paint is used.

Most of the games last about 20-25 minutes, according to Dodson, and a full day's sport last between two-and-a-half or three hours. "When your're running through the woods at top speed, being chased by the "enemy." two or three hours is all you can take," Dodson explained. "The rules state everyone who plays must wear safety goggles, as the biggest danger would be accidentally getting shot in the eye with a paint peliet. In my games, we also have a ten foot limit for shooting somone, although sometimes that doesn't always quite work. When everything's happening at once, it's sometimes hard to stick to

gain nationwide popularity There's been a rising popularity during the past couple of years in skin camouflage and CO2 powered that." Another rule is that players must be 18 or older.

Dodson is affiliated with National Dodson is affiliated with National Survival Games and is the designated dealer for the Eastern Indiana District. 



Fred McSherry president for '84-'85 **Richard Long resigns as Valley board member**

For the third time since October 1982, a member of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation board resigned with no advance warning. Board president Richard Long was not present at last Wednesday's re-organization meeting, but submitted a letter of resignation which Superintendent Baxter Paige read.

Citing personal problems and an increased workload on his farm as reasons for resigning, Long added, "I would encourage the board to continue making the best decisions possible in the best interest of education."

Long was just re-elected during the May primary to his third term on the board, defeating challenger Linda Oden from Harrison township. At the end of the meeting, Paige announced he would need clarification from legal counsel Lee Bazini before applications from candidates to fill Long's seat would be accepted. (See article, this page.)

In October 1982, then boardpresident Vernon Meredith resigned and was subsequently replaced by Fred McSherry, and in February this year William Rogers resigned and was replaced by Joseph Crill.

Paige expressed real regret in recommending the other trustees accept Long's resignation. "Dick contributed greatly to the stability of the school corporation this year, and I regret he feels he must resign. His efforts have helped shape the board over the last year after experiencing some difficult Trustees McSherry, Cecil times.' Miller, Jim Royer and Crill also expressed dismay at Long's resignation.

Re-organization of the board was held and McSherry was elected to assume duties as president, while Miller and Royer were selected to positions as vice-president and secretary, respectively. The new board also voted to retain Bazini as attorney for the corporation and

re-appointed Judy Hively and Linda Cochran as corporation treasurer and deputy treasurer.

Although trustees had the option of increasing their salary (currently \$1,000 annually) by as much as 100 percent, Royer moved to table the question of any raise until December. (At the June meeting, trustees tabled the issue of administration raises until December.)

Trustees voted to hire the architectural firm Fanning/Howey from Michigan City to prepare a feasibility study toward a building program. Paige reported three firms had toured all the corporation buildings and presented ideas to board members, but they were unanimous in their selection of Fanning/Howey.

Although an auction for the building trades house was scheduled to take place, no bidders were present. Paige reported the corpo-ration would once again advertise the home and schedule an auction for next month's meeting.

In other business: Board members devoted the remainder of the evening to preparation for the re-opening of school by setting fees and schedules. Although there will be no change in lunch prices or high school athletic prices for the 1984-85 school year, book fees and school hours underwent slight changes.

Lunch prices will remain 75 cents per day for students in grades 1 -12, or \$3.75 weekly. Reduced price lunches for qualifying families are 40 cents daily, or \$2 weekly.

Following new requirements by the State, there will be changes in school hours. Classes at Burket are scheduled between 8 a.m. - 3 p.m. while classes for Akron and Mentone will be held between 8:30 a.m. 3:30 p.m. High school hours will change from 8:10 a.m. - 3:10 p.m. to meet state requirements.

Book fees for elementary and junior high classes will be broken down this year instead of a flat fee

being charged for grades 1 - 8. Kindergarten students will pay \$20 for materials, grades 1 - 2 will pay \$38.50, grades 3 and 6 will pay \$36, grades 4 - 5 will pay \$32.50 and grades 7 8 will pay \$33.50. Changes were made to comply with recommendation from the State Board of Accounts.





Following discussion with the Borden's representative, members John Teeter, board Robert Hoehn and Lloyd Moore decided the only fair thing was to have the town follow the contract. The contract states that everyone who has garbage service must have a suitable container and the trash must be on their own property.

Board members hope this will alleviate the problem with the earlier system. The members say not allowing garbage bags to be used will both solve the problems of not having the bags torn open. and also will allow for fair determination of trash charges with everyone using containers.

Borden's will give 30 days leeway for the plan to be implemented and everyone to use containers. Board members emphasized the change is being made because of the numerous complaints with the former system.

In other matters, the board: Passed an ordinance to change several present stop signs on Walnut Street to yield signs. Announced that work is ex-pected to start on the filtration system at the water plant. Until that work is completed residents may experience a little inconvenience with their water.

Announced property between the sidewalk and the street, called the "tree lawn," is owned by the town. Any alterations of that area by putting in railroad ties, gravel or other times is prohibited unless permission is granted by the board. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 14, at 7 p.m. in the town hall



Schroer said that the Public Service Commission must approve the settlement agreement before the rate decrease and rate moritorium can become effective. Conservation field day to be at Bucher & Maple Leaf farms

The Kosciusko County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) and Soil Conservation Service (SCS) will conduct a conservation field day on August 8, . The location is the Bucher 1984 and Maple Leaf farms in Van Buren Township.

During the field day, there will be a discussion on no-till farm ing, cover crops, irrigation, and crop fertility programs. There are three corn varieties planted no-till on the site and one field of drilled soybeans, under conventional tillage.

Tom Bruns, geologist with the Department of Natural Resources, will be present to discuss the impact irrigation is having on groundwater supply. In addition, representatives from various herbimanufacturers will be on hand. Sellers and Sons and Kerlin's will demonstrate their no-till planters and Farm Bureau will show proper herbicide application.

The field day site is near the Northeast Indiana Erosion Study Area. In that study, no-till was shown to be the most viable alternative to reducing soil erosion. The soils are sandy and subject to both water and wind erosion. If through the use of no-till and other tillage and conservation practices, soil erosion can be reduced, the negative impact soil erosion has on

production and water quality lakes and streams can also be reduced.



Weatherization loans available

Northern Indiana Public Service Company announced July 16 it would begin offering low-interest to property owners who weatherize their homes to save energy.

The program -- available to qualifying customers -- will offer loans from \$200 to \$1,500 at 6% interest to help homeowners buy and install insulation, solar heating and cooling systems, weatherstrip ping and other conservation devices designed to cut electric or gas use. Payment periods will range from 6 to 36 months.

According to Jack W. Stine, Vice President, Division Operations, 'Our weatherization loan program is aimed at beating the high cost of energy in the simplest, most direct manner -- through conservation. We know that much of the energy used to heat and cool your hom escapes through the roof, walls and windows. Adequate insulation goes toward controlling long way energy costs, and the new weatherization loan program provides an opportunity to take steps to conserve energy in the home.

Among those items covered under the program are: ceiling, wall, floor, ducts, pipe and water heater insulation; interior and exterior caulking; weatherstripping; storm and/or thermal window installaheat reflective and heat tion; absorbing window and door materi-als; clock thermostats; window heat loss or heat gain materials; and passive solar space heating and cooling systems
