



The American's Creed

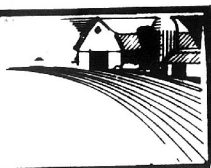

With his 100 word statement he won the National Contest for the "best summary of American political faith" and the city of Baltimore awarded him \$1,000. The House of Representatives accepted The American's Creed on April 3, 1918.

Wabash Canal Days July 25, 26 and 27

The historic and picturesque county of Wabash, Indiana will be celebrating its 150th birthday this year, July 21 through July 28. One of the highlights of the event will be the Wabash Canal Day Celebration, sidewalk sales, and parades, July 25, 26, and 27.

Wabash, Indiana is located on the Wabash River and the former Wabash-Erie Canal, which ran from Lake Erie, through Indiana, along and adjacent to, the Wabash River to the Ohio River. The canal was in operation from 1832 - 1976.

Prior to 1826 all of Wabash County was the hunting ground of two tribes, the Potawatomi and Miami Indians. In 1826 the two tribes ceded their rights to the land north of the Wabash River to the United States at the Treaty of "Paradise Springs," the present site of Wabash, Indiana.

The first white child to be born in Wabash County is believed to be Johnathan Keller, Jr. May 18, 1830.

Wabash's claim to fame took place on April 1, 1880 when the Associated Press flashed the story that the problem of poorly lighted city streets had been solved in Wabash, Indiana. This was achieved by a 4-carbon arc light attached to the Wabash Courthouse dome, which sets approximately 200 feet above the streets of the city of Wabash. It was reported that the illumination was such

that a person standing in the street in the town of Lagro, some seven miles up the Wabash River, could read a newspaper at night. One of the lamps is presently on display in the Wabash County courthouse. Thus Wabash, Indiana became the 1st electrically lighted city in the world.

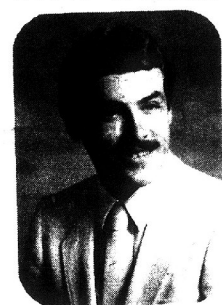
A great many festivities are being planned for the 1985 Wabash County Sesquicentennial and Wabash Canal Day Celebrations. The theme this year is county fair.

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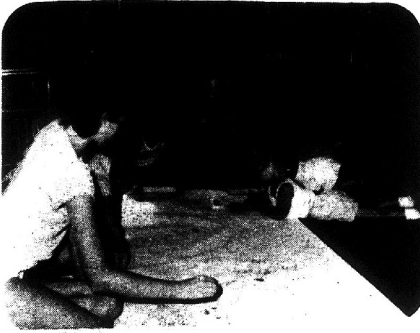

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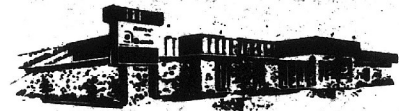

Tax decrease

Some of the pain from the property tax bite is being relieved for more than 400 landowners because of a tax reduction available through the Classified Wildlife Habitat program, announced Jim Ridenour, Department of Natural Resources' director. Enrollment in the Classi-

fied Wildlife Habitat program was a record 4,250 acres in 1984 and raised the total classified habitat in the state to more than 15,500 acres. A random survey of classified owners revealed an average tax savings of \$2.04 per acre or \$76.95 for each landowner.

Interestingly, the amount of wetland area enrolled is large in comparison to its

occurrence as a statewide habitat type. It appears, Ridenour noted, that many landowners are taking advantage of wildlife classification to reduce taxes on wetlands and to preserve them as valuable wildlife habitat.

The 1979 law granting property tax relief to landowners classifying 15 or more acres of wildlife

habitat, has had little or no effect on county tax collection. But, added Ridenour, it certainly has been a bonus for the conservation-minded individual.

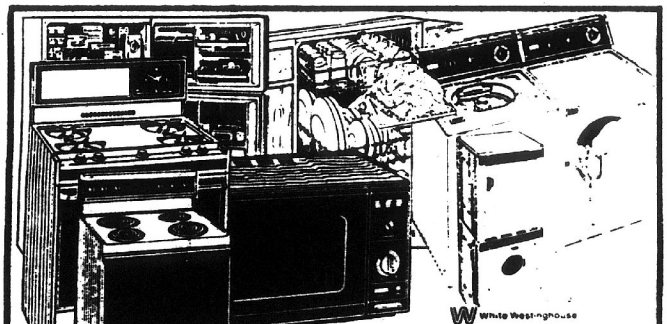

Mentone Town Board changes street lights

The Mentone Town Board held their regular meeting on July 1, 1985 in the town office. Tom Retseck from NIPSCO was present to explain the savings the town could have if they changed all the street lights from mercury vapor lights to high pressure sodium lights. By changing to these lights now the town will save \$2,200 a year. Eventually all the lights in this district will be changed, but by acting now the town can save. A ten year contract will need to be signed before any changes can be made.

The board voted to make these changes now because of the savings. The present 16 400-watt mercury lights will be changed to 150-watt sodium, and the 66 175-watt mercury lights will be changed to 100-watt sodium also.

Oak Cable systems paid \$200 for leasing town property at the park to put in a new cable TV for the town. It was reported that about two-thirds of the main cable TV has been laid. The board also reported that Joseph Good would act as the local coordinator for local broadcasts on the system. These broadcasts will be on a free channel provided by Oak Cable systems.

The firm of Jaama-Cousey has started their work on repairing the streets in Mentone. At the last board meeting it was decided to allow the firm to repair the streets the board felt were in most need of repair.

The Mentone Town Board also noted the enjoyment expressed by the community of the "Arts and Crafts in the Park" sponsored by Bell Memorial Museum. They

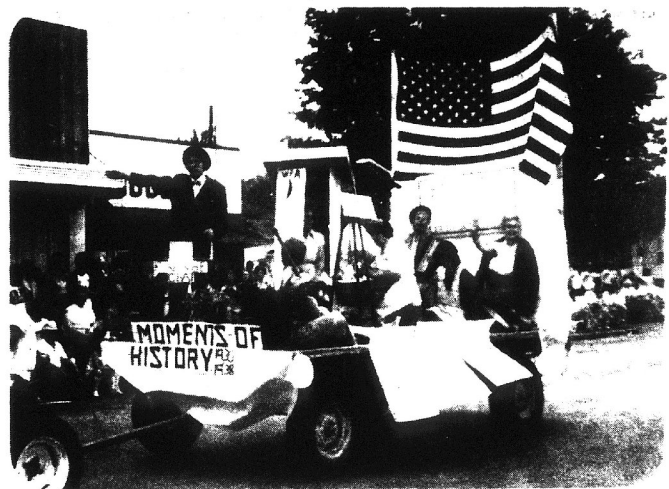
also stated that a very large crowd estimated at 2,500 attended the event in the park on Saturday.

Board member Miriam Boardman announced that the town has nine new certified EMT's that have just completed seven months of classes and testing by the State Emergency Medical Service. Previous to this the service only had three certified EMT's serving the community.

Two claim deeds have been recorded this month by the town board. The first was property owned by Pearl Horn near the cemetery that was donated to the town. The second was property from Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation that was deeded back to the town on a lot from the building trades class site so the street could remain town property.

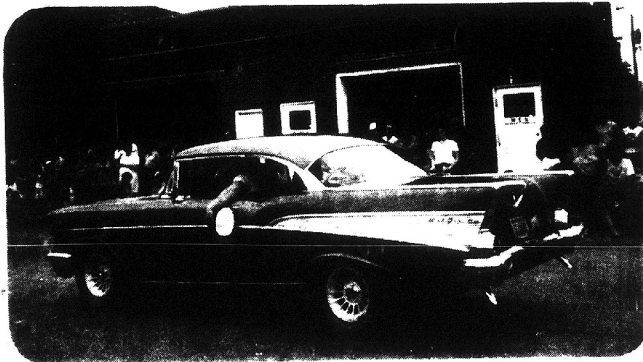

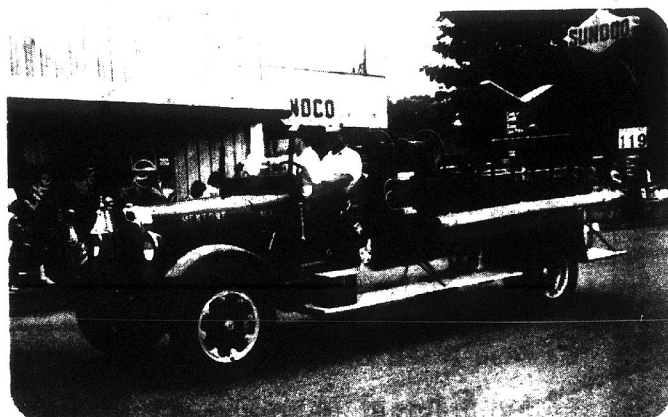

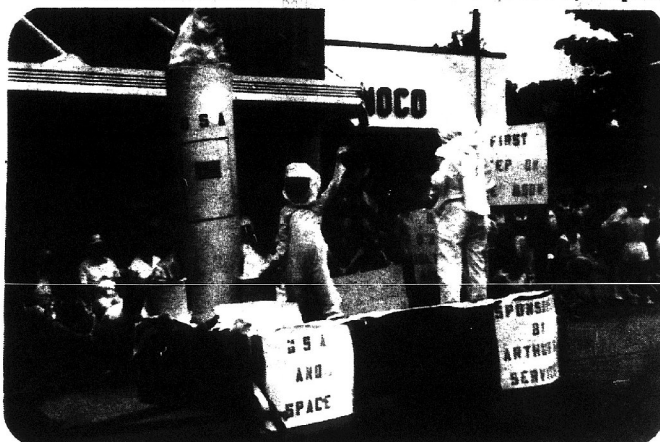

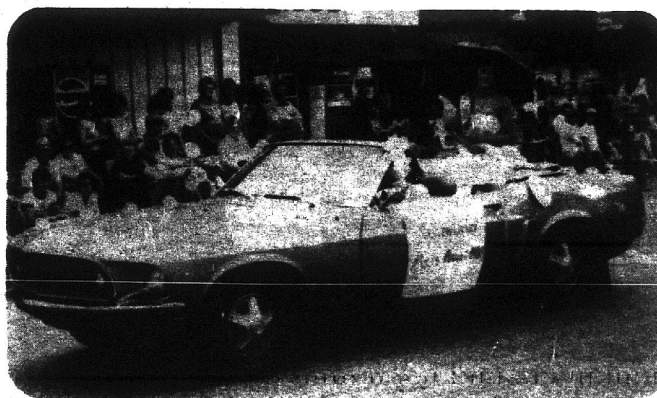

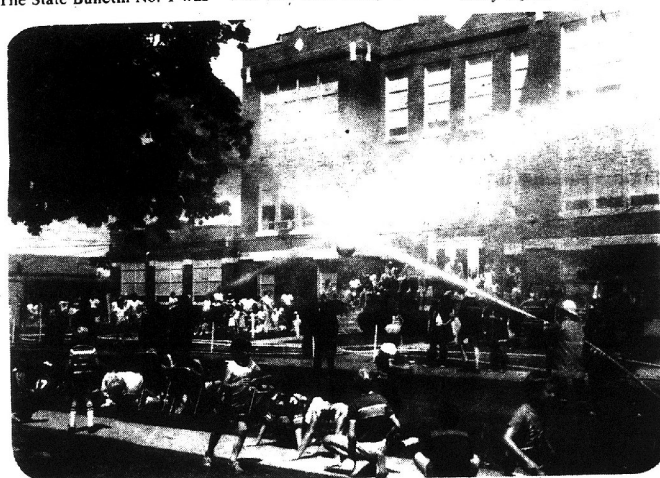

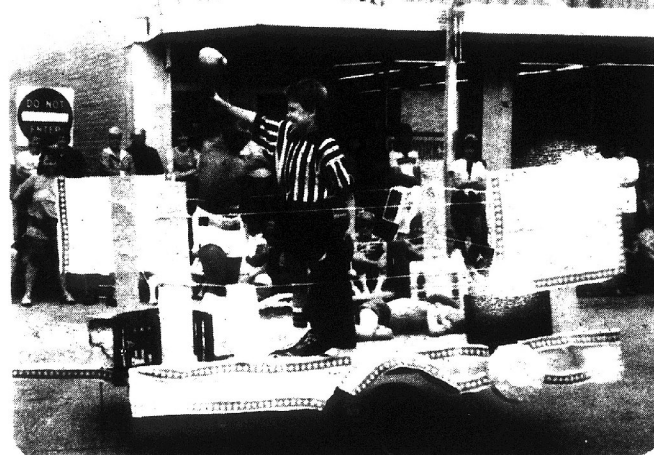

Indiana Special Olympics

Each athlete was able to enter up to a maximum of five events, although not more than two individual events and one relay in any one sport. In recognizing the importance of participation in Special Olympics, each athlete received a medal or ribbon in each event he or she competed in.

The 2,600 Special Olympians, plus close to 800 coaches and chaperones, were housed on the Indiana State University campus for two nights. Opening Ceremonies, including a parade of athletes, were held the night of June 27 and Closing Ceremonies, complete with fireworks display, were the next night. Other activities at the Games included a carnival, Tent Town, clinic, and the awards ceremonies after each event.

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Road improvements

S.R. 19 in Nappanee (Elkhart County) will be closed 0.1 mile south of U.S. 6 to install a new rubber crossing at the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. This crossing will be closed from July 15, 1985 to August 2, 1985.

S.R. 19 in Kosciusko County will be closed 4.7 miles south of U.S. 6 to replace a bridge over Dausman Ditch. This closure will begin July 17, 1985 and last until September 6, 1985.

The official detour for the above projects will be: U.S. 30, S.R. 15 and U.S. 6, which will add about 17 miles. This official detour will be in effect from July 15, to September 6, 1985.

Attorney General Linley Pearson has approved highway contracts totaling \$3 million, paving the way for work to begin on twenty projects.

Among approvals are: McMahan O'Connor Construction Company of Rochester will resurface S.R. 25 in Fulton County. The work will cost \$516,000 and will be from the east junction of S.R. 14 to just south of the junction of S.R. 110, according to the contract approved by Pearson. Completion has been set for the end of July.

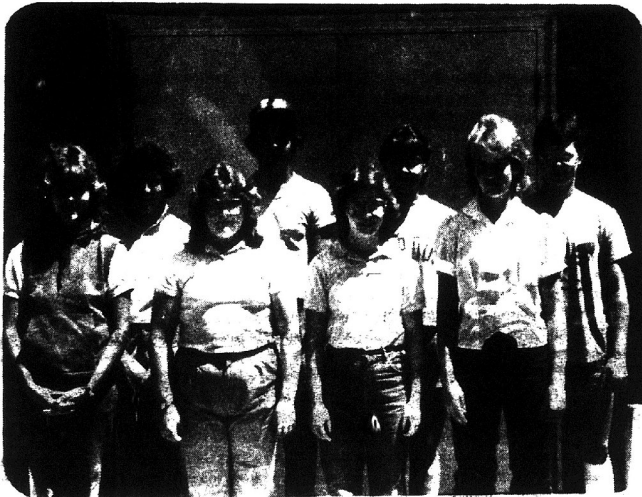

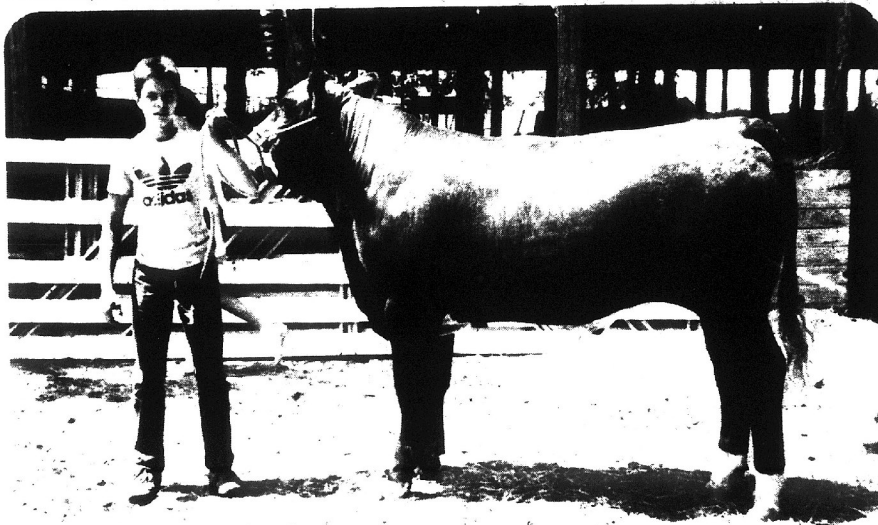

TVSC approves lunch and book prices for 1985-1986

At its regular meeting July 15, 1985 the Tippecanoe Valley School Board re-organized and re-elected Fred McSherry as president; Cecil Miller vice-president; Jim Royer secretary; and Judy Hively treasurer for the next year. The board voted to change the meeting time to the second Monday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building. This change was made due to a conflict Baxter Paige, superintendent, had with another meeting also held on the third Monday of each month.

Additional Appropriation
The additional appropriation in excess of the budget for \$17,500 in the cumula-

tive building fund was approved by the board. The money will be used to update the cooling system at the high school so that the air conditioning does not have to run in the whole building to cool the office area for the summer personnel. It is estimated that the system will pay for itself in a two year period of time.

Lunch Price Increases

For the first time in three years the board felt it was necessary to raise lunch prices at the corporation. Prices approved by the board increased the elementary lunch price to 80 cents a day (5 cent increase); high school lunch to 85 cents a day (10-

cent increase); reduced student lunch price 40 cents (same as last year); and milk will stay at 20 cents a carton. The staff price will also be raised to \$1.35 per lunch which is a 10 cent increase.

Text Book Rental

Recommendations for text-book rental were submitted by the principals and approved by the board for the 1985-1986 school year. The fees are kindergarten \$21.50; first and second grades \$43; third \$39.50; fourth \$33.50; fifth \$33.50; sixth \$38.50; seventh \$39; and eighth \$37. The high school text prices vary and change according to

Akron Town Board hears water and sewer system report

The Akron Town Board held their regular meeting Tuesday, July 16, 1985 in the Clerk's office at 7 p.m. Present at the meeting was

Jim Lauer P.E. of Philip L. Schnelker, Inc., Consulting Engineers from Fort Wayne to explain the report on updating the water and sewer systems for the town. The firm gave an estimate on just construction costs for the water system at \$182,000. This included making the water mains more effective by cutting off ends that are not used and connecting others so that if a main water line breaks people have another source to receive water to their homes. A treatment plant also was recommended. The advantages mentioned to improving the water system included water pressure, no stains from the water, assets for industry, and contamination control.

An estimate of \$265,000 was given for a sewage system improvement that will eventually be needed, but for the present time the water system is in greater need of being updated before major problems start. The whole proposed plan was explained in greater detail to the board members for their questions and understand-

ing of the report the firm was paid to do for the town.

Joe Bidwell was present at the meeting to show the board records that one of his apartments was empty during the time a large water bill accumulated. The board decided to read the meter again the first of August and then put one of the new meters on.

Other Business

Gerald Construction is to start work on the streets towards the end of July.

State highway department was called about the request for children at play signs at the Gast residence.

Rod Fisher has moved into town with his family on State Road 14.

Public Service Indiana recommended increasing the watts in the light bulbs in the parking lot behind The Den to improve the lighting. The increase in cost would be from \$7.50 to \$11. The board voted unanimously to do this.

Signs have been installed in the alley next to Viking Foods to prevent automobile traffic from using it.

Closed Circuit TV

Mr. Hill's request to purchase a closed circuit television system was approved by the board. The high school is presently wired for the system but the equipment is needed to put the system into working order. The amount of \$2,300 will be taken from investment interest to purchase the equipment from Liberty Sound and Electronics, North Liberty. A one year warranty comes with this equipment.

Cumulative Building Fund

A hearing will be held at the next meeting on August 12, 1985 at 7:30 p.m. on the proposed cumulative building rate of \$1 per \$100 of assessed valuation and the budget. The board decided to re-establish the rate for the next five years. During that time the rate cannot be raised again, but the board expects to be able to decrease it after three years. follow through with each grade level of K - 12. Math will be based on an outline by the state and working with teachers from K - 8 and the high school is described by the state. Science also has an outline set by the state that will be used in three sections. A common format will be used for all grade levels to adopt material for them. Board member Fred McSherry commented his approval of these Curriculum guides so that all aspects are covered in education within the corporation.

PSI warns of imposters

Jim Wilber, District Manager for Public Service Indiana, says imposters claiming to be PSI employees have prompted the utility to warn its customers to ask for identification.

"We want to make sure no one is victimized by someone who tries to collect money or get inside a customer's home by claiming to be from PSI," Wilber said.

"All Public Service Indiana employees carry identification cards with a color photo. Unfortunately, there are people in some areas of our service territory who've

been saying they're from the electric company when they're not."

According to Wilber, no employee of PSI is allowed to accept money from customers except at the utility office. And unless a customer's meter is inside, PSI employees won't enter anyone's home except in an extreme emergency.

"To verify that someone is an employee of ours, ask to see an identification card or call our office and check," Wilber said. "The phone number in Rochester is 219-223-2186."

Pour cake mixture into a large tube cake pan that has been greased and floured and bake 1½ hours in an oven preheated to 325 degrees.

State Police report

The Indiana State Police at the Peru District have announced the following end of the month report for the month of June, 1985 on their activities in Fulton County, and for the District #61 personnel.

County troopers had 583 patrol hours, 11,051 miles patrolled, five accidents investigated, 231 arrests

effected, 320 warnings issued, two driving while intoxicated reports, two interrogation reports, 56 motorists assisted.

District #61 had 7,203 patrol hours, 112,773 miles patrolled, 49 accidents investigated, 1,172 arrests effected, 2,294 warnings issued, 51 driving while intoxicated reports, 47 interro-

gation reports, and 517 motorists assisted.

Lieutenant John D. Gaylor, District 61 Commander, reports that four troopers assigned to the County were responsible for the above work, along with 44 personnel who work District #61. District #61 comprises of Cass, Fulton, Howard, Miami, Tipton, and Wabash Counties. The District Officers conducted 71 criminal investigations,

which resulted in 23 arrests.

Two persons have been fatally injured in rural accidents in Fulton County during the six months of 1985, as compared to one person during this same period of 1984. For the six county district, 18 persons have lost their lives in traffic accidents as compared to seven persons this same period last year. This is an increase of 11 lives.

Of the 12 fatal accidents

investigated by the Peru district troopers, four lives would have been saved by the use of seat belts.

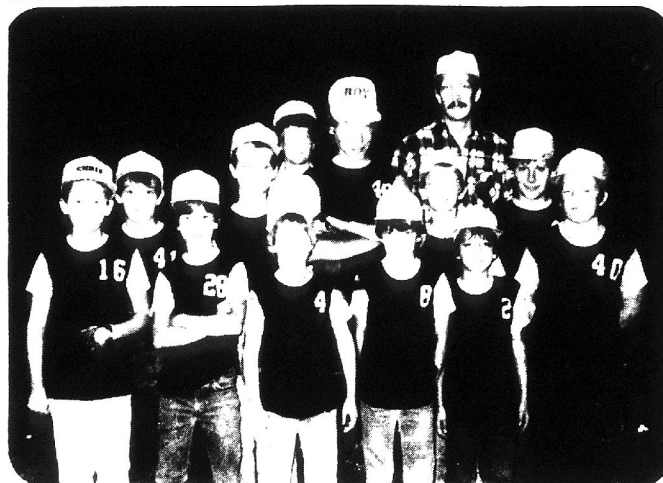

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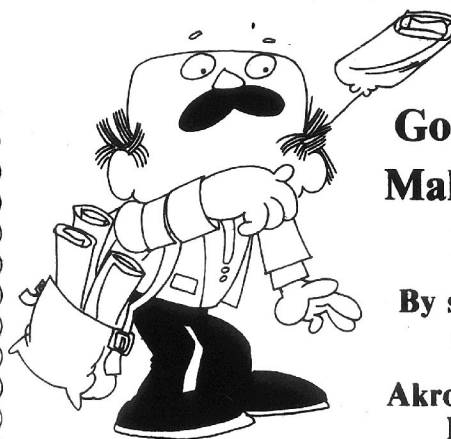

\$145 million for Rainy Day Fund

Indiana Treasurer of State Julian L. Ridlen announced that, having received certification from the State Budget Agency, the sum of \$145,112,000 in General Fund surplus revenues have been invested in behalf of the Counter-Cyclical Revenue and Economic Stabilization Fund (Rainy Day Fund) for the period ending June 30, 1985.

"The transfer of these funds indicates that our Hoosier economy is progressing in a very positive direction," Ridlen remarked. "Lt. Governor John Mutz and I have long advocated the institution of this fund so that some type of assistance would be available to stabi-

lize revenues during periods of recession," Ridlen said.

This announcement marks the first appropriation of funds since the inception of the program in 1982 by the Indiana General Assembly. Based on a formula concerning the annual growth rate of the state during the calendar year, surplus funds are appropriated to the Rainy Day Fund from the state General Fund. If the annual growth rate drops, funds are then re-appropriated from the Rainy Day Fund to the General Fund.

"I am very pleased to witness the funding of the Rainy Day Fund. Inasmuch as the Rainy Day Fund would have been a viable response

to the difficult times experienced by our Recreational Vehicle industry and the Automotive industry in the late 70's and early 80's, I believe that this financial tool will help stabilize the state's economy as well as maintain our Hoosier policy of balanced budgets."



Help with delivery is available from local Senior Citizens Centers or Area Agencies on Aging. Persons needing help must contact those agencies for arrangements prior to August 2.

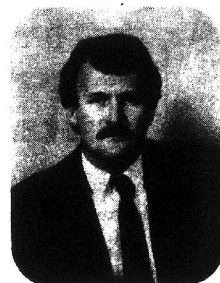
Participants must be at least 60 years old and are limited to two entries. Pro-

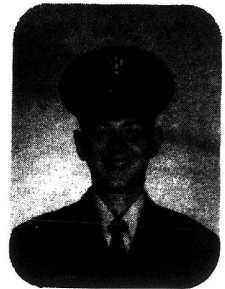

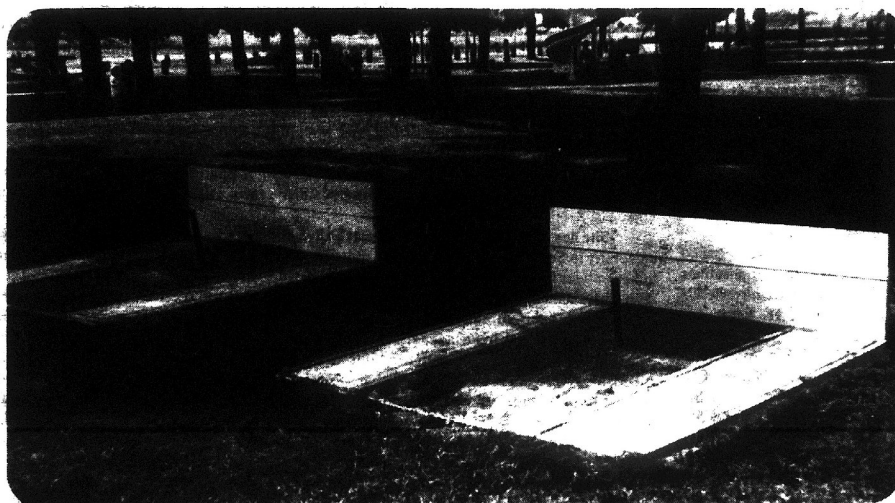

Civil War re-enactment two big days - Aug. 3-4

The Civil War Re-enactment at Rochester includes much more than a battle with its roaring cannons and scenes of dying. It also portrays the everyday camp life of both Union and Confederate soldiers, music and dancing, 1860's fashion show, and diaries of soldiers. Canoe rides on the Tippecanoe River will be available.

The two-day event is Aug. 3 - 4, sponsored by the Fulton County Historical Society. The re-enactment will be held on the north side of the Tippecanoe River, west side of New U.S. 31, three miles north of Rochester. It will be in a wooded area. Even the arena is under the shade trees.

Foods cooked over wood fires, buffalo burgers, ham and beans, barbecued chicken and pork ribs, donuts and coffee, will be available, also iced tea and lemonade. Old-time crafts, such as basketry and bonnets, will be demonstrated and sold.

This is a living-history festival and the gates will

be open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Plenty of free parking is available. There is an admission charge.

Louis Sandos, Rochester, will tell Grandfather stories and Uncle Remus stories in the storyteller's arbor all day Saturday.

For the Military Ball music will be provided by Scotty Jackson, South Bend; and Vic Rigsby, Cromwell, who play banjo, fiddle, mandolin and guitar. Both are natives

of Kentucky and have played with Bill Monroe, the Bluegrass King. Both like to rebuild old fiddles and banjos in their homes. Jackson plays with a group known as The New Frontier. Rigsby won the state banjo playing contest at the Indiana State Fair and placed third in the fiddle contest in 1980.

The Rochester Heymakers and Jackson and Rigsby are funded in part from a matching grant from the Indiana Arts Commission.

The Heymakers include 20 people from the Rochester area, 16 dancers and four musicians. Lane and Jennifer Laffoon, Plymouth; Shanna Lybarger and Sandy Sandos, Rochester, are the Heymakers musicians. Also Roseann Jefferies plays the washboard. The Heymakers is directed by Jean Sandos. This group traveled to Rochester, England, in 1984 to perform in the Charles Dickens Festival. They will also perform at Conner Prairie Pioneer Settlement, Noblesville, Aug. 10 - 11; and Trail of courage Rendezvous, Rochester, Sept. 21 - 22.

Skins of peaches and tomatoes will slip off if heated 1 to 1 1/2 minutes. Do about six at a time.

One crust pie bakes nicely but not two crust ones.

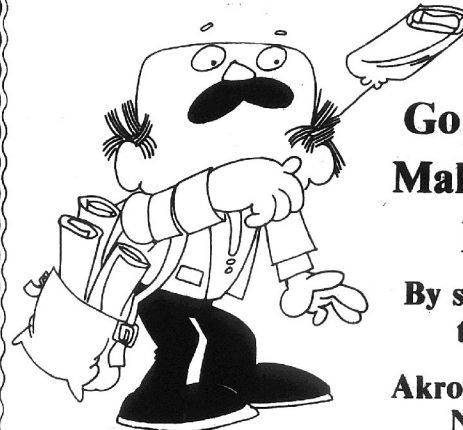

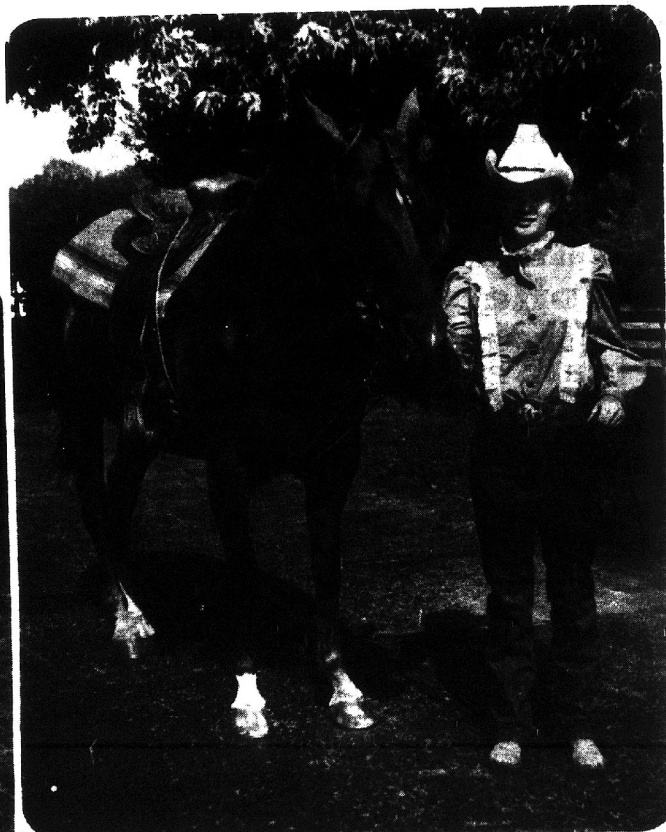
