


in the 100 meter back, 200 free and 200

FACIAL PAIN AND TMJ





I trust you will consider running the below letter in the interest of raising public awareness to the possibility of the "Gift of Life" we all have.

Recently, we learned my wife has one chance to live - a lung transplant. She joins 20,850 others throughout the nation whose continued life depends on a heart, lung, liver, kidney or pancreas transplant. At first thought, this suggest someone else must die for

these folks to have a chance to live. Deeper examination reveals a different reality.

Last year, 13,290 people were given added life because 3991 people (whom medical science could not save) made the decision to be an organ donor prior to their death, or whose loved ones made that decision upon their death. Thousands more die each year

than the 20,850 who can live with a new organ.

Medical people tell us many families have a difficult time with the donor question at the time of impending death of a loved one, only to several days later relate whey wish they had said yes. What a generous expression of love it would be if we all would accept the fact that we don't take our organs to heaven with us, and make the decision to be a "gift of Life" donor. They could extend life for another, and aid all mankind because with each transplant medical people learn even more about treatment of various diseases. To be a donor in Indiana only requires we sign the reverse side of our driver's license expressing our willingness to be a donor, and advising our families accordingly.

Reaching out to help another often brings enrichment to our own, or loved ones, lives In 1969, our 3 1/2 year old son was diagnosed with Leukemia. Ninety-nine of each 100 Leukemia victims suffered early death in those days. After much anguish and soul searching, we agreed with the physician's request to place him in a research control group dedicated to finding the cause and a cure. Those questions still elude researchers, but with what they learned through continued research, over 2/3rds of such children diagnosed today are living - as is our son. We all live healthier and longer lives as a result of those of each generation who lent themselves to research.

Twenty-five (25%) percent of those awaiting an organ will not live unless more of us write those simple words on the back of our driver's license. My family all made that decision many years before we had any idea my wife would have such a need. Our plea, and hope, is that others will sign the donor agreement on their driver's license today.







PSI Energy gets okay for market pricing, open access

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission yesterday issued an order allowing PSI Energy to make long-term bulk power sales at market prices. The FERC order, said to be the most important electric utility case before the commission this year, also approved open access to PSI's transmission system for utility and non-utility power generators.

Earlier this month, the commission conditionally approved PSI Energy's proposal in principle. The ruling makes PSI Energy the first electric company in United States to receive authority for long-term market-based sales, eliminating the need for case-byreview by FERC which regulates wholesale power sales.

As filed, our proposal created a classic 'win-win' situation," said James E. Rogers Jr., PSI Energy's chairman and executive officer. "The utility buying the power wins-by avoiding the cost of building a new power plant. Our cost of building a live point participant wins by enabling us to run our base-load plants more efficiently and creating additional revenues. These creating additional revenues. These revenues would help us meet future financial needs and benefit customers and shareholders by holding down rates and increasing earnings.

FERC did not adopt PSI Energy's request as filed last September, Rogers noted. "We haven't yet had a chance to study the order in detail, and we may need to ask for a rehearing to give us the chance to further discuss issues before FERC," he said. "However, we believe that the commission and its staff have handled our proposal in a very thorough and professional manner."

Prior to this FERC order, regulation required PSI Energy to sell wholesale power prices generally below market rates. In September 1989, PSI asked FERC to let it sell up to 450 megawatts of electricity at market rates. The long-term contracts would be for five years or more. In exchange for market pricing, PSI offered to allow greater access to its transmission system. Currently under the Federal Power Act, FERC cannot mandate utilities to provide transmission service to other

Prior FERC approval of each contract is unnecessary. Contracts, however, must be on file with FERC, along with certification from the purchasing utility that the power is being sold at or below the utility's expected alternative costs.

DNR and PSI Energy cooperate to manage endangered birds

The federally endangered interior least tern will be protected and managed in Indiana through an agreement between the Department of Natural Resources and PSI Energy. DNR Director Patrick R. Ralston made the announcement.

The interior least tern, a small gull-like bird, has one nesting site in Indiana at PSI Energy's Gibson Generating Plant in Gibson County. Under terms of the DNR and PSI Energy agreement, the company will protect the colony from human disturbance during the nesting season. PSI Energy is constructing a gate at the site and posting signs to limit human access and discourage trespass. PSI Energy also will control vegetation at the site and maintain the gravel substrate that is suitable habitat for the birds.

Interior least terns nest in small

colonies on sand and gravel bars along central North America's major river systems. The bird became endangered after much of its nesting habitat was destroyed in river modifications for flood control and navigation. Human disturbance and predation at nesting colonies also seriously threaten term populations.

"We expect the interior least tern popu-

"We expect the interior least tern population to grow and expand to other sites in Indiana because of this effort with PSI Energy." said Ralston.





Trash pick-up a big headache for Akron Town Council

The Akron Town Council held their

regular meeting on June 19.

Trash pick-up in the Town of Akron has been one big headache for the Akron Town Council, since their own trash truck broke down several months ago. The truck was old and needed expensive repairs the Council has since rented a dumpster from Lewis Salvage which relieves some of the cost. Lewis Salvage will stick with their \$205.00 per week cost of the dumpster for the year of 1990. The Town saves on the cost of dumping the trash, travel time for their employees and wear and tear on Town trucks

The Town is still operating in the red, even though they have done away with the trash truck. As of this month they have \$451.00 in revenue and \$876.00 in bills for a deficit of \$425.00.

The people of Akron had a chance to vote on how they would like to see the

Town try to solve this problem. A survey went out in last months water bills and the results were: Increase trash tags to \$2.00-135; Add \$8.00 to water and sewage bills-21, and get out of trash business-45. The Council voted to increase the trash tickets to \$2.00 per bag, which will take effect

Recycling seems to be something everyone needs to start thinking about Word through the grapevine is that it will be a state law before too long. The Boy Scouts have already taken this into hand, they have been sending out surveys and have had a excellent response. At the Town Board meeting, Royce Allison attended to report that there has been a committee formed with seven people to help the Boy Scouts get this project off and running. Their projected start up date would be September 1.

Eight Bonus Counties added for Deer Hunting

Hunters who would like to take an ant-lerless deer this November in one of Indiana's 72 bonus counties stand a good chance of being drawn for a permit, according to Patrick R. Ralston, Department of Natural Resources' director.

A total of 79,500 antlerless deer permits will be available during the 1990 firearms season, about 34 percent more than last year's quota of 59,400 permits. The large increase in permits is intended to reduce or stabilize the deer herd in counties where crop damage or deervehicle accidents have become a concern Eight counties have been added this year as bonus deer-counties.

The DNR's goal is to maintain good deer hunting and viewing opportunities while minimizing crop damage and accidents,' Ralston said.

Hunters wanting to take an antlerless deer must apply for an antierless permit in the bonus county of their choice. Successful applicants are drawn by computer se-lection, and hunters must then purchase a bonus county deer license.

Hunters are also encouraged to list a second choice on their applications card in case they are not selected for their first

To apply for an antlerless permit, hunters must purchase their regular deer license (shotgun, muzzleloader or handgun) during July or August and complete the application card included with the license. Applications must be received at the DNRs Bloomington office by August 24, 1990. A computerized drawing will allocate the antlerless permits, and successful hunters will be notified by mail by Oct. 1, 1990.

DNR personnel report that most hunters who apply for an antierless deer permit this year will be drawn, due to the large number of permits available. However, sportsmen who want to increase their chances of being drawn should apply in counties in which the number of ap-plicants is expected to be less than the number of permits available. These are:

- in northeastern Indiana, Wabash and Whitley counties.
- in north central Indiana, Fulton Pulaski and St. Joseph counties.
 - in west central Indiana, Vigo County in southwestern Indiana, Pike County
- in south central Indiana, Bartholomew County.
- in southeastern Indiana, Ripley, Ohio or Dearborn counties.

For more information, should visit local license agents who will have complete instructions for bonus deer hunts. Hunters may also call the deer hot-line at (812) 334-3795 (not toll free). Personnel will be available Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. to answer these questions.

Views On Dental Health

THE ORTHODONTIA **DECISION**



Perhaps the biggest dental decision that can be made for a child is for orthodontic treatment (braces). This is not only true for the unfortunate child with obvious buck teeth; there are other, less obvious orthodontic conditions which may require treatment.

Often, the first sign of orthodontic problems is crowding of the lower front teeth at about age seven. This may indicate that the jaws don't have room for all the teeth. In addition, losing a baby tooth too early, or too late, may result in problems which warrant orthodontic treatment.

Some dentists feel that orthodontic treatment should begin when most of the baby teeth have been lost. Others begin treatment earlier. In any case, the child should be seen by a dentist as soon as possible, to evaluate the situation and allow time to plan treatment.



Last July 4 Akron and community celebrated in queer, but most happy fashion, its 80th birthday anniversary. We had here as the town's special guest, real guest of distinctive honor, Mrs. Laura Welton Sippy. This place is her birth place, which seems to her an honor that the town is a special guest. honor that she claims, but that is not so very essential to her nor to the town. Hundreds and maybe a thousand or more girls claim Akron as their natal city. But the distinction in this matter for Mrs. Laura Welton Sippy lies in the fact that she was the first baby born within the corporate limits. The rest do follow after her. She notes in a personal letter to the editor that we celebrated the glorious 4th this year by opening a mostly successful chautauqua, and that she would like to be here, too, along with her kinsmen. She has been reading this present a successful to the here. reading this paper every week during the past year and when she catches a name of her kinfolk or of a newly made acquaintance she appreciates that it is a citizen of her natal town, a town that she desires to see grow more beautiful, more tasteful, more graceful as the years roll by. She is four score years and more, but writes a most splendid letter in a firm elastic hand.

Miss Beatrice, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Moses Bahney, celebrated a birthday last Saturday, being seven years old the 7th day of the 7th month of 1917.

Hugh Miller's farm house south of town burned last Saturday morning or more correctly speaking it caught on fire some time before midnight. The origin of the fire is unknown to the family. The son Ralph, aged 16 was awakened by the smell of smoke and he jumped out of bed and awakened the family. The fires started in the wood house as the family found it. It had already cut off access to the water at the well, and little could be done to save the house. The family saved the contents of three rooms below, but lost all in the kitchen and the cellar, including fifty dollar's worth of lard. The bedding was all upstairs nearly all of that and their wearing apparel was lost. The boy broke out an upstairs window and succeeding in saving some bedding. The main part of the house was built 50 years ago or more by Levi Pontius, built of logs and later sided up and always kept well painted. The loss is heavy with only \$875.00 insurance all told. The family is being cared for temporarily among the neighbors for the present. We presume Mr. Miller will rebuild as soon as possible. They certainly have the sympathy of the community.

Adams asks Indiana **Congressmen for College Tuition Deduction**

With college tuition and room and board charges continually escalating, State Representative Kent Adams (R-Bremen) has written letters to each United State's congressman from Indiana asking them to seek relief through possible Federal Income Tax deductions.

'Many young people and their families must borrow money in order to receive a college education," Adams said."Unfortunately, the students and family in turn are finding themselves with larger and larger debts to pay upon their graduations.

Adams pointed out in his letters that it would be worth the effort for the Congress to consider helping future college students and their families.

"It would appear to me that an effort on the part of the Federal Government to assist in this arena is well in order and certainly one of worthy consideration," Adams said in the letter. "I believe that we agree that one's education pays dividends and the investment in our students of today is of paramount importance to this nation's future.

Adams said that he has been contacted by a number of families and students concerned with the rise in college costs. In fact, he said, he had his attention called to a recent newspaper article published by Ann Landers questioning the establishment of a Federal Income Tax deduction.

"I really believe that the merits of the

Federal Income Tax deduction for money spent on a college education can only help the future of this state and our country Adams said. "I hope our congressman will take this idea into consideration, and if feasible, present some proposals to the entire body of Congress.
