Akron gets grant for sewers

Correspondence that began 46 years ago be-tween an Akron town board and the State Board Health concerning a sewer system for the town has culminated in plan, construction of which will begin in 90

The Akron Town Board has accepted a federal grant of \$121,300 and a state grant of \$60,650, both of which stipulate that construction the sewage plant must begin within 90 days of

acceptance in order to qualify for the funds. A public meeting to acquaint residents of the scope and nature of the proposed lagoon-type sewage system was held sewage system was held Wednesday evening. Pat Haas, a member of the Boyd Philips firm, presented a brief outline of the present plans. He said his firm first prepared a sewage study for the town in 1955 and in 1966 updated that study and added a lagoon alternate. In 1967, the firm designed plans alternate. In 1967, the firm designed plans and specifications for lagoon-type system, and the plans were sub-mitted to the State Bo-ard of Health in 1968. At the same time the At the same time the town applied for a grant and loan.

Herschel Umbaugh, Um-baugh and McQueen, the accountants working with accountants working with the town on the sewer project, outlined the costs of the plan as follows: land and land rights \$14,100; const-ruction contract \$415, 555; contingencies \$15, 341; engineering service \$29,754; inspection fees \$8,000; legal services and bond counsel %6,000; accounting services and bond prospectus \$6,700 and printing, administration and advertising \$1,500, for a total of \$496,950. Total following the region of the services and received the services and the tal federal aid received would total \$181,950, leaving a balance of \$315,000 to be raised a bond issue. Umbaugh said the issue

Umbaugh said the issue would be paid off in 17 years, estimating the town would save \$200,000 in interest over the cost if the project were financed for a 30 or 40 year period. He estimated the total costs per year for operating expense, bond coverage pense, bond coverage and principal and int-erest at \$54,058 and estimated sewage billings would run \$18 per quar-ter. 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An Open Letter To The Community Of Akron

THE SEMAGE MEETING, conducted by the Town Bord, was opened by a postmortem report on the future prospects. For the development of the Akron community. Members of the State Board of Health, Stream Pollution Board, Engineering and Accounting firms and FHA were brought in to explain the Board's Sewage Plans for us.

It quickly became apparent that these fine men had been convinced that our community has no growth or development potential, is a poverty pocket and will proceed in a pattern of apathy and decline. Obviously, those men who are employed or were brought in by the Board, proceeded accordingly and, naturally, did not question the assignments they were given.

Those in attendance who disagreed with the macabre Plan were quickly informed by its advocates that:

- 1. The Community is a low-income, poverty area.
- 2. There is no evidence of or reason to believe that it will change, grow, or develop.
- Pollution has been and will continue to be condoned and will be a way of life in the Akron Community.
- 4. Any planning or community investments should be made on these premises.

Noticeable was the "OLD GUARD" comradeship emerging in the background with the "Don't Rock the Boat" utterances of "Let's get behind the Board", "The Town has been this way every since I've lived here", and "I don't think the town will ever change".

At this point, the two obvious, distinctly separate schools in community thought and planning indentified themselves, the one of which is:

'The Akron Community is a low-income, poverty area and will continue to be. Nothing can change it. We should settle for what is offered us rather than attempt a change.

The other school (being Hoosiers) holds that:

'The community is, can, and will develope. This development requires the destruction of apathy, pessimism, and fear, implemented by plenty of sweat, desire, money and an injection of young blood. Age is no barrier.

It is inconceivable that any workman, home builder, business man, or banker would waste his labor or investment by staying in a community with such a dismal outlook as was described at this meeting. If one did subscribe to this poverty-stricken,low-income area theory, he would quietly be leaving. We don't believe this theory, and we doubt seriously if "deep down" the proponents of it do either. Secretly, we believe they may be doing better than they described.

Included in the information given was:

- The State Board of Health and Stream Pollution Board have approved the Town Board's present Sewage Plans, admitting, however:
 - A. We are presently and will continue polluting our surrounding environment.
 - B. The proposed system will add to this pollution by:
 - 1. Creating a combination sanitary and storm water sewer.
 - 2. Constructing open-faced lagoons which will pollute the $\operatorname{\mathtt{air}}$ and environment.
 - C. Although both the State Health Department and Stream Pollution Board are publicizing their opposition to lagoons and also state that it is illegal to construct combination sanitary and storm water sewers, they are turning their heads and making the approval here since they are told "OUR COMMUNITY CANNOT AFFORD BETTER AND THIS IS THE BEST THAT CAN BE DONE."
- 2. For this "POVERTY AREA" 'Get-Us-Off-The-Hook' sewage installation, we are offered a government handout of \$180,000, with 15 days to "take it or leave it". The total cost, including the add-ons at the time the system would be installed, is approximately a half-million dollars, and by the time it's paid off, it will be a million dollars. This isn't peanuts for a 'POVERTY AREA' system or for even a first-class sewage system.
- 3. All admit it is a cobbled-up affair, and no one can explain:
 - A. What we will do without drainage.
 - B. What it will cost to extend the system to all property owners.
- Everyone agrees we will need drainage; however, no one knows when it will be provided or how much it will cost.

Obviously, our Board will accept the government handout with the "now or never" recipient attitude. They will then need to pass ordinances, set rates, and establish a bond issue in order to sell bonds and raise the money for the project.

At this point, Akron Property owners will have to decide:

1. Do we wish to be saddled for many years with a million dollar debt for a cobbled-up, third-rate sewer—system designed for a 'poverty stricken area', with no hopes for development? If we do, we may all turn—our heads in approval as the Health Department and Stream Pollution Board have done.

0R

2. Knowing that our community is a good one, with growth potential, and well worth the effort and cost of an adequate sewage and drainage system, WE CAN REMONSTRATE TO THE STATE TAX BOARD at the time this bond issue is being presented and petition that it be disapproved. Disapproval will be based on evidence to be presented that the long range effect of the Board's sewage plan will damage us far more than it will benefit us.

IT IS NOT TRUE THAT IF WE REJECT THIS GOVERNMENT HANDOUT THAT WE CANNOT RE-APPLY AND RECEIVE ANOTHER ONE.

We believe that if this cobbled-up, costly monstrosity of a sewer plan is installed, our burden and length of time in building and developing this community will be doubled.

We believe we are far better off to reject the proposed sewer plan and continue with what we have, which in some ways is better than the system that is being offered. We should then start planning immediately for a workable system which will adequately handle our sewage and drainage problems, one that will not soon be outlawed, and one on which a growing community can be built.

It you want the present plan, just REMAIN SILENT.

If you don't want the present plan, this is the time to STAND UP AND BE COUNTED.



In Answer To Mr. Utter's Letter:

I personally met with Mr. Faust, town board president, La-Fontaine, Indiana, and visited the lagoon site there. They have a problem that has occurred due to several errors that were made. They can all be solved and they will be. They ten-acre pond to which they send approximately 40,000 gallons of water a day. The lagoon bottom was not sealed at the time of construction. Our specifications call for a 12-inch layer of clay seal and will be two six-acre ponds. Boyd E. Phelps Co., Inc. has engineered construction requirements that will prevent Akron from having the problems of LaFontaine. We will have sufficient amount of water going to the ponds (approximately 100,000 per day), the ponds will be sealed and we will have two ponds instead of one large one. The Akron town board insisted that the lagoons be properly sealed and they have spent many hours checking the We have checked with state and different lagoon systems. federal officials on the charge that lagoons will be outlawed and they have no information that they will be.

Should we fail to construct at this time with our Federal Grant, our chances of a future grant would be remote.

An Open Letter To The Community Of Akron

The Wabash Plain Dealer June 1, 1970, reported another lagoon failure at LaFontaine,

LAFONTAINE TOWN BOARD PLANS POLLUTION TESTS

LAFONTAINE -- The town board here agreed to run tests at the sewage pond west of town to determine if a break is polluting a nearby stream.

Board members decided to have an engineer run tests with a salt solution to check the possible location of a break location of a break.

location of a break.

The board has been corresponding with state officials after tests earlier this spring indicated pollution from the sewage lagoon was reaching the stream.

Size and construction of the facility was discussed by board members. The lagoon has been used since a new sewage system was installed in LaFontaine two years ago. The 10-acre pond retains sewage processed from a lift station near Ind. 15.

Attorney Al Plummer suggested two smaller ponds might have served the town better than the present lagoon. The board plans to work with the problem with the state board.

In our phone conversation with Mr. Al Plummer, Attorney for the Board, and Mr. Robert Foust, Board President, regarding their lagoon failure, Plummer said their lagoon was built on light, gravely soil and leaks, which, obviously, is the reason the newspaper reports, "Stream Pollution Caused by the Lagoon." Plummer says LaFontaine is "in a mess" with their sewage system. In his opinion, "Lagoons are no good and will no doubt be outlawed." The Board, engineers, and contractors blame each other for the failure, and Plummer says it looks like only a lawsuit would settle the problem. He says the lagoon dropped 6" during the past heavy rainfall, and the contents are getting away somewhere, according to Plummer.

Another lagoon failure is just now reported in the Marion paper in which the article states: "Foster Forbes Corporation had their lagoon overflow, regrettably dumping raw pollution into the stream" in which the lagoon outlet empties. "The State Board of Health is again rushing to the rescue," according to the newspaper report.

Board President Foust says part of their federal grant is being held back because of this lagoon failure. Foust says they installed a separate sanitary sewer, and, in addition, use their old storm sewer to get rid of their water. He says they like this arrangement and constructed it because they don't believe you can run drainage water and sanitary sewage together in one combination sewer, as is planned here for Akron. LaFontaine spent \$450-\$500,000 for their dual sewer lagoon system for 700 people.

The lagoon planned for Akron is on similar soil as the one at LaFontaine but much closer to our town and doesn't meet Federal recommendations in several ways.

We believe it is a serious mistake to spend almost a half million dollars now for a cobbled-up sewage system which, before it's paid for, will cost almost a million dollars. This is not a cheap sewage system which will get us, as we are told, "a low income, poverty-stricken town," "off the sewage hook." This is big money and must be spent for a good, adequate sewage system on which Akron (a community with excellent prospects) can build.

We don't believe the community wants a half million to one million dollar cobbled-up sewage system, (depriving us of our already inadequate drainage) consisting of a combination sewer and lagoon. Plymouth, Ind. has this combination sewer and is having to get rid of it. LaFontaine, like other towns, has learned about lagoons too late.

For these reasons, we are remonstrating against the proposed plan. WE NEED YOUR HELP. If you haven't already done so, contact those of us opposed to the plan -- NOW.



Tippecanoe River Runs Red This Week

A harmless bright red dye was poured into the Tippecanoe River this week, according to Malcolm D. Hale, District Chief of the Geological Survey's Indiana District. He said the dye would be "monitored" from about Tippecanoe to Monterey in connection with a "time-of-travel" study of the river by Geological Survey scientists. ntists.

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He said the dye will be noticeable at the "dosing" sites as well as a few miles downstream.

Follwoing injection of the dye, a Geological Survey hydrologist was to monitor and sample the dye as it traveled

The red dye, known as
Rhodamine WT solution,
is harmless to people,
fish and plants when used in limited concentrations such as are
planned. planned.
"Studies of the dye

result in more accurate predictions of travel time of contaminants that may be introduced into the river," Hale said.

The fluorometer, a sensitive instrument used to detect the dye in very small concentra-tions, can record as low as one part of dye in

water.
When the dye is first poured at the site it will be a "very bright red;" and then "gradually fade to a dull crimson; then to pink and then disappear completely by the time it has dispersed and travelled a few miles downstream," Hale said. Hale said.

Asked if the dye will stick to rocks and plant life, Hale said that experience shows that it will adhere to vegetation and rocks if sp-

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

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

all outstanding attractions are easily in view of the vacation-ing motorist. In fact, there are more than 400 caves in Indiana which offer some of the most fascinating and specta-cular viewing anywhere

America. second longest The second longest cave in the world is the Wyandotte Cave, located near the bottom of the state just off Ind. 62. There are five distinct floor levels in this cave—some 23 miles of cavelored passageways and The explored passageways and countless unexplored re-

gions. Wyandotte Cave Wyandotte Cave was known as Saltpeter Cave when saltpeter was mined there in 1812. The "Old Cave," that part known before 1850, boasts the Pillar of the Constitution—a stalagmite mountain about 25 feet in diameter and 35 feet high. It is the largest single formation was feet high. It is the largest single formation

largest single formation known to exist in any cave in the world.
Guided trips, ranging from 1½ to 2 hours, are offered hourly from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
Little Wyandotte Cave is near Wyandotte Cave

is near wyandotte Cave in the bottom of a sink-hole. Two passageways extend from the entrance. One extends 75 feet before it becomes impassible. The other passible. The other stretches 340 feet and contains two pits about 60 feet deep. These pits are crossed by a natur-

bridge.
Marengo Cave is in the Marengo Cave is in the northeastern part of Marengo, Ind. The original entrance, discovered by children in 1883, has been closed. A descending manmade stairway carries the visitor through a low, wide passage and deposits him at the entrance. This cave also has two passageways which are both explored

on the guided tour. Marengo has been called the most beautiful cave

the most beautiful cave in America. Trips begin every hour and cover about a mile, daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
Further north, on Ind. 37, is Spring Mill Park, popular with Midwesterners not only for its caves but for a variety of recreational activities and fine scenery. ties and fine scenery.

Spring Mill Village in the park is one of the most successful historic restorations in the United States. It was a frontier trading post, founded about 18-15, and later abandoned. It was hidden for years among the hills until moss-covered ruins its were discovered in a secluded hollow surround-ed by trees. Estate Planning Is Explained

Many Fulton Co. resiare concerned adents bout the problems of inand transferring of property as was shown by the attendance at a community meeting held June 17 in Roches-

This meeting was co-sponsored by the Fulton Co.Extension Homemakers cil and the Fulton Cooperative Exten-Council sion Service for benefit of al Co. residents. all Fulton Total attendance at this meeting was 51 and included several couples from Marshall County.

Mrs. Leo Thompson, re-presenting the Extension Homemakers, acted as hostess and introduced the guest speakers. The main speaker was Ritter Lavengood, estate plan-ner from Wabash. After Mr. Lavengood's presentation, questions were directed to a panel of local men, including Al Price, president of the First National Bank, John Delworth, attorney at law, and Don Kline, attorney insurance representative from Haskett and Smith,

. Lavengood told the audience that his main objective was to "suff-iciently disturb" them so that they would seek proper legal counsel. He talked in general legal counsel. ked in general because estate planning varies from family to family due to the estate, number of children, particular interests and value judgments of the family.

Mr. Lavengood told the audience that a will is a written document in which a person directs how his property shall be distributed after his death. When a person dies without a will, the provisions of the "Ind-iana Laws of Descent" determine the persons who are entitled to re-ceive property who are entitled to receive property and the
amount each shall receive. By way of a legal will, drawn up by a
competant lawyer, many
problems can be avoided are created upon death of either which spouse.

trustis an arrange ment whereby the management, control and legal title to property is placed in one person or an institution, known as a trustee, who man-ages or operates the property for the benefit property for the benefit of one or more other persons, the beneficiaries. A trust can be dreated during the life time to continue after death or it can be set up in a person's will to become effective at his become effective at his death. If created during life, it is called a living trust. If arranged for by will it is called a testamentary trust. Trusts car either irrevocable Trusts can be may or may not be changed or taken back.

There are a number of different taxes which are levied on different types of property trans-fers. The nature of these taxes and their these taxes and their impact on property were also presented. Those taxes Indiana include

inheritance tax, federal innerstance tax, rederal income tax and federal estate tax, gift tax and Indiana adjusted gross income taxes.

In addition to these various taxes, there are other costs to be met in the settlement of an estate. Other costs inof clude court, administrator or executor fees, bond costs and attorney
