Beaver Dam Church Is 100 Years Old



1872

A century of worship at the Beaver Dam Church will be honored Sunday when members celebrate the 100th anniversary of the church the church.

The centennial cel bration will begin with morning services and will include a potluck dinner at noon and a special program in the afternoon.

The church has been known by four denominations and has been remodeled several times.
In the winter of 1865-66, the Church of God

of, the Church of God organized with a congre-gation of 15 members. Their first meetings were held in the Beaver Dam School with Elder Dam School with Elder Wesley Lovett as pastor. The Sunday School was organized in 1870 by David Leininger and

Frederick Krause with 80 scholars.

In 1872, David Petry donated the ground where the present building stands, stating that a house of public worship was to be built. A frame building, thirty-four feet by forty-four feet, was built at a cost of \$1200. Church services were held every services were held every two weeks and the Sunday School met only in the summer. In 1948.

a basement and two classrooms were added to the original frame building.

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Cardinal Learning Center Cares

One of the most rewarding requirements for a psychology student at Grace College is ten hours of volunteer service per semester at Cardinal

The Cardinal Learning Center, a school for the mentally retarded and physically handicapped of Kosciusko County who have been denied services through regular channels, was established by The Council for the Retarded of Kosciusko Co., Inc. (a non-profit organization).

100 VOLUNTEER HOURS

Grace College turnishes approximately 100 volunteer hours of service per week to the Center.
The Center contains both the Cardinal Learning Center and the Cardinal Industrial Workshop. The Center's programs are pre-school, primary, intermediate and pre-vocational, and are available to sub-trainable and multi-handicapped children not being served by the local educational authority. ority.

The Pre-School Program consists of children ages 3 through 6. Pre-school is the child's first glimpse of a setting other than the family. The first task is learning how to get along

ly. The first task is learning now to get along in a group.

The "How to's" of communication, awareness, sharing, reaction to directions, self-help skills and both fine and gross motor skills are introduced. The Center feels that there is only one way for a handicapped (both mental and physical) child to perform: this is the correct

SURVIVAL READING

Primary students range from ages 7 through 9 and the intermediate group ranges from ages 10, through 12. Numbers and words are added to the curriculum established in the previous program. Now, more is expected from the child. Cardinal feels all of their children should know their

nal feels all of their children should know their name, address, telephone number, etc.

For some students a major accomplishment would be to be able to say, "I am Billy Jones." Printing is taught and writing skills are attempted. Survival leading is another prime and basic teaching area. STOP - GO - CAUTION - YIELD - WALK - DANGER - POISON - RAILROAD - and their signs and sounds are imperative things to be

Pre-vocational students are between the ages of 13 and 15. It is now time to begin preparing for life ten years hence. Hopefully, the student has learned and mastered the basics and can communicate--make a telephone call, tell anyone his name, write/print it, and not be hopelessly lost one block from home.

Everything taught now, with a few "tutoring" exceptions, will fall under the broad title of "The Academics of Living." The how to's for working together, such as simple cooking, sewing, ironing are truth. ironing are taught.

EXPANDING SKILLS

Also, the use of hammers, pliers, wrenches, saws, washing machines and dryers (coin operated for training in laundromat usage), folding, counting, sorting simple assembly and packaging, shopping, and making change, must be faced when parents are no longer here.

Cardinal prepares the student for this day starting at this early age. Similarly, they urge parents to think about the day when they will be gone and their loved one must do for himself. This is sometimes the most difficult task.

The secondary function of the pre-yocational

The secondary function of the pre-vocational group is to prepare the student for an orderly transistion from the Cardinal Learning Center to the Cardinal Industrial Worshop. There, the skills achieved will be fully utilized and expanded. When the student graduates from the learning center to the workshop, he then becomes a client.

INDUSTRIAL WORKSHOP

The Cardinal Industrial Workshop includes clients age 16 and up. The programs of the Cardinal Industrial Workshop are defined by law. The Cardinal Industrial Workshop is directly licensed by the Wage and Hour Division, Department of Labor

All clients work on a piece rate and are paid on a quantitative/qualitative production basis. Each client is evaluated monthly regarding improvements in social skills, job attitudes, and competitive readiness. When a client become s "job ready" the final disposition will be placement. Placement is the ultimate goal.

ment. Placement is the ultimate goal.
Clients in this program may earn as little as
\$.40 an hour and then only if a special certificate is issued by the Wage and Hour Division of
the Department of Labor.

If such a special certificate is not held by the Cardinal Industrial Workshop, then the minimum wage is \$.80 an hour. There is no ceiling on earnings.

#### **News Of Interest To Homemakers**

too long ago the erator replaced refrigerator replaced the cupboard as the ma-jor food storage area. In recent years, however, homemakers have lighthomemakers have light-ened the load on their refrigerators by turnthe freezer. The home freezer is now being used as a supplementary storage pantry for al-most every food imaginable.

A problem arises when the homemakers has a food product that she wants to freeze but isn't sure whether it freezes well or not. Cheese is one product that has raised some questions. Research has been done of various types of cheese to determine if they can be frozen and if so, for how long.

Process cheese, in eneral, maintained general. general, maintained very good quality after being frozen for up to four months. The flav-or and texture remained good for individually wrapped slices and loaf

Natural Swiss cheese chuck and slices retained very good quality for six weeks to two months. With longer freezer storage, the cheese toughened and gradually changed flav-

Two months freezing time did not destroy the flavor or the spreading quality of cream cheese. The new rigid cheese. The new rigid box that it comes in requires no over wrap

before freezing. Cheeses should be frozen in their origin-al wrap or in moisture proof wrappings. properly wrapped prod-



### Fined \$1,000 For Pollution

Tinkey Farms, Inc., R. fined 2, Warsaw, was fined \$1,000 in federal court at South Bend last week causing pollution of the Tippecanoe River west of Warsaw last Sep tember that resulted in a mass fish kill. Judge Robert Grant

Judge Robert Grant vied the fine after Tinkey Farms pleaded no contest to the charge filed for violation of regulations set by the Environmental Protect-Agency.

The court action was the court action was the result of an acci-dental spill of liquid chicken waste which flowed into the river and killed 69,493 fish.

Workmen on the farm ast Sept. 30 were re-airing a wall of a lithe farm pairing a wall of a liquid waste pit under one of the large chicken houses. The liquid level in the pit was low-ered by allowing it to flow onto a corn field. The wastewater flowed ine wastewater flowed through a cornfield and pasture to a culvert that passes under the Crystal Lake Road and it then entered a field tile that carried it to the river, resulting in the river, resulting in the fish kill from a concentration of ammonia.

The Indiana Department of Natural Resources has also filed a civil damage suit in Kosciusko Circuit Court seeking damages of \$21,996.10 for the fish it contends were killed in the river.

State officials said after being notified of the discharge, they conducted daily survellance and sampling of the riv-er until the effects of discharge abaded five days later approx-imately 4° miles dom-stream stream.

matter of judgment in deciding who to retain, saying he cast a more critical eye on a fouryear teacher than he did beginners. He also said he had a file full of excellent people wanting positions. He said Darr was only licensed as a social studies te-acher with a minor in English and that he preferred having a teacher with a German-English license since there were several social studies-English teachers avail-

Two parents spoke on behalf of Darr, defend-ing him as an excellent teacher who had chall-enged their children by making them want to work on additional assign-ments and who took a personal interest in them as individuals.

The board took no action, going into the second executive session to come out and pass the amended teachers' salary schedule that will give a general 3percent increase, in-cluding increments (automatic raises). Forbes said the previous schedule presented by the teachers would have to-taled 7.4% rather than percent as stated because of the increment.

Pay for beginning teachers raised from \$7,005 to \$7,200, advancing to \$9,605 in 14 years (bachelor's degree) and \$11,760 in 22 years (master's degree).

Pay for extra-curricu-lar activities also in-

creased three percent. Fringe benefits stayed the same as last year-\$50 bonus at end of year for teachers with perfect attendance; \$25 bonus for teachers missing only one day; terminal leave whereby teachers terminating their chers terminating their TVSC association receive one half of the accumulated sick leave based on contracts since 1964-65 at the rate of pay described in their con-tract; \$125 per year per employee toward a major medical group insurance program and pay at reg-

ular rate for any teacher called for jury duty. A GED diploma Charles Thomas Sagun was signed.

Board members present at the meeting were Mau-rice Coplen, Dr. Donald VanGilder, Philip Lash and Richard Goshert. A fifth member, Dr. John McKee, was not present. Also attending were the superintendent, Robert Forbes, and a number of spectators.

The next regular meeting of the school board will be at 7:30 p.m. Monday, June 19.



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> Completion of the new pipe line by Trico Pipe Line, Inc. will enable Buckeye to close permanently the 94-mile line which has served as the refinery's sole source of crude oil supply since 1956.

> Buckeye sought to close the pipeline, which follows the Erie railroad through Akron, more than a year ago because the large expenditures required to recondition it for long-term use could no longer be econ-omically justified. The only firm served by the line since 1961 has been the refinery in Laketon. The eight-inch line originates at Buckeye's tank farm in Griffith.

> Principal products of the Laketon refinery are liquid asphalt for construction and maintenance of county, state and Interstate highways and interstate nignways throughout the area. It also produces fuel oil for school district and industrial plant use, diesel fuel for public utilities' generating equipment and jet fuel for Grissom Air Base and other military install other military installations.

A problem arises when pottery utensils are not adequately glazed and lead is leaded into the food contained in the utensil. Since there is no way to identify whether pottery already in 1186 contains excess levels of these metals, the consumer should not store acidic foods or beverages such as orange juice in such containjuice in such containers for prolonged periods. Daily use of the dinnerware for food service will not pose any hazard, unless of course, the dinnerware course, the dinnerwallis used for storage.

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
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

William Chapin, a professor of journalism and former newspaperman, has written the intense ly personal account of his child's descent indrug addiction and to subsequent mental ill-ness. The parents' ness. struggle to prevent that disaster was unavailing. It is the true story of one middle-class fami-ly's battles ly's battles, loves, hates, reconciliations and contacts with the drug and medical worlds. These are the strong,

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




In a letter reported circulating in Moscow, Nobel Prizewinning novelist Alexander Solzhenitsyn attacks the Soviet State's policy of atheism and the alleged compliance of the hierachy of the Russian Orthodix Church. Ecumenical Press Service re-ports that he reminded the Patriarch that the spiritual development of Russia has always been based on the Orthodox faith. Drawing attention to the situa-Drawing tion of the Roman Cath-olic Church in Poland, olic Church in Poland, Mr. Solzhenitsyn asks why there are limits on the independence of the Orthodox Church in Russia and asserts that in effect the church is "ruled dictatorially by atheists." The letter singled out specifically the church's compliance with the ban on teaching religion to children. "We are losing the last traces of a Christian people," Mr. Solzehnitsyn wrote.

NECTARINE NUT LOAF 2 or 3 fresh nectarines

1 cup shortening 1 cup sugar 2 eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla

2½ cups sifted all-purpose flour
2½ teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt
½ cup chopped pecans or roasted diced almonds

Blanch nectarines, remove peel. Mash enough fruit to measure 1 cup. Cream shortening with sugar; mix in eggs and vanillas. Sift flour with baking powder and salt; add to creamed mixture alternately with mashed nectarines, mixing well after each addition. Mix in nuts. Turn into greased and floured 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pan; bake in 350 degree (moderate) oven about 1 hour. Cool in pan 10 minutes; remove and finish cooling on rack. Wrap and store overnight for best slicing. Makes 1 loaf.

He grew 538 acres of crops and raised 47 head of beef and dairy cattle while earning his rational horses. his national honor.

They are involved with the problems and seek solutions to air and water pollution, garbage disposal, survival of threatened animal and bird life. In fact they want to conserve all of America's natural resources.



### Alfalfa Growers Urged To Check For Weevil

ALFALFA growers in northern Indiana are being urged to make frequent field checks for alfalfa weevil, a pest which has been noted in heavy infestations in the southern part of the state.

heavy infestations in the southern part of the state. According to Dave Matthew, extension entomologist at Purdue University, the weavil problem has been developing rapidly, with 50 to 75 percent tip feeding in some areas. Much of the southern alfalfa area has been treated for the weevil, and growers across the top of the state should inspect their fields and treat with insecticides when they see 30-50 percent tip damage.

Mild winter weather was favorable to the overwintering stage of the weevil and thus high spring populations hold the threat of damage to the first crop hay. Virginia, Illinois and Missouri are experiencing heavy infestations this spring.

Damage to alfalfa is caused primarily by the larval or growing stage of the weevil.



An adult alfalfa weevil can cause a great deal of damage in a short time.

The larvae first feed on the growing tips of the plant and developing buds, then they shred the foliage. This feeding may cause complete loss of the first cutting if the larvae aren't controlled.



Dr. Van Gilder made a motion in which he asked that a referendum to be paid by TVSC be held at the November election determine if people wanted renovations of the existing Akron and wanted Mentone high schools, if they wanted new schools in each of the towns or if they wanted a centralized high school to be built. The motion failed for lack of second, whereupon Dr. VanGilder said he would like to make a public statement to the effect that in his four years on the board he had what he felt was best for the children and what had an educational connotation. He said he did what the 1968 referendum had directed him to do and read percentages of voters in Harrison township at that time supped the "two-school supphad orted the "two-school" policy that Dr. VanGil-der has followed. He der has followed. He said that he had promised to do two things-what the majority of the people wanted on the two high school plan and doing it within the limits of the cumulative building fund on a payas-you-go basis.

You will see in a few days a Declaration setting forth the causes which have impelled us to this mighty revolution, and the reasons which will justify it in the sight of God and man. A plan of confederation will be taken up in a few days.

You will think me transported with enthusiasm, but I am not. I am well aware of the toil, and blood, and treasure that it will cost us to maintain this declaration, and support and defend the—

Yet, through all the gloom, I can see the rays of ravishing light and glory. I can see that the end is more than worth all the means and that posterity will triumph in that day's transaction, even although we should rue it, which I trust in God

## News Of Interest To Homemakers

BY ANN HANCOOK Area Extension Agent, Kosciusko County

"I'd Rather Do It My-self" was the title of presentation on food preservation given by Dr. Philip Nelson, As-sociate Professor, Pur-due, at Homemakers Con-June 15. ference thousand Indiana homemakers attended the

three day conference.

Dr. Nelson stated
that in the last few
years there has been a revival of home canning by homemakers of all ages. Home canning is economical and given, the homemakers a sence of accomplishment. Dr. Nelson warned that ex-treme caution should be in canning low acid vegetables.

Use a pressure canner for all vegetables (except tomatoes), meats, poultry, and fish and mixed foods such as mixed foods such chili and stew. Botu-lism, a serious food poisoning, grows in low acid foods unless they are properly processed. It is unsafe to can green beans in a water bath since it is a low

acid food. Dr. Nelson answered questions concerning the new varities of tomatoes. The sweeter tomatoes are often on the border are often on the border between acid and alka-line. If you are cann-ing one of the new low acid tomatoes it is wise to add citric acid (available at drug stor-es) or an acid such as lemon juice.

These important steps were given in home can-ning: use only the specified times and temper-atures, do not over fill the jars, do not rely on your memory - set a timer and if the cooking procedure is interrupted, start over. In closing Dr. Nelson gave this guideline "When in doubt, throw it out." For information on

led. Seal with parra-fin and store in a freezer. Or keep several weeks at refrigerator weeks at refrigerator temperature. This makes about 6 glasses. (To use liquid pectin for this jam, omit the powdered pectin and water and use ½ bottle of liquid pectin (½ cup). No cooking necessary.





Legislative Council Will Expand Task Force Age of Majority

The Indiana Legislative Council this week okayed a proposal by State Representative, State Representative, Kermit O. Burrous (R-Peru) to expand the age of majority task force to include four 18-21year old members. Burrous, a member of the Council, stated that the task force is loaded with examining more than 70 Indiana laws that deal with persons under 21 years of age and recommending changes in these laws to the 1973 Indiana General

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23

Assembly.
The four new members of the task force will have full voting rights and will join a bi-partisan committee presently composed of eight legislators. "This is the first time any leglegislators. "This is the first time any legislative task force has included any member of the general public," Burrous noted, "but in this particular instance I felt that we definitely need the 18-21 imput, if the task force is to come up with truly workcome up with truly work-able recommendations.

The new members, who will be appointed later, will include two college students, a vocational school student and a working person. Burrous expressed the hope that "if the concept of add-ing non-legislative mem-bers to task forces proves workable in this situation, it might be expanded to other task forces which consider special problems."




