

Dear Ann:

undoubtedly As you undoubtedly know, the Town of Akron has had limited funds for the maintence and operation of the City Park. However, with contributions of materfor the maintence ials, and considerable assistance from private individuals and organizations, the Park been improved a lit-

tle bit each year. I went up to the park early this spring to see what was needed in the way of clean-up and re-pairs, and was disheartened to see the abuse it had been given by some few individuals who some few individuals who apparently have little respect for community property. The outdoor toilets had been badly abused, beer cans, pop cans, and miscellaneous trash had been thrown in the charcoal pits, on the ground. toilets, on the ground of the swing and, one seats had been run up to the top of the flag-pole and the flagpole rope then broken off the pulley. In short, the park showed the uswear and tear that ual most community property does when there are not adequate funds for regular maintenance and surveilance.

With the cooperation of the Town Board, we did, however, set out begin our annual spring clean-up and fixup, and after about one week's work we were able to put the park up in tip-top shape ready for summer. I only hope we are able to keep it that

way.
Last year I went to the park several times on weekends, and on many occasions found the shelter house crowded to capacity. This makes it apparent to me that the community might well benefit through the addition of more park facilities. I'm thinking now in terms of another shelter house, a double tennis court, a yeararound enclosed recreation center which could be used by Boy Scouts,

Girl Scouts, family re

union groups, church groups, etc., and poss-ibly over in the well field directly west of the park, a baseball diamond which could be used by Little League and others. This, of course, requires some relatively elaborate long-range planning, as well as the backing of some individuals or or-

ganization who can see

I talked with the Las Donas Club and they ex-pressed an interest in sponsoring such a project; however, they too were concerned that once these additional improvements were made to the park, how do we go about getting them cared for with the constant need for surveilance, main-tenance, and repair.

"The first freedom of a free man is freedom of the mind, but that freedom is of little value without access to information and the opinions of others," writes the Los Angeles Times. And that is precisely what Freedom of the Press Day, June 7, is all about is all about.

An independent press remains the vital watchdog of individual freedom. Government grows more powerful, and more decisions are taken out of the hands of the average citizen everyday. Yet, in the independent press, public opinion can still be heard and remains instrumental in shaping local, state and national policies. As always, First Amendment protections of the press censorship.

As Representative Paul Findly of Illinois has said, "By requiring re-porters to reveal their sources and personal notes, the courts are turning reporters' press cards into policemen's badges. As this happens, news sources dry up and the public is less in-formed and less able to make decisions necessary for good government.

Pursuant to previous arrangments, the voters of Henry township met at the polls Tuesday, June 3, to suggest that no open saloon was wented in Akron just at this time. The weatherman was on his job early and provided the finest June day weather. The rains of Sunday had put the ground in such elegant condition to work it that the drys feared the farmer voter would not leave his work to come in and vote and the day would be lost to the drys on that account, and many did not come, possibly one hundred and fifty, but enough came to make the matter very decisive in favor of the drys-a majority of 183. Athens precinct cast 127 votes, 75 dry, 49 wet and four mutilated, giving the dry vote in that precinct a clear majority of 28 which was entirely unlooked for by either party so far as we could learn.



student pilot three years ago and within a year was deeply involved not only in learning to fly but in studying the history of aviation. This study took him to the Air Force Museum in Dayton, Ohio, where he saw Neil Armstrong's autograph on display. He knew immediately this was something he wanted and without realizing it, set himself on a course that was to lead to one of the finest aviation-space - related collections in the coun-

Rather than simply writing Armstrong for his autograph, Jaques located an Apollo 11 patch and cut a picture related to the flight from a current publica-tion, mounting these on a display board that he sent Armstrong along with a sincere letter with a sincere letter praising the accomplishments of the first man to walk on the moon. Within a short time, the display board was returned with the astronaut's autograph. It has since been auto-graphed by the other two members of the crew.

His success in obtaining these autographs prompted him to design similar display boards for other space explorers and he now has collection of autographed display boards re-lating to each of the Apollo flights. This is no small accomplishment in that it involved not only writing to the men but creating an interesting display board to send them. This invariably consists of

"I follow a pretty set form in writing to these people," he says, noting that he only writes to individuals he has real and genuine interest in, feeling that any insincerity on his part would be apparent in the letter. In addition, he tries to send them something, such as a dis-play board or a photo-graph obtained from another source. Lacking these, he encloses an-other flight-related item such as commemorative first day covers. With the item to be autographed and his covering letter, he also sends a self-addressed, stamped envelope (SASE). He feels this helps ensure a response since the addressee in no way is obligated to him oththan to spend a few minutes of time.

If he has any ques-If he has any questions concerning that person's flight or accomplishments, he includes these with his letter and, to his delight, has received many detailed letters that shed new light on that individual's achieveindividual's achieve-ments. His favorite is a two-page letter from a two-page letter from Scott Crossfield, who tested the X-15. Not only does he learn more about the person, he actually gets two auto-graphs, one on the let-ter and the other on the picture or display

Jaques says 99 per cent of the people he queries of the people he queries are very co-operative and he has never had a request rejected although he has had to wait as long as 15 months for a reply. Patience and persistence are necessary prerequisites for his hobby, he notes, adding that his appreciation of the U. S. Postal Service is great as none of his magreat as none of his ma-terial has been lost in

the mails. His interest in flight and the space program has helped him obtain between 150 and 200 autbetween 150 and 200 autographs, including not only the complete Apollo program but a complete set of the Battle of Britain RAF fighter aces and a complete set of autographs from the Russian Cosmonauts. The latter is currently on display at the Huntsville, Alabama, space center.

The Jaques family now lives in Bourbon but will soon move to Alabama, a move that will force bob Jaques to give

bama, a move that will force Bob Jaques to give us his position as a columnist for Public Aviation News. The col-umn was a direct result of his study of aviation umm was a direct result of his study of aviation history and has featured such notables as Mentone's own Lawrence Bell as well as Amelia Earhart, who, though not a native Hoosier, was an instructor at Purdue University and practiced for her final was an instructor at Purdue University and practiced for her final flight there. His study of her log book there and the subsequent reading and research he did on the Earhart chapter of aviation history were compiled into a report for a college course and remain the basis for further study in the area.

While it's difficult to say which came first, the love of flying or the study of aviation history, Bob Jaques has created a collection collection that is irreplacable and that will continue to grow in value. Now stored in safe deposit boxes when not on display at schools or meetings or the Alabama Space Center, it will be do-nated to a museum when Jaques is through with it. In fact, he stress-es strongly in each of the letters he writes

that he will in no way materially gain from the asked-for autograph and that it will not be used commercially. His collection is entirely for his own enjoyment and for the pleasure of various groups to which he speaks. It reflects much from the lives of the men and women involved in aviation as well as other fields and is the product of an inquiring individual whose quest to learn to fly quest to learn to fly took him beyond the pre-sent back into history

and forward into the future. By the time the nation focused its attention on Skylab, Bob Jaques was already familiar with the project and acquainted with the men involved and their autographs had been detailed. autographs had been added to his collection.

Lacking new space pro-grams at the moment, he is attempting to get autographs of the German pilots who participated in the Battle of Bri-tain. So far, the going has been slow, but he is patient.



We've come a long way from the 9 x 12 rugs that grandmother had in her parlor. Now you not only must decide which carpet to choose, her parlor. but where you will use it, on the floor, around the pool, on the patio or on the sidewalk in front of your home.

Selecting carpet for your needs, with the money you have to spend is no easy task. You will be bewildered by the many fibers, colors, and styles from which you can select. Before you shop for carpet be-come as well informed as you can. Take along samples of colors al-ready used in the room. When you have eliminat-ed all but a few of the possible choices ask to take samples home with you to see if the car-pet goes well with other things under differ-ent lights.

Buy the best carpet

Buy the best carpet you can afford for the purpose. Wool is still standard against which we measure all other carpet fibers. For most people the price of wool carpeting makes it not feasible. There are many different types of carpeting that will give you very satisfactory performance.

noted for abrasion-resistance and offers outstanding value in medium priced carpets for heavy traffic use. There are two types of nylon, staple and continuous filament. Continuous filament eliminates pilling which is a problem with sta-ple filament. Nylon has a tendancy to gen-erate static electricity also.

Acrylics are close to wool in appearance and feel. All acrylic fibers used in carpets have good abrasion resistance and resiliency. Acryl-ics compare favorably to wool in durability.
Other fibers used for

carpeting include ole-fin and polyester. Properties for these may be found in a bulletin entitled "Buying Carpet" available at the County Extension Office.

in place by hand. Larg-er dolls are made on the sewing machine, but there is never any worry that the stuffing will spill out because she meticulously stitches and restitches the durable control to creat delle cotton to create dolls that will withstand wear. And because she noted so many arms and legs became weak points, she has devised a meth-od of attaching these extremities by use of a button that keeps them from tearing off.

The dolls' bodies are carefully stitched and then turned to be stuff-ed. Some of the small-er dolls have such tiny arms and legs that she has to use a nut pick to turn the material. She reinforces these She reinforces these small legs with wire so the doll can stand. The dolls are tightly stuff-ed with cotton before the faces are carefully embroidered. Although patterns do not call for ears, she adds these features, often high-lighting them with tiny earrings appropriate to the doll. She also stitches in elbows and fingers to give greater flexibility and to make them more realistic. She uses nylon thread for the latter, because it doesn't break as eas-ily as cotton. "These dolls are made to last," she says.

The dolls are dressed in original fashions that she sews by hand. Some of them having tatting on their panties and patticoats and other decorative trim is used on the dresses. She often devises jewelry in addition to the tiny ear rings to highlight a particular outfit and has even added rings to the tiny fingers.

Although she often makes the dolls far a-head of dressing them, there is never any doubt as to how the doll will be dressed, because she carefully marks each body "boy dancer", "girl dancer", "Jack" or "Jill" or whatever she has in mind. The clothes are

black stockings and dainty undergarments.
Much in demand by clubs for talks and readings, Mrs. Dawson never sells her dolls, prefering to use them in her talks or giving them as cifts or loaning other children.

Martha Shireman quested a transfer Rochester Community High School for her son Greg take third year German. The boy was transferred to Rochester when he was a freshman in and freshman in order to take German, and as a sophomore transferred to take vocation agri-culture. He transferr-ed last year to take second-year German and desired the third year course. The first trans-fer was granted by the State Commission on Ed-State Commission on Education after the local board rejected it. After lengthy discussion, this year's request for transfer was denied on a 3-2 vote with Richard Goshert and Dr. Wymond Wilson voting in favor of it and Dr. John Mc-Kee, Philip Lash and Maurice Coplen opposing it. In voicing opposition, board members cited a recent policy maned a recent policy man-ual adoption that says transfers can be grant-ed only if required by state regulations, i.e. vocational agriculture or special education.
A financial report by Superintendent Forbes showed \$1,399,364,34 in

funds with \$1,353, 450.47 on investment.

New teachers hired in-cluded Mary Ann Rogers, a Grace College gradu-ate who will teach kin-dergarten at Mentone; Joyce Harmon, an Indiana State University gradu-ate who will be in charge of girl's physical cducation at Mentone, and William Brian John son, an English and German teacher who will be assigned 'to the Akron school. In discussing the latter contract, Forbes said German would offered students at Akron while Mentone students would have French as their second foreign language. Spanish is language. Spanish is taught at both schools and Latin is offered at Akron although it was discontinued at Mentone this year for what Forbes described as a lack

of interest.
What to do with the 15 acres of land at Mentone that was purchased a few years ago from the Lackey family was discussed without recommendations being made.

Also discussed was the building trades class. Forbes said no Akron boys had enrolled for the com-ing year and that the program would have offered on a halftime basis. He suggested a curtailed program and suggested the boys build some storage buildings at the site of the new high school. the new night school.
Board members expressed
displeasure at this suggestion, feeling that
building pole barns
would be a better way would be a better way, to kill a course than to keep it alive and tigate a program that

would let the boys build a house in two years in-stead of one.

Forbes was also auth-rized to investigate orized to investigate risk insurance for the building program to begin soon on the Mollenhour farm southwest of Mentone.

A discussion of teacher and non-instructional personnel salary schedules tabled in the early part of the meet-ing was continued following the hour and 15minute executive sess-ion. Board members apexecutive session. Board members approved raising bus drivers' salaries from \$11.50 per day to \$13 and giving six per cent increases to clerks and custodians. The board also adopted a salary schedule for teachers that would start beginners at \$7400, increasthat would start beginners at \$7400, increasing to \$10,000 in 15 years with increments. The current pay scale is \$7200 to \$9605, the latter coming with 14 years' experience. Master technical technical start years experience. Master teachers would begin at \$7800 and peak at \$12,000 in 23 years. The present schedule is \$7,500 to \$11,760 in 22 years. Teachers had argued the scale was more attractive to beginning teachers who were more teachers who were more likely to live outside the corporation than to
