
Citizens Cemetery Undergoes Cleaning.



Your share of a family farm

Agri ues BY CLARK O. LEWIS Indiana Farm Bureau, Inc.

"If all the farmland "If all the farmland in the United States were divided equally among U. S. families, what would be your fam-ily's share?" That question was asked in an article ap-pearing in the Farm In-dex, a publication of the United States Agri-

asked in an article ap-pearing in the Farm In-dex, a publication of the United States Agri-culture. Since nowa-days, it seems that ev-eryone wants some land to call his own, where he can perhaps raise some of his own food, the answers to this qu-estion were interesting. The size of your farm would be slightly less than 24 acres, of which 20 acres would actually be your farm. You would run livestock on about four acres of land rent-ed or leased from the Government. A 24-acre plot would seem like a lot of room to a subur-banite, accustomed to a tiny lot, but the av-erage farmer who's used to 385 acres would feel pretty closed in. Of your parcel of farmland, 7½ acres would

to soly actes would real of your parcel of farmland, 7½ acres would be cropland; 9½ would be grassland or range; 3 acres would be wood-land and less than an acre would be used for buildings, roads, and nonfarm uses. Last year, the one-fifth of a dairy cow that you own managed to produce 250 gallons of milk. Your two head of beef cattle had nine-tenths of a calf, while your only hog had a litter of 1.6 pigs. You tenths of a calf, while your only hog had a litter of 1.6 pigs. You also own one-third of a sheep--not ba-a-a-d. The 5.6 hens you own laid 103 dozen eggs. You also produced 56 broilers, but only 2½ turkeys (just enough for Thanksgiving and Christ-mas, with a little left over for New Years).

The 20 acres that you own are valued at \$4,814 on the 1973 real estate market. Your livestock is valued at \$638 and your crops at \$262. You have \$726 invested in machinery and motor ve-hicles. Your gross in-come for 1973 was \$1,684, come for 1973 was \$1,684, but production expenses were \$1,198, so you had a net income of only \$486, if you didn't have to buy a set of tractor tires or if your crops weren't ruined by bad weather.



## Marie Nestleroad keeps quiltin

By Ann Sheetz

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Quilting, now being revived by artists and craftsmen as a lost art, is nothing new to Marie Nestleroad. Her mother taught her to quilt when by the time she and her husband Lester (Bus) were married, she had a hope chest full of stur-dy, handmade quilts. In fact, she has made so many quilts over the years, she says she has completely lost track of the number.

A seamstress who also makes afghans and enjoys needlepoint, the Miami county homemaker likes the challenge quilts of-fer and likes the fin-ished products because they are attractive, useful they useful are attractive, and warm--and a good way to use up scraps of material left from

of material left from sewing projects. All her quilts are made on a frame that is itself a result of usitself a result of us-ing materials at hand. It was built by her hus-band 36 or 37 years ago from a bedstead he pur-chased at an auction for ten cents. Its size--96 x 104--permits her to convert scraps into use-ful quilts that are large and attractive enough to double as bedspreads.

Although quilting is an old craft, Mrs. Nes-tleroad favors using mo-dern fabrics and likes best of all to work with polyester - cotton mixes polyester - cotton mixes and dacron bats. She notes dacron is more ex-pensive than cotton but feels the increased ex-pense is well worth it to get finished quilts that are easy to care for and light in weight. Using many patterns, she makes the quilts mostly by hand, allow-ing only the blocks to be pieced together on the sewing machine but doing all the quilting itself by hand, working with her fingers taped to prevent accidental jabbings with the need-le as she works it across the design she has presketched on the fabric. She is pictured work-ing on a quilt that was to be a gift for her only grandson. It had taken more than a month-and a half to complete and it still had to be bound, another hand job that would fill many spare hours. This quilt and the one pictured on the bed were made in similar designs, a sun-burst that radiates bold eye-appealing colors sketched on the fabric.

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#### Local girls make move to city by being mothers' helpers

What can a mother's helper hope for? That was the question posed by Leigh Infield and Annie Needham, writers for the New York Daily News

News. By their definition, a mother's helper is employed to care for the child or children in the family--and do little else. She is a surro-gate mother--a nanny-gate mother-a nanny--not a maid or housekeep-er. According to her title, the mother's helper would be requir-ed to pick up the toys on the living room floor but not to dust the pi-ano Houseyer most dust ano. However, most dust the piano and do laundry, dishes, vacuuming and general cleaning in addition to caring for their charges. Their their charges. Their days are long; often they are not free until the children finish their homework, are bathed and tucked into bed. They are expected to be available for ba. bed. be babysitting at no extra pay except on their days off. Their plus bene occasional fits are occasional trips with the family and the proximity of theaters and museums--if they ever have any time free. It's a str-ange, solitary life and the paw is near after fits are the pay is poor-often less than \$30 per week. Why, then, do girls seek this type of employment? .....

Two of the girls in-terviewed are from Ak-ron--Marjorie and Mariron--Marjorie and Mari-on Kendall, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Merrill Kendall. For them, it was a good jumping off of Mr. and Mrs. Merrill Kendall. For them, it was a good jumping off place between their lives in a small town and the city. Marion, a 20-year old graph-ic artist who spent last summer in Nantucket as summer in Nantucket as a mother's helper said, "Most of the mother's helpers I knew were helpers I knew were girls who were between college and finding their first job or be-tween finding themselv-es." es.

Most of the girls had found their jobs by pl-acing ads in New York newspapers or by answer-ing ads placed in their

home town newspapers by New York families. In Marjorie's case, a fami-ly paid her round trip air fare to New York for hopes

the interview. There is a high turn-over in mother's helpers over in mother's helpers positions because of working conditions and low pay--and a complete lack of privacy. Even on Marjoric's day off, her young charges pound-ed on her door for at-tention--to show her a picture or tell her something.

Marjorie was the first of the Kendall girls to work as a mother's help-er, working at Hastings-on-Hudson, New York, for а a year. She was respon-sible for Marion receiving a similar position in Bronxville, N. Y. Both girls feel that be-ing a mother's helper was education and re-warding--although some-times frustrating.

Marjorie is now work-ing as an assistant und-erwriter for the Ameri-can Mutual Insurance Co. in White Plains, New York, and is planning a trip to Europe in the fall. On her return, she plans to go back to college for a degree in pureipe nursing.



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

The Chicago Motor Club-AAA reminds motorists that the new turn on red law in Indiana becomes effective July 1, 1974. The Motor Club offers the following traffic safety tips in connection with the new law:

When making a right turn on a red traffic signal you must YIELD to all cross traffic. Don't dart into oncoming traffic. Be sure visibility is clear before turning. 1

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> When making a right turn on a red traffic signal you must watch out for pedestrians in the crosswalk. The pedestrian has the right-of way particularly on 2 the green or "walk" indicator. Be especially careful at school crossings.

A left turn on a red traffic signal 3 is permitted ONLY from a one way street onto another one way street. Left turns on red are NOT permitted when going from a one way into a two way street.



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



John Gast, eighth of nine children of Andrew and Marie Halbeisen Gast was born about 1863 in Akron. Siblings were Wilhelmina (Mrs. Jacob) Sayger, Frederica (Mrs. David Bright), William, Almondo and Helen (Smith) twins, Rudolph and Odelia (Bell), all older, and one younger bro-ther, Alfred Augustus. Many of their descendof their descend-are living in Akents ron today.

Both parents died in 1876 and John lived with his married sister, Rickie, where he worked for his board and room. Tiring of this and dis-satisfied that his bro-

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Dave, did not pay the wages he felt he had coming and unhappy about the slowunnappy about the slow-ness in getting his fa-ther's estate settled, he left Akron to go west in 1883, drifting eventually to Texas where he cooked for cow-boys, bought a few cat-tle and tried to rela tle and tried to make a living. He died of pne-umonia in late 1885 and his brother, Mondo, put a marker on his grave, sold his few cattle, and returned with a packet of letters written to John by relatives and friends in and around Akron. Etta Gast, wife of Mondo, who had gone to school with John, saved these and their daughter, Marie Gast Talbot, mounted them as a gift to the Historical Society, of which she is a long-time member.
