Mentone residents question annexation

Approximately 20 Mentone area residents attended Monday night's town board meeting to ask questions concerning the annexation of land around the town.

Details of the annexation were outlined in an ordinance published in the NEWS on May 9 and 16.

Board members told protestors there were residents and corporations near Mentone but not within the town limits that are receiving benefits of town utili-

ties such as water without paying town taxes. They noted, too, that their tax rates had been frozen although inflation continued to soar and that the state will soon mandate the town to build a sewage treatment facility. They said the town cannot stand a 15 per cent cost of building a sewage treatment plant without annexing new territory and taxpayers to help finance it. They said with tax rates frozen and since the state would not al-

low them to arrange a cumulative sewage treatment fund to save the money for future building, their only alternative is to annex land or let the town go bankrupt and die.

They added that no one would force annexation down anyone's throat and that if a remonstrance was filed and the town board lost, a unlikely happenstance according to recent decisions, the board would not appeal the decision but would scrap the annexation and start all over.

Don't Let Grass Fall In Street

The Akron Town Board this week requested that all residents exercise care in mowing their lawns to prevent grass clippings from being blown into the street. Board members said these clippings, along with leaves and other debris, find their way into the sewers where they tend to build up and could cause serious problems.

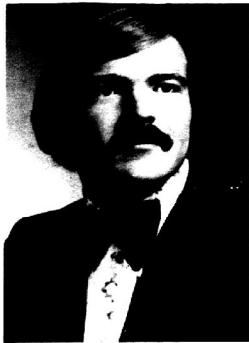

RAPE

If you are attacked, scream if you can. Carry a loud, shrill whistle or be sure to keep any of the following handy when you walk alone on a dark street: can of spray perfume or hair spray, your keys (good weapons if you keep them firmly in your hand), a rat-tail comb, nail file, umbrella, rolled up newspaper that you can use to poke your attacker in the stomach or a high heeled shoe that you can use to crush into his instep, causing him to let go so you can run for help.

If you are unable to get these items or have them and cannot put them

to use, do not antagonize the attacker, but, if necessary, submit and survive, but try to remember some sort of mark on him such as a birthmark, mole or scar so you can identify him in a line-up. You may demand to have a woman take your statement or anyone on the "Resist Attack, Promote Education" committee will be glad to help you. The police or sheriff's office can help you in getting in touch with one of them or you can contact anyone at the Family Service Association anytime through the Woodlawn hospital office.

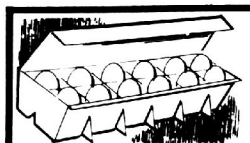

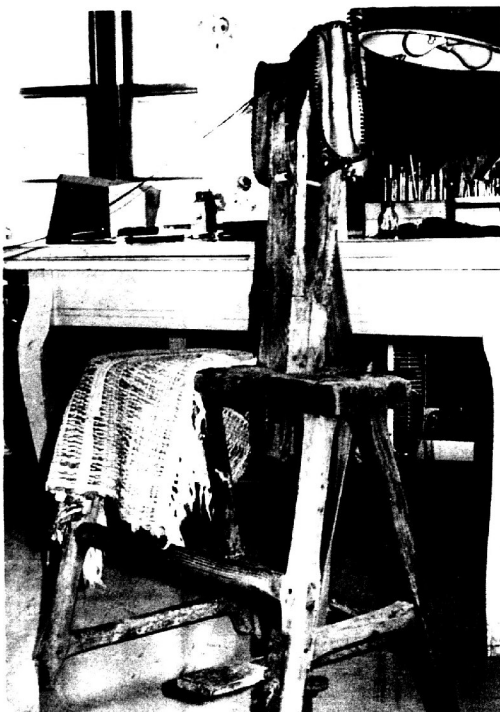

Leather working is therapy for

By Ann Sheetz

Forrest Meredith is an active father of seven sons. A farmer, he is used to working long, hard hours. And he is determined. Determined that no accident can dampen his enthusiasm for living, that there is a reason for all things and that the hand of God is involved in his struggle to live a normal, productive life after a cornpicker accident in 1971 cost him his right arm and as much as two-thirds of the use of his left hand and arm.

"I knew even while I was still in the picker that the hand of God was involved," he says. He credits this knowledge and the excitement of wanting to know where it would lead him for helping him through the long months of hospitalization that followed.

The first month was spent in Murphy Medical Center and then he was transferred to Research Hospital in Chicago. It was there the badly mangled right arm was finally removed and the left arm was fastened to his chest for feeding because it was healing so slowly. A lesser man would have had his spirit crushed. Not Forrest Meredith. His determination showed in all of his activities, and it became stronger than ever in occupational therapy sessions when he was initiated into leather working -- and then changed to ceramic tile.

"I don't know why they changed me," he says in

reminiscence, "but they did. The ceramic tile was okay, but I really liked working with leather." He remembers it took him four weeks to put together a belt made of loops, but he was so determined to do it he kept working on it although it took him six days to fold the first four loops. He has nothing but admiration for the dedicated therapists who work with 30-35 patients a day, ten or eleven at a time.

By the time he returned to his home east of Palestine, he had had many hours of therapy, but leather was still his favorite and he knew he wanted to continue working with it.

One room of the Meredith home is now filled with heavy-duty sewing machines and other tools of his trade. Although he usually wears a prosthetic arm with a hook, he considers his real second hand an old-fashioned stitching horse that firmly holds his projects while he works on them, allowing him to tighten the grip with foot pedals.

His determination to master his craft has made him very creative. For instance, his wife, Lillian, admired a snakeskin he found; he made it into an attractive belt. He made a boy a wallet with a copy of his favorite John Deere equipment etched in green. One of the most detailed projects was an attache case for a woman in Chicago whose son was going to the consulate in Australia. It bore a full-color eagle on a blue ground and represented many hours of attention to detail.

Natural tan leather takes to coloring and tooling better than others. He can vary the color by using dyes and finishes and can add colored vinyl for special effects. Rolls of

leather and vinyl fill a section of his work room along with dyes, gold letters and designs for future projects.

In spite of his strong determination, he admits there have been times he has been discouraged but by keeping busy he is able to make those times less frequent. Still curious to know where he is going and still feeling the presence of the hand of God, he continues to broaden his interests. Among other things, he is now a volunteer supervisor at the Cardinal woodshop where he encourages, discourages and keeps law and order as the boys work on saws and wood working tools. This has proven challenging, but he likes challenge. In fact, he still likes to drive tractors and does whenever he can. As long as a car or tractor has power steering he is able to handle it and it gives him a sense of satisfaction to do some of his own work although most of it is now done by his sons.

And there is the pleasure of daily gaining new skills as he converts plain leather into practical, useful and highly individualized bags and belts.

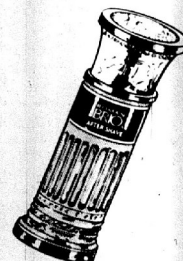

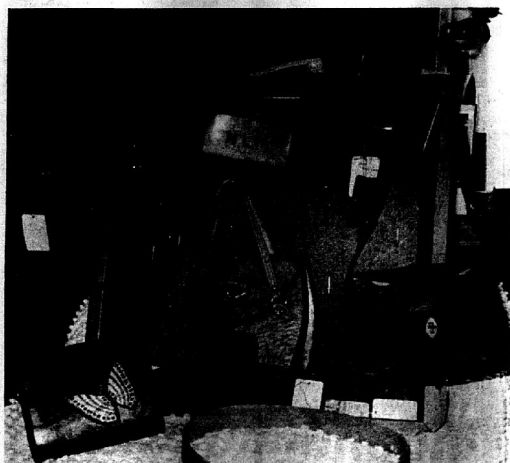

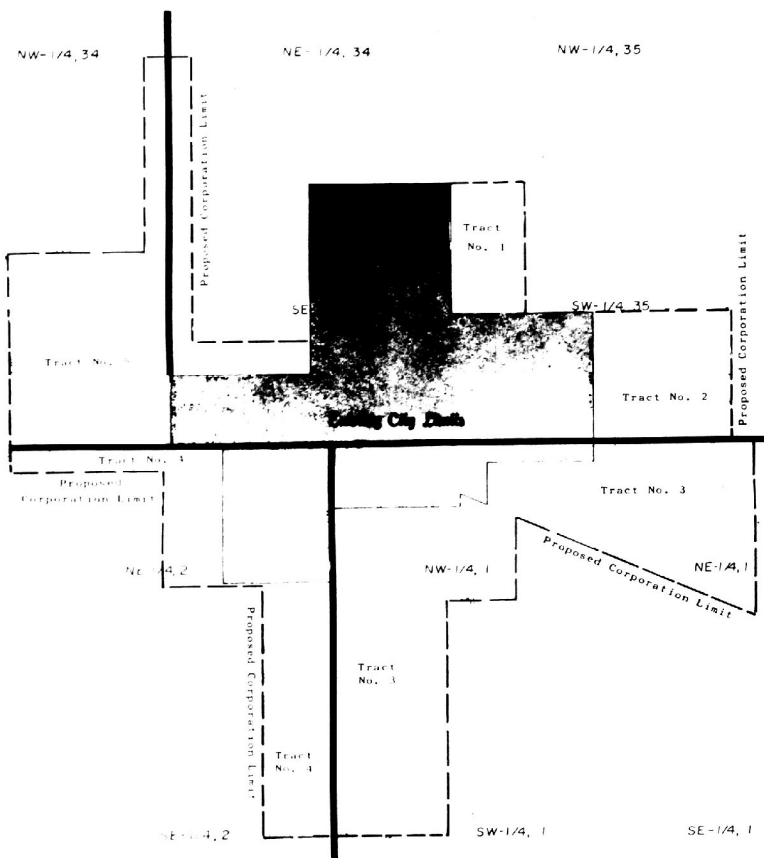

Proposed Mentone annexation plan



NEW BOUNDARIES: Persons living near the town of Mentone may soon discover they are residents of the town if annexation of five territories encircling the town is approved. The Mentone Town Board adopted the proposal to annex the land shown in the above map at its May 6 meeting. A legal advertisement describing the proposed annexation was published in the May 9th and 16th issues of the NEWS. Property owners have 60 days from the first of May to remonstrate against the annexation. Reasons given for the annexation included increased construction near but not within corporation limits and persons residing close to Mentone who are receiving benefits of town utilities without paying town taxes. The tax rates of Franklin and Harrison townships are \$8.83 and \$4.88 respectively while residents of Mentone-Franklin pay \$6.54 per \$100 of assessed valuation and Mentone-Harrison property owners have a current tax rate of \$6.53. Members of the town board are Kenneth Bush, James Whetstone and Bill Boardman. Marie Coleman is clerk-treasurer.

Good Citizen winners

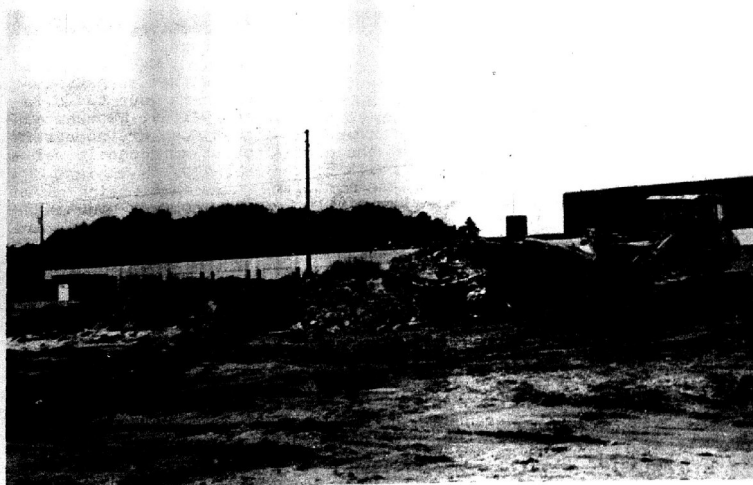
Four Tippecanoe Valley eighth graders were recently honored by the Anthony Nigo chapter, DAR, as good citizenship medal winners.

"We are not going to improve and change our lot either today or tomorrow unless we have the will to do so--unless we demonstrate the moral fiber and courage which looks outward rather than inward or downward."

Power mower safety

Could you pass a safety test on power mower operation and maintenance?

Every year safe and sane operation of power mowers is urged. Still, accidents occur, mostly from carelessness or the "it can't happen to me" attitude.

Safety in the operation of power mowers cannot be overemphasized. Before you begin your summer yard chores, brush up on power mower safety. Take the pledge to make this a safe summer. Post these rules in your mind:

--I will reread my manual on the operation and maintenance of my mower before the season begins.

--I will never refuel the mower while the engine is hot or running.

--I will never gas up or start the engine in a garage or shed.

--I will clear the lawn of foreign

objects before starting to mow.

--I will wear proper clothing--no shorts, sandals, or bare feet.

--I will be sure that no children or pets are in the area.

--I will remain clear of the discharge chute whenever the mower is operating.

--I will never leave the mower running unattended.

--I will never allow children to operate the mower.

--I will push, not pull my walk-behind mower.

--Before making any mechanical checkups or repairs, I will be sure the engine is stopped and the sparkplug disconnected.

If you live by these rules for safety, you will do much to escape many of the causes of power mower accidents.

Your share of a family farm

AgriVues

"If all the farmland in the United States were divided equally among U. S. families, what would be your family's share?"

That question was asked in an article appearing in the Farm Index, a publication of the United States Agriculture. Since nowadays, it seems that everyone wants some land to call his own, where he can perhaps raise some of his own food, the answers to this question were interesting.

The size of your farm would be slightly less than 24 acres, of which 20 acres would actually be your farm. You would run livestock on about four acres of land rented or leased from the Government. A 24-acre plot would seem like a lot of room to a suburbanite, accustomed to a tiny lot, but the average farmer who's used to 385 acres would feel pretty closed in.

Of your parcel of farmland, 7½ acres would be cropland; 9½ would be grassland or range; 3 acres would be woodland and less than an acre would be used for buildings, roads, and nonfarm uses.

Last year, the one-fifth of a dairy cow that you own managed to produce 250 gallons of milk. Your two head of beef cattle had nine-tenths of a calf, while your only hog had a litter of 1.6 pigs. You also own one-third of a sheep—not ba-a-a-d. The 5.6 hens you own laid 103 dozen eggs. You also produced 36 broilers, but only 2½ turkeys (just enough for Thanksgiving and Christmas, with a little left over for New Years).

The 20 acres that you own are valued at \$4,814 on the 1973 real estate market. Your livestock is valued at \$638 and your crops at \$262. You have \$726 invested in machinery and motor vehicles. Your gross income for 1973 was \$1,684, but production expenses were \$1,198, so you had a net income of only \$486, if you didn't have to buy a set of tractor tires or if your crops weren't ruined by bad weather.

If each U.S. family was given their own 24-acre farm, wonder if each of us could produce enough food on this farm to feed his family and do it as efficiently as the farmer does today. I don't think anyone is in a hurry to find out. Most people are pretty content to let the farmer raise the food and fiber for 51 of the rest of us.

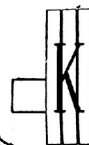

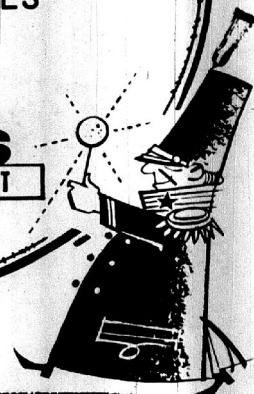

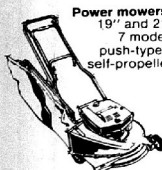

Fulton County Group Forms Right To Life Committee

A group of interested Fulton Co. residents has formed a Right To Life Committee.

They state their beliefs as:

1. Human life must be respected by all people and protected against unjust attack from conception until death.

2. The right to life of an individual is not determined by age, health, intelligence, productivity, sex, color or creed.

3. Scientific and medical evidence indicates that human life begins at conception. Thus, abortion is the destruction of human life.

4. The right to life of the unborn is in accordance with sound moral, legal and medical traditions. The Supreme Court decision of Jan. 22, 1973 is diametrically opposed to these traditions.

5. The U.S. Constitution must be amended to guarantee legal protection for all human life.

Their stated aims are: Public education regarding: 1. Prenatal life and development. 2. The need for social change. 3. The need for a constitutional amendment to protect all human life.

Stating that abortion is legal up to nine months, the committee charges this is destroying a human life.

In order to accomplish the goals they have set, a large membership will be important. Members don't have to be active or even attend meetings but are urged to join.

A large membership will, committee members say, prove to legislators there are more pro-life people than anti-life people.

School Board honors outgoing members, hires football head coach

Members of the Tippencanoe Valley school board paused during their Monday evening session to pay tribute to two fellow board members whose term of office expires this month.

Presenting plaques to Philip Lash and Maurice Coplen was Richard Goshert, who, with Dr. Wyndom Wilson and Dr. John McKee, will welcome new board members Don Snipes and Fred Kindig at a July 1 re-organizational meeting. McKee, whose term of office expires next year, will be replaced next July by Con Shewman who was elected in May.

In a short session attended by all members except Dr. McKee, the board voted to offer contracts to Wanda Fox for vocational home economics, Michael Hoyt for industrial arts with a supplemental recreation contract, George Unger for physics and mathematics and Marlene Ann Nellans for general elementary. Charles Devon Smith, presently at Triton, was offered a three-year contract to head the football department and given a supplemental contract to coach track. Superintendent Robert Forbes noted Smith also had experience in swimming, gymnastics and wrestling and said his background

would make him a valuable addition to the coaching staff. Forbes recommended the three year contract on the basis it would take that long to develop a football program. Smith is to begin his duties at once and will co-ordinate the efforts of other football coaches now in the school district. Also approved was a contract to be offered Forrest Kantner to teach vocational agriculture. Although approved by the board, the contracts are still subject to acceptance or rejection

by the teachers to whom they are offered. All salary scales were set according to last year's since a new one has not yet been adopted.

A request by Bill Balmer for transfer for his daughter Jean to attend North Miami High School so she could participate in the Upper Wabash Vocational School was denied, and boiler work at Akron and Mentone high schools was approved, the work to be done by Bock Products, Inc., Elkhart.

As was stated in the paragraph, the trip was made in a Ford touring car with buttoned on side curtains. My brother John insisted on sitting with Dad in the front seat so my parents put a strap around John and fastened a second strap to the first strap then secured the second strap around the lap robe rod.

Our road map was a "Blue Book." The directions might state, turn right when you see a store on the corner and a church and cemetery nearby.

When we arrived a few miles from Forestville, New York, there was and still is a hill two miles long with a bridge at the foot. My mother wanted to walk down the long hill.

The brake linings burned out a number of times and we had several flat tires.

On our return to Akron, we had a new brick pavement in front of our home. What a great improvement for Akron, the biggest little town in the midwest.

Our family made this same trip many times after 1914. I took my mother on this same route about twenty years ago. My husband and I drove to Forestville about five or six years

ago. That time we left Mentone about 4 a.m. and were in Forestville at 2 p.m. sitting on our relatives' front porch. Sincerely, Marjory Frederick (Mrs. John Frederick)

Coplen read a letter from Daniel G. Caraway, husband of Lynn Caraway, a teacher whose contract was not renewed, in which he asked that a previous letter he had sent Coplen, one that was published in an area paper, have the name of Cathy Lakes withdrawn as a teacher who left school prior to the 4 p.m. deadline established for teachers. Caraway had previously said Mrs. Lakes, who is Mr. Forbes' daughter, had violated the deadline and questioned why she was not dismissed. In amending his letter, he said he had no proof she had done this. Coplen asked that the second letter also be published.

Next meeting is the July 1 reorganizational session at which new board members will be sworn in and officers will be elected.

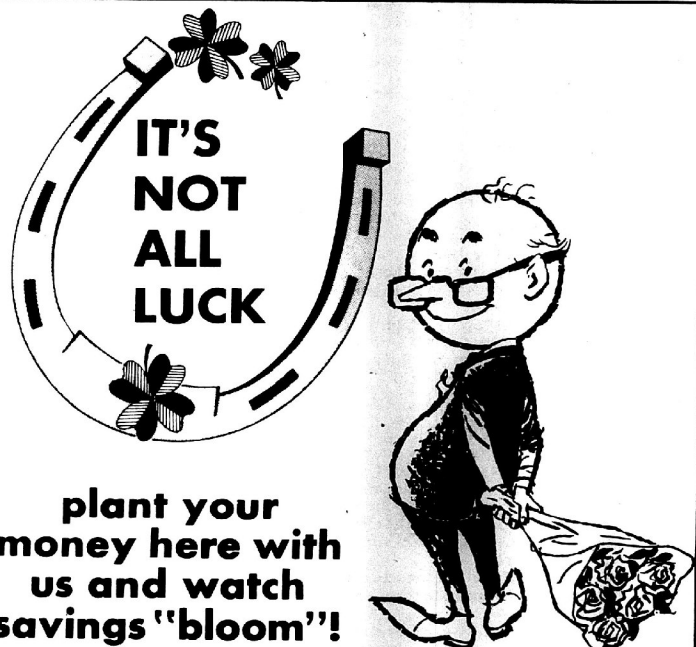

Mrs. Atkinson Named CF Chairman

Mrs. David Atkinson, Akron, has been named chairman of the 1974 Community March for the Breath of Life in Akron, according to Robert Sell, president of the Indiana State Chapter of the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation. "Mrs. Atkinson has a personal interest

in C/F since her daughter was once suspected of having the disease," he added.

Mrs. Atkinson will organize volunteers for a March that will last from September 8-15 with the funds going to the public education programs of the state chapter and to the patient care programs of the National Foundation.

Approximately 100,000 children in Indiana suffer from lung diseases, and any of them may receive treatment at any of the four Foundation sponsored clinics in the state. The clinics are located at Riley Children's Hospital and Methodist Children's Hospital in Indianapolis, Elkhart General Hospital in Elkhart and Deaconess Hospital in Evansville.

Through research and care programs sponsored by the foundation since 1955, the life expectancy of a child with cystic fibrosis has

been raised from five to eighteen years.

"The symptoms of the disease are easily overlooked," Mrs. Atkinson says, "but I would recommend that a parent who notices a persistent cough lasting more than two months, enlargement of the ends of the fingers, big appetite but poor weight gain, or a salty taste to the child's skin see her family doctor immediately. The test for cystic fibrosis is easy and painless, and if there is any doubt, the parent should insist the sweat chloride test be run."

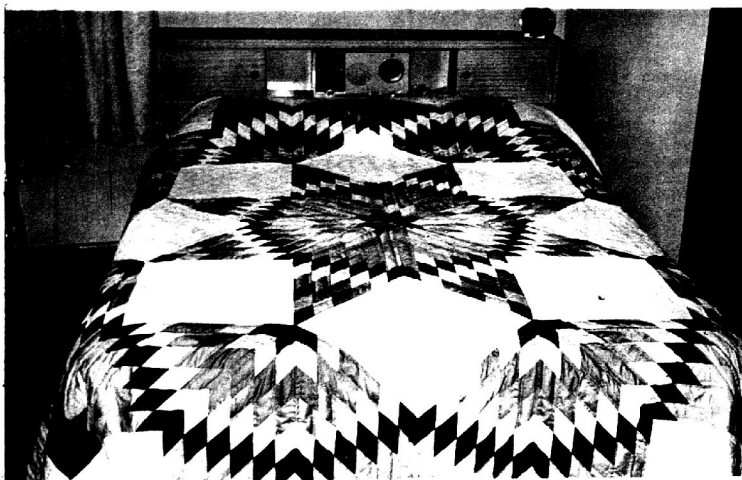

Marie Nestleroad keeps quilting

Quilting, now being revived by artists and craftsmen as a lost art, is nothing new to Marie Nestleroad. Her mother taught her to quilt when she was very young, and by the time she and her husband Lester (Bus) were married, she had a hope chest full of sturdy, handmade quilts. In fact, she has made so many quilts over the years, she says she has completely lost track of the number.

A seamstress who also makes afghans and enjoys needlepoint, the Miami county homemaker likes the challenge quilts offer and likes the finished products because they are attractive, useful and warm--and a good way to use up scraps of material left from sewing projects.

All her quilts are made on a frame that is itself a result of using materials at hand. It was built by her husband 36 or 37 years ago from a bedstead he purchased at an auction for ten cents. Its size--96 x 104--permits her to convert scraps into useful quilts that are large and attractive enough to double as bedspreads.

Although quilting is an old craft, Mrs. Nestleroad favors using modern fabrics and likes best of all to work with polyester-cotton mixes and dacron bats. She notes dacron is more expensive than cotton but feels the increased expense is well worth it to get finished quilts that are easy to care for and light in weight.

Using many patterns, she makes the quilts mostly by hand, allowing only the blocks to be pieced together on the sewing machine but doing all the quilting itself by hand, working with her fingers taped to prevent accidental jabblings with the needle as she works it across the design she has pre-sketches on the fabric.

She is pictured working on a quilt that was to be a gift for her only grandson. It had taken more than a month and a half to complete and it still had to be bound, another hand job that would fill many spare hours. This quilt and the one pictured on the bed were made in similar designs, a sunburst that radiates bold eye-appealing colors from one shaft to another.

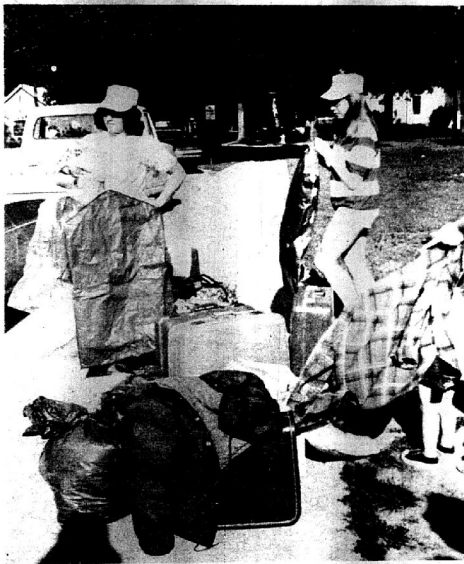

Local girls make move to city by being mothers' helpers

What can a mother's helper hope for? That was the question posed by Leigh Infield and Annie Needham, writers for the New York Daily News.

By their definition, a mother's helper is employed to care for the children in the family--and do little else. She is a surrogate mother--a nanny--not a maid or housekeeper. According to her title, the mother's helper would be required to pick up the toys on the living room floor but not to dust the piano. However, most dust the piano and do laundry, dishes, vacuuming and general cleaning in addition to caring for their charges. Their days are long; often they are not free until the children finish their homework, are bathed and tucked into bed. They are expected to be available for babysitting at no extra pay except on their days off. Their plus benefits are occasional trips with the family and the proximity of theaters and museums--if they ever have any time free. It's a strange, solitary life and the pay is poor--often less than \$30 per week.

Why, then, do girls seek this type of employment?

Two of the girls interviewed are from Akron--Marjorie and Marion Kendall, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Merrill Kendall. For them, it was a good jumping off place between their lives in a small town and the city. Marion, a 20-year old graphic artist who spent last summer in Nantucket as a mother's helper said, "Most of the mother's helpers I knew were girls who were between college and finding their first job or between finding themselves."

Most of the girls had found their jobs by placing ads in New York newspapers or by answering ads placed in their

home town newspapers by New York families. In Marjorie's case, a family paid her round trip air fare to New York for the interview.

There is a high turnover in mother's helpers positions because of working conditions and low pay--and a complete lack of privacy. Even on Marjorie's day off, her young charges pounded on her door for attention--to show her a picture or tell her something.

Marjorie was the first of the Kendall girls to work as a mother's helper, working at Hastings-on-Hudson, New York, for a year. She was responsible for Marion receiving a similar position in Bronxville, N. Y. Both girls feel that being a mother's helper was education and rewarding--although sometimes frustrating.

Marjorie is now working as an assistant underwriter for the American Mutual Insurance Co. in White Plains, New York, and is planning a trip to Europe in the fall. On her return, she plans to go back to college for a degree in nursing.

Marion is a graphic artist for International Nickel Co., Inc., in

New York City. She hopes to start working for her master of fine arts degree this fall.

Their careers are taking them far from their jobs as mothers' helpers, but the time they

spent in those roles has proven an adequate passport to New York and a safe journey from the quiet of their hometown to the bustle of the city.

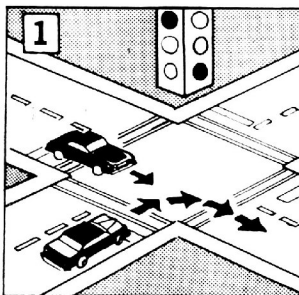

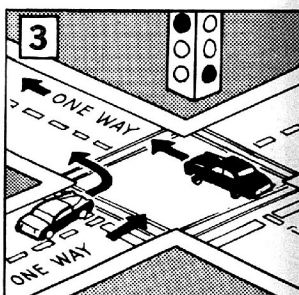

The Chicago Motor Club-AAA reminds motorists that the new turn on red law in Indiana becomes effective July 1, 1974. The Motor Club offers the following traffic safety tips in connection with the new law:

1 When making a right turn on a red traffic signal you must YIELD to all cross traffic. Don't dart into oncoming traffic. Be sure visibility is clear before turning.

2 When making a right turn on a red traffic signal you must watch out for pedestrians in the crosswalk. The pedestrian has the right-of-way particularly on the green or "walk" indicator. Be especially careful at school crossings.



3 A left turn on a red traffic signal is permitted ONLY from a one way street onto another one way street. Left turns on red are NOT permitted when going from a one way into a two way street.

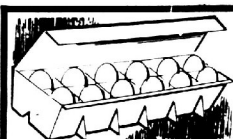

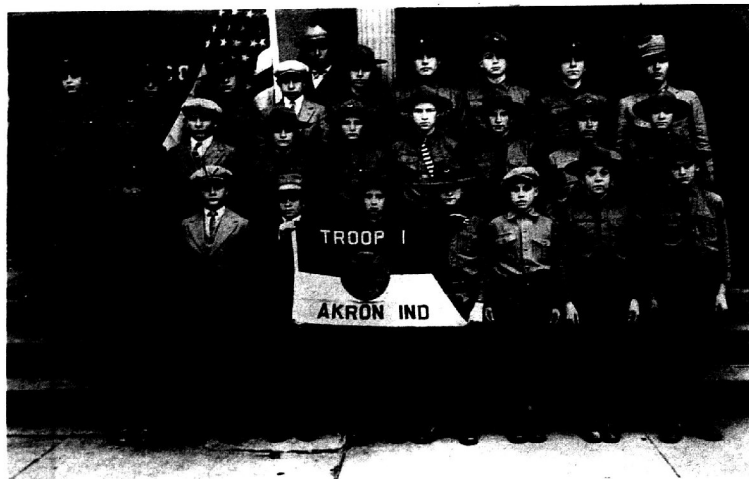

1883 Akron letters given

A collection of about 50 letters and postcards written by Akron residents to John Gast in Texas from 1883 to 1885 has been given to the Fulton County Historical Society by Marie Gast Talbot.

John Gast, eighth of nine children of Andrew and Marie Halbeisen Gast was born about 1863 in Akron. Siblings were Wilhelmina (Mrs. Jacob) Sayger, Frederica (Mrs. David Bright), William, Almondo and Helen (Smith) twins, Rudolph and Odella (Bell), all older, and one younger brother, Alfred Augustus. Many of their descendants are living in Akron today.

Both parents died in 1876 and John lived with his married sister, Rickie, where he worked for his board and room. Tiring of this and dis-

satisfied that his brother-in-law, Dave, did not pay the wages he felt he had coming and unhappy about the slowness in getting his father's estate settled, he left Akron to go west in 1883, drifting eventually to Texas

where he cooked for cowboys, bought a few cattle and tried to make a living. He died of pneumonia in late 1885 and his brother, Mondo, put a marker on his grave, sold his few cattle, and returned with a packet of letters written to John by relatives and friends in and around Akron. Etta Gast, wife of Mondo, who had gone to school with John, saved these and their daughter, Marie Gast Talbot, mounted them as a gift to the Historical Society, of which she is a long-time member.

The letters contain familiar family names

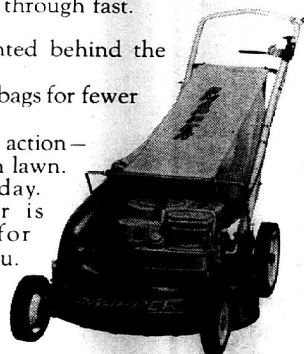

and reflect customs, events, working and economic conditions and general concerns of that period in the history of Fulton and part of Kosciusko counties. A resume of the letters can be found in "Fulton County Folks, Volume One" published in 1974 by the Fulton County Historical Society. (This book may be ordered by sending a check for \$8.50 to treasurer Ruth Richardson, R. 2, Rochester).

The letters are interesting and may be read at the museum, as the book is not to be loaned. The tone of the letters ranges from religious advice (from sisters) to childish whimsy (from nieces and nephews) to business (from brothers) to new- sy and vulgar (from friends). Here is an example, dated Dec. 2, 1883, from Will Judd:

"Dear friend, it is with pleasure that I received and read your welcome letter although I have been a little slow about answering, but you must excuse me this time and I will try to do better in the future.

Well, John, things are terrible dull around here just now although there is the most marrying you ever heard of around here. Lieu Bradley and Brett are married they were married Saturday night week ago.

Sarah Mickey and a fellow by the name of Garrit were married last night. Dave Secor and Alice Moore were married a week ago yesterday. Also Melven Bosumburg and Minnie Fish. I don't know whether you was acquainted with all of them or not.

Well, John, there was a terrible accident occurred two weeks ago last Friday Harley Secore was coming home from Rochester and his team ran away and threw him off of his wagon and killed him it broke his neck and arm and mashed the side of his head. He was killed just at the foot of that hill there at Jake Sagers house.

Well, we are getting the new school house along in fine shape. (A previous letter had stated that Black school had burned.)

The Hiatts have gone to Dakota to live so if you want to see Rett you will have to go out there to see her.

Oh yes I all most forgot to tell you that Joe Warren and Minnie McIntire are married and Jake Utter and Reda Shobe and others to numerous to mention.

Well John I will close for this time hoping to hear from you soon I

remain as ever your friend.

Wm. A. Judd
P.S. tell Mort the next time you see him that I would like to have an answer to my last letter pretty soon.

Anyone wanting to read the rest of this letter (parts were censored) or any of the other letters may do so at the museum, located at East Ninth and Race streets in Rochester. Admission is free. The museum is open from 2 to 5 p.m. on Sundays.

Historical Society Receives Variety In Donations From Residents

Over 130 items have been donated or loaned to the Fulton Co. Historical Society since the first of the year, including a 1917 Erie handbill, Railway Express notice and toy soldier on cardboard from Red O'Dell and a 150-year old spokeshave used by Paul Burns from Florence Burns.

Also, Mrs. Dow Haimbaugh gave a news clipping and transcript of a history of the Fulton Co. library as given by her in 1931 on WLS radio; Claude Irwin gave the broken tombstone of Elizabeth Lindsey, first white woman to die in the county. It is being repaired so it can be installed by the marker in front of the museum.

Edith Moon gave four pictures of Monger and Leiters Ford schools and the Beyer Bros. Creamery on Madison street.

Donald Ross gave a land grant for services in the War of 1812 and a bicycle plate from Ross Machine Works.

Other donations include a collection of Fulton school and church pictures; a 1914 test taken by Fulton Co. 8th graders in order to enter high school; Shirley Willard gave a four-cent airmail card, picture of Green Oak IOOF lodge in 1917, doll, coin bank and old iron toys of the 1920s; Frances Adamson and Georgia Nyland gave a Rochester College pin worn by Eula Berrier.

Mrs. Scott Stinson gave 13 copies of Akron News printed by her father, S.N. Shesler, and three pictures of the 1913 laying of the cornerstone for the Akron library. From the Harry Bitters estate came pictures of Albert Bitters, editor of the Rochester Republican, and family, walking canes, Spanish American War sword, wood box made for wife Dolly. Jack Marsh gave a history of the Mattice family

that dates back to Roman times by his grandfather Jack Mattice. Mervine Rentschler gave a 1949 Seehos, the first yearbook for Fulton High School. Her son was editor.

Also, Omar Reichard, photos of Aubbee schools and several McGuffy and other readers; Mary Terry, Rochester College souvenir spoon, Vera VanDien birthday spoon 1894, candy dish with picture of Rochester's Presbyterian church, Army discharge of Richard VanDien 1866, 1869 wedding license, picture of VanDien family in Rochester; Dr. C. E. Gilger gave a dentist chair over 100 years old that probably cost \$300 in 1874 and was owned by dentist Perry Heath. The Farmers and Merchants Bank found Heath's framed dentist license while tearing down the building at the corner of Main and East 8th St., Rochester.

Mildred Pownall Diveley gave a picture of Mt. Hope school. Other school pictures donated included Union and School 16 one-room schools by Phelisha Rogers; Orr school by Florence Leister, Mt. Zion school and county fair by Nellie King.

A history of Aubbee township and the Culver school by Joe Guise and others was given by the Culver school superintendent; Margaret Sadowsky gave Manitou Ripples from 1925, 27, 28, 29 and 30.

Jane Smith Foelinger Miller gave a history of the Copeland family, pictures and memorabilia of her grandfather, Omer B. Smith, 1910 mayor of Rochester, and scrapbooks kept by Genevieve Smith in 1917-18. Mrs. Tom Wilson gave a bit of lace made by Helen Disher that won first prize in 1921 at the county fair; Grace Barrett Martin gave an 1891 atlas and several books of war and navy history.

Cecil McCroskey gave a glass bottle from an early drugstore and an artist's palette.

Virginia Dittmore gave a 1932 Fulton Leader, edited by Everett and Thelma Koontz.

Also, Willis Bowen, a copy of "Lengthening Shadows," a genealogy of the Bowen family; So. Bend library, "Searching For Your Ancestors" book and from Guy and Mary Shadel, a history of Leiters Ford.

Richard Bair gave reproductions of several old photos, including one of the jail about 1905 showing the barn and horses back of it; Ruth Richardson gave 125 postcards of Lake Manitou, Akron, etc. and early pictures of Columbia and Lincoln schools.

Ted Lewis gave an advertising postcard from the Racket in 1912 and one of the Colonial Hotel bandstand; Wilbur Doud, 15 birds, six animals, oriole's nest and wildcat's head preserved by Dr. Chester Doud about 1910. He was a Fulton veterinarian.

Robert Walters gave two news articles about Elma Lincoln, a former Rochester resident who became Tarzan, and Phyllis Felder Meyer gave a Fulton Review from 1957.

Clarence Hill gave a 1937 directory of Rochester and Lake Manitou, and Mary Bowell gave oil paintings of Millark.

Mrs. Roy Fultz gave campaign postcard of 1908 used by Wm. J. Bryan for president, and Maude Buckmaster gave 1903 and 1905 Sentinels.

Tilman Wilson gave an iron padlock shaped like a heart that was found by the site of the Joe Cripe and Gilly Burns murder in 1904.

Mary Beaudoin gave 18 tinctures; Elsie Blackburn, a 1912 Easter card, an 1890 Temperance Union card.

American Party Adopts 4 Major Resolutions

Eight officials of the American Party of Indiana, including Mrs. Dennis Troutman, Kewanee, recently attended the semi-annual meeting of the national central committee in Chicago and participated in a three-day session dealing with party organization and plans.

Four resolutions passed by the controlling organization of the National Party included:

- Commendation of 35 members of the U.S. Senate who have openly declared their opposition of Secretary Kissinger's giveaway of American sovereignty over the Panama Canal Zone.

- Commendation of those members of the U.S. House of Representatives whose votes were responsible for the defeat of the Udall Land-Use Bill.

- Called for an immediate end of further deficit spending by the Federal Government, a return to honest and realistic metallic reserves for the U.S. currency, and the unqualified right of American citizens to own and trade gold as a commodity.

- Urges that the U.S. Congress should immediately investigate the grave charge against Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger that he is or has been a member of the Soviet Intelligence Service, the KGB, to establish his innocence or impeach him on charges of treason.

The National American Party was established in 1969 and has affiliated state party organizations in most of the 50 states. More than a score of announced candidates on the state level were included in those present and were presented to the committee at its political action session. They included candidates for

governor, senator and members of Congress.

The National Central Committee is the controlling body of the National American Party and Don L. Lee, Indianapolis, is the chairman of the affiliated party in Indiana and is also a candidate for U. S. senator for the American party of Indiana.
