

Back in 1911, Art Man-waring established Manwaring Leghorn Farms, Inc. with 4,000 breeding hens, and ever since chickens have outnumber-

ed people in Mentone.

Known for years as the
Egg Basket of the Mid-Egg Basket of the Middlewest, Mentone and surrounding Kosciusko Co. once boasted 20 hatcheries. Now, only Man-warings and Creighton Brothers remain. And the story at each is expansion.

Manwarings, for instance, once hatched 600,000 baby chicks a year. Now more than four million chicks a year are hatched, sometimes at the rate of 100,000 a week.

At one time, nearly every farm boasted a laying house and a few hundred chickens. Every spring farmers went to a hatchery and purchased baby chicks, the cockrels for summer eating and the pullets to ing and the pullets to be saved for laying pro-duction. Manwaring s supplied many of these, also shipping chicks as far away as South Amer-ica and Cuba, as well as all over the United States and Canada.

It's still possible for a farmer to purchase small lots of chicks at Manwarings, but most of the chicks now go to surrounding states or are kept for the firm's own production flocks.

with a sister firm, Midwest Poultry Services, Inc., oversees two complexes of 300,000 layers each in addition to its own large poultry houses. Each complex is fully automated. Fourteen miles of conveyor chain moves the feed for each of the complexes. (Each complex requires 3,000 acres of corn per year.) Another 28 miles

of plastic egg gathering belts take much of the back-breaking labor out of gathering eggs, moving them from the cages through orientation where they are counted, washed, dried, oiled, graded, candled, cartoned, dated and sealed without being touched. And a day's production from either complex would be great enough to feed every


resident of Kosciusko, Fulton and Marshall counties an egg a day. With some left over.

The family operation is now headed by Richard Manwaring, a grandson of founder Art Manwaring. Also active in management are Frank and Jim Manwaring, sons of the late Charles Manwaring and great-grandsons of Art Manwaring. One hundred and twenty em-

ployees oversee the layer complexes, hatchery, farming operation and all the other work involved in keeping those hens producing eggs that number in the millions of dozens per year and hatching the chicks that will in turn help boost that production and do even more to keep Mentone's chicken population far above its people count.





y the time a hen is months old, she's dy for soup. Or, as producers say, "She By the 18 18 months old, she's ready for soup. Or, as egg producers say, "She is-spent." Still in the cage in which she spent the last 13 months of her life, she is shipped to Kralis Brothers Foods for processing. for processing.

There, at the rate of 85 chickens per minute, hens are advanced from the loading dock through three continuous moving lines. Under constant inspection every minute of the trip, the hen of the trip, the hen moves through the killing, picking, eviscerating and packing areas. Fifty-one minutes later, the thoroughly inspected and chilled dressed hens are packed in carbons ranging to 1,000 pounds in size for shipment to soup and frozen food companies. Some of Kralis' largest cusor Krails largest cus-tomers are Campbell's Soup, Swanson, Banquet and Morton, the latter processors of frozen TV dinners.

Established in Gary 53 years ago by Joe Kra-lis, father of present president Jerry Kralis, the company opened a the company opened a pick-up station in Men-tone in 1946. In 1951, the dressing plant opened at its present loca-tion northeast of Men-tone. Offices in Men-tone became the corpor-ate headquarters in 1969 ate headquarters in 1969 when the Gary office closed. A second plant is operated in Olney, Ill. The firm merged with Flowers Industries in 1973 and is now listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

Automation has lightand the work at each of the plants, but it still takes a lot of people to keep up with the demands of the convenience food industryapproximately 180 at Mentone, 150-160 at Ol-

ney. Each of these workers is trained to handle a variety of jobs necess-ary to move 40,000 chic-kens a day through the Mentone plant and another 35;000 at Olney.

Breaking eggs

At M & R Egg Co. in Mentone, eggs are brok-en on an assembly line basis on specially de-signed machines that can each handle 1,000 cases a week. (That's 30,000 dozen eggs.) Established in 1959 by

Millard and Retha Laugh-lin, the firm supplies canned liquid or frozen eggs to noodle makers, bakeries, candy and pie companies.

In spanking clean work rooms and under constant USDA inspection, ten workers bring in edgs from area farmers, copl, wash and candle them as wash and candle them as they are fed into the egg breaking machines. These gems of mechanical wizardy break the eggs, carrying them in stain-less steel cups as they less steel cups as they move to the next step-and each is capable of keeping the egg whole or separating the yolk from the white. The eggs are held in storage tanks until they are pasteurized and canned. The canned eggs-each can weighs 30 pounds-are frozen, ready for use by the customer.

All of which sounds imple, but that's a bit deceptive. Temperatures

simple, but that's a bit deceptive. Temperatures and conditioning play big roles in the production. For instance, egg whites are pasteurized at 137 degrees and yolks and whole eggs are pasteurized at 142 degrees, because the whites will set if pasteurized at higher temperatures. at higher temperatures. The temperature is held for three and steady for three and one-half minutes and is

Each customer has different specifications erent specifications erent specifications for the type of eggs he wants, and he receives what he orders, whether it be eggs with light or dark yolks, thin for cookies or thicker for noodles. Since the eggs retain their shape after they are thought they er they are thawed they must be conditioned before they are frozen. Or as owner Millard Laughlin says, "We don't just take an egg and freeze it. It has to be conditioned according to the use it will lat-



TVSC non-instructional personnel get 11% increases

An 11 percent across-the-board salary inthe-board salary in-crease was granted all Tippecanoe Valley noninstructional personnel at Monday night's school board meeting. The mo-tion was made by presi-dent Dr. John McKee with the stipulation that replacement personnel be hired in at a lower fi-gure unless their prev-ious experience dictates otherwise. McKee has long contended it is unfair to hire new people at the salary earned by those who have worked those who have worked in the same job for sev-

eral years. Passed o on a 4-1 vote (Fred Kindig voted no), the motion was the last in a series that began last month when superintendent Robert Forbes intendent Robert Forbes suggested what amounted to a 15 percent increase. This was voted down and a motion by Fred Kindig to grant ten percent in-creases to those people with from five to ten vears of experience and percent to those with more than ten years, keeping the people who had worked less than five years at the pre-sent rate, was tabled. After discussion Monday night, it was defeated as was a motion by Don Snipes that all non-instructional personnel except bus drivers be given a ten percent across-the-board increase with an additional five percent to those with more than five years in TVSC. His motion would TVSC. TVSC. His motion would grant bus drivers a ten percent increase, \$2 per hour and ten cents per mile for field trips. Most of the other members felt ten cents per mile was too high since the drivers had no investment in the trips other than their time.

While janitors, bus drivers and secretaries have been given wage increases, still unsettled is the teacher negotiation situation. Duane Smith, speaking for Tippecanoe Valley Class-room Teachers Association, urged school board members to remove post-ings of the Profession-Teachers Association as the official bargain-ing agent. He said TV-

He said TVCTA is legally certified by the Indiana Education Employment Re-lations Board and asked all further nego-

tiations with PTO cease.

Speaking for PTO were
Jean Smith and Lewis



In 1899, a fire destroyed the corner of Akron now occupied by Akron Insurance Agency, Arter's Drug Store and Swygart's Furniture. The buildings were then frame and housed a millinery shop, the Hall and Kline Drug Store, a one-story barber shop and a hardware. The building shown in the picture is now Hill's grocery and an annex for Doering Radio and TV. It was then Strong's grocery and a bank. A windmill and the town pump can be seen on the site now occupied by the Akron Exchange State Bank. Not shown in the background is the Methodist Church, which was severely threatened by the fire.

Akron has shared

The United States will be 199 years old on the 4th of July. For 139 of those years, Akron has noted the anniversary of its founding on the same day. Often obscured by the nation's anniversary, the settling of Akron was in reality a continuation of the spirit that fostered the Revolution. The town's founder. Dr. Joseph Sippy of Medina Co., Ohio, was the son of a Frenchman who came to America with Gen. DeLa-Fayette's fleet and assisted in establishing American independence.

On June 1, 1836, a group of people led by Dr. Sippy left Ohio with wagons loaded with their household possessions, headed for a section of northern Indiana Dr. Sippy had prospected the previous year, the first white man to visit the area. Each family took with them pigs, sheep and cows. Travel by ox team was slow. Detouring through White Pigeon, Mich., because the road through Fort Wayne





Poles were cut and tents pitched for temporary homes on the east side of the trail from the present site of the Akron Exchange State Bank north to the church. Homesteading began at once, and with it came progress and involvement, involvement not only in the affairs of the community but in state, national and world activities. Men from Akron would participate in every war. They would be elected to office, build buildings, educate other men and travel the globe.

It has been 139 years

It has been 139 years since Dr. Sippy led his group of settlers to Akron. There have been good times and bad times, people have come and gone, but the spirit that is Akron has remained.


