Outstanding students in a number of areas were honored at Tippecanoe Valley High School's recent awards day program.



Police harassment

Dear Editor:

I hope everyone takes the time to fill out fill out your questionaire, es-pecially the question on what changes need to be made by the town

boards.
When I drive through other towns in the eve-ning hours of summer, I see kids loafing around their cars-leaning against them, talking, sit-ting on fenders or hoods etc. I see some riding around in cars---just cruising the town, you might say. I see them walking down the streets --not going anywhere in particular, just walk-

ing.
Akron is a different story. Have you ever driven through the uptown area around 9 or town area around 9 or 10 p.m. Hardly a teen-ager in sight, and if one happens to be there, watch out!

Our two boys and their friends have been being harassed and I don't harassed and I don't think this is the normal way to enforce the law. My husband has told the marshal if our boys are doing something illegal, arrest them. If not, leave them alone. He was told, "You're always crying to me."

On a spring evening our son was parked in front of one of the service "stations. He was yelled at in a vulgar manner by one of the marshals and told

move, which he did. He was told he didn't have any business parking there. When he went a-round the block to come home--guess WHO was par ked there? Last wee the marshal on nigh the marshal on night duty stopped him by turning on the red light on the police car to threaten him for a personal reason. I think personal matters not police business and the police car should not be used for that purpose. All last week the boys were harassed and told not to stand outside the cars talk-ing in a privately owned parking lot uptown. They are warned if their cars are not parked ex-actly right in the park-ing lot to suit whoever is on duty. Our oldest son has been stopped on 3 different occasions for no reason and yell-ed and sworn at. He was stopped by the state police last week (who was in town visiting with the marshal). Two blocks past the intersection, the state police pulled him over. In a few min-utes the town marshal utes the town marshal came. My son was told to rev up his motor, which he did. He was told to rev it up louder. He refused. He was er. He refused ne was then given two warning tickets--one for loud mufflers and one for having his car jacked up. I'm not complaining about the tickets. He really doesn't need loud mufflers or to have it mufflers or to have it jacked up. I will admit though that my son does not rev up his motor while driving in town, and I wonder if he is the only one who has a car jacked up.

We have tried to teach our children right from wrong. We have told them

our children right from wrong. We have told them they have the same rights as other people. Just because they are young adults does not lessen their rights

their rights.
Why isn't the police department trying to find out who is breaking into homes in the north-east side of town in-stead of sitting uptown watching kids lean against their cars talk-ing? What about some of the drunks leaving the taverns on Friday and Saturday night? How about some of the people who double park uptown and it's OK and the othand it's OK and the others who try it and are either screamed at or arrested? How about the people who don't always stop at the intersection? Or the person who backed 3/4 of a block from the intersection because he wanted to park there? How about iay-walkers? I've always park there? How about jay-walkers? I've always felt what is good for the goose is good for the pander the gander.

I have thought a good deal about writing this letter. I may be jeopardizing myself, but I also feel there are times when things must be said. I can always go to other towns to do my shopping as others have done. We've thought of telling our sons to stay out of Akron, but why should we? We live in the country, but we own property in Akron. own property in Akron. We pay taxes the same

We pay taxes the same as everyone else. Consequently, I feel we have some say as to how the town is run.

Citizens, those of you who don't have children the ages of mine right now, think of what I've said. You may have children who will soon be driving or you may have grandchildren who will drive. Do young adults have the same rights as middle age or senior citizens? I wonder what would happen if my huswould happen if my hus-band and I stood uptown leaning against our car talking? Do you suppose the same things would happen to us as has been happening to our chil-dren. I sincerely doubt




