# Local banker attended Washington meeting

Robert Taylor, Vice President and Cashier of the Akron Ex-change State Bank, was in Washington, D.C., last week as a part of a delegation of 25 bankers representing bankers of the State of Indiana.

Mr. Taylor is currently chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the Indiana Bankers Association, and in this capacity serves in the concerns of Indiana Agricultural bankers--as these concerns relate to legislation being enaced on state and national levels-as this legislation affects agri-business organization, agri-financing, and the continued profitability of

While in Washington, Mr. Taylor had an opportunity to review the current House and Senate bills that directly or indirectly influence agri-business. He also sat in on briefings of the Ameri-can Bankers Association; Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation; the Conference of State Bank Supervisors; the Comptroller of the Currency; and the Federal Reserve.

Mr. Taylor observed that one of the most frequently expressed concerns of bankers is the increased amount of government regulation and paperwork involved in processing agricultural loans as well as all types of loans. Re-

cognized, there is no substitute for good sound loan documenta-tion, but some of the legislation enacted in the last decade has brought about banking regulations which has created excessive paperwork - to the extent that processing time is increased dramatically - and to the point that days and days of delay result. As a consequence customer servicing efficiency is hampered materially. Customers become frustrated and sometimes even infuriated. The excessive paper work contributes to higher costs of servicing as well.






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
Scale of a first carried of a place of Incorporate ter year. Out of State Societyer year

Farmers may be wondering if the late spring predicates an early fall frost. They remember 1974 when rains caused late planting and frost arrived early. The summer drought was also a major problem.

Purdue meteorologists checked
on frost dates of 12 years when
corn had to be planted late due
to 6 inches or more of rain in
May. In seven of the 12 years frost occurred before the aver age date. The small sample of years produced an average frost date of October 6 compared to October 11 for the long period average.

In Rochester for the years 1950 to 1974 there was a 50% chance of the fall temperature reaching 32 degrees before October 9.



The sellers of the fifty-five acre tract, the Donald Ross family, arranged the sale tailored to their desires and those of Mr. Ross' late father, Lloyd Ross, in an attempt to bloya Ross, in an attempt perpetuate this outstanding example of Northern Indiana upland forest. David Atkinson, Pike Timberlands' representative, stated, "That Pike was aware of the Ross' extreme interest in conservation and that Pike would manage the forest for the perpetual production of fine hardwoods.

Northern Indiana conservation-ists and foresters recognize the north part of the Ross woods as an outstanding example of ma-ture Beech - Maple forest type and the south half as a 90 year old stand of Tulip Poplar and associated species which is second to none in the Midwest. This magnificent stand of Poplar was the result of a clearcut made about 1890, according to the late Lloyd Ross and his brother, Rudy, also of R. 2, So. Whitley. Although the same techniques of harvest will not be used, Atkinson did state that the over-mature, suppressed and damaged trees will be removed in an orderly fashion and in a manner to regenerate a new crop. Some outstanding in-dividuals will be excluded from any harvest under Pike's "Superior Tree Program". This program

is an effort to select some of the outstanding trees on Pike's thirty-one tree farms in Indiana, Michigan and Ohio as examples to the public of what Central States forestlands are capable of and as a genetic reserve of outstanding trees for future scientific forestry research and tree improvement. Local people will recognize the Ross woods as being a famous Maple sugar camp operated by the Rosses for many, many years. Although the old camp has deteriorated in recent years, the new owners would like to open this camp again each season as a matter of historical interest in that community.

The forest products grown on the Ross Tree Farm and other company and managed private lands are remanufactured on Pike's sawmill and sold through their distributing yard to furni ture manufacturers throughout the United States, Canada, and West Germany. The Pike family started sawmilling on the Wabash River in 1860 and fourth and fifth generation family members still own and operate the mill on its present location in Akron. Pike representatives report that they are anxious to acquire or manage good quality hardwood forests for a continuing source of raw materials for their plant.



Bankers are very concerned about this and are attempting to get some things changed; but supplemental effort is going to have to come from farmers and other customers as well. A letter to your legislators stating the facts is still one best way to get some of these things changed.

An interesting comparison was made by a Washingtonian which Mr. Taylor wishes to pass along: "A Republic type government is like a ship - everything is all right until you strike a reef - then you sink." Whereas, "a Democratic government is like a raft - it never sinks but you've always got your feet wet."

It seems our nation's democracy has its feet wet with inflation. This subject is uppermost in bankers' and other people's minds. We recognize clearly the personal and professional stake we have in finding a national solution to this most difficult problem. If we don't bring inflation under control, all our efforts to secure a level playing field for banking or to plan for our personal futures are about as significant as rearranging deck chairs on the Titanic.

There are signs that may be changing. Chairman Miller of the Federal Reserve Board says he will do his part in holding monetary growth within necessary limits. And the President's recent announcement on reducing the size of the proposed tax cut shows a renewed commitment to budgetary restraint. These developments are en-

These developments are encouraging for two reasons:
Their impact on our economy, and their impact on what people expect. And the latter may be the more important. If people expect inflation to continue, their own efforts to protect themselves against rising prices will simply aggravate the problem. Changes in government policy are needed to change our inflationary expectations. But government cannot do the job alone. We

all must help.
We must elect--and re-elect-public officials who show the
courage to confront the federal
budget as a whole and who will
not cave in the the demands of

its parts.

There is no single answer to this problem. It is the most complex and difficult issue our nation faces today, precisely because it pits the short-term interests of individual groups, against the long-term interests of the nation as a whole. We have all had conversations where we lament the ravages of inflation, but where we also wind up saying, 'If only they would do something about it'. All of us have to be the cata-

All of us have to be the catalyst that can crystallize this widespread despair over inflation into a coherent, effective program. We are challenged to make that commitment.

Nearly 20 years ago when he was president of Sun Oil Co., Robert Dunlap spoke some words that have meaning for as today. I hope that succeeding generations cannot say of as that we lived in a grab bag era of American history: out for what we can get today, unrooted in the past, uncommitted in our philosophy, unsure of our own capabilities, and unconcerned as to our responsibility for the future. I hope we cannot, and will not, let freedom slip through our fingers because we didn't understand or didn't care.'

or didn't care.'
This fight against inflation is truly a fight for freedom-freedom from the tyranny of everrising prices and the certainty of increased government involvement in our economy that will surely result from continued inflation. It is a fight we

must make----and win! With your help, we can make a difference.

To conclude, it was a very educational insight into the way our national system works. Despite all of our nation's problems, America is still the best place on earth to be.





# Town Board accepts street repair bid

The regularly scheduled monthly meeting of the Mentone Town Board was called to order at 7:30 p.m. Monday, June 5, with all members present. Minutes of the May meetings were read by Clerk-Treausrer, Kate Whetstone, and

Two respond-ing companies offered bids, and they were: McMahan-O'Connor Construction Company, Inc. of Rochester, and Jansma-Coursey Asphalt, Inc. of Etna Green. In later discussion, the Board elect-ed to give the contract to Jansma Coursey, with the motion being made by Gerald Romine, and seconded by Hardesty and Wayne Townbaugh Tom baugh.

Dan Richard, representative for the Kosciusko County Area Planning Commission was pre-sent, and asked the Board what their reasons were for wanting to withdraw from the Commission. He stated that he was not present to pressure them, but was interested in their feelings

on the subject.

Hardesty responded stating that, "We are a small town, and we feel we know our town best .. we feel you have some ordinances that do not apply to

Richards explained that the Planning Commission would support Mentone's ordinances even if they were not county-wide, and stated that the Com-



With high school graduation just behind them, many area young people are making decisions on what they want to

do with their lives.
Marry? Have children? What to do about a career? These are some of the most important questions they are probably asking themselves.

And what can a parent do in trying to give good, sound advice? How can we help our younger children prepare for making career plans?

Below are some tips from the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. They may give you some well needed advice right now.

-Encourage your child to think about what he wants to be when he grows up.

-Don't discourage your child from planning on a particular career at an early age.

-Try to eliminate sex bias in thinking about your child's future career.

-Don't hestitate to give your child your opinion when he asks what he should be when he grows up.

-Tell your child about the work you do.

-Encourage your child to ask others about their jobs.

-Take your child on field trips to see people at work at their jobs.

 Help your child explore hobbies and other activities that are productive and useful.

-Encourage your child in his school work and help him to understand how important it is.

-Encourage your child to visit with counselors and teachers to discuss career plans.

-Remember that college is no longer a route to assured occupational success. Discuss the varieties of training available.

And most of all, remember that your child does need your counseling and advice. His choices will affect you, and you should take part in this important decision. It is your responsibility.

# Growing vegetables in limited space

If you want the satisfaction of growing your own vegetables but don't have a lot of space, grow them in containers. All you need is enough sun and space for a good sized container.

Most vegetables grow well this way. Just look for the varieties that have been hybridized for container growth, or those that can be adapted to confined quarters. Some crops like corn produce large root systems and need a very large container. Other plants such as pole beans, cucumbers, and tomatoes will need to be supported.

Container vegetables are pretty agreeable and make few demands when it comes to location. Absolute requirements are five hours or more of full sun, enough space to set the container, and adequate air circulation.

Once you meet these demands, you can put the containers anywhere - patio, deck window box, walkway. If you don't have any available ground space, you can grow vegetables in hanging bas-

Drainage can be a problem with this kind of gardening. With

smaller containers, whenever possible use drip sauwers to catch excess water. A large container without a saucer might be better off being slightly elevated rather than sitting directly on a solid surface like a cement or brick patio. If the container stays in contact with a solid surface, water can accumulate, causing root rot.

A six inch diameter pot with a soil depth of eight inches is the minimum size for vegetables. This size is good for lettuce, herbs, peppers, radishes. Root crops, such as beets, carrots, radishes, and turnips, need depth and enough surface space to fill out to their mature size.

# Low-calorie formula available

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Women, Infants and Children (WIC) food program now gives doctors the option to prescribe low-calorie infant formula for infants and children, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carol Tuc-ker Foreman said today.

Ms. Foreman said WIC program

rules have been amended to allow infants over six-months old to intants over six-months old to get low-calorie iron-fortified nu-tritional beverages instead of re-rular formula, if prescribed by a doctor. Children over one-year old who are still drinking infant formula because of special dietary needs could also get the low calorie formula with doctor approval.
"We have received a number of

requests to authorize a lowercalorie nutritional beverage for infants and children," Ms Foreman said. "We have decided that a low calorie formula should be provided under certain condi-

The WIC program provides special foods and nutrition education to low-income pregnant and brestfeeding women, infants and children up to five-years old who show signs of poor nutrition. WIC currently serves more than 1.1 million participants nation-







# If you want to save your gowns...

Do you plan to keep your wedding gown? "If so, store it carefully," advises Lois M. Gotwals, Purdue University extension clothing specialist.

Clean the gown even if you don't believe it was soiled, says the Purdue specialist. Too often wedding gowns, stored without cleaning, mysteriously appear soiled after storing. Method of cleaning -- laundry or dry clean-ing -- depends upon the washability of the fabric and trims. sewing techniques used and the intricacy of the pattern design.

To home launder the gown, first remove non-washable trim. If the gown is made of fragile fabric such as lace, be sure to wash with the gentle cycle. Do not use fabric softeners, starch

N

or fabric finish. Rinse the gown well. After drying, let the gown hang for at least a day before storing. If the gown is dry cleaned, allow it to air for at least a day to remove all solvents and odor, suggests Gotwals.

For flat storage, select a large container to limit the number of folds to be made in the gown. Wood and cardboard contain traces of acid which, over a long period, can cause fabric deterioration; therefore, a white sheet or unbleached muslin should be used as a protective lining. Wash lining material several times to remove all fabric finishes. An extra length of liner fabric should be placed over the gown to act as a dust protector. If fabric liners are used, they should be removed every six months and washed to remove acquired acid.

An alternative to fabric liners is a paper, "Permalife," which is available from some jewelry stores and from some specialty firms. Replace the paper every five years to assure its acid absorbency.

Before arranging the wedding gown in the container, place the lining material along the inside folds of the gown. Also cushion sleeves, any other folds and all fabric details with rolls of the lining material. Fold the gown as little as possible since every fold weakens the fabric. A fold pressed sharply is even more damaging.

Store your carefully packaged

gown in an area free of moths and silverfish and with a relative humidity as low as 50 percent to inhibit the growth of molds. Fluctuations in temperature and humidity can cause deterioration



Everyone who watches the cop shows on TV knows what

criminals are doing to businesses these days. It's a jungle out there: holdups, burglaries, shoplifting, and a tidal wave of bad checks.

What the networks aren't showing is the far more damag-

Business crime

ing crime wave being inflicted on business - and ultimately the consumer.

We con't know if that's because the networks think such offenses aren't dramatic enough, or if it's just that they they don't want to offend the viewer.

Burglary, for instance, cost honest folk \$2.5 billion last year, according to the American Management Associations. That's bad news. Harldy worse, however, than the news that their own employees pilfered 2 to 4 times that much from U.S. firms.

Forged checks cost only half as much, nationwide, as embezzlement by companies' own managers and workers. Securities thefts and frauds cost 10 times as much as the cruder but less profitable crime of credit-card fraud.

Overall, stealing by the victims' co-workers and business associates was several times as costly and effective as that by heavy-handed hoodlums.

It makes one think about the cries for law and order. If half of the white-collar thugs were thrown into the hoosegow, the country would have the biggest construction boom in its history - building jails.







Not often enough, but once in a while, I think about how safe my familys important papers, documents, etc. are.

J've never really known what I should keep in a safe deposit box and what I can keep at home. I always get confused, especially when I know that our safe deposit box would not be readily accesible to Bob or I in case of

The other day, I came across a brochure sent to me by the Consumer Information Center. This brochure, prepared by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has some helpful advice on what to do with documents, etc ....

Perhaps, as I, you need it. It details what to keep, and where to keep it.

A guideline as to what should be in a safe deposit box is: Put it in if you can't replace it or if it would be costly or troublesome to replace. Items such as: birth certificates. citizenship papers, marriage certificates, adoption papers divorce decrees, wills, death certificates, deeds, titles to autos, household inventory, veterans papers, stocks and bond certificates, and important contracts.

In your active files at home, you should keep: tax receipts, unpaid bills and paid bill receipts, current bank statements, current cancelled checks, income tax working papers, employment records, health benefit information, credit card information, insurance policies, copies of wills, family health records, manuals and warrenties, receipts of items under warranty, education information, inventory of safe deposit box and key, loan statements, loan pay ment books and receipts of expensive items not yet paid

Many of us never really think about the problems that could arise if these important papers were destroyed or lost, so its very important that we all keep track of what's what. It may save us a lot of trouble!

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
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# Quilt donated to museum

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

# New park is built on old Beaver Dam school site

From the earliest pioneer days the people of Franklin Township have been careful to pro-vide an education for their children and vouths. At first schools were held in pioneer homes and log buildings. Then only the children of those families who did subscribe to a private school could get an education. There were at the very beginning per-haps a dozen of such schools. In the 1850's a change in state school law made it possible for the Board of Township Trustees to build buildings and hire teachers by levying a Township-wide tax on all citizens. These were one room frame buildings and lasted perhaps twenty years.

They were replaced about 1871 to 1888 by one room brick buildings. Nine of such were con-structed, Jennings being the first and Lincoln the last. Others were Jay Bird, Wertenberger, Tucker, Sarbers, Blacks, Sevastapool and Beaver Dam. Gradually over the years these buildings wore out and the pupils in them were moved to larger schools. These were Beaver Dam and Sevastapool which in 1901 were two room and two story buildings. Later all the township children were transported to Beaver Dam where both elementary and high school courses were offered. Thus the Beaver Dam School located on this site became the single school for all of Franklin Township.



Now only a memory is the Beaver Dam School. The building was demolished after a fire swept through the school in 1968.

In January of 1968 a fire started in the gymnasium part of the Beaver Dam School which was being used as a Junior High School. This was the end of classes for the school and child-ren were transferred to Akron and Mentone.

After the building has been leveled it was offered "for sale" by the Corporation. Fifteen concerned people of the community donated \$100 each to secure the purchase price of \$1500.00. On September 18, 1970 Articles of Incorporation were filed with the recorder of Kosciusko County. This was the formation of Beaver Dam Community Corporation, a non-profit organization dedicated to the memory of the Beaver Dam community. Since that time the membership has grown to twenty-one members. Their first project was to build a monument containing the cornerstone and cement placque commemorating the new gymnasium addition of the Bea-ver Dam School. This project was helped immensely by the contributions from the Beaver Dam Alumni Association.

As time progressed a Beaver Dam Memorial Park Board was established. A partially enclosed pavilion with picnic tables has been built, playground equip-







the other morning I sat watching the Donahue Show (my favorite!), and listened to an author talk about the lack of feelings in men. She had interviewed dozens of men, and found that most of their do not discuss their feelings or emotions with anyone.

Now all of us know about women - gab, gab, gab!
Right?! We've all heard the chiches - "women are so emotional" or "they cry their hearts out". And the backyard fence was designed exclusively for talking over.

As I listened, I realized that some of what I was hearing was really true. I can't remember the last time I heard men discussing their feelings or problems. Oh, they talk about their problems at work, or how rotten the Vikings played last night, but true, gut discussions. Never!

Now I can't believe that God made us so differently. We all have hearts, and souls, and brains, and nerves, and emotions. So what makes women want to discuss their feelings, and men hold it all in.

One word sums it up for me - "macho". That masculine need to be strong, brave, and proud, but never, ever weak or vulnerable. Men must defend themselves, and never let another person know they feel afraid or weak or sad.

It really is too bad! Women live longer than men. Too many wives spend the last years of their lives alone, and not because they want to.

I really believe that if men could release their frustrations and anger through talking, they might live longer. Wars might be avoided. Crime decrease. Alcoholism vanish.

Perhaps it's too late for the men in our society to learn to talk and to be real friends, but it's not too late for our children. The word "macho" is unfair. And so is "sissy". I want my son not to be an adjective, but a "real" human





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
