TVSC board hires Phillips as head football coach

At a special meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation board on Wednesday, May 30, Valley trustees voted to hire Jeffery Phillips as the new head football coach for TVHS. Phillips will replace Phil See, who recently resigned after one year of serving as head coach.

Phillips, 26, has spent the last three years as an assistant coach at Jasper High School, where he worked as defensive line coach. Prior to that, he was defensive coordinator at Tri Central High School at Sharpville for two years. This will be his first head coaching position.

When asked why he wanted to come to Tippecanoe Valley, Phillips responded this was one of the best football programs in Indiana, and it was the only type of position he would consider taking to leave Jasper. "Jasper has an excellent

football program," he explained, "and I would probably have been considered for head coach there when the present coach leaves. I wouldn't have left Jasper for any other program (of lesser quality)."

Phillips went on to say he has no plans for making major changes in the Valley program, adding, "when you have a program this successful, you must be doing something right and you don't want to make a lot of changes. I believe in the two-platoon system, and I believe in having my assistant coaches coach."

He is a 1975 graduate of Lewis Cass High School, where he was all Mid-Indiana Conference as a linebacker in his senior year. Phillips then played at Franklin College for four years as a linebacker. Although his teaching assignment at Valley is not yet finalized, he has a B.A. with a major in history and a minor in physical education from Franklin, and he's working on a master's degree in secondary education from Indiana State University. He's taught all types of history and government courses, as well as physical education courses, and he's also coached wrestling.

Phillips was selected over 25 other applicants and was granted a two-year contract by the Valley board members. This was the first time he'd applied for a head coaching position.

See resigned after guiding the Vikings to a 10-2 record and a Class AA Sectional title last fall. Under See and former coach Charlie Smith, the Vikings have an 84-12 mark and have made either the Class A or Class AA playoffs five times since 1976. They won the Class A title in 1979.

At the present time, Phillips is making living arrangements in this area with the aid of his wife Tonya and his two children, stepson Dylan, 10, and daughter Autumn, two.

A "Meet the Coach" night was held at the high school last Monday, June 4 for patrons to meet the Phillips.

Egg Fest starts tomorrow

The 1984 Mentone Egg Festival will begin tomorrow (Thursday) at 4 p.m. when Tiny's Midway rides open and will seriously be underway with the beginning of the 6 p.m. youth league baseball tournament and NLC/TRC All-Star baseball games at 7 p.m. at TVHS.

The festival, which is sponsored by the Mentone Chamber of Commerce, will continue Friday with the downtown area being taken over by the midway and craft and food stands. At 6 p.m. Friday the 10 kilometer road race will take place, with several age divisions for both men and women, and a eucbre and monopoly tournament will begin at 7 p.m. in the fire station. The "Special Blend Band" will play country and western music in

the downtown area Friday evening, also starting at 7.

Saturday will have a full agenda for visitors, beginning with the bike race at Mentzer Park and monopoly finals at the fire station, both at 9 a.m. The annual Miss Chick and Mr. Rooster contest will be judged at Mentzer Park at 1 p.m. as parade entries are lining up for the 2 p.m. parade. The final contest will take place at 3:30 with the by-now famous (infamous?) egg toss. On Saturday evening, a "singspiration" will be held at the United Methodist Church lawn at 7 p.m.

The final event of the festival will be "Big Time Wrestling" at the Mentone School gymnasium at 7:30

p.m. An international heavyweight championship match featuring Sgt Bobby Golden and Tom Lynch will highlight the wrestling, with two out of three falls on a 60 minute time limit. A tag team match pitting Crusher and Smasher Stone against Ben Patrick and Briar Costello, also two out of three falls with a 60 minute time limit, will also be held. A preliminary match between the Reverend Tin Hampton versus KoKo Lewis will round out the wrestling contests.

In addition to the contests games of skill and kiddie rides many special events and booths will be found throughout the festival, including a book sale by the Friends of the Library, Bell Museum bell burgers, the United Methodist Women's bake sale and the Lions' annual chicken barbecue at the fire station. Peterson receives certificate of honor

Sally Peterson, 14, daughter of Donald Peterson, Mentone, formally received a certificate of honor last Monday evening, June 4 from Mentone reserve officer Jim Lewis.

Lewis reported to board members Jim Miller, Wayne Tombaugh and Miriam Boardman that Peterson had awakened Saturday night in the mobile home where the family resides on Harrison Street. Smelling a strange odor, Peterson immediately called the fire department and then took her younger brother out of the home. By the time the fire department volunteers arrived a few minutes later, the mobile home was filled with smoke and actually caught fire when they entered the home. Volunteers reported that those few

minutes had made the difference between life and death for the pair.

The certificate was awarded "for actions taken to prevent personal and property damage and possible loss of life." As Lewis made the presentation, he commented that all too often young people only receive poor publicity, but that Peterson's actions deserved public recognition.

In other business concerning the police department, Marshal Russ Hart requested Lewis be paid for court appearances, adding that he would forego personal reimbursement for such appearances so Lewis could be paid. Lewis and Bob Hartman, as reserve officers, are now paid \$3.35 an hour for their time. And Lewis has to take off

work from his regular job to appear in court on town arrests. He estimated he will lose over \$9 an hour for each court appearance he must make, although Hartman reported his employer had decided to pay Hartman in the event he has to make court appearances.

The board did not make any decisions, but instructed Lewis to first report how many hours of work he loses for such matters. Lewis will make his first appearances next Monday, June 11 at Warsaw.

Include mail delivery when vacation planning

To ensure mail delivery is left in good order while on vacation, the Post Office recommends the following options:

Vacationers can have mail kept for their return by asking a friend or neighbor to check their mailbox periodically and hold the mail. If they will be picking up mail from a post office box, be sure they have the box key or combination during the vacation time. They can arrange for the Post Office to hold delivery of mail. Contact the Post Office for details and for the appropriate form to complete.

Vacationers can arrange for their First Class mail to follow them by informing the Post Office where to forward the mail for a specified time, after which it will be held for their return. Be sure to instruct the hotel or friends visited to forward mail they receive to the new travel address.

Travelers may find it convenient to purchase stamps and postal cards in advance in case a Post Office isn't near their vacation spot.

A tip on mailing those rolls of vacation films to processing houses - be sure they are properly packaged and legibly addressed before mailing. Thousands of rolls of film wind up in "dead letter" offices annually because they are poorly packaged and carelessly addressed. When possible, use the envelopes supplied by film processing companies. If not, make sure the envelope is big enough and strong enough to carry the films safely through the mail. Regular envelopes used for cards and letters are not suitable. The pro-

cessor's address and the return address should appear accurately and legibly on the outside of the envelope. Also, tape your name and address to the film roll itself, so it can be returned to you should it get separated from the envelope. And, most importantly, enjoy your vacation!

Because it is so difficult to know how the bereaved really feels, we advise that you *not* say, "I know how you must feel." It is not necessary to force a conversation, nor to extol the virtues of the deceased to the grieving family.

Silent expressions of emotion and compassion (like a firm gripping of the hand) and a simple, "I'm sorry," are frequently more eloquent than talkative attempts at eulogies.

Listening and just "being there" show that you care. Your presence is indication of your desire to be sympathetic and comforting.

Above all, don't try to jolt a grieving widow out of her grief. Time will do it for her gradually. She must first accept the loss, then begin to live with it and pass through several emotional stages before the natural healing effects of time take hold.

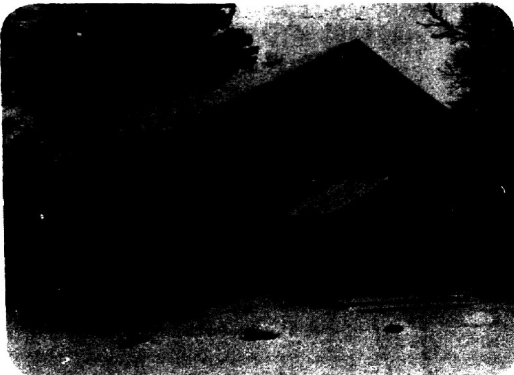

asked when and what could be done to help correct the damage. After some discussion, trustees decided the cemetery board should organize a group of volunteers to help replace as many of the monuments as possible to their original positions. Water superintendent Rod Holloway reported he's installed 11 new water meters, and that 12 more have been ordered. Valley downs Rochester

The Tippecanoe Valley baseball team eliminated Rochester in the first game of the Culver baseball sectional last Tuesday by a 16-10 score.

Zent was also doing a job on the mound, holding Valley hitless in the first two innings, but the Vikings caught up with him in the third inning, sending 11 batters to the plate and scoring six runs. Mark Howard, McConkey and Rob Dunnuck had RBI singles and Zent walked Pinder with the bases loaded before being relieved by Andy Holland. Troy Shull then sent a fly ball to center which was misplayed for a two-run error and a 6-5 Valley lead.

Both teams then played comeback. A Bryan Green home run, a Scott Hancock double and an RBI

single by Kamp gave Rochester a 7-6 lead after three innings. McConkey's two-run homer gave Valley a 8-7 lead in the fourth and Paulik's single and Green's grounder to second tied the game 8-8 after four innings.

Valley kept the pressure on in the fifth inning, taking a one-run lead when Troy Hoffman scored on a wild pitch and extending it to 12-8 on Cullison's three-run homer.

McConkey, in the meantime, was shutting Rochester down after relieving Pinder in the third inning. Notice from the Akron Marshal

Those of us who live in small rural communities such as Akron like to believe that the problem of crime is only associated with the big cities and that we are insulated and protected by the closeness of our neighbors whom we have known for years. Unfortunately the criminal tide is spreading from the metropolitan centers out into the countryside, and we are being included.

Since the first of April this year the Police Department has received reports of eight cases of major property theft, four burglaries in which homes or businesses have been illegally entered, and numerous complaints of Criminal Mischief in which personal property has been maliciously damaged or destroyed. To be sure, this is not a major crime wave comparable to what exists in some of the large cities within the State but still is sufficient to cause some concern to the people of the town.

Since it is a physical impossibility for the single officer on duty to be everywhere in the town at once, we are requesting the assistance of the residents to keep our town and its people safe and secure.

If you observe suspicious activity in your neighborhood -- strangers wandering around at unusual hours or vehicles driving back and forth continuously, let us know about it. If we can't be reached in our office at 893-4567, contact the Fulton County Sheriff's Department (223-2819) and the dispatcher will contact us by radio. If possible get a description of the vehicle or person so we have an idea who or what to look for.

If you should have the misfortune to become a victim of a crime, notify the Police immediately! If your home, business or car has been entered, don't touch or move anything! All too often fingerprints or other physical evidence has been accidentally destroyed by well-meaning but untrained people.

To help protect yourself and your property, some common sense guidelines can be followed:

Lock your doors when you leave home and make sure that any windows which can be entered are also securely fastened. Upper floor windows which can be reached from a tree or TV tower should also be closed and latched.

Ladies -- don't leave your purse in the car or in a shopping cart unattended. It only takes a second for someone to remove your wallet when you're not looking.

Lock your car when you park it -- or at the very least remove the key from the ignition. Don't provide temptation for a joyrider.

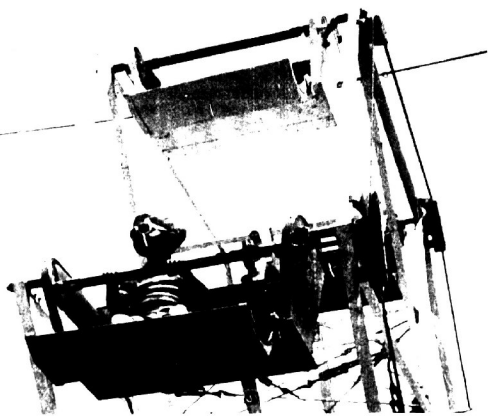

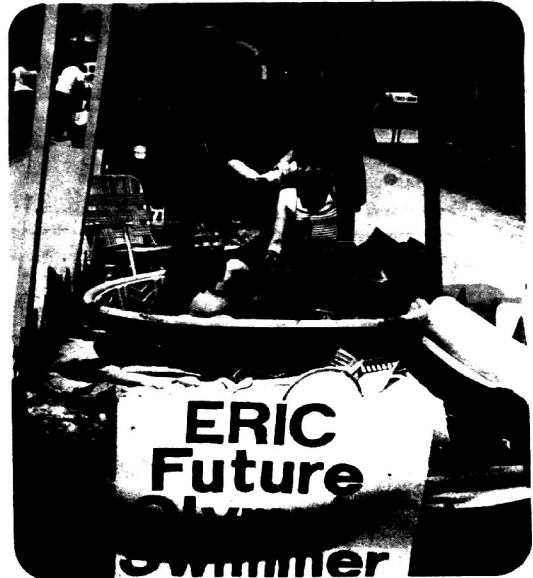

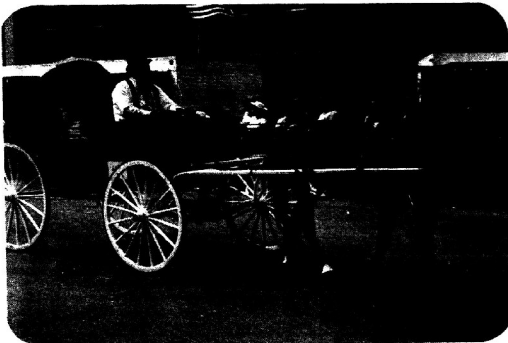

Bidding for BTC house to reopen in July Board postpones administration, non-certified salary discussion

In an unexpected deviation from past practice, Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation Superintendent Baxter Paige recommended that discussion of salary changes for administrative and non-certified personnel be tabled until December this year.

It has been standard practice for TVSC board members to review salaries for non-union personnel during the summer months, specifically July, but Paige explained his recommendation was based on the present financial bind of the corporation. The state treasury continues to be behind in payments to all school corporations, and both Fulton and Kosciusko counties have failed to pay TVSC the tax monies from the April collection. (Fulton county has paid approximately two-thirds of the tax allotment, but Kosciusko county has so far paid only one-third of allotted revenue.)

Paige commented that the present salaries of both administrative and non-certified personnel are commensurate with similar positions in other school corporations. "This may not be popular with employees," he concluded, "but I feel it should be tabled at this time."

Board members Jim Royer, Joe Crill, Cecil Miller, Fred McSherry and board president Dick Long unanimously agreed to accept Paige's recommendation.

Although an auction for the home in Saner's Second Addition, Akron, was scheduled to be held at the Monday, June 18 meeting, no bids were forthcoming. Paige revealed two estimates of \$54,515 and \$56,500 for the home, which was built by the 1983-84 building trades class under the direction of Ken Murphy, and recommended bidding start at \$50,000. After a few moments, Royer moved to table the bidding for the evening and reopen bidding at the July meeting and the trustees agreed.

Trustees authorized Paige and the school administrators to file charges in small claims court against some 30 people for delinquent textbook rentals prior to the 1983-84 school year. Delinquent rental fees, excluding the last year of school, of \$5795.65 are outstanding, and some of the debtors have been taken to small claims court by TVSC before.

In other business: TVHS principal John Hill presented the findings and recommendations of a committee which had been working on development of a language arts curriculum for the corporation. The committee, chaired by Hill and Akron principal Dan Kramer, outlined seven major goals and cov-

ered objectives for students from grades K through 12. Paige reported to board members the report will be made available to officials of the Classroom Teachers Association for their input before the next meeting of the board.

Trustees accepted a bid from the Akron Exchange State Bank for a temporary loan in an amount not to exceed \$684,000 at a rate of eight percent per annum. The note, which will be payable on December 31 this year, was broken down to \$460,000, general fund, \$71,000, transportation fund, and \$153,000, debt services fund.

Board members approved the use of the Akron school buildings and grounds for 4th of July activities. Request came from the Akron 4th of July Committee chairman Ron Dittman.

Board members reappointed Grace Waechter to another four year term on the Akron Library Board.

Scott Carmichael's request for a two-week, out-of-state professional workshop in electronics and microprocessor systems was approved by the board. They approved \$315.20 in expenses for the workshop.

In other personnel moves, trustees accepted the resignation of Susan Michaels and signed an ABE contract for Rick Ralston for five days.

Trustees agreed to advertise for bids for the purchase of three new buses which would not be received until after the first of next year. Board members did so at the recommendation of Paige to take advantage of a new state law which permits buses to be purchased from transportation funds instead of by bond. Although TVSC could legally purchase four buses next year under State regulations, trustees decided to purchase one bus for handicapped students and two regular school buses.

Paige informed board members that several first grade students from Burket have agreed to attend Mentone next year so the corporation can meet Operation Prime Time class size requirements. Under the new program, the State will reimburse school corporations \$18,000 for each new first-grade teacher they hire next year, providing first grade classes are held to a maximum of 18 students. The program, which is designed to gradually eliminate overcrowded classes in grades K-3 over the next four years, will result in both Akron and Mentone hiring one additional first-grade teacher for the 1984-85 school year.

Change-of-address kits available at post office

Summer months often mean people are going to be moving to new locations, and with that move

comes one of the continuing problems for mailers and the US Postal Service: Undeliverable-as-addressed mail. The Postal Service would like to remind those who are planning a move to give their personal and especially business correspondents at least four weeks advance notice of their relocation.

The Postal Service offers a free change-of-address kit to people planning a move. The kit contains a supply of post cards; one to be sent to the Post Office and the others to send to magazines, banks, doctors, insurance companies, and others who send mail regularly. The kit can be obtained from a mail carrier or from the post office. Senders, as well as recipients, benefit from proper notification of address changes since mail that cannot be delivered as addressed is returned, resulting in waste of time, material and postage.

To make it easier for correspondents to keep in touch with persons who move, the Postal Service recently extended to 18 months the time period during which First Class mail will be forwarded for those who submit a completed change of address card to their post office.

Rochester firm receives grant

New avenues toward job security have been opened through the efforts of a local clothing manufacturer, a state college, and a state agency. With the help of the Indiana Vocational Technical College Region 5, Hart Schaffner & Marx has obtained a \$40,800 grant to retrain employees for new jobs.

During '82 through '83, Hart Schaffner & Marx was forced to lay off 100 employees at its Rochester plant. The loss of employment for 40 other employees was imminent unless the company could find funds for retraining.

According to Jane Croy, administrative assistant at the Rochester plant, the company had asked the Private Industry Council and the

Indiana Department of Commerce for funding, but those agencies were unable to provide the needed assistance. After much persistence to find the needed financial assistance, Croy contacted Indiana Vocational Technical College in Kokomo.

Ted Imbler, the College's director for industrial training and development in Region 5, said Hart Schaffner & Marx asked the college for assistance but "the College doesn't provide any type of training package for a business or industry but funding for such programs has to come from the company or other sources," he said.

Imbler then checked with

Warren Hass, the College's Executive assistant to the president, who suggested they contact the State Board of Vocational Technical Education (SBVTE).

"We found SBVTE does have retraining funds so we wrote a Vocational Technical Education Proposal for funding. In early April the state board approved a grant for \$40,800 for wage subsidy, materials and supplies to retrain the employees," Imbler said.

The grant is being used to teach 40 employees from the vests operation how to construct and sew slacks. The 20-week training session has already begun and will end July 20.

Mario Molinaro, plant manager says the grant will help to provide new jobs for its workers. "In '82 and '83 when the company laid off 100 employees, the Rochester facility became quite shaky. With the training program well under way, full employment is now enjoyed by the remaining 350 employees," he said.

Hart Schaffner & Marx, a subsidiary of Hartmarx Corporation, opened its Rochester plant in 1959. The manufacturer of tailored clothing, is this community's largest employer.

Indiana boosts summer school program

Indiana's schools are offering more summer school programs in more subject areas this year as a result of a \$3.4 million increase in appropriations by the 1984 General Assembly, according to State Superintendent of Schools Harold H. Negley. Of Indiana's 304 school corporations, 211 have filed applications for summer school. In 1983, 170 corporations offered summer programs.

Negley said that the 1984 appropriation for summer school was increased to \$6.2 million, up from \$2.8 million in 1983. As a result of the increase, the number of courses for which the state can reimburse local school districts has been expanded greatly.

"Previously, only those basic credit courses required for graduation such as math, science and language arts were eligible for reimbursement," Negley said. "As a result of this substantial increase in funding, we can now allow courses in virtually all curricular areas to be eligible, including foreign languages, art, music, vocational education, computer instruction and other electives."

Under the state's summer school program, school corporations offering the approved courses receive reimbursement from the state in the fall. The amount reimbursed depends on the number of school corporations participating and their instructional costs. In 1983, a total of 77,441 students in 170 school corporations enrolled in summer coursework. The reimbursement rate was 71.5 percent.

Courses are offered to students in all grades, with the individual course offerings decided at the local level. Students may attend classes for a maximum of four

hours per day, with the length of the courses ranging from 20 to 40 days. High school students may earn a maximum of two credit hours per summer.

Negley said that he views summer school as an integral and often overlooked part of the state's educational system. "It can help us meet the various objectives and priorities established by the Governor, the legislature and the State Board of Education," he said.

Indy Olympic trials begin next week

Indianapolis, the only city to stage three U.S. Olympic trials, is preparing for the final two; swimming, June 25 through 30, and diving, July 4 through 8. The events will take place in the Indiana University Natatorium on the IUPUI campus.

The first of the three 1984 Aquatic Olympic Trials, is synchronized swimming, took place April 24 through 29.

The nation's top 1,000 swimmers will compete this month for the opportunity to represent the United States in 24 individual long course events and the 400 and 800 freestyle relays and the 400 meter medley relay.

Record breaking times are expected from 1984 hopefuls Mary Meagher, Bill Barrett, David Larson and Rowdy Gaines. They were all members of the 1980 U.S. Olympic Swim Team, and all hold top ten world ratings in their individual events. Jill Sterkle will be trying to make her third Olympic team.

Preliminary competition begins at 8:30 a.m. daily with final competition starting at 4:15 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and at 5 p.m. Friday and Saturday. Ceremonies begin each evening 30 minutes before starting time.

In diving, a select 57 finalists from national competitions will vie next month for the eight berths on the United States diving team. The top two finishers in each of the four events -- men's platform, men's springboard, women's platform

and women's springboard, will represent the United States in Los Angeles this summer.

Likely contenders are Greg Louganis, 24, from Mission Viejo, California, a three-time world champion and 1976 Olympic Silver medalist; Bruce Kimball, 21, from Ann Arbor, Michigan, the current national platform champion; Wendy Wyland, 19, the current world platform champion from Mission Viejo; and Megan Neyer, 22, the current world springboard champion from Mission Viejo, who captured her fifth and sixth consecutive NCAA springboard titles at the I.U. Natatorium earlier this year.

Preliminary rounds begin at noon, Wednesday through Saturday. Finals are Thursday, Friday and Saturday night beginning at 7 p.m., and Sunday afternoon beginning at 2 p.m.

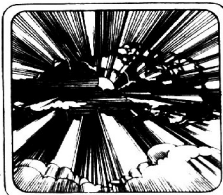

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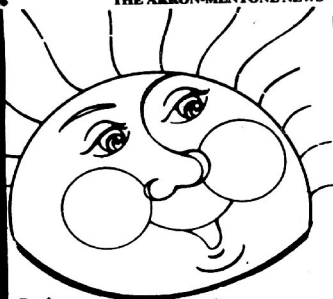

Akron gears up for July 4 celebration

The countdown for the annual Akron Fourth of July celebration began last week as the Fourth of July committee announced their finalized plans. According to committee chairpersons Ron and Melea Dittman, it should once again be a full day of activities.

As always, the festivities will begin with the parade at 11 a.m.

The parade will start at Pike's Lumber Company and proceed through town to the Akron schools, and it will feature Miss Sparkle and Mr. Firecracker contestants, Akron Queen contestants and entries in keeping with the "Nifty Fifties" theme. Ralph Tucker, 818 Rochester St., will serve as Grand Marshal of the parade this year. (See related story this page.)

Tucker to serve as Grand Marshal

Although 79 years ago Ora and Norma Tucker named their baby boy Ralph, at least three generations of children since then have referred to him as "the candy man," and they're still doing it today.

Ralph Tucker came to Akron 59 years ago, moving here from just south of Mentone. He was only 20 years old then, not long out of school at Beaver Dam, and he came to work with Harry Showalter at Showalter's Garage.

"Things were a lot different then," he recalled with that familiar grin. "The garage and gas station were across the street from the harness shop, and there was Bemenderfer's, Strong's grocery, the blacksmith shop, Leininger's grocery-and the Winona Inter-urban ran right down the center of town."

"Something was always going on," he continued. "Things were held practically every night, like the band concerts every Thursday. The thing I remember best was on Saturday nights. Four stores sponsored the event, when four men would stand, one on each corner (of the downtown intersection), each of them holding a chicken. They'd throw their chickens, and the first man who could catch one of them would win \$5 worth of groceries. It brought people into town and everybody had fun."

Tucker worked with Showalter

from 1926 - 1943. At that time, he bought the garage and took on Earl Ogle as partner. They owned the garage until 1958, when Ogle bought out Tucker. Ralph then went to work for Joe Gooch construction, where he worked until 1970 on road construction. He operated a roller, helping to lay asphalt in many of the small towns of the area, including Akron. Before Ralph retired in 1974, he worked with Karl Gast Co., installing furnaces and insulation. During these years, Ralph also found time to work at the Akron school corporation and for 23 years as a volunteer fireman.

But it's not solely these things for which Ralph is fondly remembered. He's remembered for being there in times of trouble, for always having a smile and an encouraging word for adults and for his ever-present piece of candy for children. And he's earned a special place in the hearts of all the local men and women who have entered the armed services over the past years, as he gave each of them a small good luck token; all but two have returned.

Ralph and his wife, the former Imo Leininger, have been married 56 years, and they have one son, Tom. He's married to the former Janet Beeson, who once taught school at Akron, and they have two children, Christopher, nine, and Julie Ann, seven.

Financial aid still available

There is still time, but not much, left to make application for financial aid for college this fall, according to Charles Orem, Ivy Tech Director of Student Services.

Indiana Vocational Technical College will sponsor two workshops on "Availability of Student Aid for You" next week. The first workshop will be at 7 p.m. Thursday (June 28) with the second workshop set for 3 p.m. Friday (June 29). Both workshops will be held at the main campus, 1815 E. Morgan St., Kokomo.

The workshops will include information on the various types of financial aid available and how to apply for the aid.

He added that if a person is planning to attend college this fall and needs financial aid there isn't much time left to process the applications. 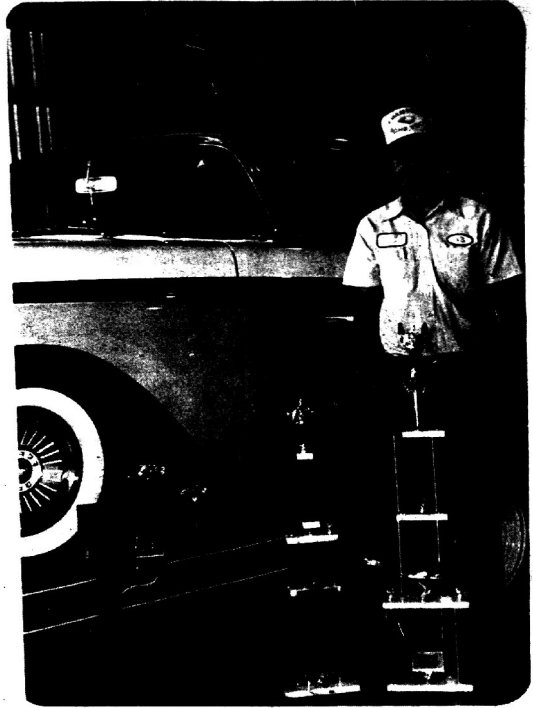
Smith, whose record stands at 27 wins, nine losses and one tie, came to TVSC from Triton and will also assist with track.

Ed Martin, owner of Hoffman's Body Shop, Akron, has recently been busy pursuing a hobby that's a sideline of his work. Since March this year, he's entered an originally restored 1957 Ford Skyliner in five auto shows, and he's come home with five first place trophies.

The 1957 Ford is one of the few surviving Skyliners, as Ford built this particular model only three years ('57 - '59). Its main feature is a retractable hard top that slides into the trunk, transforming the car into a sporty convertible. According to Martin, Ford manufactured approximately 20,000 of the autos in 1957, 15,000 in 1958 and about 12,000 in 1959.

When Martin began restoration of the vehicle last September, he not only painted the body, but he completely restored the frame of the car. The car is now two-tone, as Martin painted it in willow green and colonial white.

The car took first places in two indoor car shows, the Cavalcade of Wheels in South Bend and the Rod and Custom Show in Fort Wayne, and three outdoor shows in LaPorte, Peru and Alexandria. Martin drove the car in the Silver Lake Celebration last weekend and will show the car in the Akron parade on the 4th of July. His toughest competition to date will be at the five-day International Retractable Show in Dearborn, MI starting August 9 this year, where retractable car owners from around the world will compete for honors.

Akron town board members divide duties

The Akron Town Board met at its regular meeting on Tuesday, June 19.

The main order of business for trustees was dividing primary responsibilities for the various departments as follows: water, sewer and trash pick-up-Jerry Hudson; street department, equipment and cemetery-Dick Drudge; and police, park and ball diamonds-Jack Miller.

Miller reported receiving a check of \$500 from Pike Lumber Co. to be used for park maintenance. Because town employees can not keep up all the work to be done, the board voted to hire George Brown to mow, clean and do light maintenance at the park. It was felt because he is retired he will have time to do the work when it needs to be done. He will be paid \$3.50 per hour, and mower and materials will be furnished by the town.

Clerk read a letter from the State board of Health granting permission to dump street sweepings at the town dump. She was instructed to put a notice in the paper concerning this matter.

In other business: Kent French asked that stone be put in a washout behind the furniture store.

The town will haul in the stones and he agreed to pay for it.

Jack read a letter from Gerald McHatton requesting the alley next to his mother's house be vacated. The board denied this request because both water and power lines go through the alley.

Jack reported that the Boy Scouts cabin will be used again, so it will be added to the insurance list.

A decision on whether to buy a ladder guard for the water tower has been postponed.

The board voted to buy five new Neptune Water Meters a month. Clerk was instructed to contact Ropes Co. to find out the cost and trade in policy. Their quote could not be made final until they knew the number of meters the town plans to purchase.

The board voted to purchase a gasoline powered trimmer.

Jack gave the employees their copy of the new personnel handbook. Vandalism problems at the park restrooms, the water fountains at the park and the fountain on the downtown corner were discussed. Jerry will see what needs to be done.

Warren Ousley asked for a

permit to operate an ice cream truck in Akron and was told the board had previously denied all permits of this type and did not want to change the prior ruling.

Marshal Kruger suggested we purchase and install signs at the entrances to the town stating the town will enforce the peddler and solicitor ordinance. The trustees agreed to do so.

Two estimates were presented for repair and painting the compactor, but no decision was made.

The Marshal's report was reviewed and warrants were signed. It included: miles patrolled, 1,707; accident investigations, six; complaints, three; funeral escorts, two; arrests, 15; written warnings, three; verbal warnings, seven; open door checks, two; title checks, three; break-ins, one; theft reports, two; county assists, seven; other police dept. assists, two; and ambulance assists, one.

The next meeting of the board will be Tuesday, July 17 at 7 p.m.

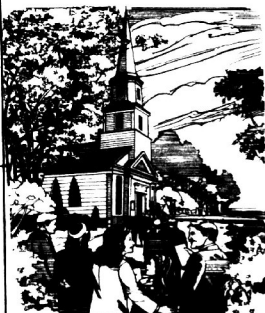

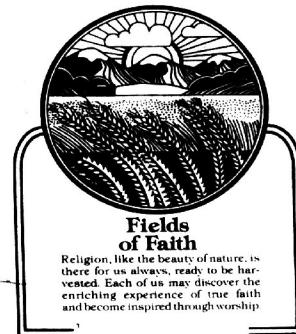
