



# Joe Bidwell to serve as Grand Marshal in Akron

In 1918 Joe Bidwell enlisted in what was at that time World War 1. His ambitions at that time were to become a veterinarian, he loved horses. Now he is the oldest living WW1 veteran in Akron.

After entering the army Joe went through four weeks of Basic Training and was promoted to Private First Class. This increased his pay from \$30 a month to \$34 a month. He was placed in the Veterinary Corps when he was promoted to "fetrier," which is the assistant veter-

inarian, and was stationed at Fort Sill in Oklahoma.

During the first day at the fort Joe noticed a man who had a build of a prize fighter, but he didn't think any more about it. The second night in the barracks the men pushed back the beds to form a ring and threw the gloves to Joe. Joe had only a little training at boxing, but it had only been with bare fists. Once he started he knew he was up against something he had never faced before. There was no referree but then flex were. Huished the gentle-

man came over to congratulate him for his good job at boxing. The man Joe had boxed with was Johnny Williams, the Champion of Missouri.

Before moving to Akron in 1933, Joe lived at Roann for ten years, he then started the Bidwell Meat Market which he sold in 1945. From 1945 to 1950 he owned the Tiosa Elevator. From 1952 to 1972 Joe owned and operated two mobile home courts. Sumset Acres of Akron was one of them. During this time he was an associate with The Merchants Protective Association in Warsaw until 1970. He covered a 21 county area with his job.

Mr. Bidwell has been a member of the American Legion since it was first formed in 1919 at Wabash, a member of the Masons and received his 50 year pin in 1979, a member of the Rationing Board during World War II, a member of the Akron Chamber of Commerce, served as the Clerk-Treasurer of Akron for 12 years, and is a member of the Akron United Methodist





# Water billings explained by Akron Town Board

questions asked about recent water billing in the town of Akron for May the following was pointed out at the town board meeting held June 18,

(1) Water rates are set by the Public Service Commis-

(2) Meters are read every three months.

(3) Payments are made contain with two months monthly with two months estimated and the third month a full billing.

(4) Due to server weather, meters were not read in

February (south side of Akron only.) This made it necessary for five months to be estimated for this area.

(5) If your estimate was not high enough your billing will be bigger than you may have expected. It is suggested that you increase your estimate on your next payment to avoid this problem.

(6) Minimum charge on 2,000 gallons per month is \$2.65 on water, \$6 on sewer, and 13é tax on water only.

(7) When meters are read if over 6,000 gallons of water were used during the three months then a chart that is set up by the state is used to adjust the cost.

Marty Gearhart will be sent to water school to become an inspector on August 8, 1985 for an eight week, one night a week basic

On May 30, 1985 the EPA inspected the town water system with Garlan Sparks. The top state official stated that Akron has excellent drinking water and facilities.







# Purdue degrees

A total of 4,378 students received degrees at Purdue University's West Lafayette campus in May.



WILLIAM KENNETH MOLLENHOUR JR.

Veteran Warsaw newsman William Kenneth Mollenhour Jr., is dead at the age of

Death came at 6:37 p.m. Monday, June 17 in Kosciusko Community Hospital where he had been a patient for one day. He had been in failing health since suffering a stroke at his Deerfield Beach, Fla. winter residence in March of 1979.

A versatile newsman whose illustrious career with the Times-Union and Radio-Stations WRSW AM-FM spanned more than four decades. Mollenhour gained a state-wide reputation for keen-eved newspaper reporting techniques, feature writings, columns and tart editorial comments.

Born in Mentone on Oct. 28, 1916, the son of Kenneth and Lucille (Hudson) Mollenhour, he graduated from Warsaw High School in 1934 and International Business College, Fort Wayne, in 1935. After serving two years with the U.S. Army's 11th Infantry Division, he ceived an honorable discharge in 1937.

His marriage to the former Alice Watkins occurred on March 8, 1936. She preceded him in death on Nov. 5, 1983.

After completing his military service, Mollenhour joined the Warsaw Daily Times as a reporter-photographer. He subsequently served as a night editor, advertising salesman, advertising manager and business manager of The Times-Union as well as a news commentator and later manager of Radio Station WRSW.

Mollenhour conducted a daring and successful radio crusade against organized gambling operations (slot machines) which were flourishing in Kosciusko County during the 1950's.

Through his tireless investigative reporting efforts, The Times-Union became the state's first daily newspaper to expose drug abuse in local public schools during the 1960's.

In addition to his distinguished career as a newsman, he found time to take an active leadership role in Red Cross CPR and Bloodmobile programs, Indiana Heart Association, Warsaw Junior Achievement, where he served as past president and chairman, was a national renown speaker for Alcoholics Anonymous and helped organize the local chapter.

Mollenhour served as aeronautics commissioner for the State of Indiana, from

1947 - 1964; held the titles of 'Sagamore of the Wabash' and "Kentucky Colonel" bestowed by the governors of Indiana and Kentucky respectively in 1963; was vice president of Murphy Medical Center from 1958-1968; and a director of Warsaw Insurance Co. and Kosciusko County Abstract and Title

He attended the Baptist Church.

Surviving are two sons, William Kenneth Mollen-hour, III, Troy, Mich., and Jerry D. Mollenhour, Bud Lake, N.J.; one brother, Max Mollenhour, Warsaw; six grandchildren; and six greatgrandchildren.

Services were conducted by Bishop Dale W. Cryderman in the McHatton-Sadler Warsaw, Funeral Home, Thursday, June 20 at 10 a.m. Interment was in Oakwood Cemetery.

# Royal Blue speaker at area crusade



**Pastor Royal Blue** 

Pastor Blue, whose parents were Mr. and Mrs. Peter Blue was born and raised in Mentone, Indiana where he attended Mentone High School and played baseball all four years on the high school team. During the summer months he worked for the Creighton Bros. Poultry Farm. During the summer of 1941. Royal was severely burned when tractor he was working on caught fire and exploded. It was at this time, as a boy 15 years of age, that he dedicated his life to the Lord for full time service. Doctors told his mother he had a 50-50 chance to make it. He was also hospitalized with broken leg during the following year when he was crushed between a car and a tree. At 18 years of age, he entered the Navy, serving in the Armed Guard in World War II and was involved in the invasion of Okinawa where God graciously spared his life. He then spent the remaining time in the military playing ball on the 19th Fleet All-Star team. After his discharge he returned home where he continued playing ball on the Mentone Merchants team, plus teams from Warsaw, Indiana. In 1950 Royal and his wife Ruth, with their son Dennis left for Los Angeles, California where he attended Biola, graduating in 1954 as President of his graduating class. His first wife was called home to be with the Lord in 1977. He then married his present wife. Linda, in 1978 and they have two children.

In 1951, while a student at Biola, he was called as Youth Pastor at First Baptist Church in Van Nuys, CA, a suburb of Los Angeles. During this time, he worked Burch's studies included under Dr. Porter L. Barring in Mentone.

ton (his "Dad" in the Ministry) and Dr. Harold L. Fickett, Jr. Royal-was instrumental in forming the Southern California Youth Director's Association, which eventually became a national organization.
