Summer reading "Dive for adventure"

"Dive for Adventure" is the title for the summer reading program at Bell Memorial Public Library in Mentone this year. Young readers (next year's grades 1 through 6) are invited to join the fun. There are no special meeting dates during the six weeks, June 5 - July 15, but there will be a party July 18 for all who participated. Children enrolled may also take part in the library's annual Trading Post Day, a junior flea market, June 21.

The summer reading club is not a contest. Each member is free to determine the number of books he/she will attempt to read, and then proceeds to do so at their own pace. As books are completed, the individual's flag is moved around one of the many trails on a map featuring such undersea sights as a "Hawksbill Turtle" and a "Portuguese Man-of War", where prizes are earned.

The summer program emphasizes devoting some quiet-time each day to reading those books that appeal to that particular person and for trying books from new categories. The fact that this keeps reading skills sharp for the next school term is an added benefit!

Bell Memorial Public Library serves the Town of Mentone and Harrison Township. The library also serves residents of any Indiana Library's taxing area through the state's free reciprocal-borrowing covenant. Residents of any area that does not support an Indiana library may purchase non-resident cards for library privileges.

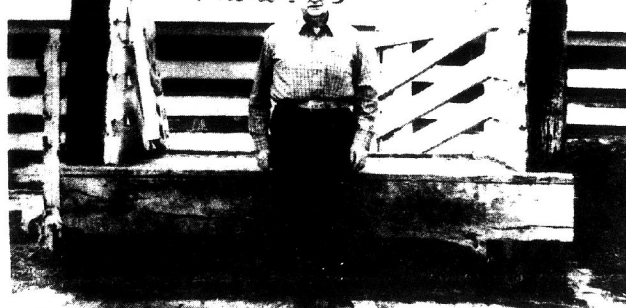

Six years ago the stockyard was leased by Morrison, but that hasn't slowed down Loren any; he still runs the stockyard on a daily basis.

Born in Sidney, Indiana and graduating from Sidney School, Loren also met his wife there, he said. He and his wife, Mary grew up together and went to the same church. They married in 1938.

Mary and Loren then moved to Mentone in 1945. They have three children, Eddie, Lorena and Kathy and four grandchildren.

Loren said, "Mentone is a very friendly community, once the people get to know and trust you then your in for life. It has been truly a pleasure to do business with the people of the community. There's been a lot of ups and downs but mostly ups in the last 40 years of running a business."

Loren usually begins his day with a cup of coffee at Teels and to also catch up on all the latest news.

When asked what his earliest memories of the Mentone Egg Festival were, he remembers that years ago, they use to celebrate when the eggs were shipped to New York and then the companies would come back and put on a big show for the people of the town and that is what is know today as the Mentone Egg Festival.

An achievement that Loren is very proud of is in 1988 he received an award for Outstanding Shriner of the Shrine Club.

He is also a member of The Blue Lodge. In the past, Loren has been the President of the Shrine Club, was on the Town Board for eight years, coached Boys League and the traveling league and, when time allows, he and his wife play in the Scrambled Egg Band. His hobbies include raising shorthorn cattle, fishing and coon hunting.

It's like the skier straddling the tree. If you pull together, you can make it around almost any obstacle.

Women's liberation. There must be a better name for it. After all, I only share working and Doug only shares the housework. I wouldn't want the sole responsibility of providing for the family any more than Doug would want the sole responsibility for the house.

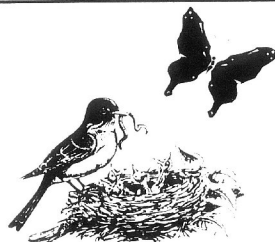

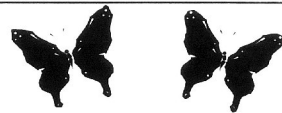

Harley-Davidson Is Running Strong

What do *Forbes* magazine publisher Malcolm Forbes, movie star Sylvester Stallone, comedian Jay Leno, author Stephen King and rock star Eddie Van Halen have in common?

Then love for Harley-Davidson motorcycles, that's what.

While Harley riders for decades have been portrayed as black-leathered "outlaw bikers," that image does not fairly fit today's population of Harley enthusiasts. Most lovers of the last American-made motorcycle are upstanding citizens and come from all walks of life. The tie that binds them is not something as simple to point to as a tattoo.

"There's just something about Harleys," says Lori Tyson of Oceanside, Calif., a motorcyclist for more than 20 years and owner of several other brands of motorcycles. "I don't know whether it's the mystique or because they're American. It's not something that you can put into words for people who haven't ridden them."

With Harley-Davidson sales booming and the motorcycles considered the latest and greatest status symbol for Hollywood stars, many more people are sharing in that experience. The company's current catalog offers 19 different motorcycles, from fast and sleek Sportster models to the Ultra Classic Tour Guide that comes complete with sound system, cigarette lighter and CB radio. Rubber-mounted engines and computer-refined frames also have been incorporated to make for a more comfortable ride.

They have come a long way since the first "Harley" was built in a Milwaukee tool shed in 1903 by the three Davidson brothers, William, Walter and Arthur, and their friend William Harley. By 1947, the Harley-Davidson Motor Co. was the world's premier manufacturer of heavyweight motorcycles and the sole U.S. motorcycle maker. In recent years, foreign motorcycle manufacturers have tried to copy the look of Harley Davidsons, but to owners of the real thing, nothing can match the thunder of a Harley.

"It's just not the same," says Ed Gonzales, a Washington, D.C., attorney who owns a classic 1952 Harley-Davidson "Hardtail."

"Only a Harley rides like a Harley."

The ride almost came to an end in 1982 when competition from foreign makers and production problems put Harley on the brink of bankruptcy. But with modernized production techniques and a tariff increase on its foreign competition in

1983 (the tariff increase was removed in 1987), Harley was able to regain its ranking as the market leader in heavyweight motorcycles.

Few products have such customer loyalty. Last June, 35,000 Harley-Davidson enthusiasts met in Milwaukee to celebrate the 85th anniversary of the company's first motorcycle and raised more than \$500,000 to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association. The Harley Owners Group (H.O.G.), a company-sponsored association of Harley riders, has a membership of 88,000 of the bike's owners and more than 300 chapters across America.

Harley-Davidson's logo is often depicted with an American bald eagle proudly sitting at its top, wings spread. The eagle symbolizes the enduring spirit of this, the last American-made motorcycle. But unlike the bald eagle, Harley-Davidson is no longer an endangered species. The road looks smooth for these American classics.

Any Indiana taxpayer who remitted intangibles tax for liabilities incurred on or after November 10, 1988, may be entitled to a refund of those payments under a bill signed into law by Governor Evan Bayh.

It is necessary for the taxpayers to

submit an Intangibles Tax Claim for Refund Form with the Indiana Department of Revenue. The refunds will be made as quickly as possible, though the Department is currently at its time of peak activity. Any refund will first be applied to other taxes owing where such liability has been established.

The history of the egg

Editor's note: This was taken from a report done by William A. Henthorn and Charles D. Smith on April 26, 1984.

The growth and subsequent impact of the poultry and egg industries in and around the Mentone area, up to 1936, led a group of hatcherymen, businessmen, feed dealers, manufacturers and others connected with the Kosciusko County area poultry business to the conclusion that some type of celebration should be held to emphasize to the community as well as the outlying areas the importance of the poultry industry. Therefore, in 1936 the first Mentone Egg Festival was held. The goal of the Festival was not only to

emphasize the importance of poultry and eggs upon the local area, but also to promote these high-quality industries.

The Festival was held annually in the Spring during the first few years then eventually was moved to the Fall months. Due to World War II there was no Festival from 1942-1945. Each year, though, the celebration seemed to mature and expand. There was an egg competition with various classifications for entrants: 4-H; producers with flocks under 100 laying hens and commercial. Usually 100 to 150 dozen eggs were exhibited, mostly by boys and girls under 18 years old. With few exceptions the Grand Champion was some young person. Workshops on topics such as financing, marketing techniques, newest innovations in machinery and commerce were led by different Purdue scientists and poultry experts. The area hatcheries, farms and other poultry related businesses conducted tours through their facilities so that others could see just what is involved in the poultry industry.

During the planning for the 1940 Festival, the committee decided to hold the first Egg Queen contest. Entrants were selected from area high schools. The first Queen was Delta Dean Doran from Burket followed in 1941 by Ileen Sarber, also from Burket. When the Festival resumed after the war, the following list of Queens and schools they represented:

- 1946 - Patricia Gaerte - North Manchester.
- 1947 - Phyllis Latta - Warsaw.
- 1948 - Wylan Titus - Atwood.
- 1949 - Kathleen Perry - Beaver Dam.
- 1950 - Tomaline Witham - Atwood.
- 1951 - Geneva Whetstone - Mentone.
- 1952 - Shirley Overmyer - Talma.
- 1953 - Sally Shively - Beaver Dam.
- 1954 - Sandra VanLue - Akron.
- 1955 - Betty Griffiths - Mentone.
- 1956 - JoAnn Tucker - Beaver Dam.
- 1957 - Boni Spradlin - Mentone.
- 1958 - Sandra VanKirk - Atwood.
- 1959 - Diana Ballenger - Beaver Dam.

In 1955 the one and only egg eating contest was held. Rob Redman of Plymouth, Indiana was the champion eating five dozen, half-poached eggs in twenty minutes. His technique was to swallow a dozen at a time out of a dish. After the contest was concluded a local doctor informed the contest committee that eating large quantities of eggs was not beneficial to one's health due to the high cholesterol level. So further "egg eating contests" were banned.

The Festival always concluded on Saturday evening with a banquet that was attended by the largest crowds to attend any dinner in all of Indiana. Typically the Mentone people served as hosts and hostesses to the Governor, New York eggs buyers and staff from the Poultry Department at Purdue University.

In 1960 the Egg Festival committee felt that due to varied and rapid changes in the poultry industry over past years, it was a proper time to re-evaluate the needs of the day and perhaps institute other programs or means that might be of more value to the industry. So the Mentone Egg Festival ceased to exist until 1975 when after two years of being called "Mentone Days" the Committee President, Bill Westerman, announced that the name was to once again become the "Mentone Egg Festival".

Advertising for each Festival was usually fairly routine and carried out much the same as the year before. However, desiring to advertise the 1946 Egg Festival in a truly unique manner, the Northern Indiana Co-op Association, under the leadership of Edward, built what was and still is quite an appropriate "ad". Built in a building just west of Dr. Davison's dental office, Hugh Rickel of Palestine designed and supervised the construction of a 3,000 pound cement egg.

The shaping of the egg was done on the drawing board. A cross-section was drawn with horizontal and vertical lines at 1" intervals. These lines represented the 3/8" steel rods to be used in completing the frame of the egg. A 3/4" reinforcing rod was placed vertically in the middle of the egg. Hugh Rickel wrote, "By measuring the diameters, the circumference could be computed. By welding the different size circles together before erection, the egg took shape as they placed one above the other." All these rods were first wired together and then welded for extra strength. Over this frame was wired metal lath and two coats of concrete plaster followed by a coat of finish plaster. Pete Goble of Atwood did the base coats but due to an eye injury to Pete, Mr. Rickel had Clyde and George Reed of Mentone do the final coat.

The egg was painted and the lettering completed by Harry Meredith. Mr. Meredith painted the front of the egg showing a basket holding many eggs. The large egg in the middle reads "Mentone" and the other eggs indicate names of surrounding communities. The slogan "Egg Basket of the Midwest" was written at the base of the design.

When the egg was completed, twelve "unknown" men loaded the 3,000 pound piece of art onto a truck and proceeded toward Warsaw. Upon reaching the lawn of the Kosciusko County Court House, the egg was left and a phone call was made to the Warsaw Times-Union notifying them that the Easter Bunny had left a small surprise on the Court House lawn. Needless to say, this caused quite a story, so much so that the entire incident was picked up by the UPI wire service and most of the nation was able to share in this event. A few days before the Festival began the egg was transported back to Mentone to be placed on a concrete base on the southwest corner of Main and Morgan Streets, where it sits today. The land was originally donated by the Northern Indiana Co-op Association but today is owned and maintained by Lake City Bank.

As mentioned earlier, the impact of the poultry industry on the local area has been extraordinary. Currently there are many businesses and farming operations within this industry that provide jobs and economic dollars to Kosciusko County. Manwaring Leghorn Farms, Inc. is the area's first and oldest hatchery.

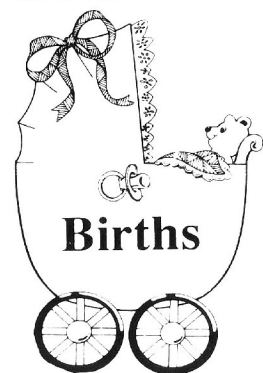

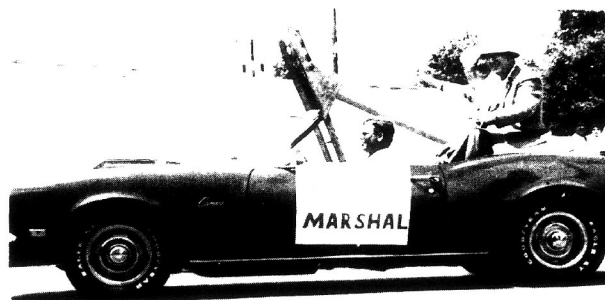

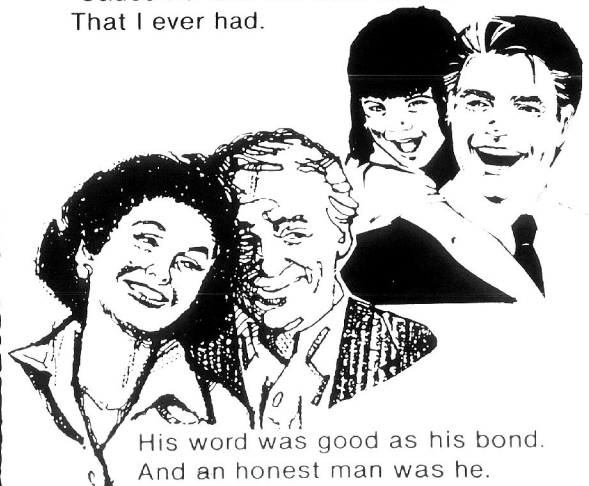

Collin enjoyed Charlie's workshop in the basement. He spent a lot of time just sawing wood and sanding knowing grandpa would help if he was stuck.

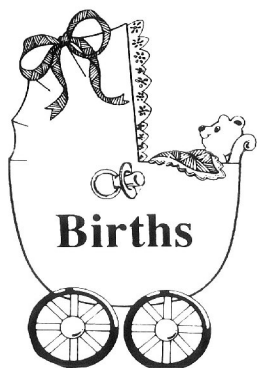

Attending from Fulton County will be Kim Bingle and Candy Reichard. They are sponsored by the local Kiwanis Club.

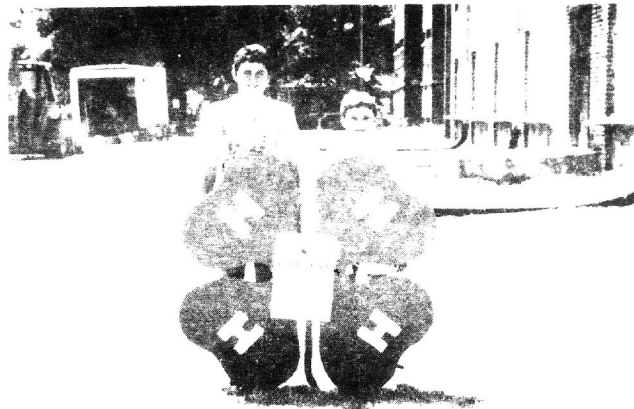
Wildlife and Nature facts

Something to sing about: Amid the bad news about declining numbers of songbirds in North America, ornithologists are finding a bright spot. According to National Wildlife magazine, more than 20 varieties of songbirds seem to be expanding their ranges in this county. Cardinals, house finches and American robins are among the birds whose home territory is growing. Researches attribute the songbird spread to the dramatic increase in the number of Americans who put out bird feeders during the winter months.

A real speedster: He's half tail and half feet. He's also a popular cartoon character that runs on blurring wheels. He's an odd bird but a real one. He's the roadrunner. National Wildlife magazine reports the roadrunner's name is right on target. When these wildly colored birds shift into high gear, they can run as fast as 15 miles per hour. At that speed, the bird's thin muscular legs take 12 steps every second. Those fast feet coupled with spectacular eyesight give this real-life speedster an edge when tracking lizards and insects.

Father's Day Traditions

June is the month of graduations and roses, and it is also the month in which we honor fathers. Father's Day is popularly celebrated in the United States and Canada with special greetings and special gifts.

The idea for a Father's Day was suggested 80 years ago by Mrs. John Bruce Dodd, who felt that men like

her own father deserved a day of recognition and gratitude. Her father, William Smart, a Civil War veteran, had been widowed when his daughter and five sons were very young. Realization of the difficulties he must have had raising his young, motherless family on a farm in eastern Washington and appreciation for his constant devotion to his family, sparked Mrs. Dodd's desire to honor all fathers.

As a joint venture between Mrs. Dodd, the Spokane Ministerial Association, Spokane Ministers Alliance and city YMCA, the first Father's Day was celebrated in Spokane on the third Sunday of June—the month of her father's birth—in 1910. The actual date for her first Father's Day observance was June 19.

Among the first notables to endorse Mrs. Dodd's idea was the orator and political leader William Jennings Bryan. He complimented her on the inspiration of Father's Day and remarked that "too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the relationship between parent and child."

The observance of Father's Day did not spread rapidly, but as celebrations were increasingly publicized, a growing number of cities and states began observing the event and a national movement was formed to have Father's Day proclaimed a national holiday. In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson took part in a Father's Day celebration by pressing a button in his Washington office that unfurled a flag in Spokane.

Congress did not give Father's Day national holiday status until 1972, when President Richard M. Nixon signed a congressional resolution establishing Father's Day as a national holiday to be celebrated on the third Sunday in June each year. Father's Day is also celebrated in at least 20 foreign countries, although not necessarily on the same day as in the United States.

The rose is the official Father's Day flower. A white rose for remembrance and a red rose as a tribute to a living father.

CANKER SORES

If you've been troubled by canker sores in your mouth recently, your dentist may recommend treatment that can help them to heal more quickly. Canker sores are small white ulcers that may appear on the mucous membrane tissues of the mouth. They often appear on the inner lip, the lining of the cheek, or on the undersurface of the tongue. Even though this is considered a minor condition, it can be painful and last from one to two weeks before subsiding.

The exact cause is not known, but some scientists believe canker sores may be associated with an allergy to citrus fruits or result from a delayed hypersensitivity to certain mouth bacteria. Some believe that tension might be the culprit. Lots of students break out with canker sores before exam week. Brides before the wedding day, etc. It may help to get as much rest as possible and to eat a well-balanced diet and avoid salt and citrus fruits. These measures may help the sores to heal within a few days.

30 YEARS AGO

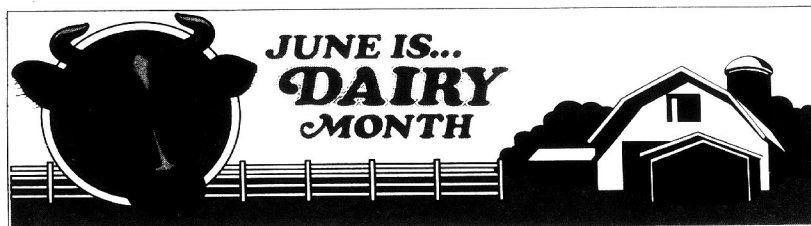

MOTORING TIPS: A bee can wreck your car! You may have thought that unusual things cause automobile accidents, but the idea of a honey-bee being able to cause a high-way catastrophe seems incredible. Yet it's perfectly true. George Barton, head of the Chicago Motor club safety and traffic department points out that the sudden appearance of bees and other stinging winged insects in cars causes many accidents every summer. Typically, driver and occupants are thrown in to a panic, and needlessly, too, because the noise and vibration of the car bewilders the bee so much that his only motive during his frenzied flight is escape. "Entomologists have proved that bees are less likely to sting while in a moving car than at any other time" Mr. Barton said. "Being under a roof and whirled along in the car they are intent only on 'going away from there'". Just roll down the window a crack, ignore your little winged 'hitch-hiker', and he'll blow out without harming anyone.

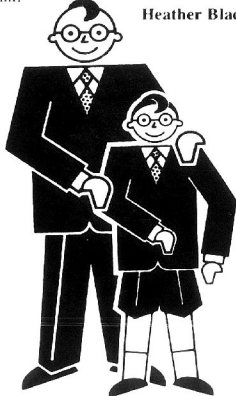

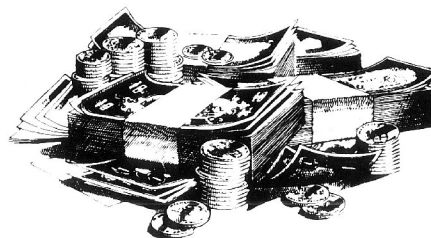

IDEM public participation in county landfill

Hazardous waste treatment, storage, or disposal facilities may undergo partial or final closure. Partial closure means the proper closure of certain hazardous waste management units at a facility that contains other active hazardous waste management units. Final closure is the proper closure of all hazardous waste units at the facility. Prior to closure, the facility must submit a closure plan to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) which specifies how the hazardous waste units will be closed in a manner that controls, minimizes, or eliminates any impact on human health and the environment. The plan must be approved by the IDEM before it can be implemented.

Indiana Rule 329 IAC 3-21-3 provides the public an opportunity to submit comments on the plan. The following company: Four County Landfill, Fulton County, Indiana, has provided the IDEM with a notification of closure and has submitted a total closure plan.

For public examination, the closure plan submitted will be on display at the Fulton County Health Department, 802 Jefferson Street, Rochester, for a period of 60 days.

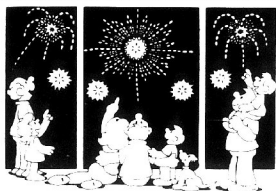

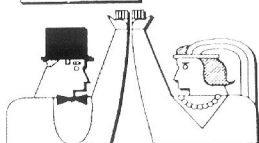
MEDIAN INCOME FOR MARRIED COUPLES, BY RACE

ISTA fights for disabled coach

The Indiana State Teachers Association, representing some 40,000 teachers and school support workers, declared its support of a Marion teacher who has been told she cannot coach softball from her wheelchair.

The ISTA is providing legal counsel and moral support for Sandra Childers, a third grade teacher at Marion Elementary School.

Childers, a paraplegic since a spinal operation three years ago, serves as assistant coach for girls' softball at Marion Adams Junior/Senior High School. The commissioner of the Indiana High School Athletic Association has made a preliminary ruling that the presence of her electric wheelchair violates a rule that first base coaches can have with them only scoring materials.

ISTA attorney Richard Darko has filed an appearance with the IHSA and will represent Childers at a June 14 hearing. According to Darko, the ruling is "A clear case of discrimination—something a just society must not tolerate."

The executive committee of the IHSA will make a final ruling on the matter after the June 14 hearing. Childers and other witnesses will testify that the practice is safe, and that she is a good and prudent coach. A court injunction has permitted her to coach pending a final decision by the IHSA.

"This is a matter of simple justice," said ISTA President Damon P. Moore, explaining ISTA's decision to furnish legal support for Childers. "To deny the disabled the use of a wheelchair is discrimination at its worst. ISTA stands behind Sandy Childers—we're going to bat for this coach!"

Should the IHSA executive committee uphold the preliminary decision against coaching from a wheelchair, the ISTA has promised to pursue the case.

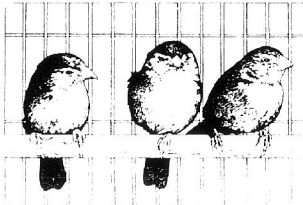

Dr. Hazen, a 1980 DDS and 1983 M.S. graduate of I.U., is a member of the American Academy of Implant Dentistry.

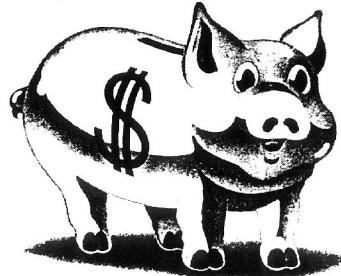

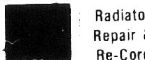

Pointers For Parents

Children And Pool Safety

Swimming pools and spas may make a splash with many families when it comes to warm weather fun, but for many children, they can also pose a real danger.



Watch your children constantly when they're playing near a pool or spa.

Drowning is the second leading cause of accidental death in the home among children under five. An estimated 350 children under the age of five could drown this year in home swimming pools and spas when their parents or other supervisors aren't looking, according to the National Spa & Pool Institute (NSPI). To prevent children from drowning, NSPI offers the following pointers for parents:

- Maintain constant eye contact at all times when the child is in or near any body of water.
- Install a fence wall or other effective barrier around your pool or spa, but keep in mind there is no substitute for constant supervision.
- Learn how to administer lifesaving techniques to children, including cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).
- Keep toys, tricycles and other children's playthings away from the pool or spa.

SunSavvy

Dr. Frank Akim is an expert on the sun's effects on the skin. Here, he answers some frequently asked questions on sunburn and protection in the sun.

Q. I have a very fair-skinned little boy. How can I keep him protected this summer?



First, it's important to keep your child's skin moist. Use a good quality, hypoallergenic, fragrance-free, and alcohol-free sun-sensitive cream, lotion, or spray. The cream or lotion should be applied to the face, ears, lips, neck, and arms. You may want to use a line of products specially developed for children such as Water Babies. In case your youngster does get burned, try the Water Babies Sunburn Relief Mist. It comes in a pump spray so you won't have to touch his sensitive skin.

Q. I have olive skin and have never had problems tanning. Recently, I got a very unusual sunburn. What would cause this to happen?

A. It could be a reaction to medications you may be taking. Some antibiotics, diuretics, tranquilizers and certain other drugs may cause photosensitive reactions. As with any unusual burn, you should consult with your physician and consider using a more protective broad spectrum sunscreen such as Shade 44 which screens out nearly 97% of the sun's burning rays.

Game Fish may help solve power plant operations problem

Public Service Indiana recently stocked its 3,000-acre cooling lake at Gibson Generating Station near Princeton, Ind., with hybrid striped bass as a way to solve an occasional plant operation problem.

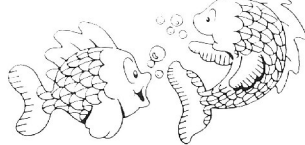
"We've stocked the lake with 30,000 wiper fingerlings that will feed on gizzard shad, which is not a good sport or eating fish," said Randy Lewis, an environmental scientist for PSI. "By using the wipers to reduce the shad population, we hope we can minimize the problem of shad getting caught in the power plant's water-intake screens. When this has happened in the past, it has caused us to shut down some of the generating ability at Gibson station until we could clean out the screens."

Wipers are a cross between white bass and striped bass. They are fast-growing and can tolerate warmer temperatures found in power plant cooling lakes better than striped bass. They are also a popular game fish among Midwestern anglers. As the wipers grow, and perhaps as early as this fall, PSI hopes they will also become good catches for Gibson Lake's visiting fishermen.

The Gibson Lake Recreational Area, owned and maintained by the electric utility, is open to the public daily from 5 a.m. to 9 a.m. through October 31. Visitors may use the lake for boating and fishing at no charge. They are asked, however, to sign in at the lake's guard building before entering the recreational area.

All boats must have a U.S. Coast Guard-approved life preserver for each person on board. Swimming, water skiing, sail boarding and scuba diving are prohibited.

Positive Parent Power

Do your children know that they are loved even when being disciplined? Do you give your children opportunities to make their own decisions? Do you reward your children with a smile or hug for something done well? Are you too strict as a disciplinarian? Do you let your children get away with too much? How many orders do you give your children each day? Parenting is a matter of finding a comfortable balance between rewards and punishment as you deal with your children each day. If your children do get into difficulty, what alternatives do you have to physical punishment?

Let's start with some general guidelines. Share your expectations and desires with your children. They are more comfortable when they know what limits have been set for their behavior. Listen to the number of orders you give your children daily. Catch them in the act of behaving well, and reinforce that behavior. Enforce, firmly and consistently, your expectations of your children. Natural and local consequences help children to learn about decision making and responsibility. Natural consequences occur without parental intervention. For example, if a toy is lost or broken, do not replace it. Logical consequences may be provided by parents when natural consequences are not available or may prove disastrous. If a child says something unkind to a friend or playmate, a logical consequence would be to be sure the child says or does something nice for the offended child. Writing on walls results in the child cleaning off the writing.

Let's look at a list of more specific approaches parents might use to deal with a child's misbehavior without punishing.

1. Gently remind the child of appropriate behavior.
2. Distract the child to another interest.
3. Offer alternatives from which the child can choose.
4. Reward good behavior-ignore some forms of misbehavior.
5. Give encouragement and compliments.
6. Use clear, concise, non-emotional messages.
7. Talk and reason with the child.
8. Count to 10 before taking action.
9. Give the child a specific period of time in which to comply with the request.
10. If your children are fighting over a toy, remove the offending toy so neither has access to it.
11. Assign time-out in a specified area for a specific period of time.
12. Help the child find a workable compromise to inappropriate behavior.
13. Take away a privilege.
14. Use contingency contracting -- "If you will do this (appropriate behavior), then I will...(reward or positively reinforce)."

In summary, keep the basic ideas in mind. Set firm, realistic goals and stick to them. Explain the reason for the guidelines; take action every time inappropriate behavior occurs; make sure the children understand that you are dealing with their behavior but that they are still loved; be as consistent as possible; and deal with children's problem behavior in a matter-of-fact, unemotional manner. We would all do well to remember this statement attributed to Oscar Wilde, "Children begin by loving their parents. As they grow older, they judge them. Sometimes they forgive them."

Dear Editor:

Beef is back. That's good news to those of us who enjoy eating beef, whether it's a lean, tender steak; a convenient, flavorful roast; or a burger with all the trimmings. It's also good news to those of us who raise cattle.

Beef is big business. The beef industry is the single largest segment of Americana agriculture with sales of cattle and calves accounting for about 22 percent of total receipts from farm marketings. In Indiana, cash receipts from cattle and calves totaled \$339 million in 1988. And every dollar of cattle sales generates an additional \$5 to \$6 of business activity in farm supply and food business.

There's an important reason why beef is back. Beef producers became part of a new era in the beef industry on October 1, 1986, when the national beef checkoff program began. Through the checkoff, beef producers invest one dollar per head of cattle sales in a program which funds beef promotion, education and research at both the national and state levels.

As of June 27, 1989, this new era in the beef industry will have been in place 1,000 days. This milestone represents 1,000 days of solid progress for the beef industry. Both personally and as part of a progressive cattle industry, I am proud of this progress.

ONE DARK TOOTH

If you have one dark tooth in the front of your mouth, there is no reason why you have to live with this cosmetic liability. Your dentist can make it look as natural as your other teeth. When a tooth becomes dark or discolored, it is usually the result of some accident or injury to the tooth. It may have been so minor that you were not aware of it at the time. The injury to the tooth, however, may have caused bleeding within the tooth. With the passage of time, the blood has dried and decomposed, causing a brownish or dark gray color to appear.

In cases where the pulp of the tooth has been damaged or if the pulp or nerve is infected or dead, your dentist may recommend root canal treatment to remove the pulp and help protect the tooth from further decay. If the tooth has been chipped, damaged, or eroded, he may recommend a post-crown procedure, to restore its natural appearance. Don't let a dark tooth detract from your appearance when your dentist can make it look natural again.

Progress Show figures on Farm Bureau program

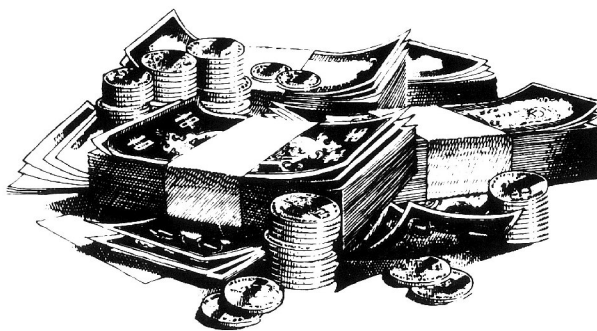
