Cargill, in cooperation with Com-bined Community Services, a local agency serving the residents of Kosciusko County, will be collecting food items to

County, will be collecting food items to be distributed through their food pantry. During 1989, CCS distributed 1.714 emergency food orders. The approximate value of each food order was \$66.83. Many problems faced by the hungry

are running out of food or money before the end of the month.

Most diets were inadequate in fruits, vegetables and dairy products.

67% of respondents report unemploy-ment; had income of less than \$350 per month; has a high school education or less and were relatively young (18 to 44 years of age).

Contrary to expected opinion, almost 2/3 of the respondents do not receive food stamps

Almost 3/4 of respondents were single and white; only 34% were non-white; al-most 3/4 (72%) were female.

Oldest living Mentone volunteer fireman

Harry and his wife Buthene were married in 1928 and have two children, Don, Mentone and Jolaine, Warsaw. "The whole family was very helpful to me, especially when a fire call came in. Each person has a special job to help get me out of the house, my daughter use to get my boots ready and out the door I would go, tripping over things and making a ton of with those big boots, the neighbors were always aware there was a fire, they could hear me leaving the house." "One of the hardest thing about being a

fireman was when there was a loss of a life, it was never easy to see something like that." Harry remembers. But saving property or someone's life was very rewarding and made up for the bad times." Harry was with the department times. when they began to have fish frys to raise money to buy new equipment.

"One time, our fire chief was watching a ball game and saw a big bright glow in the sky. He went out to see what it could be and it was a barn fire, he rushed back to town to call the fire department and ran right into us rushing to the fire, he said, "boy, you guys sure did get here fast." Harry still keeps very busy woodwork-

ing. He also repairs wood furniture. Facing eye surgery on June 7th, Harry is determined to be in the parade on Saturdav



Henry Township Fire Department raising money for Jaws unit





"Tornadoes that tore through Indiana last Saturday did more than \$50 million in damage, according to very early estimates," reports Stephen A. Williams, president, Insurance Institute of Indiana.

"This estimate reflects the current losses reported by the member and subscriber insurance companies of the Insur-ance Institute of Indiana, which represent more than 50% of the property/casualty insurance written in the state of Indiana, says Williams. Williams stresses that the damage fig-

ure is an early estimate of insured losses. Insurance companies expect to receive more claims for losses in the days, and even weeks, ahead as people discover additional damage.

The final total for the amount of insured damage reported by Institute com-panies may be much larger than \$50 million," says Williams

People who used to get numerous cavities were known to have "soft teeth". While has been exposed as a myth, there is another phenomenon, "sensitive teeth" which is quite real and often quite painful.

Wearing down of the teeth, whether from an abrasive diet or a bad bite can cause sensitivity; so may receding gums caused by periodontal disease. The problem is com-plicated by the fact that proper cleaning may be painful, and lack of cleanliness only makes the problem worse.

Construction of a \$25,000 addition to the Gilead High School building was assured recently when approval of an additional appropriation by the state tax board was received by Wallace Musselman, trustee of Perry township. The addition, of one-story construction, will comprise two classrooms and a modern gymnasium and will be 71 by 110 feet. 



once desperate, able to laugh at life and himself, pathetic, and painfully honest. In short, he's a regular human being. 



Wednesday, June 13, was Vice President's Day at the new \$2.5 million museum dedicated to "Hoosier Hysteria," which opens in New Castle on Saturday, June 30. Dan Quayle's private tour of the museum was followed by a speech in the courtyard and a symbolic "first Shot" at the Hall of Fame basket.

The next event is a gala grand opening for the general public on Saturday, June 30, with ceremonies starting at 11:00 a.m., shooting clinics at 12:30 p.m. and exhibition games at 1:30 p.m. Fifty great basketball players are expected to participate in the museum's inauguration, including Oscar Robertson, Steve Alford, Kent Benson and Damon Bailey. The legendary 1954 Milan Indians will team up once again to play their namesake, the Hickory Huskers, from the movie "Hoosiers." Senator Richard Lugar and Senator Dan Coats will join Governor Evan Bayh and U.S. Representative Phil Sharp in the building dedication. Sandi Patti will perform her inimitable rendition of the National Anthem and will also sing "Back Home Again In Indiana."

Grand Opening Saturday will provide visitors with a day filled with celebrities, activities, festivities and memories. The Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame is the only museum in the country that honors the spirit, the tradition, the players, coaches and fans of high school basketball.





People over 64 may be eligible for cash payment from State

Low-income residents of Indiana may be eligible for a cash refund from the state if they file for their "Unified Tax Credit for the Elderly" by Monday, July 2, ac-cording to State Representative Robert N. Sabatini (D-Logansport).


