NOTICE

The Town of Akron and the Akron Police Department wish to remind citizens of the following regulations concerning pets. AMC 3-5-6

The owner or person having charge of any animal within the Town limits shall at all the Town imits shall at all times keep the animal confined upon the premises of the owner or person in charge or under absolute physical control when off the premises. In the event such animal is being walked on a leash or lead, said leash or lead shall not exteed 10' feet in length. The running at large of any animal off the premises of the owner or person having charge of the animal is prima facie evidence of failure to keep an animal confined in violation of this section.

All dogs, cats and other animals running at-large will be picked up by the Fulton County Animal Warden. Owner of such animal will be liable for all costs

AMC 3-5-4

No person shall own, harbor or keep any animal which:

by frequent or habitual ong or creates barking, howling, yelping or otherwise creates unreasonably loud and disturbing noises of such character, intensity or duration as to disturb the peace, quiet and good order of the town.

B) by biting, scratching, digging, jumping, running, frolicking, urinating, defecating, vomiting or otherwise injures, damages, soils, defaces, or befouls any vomiting

person, lawn, tree, shrub, person, lawn, tree, snrub, plant, building, street, sidewalk or other public or private property without the permission of the property owner or person in charge of

such property.

C) which behaves in such manner or is otherwise disposed so as to constitute a public nuisance.





Rumor has it that certain players in the Thursday night softball game have questioned--or even objected to--the term "Old-Timers." Rita Price Simpson advises, "Anyone over twenty-two is an 'Old-Timer'. And if you're not one yet--just wait--you will be!"

I wonder if anyone not involved in preparing for the Egg Festival realizes how much work goes into planning it. I'm just beginning to see, myself. owning property within the Town of Akron were contacted about forming the holding company. All seven of them accepted the responsibility and the Akron Town Building Corporation was formed. The original members of the holding company were: Howard Van Scoy, president; Ann Allen, Leon Kindig, Kevin Deardorff, Mike Tilden, Anita Stephens and Mark Hartzler. Later, Dick Drudge replaced Kevin Deardorff and Joe Day replaced Mike Tilden. The holding company actually owns the building, with the town making a payment every six months. After 21 years, the property will be deeded to the Town of Akron.

With financing secured, the board was able to continue with plans for construction. They advertised for bids in July of '87, and received four. Ziolkowski Construction, of Mishawaka, was selected in August to build the structure.

selected in August to build the structure.

At about this time the board encountered its only real public objections to the building. Three large, stately oak trees grew on the property along Rochester Street and controversy arose concerning their removal. According to Jack Miller, the building's engineers and tree experts were consulted and the board concluded the trees must come down.

The fall of 1987 brought the election of a new town board comprised of Bob Allen, president; Rod Conner and Chuck Sterk. Sarah Jane Sutton was re-elected but because of health problems later resigned and was replaced by Jean Conner. This board took over the building project in January of '88 and saw it through to its completion.

through to its completion.

The ground breaking for the structure was held on June 6,

1988 and construction actually began on June 13.
The building was completed in October 10, 1989, well ahead of Dr. Hoff's stipulated 50 years, and occupied by the end of

of Dr. Hoff's stipulated 50 years, and occupied by the end of that year.

Having the fire department, police department and EMS headquartered in the same building has proven to be a great asset to these emergency services. All agree that the three departments benefit from their proximity to each other and are better able to serve the community. Akron Town Marshall Tim Fleck has said, "The new building makes it easier for the three departments to work together." The fire department runs with the police on personal injury accidents, and the police accompany the firemen on runs to assist with traffic control. Each of the three departments are always aware when the other has a call and is available to help if needed.

Completion of the new town building required a great deal of dedication and hard work on the part of all involved. Jack Miller reports that during his presidency the town board held eight meetings concerning the building in 1986 and twenty-eight in 1987. He says, "I'm very proud to have been able to serve the community. It was a good experience and I'm proud of what we accomplished." All members of both town boards, the holding company, the department heads and all others who were involved with the project deserve a big pat on the back for a job well done. The people of Akron have a town hall they can be proud of for many years to come.

Profile of Mike

Mike Hoyt, Industrial Arts teacher at Mentone, has been teaching and coaching in Tippecanoe Valley School Cooperation since 1974. During that time, his students have turned out an impressive array of hand crafted furniture, including fine tables and chests. Usually displayed during the Christmas and spring and chests. Mike feels the present Industrial Arts program at Tippecanoe Valley is exceptional but he fears for its future. "It's in jeopardy," he says. "We have one semester classes now, but, depending on funding, the classes might be cut to nine weeks. We just can't accomplish in nine weeks what we do in a whole carester."

Mike feels it's important to continue the present program because "the kids get experience and have pride in their projects. It's exciting to me to see the kids develop and draw their own plans, to see them build a project from the beginning. It builds a lot of pride in kids, and that's what so many kids are lacking today. I think they need this. I'd like to see it continue."

A 1963 graduate of Nappanee High School, where he grew up, Mike says he learned responsibility by helping his dad on his milk route. "I had to get up early and tussle ten gallon milk cans six days a week. I also had a lawn-care service. I mowed twenty-five yards a week. Those jobs kept me out of trouble!"

In spite of his heavy work schedule, Mike had time to participate in football, basketball and track in high school. He remembers the 1963 basketball season as special. "That year we beat Elkart Central in the sectional!" Mike feels it's important to continue the present program

Mike began college at Vincennes, where he was a distance runner. But, after a year, he moved on to Indiana State University at Terre Haute, and he gave up running to spend more time on studies. Two fine Industrial Arts college instructors, Guy Conrad and Calvin Stutzman, greatly influenced

his future by encouraging him to major in Industrial Arts. Mike graduated from ISU in 1968.

Mike's first teaching job was at Jackson Township School near Valparasio. The following year they consolidated with Chesterton and remained Chesterton High School. He taught there until 1973.

Mike had met his future wife, Diane, at Tippy Dance Hall. A graduate of Mississinewa High School, Diane had received her bachelor's and master's degrees in Home Economics from Ball State University

By 1973, although they were settled comfortably and Mike had tenure in one of the highest paying school corporations in the state, Mike and Diane felt they were facing a tough decision. With two small children, Jeff and Jennifer, they were living in a high crime urban area. It wasn't what they wanted for their children.

So, with a lot of faith, and without another job, Mike resigned from his secure position at Chesterton. "I knew if I didn't do it then, I never would."

After teaching the next year at Argos, Mike says, "Robert Forbes (then TVSC School Superintendent) called me on the last Forbes (then TVSC School Superintendent) called me on the last day of school. He was very persuasive. I never applied. He knew exactly how many miles I drove to school and what sports I coached. I told him 'I'm not looking for a job.' He said, 'You will be when I'm done talking to you!'"

"I came-here the same year Charlie Smith was hired. I helped coach football and had seventh grade basketball. I taught junior high shop one-half day and high school shop one-half day- in the old school bus garage "

the old school bus garage."

One of Mike's most vivid memories of those years is April 3, 1974. "I was waiting for Don Craig to pick me up for independent basketball practice at the Talma gym. When Don didn't show up, I started on alone. But, I never made it to the gym." What he did do was barely miss the devastating tomado that destroyed, among other things, Don Craig's home and the Talma gym. "The next day I couldn't find a direct route to Argos. There were trees over the road everyplace. So, I helped

clean up the mess at Don's place."

Through the years, Mike and Diane, who has taught Home Ec at Tippecanoe Valley for several years, have had a variety of schedules. Both have taught divided days between the various TVSC schools. Mike has coached a variety of sports and classes. He is presently seventh and eighth grade football coach as well as sixth grade girls' basketball coach. "But," he says, "that will probably change next year. I've been involved with coaching every year since I've been here and I really enjoy it."

Mike's other interests are painting houses and farming. He hires about five men each summer for a painting crew. "I really enjoy the summer painting," he says. "The contacts with people and the opportunity to see the countryside."

and the opportunity to see the countryside."

The Hoyts raise cattle on their farm. The biggest advantage of farming has been the whole family's interest in and participation in 4-H. "It's always been a real family activity. But, Diane takes the brunt of it. When a wife teaches full-time, raises a big garden and still has to cook and clean, it's really not fair. It's hard for the working mother. She's busier than I am and deserves a lot of credit."

The Hoyts are having the satisfaction now of seeing their way.

The Hoyts are having the satisfaction now of seeing their way of life pay off for their children. Jeff, who worked for U.S.Air and in the fire restoration business since high school graduation three years ago, is going to attend Cedarville College full-time this fall, with an interest in Christian Counseling. Jennifer, a Student elementary classroom aide in her senior year, will attend Vincennes University, preparing to follow her parents into

teaching.

The specialty of the house is Bar-B-Que Country Style Ribs. Prepared according to owner Steven Sloane's secret recipe, the ribs are served in either a single portion dinner or all you can eat. The menu also offers steaks, pork chops, shrimp and catfish. "All my meats are cut fresh, never frozen," Steve says. He also plans to serve an all you can eat, broasted chicken special on Wednesday evenings. For the lunch hour, daily specials such as beef and noodles, meatloaf, spaghetti, or lasagna will be featured. "I have a rotating menu of 20 different specials, so customers won't see the same things week after week." Steve

Something new Sloane's is introducing to the Akron community is free delivery of lunch items to businesses and factories within a couple mile radius of the downtown area.

Having worked in a factory, himself, for several years, Steve understands how short a lunch break can seem. 'People don't have the extra 15 or 20 minutes it takes to get some place," he says. "Now they can call their order in and I can have it there for them. It gives them a little bit more of a break." All menu items are available for carry out.

While the 107 East Rochester St. location has housed a bar for several decades, it had been closed for over a year when Steve purchased it. Study recommends middle school for Valley

The possibility of a building program to construct centralized middle school next to the high school was discussed at the special public meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley School Board on June

Dr. Alex C. Moody and Dr. Robert Boyd of the Bureau of School Services of Indiana State University presented the results of a study commissioned by the board last fall. The study was based on demographic factors including projected the academic enrollment. program, the existing facilities and the financial status of the school corporation.

recommended 77,500 square foot structure to serve 500 sixth, seventh and eighth grade students, with completion to coincide with the pay-off of the current high school bond issue in 1994.

The building could be either a separate structure or be built to "wrap around" the high school. The study proposed school. The study proposed using the high school lunch room but building a separate gym for the middle school.

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

Whatever Happened to . . . Herb King

Herb King, son of Darrell and Mary Ann King, Mentone, will
be remembered by high school football fans as one of
Tippecanoe Valley's football All-Staters on the Championship team of 1980.

Today, Herb is Head Football Coach and Athletic Director, responsible for all athletic events, at North Putnam Junior-Senior High School in Roachdale, Indiana, where he lives with his wife, Nancy, and children, Ashley, a third-grader and Jordan, one year

Herb is rightfully proud of the record he has compiled in his short time at North Putnam. "The past season we had the best record in the school's history. We were 10-3, won the school's

first sectional, first regional, and lost in the semi-state to the eventual State Champs, S. Decatur, by three points.

Herb says, "It's been very interesting at N. Putnam. "When I interviewed for the job, a board member told me, 'You do realize you won't win any ballgames with the team coming

up?""
"We lost the first five games to state rated opponents. Our competition is very strong, similar to the Tippecanoe Valley area. We were rated fourth, which is where we ended up." In two years, he's won more ballgames than N. Putnam had won in the previous six years combined.

Herb notes he had three All-Staters on his team, besides the quarterback, who threw the ball for over 1800 yards. All four are returning seniors. So, although they have moved up from 1A to 2A, putting them into one of the toughest sectionals in the state, he believes they have excellent potential for next year

he believes they have excellent potential for next year. Herb says his present position is very challenging, but he misses teaching. He expects to teach a computer class next semester, in addition to his current duties, and, although he intends to stay in coaching, he says, "I enjoyed the classroom and someday I will return to it, just coach and teach."

As a child, Herb sang with his family, "The King Family," Darrell, Mary Ann, Herb, Kathleen, Marilyn, Phil, John and Sam, all over Northern Indiana and in Georgia and Florida. "We would sing at churches on the way when we went on vacation," he recalls. Relatives who knew we were coming would make arrangements for us."

(Another 1985 graduate was Herb's neighbor, Leafy Hudson).

Now that the weather is warmer and children are spending more time outside, the postal service is reminding parents of the importance of safety rules for children to use when near mail vehicles and on postal service property. Mentone Postmaster Mike Skoczylas urges parents to assist the postal service in its safety efforts by going over some basic rules with their children. "Please be aware of the great interest children have in mail trucks," says Mr... Skoczylas. "We know that they love getting mail for

mom or dad, and this can be a fun and safe experience for them if they are made aware of and observe a few simple safety rules." Postmaster Postmaster Skoczylas recommends that the following rules be adopted by every family with children:

Never send children out to get the mail from the letter carrier.

When children are outside they should never walk in front of, or come from behind the mail truck.

Children should stand behind the mailbox until after the carrier drives away.

Children should be discouraged from using bikes and hot wheels as a "ladder" to reach the mailbox.

Children should not follow the mail truck on their bikes, skateboards, or on foot.

Children should not play on

ostal property at any time.

If asked to pick up mail for their family from the post office box section, children should either be given the key for the family post office box; be taught the combination; or if necessary, be given written authorization signed by parents. Children should not play in the lobby area; nor should they attempt to open any other post office boxes.

Vernon "Bud" Waymire and his wife, Martha, both retired in January of 1990, but in January of '91, they both returned to work: Bud as Henry Township Trustee and Martha as his

work: Bud as Henry Townsnip Trustee and Wartha as his secretary.

"I like to get involved," Bud says. "I'm no politician, but I like to see good government. If I can help in any way, shape nor form, well I guess, that's my goal. I want to be honest. I'm not in this for the money. I'm not indebted to anybody," he says with a smile, "other than my parents and my wife."

A township trustee has many responsibilities. "There's a lot more involved than I thought," Bud says, "I'm a rooky yet, but I'm willing to learn!" He has been attending a series of training sessions designed to teach township trustees the necessary information on real estate.

information on real estate. Each spring from March 1 to May 15, the assessments must, be handled for the township. Individuals, farmers and businesses must all file Individual Tangible Personal Property Assessment Returns with the township trustee covering such items as farm

Returns with the township trustee covering such items as failing machinery, business equipment, mobile homes, etc.

Former Henry Township Trustee, Claire Ellis, has been helping with the assessments, as he has done since 1972. "We've had help from the past three trustees," Bud says.

The trustee also handles the financing of the fire department. "The fire department is our biggest expense," Bud says. "The insurance costs are terrific." Funds are collected from other trustees, that the department provides service to and the townships that the department provides service to and the firemen are paid once a year.

Administering poor relief is another of the trustee's many responsibilities. This includes helping needy citizens who meet specific guidelines with their rent, utilities and medical payments as well as distributing surplus food commodities. The food items are made available through Real Services of St. Joseph County and include items such as butter, cheese, flour, green beans, raisins and rice. Eligibility to receive the surplus is green beans, raisins and nee. Engiointy to receive the surplus is determined by income and age. Bud has visited local factories to explain the program and the eligibility requirements. The commodities are received and distributed at the trustee's office in the Akron Town Building. Volunteers assist the Waymires with the program and Martha says, "It all goes pretty fast."

Any excess food that is not handed out is donated to the Ministerial Assoc., local food bank or Helping Hands. Concerning poor relief, Bud says, "We're fortunate here, that

we don't have the problems of other places. We want to help people. That's why we're here.

In some instances, community service is necessary to qualify In some instances, community service is necessary to quairy for relief. In that case, the trustee must coordinate the program. Managing the Dog Fund is the trustee's job as well. Dog taxes are collected from people who own dogs and payments are made to farmers who experience a loss of livestock from dog attacks.

In addition to these and other duties, the trustee must also repare the township's budget and file quarterly reports with the State Board of Accounts.

"Being trustee is almost a full-time job," Martha says.

This is not Bud's first experience with local government. Previously he served on the town board for eight years. "I think it's everybody's duty, at some time, in some capacity to serve the public." Bud says, "I've seen government in other countries and this is sure better!"

Before his retirement, Bud worked for several years in a machine shop and for 18 years at Miller and Sons in Silver Lake. Martha worked at Chamberlins for 17-1/2 years and then at Wen

Martha worked at Chamberlins for 17-1/2 years and then at Wen from 1983 until her retirement in '90.

A native of Frankfurt, Germany, Martha met Bud when he was in the army and she went to work at the mess hall. 'I didn't know any English," Martha says, "but I learned it real quick in the mess hall. Of course, it was all the wrong words." She adds, "The people in my neighborhood sort of looked down on my mother for awhile when Vermon and I started dating because he was in the military redice and they weren't sure what was going was in the military police and they weren't sure what was going

to transpire." But he won them over by bringing fruit and candy to the neighborhood children. "And right up to the last day, my

mother didn't think he was really going to marry me."

"She was a war bride," Bud says. "I liberated her or maybe" he chuckles, "she captured me!"

Because Martha was a German citizen and Vern was American, the wedding required an enormous amount of paperwork and red tape. In fact, the Waymires were married twice, once on August 6, 1948, in a civil service and again on August 7, in the church August 7, in the church.

Martha wore a dress that her mother had sewn for her from a parachute Bud had provided. His mother sent the thread and zipper from the states because they were not available in Germany.

When she married, Martha knew she would be leaving her home and her mother behind. (Her father and two brothers had nome and her mother been killed in the war.) But she had no idea how soon. "He came home on Friday at 5:00 and said, "Can you be ready to go at noon on Sunday?" Martha remembers. So only 22 days after the wedding, the Waymires left Germany.

They lived in both Wabash and Miami Counties before

moving to Akron in 1971.

They have three sons: Kurt and Max both live in Akron, and Kerry lives in Phoenix, Arizona. A fourth son, Michael, was killed in Viet Nam on the Fourth of July in 1971. They also have two grandsons and a granddaughter.

canning.

In spite of the fact that she lost the fingers on her left hand in In spite of the fact that she lost the infigers of her left hand in an accident several years ago, Martha also enjoys knitting and crocheting. "Knitting is better. I can hold a needle here and a needle here," she explains. "I have to crochet on my lap because I can't hold the stuff that I already have done. I love to knit!" But adds, "She probably does more needlework now than before she had the accident with her hand."



Galaxy I Satellite to move

Due to the scheduled launch of other replacement satellites over the next two years, the Galaxy I Satellite will move from its over the next two years, the Galaxy Fasterine will move from his present location. This move is required by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) (ORB1988) to accommodate G.E.'s new C-4 satellite as well as to avoid unacceptable interference from G.E.'s C-1 satellite which is scheduled to be moved in the summer of 1991.

The Galaxy I move will start June 21, 1991 at approximately 10 a.m. and will be completed on June 28, 1991. The move will consist of a seven day drift with a small thrust on the spacecraft to initiate drift on June 21 and again on June 28 to stop Galaxy I

This move could possibly cause interference on the channels received from this satellite, such as CNN, ESPN, WGN, The Discovery Channel, HBO, Cinemax, etc. due to realignment of the Sammons Communications dish to coordinate with the change in Galaxy I's position.



Akron Taekwondo, USA

By Tonia Weller

Located upstairs, behind Harris Drugs, Akron Taekwondo teaches its students courtesy, control, self-respect and how to work with others, in addition to the Korean form of karate.
When owner Suzi Caudill started the school five years ago,

one of her first students was her husband, Jack. He proved to be a very capable student and is now an instructor at the school. "We like working together," Suzi says. "We have a lot fun teaching together.

Tackwondo is a family affair for the Caudills. Suzi, who will tackwondo is a family affair for the Caudinis. Suzi, who will test for her fourth degree black belt after completing the required waiting period, and Jack, who just received his third degree black belt on June 14, have been married 22 years and have three children. Dustin, 17, has a second degree black belt and Brian, 19, and Jennifer, 14, both have earned first degree black

Taekwondo, which in Korean means "way of the hand and the foot", uses 70% foot action and 30% hand action. Karate, on the other hand, which means "empty hand", relies mostly on hands. Suzi says, "Taekwondo uses the fancy high kicks. We use the feet because the legs are longer and stronger and give you the element of surprise.

Besides the school in Akron, the Caudills also teach classes at the YMCA in Warsaw and give demonstrations at area schools. They teach eight classes each week to approximately forty

students, from age five through adults.

Affiliated with the American Tackwondo Association, headquartered in Little Rock, Arkansas, Akron Tackwondo is one of 200 schools nation wide. The organization has a total of 150,000 members.

The comfortable uniforms used for taekwondo resemble white pajamas. The "belts" refer to the ties at the waists of the wrap style jackets, with different colors being awarded as skills increase. Students begin as a white belt and work their way up through orange, yellow, camo, green, purple, blue, brown, red, 1/2red-1/2black and finally, to a black belt. This is not the end of the process, however: there are nine degrees of black belts to be the process, however: there are nine degrees of black belts to be earned. After achieving each degree, students must wait the specified amount of time before they are allowed to test for the next degree: one year between first and second, two years between second and third, three years between third and fourth and so on. The process requires at least 36 years to advance from a first to a ninth degree black belt.

Akron Taekwondo holds testing for advancement every eight Akron Taekwondo noids testing for advancement every eight weeks. Students perform before a panel of five to seven judges, sometime including school principals and others from the community. In addition to their performance on test day, students are also evaluated on their classroom performance, ability to work with others and overall attitude. A student can advance to the next belt color with either a "recommended" or the slightly better "decided" ranking.

"Testing is a very good thing for the students," Suzi says.

"They learn how to handle pressure and stress. One of the best things about tackwondo is the improved self-confidence and testing is a big part of that. You're very proud of what you've accomplished."

In the lower degrees, students primarily work on their "forms". These consist of controlled movements and are the basic techniques for blocks and punches. The first form has 18 movements.

Students also learn "one-steps", which involve working with a partner to learn distance and control. They work on learning how close they can come to their partner without making contact. "I always tell the kids, 'Anybody can kick someone and hurt them, that doesn't take any skill' but it does take skill and practice to be able to kick full power and stop an inch from somebody's

nose without touching them," Suzi says.
As students advance to the camo belt, they add "free-sparing" This is limited contact fighting and again teaches control. "No one gets hurt," Jack says. Suzi adds, "It wouldn't be any fun one gets find, Jack says. Suzi adds, it wouldn't be any tuni-coming to class and getting hurt. Then you wouldn't want to come back. The contact is very controlled."

After achieving a ranking of brown belt, students learn to break boards. In order to advance to a red belt, a student must

break at least two stations of boards, one by hand technique and one by foot. The school runs through a lot of boards. Suzi jokes, "We could have built a house with all the boards we've broken!"

Courtesy plays a big role in tackwondo. Students are required to call their instructors "sir" and "ma'am" and everyone is expected to be polite and helpful to everyone else. "The higher ranks help out with the lower ones," Jack say. "Everybody helps were the transfer of the same the same transfer of the same transfer."

In order to become an instructor, you must first attain a first degree black belt and then complete 200 hours of assistant teaching under a certified instructor. Suzi did her assisting in Rochester with Michael Barnett, where she first began taking classes seven years ago. In addition, she spent a week in Arkansas training with Master Lee. Both written exams and physical skill testing was involved. "It was a rough week!" she

Recently, Suzi received her certification as a rape prevention instructor. She will be giving programs and demonstration to various groups on how to prevent rape.

The Caudills and their students also attend several tournaments each year, as the numerous trophies lining the wall of their workout room prove. New Blood Warmer at KCH

A new Rapid Infusion Blood Warmer in the Kosciusko Community Kosciusko Hospital Emergency Department will allow physicians and nurses to administer a bag of blood in two to five minutes, a major improvement over previous manual procedures.

A single unit of blood or intravenous solution warmed to body temperature and infused in 30 seconds. This means 1000 cc's of fluid can be given in five to eight minutes.

Kim Finch, Department Emergency Director, says this is especially important in multiple trauma with blood loss and/or shock. She says it improves monitoring capabilities and better allows surgeons to stabilize patients before a transfer.

Previous infusions take as long as 20-40 minutes.

The warmer alone can be used for hypothermic patients. warmer/infuser can also be used in surgery to pump in blood as fast as it is being lost.

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



After serving twenty years in the U.S. Air Force, Terry Reed and his family are happy to be back in Mentone. Terry says, "I just want to settle down and become a real-life citizen of the community. Now we can say, 'this is home.'"

Terry started school in Warsaw, at Center Ward on Main Street, where the new Zimmer building is presently going up. When he was in the third grade, his family moved to the country, into the Milburn School, a one-room brick schoolhouse, where Grandpa Brown went to school," that was converted to a

house.

Terry has happy memories of living in the school house. "I enjoyed the country," he says. He remembers having to heat water on the stove and helping his dad fill the fuel tank with kerosene for the heating stove. "We had the best drinking water there that I've ever tasted," he says. "We kept a tin cup hanging by the pump. The County Highway men used to stop when they went by just to get a drink from that well. And I remember how the wind used to how!. I miss those days. He immediately went to see the Air Force recruiter, passed the battery of tests and, two days after graduation from computer school, May 7, 1970, Terry joined the Air Force.
"Debbie wasn't thrilled," Terry says. "She never liked service

ronowing basic training at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas, Terry was stationed at Chanute Field, Rantoul, Illinois, where he received training in Aerospace Ground Equipment—"basically mechanics." Deb soon joined him in Rantoul and they stayed there until November, when he was transferred to Beale Air Force Base in Northern California.

Terry's next assignment was at Lockbourne Air Force Base, Columbus, Ohio. While there, he was sent for six months TDY (temporary duty), arriving back home in June, 1973, just three days after their second son, Dathan was born. Sent back to Chanute Field, Terry instructed in Tech School there for the next five and one-half years. From there, he went to

Germany. Deb joined him in Germany in May, 1979, and they lived there until April, 1982.

Terry says he and Deb have fond memories of Germany. Both boys attended the base school there. Ed learned to play soccer from their German neighbor boys. "The boys attended German holiday festivals with their German friends and we took the German boys to American holiday celebrations on the base.

Both their parents, George and June read and Wayne and Phyllis Bowser, visited them in Germany and Terry and Deb showed them the sights. They have gotten to know the "twin

towns" of Traben and Trabach, located across from each other on the Mosel River quite well. A bridge connected the two identical towns. "On Sunday afternoons, we would sit on

The Reed's daughter, Tara, was born in Germany in August, 1980, just one day before Grandpa and Grandma Reed arrived to

visit.

When Terry and Deb returned to Germany, they went to Nellis Air Force Base, Las Vegas, Nevada, where there son, Ryan was born in January 1983. Terry was assigned to the F117A Stealth Fighter Project, "the one that performed so well in Panama and the Gulf. My job was to help maintain it," he says. "We did all pilot pre-training. It was all nighttime flying over the desert.

over the desert."

Finally, in 1985, Terry was assigned to the B1 Program, the "latest and greatest Air Force Bomber," at Ellsworth Air Force Base in South Dakota. While stationed there, Terry had an unusual experience. He happened to be on hand when another Airman grabbed some hot wires and Terry, seeing he was about to be electrocuted, "reached down to pull him off, just wrapped his hands around his rib cage, yanked and away we went." For his act of bravery, he was awarded The Airman's Medal, given for an act of bravery involving the endangerment of one's life.

In May 1990, Terry was honorably discharged and the family

In May, 1990, Terry was honorably discharged and the family at last returned to Mentone. Terry is employed at Autoworks in Warsaw, and Deb works at Mentone School. The family is at

home on N. Broadway Street.

Terry and Deb's son, Dathan, graduated from Tippecanoe Valley High School this spring. Eddi, a member of the Air Force Reserve, and his wife, Amy, are expecting their second child

Terry's plans for the future include running for the Mentone Town Board. "The whole family is glad to be back here," he says. After the military lifestyle, we find Mentone a little laid back, but we're enjoying it. This is home. We plan to stay."

Retired educator Roy Meredith has been chosen a Grand
Marshal of this year's Fourth of July parade.
During his 43 year career in education, Mr. Meredith, 85, served as a teacher and principal at Akron High School. From 1963 until his retirement in 1971, he was the assistant superintendent of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation.
Bom and raised in the Beaver Dam area, he graduated from Beaver Dam High School in 1924 and from Indiana University in 1928. He received his Masters degree from IU in 1934.
His teaching career hegan in Illinois, where he served as a

His teaching career began in Illinois, where he served as a teaching principal for 12 years. When the position of principal at Akron High School became available, Roy and his wife, the former Evelyn Blesch, returned to their home town.
During World War II, Roy served for three years as a captain in the U.S. Army. As a cargo officer, he made eight trips across the Atlantic during the war.

When the state mandated the consolidation of schools in the early 60's, Roy acted as the "unappointed co-ordinator" of the movement to consolidate Akron, Mentone and Burket Schools. "It wasn't whether we wanted to or not, it was a forced affair," Roy remembers. "This corporation wasn't founded on love of each other. Mentone didn't want to go to Warsaw and Akron didn't want to go to Rochester," he recalls. He feels the success of the athletic teams and the swimming nool at the high school of the athletic teams and the swimming pool at the high school were the unifying forces that forged a successful school system from the former rivals.

Besides his work with the schools, Roy has also been very active in other community organizations. He is the charter president, and still an active member, of the Akron Lions Club, which he helped form in 1947. He is a past-president of the Akron Chamber of Commerce. He is a director of the Fulton Akron Chamber of Commerce, he is a directly of the Tulton County Local Housing Authority, on the Board of Directors for the Council on Aging, the legislative chairman of the Retired Teachers Association of Fulton County and a member of the Manchester Chapter of the Phi Delta 'Kappa Education Fratemity. Roy is also the president of the Fulton County Hospital Association, the holding company responsible for Westleway Hospital Woodlawn Hospital.

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While he was certified to teach both math and social studies, it is American History, especially the precivil war era, that interests him most. Roy feels the best way to keep history from being boring to students is to teach the interesting incidents that happened and were important but weren't necessarily recorded in the history books. One of his favorite bits of history involves the 1859 Republican Convention, and Abraham Lincoln and his opponent Seward. "Lincoln's followers hired the champion hog caller in Illinois to lead cheers at the convention," Roy says. "The cheers were loud enough to convince the delegates that Lincoln was the one the people wanted!" If it weren't for the hog caller, history might have been different.

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Recently, Roy spent some time tape recording recollections from his youth for the oral history program at the Akron Library. One of his memories involves driving cattle and sheep through downtown Akron. "My grandfather was a stock buyer, way back when. He bought livestock during the week and then on weekends, my cousin and I would drive them down the main streets of Akron to the railroad stockyard." Roy adds, "There weren't any big trucks then, it was the only way you could get them to town!"

The best advice Roy has for teachers today is the same advice he received during his first year teaching from the superintendent at Danville, IL. "He said, "There are just three F's in teaching, be friendly, be fair and be devilishly firm!" I always gave that same advice to others." Roy adds, however, "There have been too many restrictions put on teachers to have discipline in the classroom today. Too many laws and too many regulations. Of course it's an entirely different social environment now." He feels the enormous increase in single parent homes and too many hours spent watching television are causing many of the problems with today's students. "You don't see kids out playing like you used to," Roy says. "Now they come home and watch TV."

Roy was surprised to learn he'd been selected as Grand Marshal for the parade. "I was sitting in Harris Drugs, when a young lady came up to me and told me," he says.

Although his wife, Evelyn, jokes, "They probably couldn't find anyone older, who hadn't done it before," it s certainly a fitting tribute to one of Akron's most distinguished and deserving citizens.



Scenes Around Town

"You can't go home again," claims author Thomas Wolfe. Well, forgive my impertinence, Mr.. Wolfe, but I believe we

It all started last year. I called at the funeral home when the mother of my girlhood chum, Marilyn Klauk Hulet, died. Marilyn and I had only seen each other briefly two or three times after we married and went our own busy ways. But, somehow, that funeral home visit was different. We agreed to

meet again when we would have more time.

Past Sidney's eighth "wonder of the world," the brick mansion that took about thirty years to complete. Past the spot where our white frame, shuttered church had stood and the house that was built for our parsonage when we were in high school. Past the old garage Marilyn's Uncle Arley ("Switz" Sisk) used to run, where when we each had a nickel, we braved his teasing of us by calling us "Maryland" and "Cabbage Plant" to splurge on candy bars on our way to school. And up the hill to the erstwhile heart of the community, the school--or what's left of it. The main part is gone now, but to our surprise, the front steps are still there, hidden in the grass, beckoning the sentimental visitor to travel through time "back to those golden days of yesteryear."

But, the exciting part of the day was the walk west down Arthur Street to the sites of our old homes. Only huge stumps remain now of the lofty maple trees that shaded the Klauks' little dollhouse home. After some thought, we were able to determine

Then--on down the street to my house. It's a full city block away from the nearest house, at the end of the street. A GTE building sits there now. Steve Yates, of Melbourne, Australia, who came to Indiana recently to attend his son, Shawn's, graduation from Warsaw High School, and to visit Mentone friends, lived in Mentone and attended school here in the early 1970's.

When asked what brought him to Mentone originally, Steve replied, "I was a seventeen year old spoiled brat." His family's impending move from Puerto Rico to Adelaide, Australia between his junior and senior years in school had upset him. "I felt back because I couldn't graduate with the people I'd gone to school with so many years. So, I ran away from home."

Steve's parents were brought together when his father, Air Force Sgt. Gene Yates, from Kansas, met and married his English mother, Pauline, in England in 1950. After Steve's birth in 1954, they were relocated to Omaha, Nebraska, then to Madrid, Spain, and from there to Roswell, New Mexico.

Although Steve's memories of those early years aren't vivid, he remembers he spoke fluent Spanish while in Spain, from ages 4-7. "I do remember castles there," he says. "And we used to go to the Riveria on the Mediterranean, where I got third degree burns from too much sun." During that time he also had eleven stitches taken in his head from wounds received while diving into the bathtub!

It was in Puerto Pice that Steve met Mentone's Larry Florer.

It was in Puerto Rice that Steve met Mentone's Larry Flenar family, also in the Air Force, and became fast friends with their son, Rick. "We were very close. They considered me another son, and always told me to come and see them when they came back to the States. But, I'm sure they never dreamed I would come so soon.

It was 1971 when Steve's father retired and chose to move his It was 1971 when Steve's father retired and chose to move his family to Australia. "He saw it as the 'land of opportunity,' as people used to see the Old West." Steve went along, but only for six weeks. With only \$100, "I ran away from home," he says. I stayed in the YMCA in Sydney. I 'rang' my mom in the morning and asked for bus fare home. Then I 'rang' her in the afternoon and said I wouldn't be there. I was going to America. I didn't see her again for three and one-half years. It nearly killed her "

After arriving in New York, where he met with a friend, Steve hitchhiked to New Orleans, then to Indianapolis and on to Rochester. I 'rang' the Flenars from Rochester and said, 'I'm here.' They said 'You are what!' But, they more than made me welcome. They are very nice people."

The Flenars picked Steve up in Rochester, took him home with them in September, 1971 and he enrolled in Mentone High School. Steve's first impression of Mentone was that it was comfortable and the people were friendly. "Everyone sort of took me to their bosoms. It was a big change, from traveling with the Air Force, to a more domestic life."

Steve worked at M&R Egg Company, then, after marriage to Sherry McGowen, her uncle helped him land a job at Boise Cascade, a trailer factory, where he worked two years. Steve remembers that as "good pay and good companionship." He worked "lots of overtime," but still found time to form softball and basketball teams with his co-workers.

and basketball teams with his co-workers.

But, after son Shawn was born, Steve had a great desire to return to Australia. "We were saving money for that," he says.

The young family arrived in Melbourne, Australia in 1974. At

first, Steve worked shifting pallets and loading trucks in a store. After about a year, Sherry and Shawn returned to the United States and Steve moved to Perth, where he did industrial cleaning for a year. Then, he returned to Melbourne and, for

seven years, ran his own industrial cleaning business.

Steve's business finally became 'too successful,' causing him back trouble. So, he went to work for the chocolate factory where his father had worked before his death in 1976.

The last four years of Steve's employment with the chocolate factory, he traveled for them as Marketing Manager, getting to see many places most people wouldn't see in a lifetime. New Guinea, Tahiti, Fiji, Midway, Guadalcanal and most of Asia are just some of the places he has visited.

Steve has also seen most of America. Through the years he has come over to be with Shawn as often as possible, visiting with the Dale McGowen's, Flenars, and other friends while here and touring the country. Dale and Vi McGowen accompanied Shawn on one of several trips to Australia, and they all have seen much of that country. seen much of that country.

Although Steve retains his U.S. Citizenship, he is a permanent resident of Australia, which means he is compelled by law to vote in their elections. Anyone who doesn't vote is assessed a \$20 fine. Two other laws of note are that both adults and children must wear helmets when riding bicycles and Australia

passed the first seat belt law sixteen years ago.

Steve says Australia is a beautiful country, with much to see Steve says Australia is a beautiful country, with much to see and do. Melbourne's climate compares to that of Los Angeles. But, because there is more public transportation, without so many cars, there isn't much smog. "With population made up of Spanish, Chinese, Japanese, Greeks, Italians, English and more, Australia is today's 'melting pot,' as America used to be."

Steve says the recent American movies he's seen, including the Crocodile Dundee shows, The Man From Snow River, and

show starring Linda Evans, have portrayed Australia very realistically.

After looking up old friends from Puerto Rico, now living all over America, Steve will embark on the thirteen hour flight from Los Angeles back to Australia, to return to his present job at Ormond College in Melbourne.

Steve feels family is all important in anyone's life, and he's

already looking forward to Shawn's next visit to Australia.
