Forrest Miner, Larry Pyle, Mary Boggs and Freeda Witham will share the honors as fellow-Grand Marshals of the 1992 Mentone Egg Festival Parade. Together, these four distinguished people have devoted over 100 years to the stability and expansion of Farmers State Bank, which celebrates its 100th anniversary this year. In keeping with this distinction, the parade theme is "A Salute to Business and Industry."

Bank President Forrest Miner has been with the bank the longest time, starting in 1950, after a short time as accountant for Smith Auto Works in Warsaw. A 1947 graduate of Mentone High School, he had graduated from International Business College in 1949.

A farm boy from Crystal Lake, Forrest had chosen to study math because it's dependable. "Two and two always equal four," he says. "I liked that." Forrest first worked as a bookkeeper and subsequently held "every position in the bank," until, in 1967, he was appointed president.

An enthusiastic Farmers State Bank historian, Forrest treasures a book of newspaper clippings, photographs and important letters put together by bank employees Joann Utter and Freeda Witham.

An avid golfer, Forrest lives in Warsaw. He is the father of four children: Brett, Golden Colorado; Christine, Laotio; Todd, Fort Scott, Kansas and Sally, Sidney, Indiana. He has five grandchildren.

Vice President Larry Pyle, with the bank 28 years, claims to be "a transient." Born in Danville, Illinois (because it had the closest hospital to his Indiana home), he subsequently lived near Covington, Kingman and, finally, near Waynetown, where he graduated in 1957.

Larry played high school basketball, but says, "in a class of sixteen everyone did." Possibly more important to him at the time was playing trumpet in the high school band.

Larry went to Purdue, where he "got a shock." He found it wasn't as easy as high school had been, and he had to "shape up or get out." But, shape up, he did. He knuckled down and did very well. "I had to change my whole attitude," he says.

After graduation, Larry worked a short time at a bank in Waynetown, then decided to try his luck at farming in Georgia. "I only stayed on the farm a year," he remembers, "but I owned it for ten."

Larry's next step was to advertise for work in the Indiana Banker's Association's newsletter. Employment at Farmers State resulted. He came her in November, 1963, but says his

anniversary is 1964.

Married to Mentone's former Sue Borton, Larry is the father of four: Jennifer Witham, Valparaiso; Lou Anne Guilford, West Palm Beach, Florida; Kevin, Akron and Brian at Purdue University. He and Sue have two grandchildren.

Through the Shriner's, Larry has been able to realize a lifelong desire. True to his Scottish ancestry, which he has traced, he has learned to play the bagpipes.

Larry says, "When I came here we put a lot of boxes in the attic because we weren't sure we would stay. We haven't unpacked them yet, but I think I'll stay!"

Vice President Mary Wilson Boggs has also been at the bank 28 years. Born in one of two houses near Mentone—either her parents' or her grandparents', she isn't sure which—she says, "I've gone to every school in the corporation but Burket!" Starting at Beaver Dam, she moved to Akron, where she attended two and one half years. She missed the following year because of having polio. Her next move was to West Wayne (now Washington), Warsaw. From there she went to Talma, then to Mentone in sixth grade, where "I've been ever since."

Mary played French horn and bassoon in the high school band and had the honor of being co-valedictorian with Marilyn Tucker at graduation in 1949.

After Mary graduated, she cleaned houses for awhile, until she took the position of secretary to Mentone High School Principal John Frederick. Her next job was at Manwarings for about a year, before coming to the bank in 1964.

"We had to run all incoming checks by calculator on my first job," she laughs. "And two people posted the statement and ledger. The girls today can't believe it!"

Having started dating Kenny Boggs in high school, Mary married him after graduation. They have two children, Kathy Bowser, La Grange and Marion in Georgia. They have four grandchildren.

Mary likes to mow and work in the flowers. She finds Mentone a quiet, wonderful place to live.

Vice President Freeda Kessler Witham has been with the bank for 23 years. She was born and raised on the farm (then a hatchery) where she has lived all her life except for a short time after marriage.

Freeda says, "We didn't come to town a lot. It seems like we were always working." But she has precious memories of school. "Dale Kelly was principal," she remembers. She played clarinet in high school band and remembers that they always won lots of contests.

Graduating in 1946, Freeda attended Purdue University one year, then married Rex Witham and settled down to raise their four children: Greg, Valparaiso; Susie Rentschler, Fulton; Janie Gard, Carmel and Sally Hearn, Chicago. She has five grandchildren.

Freeda hadn't planned to be a career woman, but she says, "You just follow the events of your life as you have to." For her, that meant starting at the bank in 1969, where she worked in bookkeeping two years. Since then she has been Forrest's secretary. "I enjoy working at the bank," she says.

The important things in Freeda's life are her church, the Church of Christ, and her family. "My most precious times have been with my children," she says.

"We go to all the grandchildren's school functions and they come home a lot."

Freeda says she finds it hard to believe the changes that have taken place in Mentone, such as loss of retail stores and some industry. But, "I like the dependability of Mentone people. Their values are high and we have produced high quality young people."

These four honorees, all originally Indiana farm people, have contributed immeasurably to the success of Farmers State Bank and the town of Mentone.

A CHILD'S INJURED TEETH

If you have a youngster who has an accident in which one or more of his primary teeth are injured and become discolored, the teeth may be able to be saved and returned to their natural color. Through a technique called labial pulpectomy, a hole is made in the front of the tooth and the dead tissue causing the discoloration is removed. The tooth is then filled with a white paste similar to that used in root canal therapy.

The hole in the tooth is covered with calcium hydroxide which hardens and forms a seal over the opening. Then the entire front surface of the tooth is covered with a bonding agent and matched in color to his other teeth.

It is important to the child's proper tooth development that his primary teeth stay in place until his permanent teeth are ready to erupt and replace them. Usually all of a child's 20 primary teeth have emerged by the time he is three years old. These teeth begin to loosen and come out between the ages of six and 13 and are replaced by permanent teeth.

He doesn't have a cemetery lot. He never had a tombstone. His earthly remains lay somewhere in a body-bag at the bottom of the Pacific Ocean. He grew up during the great depression and sometimes didn't have shoes to wear. He didn't worry about that. He worried, instead, about his little sisters' shoes. He was a bright, articulate young man with everything to live for. He freely joined the Navy December 9, 1941, understanding it could lead to the ultimate sacrifice...his life... and it did. He was my brother. He and the many thousands more who gave their lives made the world free for all of us who remained at home.

Within the last ten years, my sister said to me, "A day never goes by that I don't think of Maurice." The same is true for me. Memory is a wonderful thing. The Reverend Thomas Harmon, pastor of the Christian Fellowship of Atwood, spoke about "remembering" in his Memorial Day address at the Mentone Cemetery:

A Day Of Remembrance

PSALM 77:11 I will remember the deeds of the Lord; yes, I will remember your miracles of long ago.

The question today is, will Mentone continue to remember? God wants us to review and remember the blessings that He has done for each and every one of us. God told His people to review what He had done morning, noon and night. Our nation and our community asks that this be a time of review and remembrance.

It was springtime in 1866, just after the Civil War had devastated the South. A group of southerners did something extraordinary. They marched down the streets of what was left of their town, to a cemetery. There they decorated the graves of the soldiers. ALL the soldiers. Union as well as Confederate.

The mothers, daughters and widows buried their dead. Now they buried their hatred. The time for healing had come. IT WAS THE FIRST MEMORIAL DAY!

The nation decided almost 125 years ago that we should remember those who have served our country in time of conflict. We honor them with our presence; flags and flowers on their graves; prayers and patriotic music.

By our presence here, we say that we remember and appreciate what has been given. As we place the flags, they speak to us of the great dedication and commitment of these veterans. The flowers renew themselves each springtime, and as we place them, our devotion is renewed. With our prayers we continue to show our appreciation to God for the freedoms we still enjoy. The Battle Hymn of the Republic stirs our hearts in patriotic response and challenge.

We have freedom and prosperity today because of their service to the nation and to their community.

At the National Cemetery on Long Island, one of the nations' largest, it has become necessary to advertise for volunteers to place the flags on the graves of veterans, as the number of veteran volunteers has decreased. However, many of those who volunteer have no idea why they are there. One young man, a 13 year old Boy Scout, was asked if he understood why members of the troop were placing flags on the graves. He replied, "To get our service badge."

No doubt every flag and every headstone has a story behind it. These men and women many not have served their country by choice, but they did make a choice. That was, to serve the nation and defend the freedoms which we in Mentone have shared and enjoyed for many long years.

We are not able to be in Arlington Cemetery, Luxemburg, Normandy, Okinawa, or more recently, the sands of the desert. But we can assemble here to reflect on their service to this great nation, and to our community.

They have paved a road which we can safely walk today without fear. These veterans, whom we honor today, call out for us to remember. We are committed to this end.

Memorial Day is over another year, but we will continue to remember.

But it's left up to you to see they are obeyed.

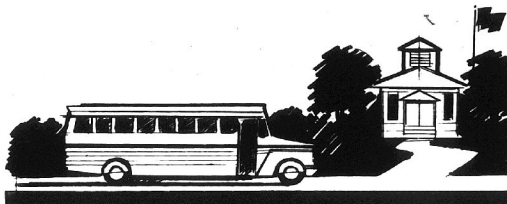

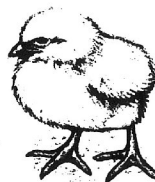

School Board Criticized, Public Hearing Date Set

The June 1 meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley school board may not have lasted very long, but the discussion certainly was heated.

Although notices printed in area newspapers stated it was to be a "special public" meeting, the school board's agenda didn't set aside any time for public comment. The eight or nine patrons in attendance who had come to address the board were not pleased by that fact.

The one item of business on the agenda was setting a date for the state required public hearing on the proposed middle school building project. By a 4-1 vote (Jeff Tilden voting no), the hearing was scheduled for June 15 at 7:30 p.m. in the Tippecanoe Valley High School lecture room. Immediately following the vote, board president Fred McSherry asked for a motion to adjourn.

That action brought Akron resident Joe Day to his feet with a request to address the board. While Day was making his request, a motion for adjournment was made and seconded. Before a vote could be taken Day demanded, "Are you denying my request to speak at this public meeting?"

McSherry told Day it was a special meeting specifically for the purpose of setting a hearing at which the public would be allowed to express opinions.

After Day persisted, McSherry said he would leave it up to the board to decide if Day could speak. Board member Jeff Tilden immediately stated he had no objections and other board members concurred.

In his statements to the board about the May 21 afternoon meeting at which the vote to build the new middle school was taken, Day said he felt misled. He pointed out that the motion to build was made by Mike McFarland, who is an appointed member and seconded by John Mellott, who was recently defeated for re-election. Day stated he felt newly elected board member Forrest Kantner should have had "the opportunity to express his views."

Day went on to criticize school board agendas where time for public comments is usually limited to a portion of the meeting just "after the bills are paid" and before the guest speaker. In a formal written request presented to McSherry, Day asked that in the future, audience input be allowed for each item on the agenda. He also requested a copy of the master contract for teachers and offered to pay copying expenses.

Mark Wise spoke next, saying he was disturbed to read about the decision to build in the paper. He also criticized the May 21 meeting saying, "It was a public meeting that wasn't very public." He then said of Joe Crill's statement expressing concern about appearing to sneak the vote past the public, "You hit the nail on the head...You did!"

In response to McSherry's statement that the board had been discussing the topic for 18 months, Wise said then "another few months wouldn't make much difference."

McSherry countered by saying that waiting would have sacrificed low interest rates. He said the board urges people to attend meetings so they can hear their comments.

That remark brought an angry response from Jim Saner who said, "Whatever we say goes in one ear and out the other. You've slapped us in the face and it doesn't matter what people think. You guys treat us like trash. You think a new school is going to solve all our problems but you're wrong. It takes programs and teachers."

Saner went on to recall a conversation he'd had with superintendent Baxter Paige five years ago during the remodeling of the Akron School, in which Paige had said the renovation was temporary and a new school would be built. Saner had expressed dismay that they would build after spending so much money on renovation. Saner recalled, "Paige told me one or two million dollars wasn't much to be concerned about. Well, I am concerned!"

Paige, who was serving as secretary and recording the minutes of the meeting, questioned Saner's memory of the conversation. He then stated, "This corporation needs a middle school."

Three patrons in the audience had come to ask the board to take class size at Akron School into consideration. The board recently voted not to renew the contract of an elementary teacher, which means that grade will now have three classes of 30 students instead of four classes of 22 or 23 students. "There are too many kids in each room," said Teresa Weaver, the mother of a child who will attend fourth grade at the school next year.

Commenting on the meeting afterward, Joe Day said, "It's upsetting to go to a meeting and then not be able to say anything. The audience was mad before the meeting. Now they are really mad. The board was continuing to take action while I was requesting the floor. People are always asking me about attending board meetings. Well, the meeting on June 15 is the one to be at! It is specifically for the public to remonstrate. I encourage everyone with an opinion on the schools to attend."

The board also held a regular meeting on June 8 which was attended by opponents of the building project. A report on that meeting will be in next week's News.



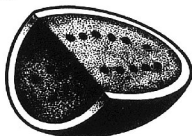
Akron Track Team Members Establish New School Records

Bailey Family recovering from fire

"Everybody who has an upstairs should have a ladder for the window or some way to escape in case of fire," says Roseann Bailey. "When I think how close my family came to getting burned up, well, it really scares you!"

"I'd never thought about it before," her husband, George says, "but I'll never sleep upstairs again without an escape way. It's really dangerous to have your loved ones up there without a way to get out."

It was on the night of March 16 that the Bailey family's lives were changed forever. It was about 10:00 p.m. and George and Roseann were in the living room of their home east of Akron. Their daughter Beulah Bradley and her daughter, Alicia, 11, were already upstairs asleep.

Suddenly, without warning, a kerosene heater near the stairway exploded, throwing flaming kerosene throughout the living room and onto the ceiling. Acting quickly, George grabbed the blazing heater and tried to drag it from the house. "But there was just too much fire," he says. "I couldn't do it." Grabbing a pillow, Roseann tried frantically to beat out the flames. Their screams woke Beulah, who came running down the stairs. George told her to go out through the kitchen and he'd get Alicia. He ran back through the blazing inferno that had engulfed the living and dining rooms and up the stairs to get the child. "I only had one thing on my mind and that was saving my granddaughter," he says. "I didn't even feel the pain. What I did was, I just pulled Alicia up again me, put my hands up over her head and ran backwards through the fire with her to try to protect her as much as I could."

Beulah had returned to the house to look for Alicia and George had to push her back out through the kitchen door. "I just kind of froze," Beulah says. "I think I was in shock. I didn't realize I was on fire. I remember thinking, 'What's hitting me in the back?'" It was her father beating the flames out with his hands. "Her shirt was all afire and her hair was on fire, so I used my hands," he says.

Meanwhile, unbeknownst to George, Roseann had put the pillow over her face to protect herself from the smoke, and crawled out a bedroom window. "It was the first fire I was ever in in my life, and I was scared to death," she says. "The smoke was really gettin' to me. First there was real bright flames, but then it started to fill with black smoke." Beulah says, "We thought she was still in there. Dad started to go back in after her when she came around the corner and hollered at us. Dad told us to get in the car and go call for help."

So Roseann drove Alicia and Beulah the three miles to the home of her other daughter, Maria Spencer. George, meanwhile, moved two cars from his yard across the highway to safety and then got in another vehicle and also drove to Maria's, passing the firetrucks along the way. "We didn't have any neighbors close by where we could use the telephone," he says. "I don't know how I made it. I knew I was burnt real bad when I started to drive and the bottoms of my feet came off on the brake and gas pedals."

When the ambulance arrived, the EMT's took Beulah to Woodlawn Hospital first, thinking her to be the most seriously injured. George and Alicia followed in a second ambulance. All three were then transferred to the burn unit at Fort Wayne's St. Joseph's Hospital.

The Baileys still don't know what caused their heater to explode, although they hope to be notified if the fire marshal ever determines the cause. "We about lost our lives and we have no idea what happened," George says. "Just right now it was all afire. In a matter of seconds our whole life changed." Roseann adds, "After what we went through, I would think they would let us know."

Alicia suffered burns on both hands, one leg and her face. She

spent eight days in the hospital. Beulah was badly burned on both hands, her face and back. A great deal of her long blond hair was burned off. While George received burns on both arms, the bottoms of his feet, the top of his head and his face and back, it was the damage to his lungs and heart that proved the most serious. "He had burnt tissue in his lungs and fluid around his heart," Roseann, who escaped without injury, says. George explains, "They had to put a tube in my chest to drain the fluid."

Although he spent six weeks at St. Joseph's, George has very little memory of the first four weeks. "I was out about five minutes after I got there and after that I just don't remember. It's a total blank. My wife tells me people came to see me and I responded, but I just can't remember." He spent those four weeks on a respirator with bandages covering most of his upper body. "All I could see was his eyes and mouth," Roseann recalls. "There were times," George says, "when they thought I wasn't going to make it. One night the hospital called Roseann. The doctor told me later, 'You'll never be that close to death again without going'."

Beulah was also on a respirator for a week of her four week hospital stay. She and George were both placed in a hyperbaric chamber three times a day for the first week. The chamber, which Beulah describes as looking "like one of those big Blue Flame gas tanks, only with portholes" simulates the pressure of being 45 feet below sea level. It helps to control swelling and to clear the lungs. "They said if we hadn't been put in it our heads would have swollen to three times their size," she says. While George doesn't remember the chamber, Beulah recalls that she would get sick when they would start to let the pressure off.

Both George and Beulah have undergone skin grafts on their hands. Beulah must wear special elastic gloves 23 hours a day to keep the grafted skin smooth and to protect it. She may have to undergo additional surgery on the tendons in her right hand. Twice each day, she exercises her fingers with a battery powered Mobilimb H-3. She is the first person to use this device which attaches to each of her fingers and moves them up and down.

At the time of this interview, George was hoping to be released from therapy. Beulah will continue her therapy sessions three times each week, at least until September. She has been told the healing process will take approximately 18 months.

Although the burns on George's feet make it very difficult for him to get around, he has made dramatic improvement since being released from the hospital.

The Baileys have nothing but praise for the burn unit at St. Joseph's Hospital. "You would never find a better hospital than St. Joe," George says. "It was great! The people there were real special. I never asked for anything they didn't get me and I never found anyone who wasn't great."

Agreeing wholeheartedly, Beulah says, "When I first took my hydro treatments, I'd just bawl 'cause my hands looked so awful. The nurses would sit and talk to me and cry with me. It helped so much knowing they cared."

Roseann adds, "The burn unit is real personal. They make you feel like family. And the other patients are all so nice, too."

One thing Beulah says was especially helpful to her is a program where other burn victims, who are partially recovered and now out-patients, talk to the patients and show how much progress they've made. "They told you what to expect and what improvements you could look forward to and that helped a lot," she says.

A photographic record is made of patients' progress and is then used to reassure and encourage other patients.

Hospital personnel report that George's good attitude, in spite of all that he went through, served as an inspiration to other patients.

The Bailey family is also very thankful for all the help they've received. "People around here have been real nice," Roseann says. "The help has been just wonderful!" Beulah adds, "We've had so much help from family and friends. Knowing people cared really made a difference."

George is especially appreciative of the volunteers who cleaned up the debris from the fire at the home site. "There must have been 20 or 25 people out there helping," he says. "They were great."

He plans to place a modular home at the site in the near future. "It's going to be one story and total electric!" he stresses.

"I'll never stay in a house with a kerosene heater again!" Beulah says.

"We lost all our things," Roseann says. "But we can replace material things. You can't replace lives. We were very lucky."

Boling named new superintendent Jr. High objections continue

Assistant superintendent Karen Boling will become superintendent of Tippecanoe Valley Schools on July 1. She was chosen by a unanimous vote at the June 8 school board meeting to replace Baxter Paige who will retire at the end of the month. Boling, who came to Valley in July of '88, was interviewed for the position of superintendent during the executive portion of last week's board meeting. Her title will actually be acting superintendent until later this summer when she expects to receive her doctorate degree from Ball State University. She will then apply for her certification as superintendent.

The patrons in attendance greeted the 5-0 vote with applause. Terry Randall of Akron said he approved of the selection but questioned Boling's place of residence. She now lives in Warsaw but said her house is for sale and she will be moving into the Valley district.

Boling's selection as superintendent seemed to be the only point in the meeting without conflict.

The meeting had to be moved from the administration building to the high school lecture room because nearly 70 patrons showed up to express their concerns about the proposed middle school building plan.

The required public hearing on the matter was held June 15 and a report from the hearing will be in next week's News.

Financial consultant Dr. Don Patton estimated the project will cost \$8.5 million to \$9.5 million with 90 percent of the money being raised through a bond issue and the remainder coming from the capital projects fund. He reiterated his opinion that the project can be completed without a tax increase.

Patrons again expressed displeasure with the board's handling of the vote on the project. Terry Menzie of Mentone accused the board of "voting in secrecy" at the special afternoon meeting on May 21.

Board President Fred McSherry said the May 21 meeting which was attended only by reporters was open to the public and had been mentioned at the previous board meeting. Menzie asked if a mention of the vote on the project appears in the minutes of the May 19 meeting. After finding nothing in the minutes to support his recollection, McSherry asked Judy Hivley to review the audio tape and minutes of the meeting to determine when the May 21 meeting was set.

Concerns from patrons prompted board members to pledge they have no intentions of letting the Akron, Mentone and Burket elementaries fall into state of disrepair. Carol Ellenwood urged the board "to be diligent in upgrading and maintaining the elementary buildings."

Superintendent Paige reassured the patrons' that in his 12 years with the corporation the possibility of moving the elementary schools from their present communities has never been discussed.

Mentone teacher Pam Smith presented the board with a statement signed by 74 people who support the building project.

After a letter from Dennis Burch supporting the project was read by McSherry, Richard Day asked if a precedent has been set for reading all letters of the board aloud.

Jeff Tilden, the only board member to vote against the building project, said that if one letter is read, then all should be. "You'd better leave a lot of time for letters at your next meeting," Day replied.

Debbie Clark said she opposed the project and feels the money would better spent upgrading the teaching staff.

Becky Shambarger, a computer technician who works in all the buildings, said she felt a new middle school was needed.

Linda Burch said combining Akron and Mentone will allow more courses, such as pre-algebra, to be offered.

Joe Day predicted teachers would not get the things they need and want, saying previous building project have proven this.

Also discussed in the three-hour long meeting were better use of space at Akron and Mentone, wiring those two buildings for computers, the number of fourth grade teachers at Akron, the three-story Mentone structure and long-range plans for each of the corporations four schools.

Brett Boggs identified the major needs at each site for the

upcoming year.

Burket's biggest need was said to be the gym, while at Mentone it is the three-story structure. The windows at Akron School were identified as its biggest need, and the high school's list included a stage lighting system, renovation of the science labs and replacing carpet and wallcoverings.

In other business:

* Approved an application for \$128,076 in Chapter 1 funds from the federal government to be used for salaries of teachers and aides for elementary remedial reading.

* Heard a report from Karen Boling that 49 students require remediation during summer school based on ISTEP tests. This is an increase of 16 students from last year. Mrs. Boling said a change in how the tests were written resulted in an increase at nearly all school corporations.

* Tabled for further discussion a recommendation that all building administrators receive one-year contract extensions that had been made by Paige.

* Chose Merchants National Bank as low bidder from which to obtain a temporary loan if needed.

* Accepted a bid of \$1,200 from Maple Leaf Farms to purchase a used 1980 66-passenger school bus.

Miss Fulton County Info meeting

Valley Board Firm Despite Public Opinion

Judging by audience response, more than half of the standing-room-only crowd of over 200 opposed the middle school building plan but that did not sway the Tippecanoe Valley School Board. After the June 15 state-required public hearing, they again voted 4-1 to proceed with the proposed construction. Akron's Jeff Tilden continued to cast the only dissenting vote.

Retiring Superintendent Baxter Paige said the completion date of the seventh and eighth grade facility is estimated to be August 1994. According to financial adviser Dr. Don Patton, total cost of the project should be between \$85 million and \$9.6 million.

Patton said that although the tax rate is expected to range from 49 cents to 58 cents per \$100 valuation, the high school debt service rate of 42 cents per \$100 valuation will be retired early, leaving that money to be applied to the new building.

The overall effect in terms of taxes paid would be between 3 cents and 10 cents per day, according to Patton. He estimated that a homeowner whose house has a market value of \$50,000 and would be assessed at approximately \$15,000, would pay between \$10.50 and \$36 a year in increased taxes until the high school debt is retired.

Joe Day, a leading opponent of the construction said that while "it's cents a day, or if your in business, a dollar a day, that's every day for the rest of your life."

Dennis Overmeyer of Burket countered, "If you worry about taxes over the future of your children I feel sorry for you."

After the board voted, without comment, to adopt the

resolution they quickly voted to adjourn. This action brought a heated reaction from the outraged crowd. When architect George Clinton tried to explain the state law and hearing format, he was quickly shouted down. "You don't even care about our opinions," a lady said. "You have already made up your minds," was also shouted.

A total of 19 people spoke during the meeting. While each speaker was allotted two minutes, several people offered Joe Day their time so he could finish making his points. Besides the increased costs to tax payers, Day questioned whether consolidation would end with the junior high. He also pointed out information he felt had been left out of the project history and reminded the audience that the board had voted for the project in an afternoon meeting without the possibility of public comment.

A public vote on the issue in November was suggested by a patron and brought lots of applause from the crowd.

Many of those in attendance expressed the thought that too much money was being spent on buildings rather than teachers. "A lot of kids came out of one-room schools smarter than kids that come out of high school today," said one man.

Judy DeVries asked with all the extracurricular activities, "When are they going to spend any time learning?"

Forrest Kantner who was elected to replace John Mellott on the board said he felt the board had made a wise decision. "You can have a good education system in a chicken coop if you've got the right teachers," he said. "If you put those same teachers in a better facility, they can do a better job."

Valley teacher Lee Ann Rock said she was proud of the school system and supported the board's decision.

Most of those in favor of the construction plan spoke of the needs of the children, while those opposed stated the opinion that a building alone wouldn't solve those needs.

The following is a part of a town ordinance pertaining to loitering. If you have any questions or would like to read more on this you can go the Akron Town Clerk's office during regular business hours and obtain the ordinance.

AMC 7-1-1 Unlawful loitering or gathering on private property

Sec. 1: Irrespective of whether or not any other unlawful activity is conducted or intended, it shall be unlawful for any person or group of persons to loiter or gather, whether in a vehicle or otherwise:

A) upon any business or commercial premises (including parking lots or other exterior areas):

1) after the closing hours of such business or commercial establishment; or

2) during the business hours of such establishment other than pursuant to the purposes

for which the establishment is open to the public;

unless with the knowledge and consent of the owner, tenant, operator, or manager of such business or commercial property; or

B) upon any business or commercial property in a manner contrary to any written and prominently displayed rules of the establishment, or if asked to disperse or depart by the owner, tenant, or manager of the establishment or their authorized agent; or

C) upon any residential, agricultural, industrial, or undeveloped property, occurred or unoccupied, except with the knowledge and consent of the owner, tenant, or manager of such property.

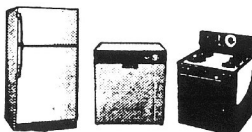
