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

there's more to it than that. Microwaves are high frequency waves. When they penetrate food they agitate the molecules causing the friction that produces the heat that cooks the food. Microwaves cook so fast because they go through all the food at the same time, not layer by layer like conventional cooking

microwaves effect materials in different ways. They penetrate and cook food but bounce off metal which is why the inside of an electronic oven doesn't get hot. That means no burned-on spills. Waves go through some materials such as paper, glass, ceramics and boilable plastics so they can be used for cooking.

translate that into everyday terms. Kids come home for lunch. Stick a hot dog in a bun, put on a paper plate, add a scoop of baked beans and slip into a microwave oven for a few minutes. It's an instant hot lunch with no dishes to wash. Or Dad calls to say he'll be late for dinner. Put his meal in the refrigerator. When he comes home, reheat it in seconds in a micro-wave oven. It heats so fast it doesn't have time to lose moisture and taste leit-overish. Or friends stop by. You invite them to stay for din-ner and follow through with an elegant meal from the freezer via a microwave oven. It cooks while you set the table.

HERE COME THE SONG BIRDS BACK Saturday, the first contingent of robins arrived at Possum

Things are picking up. Soon the blue birds, and wrens will

Things are picking up. Soon the blue birds, and wrens will be back.

Twenty three years ago, Helen and I planted 200 wind break trees here at Possum Hollow which have become the Community Nesting Home for hundreds of songbirds. Many winter birds such as cardinals, jays and titmice make it their year-round home. The greatest population, however, is the summer birds including the robins just now arriving and returning year after year.

The song bird's life, however, isn't without its troubles. Hoardes of trash birds, including starlings, crows, cow birds, and blackbirds are threatening to take over this nesting sanctuary in the spring and in the fall. Soon they'll be arriving by the thousands. Heretofore, we've driven them out of town by shooting in the evening when they come in to nest. The Town Board passed an ordinance last year rightfully illegalizing shooting in town. This was a good ordinance since uncontrolled shooting should not be allowed. The board should, however, authorize controlled shooting for the removal where necessary of trash birds and predatory animals when detrimental to the community, welfare, and safety or an equally effective substitute.

We are faced with the total loss of our bird population and the destruction of the trees in which they nest unless a way is found to drive these trash birds, which will soon be arriving in black clouds, out of town. The Board has refused a shooting permit for this purpose. Therefore, we are going to try the carbide bird-control gun which has been used on the Whit Gast farms with limited success. If it fails, the town will lose a wild life sanctuary and hundreds of songbirds and become the permanent home of hoardes of trash birds. This wind break of 200 pine trees is apparantly the only tree area in town big enough to support this bird population. I hope you will agree that this short sound distrubance used at dusk when the spring migration starts to arrive is easily worth saving the home of hundreds of songbirds and ridding the town of the predators.

This is a national problem. For example, the Ohio Legis-

This is a national problem. For example, the Ohio Legislature is spending thousands of dollars trying to control
trash birds causing millions of dollars in damage.

Since this songbird and wildlife tree sanctuary is the
nesting and feeding grounds for hundreds of birds in Akron,
we believe it is of community interest and benefit. If it
is destroyed as the trees on our streets are being destroyed,
we are one more step on the road to becoming a "Rural Packerton Chetto" in the words of the February FARM JOURNAL.

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

Soybeans Increase In Demand

The fact that Europe ans are upgrading their diet and eating more meat and poultry has meaning for soybean pro-ducers in Fulton County, according to Clem Good, Chairman of the Fulton Chairman of the Ful Co. ASC Committee. increase in European de-mand for meals and oil, coupled with prices that allow soybeans to com-pete favorably in the market, has brought an upswing in soybean ex-

Good cited the latest official figures from the U.S. Department of Agriculture showing a September-December total of 159.4 million bushels of soybeans exported, an increase of 18 percent over the same period in 1968 when shipments were already unusually heavy because of the impending dock strike.

In fact, said Good, U. exports of soybeans in November reached a new monthly high of 53. 7 millions bushels, 1.2 million more than the previous month's record million more than the previous month's record and 3.7 million than in November,

Citing the latest figures on exports of soybean meal, the ASC Committee chairman said the October-December total was 1,680,800 tons, up 32 percent over the same period a year ear-lier. Of the total, 90 ercent was shipped to Europe.

Soybean oil exports for 0 c t ober-December were 278.6 million 1bs., 7 percent above the cumulative total for the same period in 1968.

Mr. Bybee leaves his widow, Miriam, whom he married in 1935; two daughters from a prev-ious marriage, both of whom are married; two granddaughters and five great-grandchildren, all from California.

Mr. Bybee attended Mentone High School, graduating in 1911. He taught a year at Stoney Point School after taking a summer teaching course at Winona (Ind.) College. He entered the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor in 1912 and

attended two years when he left to go to Montana to improve his health. He taught school in Sutherland Co., 20 miles south of Terry until World War I broke out. He enlisted July 8, 1917 He enlisted July 8, 1917 in Miles City, Montana and eventually landed in France via England, with the First Division (the Big Red I). After being gased and wounded and recovering sufficiently, he was sort. and recovering sufficiently, he was sent to England where he served with G-2 Corps of Intelligence Police, first in Southampton and then in London where he was when World War I ended. He came home to the U.S. aboard a hospital ship, having contracted T.B. from the gas he received

in France. He spent time at U.S. General Hospital 21, now FitzSimmons Hospital at Denver. His cousin Loa Stoddard and her husband Edward were living there when with Loa's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Loren Manwaring. Mrs. Manwaring was Mr. Bybee's beloved Aunt Cora, his father's sis-Bybee's ter.

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
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Outstanding Farmer Is Named





When Uncle Sam takes his decennial census photograph of the nation on April 1, every American household will contribute its own uniquely important details, says the U.S. Dept. of Com-merce Bureau of the Census. However, it says, no individual household or any of its members can be singled out for viewing because the cenplete charge of the re-sulting snapshots which cannot by law be dis-closed to any person outside the Bureau for any reason whatsoever.

The Census Bureau says complete anonymity is made possible on the ce-nsus reports because wh-en the official census form is filled in and returned for processing the name and address are withheld when the other items are fed into the computer. That insures that me proper items are fer items. that no person, no fami-ly, no housing unit is indentifiable in the resulting statistical out-

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

Lacy "Basket Egg Tree" Is Fancy Fun At Low Cost



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Faye Ang-ting Bet-

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With a little help from Mom, youngsters can be kept busy on Easter vacation fashioning a "Basket Egg Tree" that will make a lasting and lovely centerpiece or table decoration.

Because it's made from scraps and throw-aways, the cost of the project is very little. All it takes is eggshells, embroidery scraps, thread, transparent tape, glue, a branch, an empty fruit can, plaster and a basket or pot to set it spanels. It is a good idea to break the eggs with a knife, near the smaller end. Use your finger to wash the inside of the eggshells with warm water, and let them dry thoroughly. Reinforce any shells with jagged or cracking edges on the inside with tape. Before you decorate them, attach a hanger thread to the inside of each egg. Use transparent tape, preferably the nonshiny type (Scotch Magic Transparent) so that decorations can be easily glued on top of it. About nine inches of metallic thread make a pretty

If your sewing box does not yield enough scraps of metallic braids, velvet ribbons, yarns and pieces of lace, you can buy remnants for pennies at the embroidery counter of any department store. These, together with glue, tape and imagination will help your children turn the eggshells into beautiful little basket creations.

It is the source of the season of the se

ton in which to pack the shells away.

The entire cost of the project is from \$2 to \$3, depending on what supplies you have on hand. Patching plaster is about 45 cents, non-shiny tape about 49 cents, white glue, about 29 cents, and a can of spray enamel, about 98 cents. If you choose to buy embroidery remnants, you can probably get all you need for less than a dollar.




