C of C fund game Friday





NEW SPEED LIMIT: This week, as the statewide 55 mile per hour speed limit went into effect, marks the first time in 29 years that motorists have been forced to slow down on Hoosier highways. Accarding to State Police Superintendent Robert L. De Bard, Indiana traffic laws required "reasonable and prudent" speeds on the open road beginning in 1939. A 35 mile per hour limit imposed during World War II was lifted in August. 1945. In 1953, the Indiana General Assembly added an amendment that fixed an absolute speed limit of 30 in urban zones and 65 on rural roads and highways. De Bard said the new speed limit will be "strictly enforced." He predicts reductions in the loss of life as a result of the new lowered speed limits. the new lowered speed limits.

Accused Wallis Murderer May Get Attorney

The Public Defender's office in Ft. Wayne was ordered this week by Allen Co. Circuit Court judge Hermann F. Busse to determine whether Donald Allen Locke, 27, is eligible for pauper representation in his defense against two murder charges concerning the slaying of Nena Wallis, 30, a former Men-tone resident.



To The Editor:

Today we are seeing radical changes as a result of recent Supreme Court decisions. Traditional interpretations of the United States Constitution have been reversed to ban prayer in the schools, to leg-alize abortion and to force busing of school children for racial bal-

Yet the Constitution is being ignored to alusurping of states rights in outright violation of the Tenth A-mendment to the United States Constitution.
Public education is a prime example.

With federal funding with rederal runding of education has come of the Freezer Fresh by federal control. is being called up to take a good look at federal involvement in public education. His bill, H.R. 10639, will be offered as a substitute for H.R. 69, the bill to ex-tend funding of the ESEA, when H.R. 69 is brought to the floor of the House

of Representatives.

If this fails, Congressman Landgrebe and other members of Cong-ress will offer sections of his bill separately amendments as amendments to the ESEA bill. What happens here will depend much on the public's response.

According to Human Events, the "Inside Washington" weekly newspaper, the measure is expected to reach the hour floor in Mid-March. So there is still time to let your own congressman know if you oppose continued federal funding of public education

Your congressman needs to hear from you if you want him to vote to rewant him to vote to re-store local control of public education as in-tended by the framers of our United States Constitution.

Tinkey Farms, Inc., of near Warsaw, will pay a \$10,000 out-of-court damage settlement for killing more than 40,000 when accidentally discharging poultry wastes in neighboring

county waters.

The wastes, which went into the Tippecanoe River, escaped when a sew-age holding tank on the farm ruptured, killing 31,117 fish in Fulton Co. and 11,734 in Marshall Co. in 1971. The Indiana Attorney General's office filed? al's office filed; a \$21,966.00 suit against the farm, but the out-of-court settlement was accepted by the Indiana Department of Natural Resources.

News Of Interest To Homemakers

Since meat is an important part of the diet and is meal in is served at every in some form, it often consumes more than one fourth of the food one fourth of the budget. The ave American consumes average pounds of meat a year.

Stew meat and less tender roasts are the less popular cuts of meat and usually the most economical. The more tender and more st economical. The more tender and more expensive cuts include ribs, T-bones, club, porterhouse, and sirloin steaks. The demand for steaks and rib roasts is especially high during the cook out season.

Price per pound should not be the only form of meat comparison. cuts contain only lean meat while others contain fat, bone, and gristle. Learn to judge how much you are paying per serving rather than just price per pound.

Price does not determine nutritive value.
Meats contain high quality protein which aids growth and repair of body tissues. They also provide iron, thiamin, riboflavin, and niacin, Lean meats are much the same in value whether from tender or that pork is a better source of thiamin. Liver is especially high in many nutrients as are variety meats - kidney and heart.

Dried beans and peas are valuable for many of the same nutrients and can be used in place of meat some of the Peanut butter another good value price wise. Eggs and cheese also serve as meat sub-

Two or more servings should be chosen from the meat group each day. Count as one serving -two or three ounces of lean cooked meat, fish, or poultry, two eggs, one cup cooked dry beans, one cup cooked peas, and four tablescup cooked beas, poons peanut butter. THE AWARENESS PROGRAM



Richard Goshert exploded to fellow board member Dr. John McKee during Monday eve-ning's Tippecanoe Vall-ey school board meeting. Mc-Kee said he did not know if Forbes had a contract or not and therefore could not approve a claim that might prove false. Forbes said he had a contract. McKee charged, seen it." "I have never

"It's signed by the three members who voted for it," Forbes said. "You can sign it, too, if you want to."

It was during this discussion that Goshert was overruled by Cop-len who added that he also had not seen the contract.

Forbes said, "I could not find you. The other members signed here in the office."
The contract was not produced and the payroll was approved 4-1. McKee voted no. A similar vote was taken on the other claims, McKee a-ain objecting, saying gain objecting, saying some of the claims were for Forbes and might be

false.
The discussion came during an emotion-filled meeting attended by a near-capacity audien-ce, many of whom had ce, many of whom had come to register complaints with board members and Forbes.

Forbes said he knew of no regulation requiring a nurse but said money had been allowed for one on at least a partbasis next year. said the nurse had time been dropped because the county tax adjustment county tax adjustment board dropped the appropriation and it was not restored by the st-

More government regulations, regulations, gasoline rationing and limitations on profits are not going to create new sup-plies of energy, and Congress can best serve to alleviate these shortages by undoing the acts they have taken to undoing destroy the free market,



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


