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

In those days it was not uncommon look down main street see several horses tied to the hitch racks that lined the north that lined the north side of main street. that time until From the present, I have never driven my car to town and failed to find a parking place on main street

Several years ago, members of the town board came up with an ordin-ance placing a time lim-it on main street parking. This ordinance was needed about as much as a drowning man needs a drink of water in a little town like Mentone. For a while the ordi-For a while the ordi-nance was enforced. It looked so unnecessary to see the town marshal walking up the street, marking the tires on ten or twenty cars. After a few weeks, the enforce-ment of the ordinance was fazed out.

Now out of the clear
blue sky the board gave the marshal orders to enforce the law again. Only recently a lady had an appointment for a permanent at a local permanent at a local beauty shop. She came in early to do some grocery shopping and transother business be-e her appointment. fore When she left the beauty when she was greeted with a parking ticket. Needless to say, she was more than slightly upset and swears she will never do any business in Mentone anymore. Re-sults the beauty shoppe and food market and who knows who else has lost a good customer.

Now we all know that Mentone merchants are having a struggle trying to compete to compete with the supermarkets and shopping centers and we also know that the town board is not helping this situation by their actions. One spends the One board member spends the day on his job in Bourbon, another at the spring factory at the spring factory and the third one in school. How can they possibly know wheather or not we have a park-ing problem in Mentone? Ninty percent of those parking on main street are in town for shopping business transacts. Certainly they not loafing since ions. there is no place left in Mentone for loafing t for those who to loaf in a tavexcept for like to loaf in a tavern. Of course those who are transacting business can always check their watch and when

their time is about ran out, they can always go move— their car over a space or two and go on and finish their business. They are plenty of spaces to move into. I don't recall any of

the present board memb-ers being on the board when this ordinance was drawn up but the present board should think twice they drive any more business out of town. If they are trying to better town, bey should Chamb ing to make Mentone a better town, perhaps they should sit down with the Chamber of Commerce and between them look into the possibilities of getting a bar-ber of plumber of elec-trician who will do home repair jobs to move in-Mentone.
I once heard a well-

known farmer who is now deceased make a remark, "All we want in Mentone is a post office, a bank and the stockyards." If are going to insist driving our business to shopping centers, we will soon find it that

way. The The blame for this should not be directed to the town marshal. He has a job working the town and gets orders from the town board and line any employee, do as the boss says or get fired.

Church Lists Opposition To ERA

The Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), still under discussion after having been killed in Senate

been killed in Senate committee in the Indiana General Assembly, is very controversial.

Akron resident Lana Atkinson this week submitted the following points her church considers ungodly and immoral about the ERA:

ERA would bar a state from conposing creater

from opposing greater liability for support on a husband than wife merely merely because of his sex.
Women would be subject

to the draft and to combat duty equally with men. A woman will re-gister for the draft at

age 18 as a man now does.
Quoting a Professor
Paul Fruend: ERA would require there be no segregation of the sexes in prison. And from Sam Ervin: Police practices by which a search involving the removal of clothing will be able to be performed by mem-bers of either sex without regard to the sex of the one to be searched; segregation by sex in sleeping quarters of prisons and similar pub-lic institutions would be outlined; segregat-ion by sex of living conditions in the armed forces would be outlawed, including close quarter living in combat zones and in fox holes; segregation by sex in hospitals would outlawed; physical

exams in armed forces would have to be carried out on a sex neutral basis."

The list continues: ERA provides the wife and children would not be required to wear the last name of the huslast name of th band or father. They band or father. They can choose any name they wish. Under ERA, if a wife fails to support her husband, he can use it as grounds for divorce. ERA will abolish seduction laws and statutory rape laws tutory rape laws.

Quoting Dr. Jonathan H. Pincus, professor of neurology, Yale Medical School, "A solid, happy family life is the foundation of mental health and happiness. I would predict ERA and many of the other goals of its proponents will bring social disruption, un-happiness and increas-ing rates of divorce and desertion. Weakening of family ties may also lead to increased rates of alcoholism, suicide, and possibly, sexual deviation.'

The church (Church of Christ) also noted that in states where the ERA has been ratified His and Her rest rooms have and Her rest rooms have been done away with at major truck stops and service stations. One rest room only is available to both sexes.





bye, Tippecanoe and Tri-ton opened the Friday night session after the other four teams had squared off Wednesday. The capacity crowd was at a fever pitch from the announcing of line-ups on, and the teams responded with a fitting

barnburner. The Vikings got off to a slow start, trail-ing 6-4. three minutes into the opening quart-

er. Then Tippecanoe started doing everything right and during a 4-minute span outscored the Trojans 14-0 to open a commanding 18-6 lead. Triton closed to within 10 at the quarter, 18-8

After the Trojans crept to within seven at 20-13 early in the second stanza, Tippecance went on another scoring benge, 10-0, to go up by 30-13 midway through the quarter, and through the quarter, and it appeared that the rout was on. But at this point, the Trojans called time, and when play resume, Triton was pressing and Valley was turning the ball over. 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





Blackbirds

Dear Editor:

Dear Editor:

Knowing your interest and concern for community and national health and welfare, we knew you would be interested in this letter of March 7 to our Town Board.

"We need some ideas and help in the contract."

"We need some ideas and help in the control of disease carrying blackbirds which, each year at this time, come in by the thousands determined to establish a rookery in the trees here at 'Possum Hollow. Although this is out-

side the corporation limit, those people living in the corporation are probably more affected and just as susceptible to the diseases carried by these birds as those outside the corporation limit.

These hordes of black-birds intermingled with starlings and grackle have definitely been eshave definitely been established as carriers of Histoplasmosis (the lung disease), Cholera, and other related diseases of humans and livestock. In addition to carrying disease, to carrying disease, they damage farm crops and trees along with with offenthe creation of sive odor and noises.
Attached are two news-

paper clippings from The New York Times reporting the United States Army's necessary removal the birds for health and safety. Also, the article reports the incidents of Histoplasmosis, the lung disease, identified by Dr. P. D. Jones of Milan, Tenn.
In the past, we have continuously prevented most of these birds from

establishing their nest-ing rookery by the use of noise producing bird bombs and occasional use of a shot gun. This has been, and still is, a lengthy and expensive process, but the only one we know of.

We have contacted several agencies, including Purdue University, for rodent and trash bird control methods without success and we need the help of your Board or anyone else who would have some effective, workable control ideas. Since this becomes

matter of health, we're all affected and the sooner we get started with an effective con-trol, the less dangers trol, the less dangers there will be to all of

our end of town, we have the finest crop of red - cheeked youngsters you ever saw who love to play and walk through the areas these birds infest; so, it becomes doubly more im-portant that we find a solution.

Things I Remember

By Goldie Kesler

I cannot really understand why peoples in other countries seem to have nothing and we have such an abundance of everything.

Before I ever went to school at age five years Grandmother insisted we make two quilt patches every day with seams just so and center matching perfectly. We ching perfectly. We made enough patches and quilts so my great-granddaughters will still have a keepsake. We did our own sewing so there was always plenty of material to cut up. The chest and clothes press were running over with quilts, comforters, pillows and cushions. The everyday cushions. The everyday ones were four or nine patch affairs but the fancy ones were "work-ed" with feather stitching along the seams. Flowers, birds, and especially the names of pecially the names of all the young men in the neighborhood were em-broidered on the patch-es. We had wool com-forters and blankets, too. Wool was washed and picked or carded. A fleece off a big sheep would provide wool for two comforters.

We had some beds without springs. Ropes went crosswise and lengthwise of the bed frame to make a very comfortable be-ginning for what was put

on top. In the fall after the corn was cribbed we fillbaskets with clean inside husks and in the long winter eve-nings everyone worked nings everyone worked at tearing the husks into strips and placing them in a tick. Some people used straw but it soon lost its buoyan-cy and Grandmother would have none of it. Husks for us.

When the days began to get warm Grandma said we must pick the geese. A few feathers were pul-led out and if no blood shown on the quill, the feathers were ripe and the geese would pull

them out themselves. We pulled a sock over a goose's head and tied their legs with a car-pet rag. Grandmother pet rag. Grandmounts sitting on a potato crate held their heads between her knees and stripped off the feathers. They looked much like a sheep just sheared but seemed like new feathers grew almost over night. A dozen or so geese would make a feageese would make a fea ther bed in a season.

Most houses had a thimble in the ceiling of the living room and the stove pipe went thru the thimble and on to the chimney. It was one way of conserving fuel of conserving fuel and warming the upstairs

bedrooms.

A husk tick first and A husk tick first and then a big fat feather bed made a most cuddly place to sleep in winter. We climbed into bed (and climb we had to) and sank down in the softness, with a warm flat iron at our feet one could sleep ten hours straight through. Refreshed and fortified with five pancakes and with five pancakes and a bite of sausage, one was ready for any kind of "rat killing" as the saying goes.

nephews, hired men, and nephews, hired men, or what ever, we always had good places for everyone to sleep and keep warm. Even a tramp was given a cover so he could sleep in the barn after a stiff lecture after a still from Grandfather from Grandtather common one was allowed to smoke near the barn.

She cit-ed statistics indicated statistics indicating TVCTA has only 27 members, some reportedly do not approve of the group's tactics and are joining the new organization. She said, "Most corporation teachers are fine ation teachers are the people, but they are be-ing led astray by ISTA militants." She report-ed a recent question-naire asked teachers if they could ever foresee reason to consider any reason to consider the possibility of a strike by TVSC employ-ees. Blackbirds

Howard M. Utter Akron, Indiana

Re: Your letter in the NEWS of March 7, 1975.

Dear Howard:

The birds to which you refer are primarily red-wing blackbirds, grack-les and starlings. Orles and staffings. Or-inthologically speaking - starlings are a year around nuisance while the other two species are only a migratory one and primarily in the spring.

As to the usesses mentioned, cholera is primarily limited to India and the far East. Hog cholera, another possibility, is beyond

refer you to a veterinarian

Histoplasmosis is caused by a fungus and is world-wide in disis world-wide in dis-tribution. However, it is most prevalent in the midwestern United States. It is an ex-tremely common disease in this area and the probability is very good that both you and I have

had it or do have it and do not even know it.

It is very seldom fatal.
Factors related to
its distribution are its distribution are not clearly known, however, climate, soil conditions, birds, animal life, poultry, pigeons, decaying trees and stumps and caves, domestic animals, men, etc, as well as the birds in question may harbor and ion may harbor spread it.

As a solution to your problem, we might sug-

gest:
(1) Eliminate your

rookery.
(2) Have the Army Corp of engineers eliminate all possible sources - inding mankind. includaun



IEERB finds some TVSC practices unfair, some not

Michael I. Swygert, a Valparaiso attorney and law professor at DePaul University, Chicago, a hearing examiner for the Indiana Education Employment Relations Board (IEERB) has found that actions of the Tippecance Valley school board and TVSC superintendent Robert Forbes constituted unfair labor practices against loyment Relations Board corporation teachers and against the Tippeand against the Tippe-canoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association (TVCTA). He also ruled other school board and administration action did not constitute un-

fair labor practices. Swygert made the following recommendations that he proposed IEERB order the school board administration to

follow:

- Cease and desist from making any threats of reprisal or promises of benefit to teachers in an attempt to coerce teachers from their right of collective bargaining.
- That they stop mak-

ing statements for the purpose of discouraging

employee participation in the TVCTA.

- That they stop com-piling and circulating

alleged teacher "rat-ings" unless the ratings are based on merit and factors clearly other than the teachers' collective bargaining activities and membership in TVCTA.

- That they be demand-

- That they be demanded to post a notice for at least six weeks during the school year stating they will never again engage in an unfair labor practice proagain engage in an un-fair labor practice pro-scribed by Public Law 217.

- That they cease and desist from discourag-ing membership in TVCTA through discrimination in regard to any term of condition of employor condition of employ-ment, including salar-ies paid. It will be up to IEERB to determine whether or not to order the school board to give back pay to five teachers not given a \$500 raise this year that the other teachers receiv-

Decisions won by the school board included:

- It was not an unfair labor practice to abolish teacher preparation periods this school

year.
- The transfer of a teacher or teachers from one school to another within the school corporation is not an unfair labor practice.

- Letters written by school board members Dr. Wymond Wilson and Rich-ard Goshert that ex-pressed anti-union views stitute an unfair labor practice because the

prohibits the administration from supporting the establishment of a teacher bargaining agent

through donations of funds or other means. The findings and rec-ommendations have been presented to IEERB, which will be required to accept or reject his recommendations and issue the cease and desist orders he suggested.

According to the Indiana State Teachers Association (ISTA), Tippecanoe Valley is the only school corporation the state that does teacher bargaining unit to negotiate with the school board for teacher contracts, salaries and related fringe benefits.

TVCTA has requested and received permission from IEERB to conduct another teacher election determine if it can gain support to repre-

in bargaining sessions. Because TVCTA representatives contend nonmember teachers fear re-prisals from the school administration, it is believed the ballot will be by mail. I also want the taxpayers of Kosciusko Co. know that the sheriff sends a sheriff's car after one of the jail cooks in the morning and then takes her home in the evening after work.
This is all done on gasoline bought by the taxpayers of the county. The three radio men have to furnish our own gas-oline which is what we all should do. I was the all should do. I was the only member of the sheriff's department that lived in the south part of Kosciusko Co. I have resigned because of the treatment I received at the hands of Sheriff Hammersley. This is not fair to the people in the south half of Kosciusko south half of ROSCIUSMO Co. I am sending this to the newspapers be-cause I think it is something the taxpayers should know about. I have resigned as of Feb. 28, 1975.

About the time I am eating my lunch, I get a call from the kitchen that they are ready to feed the prisoners I the prisoners. Then I try to finish my lunch when I get a call that the cooks want the dishes picked up. I have done this most of the time this most of the time for 12 years. If anyone thinks that this is untrue, I can name several persons that will say that this is true, because they have been here when this happened. Until two years ago I had to feed the prisoners in the mornings because I was the only one at the jail to feed them. During my lunch hour I was the one call-ed to feed the prisoners even if there was other members of the depart-ment on station. Most of the time I get the call to feed the prison-

I am writing you this letter to let you know of the unfair treatment I have received at the orders of the new sher-iff, John E. Hammersley. when the budget was made in July of 1974 for the year of 1975 under Sher-iff David Andrews, he named me chief radio op-erator at a salary of erator at a salary of \$7,830 per year. 

Considering that it takes 40 gallons of sap water for each gallon of syrup, it's easy to see that a lot of water is handled, and that's work, no matter how you look at it. Constantly searching for ways to make the work easier, Lewis has for the past two years used plastic that crisscrosses woods like giant the rubber bands, carrying water from trees to colbands, carrying lection tanks scattered throughout the woods. Using a tractor and tank wagon with a pump, Lewis will then collect the sugar water and haul it sugar water and haul it to the evaporating room, a big savings of time and labor over the traditional bucket and spile method still used in parts of the woods lacking enough fall to utilize the tubing. "It is a more samitary system too." Lewis adds. is a more sanitary system, too," Lewis adds.

Once at the evaporating room, the water is pumped into an elabor-ate system of tanks for its final processing. pumped its final processing. Frequent tests are made when either Lewis






