Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals or free milk. In addi-tion, families not meet-ing these criteria but ing these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education ex-penses due to the mental penses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply. Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents.

in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information school. The information provided on the appli-cation is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of deter-mining eligibility. mining eligibility.
Applications may be submitted at any time dur-

ing the year.
In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these bene-fits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, they should contact the school.





#### INDIANA'S BURIED VALLEYS

Before the Ice Age, existing streams had cut their valleys deep into the underlying bedrock. The largest of these ancient drainageways was the Teays River, which flowed westward across Indiana. It entered the state in Adams County and crossed into Illinois from Benton County. The Teays River had at least seven large tributaries in Indiana.

The ancestral Wabash River, unlike its modern counterpart, was restricted to south-central and southwestern Indiana, where it was the major drainageway. During preglacial time, a bedrock divide existed between the Wabash and Teays

When the vast glaciers melted, most of the Teays Valley and parts of the Wabash River valley were covered over with a thick blanket of rock debris, thus obliterating or drastically altering the original courses of these streams. Only the Whitewater River follows much the same course as its preglacial ancestor.



ter to me. A copy of that letter is enclosed. In the letter to which he referred, Roger F. Marsh, Executive Direc-tor of the Indiana State Highway Commission, had written to Sen. Bayh: "...Available revenue is not sufficient to im-

prove all roads to the desirable degree."

"We do not have any plans for major improvement on this portion of SR 19. The narrow rightof-way width prohibits the widening of the ex-isting roadway. Also, there are numerous locations where there are not any shoulders nor side ditches because of insufficient right-of-way. To correct this situation would require major reconstruction for which funds are not available at this time. The Highway Commission will continue to consider will continue to consider the needs on this route, along with those on other roads in our State Highway system, as future programs are developed to utilize the arailable funds.



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### Judge Lee vacates IEERB ruling

A dispute that originally centered on the use of the words 'any' and 'all' when it began two years ago was heard in Kosciusko circuit court recently. The result was that Judge Gene B. Lee vacated an order entered May 28, 1975 by the Indiana Education Employment Relations Board (IEERB) in connec-Board (IEERB) in connection with the recogni-tion of an exclusive bargaining representa-tive for corporation teachers.

teachers.

IEERB conducted a representation election in the school corporation on May 16, 1974, less than two weeks before the end of the 73-74 school term. Following this, TVSC challenged the votes of eight teachers whose contracts were not renewed prior to the election and of

were not renewed prior to the election and of six others who had resigned their positions prior to the election.

IEERB, however, ruled those teachers whose votes had been challenged should be entitled to yote and have their ed should be entitled to vote and have their ballots counted, and on May '28, 1975 issued an order certifying Tippe-cance Valley Classroom Teachers Association (TVCTA) as the exclus-(TVCTA) as the exclusive representative of the TVSC employees. In the meantime, the school board had recognized the Professional Teachers of Tippecanoe Valley. In the suit filed by the school board against IEERB, Franklin K. DeWald, IEERB chairman, and the TVCTA, Judge Lee found:



"The Courtship of Miles Standish" by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, which described the legend of John Alden's courtship of Priscilla Mullins, has special significance for two Mentone sisters, Tessie Anderson and Mary Barkman.



Patrick Henry raised the cry against the Stamp Act. He introduced resolutions in the Virginia House of Burgesses, so strong patriotically they were defiant. March 23, 1765, in a voice that startled even those aware of his eloquence, he shouted, "The war is actually begun! Why stand we here idle?... Is life so dear, or peace so sweet, as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it, Almighty God! I know not what course others may take; but as for me, give me liberty, or give me death." His speech gave powerful impetus for action for freedom by the colonists. the colonists.
