# Severe weather takes heavy wildlife toll

Death tolls for pheasant, quail and songbirds have been highest among wildlife mortality caused by the severe winter, ed by the severe winter, according to preliminary estimates by the Indiana Department of Natural Resources.

The agency said there had been "higher than normal" wildlife losses throughout Indiana.

added that because of sufficient winter cover and food, State Fish sufficient winter cover and food, State Fish and Wildlife Area have had a lower mortality than most private land, but even on these areas quail have suffered "substantial mortality and weight loss."

good wildlife food and cover are generally cover are generally lacking when snow and cold persists," department biologists said. The biologists ment biologists said. The biologists said one large die-off of pheasants "may be tied to winter fooding of sants "may be tied to winter feeding of grant treated for planting with a fungicide." "It appears that song-bird mortality has been

higher than normal, even where bird feeders were maintained," the biologists said. "Scatterreports of dead birds of most resident species attest to a higher than normal kill."

However, the biolo-gists said, "Given good gists said, "Given good spring nesting conditions, most species should recover their numbers by the end of the summer." They added that planting good winter food and cover materials this spring should bely reduce the chances. help reduce the chances of another large loss next year.

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

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

The Laetrile war is raging. carrying The press is much that is said by the opponents. I'd like to respond. \*Look who is against its those who do care for cancer victims but who stand to lose should its use become legal. I'm not just imagin-ing things, for the same Indiana hospital monired both the failure conventional therapy and my recovery using Laetrile. Monitoring was done both by X-ray pictures of my lymph nodes and touch. was

Soon after the com-Soon after the com-pletion of conventional therapy at the hands of a very skilled radiolo-gist he wrote into my record that it seemed my cancer was complete-ly resistant and that my life span would be relatively short. That was in 1971. Six months later using the Laetrile program I had recovered. No cancer since No cancer since. The Indiana therapist says my recovery is a mira-cle. We agree. God worked through Laetrile after not working other-

wise.
So, since Laetrile can so, since Laetrile can not harm the body, since the bill in the legis-lature provides for its use only under the dir-ection of licensed physicians, since going to a foreign country is impractical, and since not one of the many I know who have gone onto Lae-trile regret it we urge you to let your State trile regret it we urge you to let your State Senator know you would like to see House Bill 1405 passed, and that you would appreciate all the help he could give. 

"As soon as I got there, I could see he had what EMTs call the look of a heart victim," King says. Tucker was not breathing. There was no pulse. "I reckon so." Tucker

"It was the best Christmas we ever had," Olive Tucker says. "Unusual but good."

After that, Tucker made a rapid recovery, although he was in the ICU three different times. He came home on times. Harrell reported the corporation is seeking dance or ballet teachers and trying to determine if there is enough interest to offer such a course. He said plans are underway for a women's exercise class with beginning and advanced tennis to be offered later. fered later.

Harrell asked for and received permission to publish an annual district-wide newspaper that he said would be mailed around August 1 corporation residents. It would contain calendar, sports sched-ules, staff listings and possibly a page for each of the elementary buil-dings, he said, in add-ition to a review of the past year. explanation past year, explanation or review of new or different policies or programs. He estimated it would cost \$900.

A vocational agriculture council was named with one member from each of the corpora-tion's five townships tion's five townships and two people representing agri-business. Iodine is one of the few nutrients that prois one of the duces deficiency symptoms in humans as a result of deficiency in the soil. Indiana is included in the "goiter belt" due to our lack of iodine in the soil.

Although the total amount of iodine in the body is very small, it is found in every living cell. Most of the iodine in our bodies is found in the thyroid

When iodine is lacking in the diet, the thy-roid gland overacts to compensate for the de-ficiency and enlarges. ficiency and enlarges. This is known as simple goiter.

People meet their needs for iodine through food and water sources. Near the sea coasts the soil and water are richer in iodine. The best nat-ural food sources are seafood and produce seafood and produce grown in iodine rich

hoosiers need to We be conscience of our daily need for iodine since our soil is low in iodine content. In or-der to decrease the inder to decrease the in-cidence of simple goiter it was decided to forti-fy foods with iodine. The problem was to find a food that was univer-Table salt was chosen as the most practical medium. By using table salt you will meet your iodine requiremeet your lodine require-ment. The use of iodiz-ed salt is the best way of assuring an adequate supply of iodine.





Regulations covering the exhibition of horses are expected to be is-sued in the near future.

sued in the near future, Werner said. Copies of the new regulation have been provided to county Extension offices.

The new rules make changes over the old standards in the following ways: 1. A negative test for cattle for tuberculosis is required erculosis is required under the new regula-tions. 2. A negative test of swine for pseutest of swine for pseu-dorables is required. 3. Health certificates for dogs are no longer required. 4. Vaccina-tion of dogs for distemper, hepatisis, and lep-tospirosis is required within one year of exhibition.

Health certificates are not required for swine shows at which all swine on the premises are slaughtered immediately following their exhibition, according to the regulation.

The Fulton County 4-H The new requirement livestock enrollment and ownership deadline for sheep, swine, dairy, rabbits, poultry, horse and pony and dogs is May 1. When enrolling their 4-H livestock, 4-H'ers should be aware of the changes in animal health regulations.

New health rules covering exhibition of all prior to the opening prior to the opening within 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition, and cattle under six-

months of age.
The pseudorabies stanrequires that all Indiana swine must have passed a negative test for pseudorables within 90 days prior to opening date of the exhibition, except swine from a currently PRV approved herd, swine qualifying for a carcass show or swine exempted by the state veterinarian.

No swine may be ex-hibited in Indiana originating from any pre-mises known to have had pseudorables in any spe-cies within the preced-

cles within the preceding 12 months.
Dr. Ken Myer, Purdue Extension veterinarian, warns that purchase of 4-H pigs from farms where pseudorables has been present could result in increasing the spread of the disease to currently uninfested spread of areas.

Pigs should be purchased only from pseu-dorables free farms. If there are qny questions concerning the pseudor-abies status, the ani-mals should be tested before they are trans-ported to the 4-H mem-ber's farm, he says. Pseudorables is a

disease of swine and other animals which is sometimes identi-as "mad itch". It also I t does not affect humans.

Some manufacturers use code dates that are difficult for the shopper to understand, and they may be misinterpreted as throwaway dates.

"Open dating" means any date on a packaged food that can be read by the shopper. It is a calendar indicating freshness. Some foods that have "open dates" are milk, cottage

"Open dating" tells the shopper about the freshness of the product.







"We intend to take personal action, beginning in our homes, that hopefully will bring about positive change in viewing habits and eventaully in the media itself."

According to the announcement from the denomination's Family Life Commission in Cleveland,

Commission in Cleveland Tennessee, the week of Temmessee, the week of non-viewing is the ini-tial phase of a four-, phase program to be car-ried out over a period of ten months. The first part of the pro-gram will be followed by an emphasis on family television control. In television control. In September, a nationwide survey of viewers will be conducted to deter-mine the ten highest rated programs as well as the ten that are rated the lowest. The sponsors of the ten lowest-rated programs will be written and asked to reconsider their spon-sorship of these shows. Finally, in January, if no positive response has been received from the sponsors, a product boy-cott will be organized as a protest against the sponsorship of undesirable programming. Along with the product boy-cott, a letter-writing cott, a letter-writing campaing to television networks and to local television stations will be promoted.

The Church of God is one of the several de-nominations that are planning organized cam-paigns to stop the pro-liferation of television programs which emphasize violence and sex.

# Saláries and fringe benefits take most of school funds, report shows

An average of 81 percent of the total money spent for public educasalaries and related fringe benefits. This is one of the facts brought out in the 1977 School Statistical Recompiled by Indiana Farm Bureau.

Copies of the 101-page ook have been mailed book have been mailed to all superintendents of the 305 public school systems in the state, according to William A. Hadley, the organization's local affairs adirect and coordinator book visor and coordinator of the project. The book is printed annually to help local districts evaluate costs, compare them with similar school systems, and analyze local tax situations and trends.

The average Indiana salary of a beginning teacher was \$8,819, as of January 1. The state's highest salary for a beginning teacher with a B.A. degree is \$9,907 for Duneland in Porter county and the lowest is \$8,150 paid by No. Vermillion school in Vermillion county. Average salary at the end of five years experience for teachers with a B.A. degree is \$10,075, with the maximum, with an M.A. degree at \$15,417.

The state's public school enrollment continues to decrease with 12,041 fewer students this year than last year. Schools with organized corporations by No. Vermillion school

ganized corporations numbered 286, while 19 schools operate under a township trustee system

# U.S. defenses invite annihilation, Snider tells Anthony Nigo Chapter

"It's Your Country, Too" was the national defense topic presented by guest speaker Prof. Snider of Grace ge at a recent Wayne Smith of State
College at a recent
meeting of Anthony Nigo
Chapter, DAR in the American Legion Home.
"America's national

"America's national defense program has been virtually at a stand-still since the 1972 Strategic Arms Limitations Talks (SALT)," he said. The SALT agreement enabled the Soviet Union to thoroughly modernize its armaments program. Its strategic, naval and general-pur-pose forces have been updated without major countermoves by the U.S. and without provable violation of the armsviolation of the arms-limitations talks, Sni-der charged. He said a comparison of strategic defense weapons strength shows Russia surpassing the United States by more than 3 to 1 with the USSR having 14,000 strategic weapons as compared to the U.S.'s 415.

Snider said the Soviet navy has steadily grown with the development of new nuclear submarines, new nuclear submarines, outnumbering the U.S. nuclear subs 3 to 1, thus going far beyond a defensive naval force to become a powerful offensive force.

offensive force.
He also reported Russia is spending 50 percent more for defense than the U.S., building strong civil defense provisions, which include 75 command posts underground and addi-tional shelters for civilians. It makes no ef-fort to keep defense preparations secret. Information regarding Information regarding Soviet military strength has been easily obtain-ed by the American Se-curity Council for the production of "Price of Peace and Freedom," a 28 minute film now a-vailable vailable.

vailable.
Snider said the present SALT II talks controversy concerns whether a new high-performance Soviet bomber, "Backfire," should be considered a strategic bomber, despite the fact it has features of Mach 2 speed at high altispeed at high altitude, supersonic at low altitude, aerial refuel-ing and the flexibility to perform a variety of missions, including attacks against the U.S. mainland. The Soviet Union insists, Snider said, that the Backfire be excluded from SALT limitations.

"A comparison of the trends in Soviet and A-merican defensive forcmerican detensive forces shows how the U.S. has almost disarmed its defensive forces," Snider said. "The U.S. has continued to cut its defensional forces." fense spending for development programs for strategic weapons, such as the B-1 supersonic bomber. Present defense

expenditures invite dis-aster and destruction."

Concluding his talk, Snider quoted Alexander Solzhenitsyn from an address at an AFL-CIO meeting in New York, "At address at an AFL-CIO meeting in New York, "At one time there was no comparison between the strength of the USSR and yours. Then it became equal to yours. Now, as all recognize, it's becoming superior to yours. Soon it will be 2 to 1, then 3 to 1. Finally it will be 5 to 1. With such nuclear superiority, it will be possible to block the use of your weapons and on some unlucky morning they will declare: "Attention, we are marching our troops to Europe, and if you make a move, we will annihiliate you. And this ratio of 3 to 1 or 5 to 1 will have its effect. You will not make a move."
