Citizens register complaints about loose dogs

Mentone trustees hear meter presentations

man, Jim Miller and Wayne Tombaugh listened to salesmen from Water Products Co., Wabash, and Rupp's Corporation, Kokomo, at last Monday's board meeting. Dave Stevens and Earl Bucher, from Water Products. offered a presentation of Rockwell magnetic-driven water meters, and Tim Rupp, from Rupp's Corporation, represented Neptune water meters.

Although no definite plans have

been made to start meter-replacement, president Miller stated implementation of a replacement program is a major concern of the board.

Clerk-treasurer Kate Whetstone read a letter of resignation to the board from dispatcher Becky Hart. Hart, the wife of Marshal John Hart, has served as police dispatcher for five years, and Miller warmly praised her work.

Trustees signed Ordinance #248, stating no new mobile homes or mobile units can be set within town limits except in designated mobile home courts or parks. The only exception allowed is that the owner of an existing mobile home can replace the home according to specifications established by the Administrative Building Council of Indiana. Home must be replaced within a 30 day time limit.

In other business: Trustees voted to hire the county dispatcher instead of attempting to replace Hart with another local dispatcher. After an initial cost of \$365, which includes a \$177 connection fee to the county dispatcher telephone, cost of the service will be \$227.67 a month. For Mentone residents, the number to call remains the same, as the call will be automatically transferred. Marshall Hart was instructed to make arrangements for the service.

Two citizens attended the meeting to complain about dogs running loose in town and creating a public nuisance. One woman became quite emotional as she insisted the dogs posed a physical threat to her family. At one point she threatened to take matters into her own hands, and Marshal Hart

informed her the dogs' would have the right to prosecute. He also warned it was against town statutes to wield weapons within the town limits. Hart reported to board members he'd repeatedly advised the woman to take her complaints to the county prosecuting attorney, but she's failed to do so.

Trustees accepted Hart's report for the month of February. included 1,300 miles logged on the police vehicle while answering 23 calls. It also included: eight accident reports, with four investigations; two agency assists; three record checks; two vandalism reports, two title checks; two arrests, 22 traffic citations, and one warn-

The next meeting of the board will be Monday, April 2 at 7 p.m. in the town offices

Warsaw advances to Elkhart regional

Valley meets Waterloo at Triton

If it's true revenge is sweet, Coach Ned Wicker and the Triton Trojans savored a double victory in last Thursday's win over Tippecanoe Valley in the opening game of the Triton sectional. Although the Vikings grabbed an early lead, they were unable to repeat an early-season, double overtime victory over the Trojans.

Triton senior Curt Anders led the Trojans by scoring 20 points and grabbing 13 rebounds, but it wasn't a one-man show. Junior center Mark Senff added 14 points and junior forward Ryan Meister scored 13 points while guards John Smith, Zak Lemier and Gary Flenar assisted their teammates by successfully executing a spread offense.

Valley senior Greg VanDeWater tallied 21 points, 17 in the second half, before fouling out of the game with 1:53 left on the clock. Shad McConkey added 16 points for Tippe Valley. Senior Dan Boyer and junior Ken Johnson Valley's 37 - 35 rebounding edge with nine and eight rebounds, respectively.

Anders gave the Trojans their final lead by dropping in two free throws late in the third period to break a 39 - 39 tie. After Valley lost the ball without scoring, Anders then hit a short jumper to end the third quarter 43 - 39. By the end of the final period, during which the Trojans made 11 of 15 free throws, the score was 64 - 55.

Valley hit only 38 percent from the field, making 25 of 66, while Triton hit 21 of 44 attempts for 48

percent. Triton also made 22 of 30 from the charity stripe, while Valley connected for five of nine attempts.

Barn owls make comeback artificial nest boxes when properly The Division of Fish and Wild-

life remains very interested in recent sightings of barn owls in Indiana. This bird may be the rarest known in Indiana, with only one active nest recorded in 1983.

A barn owl is not just an owl in a barn. This bird is about 14 inches tall, has a golden brown back and is white underneath with dark spots on the back and breast, dark brown eyes, a round head with no ear tufts and a white heart-shaped face. If you sight one of these birds perched in a barn, silo or similar structure, you'll likely notice it lowering its head and swaying back and forth.

Numbers of these birds have drastically reduced during the past 25 years due to several reasons. Many wooden barns and open silos have been replaced with modern metal structures which do not provide nesting platforms. Draining wetlands, clearing odd areas and maintaining fewer hay fields has resulted in fewer mice which are favored food for these birds. A pair of nesting barn owls is a fine and most efficient means of rodent control, far more effective than barn cats or poisons.

There is hope that populations of barn owls can be recovered. These birds adjust to human activities better than most owls and will use

Dentistry advances with Occlus-o-Guide

Wearing braces can sometimes be an unpleasant and quite often an uncomfortable experience. One out of every 10 children in the United States will have to wear braces.

Dr. Earl O. Bergersen, a professor for 25 years at Northwestern University Dental School, has invented a device called the "Occlus-o-Guide," similar to a football player's mouthguard with an indentation for each tooth.

The U-shaped device is aimed at improving the patient's appearance, but also at heading off the health problems that crooked teeth can cause later in life, including loose teeth, gum disease and tooth loss.

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Daniel C. Croner, D.D.S. in North Manchester, has used the Occlus-o-Guide technique on three of his patients since September. "Basically what this technique does, is that it moves the teeth without braces. The plastic mouthguard straightens the teeth.

"The Guide must be worn four hours a day and at night while asleep. The patient puts pressure by biting down on the device for four hours a day. This stimulates growth and eventually the teeth will straighten," said Croner.

Croner listed several advantages to the "Occlus-o-Guide" technique. The first is the economic advantage over conventional

braces. In the three cases Croner has been working on, not one of them has cost more than \$700. Traditional braces can cost anywhere from \$2,000 to \$3,000. Another definite advantage is that the Guide will move teeth more rapidly. The savings in time spent on treatment by using the Guide is nine to 11 months compared to two or three years with braces, according to Croner.

"The ideal patient is a child, 8-11 years old, whose permanent teeth are still coming in," said Croner, although Bergersen has reported success with older people. "I feel the device works best with severe overbite or overject problems," Croner said.

The only disadvantage Croner listed was that the device is removable. The patient has to devote the time necessary for the device to work. "It requires people to wear it. You can't eat or drink with the device in." The motivation has to be there in order for this technique to work.

On Mon., Feb. 27, "That's Incredible" aired a segment on Bergersen's "Occlus-o-Guide." Although a number of European doctors use the device, Bergersen estimated that only 5 to 10 percent of American orthodontists do so. But according to "That's Incredible" this technique is going to "grow with the profession."

Wirpel offers recommendations for teacher contract settlement

Sander W. Wirpel, stateappointed fact finder in the Tippecanee Valley School Corporation and Classroom Teachers Association dispute released his fact finder's report, Sat., Feb. 25, 1984.

The report listed 12 recommendations for settlement when the report was made public.

Wirpel conducted a hearing on Nov. 17 and sent the report to the parties some time later. Negotiators reached agreement on Feb. 9, but the teachers association rejected the agreement. The report then was made public.

The parties have been unable to reach final agreement on 17 items, including salary, teacher association rights, teaching conditions, insurance, sick leave and a grievance procedure.

In his report, Wirpel called for a 6 percent across-the-board increase, retroactive to Jan. 1, with increment and a 6 percent increase in extra-duty pay. The teachers asked for a 14 percent hike and the corporation offered 4

percent.

In the report Wirpel said his recommendation, which was well below the 14 percent increase the teachers requested at the fact-finding hearing, was made due to limited resources of the school corporation and other major language problems which need to be addressed.

Wirpel reported that a grievance procedure culminating in binding arbitration would be recommended. The teachers asked for binding arbitration; the school corporation opposes it.

In Wirpel's recommendations the school corporation should expand payroll deductions for savings bonds and group insurance, but not withold pay of teachers who are not members of the association to represent a "fair share" dues or fee for the association. The association has asked that non-members be required to pay an amount less than dues to help finance the association; the corporation opposes this.

The association's proposal to

encourage early retirement (after 10 years) of teachers by paying them a lump sum of 1½ percent of final pay times years of service should be adopted. The action is designed to avoid big expenses as teachers reach retirement age. There would be savings over the years because teachers lower on the salary schedule would be hired to replace those taking early retirement. The corporation wants no change.

As for the insurance recommendations, the school corporation increase its annual contribution toward medical group insurance coverage for single employees from \$557.60 per year and for family coverage from \$925 to \$1,100 per year.

No dates have been set for future mediation, and no new proposals have been made to date.

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
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








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Block extends programs

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block extended the sign-up period for 1984 cotton, feed grain, rice, and wheat programs by three weeks, through March 16.

Block also said he has changed summer fallow rules so that the requirements would be the same as they were in 1983 and previous programs. Prior to this action, acreage designated for the 1984 programs could not have been land intended for summer fallow in the current year. Other provisions of the 1984 programs will remain unchanged, he said.

Block said he took these actions to clear away some of the obstacles which made it difficult for farmers to make sound decisions about the programs. many Also, farmers have not been able to finalize crop operating plans including financing and lease arrange-

ments. Since producers must sign a binding contract in the 1984 acreage reduction programs, liquidated damages for failure to comply, they are reluctant to sign up until their operating plans are more complete, he said.

"Both USDA and private sector analysts say that when most farmers compare these programs with their operating plans, they will find participating is to their advan-tage." Block said. "This extension will give producers the time needed to weigh the benefits of participating against the risks of no price protection which they would otherwise face."

Block encouraged farmers avoid a last-minute rush to USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Services county offices so that they can better serve each







Day what comes to mind? Leprechauns, shamrocks, the Blarney stone, the color green or maybe

Most people know St. Patrick's Day is celebrated on March 17, but many don't know who St. Patrick was or what he accomplished with his life. Some of the legends surrounding St. Patrick include the story of how he charmed all the snakes of Ireland into the sea so they would drown. He was also accredited with planting threeleafed shamrocks in Ireland.

In honor of Ireland, and St. Patrick, we thought we'd set the record straight. St. Patrick is the patron (guardian) saint of Ireland and was chiefly responsible for converting the Irish people to Christianity.

Born in Britain, St. Patrick was captured and sold as a slave in Ireland when he was 16. During his captivity, he dedicated himself to his religion. After six years of slavery, he escaped to France and

studied for the priesthood.

As a result of his experiences in

convert the Irish, so he returned to Ireland and traveled the country spreading the Christian doctrine. He founded more than 300 churches and baptised more than 120,000 people. He was also responsible for introducing the Roman alphabet and Latin literature in Ireland.

St. Patrick used the shamrock to spread the blarney too thick.

When you think of St. Patrick's prison, Patrick was determined to illustrate the idea of Trinity, the term used to express the belief that in the one God there are three divine Persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost. Many people believe this is how the shamrock came to be the traditional symbol of Ireland.

Bell Library finishes 14-year reference center

Two weeks ago the Bell Memorial Library officially completed a project begun in 1970. Librarian Madeline Fisher was pleased to announce the reference planned by former librarian Pearl Lackey is finally finished.

According to Fisher, the addi-tion (to the back of the original building) was added in 1970 by Claypool contractor Robert Bowen. At that time, funds were available only for the structure, but Bowen personally furnished paint for the room and old wooden shelving he'd taken from the old Mentone drug store. (The shelving has now been replaced by new metal shelving, and the old wooden shelves have been donated to the Kosciusko County Historical Societv.)

Lackey immediately started acquiring reference materials for the new room, but at that time the library was under a severely-limited frozen budget. The frozen taxes were broken in the last three years, however, when Harrison Township merged with Mentone and Bell Memorial became a town/ township library. The increased revenue enabled Fisher to complete the room and acquire an impressive collection of reference

One of the major new acquisitions are a \$2500 microfilm reader due to arrive this week and a \$1500 microfilm collection of every newspaper ever published in Mentone. (This includes the Mentone Gazette, the Mentone Tri-County Gazette, the Mentone Community News, the Northern Indiana Coop News and the Mentone News.)

Fisher's pet project for the library is an extensive collection of agricultural reference material. "We're a rural community," she pointed out, "and I've always deeply felt the absence of agricultural materials. It took some doing and a lot of help from Purdue University, but we've updated our agricultural material. We now have repair manuals for every tractor ever manufactured in the U.S., and I'm still looking for a source of materials for the German manufactured Steiger tractor and other foreign tractors."

Fisher added she also has an extensive collection of consumer research material not always found in small libraries.

Now that the reference room is completed, Fisher intends to turn some of her attention to updating and improving the Bell collection of materials for young adults, ages 14

Free pre-school testing offered at Fulco sites

Kosco targeted by USDA

A new target area has been approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for eight counties in northeastern Indiana, plus counties in Ohio and Michigan. Kosciusko County is one of the eight counties targeted in Indiana.

Targeting is a strategy which grew out of a national resource conservation study--known Conservation RCA, Resources -conducted several years ago by the USDA. In simple terms, targeting means putting additional Conservation Service (SCS) technical assistance and increased Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) ACP cost sharing in areas where erosion problems or water conservation problems are the worst.

Congressman John P. Hiler supports targeting as an efficient way to approach soil and water conservation. "We need to fight soil erosion and maintain our agricultural productivity," Congressman Hiler said.

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block said, "Targeting has produced excellent results during the past two years. Targeting of technical and financial assistance in 31 states in 1983 resulted in 29 million additional tons of soil saved and conservation of 276,000 more acrefeet of water.

Secretary Block expanded targeting in 1984 to 44 states and Puerto Rico, according to Robert L. Eddleman. SCS state conservationist in Indiana. He said, "To qualify for targeting, an area must meet certain criteria: soil erosion or water shortages must have a significant impact on the nation's agricultural conservation needs, progress in treating the problem



U.S. over which

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must be likely and people who live in the area must support the work."

Targeting in Indiana began in 1983 with a 12-county area ir. southwest Indiana. Two additional areas were added this year: the 8-county Ohio-Michigan-Indiana (OMI) target area and the 8-county Miami Whitewater target area in southeastern Indiana.

"Targeting works," Bill Weber, SCS assistant state conservationist for land resources, says. "Major benefits are erosion control which sustains agricultural productivity, improves water quality, and reduces maintenance problems on roadside and drainage ditches."

Weber said, "Targeting more SCS personnel for technical assistance means that SCS employees will be able to concentrate on landowners with the most critical erision problems."

Through additional soil conservation, Kosciusko County can benefit through increased soil productivity and reduced pollution of its many lakes and waters.

Joseph P. Crill replaces Rogers on board

In an unanimous decision Monday evening, March 19, members of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation board appointed Joseph P. Crill to serve the remainder of William Rogers' term on the board. (Rogers, who resigned in February for personal reasons, was elected representative from Newcastle township in 1982, and his term was due to end in 1986.)

Crill, 44, has been self-employed in plumbing and heating since 1973. He graduated from Aubbeenaubbee High School and served with the U.S. Army from 1961 - 63. He's lived in Newcastle township since 1973.

Robert H. King was the only other applicant for the position. Superintendent Baxter Paige announced Crill will be sworn in at the April meeting of the board.

the April meeting of the board.
Paige informed trustees that
public law 111, called "Prime Time
Legislation," had been passed by
both branches of the State Legislation. Funds are being offered to
encourage schools to lower teacherstudent ratios in grades K-3 over
the next four years. The new law

states that, in order to lower class sizes to 18 or fewer pupils per class, the State will reimburse schools \$18,000 per new teacher

Paige pointed out that while this law may well benefit larger schools whose enrollment has dropped during the past few years, it was of little help to TVSC and many smaller corporations that are already utilizing all available classrooms. He pointed out, with a touch of irony in his voice, that "no money is available for classrooms, only for teachers."

To meet the requirements for the added funds, approximately three teachers would need to be added each year corporation-wide for the next four years, and Paige added 12 classrooms would be difficult, if not impossible, to find.

The legislation also holds a passage that offers \$6000 for new aides hired or \$3600 per teacher to corporations that already meet the 18-or-fewer-pupil requirement.

Paige suggested that a few possible solutions toward cutting class sizes would include reap-

portioning or redistricting students, adding new rooms at the elementary schools, or building a middle school, thus opening rooms for elementary students. He requested that letters with possible solutions or suggestions from Valley patrons be directed to his office and that board members consider the options.

Trustees approved a calendar for the 1984 - '85 school year. It includes: the first day of school for students, August 23; Christmas vacation, December 21 to January 2; end of first semester, January 10; begin second semester, January 14; spring vacation, March 29 - April 8; and last day of school for students, May 23.

No half days of school for students were scheduled, as it would create complications in meeting new State requirements.

new State requirements.
Approximately 100 teachers and parents attended the Monday meeting, held in the high school conference room, to lend support to the teachers' in their contract dispute with the board. Classroom Teachers Association president Bernadean Howard thanked everyone for coming and once again urged trustees to return to the negotiating table and attempt to settle the contract. She pointed out that the end of the school year is drawing closer and Tippecanee Valley is the only area school

system that still has not settled a contact.

In other business: Valley principal John Hill received approval on his proposed changes in graduation requirements. The changes, which begin next year in accordance with new State requirements, will be implemented gradually. By the 1987 - '88 school year, Valley students will need a total of 42 credits to receive a Valley diploma, including four years of English and two years each of math and science.

Paige recommended Robert DuBois be given a one-year extension as coach of the varsity boys basketball team, but trustee Jim Royer questioned if it wouldn't be better to give him a two-year extension, adding, "it would give him a chance to start a program." The trustees unanimously voted on the two-year extension.

In other personal matters, board members accepted the resignation of Terri Klotz as coach of the girls tennis team and appointed Beverly Clampitt to take over as coach. Trustees also approved professional leave requests for Gary Stath and Jeff Salyer to attend a wrestling clinic in Chicago between April 13 - 15.

This elicited some comments from patron Dick Mims, Akron, when members of the audience were given the opportunity to

speak. Mims asked why substitute teachers hadn't been hired to relieve the two teachers at Mentone who were in charge of the annual science fair. When pressed by Mims, Paige admitted that substitutes were hired when teachers took professional leave, prompting Mims to ask if wrestling was more important than science.

Mims also urged trustees to carefully consider the classroomsize problems, saying, "Let's try to look to the future and find a long-term solution."

Trustees approved Paige's recommendation to hire Pace Designs, Elkhart, to do an energy conservation study for TVHS. The study will be submitted to the federal government in an attempt to obtain up to \$50,000 in federal grants. The corporation will not be obligated to pay for the study unless it results in a grant, and then cost of the study would be approximately \$7500.

Board members approved funds for an administrative workshop to be held at Pokagon State Park between June 12 - 14. Cost of the workshop, paid by the corporation, will run about \$500.

Board members approved claims of \$123,322.67 and payrolls of \$76,238.01 and \$74,411.62.

The next meeting of the board will be Monday, April 23 at the administration building, at 7 p.m.



Spring clean-up set for May 4 and 5

Akron trustees sign with Public Service

The Akron town board meeting was called to order and a representative from Public Service Indiana spoke with the board. Representative wanted trustees to sign a contract that started in 1982 and runs for another three years.

Wednesday, March 28, 1984

The PSI representative also discussed the possibility of conversion of town lights from mercury to sodium, saying that sodium is more economical and saves on energy. One other benefit was that the high pressure sodium lights make the town more visible. The board voted unanimously on the PSI contract and signed the document.

The board also signed a contract for Val Duggins, waste water treatment inspector, to be paid \$310 per month for inspections of the waste water treatment plant. Rick Ringle, town employee, stated that the sub-station behind the telephone station still hasn't received the necessary parts for repair. Jack Miller, board president, made a motion for Clerk Sarah Jane Sutton to get in touch with the company that is providing the new parts as soon as possible. The motion was passed with Miller stating, "that sub-station should be in operating condition at all times."

The board also voted unanimously to get a new agreement written with the Henry Township Fire Department. The present agreement is 10 years old.

A resolution was written giving clerk Sutton permission to write checks forbillsbetween board meetings. Dick Drudge made the motion and Miller seconded it with the vote being unanimous.

Trash pick-up days for spring clean-up has been set for May 4 and 5. Anyone wishing to volunteer their time or trucks should call at the clerk's office. Also anyone wishing for something to be hauled away should call the clerk's office. The trustees stated, however, that all doors must be removed from freezers, refrigerators, etc.

The Akron firehouse door is in need of adjustment and Sutton was given information and Miller made a motion to have her call the Safeway Door Company in Warsaw to have them make the necessary adjustments. Hudson seconded it and the motion was passed unanimously.

Beginning April 2 the clerk's office hours will be 8 a.m. - noon, Monday through Friday. Mrs.

Florence Katz's (secretary to clerk) hours will remain the same. Also on April 2 the town employees will be working 7 a.m. - 4 p.m. instead of the 8 - 5 shifts that they are working now.

Garland Sparks, superintendent, was advised to check into the cost of three fire hydrants and instructed to return to the next town meeting with the results. A discussion was brought up about the water meters being repaired. Apparently Akron water is filled with iron and sometimes blocks up the water meters. The board instructed the employees to keep check on the meters and report back to them.

Town employees also reported trash is being placed in the sewers, causing pump problems. The material is characterized as a "heavy-duty or super-strength" paper toweling made with nylon or synthetic fibers. The fibers are wrapping around the pump and

causing many problems. Citizens should be informed to be very careful of what they put in the sewer system, as the repair expenses for this are very high and parts have to be replaced.

Marshal Dave Kruger submitted his police report for the month of February. Akron Police Dept. patrolled 1414 miles, investigated six accidents, had one dog complaint, two funeral escorts, five arrests, seven verbal warnings, seven motorist assists, four public assists, one open door check, four title checks, one attempted break-in, one theft report, five county assists, two other police department assists, and one ambulance assist

An engineer will meet with the board next month to discuss the painting of the water tower.

The next board meeting will be Tuesday, April 17, 7 p.m. in the town hall.

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
