

Floyd Henson is certainly the man of the week in AKRON. In his fifth year of coaching at Akron, he has seen the team develop from one that won only three games the first year to one that has lost only two games this year and that has captured the sectional tourney crown. Championship teams are nothing new to Henson who led Odon to the semi-finals in 1959. Henson, a 1948 graduate of Indiana State and a 1939 graduate of Paris. Ill. High School, participated in three Illinois state finals. His team didn't win but placed second once and third another time. another time.

Forst Dunnuck, guidance director and counselor at Akron High School was named winner of the Rochester Jaycees' first Outstanding Young Educator Award at ceremonies held in Rochester last night. # **PSI** seeking rate reduction

Public Service Indiana will ask for a two-step rate decrease totalling more than 9 percent.

The company had earlier estimated it could reduce rates 7 percent. When rates 7 percent. When numbers were finalized, however, a larger decrease resulted.

PSI says it would reduce rates by giving customers the benefit of certain tax savings sooner than normal. A decrease of about 6 percent would take effect May 1. One of about 3 percent would take effect July 1.

Both decreases must be approved by the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission. Approval by the Internal Revenue Service is also required before the 3 percent decrease can take effect.

"If the reductions are approved, our customers would save a total of \$131 million in 1988 and 1989," said Hugh A. Barker, chair man of PSI. "Normally, those tax savings would be spread over as many as 30







### **Apportioned** deadline now March 31

Governor Bob Orr has signed legislation extending the registration deadline for apportioned commercial ehicles to March 31. The bill, authored by Senator William Soards and Repre-sentatives Jack Cottey and Mary Kay Budak, is effective immediately and will set the March 31 deadline for

upcoming years.
All apportioned commercial vehicle registration is conducted through the Bureau of Motor Vehicles' International Registration Plan Division. 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
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# Tornado Preparedness Week to be observed March 13-19

Governor Orr has pro-claimed March 13-19 to be 'Tornado Preparedness Week'' in Indiana. The Tenth Annual Statewide Tornado Exercises will be conducted on Thursday, March 17, 1988 between 2 and 4 p.m. EST and again

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between 7 and 9 p.m. EST.

The first test will allow participation of schools and businesses, the second test will be geared to businesses with an evening shift, evening activities at schools and people in their homes. The drills provide a good way of testing warning and communications systems.

Indiana ranked third in the

nation in number tornadoes and third in the nation in number of tornado deaths per square mile for the period 1953-1986. Three of the worst tornado out-breaks in U.S. history have affected Indiana.

On April 1965, the Palm Sunday Outbreak spawned Il tornadoes over 20 counties and took the lives of 137 Hoosiers. On April 3, 1974, the Super Outbreak the Super Outbreak occurred. An unprecedented 148 tornadoes affected 13 states and Canada. 46 Indiana counties were affected by 21 tornadoes and 47 people were killed.

The most devastating tornado in U.S. history occurred on March 18, 1925. The Tri-State Tornado tore across 219 miles of southeast Missouri, southern Illinois, and southwest Indiana, for three and half hours at speeds of over 70 mph. 695 were killed, 70 of them in Indiana.

average of 20 tornadoes per year strike Indiana, and Indiana aver-ages six tornado deaths per vear. Indiana's population is about four times as dense as the so called Tornado Alley states of Oklahoma and Kansas, making Hoosiers more vulnerable to a tornado

Last year 17 tornadoes touched down in Indiana including the Morocco tornado, which damaged 20 homes and injured three people. Fortunately there has been only one tornado death in the last seven years in Indiana, and only 12 in the last 13 years. However,

Tornado Season in Indiana is from mid March through June. Although tornadoes are most frequent in June, the tornadoes that occur in March and April are generally larger and far more destructive. Tornadoes are most common in the afternoon and evening hours from 2 to 8 p.m.

Tornadoes aren't the only threat! Downburst winds, hail, lightning, and flash floods also pose a serious threat to the residents of Indiana

There were more non-tornadic damaging wind-storms in Indiana than any other state on a per square mile basis from 1955 to 1983. 62 people were killed by lightning in Indiana from 1959 to 1982. Flash Floods pose a greater threat to life and property nationwide than any other weather phenomena.

The following are recom-mended general safety instructions to follow during severe weather:

\*Seek inside shelter, preferably in a tornado cellar, underground excavation, or a steel-framed or reinforced concrete building of substantial construction. Stay away from windows. Do not waste time opening windows, seek shelter immediately - the tornado will "open" the windows well before the pressure difference can cause any structural damage.

In office buildings and steel reinforced masonry structures, lie down in an interior hallway on a lower floor, preferably in the base-

In factories, post a lookout Workers should move quickly to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection in accordance with advance plans.

In homes, the basement

usually offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under a sturdy workbench or heavy table, if possible. In homes with no basement, take cover under heavy furniture in the center part of the home. Stay away from windows.

Whenever possible, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid audi-torium and gymnasiums or other structures with wide, free-span roofs, especially those which are not steel and concrete reinforced structures. Students should assume crouched position on floor along a wall with hands covering head.

If a building is not of reinforced construction, go swickly to a nearby requickly to a nearby re-inforced building, or to a ravine or open ditch and lie flat. Move away from the tornado's path at right angles. If there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or

Keep listening to the radio r television for the latest advisory information. Call the local law enforcement office to report a tornado. Remember, Tornado Watch means tornadoes are expec-ted to develop. Tornado Warning means a tornado has actually been sighted.

Farmers and their bankers could apply for the guarantee from the IADC which could then guarantee fixed asset loans of \$25,000 -300,000 at 50-90% of the

The RFD program is step two in the state's Value-Added efforts. Last year, the General Assembly appropriated \$800,000 for value-added industry promotion to help find new markets for Indiana's agricultural products.



When The Going Gets Tough, You Just Keep On Trying!

It would seem that losing weight is an uphill procedure. It seems uphill just trying to begin. It seems uphill as you battle against snacking and eating fattening foods. It is also uphill when

rattening joods. It is also upnil when you hit your plateau. Many times after a person has lost twenty pounds or so (this may vary) no more weight will be lost for several weeks. This is known as a plateau. This is sometimes the downfall of a person

who has several pounds to lose and thinks they won't lose any more.

Now is the time to look at yourself and how far you've come since the beginning. Remember back, look at old pictures of yourself or whatever it takes to remember what you looked like 20 lbs. ago. By now, you feel better, as well as look better. Even though you haven't reached your goal, you have improved considerably, enough that you don't want to

look better. Even though you haven't reached your goal, you have improved considerably, enough that you don't want to return to your former shape.

Each time you step on the scales, be proud of your accomplishment thus far and be grateful you haven't gained weight. If you continue your eating habits as before and with continued exercise, in a month or two your weight will begin dropping as before. Don't become discouraged, this is the time when willpower and a positive attitude must prevail.

Take inventory of your clothes. Try on the clothes you wore when you were overweight and notice how loosely they fit, pride yourself on a job well done so far. Realize how much better you now look and remember how you felt physically as well as emotionally when you were overweight. If I were a betting person, I would bet you are much happier and feel much better now. Why give that up for excess food?

Talk with a good friend who will support your attempt at losing weight. Perhaps there is someone who has been thruthis same situation and can give you some good advise. Perhaps the exercise you have been doing has gradually decreased. If this is so, try increasing your exercise and see what happens.

This may be a good time for a change of hair style. Sometimes when your weight doesn't change, a change elsewhere making you look better is enough of an incentive to keep you going until your plateau is over. Experiment, but don't give up.



# IT HAPPENED IN AKRON TAKEN FROM THE AKRON NEWS MARCH 17, 1938 50 YEARS AGO

The bride wore a bolero jacket frock of navy blue crepe with printed top, and navy blue accessories. The bridesmaid's frock was also navy blue printed crepe, with black accessories. The bride is a graduate of the Tippecanoe High School in the class of 1936. The groom graduated from the Talma High School in 1930. After the ceremony a wedding supper was held at the home of the groom's parents. 

#### LEGEND OF THE DOGWOOD





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#### **VA Home Loan amended**

The Indianapolis Veterans Administration Regional Office has announced that recent legislation signed by President Reagan will allow the Veterans Administration to relax downpayment requirements in the sale of certain homes acquired by the VA through foreclosure.

The Veterans Home Loan Program Emergency Amendments provides the VA with the authority to reduce or waive the five percent downpayment requirement on the purchase of VA-owned payment requirement on when purchase of VA-owned properties when it is determined necessary to market these properties competitively. This provision was effective February 29, 1988, the date the new bill

was signed

The measure also corrected a technical error in earlier legislation where the amount of a veteran's prior use of "entitlement" or loan guaranty benefits was sub-tracted from the potential guaranty on a new loan.

Instead, prior use of a veteran's entitlement will now be subtracted from \$36,000, the maximum amount of loan guaranty benefits available to an eligible veteran, with the remainder for use on new

The VA official said this provision applies to all loans closed on or after February 1. 1988, unless a guaranty commitment was made on or before December 31, 1987.



message. Under all the debris of winter were young delicate spring flowers trying to push their way up to the warm sun. Out of winter's gloom was the rebirth of spring. I had forgotten that in the fall we had planted spring bulbs in the same flower bed as the roses. The young plants held tight as I had tried to force their secure roots from the soil with my rake. I saw my own faith deeply rooted and my disbelief trying to uproot my

I realized the real message of Easter. No matter what debris we are buried in, whether problems, financial burdens, or any other worldly pressure, the love of Christ is pressure, the love of Christ is there pushing us up to conquer over any problem. Even when we forget what seeds of faith are planted deep within us, God remembers. When we think we are carrying the entire load of this world's problems, God is holding up our arms and moving us forward. We are human, and God knows that too!

Easter provides a chance to get a refill of Christian faith. Just as my little spring flowers brought renewed hope to me. Easter can do the same for you. It is an opportunity to celebrate our Christian belief. Easter will be an opportunity conquer my unbeliefs.

## Severe weather definitions

Tornado. A violently rotating column of air usually forming a pendant from a cumulonimbus cloud, whose circulation reaches the ground. It nearly

cloud, whose circulation reaches the ground. It nearly always starts as a funnel cloud and may be accompanied by a loud roaring noise. On a local scale it is the worst destructive of all atmospheric phenomena.

2. Funnel Cloud. A rotating column of air forming a pendant from a cumulus or cumulonimbus cloud, whose circulation does not reach the ground. Note: Using the phrase funnel cloud aloft is redundant. Do not use the phrase tornado aloft when talking about a funnel. By definition a tornado reaches the ground and cannot be aloft.

3. Severe Thunderstorm. A thunderstorm accompanied by winds (sustained or gusts) of 58 mph or morpaniang may be used to infer the occurence of a severe thunderstorm.

thunderstorm.

4. Squall Line. A line of thunderstorms or squalls which may extend over several hundred miles.

5. Waterspout. A rotating column of air usually forming a pendant from a cumulus or cumulonimbus cloud, which forms over a body of water, and whose circulation reaches the water.

6. Downburst. A strong downdraft from a nulonimbus cloud which induces damaging winds

on or near the ground.

A. Macroburst. A large downburst with the diameter of outflow 2½ miles or larger and damaging winds lasting 5 to 20 minutes, intense macrobursts can cause tornado-force damage.

B. Microburst. A small downburst with the diameter of outflow less than 2½ miles and peak winds lasting only 2 to 5 minutes. They may induce dangerous wind and downflow wind shears which can



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

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# Changes made in laws for commercial vehicles

Bureau of Motor Vehicles Commissioner, Charles Layton reminded commercial vehicle owner/operators recent changes which affect their operations. The new regulations were adopted by the 1988 Indiana General

Registrations for vehicles under the International Registration Plan for the 1987 plate year will expire on March 31, 1988. The extension was granted to aid owners who were unable to meet the application dead-line established by the Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

Beginning April 1, owners or lessees of Tractors used a semitrailer will experience an increase in fees from \$10 to \$350, with the greater increase realized on heavier vehicles. The new fees are listed below and will

# New advantage for farmers

Driving two tractors at once would be too much for most farmers to handle, but driving one machine that does the work of two is a different story.

recent Ohio State University survey shows many farmers have taken advantage of new technology to save time, labor and fuel costs. Twenty-two percent of the Ohio grain producers answering the survey spent less than an hour working each of their acres, compared to an average of 1.8 hours. Farm machinery budgets currently in use often assume the farmer will spend three to four hours per acre.

One of the ways farmers are improving their productivity is through the use of tractors equipped with dual power take-off (PTO) shafts and three-point hitches. By mounting implements on the front and back of these machines, two jobs can be done in a single pass over a

# Financing program of incentives to be provided

demonstration program will provide low-interest money for energy savings to indusand commercial businesses and agricultural producers.

The loans can be used for energy conservation, Indiana resource development and renewable energy projects.

Any for-profit business or agricultural producer currently doing business in Indiana or who will be operating in the state as a result of their proposed project is eligible to apply for this pilot program.

There are several eligible projects for this program, including boiler replacements, coal-fired gas turbine systems, biomass projects, heating, ventilation and air conditioning replacements or conversions, renewable energy grain-drying systems.

Ten million dollars in funds from the Exxon Oil Overcharge Settlement are available for this program.

The Indiana Energy Development Board, a group of government, business and education leaders from around the state, approve the applications.

This program is preliminary stages right now and the guidelines being set are contingent upon number and rate of appli-

number and rate of applications received.

Each application will be reviewed for technical and economic feasibility. The EDB will be particularly sensitive to the applicant's ability to secure additional financing secure additional secures the supplement the financing to supplement the state's level of participation. This will serve to stretch Indiana's funding while ensuring that the applicant has a meaningful financial

proposing. Only projects which will be located within Indiana will be eligible for consideration.

Agricultural producers are required to match 25 percent of the project cost and industrial and commercial businesses must match 50 percent of the project cost. The loans must be repaid in ten years or less

Before a loan is approved. the applicant will be required to participate in a technical energy analysis of the building or project in order to determine the conservation techniques that will be used to maximize the return on investment of renewable resources.

Projects involving this fund should demonstrate the ability to increase energy use efficiently, utilize Indiana's natural resources and the ability to utilize renewable energy resources.

The projects must use commercially available and reliable technologies with the minimum and maximum loan amounts ranging from \$4,000 to \$1,500,000. The projects must be completed within ne year of the closing date of the loan with repayment made within ten years or less from the closing loan date.

Parents, in her opinion, don't have an acceptance of the young person's feelings of helplessness and vulnerability. The urge to drink or use drugs is still there but parents think treatment removes all desire "fixes to drink/drug and the young person, making him/her almost superhuman.

"Young people won't go to parents who expect them to be perfect. They internalize for so long that they lly fulfill the prophecy and DO drink or drug. I used to feel that, to be a good parent, I had to be a friend, then I found the quotation 'God made you parents, not friends, because friends will let your kids do things that you love them too much to let them do.

No. 2 obstacle, according to Mrs Demoret, is peers When teenagers come back from treatment to the old environment, peer groups are still the same. Drug users look down their nose on sober ones and non-users still find recovering friends

hard to accept.

One high school sopho more put it this way: "My old drug-using friends want me to use with them. When I won't, they drop me. My new friends are the ones in A.A. and N.A. That's it. I have to friends, lifestyle.

Point No. 3: Public. "We have pigeonholed these youngsters," Mrs. Demoret "because they don't conform to our standards of respectability - dress, hair, etc. - and we keep believing once a druggie, always a druggie. After a while the teenager thinks What do I have to DO to convince these people I've changed?' The public says, 'Change your appearance to what is acceptable and then we'll believe while the young people there are 'acceptable' say there are kids who are drinking and

Mrs. Demoret says A.A. and N.A. meetings encouraged in middle school and high school. "If one of our drug-free support group members has a relapse for the first time, he or she is suspended from the group until he/she brings a signed slip from an adult member of an A.A. or N.A. group that he/she has attended at least one meeting. This is not punitive. It's just based on the fact that there is no long-term sobriety without A.A. or N.A."

She concludes: single most important thing for parents to remember is to forget sentences that start 'If forget sentences that start it it weren't for you---' and 'How can you---' and 'Because of you---' and 'If only you had---' and 'Why can't you be more like your brother (sister, cousin, etc.)?

"Many times people store chemicals such as cleaning solutions and weed killers in their basements and garages," Pearson says. These chemicals can be deadly if ingested by

The same can be said for medicines in bathroom or kitchen cabinets. If they are used by the person for whom they were prescribed, they are safe. But if they are taken by the wrong person, tragedy can result.

Hoosiers should make careful inspection of all potentially dangerous products in their bathrooms, kitchens and garages. When checking the garage, make certain automotive supplies, such as oil, antifreeze, transmission fluid and car wax are placed out of the reach of If gasoline is kept in children. kerosene is garage, make sure it is properly labeled and stored away from a pilot light on a

Make certain all items are labeled and are in their original containers instead of drink bottles or other containers.

#### CHILD WITH PERIODONTAL DISEASE

Periodontal disease is an infection of the gums and other tissues that support the teeth. This is much more common in adults but no less serious when it happens to children. It is caused by plaque or bacteria that forms along the gum line, making the gums wollen and tender. Left untreated, the plaque will harden into calculus or tartar, increasing the decay area and infection. This causes the gums to separate from the teeth, leaving pockets for the urther spread of decay and infection. Eventually periodontal disease attacks and destroys the bones that support the teeth causing the affected teeth to loosen and fall out.

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

For too long, Indiana's educational system has been driven by minimums. We within minimum graduation requirements, ninimum instructional time requirements, minimum achievement standards for students and so forth. We minimum have done little to provide incentives to students to achieve and perform above these minimums.

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An incentive program for student achievement has been implemented to help change this pattern of relying on minimum standards. The Academic Honors Diploma, as approved by the State Board of Education, Board of Education, encourages and rewards students who pursue a rigorous, advanced course of study during the high school years. Beginning in the 1989-1990 school year, all schools will be required to offer this choice to students, but many schools are offering it beginning with the 1988 graduates.

I believe parents should be aware of this opportunity and encourage their children to consider this alternative. The extra effort students put forth to earn the Academic Honors Diploma will help them to develop strong character -- hard work builds self-esteem and determi-nation, not to mention the benefits derived from a more rigorous curriculum. I am convinced this extra effort will carry throughout their lives and lead to other successes.

The Academic Honors Diploma is available to any and all students who wish to pursue the challenge expected of them. It is not intended to be limited to only the very few and top academically talented students; rather the State Board hopes a broad range of students will be encouraged actively pursue diploma.

Earning this diploma equires a student to earn at least nine credits over and above the 38 required for graduation, or a total of 47

credits. It is also understood that the course selected will above may count toward this be academically challenging.
