Kathryn Hartzler retires as Republican Chairman, after thirteen years in the party hierarchy, she will give up her chairmanship, when the vice chairmanship and precinct committeemen gather to meet on March 4, at city hall.

In a interview with Kathryn on Thursday she said, "It's time to leave when you have the support of the people you help put into office, and new blood and new ideas are always good in any organization."

Mrs. Hartzler joined the GOP as vice chairman in May of 1976.

There were many highlights in Mrs. Hartzler career, one was the Republican National Convention last year as an official delegate of Indiana. But her main concern has always been on the local level. Mrs. Hartzler said, "Today you have the most honest and civil minded policitions, they are ones that want to make a difference, the day of back room politics is a thing of the past."

Mrs. Hartzler was the first women GOP chairman in Fulton County and was 5th District republican secretary for six years.

Want your tax return faster?

Did you know your tax return can be sent directly to the Internal Revenue Service's computers over telephone lines? Through the Electronic Filing Systems (EFS), taxpayers expecting a refund can have their check issued up to 3 weeks faster than the average "paper" tax return. In addition to faster processing, taxpayers who file electronically can elect to have their refunds deposited directly to their

checking or savings accounts. Last year, over 62,000 Hoosiers took advantage of this system to speed up their refunds.

To participate in electronic filing, you must contact a professional who has met IRS requirements. Check local advertising for participating transmitters. IRS reports there are over 300 offices who have applied to participate in Indiana.





At this meeting the show manager, David Roepke, will explain the details of run-

ning a Farm Progress Show food tent.

On January 4, the Fort Wayne Region began testing every unit of donated blood for the presence of HTLV-I antibodies. By February 1, all units of blood in inventory at 54 participating hospitals had also been tested.

HTLV-I is a retrovirus associated with Adult a type of Adult T-lymphoma/leukemia as well as neurological disease (tropical spastic paraparesis) causing paralysis and muscle spasticity. Both diseases are rare in the

United States.

American National Red Cross' decision to implement HTLV-I testing resulted from research findings which demonstrated 10 out of 40,000 random blood donors in certain geographical areas may carry the virus. The study also estimated that, without intervention, the virus would be transmitted to perhaps 2,800 of the nation's roughly 4 million transfusion recipients. A small number of those infected could develop disease.

Most HTLV-I positive individuals in

this country have been detected in intravenous drug users in New Orleans, New York City, Miami and Atlanta. HTLV-I infections are common in the Pacific Rim countries, the Caribbean basin and Africa.

According to the Region's Medical Director Ranie Koshy, M.D., one of the major reasons for implementing the HTLV-I test is that a person may not experience clinical symptoms of disease anywhere from 20-40 years after infec-tion. If, at all. "The Red Cross is taking a conservative approach," explains Koshy, because there is still much to be learned about HTLV-I. The Food and Drug Administration has a licensed test available and as a responsible organization we felt it would be prudent to utilize the test.

Testing for HTLV-I antibodies actually consists of two tests. The first is a screening test performed at each Regional Blood Center. If the test is repeatedly reactive, a second confirmatory test is conducted at American Red Cross National Headquarters in Washington, D. C. Blood donors will be notified of the possible presence of the HTLV-I virus if their test results are confirmed positives

Through the company's weatherization loan program, customers have received low, 6 percent interest loans for energy conservation projects. Loans are available for adding insulation, storm windows, caulking and weatherstripping as well as other conservation measures

From \$200 to \$1,500 can be borrowed under the program with repayment terms of six months to three years, depending on the amount of the loan.

A home energy audit is required for loan recipients. The audit is done by a state-certified energy audit specialist, who spends about two hours examining the home. A written report of the findings and recommendations is made for the homeowner, along with a list of stateapproved installers who can provide energy conservation systems.



Akron Town Board Meeting

Water and Sewage policy adopted by Akron Town Board Adopted by the Akron Town Board on February 21, will go into effect with March

Policy statement for the Water and Sewage utilities

A. Sec. 2-3-6 for the sewer rates and Sec. 2-5-3 for the water rates of the Akron Municipal are part of this policy statement.

B. All charges are billed once per month and are due when billed. Payment is required

by the 20th of the month. Bills not paid by the 20th are subject to cut-off of service

C. If unusual quantities of usage show on the bill, payment is still due by the 20th, however, a complaint can be registered at the time the bill is paid. This will start an investigation into the possible cause of the high bill. Errors in the reading will be corrected by the next bill. Leaks will occur on occasion. The water metered will be charged, however, if it is shown that the leakage did not enter the sewer system, a correction in the billing will be credited on the next bill.

D. For the purposes of the billing in section C above, an average usage will be determined by averaging the consumption for the three previous months.

E. Multiple users on one meter will be billed at the minimum rate times the number of users for both the water and sewage. On the third month the meter reading will determine the bill for both utilities, but no case will the bill be less than the minimum for each service times the number of users for the period covered.

F. Vacation rates or winter rates the utilities can be arranged. The sewer rate will not be charged during the off period. The water rate will be charged at the minimum.

G. Failure to pay the utility bills by the 20th of the month will result in a Red Notice on the following month. Failure to respond to the Red Notice by the 20th of the month will result in cut-off of services. Service can be restored by paying the delinquent bill in full and with the paying of a service charge. All delinquent bills not paid are subject to





Views On Dental Health

SUDDEN WISDOM-TOOTH



PAIN

If you have a partially erupted wisdom tooth that suddenly begins causing you pain, you should contact your dentist immediately for help. Percoronitis (inflection in the wisdom tooth area) is often caused when food and bacteria are trapped under the gum line. Until a wisdom tooth is fully erupted, it may be difficult to keep it free of food particles which begin to decay and attract bacteria. Unfortunately, partially erupted wisdom teeth tend to decay easily. When the nerve is also infected this can cause the severe pain of toothache.

To help relieve the pain until you get to the dentist, you can rinse your mouth thoroughly with a solution of warm, salt water, usually one teaspoonful of salt to a glass of warm water. Normally, aspirin is not recommended to relieve this pain because it may cause bleeding problems if the tooth has to be extracted.

Any pain caused by a wisdom tooth infection is considered a dental emergency and should be treated as soon as possible by your dentist.




The Van Dells

Indiana Board of Education

One year ago, Indiana had the shortest school year in the nation. As a result of action by the Indiana General Assembly, the state has lengthened its school year by five student days, and has reached the na-

tional average of 180 days.
Unfortunately for the boys and girls of Indiana, the General Assembly is now considering legislation, which in the aggregate, could cut as many as ten student days from the school year. If this legislation is enacted, our minimum school year would be shorter than it has been since 1967. Such action is educationally un-acceptable because the lost student days would be replaced by noninstructional activities, which although important, cannot be as considered as important as classroom learning and achievement. Student learning and achievement must be our primary concern.

Reducing the number of student days is fiscally irresponsible because it represents a breaking of the faith that the state made with the taxpayers two years ago. Indiana taxpayers are paying for 180 student days, and anything less than that is unacceptable.

At a time when many states and nations already exceed 180 days or are considering adding to their school years, and at a time when many leading educators, educational organizations and business orga-nizations are calling for more student time, it is ironic that the proposals presently being considered move Indiana in the opposite direction. Such a move backward assures that Indiana will continue to be a laggard in educational achievement.

The Indiana State Board of Education urges each member of the Indiana General Assembly to support Indiana's students by voting to keep the school year at 180 stu-

About Feb. 10, 1989, Kenny Grant, president of the Indian Awareness Center, a branch of the Fulton County Historical Society, received word from South Dakota that the Sioux Indian's on the Rosebud Reservation were freezing. So he asked me to put a notice in the newspaper asking people to donate clothing for the Sioux. So I typed up a news release and sent it to the Rochester Sentinel, Shopping Guide News, and Kewanna Observer, also WROI Radio.

Observer, also with Radio.

The response was tremendous. People came from all over bringing clothing. Matt Galvraith of the South Bend Tribune came and interviewed Kenny and put his picture in the Tribune. So people came down from South Bend to bring clothing too. And two donations of money came from South Bend too, to help pay for gasoline. The Alleluia Christian Lutheran Church, Mishawaka, donated \$111. Arlene Trash, South Bend, sent

Bob Smith, Farm & Home, Rochester, volunteered to drive his truck to take the clothing to the Indians. We gave him the money donated by the church and the South Bend lady to use for gasoline.

Bob brought an 18 foot trailer to the museum on Saturday, Feb. 18, and we loaded it clear full. He also had the topper on his pick-up truck full of clothes. He and his wife started west at 4 a.m. Sunday morning and arrived in South Dakota on Monday. The truck and trailer were unloaded at a Mormon Church on the Rosebud Sioux Reservation, and by evening all the clothing was gone. Bob reports that the Indians on the reservation are very poor, no jobs, no help from the government or the community. Some are living in empty cars.

Bill Tucker, Indianapolis, also took a pick-up truck full of clothing to the Sioux. He called the museum, got directions from Kenny Grant, left Saturday evening and arrived in Rosebud on Monday morning.

Kenny's sister, Pat Andrzejck, called me with thanks. She asked me to thank all you good people for donating the clothing. Also thanks from Agnes Whitemouth, the lady in charge of distributing the clothing on the reservation. And thank you from all those who received clothing. It was wonderful!

It Happened In Akron

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IT HAPPENED IN AKRON TAKEN FROM THE AKRON NEWS MARCH 5, 1959 30 YEARS AGO

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

The veterans Administration provides newly quaified tax veterans and surviving spouses with abatement certifications enabling them to save thousands of dollars in annual property taxes, according to VA Regional Director, Roy Bailey

Bailey indicated that the amount of exmption for eligible veterans and spouses depends primarily upon disability status, age, and period of service. According to Bailey, the tax exemption is provided by Indiana law and ranges between \$2,000 and 9,000, depending on the veterans or surviving spouses eligibility status.

Tax abatement certificates are no longer automatically mailed to eligible veterans and surviving spouses. Persons who have not previously furnished their County Auditor with the abatement form should contact the Regional Office to obtain the certificate

Regulation 16 is the rule, promulgated by the State Board of Tax Commission pursuant to the provisions of IC 6-1.1-31 1, for use by all business taxpayers and assessing officials to determine the valuation and assessment of all business personal property located in the State of Indiana each year. (Personal property is approximately 25% of the property tax The regulation is oriented and fairly complex.

The new Regulation 16, was last revised for March 1, 1980. Since that time, amendments from legislative changes and court decision have resulted in five separate supplements. The new Regulation 16 incorporates all of the changes into one new Regulation.

In an effort to notify business taxpayers, the State Board of Tax Commissioners has had printed over 50,000 copies of the new Regulation 16 for distribution to all affected parties. The Regulation contains over 125 pages of material and is too voluminous to be mailed. Taxpayers wishing to obtain a copy of the new Regulation 16 may pick it up at the Fulton County Assessor's

In order to conserve printing costs, taxpavers should retain Regulation 16 for future use.







faces, or improperly aligned teeth. Some people express tension by clenching or grinding their teeth, either while awake or unconsciously when they're asleep. When the lower teeth are rubbed against the upper teeth this is called bruxism. If you grind your teeth from side to side this may result in a bite or damage to your cheek or lips. You may be able to relieve the emotional aspects of the problem by trying to eliminate whatever is causing the tension. The dental aspects can be helped by your dentist. For instance, he can check the relationship of your bite to see if there are any inregularities in your teeth that are causing problems. He may suggest that you wear a Hawley-type appliance or a night guard to help break the bruxing habit. This will also give him another way of checking your bite to find out what dental problems should be corrected.

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





Apparently a change in the governor's mansion still isn't enough to convince some of our more professional politicians that their job as citizen legislators is to represent the citizens of the state...not cut deals and wield influence in back door meetings.

The most recent example of this is the methods used by a few to bury a change in the

The change would have set the same speed for trucks as for cars on rural stretches of interstate highway eliminating as much as possible variances in speed between different types of vehicles. The issue wasn't a special concession or benefit to trucking. It was a safety measure.

These are the facts: According to Purdue University Professor Patrick McCarthy, speed variation is more important to highway safety than average speed. In a study done for the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety, Professor McCarthy says, "An increase in speed variation increases the incidence of fatal and injury accidents as well as the number of fatalities and injuries." That's why interstates have posted minimum speeds.

The change wouldn't have been necessary in the first place, if a few politicians hadn't decided to drop the speed limit for trucks back to 55 mph in an eleventh hour session of the most of our lawmakers didn't even know they had voted for a change. Of those that did, their motives weren't about safety. The change was "get even" legislation designed to punish the trucking industry over protesting about unconstitutional taxes.

Besides the speed limit, diesel fuel taxes were also increased to make Indiana the

highest in the nation at 27 cents per gallon tax. The average motorist won't know about this because 11 cents of this is paid through a surtax...a hidden tax.

At the third reading of the bill to restore the old speed limit, some of our state's finest killed the bill. House Speaker Pro Tem Chester Dobis called the vote "a matter of principle." Ways and Means Committee Chairman Patrick Kiely blasted the bill as "blackmail" from outsiders. Apparently, Kiely had forgotten the many town meetings that were set up by Indiana truck stop operators throughout the state to discuss these very issues. Kiely was invited to these meetings, but never showed up. Even Kiely's own constituent survey showed the very people that elected him to office supported the bill.

So, if these elected representatives didn't vote on the issues and they didn't vote their

constituents wishes, who did they vote for?

The losers so far have been thousands of mostly small businesses whose livelihood directly depends on trucking. The truck fueling business alone employs more than 10,000 people statewide while contributing more than \$750 million in sales each year to the state. The vast majority of trucking businesses in the state are small yet they are as essential to all of us in the state as water and electricity.

For our elected officials to play politics with the issues is absolutely outrageous. Ultimately, we all lose from this because just like water and electricity, transportation

costs are paid by all of us through everything we eat, drink and purchase.

Ironically, this very approach to the issues is what got our state into trouble with unconstitutional taxes in the first place.





Applying for children's social security card

You must hurry if you are a Fulton County parent who still needs a Social Security number for a child. The Internal Revenue Service requires a number to be listed for all dependents age 5 and over on the tax returns due by April 17th. A small penalty will be charged for each one missing.

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To get a Social Security number, you must provide proof of your son or daughter;s date of birth, identity and U.S. citizenship. The best proof of age and citizenship is an official birth certificate issued by the Local or State Health Denartment.

A child's identity can easily be established by such records as a school record, report card, library card, doctor record, shot record, newspaper birth announcement, hospital I.D. band, insurance policy or any other document giving identifying data.

You cannot use a birth certificate to establish identity.

The parent that signs the applications must also supply proof of his or her own identity with things like a driver's license, state ID card, voter registration card, work badge, credit cards, etc. This is the case whether the application is mailed back to the South Bend office or brought in person

Only original documents can be used. Photocopies cannot be accepted.

Apply as soon as possible if a new number is needed because it generally takes two to three weeks to receive a Social Security card. Processing delays can be expected if too many parents procrastinate too long and cause backlogs.

You may get an application for a Social Security Number (Form ss-5) and a return envelope by stopping in at the Akron Post Office or any other Fulton County Post Office. You may also call Social Security Toll-free at 1-800-234-5772 to have an application mailed to you.



Early Basketball Days

Basketball and Indiana! Just as rightfully paired as ham and eggs.

And so it has always been, as least in the lifetime of this writer, now in his eighth decade.

The game is such an integral part of Indiana that it has been played anywhere a barrel hoop could be attached to a wall or post, indoors or out. Only weather that stiffens fingers and when noses need constant wiping, can stop basketball out of doors. Before nets were invented, many and violent were the arguments as to whether the ball went inside or outside the

Fans who watch games in the comparative comfort of today's big gym, would not believe some of the old "courts" used for high school games 60 years ago. Old store buildings, church and barn lofts for pick-up games, and a floor little over half the size of today's regulation boards, served many early high schools. Space for a couple hundred fans was about average in a small high school. This writer's high school in the 1920's had a gym considerably undersized by today's standards, with either three of four rows of double-deck bleachers on one end. During school days it served as a "manual training" shop. Jim Riley, one-time Warsaw high principal, and Lester Davis, long-time Atwood principal, began their basketball careers in that little gym.

This is all a lead to the fact that Mentone High School, formed about 1908, like many other schools, had no place for basketball except vacant buildings and an old grist mill, until 1926. The community wanted a gymnasium, but Franklin and Harrison township trustees (Mentone lays in both townships) felt tax monies should not be spent just for a place to play games.

Someone took leadership, an organization was formed among the taxpayers and school patrons, many of whom bought stock, to finance a gymnasium. Costing \$5,000, the frame building was erected in 1926, paring costs to the bone, labor was donated, and a part of the fence from Mentone's old baseball field was used in the new building.

Work went fast, because Mentone had been promised the county tourney (not to be confused with the sectional tourney) in 1926 if the building were ready. Officially named the Mentone Community Building, it was on land donated by Mrs. Susan Forst. Orla Hudson was trustee, and on the evening of January 2, 1926, 1200 people gathered in the new building for the dedication. A. I. Nelson, cashier of Mentone's Farmers State Bank, presided. Speeches were made by County School Supt. Harry Lewallen, and well known Mentone family physician, M. C. Yocum. A male quartet from Burket sang.

And the building opened none too soon. On January 29-30 the Kosciusko County Tourney was played, with Claypool and Milford meeting in the first game on Friday afternoon. Thirteen teams, including the two just named, plus Beaver Dam, Syracuse, Sidney, Burket, Atwood, Pierceton, Leesburg, Mentone, North Webster, Etna Green and Silver Lake. All in two days! So small were some of the schools in student count, that when the first five took the floor, it was hard to fill the bench!

And, in true tradition, fierce winter weather moved in. The Winona Railroad Co. battled eight foot drifts between Mentone and Akron, and the mercury plunged just a few days before Friday's tourney start. But Mentone went "all out" to host the contests. The Warsaw Daily Times reported players were fed at "the restaurant" and by the Ladies Aid Society at the M.E. Church. Anyone who could get to Mentone could find lodging in a private home.

Atwood beat Milford in the final game, 45 to either 32 or 38. (The headline said 38, but a line in the news story said 32). Box scores weren't given.

So hospitable were Mentone and the Community Building that the county tourneys were held there until 1953, when a new gym, stage and bandroom were added to the Mentone school building.

Out of use for many years, the old building was recently razed, but the hard games, screams, scraps and good basketball it saw will not soon be forgotten.

(And, slightly out of context, we have to mention Mentone's first high school team. Coached by Clark Mollenhour in 1908, the "Little Giant" starters included Mark Turner, Homer Mentzer, Earl Baker, Herbert Bennett and Emmet Dunlap.)

Also the question of parking in front of the old fire station, the Board decided to leave it as it is until they see what the building will be used for after it is sold. 

Internal Revenue Service says beware of impostors

Indiana residents should beware of persons posing as employees of the Internal Revenue Service. According to the IRS, these impostors attempt to harass people or collect money for what they claim are unpaid taxes.

People should request to see the credentials of any individual claiming to represent the IRS. Every IRS employee who makes contact with the public is required to carry distinctive identification and must show this when conducting official business. Generally, people who owe money to the IRS will receive written notification before being contacted in person.

Last year in Indiana, IRS received 14 reports of individuals impersonating and employee of the Internal Revenue Service.

People who doubt the validity of credentials offered, or the identity of telephone callers, can verify the IRS contact by placing a collect call to the IRS' Internal Security Division, Office of Regional Inspector, in Indianapolis at (317) 226-6393. If there is no answer at the Indianapolis number, a collect call can be placed to the Cincinnati Office at (513) 684-3564.
