

Of their business, which now employs thirty-one people, "It was just the four of us for a long time. You always want to grow and things just kept falling into place. But, we never thought it would grow to the size it is now."

#### **Hardesty Printing**

After eighteen years, Frank and Alice Hardesty have brought a part of their business, Hardesty Printing Co., Inc. to Mentone. Hardesty Printing, with plants in Rochester, Warsaw and now Mentone, is, by Frank's definition, a general commercial printer. They print everything from busines cards to thick book, including brochures, cookbooks and, annually, the Fulton County Historical Society Book. Reminiscing, Frank and Alice mentined that ten years ago, they printed that "classic child's storybook," Buzzy Byron Bumblebee, by Leafy Hudson.

The Hardestys do four color processing and special binding,

including saddle stitching. Last fall, Hardesty Printing bought the Saemann building, between Teel's Restaurant and the Post Office and installed a tipping operation, in which three operators assemble and glue sheets of carbon paper to cardboard backing, forming the back portions of various business form books. This process "is more

portions of various outsiness form books. This process is note manufacturing than printing, "Frank says. Frank and Alice both grew up in the Argos area. Alice was a farm girl, attending Green Township School through grade eight, when she moved on to Argos High School. It was there she met and started dating Argos basketball player Frank Hardesty.

When Alice's father died, the family moved off the farm to when Ance's famer due, the family moved on the family the Culver area, where her mother could'get work, and Alice finished her last two years of high school at Culver graduating in 1953. She says she "babysat every night" in those days. But, a favorite memory is of her senior cords. Being slacks, they were allowed to wear them to school only on Fridays.

Frank attended Argos School all twelve years, also graduating in 1953. "My dad was almost blind," Frank says, "so we never had a car." Part of a large family, Frank found time to play basketball, baseball, and trumpet in the band, although he worked many hours all through high school at The Argos Newstand. "Even though Alice moved to Culver, we continued to see each other," he says.

Frank and Alice married in 1954. Jobs were scarce, so Frank voluntarily requested the draft board to move his name to the top of the list and he was drafted into the U.S. Army. After bar training at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, he went to Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Maryland, for ten weeks. His next tour of duty took him to Fort Clayton, Panama, where he served eighteen months.

Alice joined him in Panama for a year she will never forget. Living in civilian housing in Panama City, their "guests who came to dinner and wouldn't leave" were cockroaches large enough to fill the bowl of a tablespoon. It wasn't all bad, though. One thrilling experience was a boat ride from the Pacific side, throught the length of the canal, to the Altlantic side of Panama.

When more afluent American Civil Service employees used their accumulated two to three months furlough time to go home, they rented their apartments to servicemen. The Hardestys, with another couple sharing the rent to make it affordable, rented one of these apartments. "But," Alice says, "even in that better apartment, there was no hot water." Pregnant by then, she says, "I'll never forget the cold water in the shower on my stomach."

Randy was born in Panama, and shortly after, Frank, Alice

and their new son returned to the United States. Frank went to work for Railway Express, but when they went out on strike, he applied to the Indiana Employment\*Agency. Through them, his printing career was born. They sent him to an apprenticeship with a commercial printing company, where, "I made \$1.50 on a good day." Although he received help from the

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G.I. Bill, Alice says, "We had some pretty hard times." When the printing company started laying off, a salesman told Frank that Artlye Cullum in Mentone was looking for help. Frank applied and began working August, 1958, at The Country Print Shop.

Alice recalls living that first year in Mentone in the small rental house across from the school, belonging then to Gerald Römine. By then, Bill had joined their family circle. "We were desperate for more room," she says. As a result, they bought land behind Cullum's house, south on Road 19, and with their hum hand, midde bu Alice acrossite hum her is hum heit

land behind Cullum's house, south on Road 19, and with their own hands, guided by Alice's carpenter brother-in-law, built their lovely present two-story Cape Cod home. Taking a big step, Frank and Alice bought the commercial division of the Rochester Sentinel January 1, 1974. "It was just Alice and I until Randy graduated in May," Frank says. Bill joined the company after his 1976 graduation. Frank says, "When both boys made the commitment to stay with the company, I knew we had to grow." Warsaw Printing was for sale, and Hardestys bought it September 1, 1986. "Warsaw has accepted us well," Frank says. The company has seen steady growth through the years.

The company has seen steady growth through the years. Hardesty Printing presently employs thirty-one people. Their latest expansion is the acquisition of Raymond Lewis' garage building, as of March 1, 1992, which they will use for storage.

### Joe Day explains opposition to combined middle school

As the spokesperson for the loosely knit organization of citizens opposing the construction of a new middle school at Tippecance Valley, Akron resident Joe Day has very strong opinions on that topic. "I think the biggest needs that they do the junior high," he says. "I think the biggest needs are in the areas of Prime Time. We're complying with Prime Time through the use of aides because we don't have enough space. They (administration and school board) just built a junior high at Akron and they need to do that at Mentone. If they build a single junior high, they still have major work to do at Mentone that's coing to cost a lot of money and they still have smore work to do going to cost a lot of money and they still have some work to do at Akron!

While Day says there are many people who don't want to see a building project of any kind, he personally would not be op-posed, if a project met all the needs of the school system. "They need to address all the issues that will solve the problems, not just part of them. They need to satisfy all those needs and the public needs to be involved in the solutions," he says.

As an example of a building project that did not address all the needs, Joe cites the recent renovation of Akron. "We just built a new junior high at Akron. They moved into it in '88. Within the first year they said 'We don't have enough space'. Somehow they tore down a high school building that had much more square footage than they added on and they can't figure out why they don't have enough space. Does that make sense?" he asks

Day explains that the construction needs for that project were based on a study conducted by Ball State University that erred in its projection of the population. "Now they have <u>another</u> study, this one from Indiana State University and we're going to go with this one... But nobody has really discussed the flaws in this study.

Day has spent many long hours pouring through the 102 page Cooperative Study of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation Report 91-2 prepared by Dr. Alex Moody of ISU and he says.

You can find errors in almost every section." The report states, "Agriculture provides a major source of financial activity and employment opportunity in the geographic area." Day says, "They don't even mention the 400 jobs in Akron. That's an error."

Projections on future pupil population are based, in part, on the number of building permits issued and the number of births in specific years. The report clearly statistics and 23 that only statistics from Kosciusko County were used. Since Ak-ron is located in Fulton County its statistics were not included in these projections. "They just average all the statistics and it's supposed to come out OK. It's like the statistician who drowned in a lake with an average of four inches of water in it. I've got combination padlocks over at the hardware store," he says, "and I suppose if I just average the combinations it'll make 'em easier

to sell 'cause people can remember them easier."

Joe goes on to point out that estimates were used for birth rates for two (89 & 90) of the six years included in the projec-tion of kindergarten enrollment. "That's 1/3 of the years, and that includes no data from Fulton County! This obviously has errors. How can we base a building project on this?" he asks. "It's

contradictory and has big holes in it! The ISU report also supports Day's argument that attention needs to be given to the elementary schools. It contains references to "space limitations" for Project Prime Time and a recommendation to "reduce class size." According to Day "In this whole thing, they speak very little

about space needed for the junior high. They talk about the prob-lems of adolescence...but when they actually talk about space, the only thing they really address is the area of K-3. But from this they conclude we should build a middle school?" Joe asks ironically.

"To show you how responsible this study is, they told us with such a wide tax base, we'd be fiscally responsible to spend \$20 million dollars!" Joe exclaims.

When this study was presented, Day questioned the preparers on the emphasis on "global society" and was told, "If your child on the emphasis on "global society" and was told, it your china goes to college, why would they ever want to come back to Ak-ron or Mentone?" "That," Day says, "was an insult I could not live with!" He points out that schools need to employ hundreds of college graduates as teachers and administrators. "I guess we of college graduates as teachers and administrators. "I guess we should build our school out in the 'global society'." "In the past 30 years we've had many different school boards with many different people and all kinds of ideas, but in that 30

years we've only had three different superintendents. They have all either started a project, worked on a project or supported a project that consolidated our schools," Day says. "The people have been opposed to this right and left. But over the years you've had a combination of members on the board that have listened to the administration and haven't listened to their patrons. And it's time that changed! It has to change! If we don't have the opportunity to run our own schools, we have a sad future

"Small schools do a better job of teaching the basics," according to Day. He also states that smaller schools allow kids to be somebody and build self-confidence. They allow closer ties be-tween students and faculty, and encourage parental and com-munity involvement. They also discourage "tracking" which is what happens when slower students are segregated from faster learners. "It's the smaller schools that allow more innovation

learners. It's the smaller schools that allow more more movement and it's also where excellence is achieved," Day Says. "The ISU study says we should 'create small communities for learning." Joe laughs, "But we already have that!" He goes on to say many larger schools are now working towards creating "" smaller, more intimate learning groups within the schools. "They split the school down the middle and have a red hall and a blue split the school down the initiale and have a real name at the hall. They try to make it seem like two schools. We already have two schools!" he says emphatically. "For so long people have been selling the idea that bigger is better. I'm afraid we're going to complete this transition and then find out it's a mistake.

Besides his objections to consolidation, Joe has also been critical of the school board's use of executive sessions. Recently a legal advertisement was run announcing a meeting before the board voted to hold it. Day felt this indicated it must have been discussed in a private executive session, so he asked to view the minutes of those meetings. "I thought when they said I could look at the minutes I'd really get to see something," he laughs. "I found some entries for executive sessions and all the contents of the meetings said were '1. Personnel' then it stated who was at the meeting. There wasn't anything to see! They said there was nothing to hide and there really is nothing to hide." 

### A Walk Down Mentone's Main Street About 70 Years Ago With Clayton Holloway

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When leaving the Whynona Station, we crossed the street to Dr. Van Gilder's office who was Don Van Gilder's father. This

Dr. Van Gilder's office who was Don Van Gilder's father. This building is now occupied by Dr. Davidson. Next was the public library, with Mrs. Van Gilder as Libraian, where some of the boys spent their evenigns reading *Boys Life*, and *Natoinal Geographic*. The next building was the Motor In Garage, this is where Dr. Yocum kept his car, as this was a storge garade only, with the only gas pump in town. Then came the post office. I think a Mr. Smith was the Post Master. Then came the telephone office, with the switch board on one side, and living quarters on the other side of the second floor. On

side, and living quarters on the other side of the second floor. On the east side of the bottom floor was Oylers Grocery Store, on the west side. Ed Whetstone's Variety Store. Later this store had the whole bottom floor.

Across the alley was at one time a bank, which was later Sarber's Grocery Story, later taken over by Hill and Lemler Grocery. Then came the drug store, operated by Shaffer and Goodwin.

Next came Mrs. Miner's millinery store, which was later occupied by Jones' Grocery Store. When the grocery store closed it then became Shinn's Locker Plant. L.P. Jefferies' Furniture Store was next, he was also the funeral director. The next establishment was the general store of Foriet and Clark Forist and Clark

Across Broadway Street on the corner was the Mentzer Co. General Store, ran by Sam Mentzer's and son Maylon, also son-

in-law Bud Cole. It is now occupied by the post office. Next came the hardware owned by Weldon Reed and son Robert. Then came a vacant lot where they stored farm machinery and wire fencing. On this half a block of Main Street were hitch racks, where people who came to town could hitch their horses. Across the alley was Bakers Restaurant and Rooming House. Their son was a pretty good prize fighter! Then came Dodgridge Jewerly Store, later occupied by Bollard's Drug Store, then by Evan's Drug Store.

Next at one time was a theatre and later Pontius Monument salesroom. Then came a small room used for a cream and egg buying station. Then came the old livery barn. It was a big one! later the front part was used by Carter Brothers for a filling later the front part was used by Carter Brothers for a filling station. Across the street was the town hall and fire station, also the town's water works. There was only a hose cart for fire protection, pulled by had or by someone's wagon. The fire alarm was sounded by a fire bell on top of the fire station. In the building on the west side of the fire station, was the town light plant. East of the fire station was Lighters Blacksmith Shop, later owned by Earl Wagner, then by Bryon Lynn's Welding Shop. Next to the blacksmith shop was a building used as a battery shop, later used by Bryon Lynn. The next lot was vacant then came Hudson's Barber Shop. Then, another vacant lot on the back end of this lot was Fleck's Ice House, which was filled each winter with ice from Latimer's pond and Palestine Lake each winter with ice from Latimer's pond and Palestine Lake. Across the alley was Pontius Monument lot, with a wench on a Jarge pole to move the monuments. Later these two lots were

used for a building to house Overmyers Ford Garage (Model T). Then came the building where I saw my first moving picture. Next came Criss Fleck's butcher shop. Boy did he make good home made bologna! Dr. Tompson's Cigar Shop and 'loafing place' was next, after came Mills and Polson's Barber Shop, then the Central Hotel and Restaruant. Across the street the Farmers State Bank, which is the only business on Main Street

Parmers State Bank, which is the only business of Main Street that is in the same location as seventy years ago. Next to the bank, where the new office is now, was a school room for the 5th and 6th grade, another room that faced Broaway was the 3rd and 4th grade. I attended both the 5th and 6th grade here. My teacher in fifth grade was Julia Swick and in other the location. sixth grade Lena Igo. Then came Aughonbog harness shop, next was Dr. Yocum's office, and the theatre was in the next room.

The small building where Dr. Van Gilder's office is, was lke Saber's tailor shop. Across the alley was the office of the Mentone Gazzett, Mentone's first newspaper. Then came the





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
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### **Scenes Around Town**





### Valley Board views revised school plans

The Tippecanoe Valley School Board viewed a revised set of

Ine hippecanoe Valley School Board viewed a revised set of plans for a new middle school project at their March 9 meeting. George Clinton, of R.W. Clinton and Associates of Richmond, presented the plans saying he had made adjustments based on comments from the board and public at the last meeting. The changes included cleaning up the lines of the building, moving the cafeteria to accommodate a large group study area adding a state between the mm and cafeterin and study area, adding a stage between the gym and cafeteria, and creating a visual barrier so the cafeteria will not be seen from the

Atron resident Joe Day spoke against the project. He questioned the costs involved and the emphasis on special programs, saying that the basics were more important. He also programs, saying that the basics were more important. He also expressed concern that another school would mean hiring two more administrators (principal and assistant principal). Board president Fred McSherry replied that while he agreed that basics were important he felt the corporation needed to offer programs similar to those offered at Warsaw and other neighboring schools.

McSherry and Superintendent Baxter Paige said they did not anticipate the need for more administrators because if a new middle school is built the workload will be lessened at the grade schools allowing the elimination of assistant principals there. Shifting personnel to the middle school could be done with no additional cost to the corporation.

Clinton was questioned by board members on plans for remodeling the Mentone building. He said he would present revised plans and cost estimates based on board recommendations at the next meeting. The board approved Dr. Don Patton, a retired Ball State

University professor, as financial advisor for the project. Patton had worked for the corporation in the same capacity for the Akron elementary remodeling a few years ago. Day questioned the need for his services and was told board members weren't equipped to handle the various forms of financing needed for a project of this size. Patton's fee for the project will be \$12,000, but the board's approval was contingent on his agreeing to be paid only for time and materials if the project is abandoned. In other business, the board:

#### **Profile of "Gert"**

#### by Leafy Hudson

Gertrude "Gert" Smythe has become an experienced world traveler although she has never lived further than "the house across the street" since she moved to Jefferson Street in Mentone when she started high school.

Using funds planned for a California vacation that fell through, Gert flew to London, hoping to soften the blow of news of her mother's death for her Irish Uncle living in Liverpool, England. Gert met many obstacles on that first trip, such as England. Gert met many obstacles on that first trip, such as delayed flights and lost luggage, but she didn't let that deter her. Carefully keeping her head, she found a hotel, searched out proper connections, and arrive as scheduled at the right station to be met by her mother's brother and wife. After a hearty reception and glorious get-acquainted visit with them, she flew to Ireland and, all alone, drove the coast of Ireland, finding her family's native village. Since that first line. Gert has made numerous trips to England

Since that first time, Gert has made numerous trips to England and Ireland. She has become well acquainted with her Irish relatives and is delighted each time she finds a new cousin. At one time or another, her entire family has accompanied her to the homeland.

Gert's mother, Ellen Gertrude Sandham McClane, was born in County Cork, Ireland. She had one sister and six brothers, five of whom went to sea. "Uncle Bill," Gert says, "didn't get to go to sea, because tradition says the oldest brother must stay on land. Unfortunately, two of the brothers were lost at sea. Their names appear on a memorial across from the Tower of London. Another brother, still living in London, qualified for the Cape Horn Club by sailing a square-rigger (sailboat) around Cape Hom.

Ellen earned a pharmaceutical degree at Westminster College in London and helped dispense drugs to the wounded in World War I. But, the Irish who were sympathetic to the English during the war were not welcome back in Ireland. So, Ellen, with a brother, his wife, their daughter and a maiden aunt, sailed about 1922 from South Hampton for America. A cousin, Mary Boggs (Joe's mother), in Mentone, Indiana, was the "only soul they knew in America," so they came to Indiana, settling first in Warsaw

Ellen soon found work dispensing drugs at "Prospect Hill," Ellen soon found work dispensing drugs at "Prospect Hill," Margaret Randel's Warsaw Hospital and eventually she met and married Margaret's brother, Neal McClane, also Irish. Gert says, "Mother got so homesick, she said if she could have walked across the ocean, she would have gone home." Living on the east side of Chapman Lake, Gert and her sister, Peg, started school at Oswego, attending junior high at Leesburg. Gert says, "Until the depression came when I was six, everything was great. It scared the daylights out of me. I want to have everything paid for then I won't lose it!"

have everything paid for, then I won't lose it!" Living in hard times in those days, Gert says, "Mom though if we could just get into chickens, we'd be alright. And she was right." They came to Mentone because there was room on the Jefferson Street property for 1000 chickens and raising chickens became their way of life.

Gert has fond memories of her school days at Mentone. Naming many of Mentone's present grandparent population, she remembers how freely they gathered uptown evenings to play games, with never a thought of causing problems or being in any kind of danger.

Preparing for nurse's training all through high school, Gert knew she'd need money. Knowing her situation, Jim Becson

gave her about 200 cockrells. "Mom said if I would raise them, they would furnish feed and I could have the money. When it

they would furnish feed and I could have the money. When it was time to go skating on Saturday night, I would be out in the chicken house chasing chickens with a wire!" Gert applied to Indianapolis City Hospital, hoping to be accepted in the wartime Cadet Nursing Corps. They would have paid for her training in exchange for service afterwards. But, at 95 pounds, she was too small and was turned down. It was one of Gert's biggest disappointments ever. "I thought my world would end," she says. Gert's chicken money wasn't enough to fund another school, so. after raduation from Mentone Hieb School, where three

Gert's chicken money wasn't enough to fund another school, so, after graduation from Mentone High School, where three generations of her family have now graduated, Gert went to work in Frank Saemann's Lake City Machine Shop. "Eventually, I got to work in the office," she says. They found out I could count, then that I could type and then Frank discovered that I could take shorthand." Her co-workers were: Lillian Witham, Evelyn McClaren, Irene Boganwright, Grace Lewis and Elizabeth Blue. She also worked for Saemann in his Miracle Arm Factory at Bourbon Miracle Arm Factory at Bourbon.

Another co-worker wanted to introduce Gert to her brother, Harold Smythe. "I wasn't very excited about it," she remembers, "but three weeks after I met him, I told him I'd marry him!"

Marriage had to wait until after World War II was over, however. An important feature of Gert's life is the bond formed between herself, Grace Lewis, Phyllis Bowser, and Mary Esther Romine as they supported each other while awaiting the return of their men from the war.

Harold returned in April of 1946 and they were married in une of that year.

During the war, Gert had bought the three empty lots across the street from her parents' to prevent Bud Todd from buying them for a poultry processing plant. Gert and Harold decided to make their home there, but "how" was a problem because lumber was scarce.

So, they bought a frame house in the country near Athens and moved it to their lots. Harold, his brother, Harry and some other brothers dug the foundation and poured the cement wall. Bill Schooly and Bob Parker helped frame it in and side it. Gert's father, a carpenter by trade, helped with the floors. "We did the prot overslues Deddy to the work of the did it." rest ourselves. Daddy told us how and we did it."

Years later, when the family needed more room, they planned and built and addition themselves, transforming their modest little house into a large lovely home

The family was David, born in 1949 and Elizabeth "Liz", born three years later.

Harold suffered a serious heart attack in 1957. He continued as manager at Midwest Spring until his deteriorating health forced him to retire. "We thought if we could just get the children raised, it's all we would ask," she says. Harold died on Gert's birthday in 1988.

Liz underwent a biopsy on her collarbone on St. Patrick's Day, 1989. Gert remembers sadly the four leaf clover David found and gave to Liz before surgery that day. "We though her treatment would be successful," Gert says. But it was not to be. Liz died October 3, 1990.

Gert is pleased to be a partner in Creighton Bros., where she has worked for 24 years. She says "It's my privilege to be the only woman investor there."

She fills the rest of her time, between trips, with her family and her favorite hobbies. She has four grandchildren, all of

whom she is very close to. One hobby is collecting beautiful things. She numbers among them precious Waterford crystal and delicate figurines from Ireland, as well as an extensive collection of Norman Rockwell figurines.

figurines. But, Gert's favorite hobby is growing irises. "It gives me a lot of joy in the springtime," she says. "People come from all directions to see them. At least 250 different hybrids bloom around Memorial Day in her garden. "It's a lot of work, but worth every minute of it." About Mentone, Gert says, "It's good place to raise kids. I'd do it all avain."

### **Minks found not** guilty in rape case

After a four day jury trial in Fulton Circuit Court, Joe Minks was acquitted of rape and criminal deviate conduct charges.

The jury returned the not guilty verdict at 10:30 p.m. Friday after deliberating for approximately two hours. Mink, 23, who now resides

with his parents in Sullivan, IN, had been charged with IN, had been charged with raping a woman in her Akron home on July 7, 1991. Court documents report the investigation began after the woman's husband beat up Minks on July 12 after accusing him of raping his wife. Minks was arrested on the Class B felony charges on August 1. 1991 and held in

the Class B felony charges on August 1, 1991 and held in Fulton County Jail on a \$25,000 bond. During the trial 20 witnesses for the defense testified that Minks was in the town of Sullivan, south of Terre Haute, during the evening and early morning hours of July 6 and 7 when the rape was alleged to have occurred. Among the occurred. Among the witnesses were Minks' twin brother and his grandmother. Minks testified in his own behalf for about 15 minutes on Friday. Witnesses

The victim had "positively" identified Minks in a photo line-up and during her three hours of testimony on Wednesday she again weamsuay sne again identified him as her attacker. ### **On Scene with Henry Township Fire Department**

It's hard not to be fascinated when fire trucks race by with lights and sirens blaring. Have you ever really thought about what these guys do other than just hold Bingo every Saturday night at the fire station? I recently had a chance to do a ride-along story about the Henry Township Fire Department. Little did I know that only 24 hours after starting my research, I would

Witness a family losing their home. It all began at 10 p.m. Monday night. The weather was terrible. It was raining, lightninging, thundering, sleeting and snowing all at the same time, and then, "Henry Township Fire Department you have a structure fire," came blasting across the

pager. I managed to catch the second fire truck rolling out of the station. It was Henry 3, the truck that carries equipment, JAWS Unit, suit-up gear, air tanks, lights and a generator. I was in the truck with three firemen, one drove and the other two suited up in fire gear and air tanks. Within minutes other trucks and The look on one fireman's face told me it was serious. They were facing a dangerous fire and did not know if people were still inside the house.

When we arrived at the scene, I stood up in the truck to see the fire as we drove up. The house was engulfed in flames. Within seconds other trucks and firemen arrived. Hoses and water appeared from everywhere. Someone reported that one

family member was unaccounted for and the intense fight to enter the house was on.

Two firemen busted through the front door, others were breaking out windows and knocking down flames. For the first 30 minutes, firemen were fighting to save a life, then communications came through that the third family member had shown up at a different location. He had joined other family members, three of which were critically injured in the fire. The mood was better, but everyone was still very concerned for the property and the injured people.

The heat was so intense that the firemen had to fight the fire from the outside. Some firemen went inside to "knock down flames," others were running pumpers. Still others were running back to town to refill trucks to keep a constant supply of water to the men fighting the flames. It took 45 minutes to bring the fire under control.

I rode back with a truck enroute for more water and it's a ride I won't soon forget. In the country you don't have the luxury of a fire hydrant, you have to run to town to get more water. In town there are firemen standing by, filling trucks as they come in and running communications between the scene and the base. By this time Burket Volunteer Firemen had also been called in for mutual aid.

When we arrived back at the scene, the fire had been contained and firemen where beginning to go inside. They cut holes in the roof with axes and saws, looking for any flames that could be hiding. At this time a fireman fell through the floor in a attempt to find hidden flames, but was able to crawl out uniniured.

Everyone on the department has his own special job to do when at a scene. Some go inside with air tanks, others fight from the outside and some run pumps and do water runs. That is what it takes to do a dangerous job such as this. It's like the saying says, "If you have a bad day here, someone could die." Along with the danger, the firemen see heartache. "When you

go into a house after a fire destroys everything, you get a lump in your throat. You see pictures hanging on the walls and all over the floor, and you know a family has lost a lot. They have lost their home. That's why when you are called out to a fire, you do everything you can to get the fire out. That's what you are called to do even when the situation looks hopeless. You try and save anything you can, even if at times it's not much." I was told that firemen hate to see any kind of fire, but when

it's a structure fire, that is the worst. You know people are losing so much in material and sentimental things, memories that can never be replaced.

The firemen staved on the scene all night and the state fire marshal was called in to help investigate the cause of the blaze.

The firemen were called back to the scene again on Tuesday morning because of a rekindle. The upstairs had ignited again, from smoldering embers.

On Friday, they were called out to a chimney fire, which had and even some pictures and a family Bible. The department responds to around sixty fires a year.

Approximately 40 of those are grass fires and the other 20 are good intention calls, structures, car fires and false alarms.

The Henry Township Fire Department is manned by seventeen volunteers. At times most will admit to some conflict within the department. But you can't help feeling these guys truly have a respect and admiration for each other. After going along on two house fires within a week, I saw a group of men that truly care for their community and what they represent. It's a dangerous and thankless job, but one that none of them would give up for the world.

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

#### **Coplen's Brentwood Log Homes of Akron**

Akron has another new business. In December, Dale Coplen, his wife, Feryl, and their son, Mike, began a dealership for Brentwood Log Homes, Inc. that covers Fulton, Marshall and Miami counties.

Miam counties. The Coplens are currently operating from their home south of Akron, but by August 1, they plan to move into the new log home they are constructing north of Akron on St. Rd. 19. The new two story log house, located in Brentwood Estates, will serve as the family's home, office and as a model home for pros-pective buyers. "It's just a coincidence," Dale says about the fact that the name of the company he sells for and the subdivision are the same.

Dale, who retired from Sonoco Products in 1990, says, "I've been interested in log homes for a long time. Then we saw an ad about the dealerships in a newspaper and we wrote for information.

Dale and Mike, who also operates his own chimney sweep business, attended a two day seminar on log homes at Brentwood's company headquarters in Murfreesboro, Tennessee. They learned about the construction options and methods, advantages of log structures and sales techniques.

While most people are familiar with the country charm and back-to-nature style of log homes, many do not realize that there are several practical advantages to this type of construction. Because the logs take the place of the 2x4 framework, shea-thing, siding, insulation and wallboard used in conventional con-

struction, the log homes are much simpler and quicker to build.

Due to its unique cellular structure, wood is a natural in-sulator. It would take a concrete wall five feet thick to equal the insulating qualities of just four inches of wood. It is estimated that a six inch log is equivalent to insulation with an R-36 rating. Log homes, therefore, are very energy-efficient, requiring less energy for both heating and cooling. Log homes are more resistant to fires than conventional

dwellings because there is no space inside the walls to act as a chimney and create draft. In case of a fire, the logs tend to simp-

Using the state that, in case of a fire, the logs tend to simply ly smolder rather than burst into flames. Wooden logs are extremely strong and sturdy. Pound for pound wood is even stronger than steel. A 1" square x 2-1/2" long wooden block can support 10,000 pounds. Log homes are also very durable and virtually maintenance-free. Rain, wind, time and other elements which can damage the appearance of a conventional dwelling merely enhance the natural beauty of a log home.

Brentwood Log Homes are sold as a package, giving the buyer several construction options. They can choose to have the company supply contractors to completely build the home at a cost per square foot comparable to a conventional home. If they wish to save money, they can choose a "dry-in" package, with the company erecting the walls, subflooring, rafters, ceiling beams, exterior doors and windows. The buyer then completes the roofing, fireplace and interior work. In a third option, which saves even more, the homeowner does most all of the construction with technical advice from two Brentwood representatives who make sure the logs are being assembled correctly. Or to save the most, a buyer purchases only the package and does everything himself.

Brentwood offers several different floor/plans, all of which can be customized for individual buyers. Logs are available in a choice of white pine, lodge pole pine, cedar, spruce, cyprus or

oak. There are also several choices of log shapes including round, 6"x12" tongue and groove, 8"x8" square or "D" logs, which are round on the outside and flat on the inside. **Feldman and Walters** to wed in November

A Brentwood package includes complete blueprints, logs, ceiling beams, rafters, porch posts and beams, spikes, dowelrod and the special foam rubber gaskets which are placed between the logs to provide a weather-tight seal.

A Brentwood Log Home will be featured in the April-May is-sue of Log Home Living. Dale invites people to stop by and watch the model home being built. "They might want to call first to see what's going on that dow: "he cave that day," he says.

The Coplens have chosen a two-story home built with 8x8 "D" shaped pine logs. It will have an open beamed cathedral ceiling in the living room which will provide the perfect back-drop for Feryl's basket collection. There will also be a loft overlooking the living room and a sunroom.
