#### Exemptions Must Be Filed Now

Monday, May 5, is the deadline for filing of property tax exemptions and Fulton county auditor Ernest (Bud) Walters reminds residents of regulations pertaining to filing.

Persons with mortgages and those over 65 years of age are eligible to file for tax exemptions on this year's taxes, payable 1970. Mortgage exemptions of \$1,000 are available to those persons who have mortgages on real estate

Mortgage exemptions of \$1,000 are available to those persons who have mortgages on real estate of \$1,000 or more, although no taxpayer may be exempted for more than half of the assessed valuation of his property.

#### TVSC Orders Portables, Gives Teachers Pay Increase

Five relocatable classrooms costing \$10,885 each will expand classroom space at the Akron school to include all grades, K-12, during the 1969-70 school year if the State Division of Schoolhouse Planning approves the project. Members of the Tippecance Valley school board voted 4-1 (Richard Goshert casting the "No" vote) at Monday night's meeting to purchase the air conditioned, carpeted, self-contained units from National Homes. They will be used to house three sections of the sixth grade, one section of kindergarten and one other class, either high school or junior high. In addition, the board, by the same vote, approved a \$5916.95 purchase order for draperies and Heywood-Wakefield furniture. Shelving and the structures will ad several more thousand dollars to the cost, the exact amount as yet un-

determined. By returning junior high students to Akron from Talma, the board expects to cut off the extra "leg" bus route and hopes to reduce enrollment at crowded Talma Junior High School.

The meeting was attended by 25-30 parents of corporation children, many of whom favor a centralized high school. Represented by their spokesman, Larry Klein, they asked the board why Indianapolis attorneys had been hired to represent the board and were told the capital attorneys were closer to the action at the office of Public Instruction and, in response to another question, were told that it was not known wheth-

er the same attorneys would be employed for other corporation business.

ness. Klein also asked if there was a change in administrative reimbursement for the next biennium and was told by Supt. Robt. Forbes that the recently legislated changes had not "been good for this corporation."

In conclusion, Klein said the group hoped the board would make the best use of space in utilizing the relocatables and suggested that they be considered temporary and that it was hoped they reflected something more long-range than the next school year. Dr. O. L. McFadden, board member, interjected that he felt the state would "make it a temporary solution." Klein concluded by saying the group favored better education and hoped to see the joining of the two high schools in the future.

After much discussion, the board voted to offer the teachers a \$300 across-the-board salary increase that would boost the pay of beginning teachers to \$6600. This was a counter-proposal to a schedule presented by the teachers that called for a starting salary of \$6550 but that included a 3% per year increase for each year of experience. The couter-proposal retained the present extra-curricular schedule. The teacher's salary committee had proposed changes in this schedule that would have included paying the teachers \$25per semester hour for graduate-level courses taken above the Masters level.



### Postage Increase On July 1

An "inherited" postal deficit of \$1.2 billion

deficit of \$1.2 billion is responsible for the proposals to raise post-age, local postal offi-cials announce. Postmaster General William Blount has said that the record \$1.2 billion 1970 deficit compelled President Nix-on to seek postage rate on to seek postage rate increases. Without the Increases. Without the higher rates, the de-partment will be left with a staggering defi-cit that would become an added public tax bur-

an added public tax bur-den, they said. In addition to in-creasing letter mail from 7 to 7 cents, as proposed by the Johnson Administration, Nixon also asked that second and third-class mailers and three reduce the large postal deficit, and the rates for third-class and most magazines and newspapers would be in-creased 16 to 20 percreased 16 to 20 per-cent above the present levels. These percent-ages include rate hikes already scheduled by previous action on Con-

It is hoped the pres-ident's recommended in-creases will reduce the 1970 postal deficit by more than \$600 million.



A warning is being sounded for the state's corn growers this spring. It's watch out for grassy

weeds. Recent university studies show that a heavy foxtail in-festation can cut corn yields up to 23 bushels an acre... and grass problems like foxtail can-not be handled by supplement-ing cultivations with a spray of a contact weed killer. In the first place, while the spray used will control most broadleaf weeds, it won't bother the grasses. grasses.

Moreover, grower experience has shown that depending on a cultivator to get weeds after they emerge can create more problems than it solves. For example, the weather

doesn't always cooperate. Then, too, time is too valu-able to spend in cultivating corn, and the economics of hir-ing a hand to sit a cultivator is certainly questionable, pro-viding the labor is available t = 1at all.

It's for reasons like this that state extension services are ad-vising growers to use a herbi-cide that stops weeds before they emerge, and keeps them out all season.

they emerge, and out all season. Several new herbicides have been recently introduced that give summer-long control of most annual broadleaf weeds corn and still and grasses in corn and still enables growers to follow with crops like soybeans...or springfear of carryover injury. Moving to a pre-emerge herbicide program on rotated corn means investing a little more in the crop. But as many growers found out last fall, it can pay off handsomely in ex-tra bushels at harvest.



### Soybean Champions Outline Plans To Increase Profits From 1969 Crop

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Four of the nation's leading soybean growers have met here with agricultural leaders to outline improved production guide-clines for the 1969 soybean crop. Purpose of the toplevel meeting was to help U.S. soy-bean growers increase net pro-fits despite the possibility of lower soybean prices. In briefing sessions with

Spokesman for the group, Robert Judd of the National Sovhean Crop Improvement Council, cited data showing sovheans to rank far behind other U.S. cash crops in pro-ductivity. While farmers have increased the productivity of corn 866 percent, and wheat 56 percent since 1947, sovbeans have increased a bare 18.5 per-cent in productivity.-just over one percent per year. Many farmers are barely breaking even with yields of 20 bushels of 12 separate steps to guide farmers toward increased pro-lowing key management points: *Sred selection* — Certified varieties proven for the local

growing area are recommend-ed. Varieties should be adapted for planned management, such as narrow rows, crop rotation, or length of growing season.

Pre-plant fertilization — Soil tests are absolutely necessary. Since soybeans respond read-ily to fertilizer applied to crops ahead of them in a rotation, a good fertilizer program is re-quired. Best pH level varies from 6.3 to 7.2. Seed bed preparation—Deep.

trom 6.3 to 7.2. Seed bed preparation—Deep plowing ahead of soybeans is best. Seedbed should be worked shallow in the Spring, making a smooth, fine bed with good a smoot moisture

Moisture. Seed innoculation — Innocu-lation gives soybeans a faster start—at a low cost. "Good in-surance" say the soybean champions.

champions. Planting guide—Plant in a firm, moist seedbed when the temperature is between 70 to 80 degrees. (first to middle of Max). Maintain planting depth at between  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 inches, a slow, uniform plant-ing speed. Downwidth—Narrow soubcan

ng speed. Row width—Narrow soybean rows, especially in the Mid-west, help conserve moisture and facilitate better weed con-trol Best guide is to plant varieties adapted to the desired

row width and plant popula-tion.

tion. Seeds per foot of row—Key to high yields is correct num-ber of seeds per foot of row. A good guide is one seed per inch: too thick planting results in lodging. Plant uniformly sized seeds, check them for proper drop in the row.

Post-planting fertilization — Soybeans may need micro-nu-trients in some soils. Although phosphorus and potash are their basic elements, soybeans can respond to minor elements. Soil test to find their needs. Weed and disease control-Weeds cut soybean yields dras-tically A combination of chem-ical weed control and row cul-tivation is basic to increased weed or disease problem, then select from commercial herbicides or other chemical controls. controls.

controls. Harvesting — "Go low and slow" the champions recom-mend. Begin harvesting when the moisture content is between 14 and 15 percent, then cut 11/5 to 2 inches from the ground. Good ground speed is between 2.5 to 3 miles per hour. Best guide is to constantly check the combine for proper adjustment. Soybean marketing—Aim for

and compared for proper adjustment. Soybean marketing—Aim for No. 1 grade soybeans with good management techniques. Weigh all economic factors be-fore deciding to sell or store. Sell to reputable marketing co-operatives or dealers. *Profit planning* — Twenty bushels per acre is an average with costs averaging between \$45.00 and \$60.00 per acre, farmers need 30 or more bush-els per acre to begin making a profit.









Their first project was to build shelter, second, to se-cure food for winter, and third, to plant a erove of Box-elder. Elm grove of Box-elder, Elm or Cottonwood to protect and give give comfort from relentless summer the

sun and winter wind. I have heard the comment that the trees make visibility on our stre-ets more difficult. I agree and submit that if one wants unlimited visibility, the Bon ville Salt Flats are the Bonnepen for settlement. With traffic going past our home at up to 50 miles per hour, I doubt if a few trees have much to with the accident do rate.

Have you noticed the

tremendous interest in wooded lots for build-ing sites? Look at the Ing sites: Look at the land development ads. The highest priced lots are the wooded lots. And yet in Akron we have a proposal to provide for the ultimate death

for the ultimate death and removal of our beau-tiful shade trees. If the highway and the auto are forcing us to deface our properties, remove these living hi-story books, and lower remove these living hi-story books, and lower our property values, then I suggest we legi-slate the highway out of our community to the rural area where it be-longs, and begin to act like humans capable of like humans capable of the recognition of nat-ural beauty rather than glorification of mach-ines.

I recently planted two trees in my Tree Lawn which, in spite of Lawn which, in spite of the killing salt off the highway, should be off-ering considerable shade and beauty in 15 to 20 years. Consider this people who submit to the proposal not to plant and rent plant and replace their trees: Come over to trees: Come over to our house and we'll sit under these two trees and marvel at the way we humans made ourselvwe numans made other homely, heartless machine in 1969, at the expense of the peace of mind gained from the beauty of a tree.
