

The elec-tion is now over, and as I am living in Indian-apolis while completing my second year of undergraduate studies, not know who won the race for school board representatives, althoug knowing the general pol alt hough itical climate of the area I can make a calculated guess.

have always taken granted that the I have always taken for granted that the principle purpose of the first twelve years of school was to educate students for the future; specifically, the first few years after graduation when one has little experience to draw upon. I find myself joined by no less an authority no less an authority than the Indiana School Board's Association, who state in their Code who state in their coue
of Ethics, as printed
in the April 30th edition of the News, that
a school board member
should think "always in terms of 'children fir-st.'" However, after reading some of the re-cent letters to the editor, I find that the people do not think of education and children first unless (a) it does not cost anything (b) it is convenient for the adults, and (c) it does not upset the status

As I stated above, the 12 years of school should prepare one for mediate future. own case, and I immediate imagine for many others, this education was woe-fully inadequate. This not because I did take advantage of was was not take advantage of what was offered, for I graduated third in my class, but simply because what was offered class, but sin was not sufficient. This not a problem just Mentone. In talking students from othe small schools I find that they also suffer.

When a graduate from a small school continues education he finds himself competing with people who have had four years of foreign langu-age, done independent study, taken honors Eng-lish classes and perhaps two or three years of biology. A small school cannot offer its students this wide range of studies because it does not have enough pupils to make it worthwhile.

Let me cite an example to illustrate my point. To my knowledge, Mentone students now have access

to one foreign language-Spanish. Most colleges are presently de-emphasizing Spanish because many graduate schools many graduate schools no longer accept it in fulfillment of the foreign language require-ment. So when a graduate of Mentone goes to college he may find him-If studying a language 's had no exposure to and at the same time competing with students who have studies it for two years in high scho-Certainly Spanish should be offered in high school, but stu-dents deserve a choice.

give its students the education they don-The only way TVSC can to combine the two schools. I personally do not care whether it is in Akron, Mentone, or in between. Rural Society Problems

Someone asked a successful farmer how he liked the trend to large scale farming. "The farming is all right," he replied, "but the re is hardly anybody to talk to when I drive into town on Friday night."

Machinery can be sub-stituted for people on the modern farm. But there is no substitute for people in the make-

for people in the make-up of a community.

That's the problem facing us in the next 10 or 20 years. Today, for the first time in a generation, city people are talking about how they are getting fed up with the traffic and bad air and wondering how they can get back to the country.

they can get back country.
What will it take to stop migration to the metropolitan areas and,

metropolitan areas and, hopefully, encourage people who want to return to the country?

Jobs, of course. We knownow that those jobs will not be on the farm because farming has because farming has changed permanently. The that a farmer today can turn out eight times as many goods as his grandfather makes it clear there will be fewfarmers.

WHAT WE NEED is a movement of industry, bus-iness, government and other services into the countryside. But every little town can't expect to get a factory, office building or research laboratory. What is needed is for

villages, towns, and small cities to get together and cooperate in the development of nat-ural economic areas of several counties. The natural boundaries of new and larger community would be fix-ed by an hour's drive to work.

Jobs are necessary to hold young people and to stop the migration of hold young people and to stop the migration of families who are giving up farming. Jobs are even desirable for active farmers. Full-time farmers cannot have a full set of community services unless there are nonfarm people to help support them. Furthermore, farmers, their wives, and children may at times want some work off the farm. The time is soon here when all small farmers and even some grain

and even some grain farmers with good-sized operations will be moon lighting. The two-pay-check family is becoming an American way of life. Farmers' wives are really not different from wives living in town. They like to work and they like the extra income.

GOOD SCHOOLS are an absolute necessity for the rural community of the future. Unless there are good schools, young parents will not stay. Unless the schools turn out educated and train-ed people to work in factories and service enterprises, these bus inesses will not stay.

Churches, recreational facilities, and transportation are equally necessary. These add up to livability in a community. Educated, ambitious young families insist on this livability, and industries that are considering moving considering moving the countryside know they cannot hold good help.

help.

Anyway you slice it, the quality of livability in a community adds up to high taxes. An old idea that is being thoroughly discredited is that factories are hunting for communities with low taxes. Industry has learned they cannot keep good employes, especially employes in management and research, in a community with poor schools and research, in a com-munity with poor schools and services. ONE OF THE FATAL mis-

takes often made by sm-all communities looking for industry is to st-ress low taxes or to in-sure lower taxes for the future by skimping on community development.

It would be far better It would be far better to work hard toward shifting the tax base away from real estate to other kinds of levies. Better this than getting along without the things that are absolutely necessary to the things that are absolutely necessary to keep the community growing instead of shrinking. In this search farmers can expect to get real help from the nonfarm resident who is living in a small town living in a small commor on an acreage in the

country.

During the next 10 years, most rural communities will be deciding whether they will grow and live, or strink and die Ferrers have and die. Farmers have a real stake in this decision. Farmers should join with townspeople to figure the best way to keep their own community on the map.

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



If There Must Be A Manifesto

This is the era of the manifesto, the ultimatum, and protest, the de-mand for reparation. Young Negroes want us to expiate slavery; young Indians want us to atone for the Manhattan Island swindle; young whites want us to pay for all other sins--our own and our fathers'--not included in the catergories. the foregoing

Since it is the fashion now to collect for ills and hardships sufferered in the past, perhaps those Americans who came to maturity during the Great Depression and now range in age from 48 to 58-the people who are usually on the receiving end of today's protests--should announce their own manifesto.

Dumped inauspiciously in between the Lost Generation and the Beat Generation, they were the generation of the hungry and forgotten.
And the frustrated-for besides not having enbesides not having enought to eat, they did not have enough money to buy airplane tickets and bus tickets to to distant places to protest their condition.

Their right to disrupt college campuses was impaired by the necessity of spending their spare time working in order to

time working in order pay for tuition, books and dormitory space. Af-ter four years of college, if they indeed managed to make it all the way through, few could afford the luxury of attending graduate school; their right to postpone

reality was harshly crushed by the exigencies of making a living.

They marched the streets--hunting for work. And no telling what wo-uld have happened to millions of them if war hadn't come along and plucked them from the streets and put them into military training camps.

After the war, they finally got their big break. They found jobs and became the middle class, whose principal privileges are those of paying the bulk of the privilegal paying the bulk or the nation's taxes and buying the jet airplane tickets for sons and doubters who travel distant places to pro-

test.
It is time, we think, for the forgotten generation, 25 million strong, to point to the difficulties of the past and to confront American society with a demand for reparations. The payment would have to payment would have to be a token, of course, for there isn't enough gold in Fort Knox to pay for all those missed

meals.
But a little sum of, say \$500 million--about what James Forman originally asked churches and synagogues to pay in atonement for racism --would be a suitable symbolic sentiment. It would provide each member of the forgotten generation at least enough eration at least enough to make a down payment on dentures, eyeglasses or hearing aids-which they can ill afford to buy after paying today's

high tuition for angry young collegian.



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

An **OPEN LETTER**

the Akron Community

We present the following questions to the Akron Town Board, the State Board of Health, Stream Pollution Board and Engineer:

- What did you estimate the cost of extending the Sewage System you have planned to all property owners?
- What do you estimate the cost of adding the omissions in your present plans, and when would the ommissions be added?
- Is the present Sewage Plan intended to meet the minimum requirements of the community's needs for growth and sanitation requirements (to get us off the hook), or is it designed for community long-range growth, and, if growth, what size growth? size growth?
- Do the State Health Department, Stream Pollution Board, Town Board, and engineers believe that the proposed system will meet the criteria of the Federal and State standards now set for 1972 which the State Health Department and Stream Pollution Board will be enforcing?
- Has the Board provided insurance for the town in the event we are sued for damages for sanitation and pollution vio-lation and property damage resulting from our action?
- Why did the estimated \$234,000 lagoon-combination sewer plan by Phelps Engineering (in their report to the Town Board) become \$416,000 four years later?
- Where do we go with our drainage water if the drains are closed?
- 7A. How does the Board plan to pay for a storm sewer?
- Which street drains will be open and which closed?
- In your judgment, will the sand and calcium chloride from the State Highways washing down our sewers damage the mach-inery in your present sewage system plans in the event you leave sewer manholes open for drainage?
- What amount of government grant do the Board, engineers, and accountants estimate available?
- Does the Board believe that if we were to withdraw our obligation for a Federal grant at this time that we could not re-apply and get one later?
- 12. Why does the Board not wish to use land inside the town at no cost for the location of a sewage treatment plan instead of buying the ground, installing pipe and machinery to pump sewage through a half-mile of pipe?
- 13. Has the Board investigated the combination-sanitary/storm water sewage system (like the one planned for Akron) which Plymouth, Ind. cobbled up by converting their old drainage sewer into a combination sewer?

In a contact with Plymouth officials last week after a heavy rainfall, they stated their dissatisfaction with their system and indicated they were getting the usual calls from irate property owners, complaining of flooded streets and basements with sewage and storm water backed up in them.

Plymouth officials stated that their economy-intended sewer is most unsatisfactory, pollutes their river at times, and will have to be re-done. They welcome Akron to come up and look at it.

At the May 14 open information sewage plan meeting, Messrs. Smith and Kendall, of the Town Board, stated they would not answer questions in that meeting but would hold an open meeting soon and answer these questions at that time.

For this we are grateful and urge all people effected in the Akron Community to attend.





Mentone's **Reading Club Has Space Theme**


The 1970 Vacation Reading Club at the Bell Memorial Public Library will begin June 1 and end July 25. The sticker cards this

YELLOW SPRINGS, OHIO: Antioch College was back to normal Wednesday after two weeks of tensions that were heightened by a sit-in against the failure of Antioch's Administrative Council to approve one of the student strike's original three demands—that the college contribute \$50,000 in institutional funds to the Black Panther Defense Fund. A teach-inon Black Panthers was voted Friday, occupied six hours Monday, and a vote on alternative contributions was held Tuesday.

There is no longer any excuse for college authorities, city officials, or the police to allow rioting, van dalism, terrorism or just plain nastiness to continue on the campuses of higher learning. The time for a decisive, definitive, final crackdown on terroristic protest has come. Such activity must be brought to an end. And, there is reason to believe, we feel, if colleges and university officials are not strong and wise enough to do this on their own, the public will do it for them.

College or university, according to the dictionary, means institution of learning of the highest grade. Today it is a place where people kill, destroy buildings, riot and deprive others of a most precious

and deprive others of a most precious privilege—an education.

There are signs that some colleges and universities are taking a definite stand against those who are rioting and disrupting classes. Among them are Purdue and Indiana Universities where college officials have stated that class will continue despite the efforts of some youths to shut down the schools. But in far, far too many cases youthful destructionists are still being

allowed to trample on the rights of the great majority of students and faculty who merely wish to get on with education. Highly significant is the overwhelming public support for strong and decisive action on behalf of campus order. More than four out of five persons questioned by the Gallup Poll recently believed that students who break laws during demonstrations should be expelled and stripped of federal education loans. And the surprising—and gratifying—thing is that more than seven out of every

loans. And the surprising—and gratifying—thing is that more than seven out of every 10 persons aged 21 to 29 think the same. This is a powerful public mandate and demand to end once and for all the lawless, destructive permissiveness which has enabled small groups, black and white alike, to terrorize campuses and withhold from the majority its civil right to education. It is also an indication that there are great numbers of Americans who might support strong outside, off-campus intervention wherever a college or university showed itself unable or unwilling to take the needed strong steps to produce lasting order.

Colleges and universities are places to learn--we feel it is high time that the era of weak-kneedness and bootless shilly-shallying on the part of some institutions of higher learning comes to an end.

"I've even made loading automatic," reports a mother of five. Everyone, including her burly husband, automatically picks up his dishes after meals, drops the bones and big scraps into the sink and puts the dishes in the waiting dishwasher. Today's dishwashers are equipped to take care of soft food particles-no need for

"sure I do my wedding gift china," reports another. "If there is a time I love my dishwasher most, it's after a dinner party. Besides, American manufacturers today produce china and crystal with the idea that it'll probably go in a dishwasher." Some of the new dishwashers have a light-duty cycle that treats party dishes extra gently. With older models use less detergent and cut down on washing time.

"at last I've found an acceptable place to store dirty dishes," is another comment. New top-of-the-line models often have a rinse and hold cycle for partial loads. But old hands with dishwashers have long been successfully letting loads accumulate after scraping off food that might harden. Dishwashers also can be counted on as a place to store clean dishes. 
