

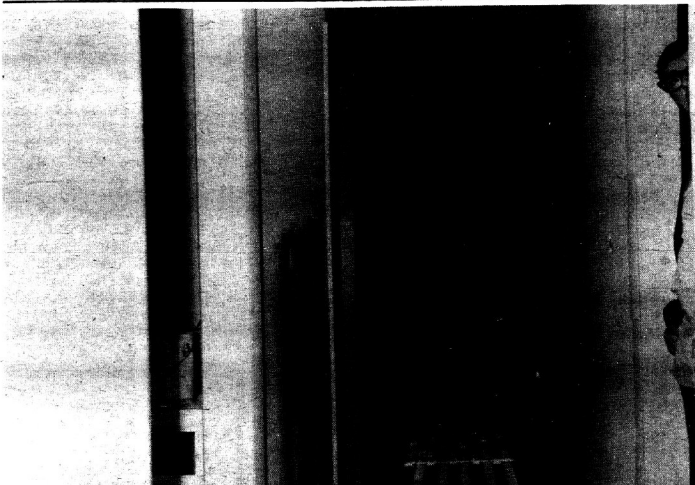

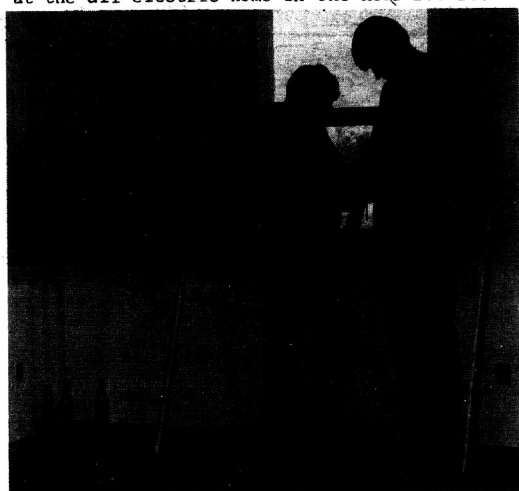

Seven Akron businesses robbed

Seven places of business in Akron were entered sometime after midnight Saturday and more than \$150 in money and power hand tools were stolen.

The break-ins were discovered at various times during the day Sunday and reported to the sheriff's office. Joining the investigation are Akron and state police.

Hardest hit was Carson's Akron Lumber Co. where a power saw, two electric drills, four crescent wrenches and two hammers were stolen, along with \$7 to \$8 from the soft drink machine, two rolls of nickles and four or five rolls of

pennies. Entrance was gained by breaking a window on the south side of the building.

The loss at Stephen's Texaco service station was set at \$50, \$25 in silver from the cash register and \$25 damage to the front door, which was kicked open.

The E-Z Clean Laundry sustained a \$50 loss, the money being taken from a coin changing machine.

Entry to the Akron Foundry was made by breaking the glass of the office door. Stolen were \$40 in quarters and dimes, \$2 in nickles. The thieves pried open the soft drink machine

and stole three \$5 bills and four \$1 bills.

The front door of Oglet's Standard service station was kicked open and \$10 was taken from a cash drawer and \$15 to \$20 in silver was stolen from the cash register cash tray. Estimated damage to the front door was \$10.

Also kicked open was the front door of Arthurs service station with \$25 damage resulting. Two boxes of cigars and \$20 in change were taken from a cash box.

FIND PARACHUTE: Ruth Ann and Joe Harter Jr. recently found the remains of a Radio Sonde weather balloon and a transmitter attached to the parachute shown in the picture. The balloon was found in a field at the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Harter, R. 1, Akron. The balloon had carried the parachute and transmitter aloft to altitudes as high as 17 miles, according to information found with the equipment. Released December 14, 1970, from Midway Airport, Chicago, the equipment had measured temperature, air pressure and humidity. According to a message on the transmitter, the Harters mailed the transmitter back. Everything was in excellent condition, although the Harters do not know how long the parachute had been in the field. The equipment is the property of the U.S. Weather Bureau.

Walk For Development to be Saturday

The Fulton County Walk For Development will be this Saturday, May 8. It will begin at the Rochester High School; go around Lake Manitau; weave through Rochester, and finish at Akron High School, by way of Athens.

Each walker will get his own sponsors, who pledge a per mile rate (anything from one cent up). Of the money raised, 42½% will go to a job-training project for youth in Kenya, Africa and will also provide the trainees with one nourishing meal each day. Another 42½% of the money raised will go to R.E.A.L. services in South Bend, providing hot nourishing meals for poor, elderly per-

sons, who without this service would for the most part have to be in institutions. The remaining 15% will go for making more walks possible.

Anyone wanting to take part in the Walk, but without a way to Rochester may go on the buses leaving Akron High School at 7:45 a.m. Saturday. It is not necessary to finish the entire walk. Walkers will get credit for the miles they do walk.

It is requested that following the Walk, sponsors will please use checks instead of cash in paying their pledges to the walkers. Checks should be made out to "Fulton County Walk For Development." The canceled check will be the receipt for income-tax deduction credit.

Tax Them To The Limit

Arnold W. Spilly, acting executive director of the Indiana State Teachers Association, this week called for an investigation by the National Education Association of the financial crisis facing Indiana schools.

Spills said the members from the nine regional field offices of the ISTA painted a "grim picture for the 1971-72 school year." He said cutbacks now are under consideration by school boards throughout the state that would increase class sizes, reduce the teaching staff, limit the purchase of teaching materials and reduce course offerings.

"ISTA leaders cannot remain silent while this kind of activity is being planned," he said. "We intend to get the facts and when we get them we will try to alert the parents and concerned citizens in each school corporation of what is going to happen to their children."

Spilly said the NEA has the facilities to survey education systems on a statewide basis, and to make recommendations for the maintenance of educational standards. He indicated that the 50,000 member ISTA would use investigation results in

an all-out "Save Our Schools" program.

"I do not want to leave the impression that all school boards in Indiana are planning to shortchange their pupils," Spilly said. "Some boards have announced educational improvements for next year; some other boards, which sincerely wish to improve their programs, are handicapped by the fact that they are at the legal tax maximum."

"On the other hand, there are many school systems in this state that have not availed themselves of their full taxing power, and which seem to be thinking about using the current money shortage in other school corporations as an excuse to reduce their own efforts," he said.

Spilly estimated that about 75 school corporations are within 10 cents of their legal maximum tax rate, or over it. He recommends that these schools refuse to cut back their educational program. Instead, he said, they should proceed with their present programs and faculties, keeping in mind that Gov. Edgar Whitcomb promised that no school would have to close its doors during his administration. "We trust the Governor will

keep his word," Spilly said, "even if it necessitates calling a special session of Legislature to provide adequate funds for the schools."

Spilly became head of the ISTA May 1, succeeding Robt. H. Wyatt, who retired after 32 years as executive director.

An orientation class for new Red Cross volunteers will be held Tuesday, May 11, 1971, it was announced today by Mrs. Lee Pattison, chairman of volunteers of the Kosciusko County chapter of the American National Red Cross, a United Fund Partner.

Mrs. John Moriarity, of Ft. Wayne, Division chairman of Red Cross volunteers, will conduct the class to be held from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the chapter house, 501 North Lake in Warsaw.

Mrs. Moriarity will be assisted by experienced volunteers of the Kosciusko County ARC chapter. Those wishing to attend will bring a sack lunch. Coffee will be furnished. Anyone interested in taking the training to become a Red Cross volunteer may call 267-5244 and register for the class, or stop at chapter headquarters.

Service groups consist of hospital volunteers, nursing home volunteers, food service, transportation service, office volunteers, also other services including the Blood Program and Service to Military Families.

Further training in their preferred service groups will be given. New volunteers will work on a 'Buddy' system, with an experienced volunteer while completing their training.

Tours of the local hospital and nursing homes will be arranged for those wishing to serve in these areas Mrs. Pattison stated.

Volunteers who wish to take a 'refresher course' are welcome to attend.

Mentone Board Receives Bids

Bids for sealing 25,000 square yards of bituminous paving and constructing 1,000 square yards of parking apron using hot mix were read Monday night at the regular meeting of the Mentone Town Board. Bids were received from Brooks Construction Co., Ft. Wayne, Warsaw Asphalt Co. and Phend and Brown, Milford. The bids were taken under advisement and contracts will be awarded later. A bid for cement floor for the storage building at the water works was read from Sedrist and Sons and was taken under advisement.

Dr. O.L. McFadden presented a plaque containing the names of outstanding contributors to the Mentzer Park that will be placed at the entrance to the park.

Jerry Secrist, president of the Youth League, asked the board what part of the \$500 allowed for park fund would be available to the Youth League and was told that the Mentzer Park needed no money and the Youth League could present bills for needed equipment.

Application for gas tax refund to the town to be used for Road and Street fund has been approved by the state, the project being black toping some streets and new curbs. The money, \$6,000 from the state to be received by Jan. 1, 1972, will be matched by \$2,000 by the town for the project.

The board voted to buy a two-way radio for use by the Police Department.

Present at the meeting were Jim Whetstone, the president, and Kenneth Bush and Bill Rathbun, as well as clerk-treasurer Clayton Holloway.

The Akron GAA participated in the District 2 track meet with 14 other schools at Goshen on May 1st. The Akron team placed sixth in the field with 19 points.

Jennell Geiger placed first in the running long jump with a 16' 1" jump, second in the 220 yd run, fifth in the 100 yd dash.

Connie Rans placed fourth in the shot put, Carla Rans placed fifth in standing long jump, and the 880 yd relay team placed third. The team members were Pat Hoffman, Jennell Geiger, Cindy Isley and Rita Ault.

All these girls will participate in the regional meet at Chester-ton on May 4th.

Heading For Second Place

Mr. Willard Wilson, secretary of the American Petroleum Institute, has a word of advice for the dropouts from citizen responsibility: "If you feel you are too busy to take an interest in government...feel that getting mixed up in politics is beneath your dignity or bad for business—then, at least take time for one thing: Teach your children to count in rubles—they'll need to with the inheritance you're leaving them."

Mr. Wilson's words could well have been inspired by the report of a Citizens' Panel on Defense, published in U.S. News & World Report. It says flatly, "U.S. Superiority Has Ended." The U.S., in brief, is on its way to becoming a second-rate power, and

this in today's world can easily be tantamount to obliteration as a nation. The conclusions of the Citizens' Panel are based on a number of discernible trends. Among them, growing Soviet superiority in intercontinental ballistic missiles, Soviet commitment of greater resources than the U.S. to strategic offensive and defensive weapons, the possibility that present U.S. technological superiority will be lost to the Soviet Union. Also mentioned is the failure to recognize that sustained, irresponsible criticism of "the military-industrial complex" could undermine and weaken the only forces which provide security for the U.S. International realities demand reappraisal of national spending priorities.

An Editor's Trials

If you stop to think about it, every community, large or small, gains its sense of identity and purpose through the pages of its local newspaper. If you want to find out anything or let other people know about some event, service or product, it's a pretty fair bet that the pages of your local newspaper can lend a hand; even ex-subscribers seem to think so.

News Of Interest To Homemakers

Food faddism and quackery are receiving an increasing amount of attention from nutritionists because of the health, economic and social problems they create.

Though the superstitious, uninformed and the poor may seem most attracted by faddism, persons with easy access to sound scientific information are often as vulnerable.

The Food and Drug Administration believes that 10 million Americans are spending a billion dollars per year on food quacks, purveyors or nutritional supplements, and vendors of books and special devices reputed to solve the nutritional ills of the country. If a comparable amount were spent on improved food intakes both the consumer and the food industry would benefit.

The major concern of the government and other agencies involved in protecting the consumer and the food industry would benefit.

The major concern of the government and other agencies involved in protecting the consumer against fraudulent claims stems not only from fear that the product will be harmful, but also from concern over the economic and ethical aspects. The government is concerned that millions of people are spending money for ineffectual products.

Quackery follows certain well defined patterns. If your answer is "yes" to any of the following questions, it is very likely that you are one of the thousands of people who are victimized by quacks each year. (1) Is the product or service offered a "secret remedy"? (2) Does the sponsor claim that he is battling the medical profession which is attempting to suppress his wonderful discovery? (3) Is the remedy sold door to door or in health lectures? (4) Is the product or service good for a vast variety of

illnesses, real or fancied?

Be an intelligent consumer. Don't fall prey to the quack or food faddist when good sound medical and nutritional advice is available.

For 2 lbs. of chuck roast--- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup vinegar, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup salad oil, 2 T. Worcestershire sauce, 1 T. Adolf's meat tenderizer salt. Pierce the meat with a fork several times on both sides so the mixture can penetrate. Refrigerate and soak for eight hours turning every 2 hours if possible. Drain, then grill.

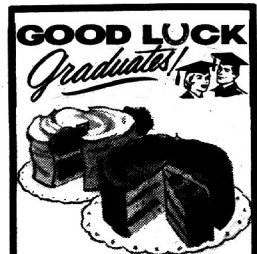

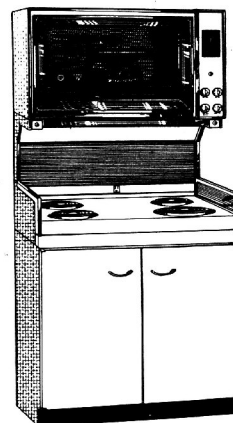

The trio left Wyoming, Mich., a suburb of Grand Rapids, last Wednesday and walked through Mentone Tuesday afternoon. They like to walk for the fun of it and because it's healthy. They hope to arrive in Kansas City by June 15 and if former President Harry Truman's health will warrant it, they will spend an hour with him, presenting him with a pair of the special walking canes they are using. The trio sport bright red vests and friendly smiles, saying they have met nice people wherever they have been. The center man drives as well as walks, but all of them will cover every inch of the route. They planned to drive to Rochester to spend the night, return to complete their walk, stay in Rochester a second night and then continue to Logansport.

Join 25-Mile Walk For Development

One hundred forty seven Akron and Rochester high school students started on a 25-mile "Walk for Development" Saturday morning from the Rochester high school parking lot. Seventy of them completed the trip.

Walking to Akron, the route took them past the Rochester Community Schools administration building, east on Ind. 14 and 18th street to Lake Manitou, around the lake the long way to Ind. 14, north on Indiana 25, west on the Ft. Wayne road back to Rochester, and then east on Ninth, and Ind. 14 to Akron.

The first of the walkers arrived in Akron at 2 p.m.

The young walkers were sponsored by private individuals and business concerns and were rewarded with contributions for each mile actually walked.

One Rochester girl reportedly was paid \$4 per mile and others were paid more than \$3 per mile. Total amount of money raised is not yet known as the tabulation is not completed but leaders of the walk hope it will exceed \$1,000.

Money raised by the walkers will be doled out on the basis of 42.5

percent to worthy causes overseas, the same amount of local needs and 15 percent to the American Freedom from Hunger Foundation.

In addition to other donations, four business places donated money needed for supplies.

Check points were established along the route with Rochester volunteers manning five of them and Akron providing four.

Joyce Moore, who organized the walk, said everyone who participated felt it had been a worthwhile project.

Akron sewer construction resumes

The Town of Akron has received the first payment from the Federal Government on the grant toward the sewer project, according to Willis Bowen, clerk-treasurer.

The contractor has been working on the lagoon during the past month and the lagoon is now virtually complete. The workmen expect to be in town soon to finish laying the sewers and installing the lift stations.

The Town Board is in the process of arranging to have the existing sewers cleaned before they are hooked into the new system. It is hoped this will be completed in the near future.

Hoosier Boys State is a school of government and practical politics. The boys will divide into mock political parties and conduct election campaigns and balloting.

For the first time, the Indiana American Legion, sponsor of Hoosier Boys' State, is requiring each delegate to sign a loyalty oath that reads:

"I solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States of America, the Constitution of the State of Indiana and the laws of the United States and the state of Indiana, and will, by precept and example, promote respect for the flag and the institutions of the United States and of the State of Indiana, reverence for law and order and undivided allegiance to the government of the United States of America."

To The School Board, Superintendent, and the Residents of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation:

For too long the majority of our people in this corporation have remained silent. The time has come for us to give support and thanks to a school board and superintendent that has done an excellent job of administering our schools in the face of an obstructionist and obstinate minority. The great majority of the men on the board are reasonable, sensible and are men of their word.

Lets show our support by quiet thanks, a pat on the back or a warm handshake, not by going enmasse to board meetings and trying to disrupt, or shout down those with whom we do not agree.

What rational or reasonable person can say that because we have two average sized high schools instead of one large school that our educational system is inferior to that of our neighboring schools? According to Dr. Seager's study of our school system, it was "astounding at the educational opportunity available to the students in the Tippecanoe Valley Schools." If we will also remember, former State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Richard Wells, upon making a tour of our facilities stated that many corporations in the state would be glad to have facilities such as we own and have paid for in Tippecanoe Valley. It is true we do need additional classroom and playground equipment and facilities and our board is trying to provide for them but they are opposed by a group who wants all or nothing at all.

A great part of the

current breakdown of our country can be attributed to the deterioration of the home and the community. Lets keep our homes, our schools, and our community close knit and compact and we can contribute to this by keeping our two school system. It is evident everywhere we look that bigger doesn't mean better when we consider the plight of big cities, big schools, big government, etc.

We should be skeptical of taking advice from those people who are wanting to sell their homes, farms, or businesses because of their inability to meet taxes, insurance, interest and principle payments. Yet these same people want to plunge us into big indebtedness to build one school. We should also beware of the advice of people who have money for luxuries and yet cannot pay their laundry or gasoline bills. Likewise, the professional or worker who lives in a rented house or apartment and commands a good salary. Yet they do not pay enough school taxes to support one child in school a year. He may be gone tomorrow promoting similar ventures in another community, but you will still be here paying for his mistakes and another will move in to take his place.

If our corporation offered every conceivable subject to our students, there would still be somebody wanted that would be available somewhere else.

Blind conformity and "keeping up with the Jones" is another matter that has kept us all in trouble. We do not have to do something just because someone else does it. There are many corporations and communities that would be glad to trade places with us. Many of them have new schools, high taxes, serious shortages of school operating funds, a curtailment of school functions, decaying communities, and horrendous drug and discipline problems in their big school populations. Perhaps we do not realize how fortunate we are in Tippecanoe Valley.

We should keep our high school system, improve on it, continue to provide the best that is possible in education

to all our pupils (not just a few); pay our bills, and we will discover that our children are as well prepared to face life and the future as any group of students in the nation.

Not all Mentone business people agree with the Mentone Chamber of Commerce.

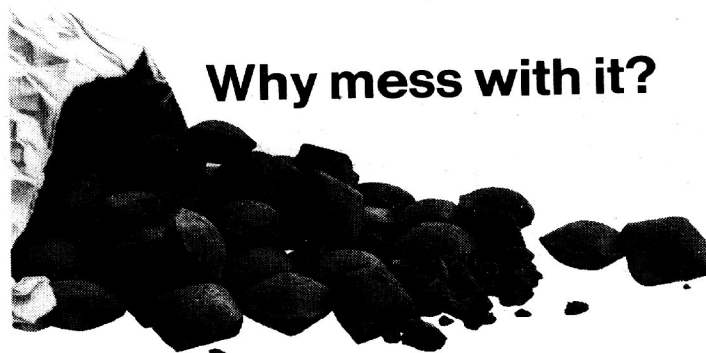

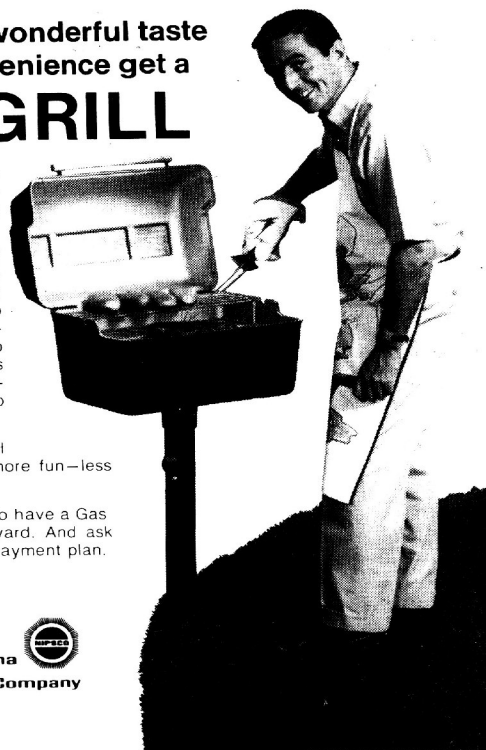

News Of Interest To Homemakers

Poor food handling practices in the home often cause illness in the family. This is especially true in the summer time. Picnics, family reunions, and cook outs are breeding grounds for bacteria in food. Even though foods were safe to eat when purchased, lack of sanitation, insufficient cooking and improper storage can allow bacteria in foods to increase to dangerous levels.

Disease producing bacteria may enter the body in contaminated foods and set up infections in the digestive tract, and in some cases in the bloodstream. Other bacteria may form dangerous toxins in food. Eating food in which the bacteria have grown and produced toxin causes illness.

Foods containing Salmonellae can cause an infection in man called salmonellosis. This disease is difficult to control because it spreads simply and easily. The usual symptoms are fever, cramps, diarrhea and sometimes vomiting. The symptoms are much like those of a twenty-four hour virus.

Bacteria grows best at temperatures between 60 and 120 degrees. To prevent the growth of bacteria keep cold foods cold and hot foods hot. When transporting foods from the home to picnics and reunions use insulated equipment to hold them at the proper temperature. After serving foods, return the left overs to the refrigerator as soon as possible. It is better to be overly cautious when you're responsible for the health of your family. Be especially careful during the hot summer months in storing, preparation, and

serving of foods to insure safe high quality food products.

BAR-B-Q RIBS
1/2 large onion (chopped), 2 stalks celery; 1 cup catsup, 1 1/2 cups Bar-B-Q sauce, 1 teaspoon liquid smoke, garlic powder to taste, 1/2 tea-

spoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon season salt, salt and pepper to taste, 1 Tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 cup brown sugar, dash of Tabasco sauce. Saute onion and celery until tender. Combine remaining ingredients with onion and celery. Cook together over low heat for 45 minutes. Cover ribs with water and bring to a boil. Put the ribs on the grill over low heat, baste and turn several times for 25 minutes. (Sauce is good on chicken also).

session and in closing, the group sang the club prayer song and repeated the collect. The next meeting will be at the home of Mrs. Monroe Romine.

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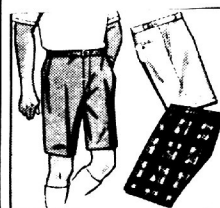

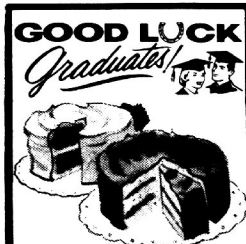

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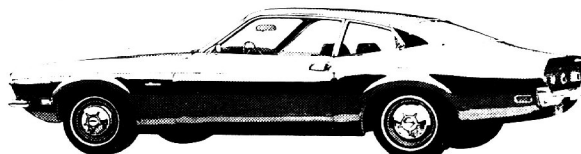

NEW BOOKS

AKRON CARNEGIE LIBRARY

THE WAR OF THE INNOCENTS by Charles Bracelen Flood. The author had lived three years in the Far East as a university lecturer and journalist before this year in Vietnam, and his knowledge of Asia and feeling for Asians parallels his compassion for the young American draftees. Even years from now when political passions have cooled, readers will turn to the War of the Innocents to discover what this war was, and what wars really are.

THAT MAN CARTWRIGHT by Ann Fairbairn. This is the story of a newspaper's fight to speak out, set against a backdrop of bitterness, hatred, prejudice, blackmail, arson, murder and suicide--of the strike, the commitment to decency, integrity, and "the legal rights this country grants to other workers and not to the workers in the field". It captures the raw, sensual surroundings of the California valley, its heat drenched vistas, its landscape of poverty, its sun-baked faces, the leathery touch of a work-worn hand.

HALLELUJAH CHARIOT by Evelyn Hathaway. Evelyn Hathaway writes this engaging account of the life of her father, Andrew Hendricks, a pioneer minister in the Nazarene church. 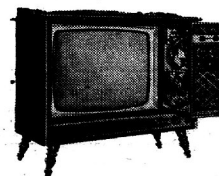
Successful Season Ends At Talma

Kosciusko Co. Gets Federal Funds For Fight Against Wild Marijuana

Kosciusko County has been named the only county in the state eligible for federal funds in a pilot program to eradicate wild marijuana or hemp plant.

The program, the result of a Nixon administration plan to declare war this summer on marijuana growing wild in farm fields and hedge rows in ten states mostly in the Midwest, will use \$85,000 allocated by the Justice Department, Bureau of Narcotics, and will be channeled through the Agriculture Department.

It is thought Kosciusko Co. will be in line for a grant of approximately \$15,000. Grants will be turned over to farmers to help pay costs of eradicating the illegal plant.

County Agent Don Frantz attended a meeting regarding the program last week in St. Louis and said the money will probably be distributed on a sharing basis with the farmers contributing time, machinery usage and equipment rental as their portion of the eradication costs.

The campaign has tentatively been named

WHEP, Wild Hemp Elimination Program. States on the WHEP list are Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, So. Dakota and Wisconsin.

Initially, \$46,000 will be allocated for eliminating an estimated 22,000 acres of marijuana, including that in Kosciusko county. The remainder will be spent on "the basis of need" as the season progresses, an Agriculture Department spokesman said.

The department said the season for effective control is from May 15 to July 15.

Most of the total budget, \$68,000 will be handled by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the remaining \$17,000 will be handled by the Extension Service as a special grant to control marijuana in Champaign Co., Ill.

A separate program is already underway in part of the county to spray the wild marijuana plant. Funds for this, \$900, were received by Sheriff David Andrews

through the Indiana Criminal Justice Agency. The spray is being used by farmers along fence rows, ditch banks and other portions of private property not covered by the county's annual roadside spraying program.

In the past three years, approximately 70 persons have been convicted in the county for possession of marijuana.

Trustees in the various marijuana growing townships of the county have been provided with enough chemical concentrate to make 30,000 gallons of weed killer.

Anyone desiring any of the weed killer is advised to get in contact with his trustee.

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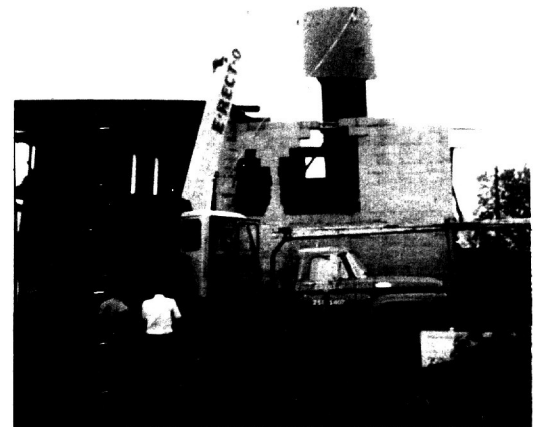
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Kosciusko Co. Gets Federal Funds

For Fight Against Wild Marijuana

Kosciusko County has been named the only county in the state eligible for federal funds in a pilot program to eradicate wild marijuana or hemp plant.

The program, the result of a Nixon administration plan to declare war this summer on marijuana growing wild in farm fields and hedge rows in ten states mostly in the Midwest, will use \$85,000 allocated by the Justice Department, Bureau of Narcotics, and will be channeled through the Agriculture Department.

It is thought Kosciusko Co. will be in line for a grant of approximately \$15,000. Grants will be turned over to farmers to help pay costs of eradicating the illegal plant.

County Agent Don Frantz attended a meeting regarding the program last week in St. Louis and said the money will probably be distributed on a sharing basis with the farmers contributing time, machinery usage and equipment rental as their portion of the eradication costs.

The campaign has tentatively been named

WHEP, Wild Hemp Elimination Program. States on the WHEP list are Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, So. Dakota and Wisconsin.

Initially, \$46,000 will be allocated for eliminating an estimated 22,000 acres of marijuana, including that in Kosciusko county. The remainder will be spent on "the basis of need" as the season progresses, an Agriculture Department spokesman said.

The department said the season for effective control is from May 15 to July 15.

Most of the total budget, \$68,000 will be handled by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the remaining \$17,000 will be handled by the Extension Service as a special grant to control marijuana in Champaign Co., Ill.

A separate program is already underway in part of the county to spray the wild marijuana plant. Funds for this, \$900, were received by Sheriff David Andrews

through the Indiana Criminal Justice Agency. The spray is being used by farmers along fence rows, ditch banks and other portions of private property not covered by the county's annual roadside spraying program.

In the past three years, approximately 70 persons have been convicted in the county for possession of marijuana.

Trustees in the various marijuana growing townships of the county have been provided with enough chemical concentrate to make 30,000 gallons of weed killer.

Anyone desiring any of the weed killer is advised to get in contact with his trustee.

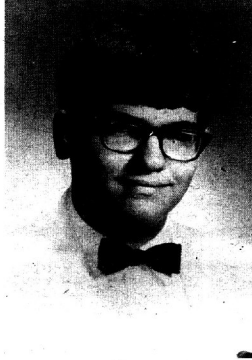

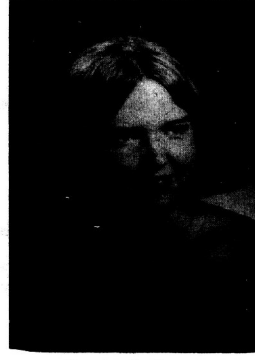

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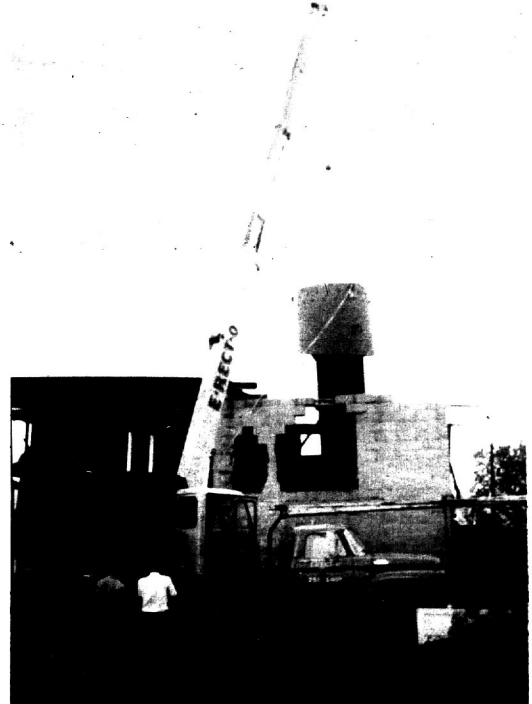

News Of Interest To Homemakers

by Ann Hancock, Area Extension Agent

Recently there has been much discussion on the relationship of cholesterol to heart disease. Medical authorities still do not fully understand what if any correlation there is. But because of the publicity many people have decided to cut out cholesterol altogether from their diets without consulting their doctor. Most doctors recommend that we should not do this. It would be the same thing to decide that you might be diabetic so you cut out sugar. Consult your doctor before going on any diet.

Let's look at the positive side of cholesterol for a change. It serves many useful purposes in the body. Cholesterol serves in the transportation of fatty acids in the body, it also forms the basis of many hormones and works in the conversion of vitamin D. If we do not get enough cholesterol in the foods you eat your body synthesizes it.

Foods that are high in cholesterol include eggs, dairy products, shell fish and kidney just to mention a few. If we were to exclude these foods from our diet we would be losing many major sources of nutrients. Eggs for

example are high in iron. And since most women do not get enough iron an egg for breakfast is a help. Dairy products are our major source of calcium. We can use low fat milk and still get the calcium however.

Heart disease has multiple causes. For example smokers run a risk factor twice as high for heart disease. And smoking has no positive side. If your doctor puts you on a low cholesterol diet, by all means follow his order. But don't take it upon yourself to completely change your diet. Remember moderation is the key word.

1 1/2 cup crushed vanilla wafers (28), 4 Tablespoons butter or margarine, melted, 1 qt. peppermint stick ice cream, softened, 2 squares (2 oz) unsweetened chocolate, 3 well beaten egg yolks, 1 1/2 cup sifted confectioners sugar, 1/2 cup chopped pecans, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 3 egg whites. Toss together crumbs and butter, (reserve 1/2 cup). Press remaining crumbs into 9 x 9 x 2" pan. Spread with ice cream; freeze. Melt 1/2 cup butter and chocolate; gradually stir into egg yolks with sugar, nuts and vanilla. Cool thoroughly. Beat egg whites until stiff peaks form. Beat chocolate mixture till smooth, fold in egg whites. Spread chocolate mixture over ice cream; top with reserved crumbs and freeze. Makes 8 servings.

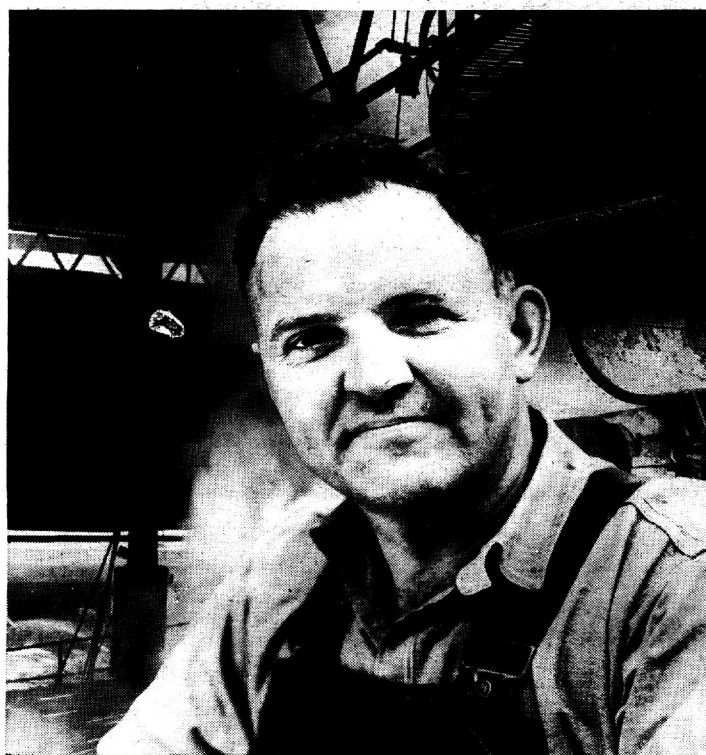

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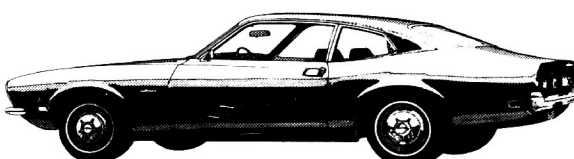

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School Board offers teachers present salary schedule, hears survey report

Teachers in the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation were offered their present salary schedule, which starts at \$6900 for a beginning teacher, during Monday night's school board meeting. The board refused to recognize the teacher's association as the exclusive bargaining agent but said this was not a refusal to consider the teachers' views. A committee composed of Roy E. Meredith, assistant superintendent, Dr. John McKee and Richard Goshert, board members, was named to meet with teachers to discuss problems. The board also voted to change a policy wording to include a committee instead of the superintendent only as had been previous negotiating policy.

The action followed a lengthy discussion and a change in vote by members of the board who had earlier heard a request for use of a bus by a 4-H club that was made by Alicia Dickerson and had heard attorney Tom Lemon, representing a citizen's group, ask Superintendent Forbes if he had

received any word from the General Commission and if any additional information had been submitted to the General Commission to support the two-high school policy. "No" was the answer to both questions as was the answer by Dr. Donald VanGilder when Lemon asked him if he had made the statement that a member of the Commission could "be bought for \$500."

Lemon also introduced the results of an independent survey of the Akron, Mentone and Talma schools that was made by R. W. Morrison and Associates. He said Morrison recommended the construction of a single 9-12 high school facility and said the present schools would adapt well for elementary and junior high schools. He also recommended closing the Talma school, now a junior high. Denying his group had asked for a "predisposed decision" as he had charged the school board had asked of Dr. Paul Seagers when he conducted a survey in which he said two high schools could be maintained, he presented three copies of the report to the five-member board.

The report, not authorized by the board, was made by Morrison, a former member of former State Superintendent Richard Wells' staff, with the assistance of board member Richard Goshert who said he accompanied Morrison in his tour of the schools.

Contracts for new teachers and for summer personnel were signed and the sale of the building trades house constructed at Akron by

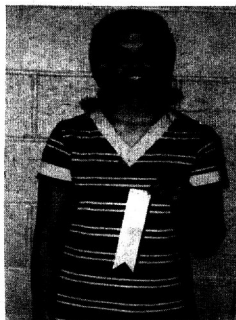
boys from Mentone and Akron was authorized.

Alvin Finney's name was approved for a future bus driver vacancy.

Martha Shireman's request for transfer of her son Greg to Rochester so that he could take German, a course not offered in TVSC, was again denied by the board and a motion by Dr. McKee that the board reimburse Mr. and Mrs. Robert Saner tuition for transferring their daughter to Rochester to complete a foreign language requirement was also denied. Both votes were 3-2 with board members Goshert and McKee voting in favor of the transfers.

At the start of the meeting, board member Richard Goshert objected to the minutes of the previous meeting, saying no mention was made of a motion he had made that died for lack of second. His motion had been in the form of a protest against the hiring of Dr. Seagers and other board policy. He read a prepared copy of

The ranch-style home was built by boys from the Akron and Mentone schools under the direction of teacher Raymond Pontius and his aid, Charles Fellers.

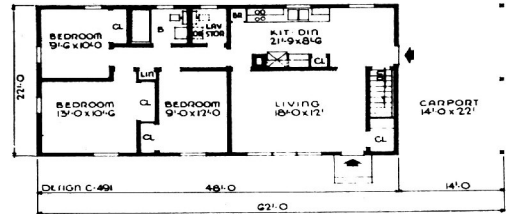

A Tribute To My Grandmother

My Grandmother has influenced my life more than any other one person. Her keen interest in the finer things of life have always been an inspiration to me. I would like to take this opportunity to tell a little about her life.

She has had a good, but sometimes sad life. Her first child, Frances, died nine days after birth. The doctor had not arrived so the midwife would not let the baby be born. The subsequent injuries caused her death. After nine years she had Howard and Franklin, and nine years later, Stanley.

Their father, Edwin Newton was killed after 26 years of marriage when a car struck him and severed his leg. He died in Grandma's arms in the back seat of the car. Even in death, he sat the stage so far for 12 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

Not long ago I asked how it was in the olden days, especially in food production. I am interested in organic gardening and farming. My theory is that food used to be much better than it is now. In the polluted city where I live it is hard to breathe clean air, let alone get fresh food with taste and no preservatives.

When Grandma was a very small child, her folks decided to go by covered wagon and settle in Illinois. But they did not like it there and so after two weeks, they came back home and bought a farm west of Montone where she grew up.

She said, "When I was a child on the farm, we ate just good plain food. We canned all kinds of fruit and sealed the cans with sealing wax, a red substance. My mother was a great cook. She baked bread, pies and made the best doughnuts you ever tasted. She took prizes at the Farmer's Institute. I have never tasted any as good as she made."

"My mother always dried lots of apples and corn. In the fall, my father butchered lots of hogs and killed a fat beef. I remember the good dried beef they hung in the garret around the chimney to dry. We always made a big barrel of kraut, each fall and kept it where it would freeze. He made pure apple butter each fall, which kept without sealing for a year. The only groceries we bought were green coffee and

sugar. To my way of thinking the food we had was much better than anything we buy today, for it was pure. I never knew such a thing as being hungry."

"My mother was very clean and had the whitest washes from her homemade soap. On butchering day, she would stay out in the cold all day to examine every piece of meat to be made into sausage to make sure there wasn't any pig hairs in it. My father sugar cured the hams, shoulder and parts of the side meat like bacon. They cured for six weeks, then in the spring they were smoked with hickory wood or coals until they were a deep brown. They were left to hang in the meat house all summer long and never spoiled. Some of the side meat went into a strong salt solution and it would keep all summer too.

When she talks about her grandparents time, it was quite different. They were real poor. One of her grandparents lived in a log house with no conveniences of any kind. Each of her grandmothers had ten children to care for. Her Grandfather Laird fought two and a half years in the Civil War.

I asked her the cause of death of most people in her younger days. I wanted to know if people died from as many heart attacks and cancers. She said she didn't think so. A lot of men died from accidents with horses. Children died from childhood diseases, such as typhoid fever and diphtheria. A lot of small children died from a disease called cholera infantum, a disease of infants, prevailing in the summer. Breastfed babies were not affected, so this must be why just the other day a friend told me that her grandmother told her a baby should be nursed through its second summer at least.

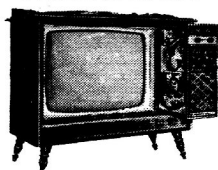

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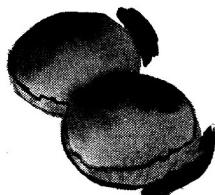
