The balloon was found in a field at the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Harter, R. 1, Akron. The bal-loon had carried the parachute and transmitter aloft to altitudes as high as 17 miles, accord-ing to information found with the equipment. Released December 14, 1970, from Midway Airport, Chicago, the equipment had measured temperature, air pressure and humidity. According to a mes-sage on the transmitter, the Harters mailed the transmitter back. Everything was in excellent condition, although the Harters do not know how long the parachute had been in the field. The equipment is the property of the U.S. Weather Bureau. Bureau.

The program, the re-sult of a Nixon administration plan to de-clare war this summer on marijuana growing wild in farm fields and hedge in farm fields and hedge rows in ten states mostly in the Midwest, will use \$85,000 alloc-ated by the Justice De-partment, Bureau of Nar-cotics, and will be channeled through the Agriculture Department. It is thought Kosci-usko Co. will be in line for a grant of approxi-mately \$15,000. Grants will be turned over to

mately \$15,000. Grants will be turned over to farmers to help pay costs of eradicating the

costs of eradicating the illegal plant. County Agent Don Fra-ntz attended a meeting regarding the program last week in St. Louis and said the money will probably be distributed probably be distributed on a sharing basis with the farmers contributing time, machinery usage and equipment rental as their portion of the eradication costs. through the Indiana Criminal Justic Agency. The spray is being used by farmers along fence rows, ditch banks and other portions of private property not cover-ed by the county's annroadside spraying program.

In the past the years, approximately three 70 persons have been con-victed in the county for possession of marijuana.

Trustees in the various marijuana growing townships of the county townships of the county have been provided with enough chemical concen-trate to make 30,000 gallons of weed killer.

Anyone desiring any of the weed killer is advised to get in con-tact with his trustee.

The program, the re-ilt of a Nixon adminsult of a Nixon admin-istration plan to de-clare war this summer on marijuana growing wild in farm fields and hedge in farm fields and hedge rows in ten states mostly in the Midwest, will use \$85,000 alloc-ated by the Justice De-partment, Bureau of Nar-cotics, and will be channeled through the Agriculture Department. It is thought Kosci-usko Co. will be in line for a grant of approxi-mately \$15,000. Grants will be turned over to farmers to help pay costs of eradicating the illegal plant.
