Lions Sell Candy For Cancer Control

In their continuing In their continuing fight against cancer, the 62 Lions Clubs of District 25-G, located in St. Joseph, Marshall, Elkhart, Kosciusko, Mi-ami, Fulton and Wabash ami, Fulton and Wabash counties, are preparing to conduct their second May 6 through May 22. The entire project is for the purchase of an

amazing new cancer treatment machine, the 35-MEV Linear accelerator, which the Lions of Indiana have pledged to purchase at a cost of \$750,000. It is to be housed in facilities now being constructed at the Indiana Univer-sity Medical Center in

Indianapolis. The 35-MEV Linear Accelerator is designed to treat large numbers of people who could nev-er before be treated with X-rays. No matter No matter where the cancer lies, this super machine reach the cancer, pain-lessly, without excess-ively damaging the underlying tissues.

The super life-saving machine is 35 times more powerful than the expoweruu children is the advantage of not only producing X-rays, but a new treat-ment ray known as an electron beam which is intereely powerful and can be directed at the cancer and then stopped before striking vital organs. This machine will also be an import-ant research tool available to all physicians when not in use as a life-saving cancer machine.

News Of Interest To Homemakers by Ann Hancook, Area Extension Agent Kosciusko County

Dollars spent for good beating are dollars well spent. Or are they? Do you sometimes wonder if you make the best if you make the best use of your food money? With the wide array of products now available on the grocers shelves, it is sometimes diffiit cult to make a wise choice.

How much spend for f should you spend for food? There is no dollars and cents answer to this question. You should spend enough You should spend enough to give your family nu-tritious meals they en-joy eating. A good diet depends on the foods you select, not the amount of money you spend. To help you estimate how much you might re-asonably spend, the U.S. Department of Agricult-ure have figured the costs of three basic food plans. Weekly fofood plans. Weekly fo-od bills for a family of four with the low cost plan add up to \$25 to \$35 depending on the

ages of the children. Comparable costs for the moderate-cost plan are \$30-\$45 and for the libral plan \$40 and up. Remember this figure does not include paper products, soap, pet fo-ods, and cigarettes. The U.S.D.A. has found that these items account for over twenty cents, of every dollar spent in super markets. News Of Interest To Homemakers

by Ann Hancook, Area Extension Agent Kosciusko County

There are several thousand kinds of spe-cies of wild mushrooms. Some are extremely pois-onous, the majority of these are unattractive for eating because of poor flavor or texture or small size. And a few types of mushrooms are not only edible but delicious. Fortunately delicious. Fortunately some of the wild mush-rooms that are easiest that are easiest are also to identify among the choicest for eating.

There are several folk rules that claim to dis-tinguish edible from poisonous mush room. These rules have evolved from experience with wild mushrooms, chiefly in European countries, where for centuries, people have gathered people have gathered and eaten many kinds of wild mushrooms. Each of these rules have some validity in a given ar-ea, where only one or a few kinds of poisonous

mushrooms occur, but generally they are without value and should not be depended on. There is no test other than eating to determine whether to unknown mushroom is edible. This means that anyone who gathers mushrooms must be able to edentify every speciman picked.

The morel is the most The morel is the most common edible wild mus-hroom. It is four to eight inches high and the cap is light tan to brown, the stem white and both cap and stem are hollow and brittle. They appear this time They appear this time of year especially with abundant rain. They can be found in wooded areas, pastures and lawns. They freeze well for future use. Other types of edible mushrooms include: inky

caps, shaggy mane, oyster mushroom, fairy ring fairy ring and meadow mushroom, mushrooms.



Indiana Attorney General Theodore L. Sendak ruled Friday that school boards may buy insurance coverage with public funds to protect their members from being sued personally in civil suits arising from their board membership. Sendak's reply came

upon a request from a state examiner of the State Board of Accounts which audits the finanand local governmental units, including schools and must determine which expenditures are legal and which are in violation of a state law or

regulation. Sendak said, "The Gen-eral School Powers Act grants authority to the governing body of a sc-hool corporation to purchase insurance, payable chase insurance, payable from public funds, which covers employes' personal--civil-liabi-lity suits arising from acts committed while within the scope and course of their employ-ment."

Sendak's opinion said this 1965 law "provides specific authority for a school corporation to insure the school corporation, members of governing body, employ-es, contractors or agents of the school corporation from an liability, risk, accident or loss related to any school property, school contract, school or sc-hool related activity. This authority includes, but is not limited to,

the purchase of insurance protecting such persons against false imprisonment, false arr-est or for acts committed in the coarse of their employment."

The subject of lia-bility insurance has been discussed at Tippecanoe Valley school board meetings but no action has ever been taken.

He estimated, \$3 million, and MeKee Sufficiency, He estimated, \$3 million, and McKee retorted it would be more like \$5 million, a figure also estimated by Coplen and Lash and described as more than adequate by Goshert. actived as more than adequate by Goshert. Superintendent Robert Forbes said he had not had time to compute the cost of a 9-12 high school but would esti-mate \$3.5 to \$5 million, depending what use put depending what was put into it. Forbes also said he

not prepared to answer a question posed by a board member as to the school's size. in order for the hospital trustees to obtain Hill-Burton federal funds to go with local money for building a new hospital.


