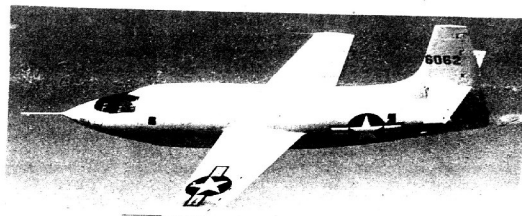
Since the first May Fellowship Day in 1933, it has been traditional

Club history remembered

This being National Homemakers Week, the history of the Mentone Home Economics Club and some of the highlights are shared. One of the first clubs in Mentone, the Mentone Home Economics Club (as it was first known) was organized on April 3, 1934. Mrs. Rhoda Jones was hostess to a group of women who met to organize a home ec club.

Clara Riggs, president of the Harrison Center club, and Zedna Mollenhour were present and assisted in forming the club and electing the first officers. Mary Barkman was president; Blanche Paulus Whitmyre was vice president; Lydia Sanders, secretary-treasurer; Grace Weisert, publicity. Four of the members--Mary Barkman, Blanche Whitmyre, Esther Sarber and Olive Tucker--are still members.

Clara Riggs and Zedna Mollenhour then gave a demonstration on dish washing and soap making. There were 18 members in 1934.

A constitution and by laws for the club were adopted in 1952 with some revisions in 1972.

Highlights of the first year included a play put on for the Farmers Institute that netted \$7. Carry-in dinners were frequent, as were ice cream socials with Eva Laird as a popular hostess. Blanche Whitmyre made a dress for her granddaughter that was modeled at achievement day in 1957. 1959 - Guest day at Pete's Lunch. The Warren girls played. Rita Paulus tap danced. 1953 - 19th anniversary party out was at Eskimo Inn, Winona Lake, our first.

With membership from 24 to 30, finances were low and from 1940 to 1945 there were no club books, but in 1948 a special collection was taken and given for band uniforms.

The club took part several years in the Egg Show and gave to charities. In 1956 had a box social to raise funds for street markers. Christmas dinners were put back in the homes until 1959.

There have been sad memories in the loss of several members and the tragic death of the 1962 president, Opal Tucker. Also some pleasant ones as we helped Fred Swicks in a surprise on their 41st anniversary, the Elmer Sarbers, Claude Gates, Linus Bortons, Emory Andersons, Elmer Rathfons, John Lairds, Clarence Leiningers, Roy Coxes, Ralph Warrens and Wm. Fowlers on their 50th anniversaries.

Roll calls have been on categories concerning the home. The past 43 years have seen many

changes from the kitchen where the only thing automatic was the cook, to the modern pushbutton conveniences, from the homemaker who went to church on Sunday and an occasional gathering to the homemaker of today who also holds down a job away from home, but the basic concepts remain the same as stated in the homemakers' creed. So as we have in the past endeavored to improve our homes and communities, let us continue, for Time is what Life is made of, for

Yesterday is but a dream and Tomorrow only a vision, but Today well lived makes every yesterday a dream of happiness and every Tomorrow a vision of hope.

The club now has 21 members. We have been an honor and standard club different times, as well as one of our members being the second Jane of the year of the Kosciusko Co. clubs.

The club today is known as the Mentone Extension Homemakers.

THE WINDS OF SUMMER by Arlene Hale. Countering the gaudy, carnival atmosphere of Gold Rush City with an ominous sense of growing menace, this story provides a sure mixture of mystery and suspense that will please the author's many fans and win her new readers as well.

THE SLOW AWAKENING by Catherine Marchant. In the middle of the last century the prospects for an orphan or an unwanted child could be grim indeed. Such a child was Kirsten McGregor, for her parents had died suddenly while traveling in Northumberland and there were no relatives or friends to claim her. This is a novel of suspense written under a pseudonym by the popular author, Catherine Cookson.

OF PURE BLOOD by Clarissa Henry and Marc Hillel. This is the never before told story of Hitler's secret program (Fountain of Life) plan - to breed a master race. In the absence of records and confronted repeatedly with close mouthed witnesses, the authors were finally able to locate and interview both supervisors, mothers, children of these homes - they completed their book after more than three years of research.

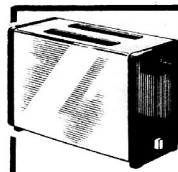

The lie of communism described at DAR meeting

One word that can describe communism is "Lie," Mrs. Denes Bardos told members and guests of Anthony Nigo and Agnes Pruyn Chapman chapters, DAR, at their April 26 combined meeting.

Mrs. Bardos, a housewife and mother who is a native of Hungary, described her country's 1000-year history and the suffering communism brought.

"Everything the communists do is a deceit," she said. "They promise one thing but give another." She said the communist constitution and the American version say about the same thing but communism is anti-Christ, its greatest enemies being those who believe in Christ.

"They use spy rings among neighbors to report happenings by using money as a reward. When you have no food and warmth, money can buy them and you'll do anything to help your family," she said.

Mrs. Bardos said the communist movement is also pushing women's liberation, pushing women back to slavery, deceiving those in Hungary by saying the women of Russia work at everything but no saying that they had to work to keep the country alive because of the loss of manpower in the war.

She said day care centers for these women's children helped the government gain control over the minds of the children to indoctrinate them in their ideas and beliefs.

"They break the family principles up so those who do not have their beliefs in God have nothing to hang on to. The sooner they can get rid of all the old people, then more money can be spent on government projects," she said.

"Another place controlled by the government is the mental institutions where they have access to trainable minds." She noted that already in the United States sex can be taught but God can't be discussed.

Mrs. Bardos showed pictures of Hungary and warned members to watch

for the words "Peace" and "Liberation" when considering that one in every ten countries of the world are totally free. She said she survived by living with the motto "With God nothing will be impossible."

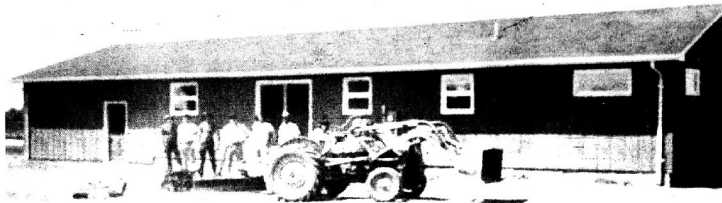

School board grants Harrell \$2,000 increase, makes other salary raises

Tippecanoe Valley school superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrell was given a \$2,000 per year salary increase and his contract was extended one year at Monday night's school board meeting. This boosts his salary to \$29,000 per year.

The action was taken after a three-hour executive session called 20 minutes into the regular monthly meeting. The board left the room for its secret discussion at 7:50, returning at 10:50 to find most of the audience had become weary and gone home.

Unanimous votes were cast in favor of boosting the starting salary for beginning bachelor degree teachers to \$9,300 from \$8,981. Beginning master degree teachers will receive \$9,700, up from the present \$9,371. Teachers with bachelor degrees will receive \$250 per year increments the first five years; \$175 per year until ten years and \$125 per year between 10 and 15 years. Master degree holders will receive \$300 per year increments the first ten years and \$200 per year until 20 years. The salary schedule will become effective July 1, 1977 and will remain in effect until Dec. 31, 1978.

Also established were salary ranges for principals: \$22,000-\$24,000 for a two-year contract for high school; \$18,000-\$20,000 per year for a two-year contract as K-junior high principal (Akron and Mentone) and \$17,500 for K-5 (Burket.) Each will receive full family hospitalization benefits plus an additional day of sick leave for each month of work past nine months.

Charlie Fellers, present building trades teacher, was named maintenance director and supervisor of buildings and grounds at a \$17,252 yearly salary. His 12-month contract will entail his being on call for emergencies in addition to his other duties.

Non-instructional personnel granted raises included the central office secretary and

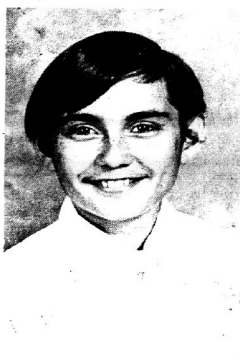
bookkeeper who will next year receive \$11,047.56 and \$8,741.87, respectively, under terms of a pay scale established. This calls for the present salary to be used as the base, increasing 2½ percent in six months and five percent after

one year's service. For additional responsibilities, each position will pay \$750 and \$500, the amount of this year's increases. This will not be added yearly, according to Harrell. Each will receive

two additional days of personal leave and the same sick leave granted administrators.

Junior high school secretaries and treasurers will have their pay based on the current salary with increases ascending as for central office people. This also includes library aides, study hall clerks and some part-time personnel. Custodians and sweepers will have their pay based on the same concept with 1½ and three percent increases. Bus drivers' pay will increase at the same rate and an additional three percent will be added for extra legs (runs to the high school). The bus mechanic's present salary will be the probationary salary with increases of 2½ and five percent at the end of six months and one year. The latter, LeRoy Combs, will be assisted by his wife as part-time records clerk at \$1,000 per year.

Other personnel-related matters passed included:

- Signing Barbara Rager's substitute contract for time worked past 15 days.

- Holding in abeyance Frost Dunnuck's request for back pay. This was done at Harrell's recommendation.

- Accepting the resignation of Kenneth Bush as instrumental music director and naming Kevin Campbell, a Ball State University graduate from New Haven, to succeed him. Campbell is expected to begin a summer program and to carry out previous parade commitments.

- Accepting the resignation of Merdena Bechtol, remedial reading director. Mrs. Bechtol has taught 42 years.

- Placing on tenure (signing sixth contracts) Jean Branning, Jean Smith, Linda Garver, Kathy Suchecki and Karen Nelson.

- Granting child-rearing leave to Marlene Nellans for the 77-78 school year.

- Granting Charlie Hammer's request that his bus driver's salary be paid over a 12-month period and approving paying all personnel twice a month instead of once.

- Signing adult education contracts for Mark Jump and Dave Creighton, tennis, and Pam Lehman, children's beginning dance.

Additional teacher needs were noted in the fields of business education and industrial arts. Part of the business ed request was prompted by a decision to enter into a vocational education co-operative whereby girls can work half-time and study half-time, putting into practical use their training as they receive it.

In the twenty-minute session that preceded the three-hour executive session, board members voted:

- To hold open bids on the building trades house. Appraised at \$35,000, the opening bid can be no less than 90 percent or \$31,500.

- Made plans for board members Don Snipes, Con Shewman and Vernon Meredith to attend an Indiana School Boards Association meeting at Wawasee on May 18.

- Appointed Eleanor Hoover to the Bell Memorial Library board.

- Heard a report from Harrell that a textbook selection committee composed of teachers in the fields changing texts and four lay people had completed their choices. Teachers involved were those in vocational agriculture, art, office education, home economics, instructional arts, driver ed and auto mechanics. Patrons serving on the committee were Bev Clappitt, Mary Cumberland, Don Kline and Norma Jamison.

- Approved a request to submit an Adult Basic Education Proposal. This would cost approximately \$5,000 and would involve an adult education director and secretary to help survey the community for needs in helping adults complete high school. In conjunction with this, board members also signed a Title 6 civil rights act statement.

The board answered questions from the audience, adjourning shortly before midnight.

All members—Fred Kindig, Don Snipes, Con Shewman, Vernon Meredith, and Everett Besson—were present. Also present were Harrell, business manager Robert Forbes and central office secretary Judy Hively.

The next regular meeting will be June 20.

Mentone notes Bell anniversaries

Several nationally important anniversaries will be celebrated this year in Mentone where aviation pioneer Lawrence D. Bell (1894-1956) was born and reared.

The town is building a museum to display Bell's 44-year collection of aviation artifacts and is commemorating:

- The 20th anniversary of the first flight of the Bell X-14, which was the first vectored-thrust jet VTOL.
- The 30th anniversary of the first supersonic airplane, the Bell X-1, which Air Force Capt. Charles E. Yeager (now a retired brigadier general) flew faster than the speed of sound on October 14, 1947.
- The 35th anniversary of the first flight of

America's first jet airplane, the Bell P-59.

On July 23, Bell will be enshrined in the Aviation Hall of Fame at Dayton, Ohio, along with Walter H. Beech, James S. McDonnell, Will Rogers and Alan B. Shepard. One of the nation's top aviation executives, Bell founded Bell Aircraft Corp. (today Bell Aerospace Textron), Buffalo, N.Y., in 1935 and provided leadership for it to become a world-renowned producer of advanced aerospace technology.

Most of Bell's collection has been either displayed at Bell Memorial Public Library or kept in storage since his death 21 years ago. In 1976, a campaign was organized to raise \$200,000 for building a museum, and it is receiving nationwide support. The museum, which will

cover 6,400 square feet on an acre and a half lot adjacent to the town park, will contain many items, large and small, in addition to several airplanes.

Mentone board considers employee pay raises

A proposal to consider a \$500 per year pay raise for Mentone town employees was passed at a recent Mentone town board meeting after questions had been answered. These increases, if approved, will be for 1978 and 1979 and will apply to full-time employees Harry Sullivan, water works superintendent, and Frank Banghart, assistant water superintendent, as well as those employees fulfilling probationary periods, which would include Marshal Ken Richardson.

Other items of business discussed included a report by Richardson that the spotlight on the police car was broken. He said repairs would cost \$28, and a new spotlight would cost \$38-\$42. No official action was taken. Nor was action taken on his request for a camera to record accidents. Town attorney Lee Bazini said legally, it wasn't needed. And Richardson's request for typewriter repairs in the police office were also tabled.

Also tabled was a request by an area daily newspaper to place motor route tubes in town.

Bob Whetstone, chairman of the park board, reported five permanent grills had been ordered at a price of \$51 each for the park.

Gerald Construction Co., Rochester, submitted a price list for repair to streets, but

bids were not accepted since the project has not been advertised.

Bazini told the board the town will receive \$150 from a will to pay upkeep expenses of four graves in the town cemetery. The board moved to accept the money.

Clerk-treasurer Kate Whetstone said the board would have to consider transferring some funds by the end of the year since garbage and trash pick up was running in excess of the appropriation and because of the telephone bills.

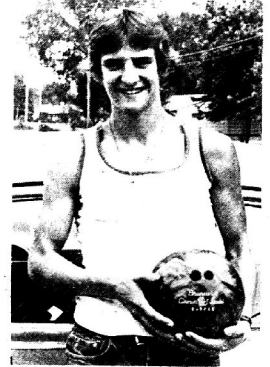

Sunday was graduation day--commencement. The ending and beginning, a study in contraction that won't end when the last rose petal is swept away or the last diploma filed in the underwear drawer.

It was a contradiction that was predictable, but no one ever believes it.

Mothers who said they wouldn't cry when the band played "Pomp and Circumstance" did. Fathers who said they would stand and cheer didn't. Someone's mortarboard was worn at a 90 degree angle that defied gravity while one anchored with pins fell to the floor. The audience applauded speeches not really heard and tingled with pride as the class filed past, however imperfect the cadence may have been.

It was a great day. Kodak did a landoffice business in film and flashbulbs and punch was consumed by the gallons.

At the reception father and the graduate said they wouldn't have, the diploma was passed for everyone's inspection while the graduate, yearning for the comfort of jeans and sneakers, looked solemn in new clothes and good shoes.

And as surely as the last cup of punch was finally drunk and the last paper plate dumped in the trash, someone's favorite uncle or cousin leaned back in his chair and advised the graduate. "The best years of your life are past. School was the time of your life. You will never see a lot of those kids again."

And as surely as the last congratulatory kiss was acknowledged, the graduate replied, "Not our class. We'll see each other often. And we won't change."

That's what our class said, and it's what our son's class said. I don't know about his, but our class is still proving that much of

life, including graduation/commencement is a contradiction.

We couldn't remember how long it had been since we'd seen each other when we met at the Old Grads reunion a few weeks ago. A long time, we agreed. We hadn't seen some of our classmates since we graduated, and we didn't know when we would, but the ten of us (out of 27--less than a fifth of this year's Valley graduating class) who attended agreed the last 25 years had passed rather quickly.

"I used to hear someone say he or she had been out of school 25 years, and I'd think, 'Yeah, and you sure look it,'" I confided to a classmate.

She agreed. "Remember how they looked? All gray and a lot heavier than when they were in school."

We looked proudly at our class. Grecian Formula and Clairol hadn't made many inroads on that august gathering. In fact, at least one of the fellows didn't have any hair left to put it on. "Do you think the lighting in here is kind of funny?" she whispered.

"It's tricky," I said. "It reflects light on hair but notice how heavy it makes some of us."

"Must be what makes my arm too short when I read," another said.

Someone else giggled, and we knew none of us had changed. We were just like we were when we met in gossipy huddles before class and exchanged stories or passed gum or looked at the pictures in our wallets.

Before you could say "Class of '52," someone whipped out a package of something that looked like antacid tablets --I couldn't tell because of the lighting--and someone else opened a wallet and started

passing pictures. Instead of boy and girl friends, we looked at pictures of other teenagers--our sons and daughters. One even had pictures of grandchildren, but other than that, it was just like old times.

Sure, we were contradicting ourselves. We all knew it, just as we also knew it doesn't matter whether you call Sunday's ceremony graduation or commencement. One part of life is ending and another is beginning. Just as it is daily for those of us a quarter of a century--or more--removed from the Pomp and Circumstance that launched us into life.

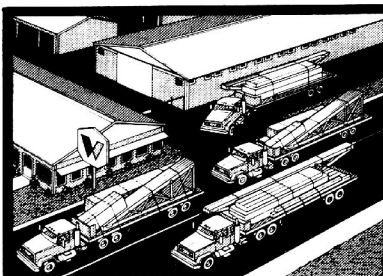

USDA announces dates and rules for beef referendum

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced June 6 as the beginning of a two-week registration period for the beef research and information order referendum and issued rules for the referendum.

Anyone who was a cattle producer during 1976 can register to vote, either in person or by mail, at local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices between June 6 and June 17. A list of those who register will be posted daily at ASCS offices and a final listing will be posted five days after registration closes. Those registered can vote between July 5 and 15 at their ASCS office. For approval of the beef research and information

order, at least 50 percent of those registered must vote, and two-thirds of them must favor it.

The order that producers will consider in the upcoming referendum would authorize a research and information program administered by a beef board of up to 68 producers. Board members would be appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture from nominations submitted by producer organizations. Each state or geographic area would be represented in proportion to its cattle production.

The beef board could initiate a broad spectrum of projects to improve beef production, distribution and marketing, according to Sid Sadler of the Fulton Co.

ASCS office. He said such a program could include consumer education and information and research.

During the first three years of operation, the board could collect as-

sessments of up to three-tenths of one percent of the value of all cattle sold. After that, the rate of assessment could be changed but could not exceed five-tenths of one percent--

the maximum amount permitted under the beef research and information act. Producers not wishing to participate in the program could have their assessment refunded.

Dates are July 25-29, August 1-5 and August 8-12. Hours are 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

These include transportation, insurance, a T-shirt, all craft materials and a cold drink each day. Each camper will furnish his or her own sack lunch. A Camp Chippa-Y tee shirt will be given everyone who pays a \$5 deposit before June 1.

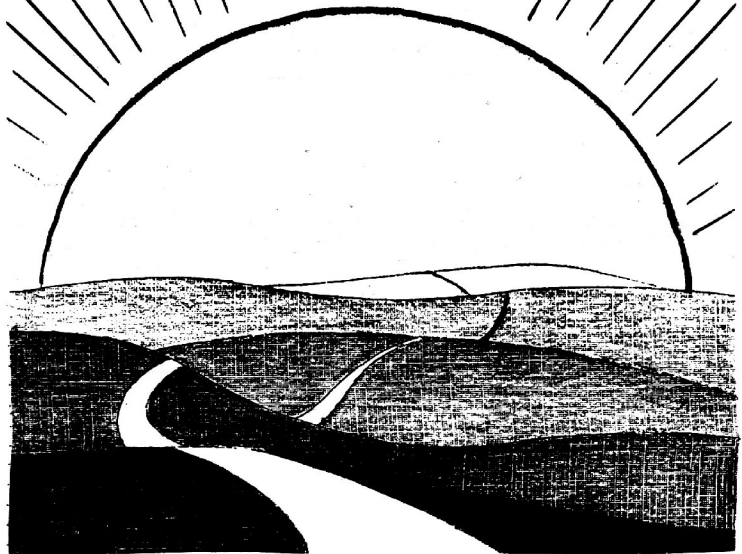

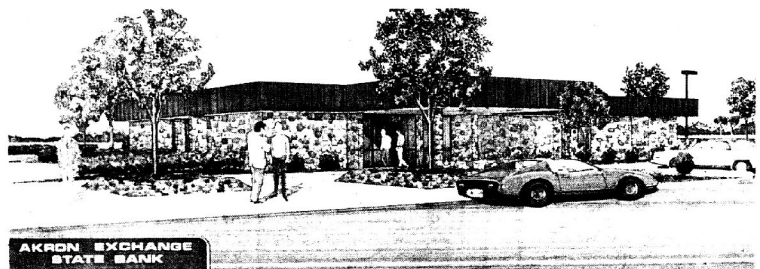

Mosquito control measures outlined

About 50 species of mosquitoes inhabit areas of Indiana at one time or another, says Ralph E. Williams, Purdue University extension entomologist. Almost any of these can be annoying to humans, and a few are capable of transmitting encephalitis viruses.

A strain of the virus, called St. Louis encephalitis, was present in the state during the summer and fall of 1975, causing illness and death.

Encephalitis is transmitted from birds to humans by some, but not all, mosquitoes. The Culex mosquitoes are principal carriers although others are also suspected.

Mosquitoes always develop in water, but the type of breeding place varies with the kind of mosquito. Breeding places include flood waters, woodland pools, ditches, marshes, ponds, edges of lakes, tree cavities, rain barrels, fish ponds, bird baths, old tires, tin cans, catch basins and other water holding sources. In these habitats the life cycle of a mosquito can be as short as 10 days.

Around the home, the most effective way to control mosquitoes is to prevent them from breeding. This can be done by eliminating or altering breeding sites that may exist. Water holding containers such as cans, tires, basins, etc., should be destroyed or disposed of.

It is recommended that water in flower pot containers and bird baths be changed weekly to discourage mosquito breeding. Rain gutters should be kept clean and flat roofs should be

kept dry. Stagnant pools, puddles, ditches, or swampy places around the home should be drained or filled, and tight covers should be placed over cisterns, garbage cans, cesspools, septic tanks and fire and rain barrels. The margins of small ponds should be kept clear of vegetation.

After all steps are taken to eliminate breeding sites, adult mosquitoes may still be a problem if they move in from surrounding areas. Adults can be effectively controlled by applying carbaryl (Sevin) or malathion from hand sprayers and treating areas around the yard where mosquitoes congregate, such as shrubbery, flower beds, and shaded areas around buildings. Commercially available home sprays containing pyrethrins or slow release resin strips containing dichlorvos (Vapona) can be used indoors to control mosquitoes. Before using these insecticides, it is essential that the label be carefully read and the directions followed.

Publication E-204, entitled "Mosquitoes-Nuisance and Disease Carrier" is available at the County Extension Office.

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What's Cooking?

What effects do microwave have on food?

Microwaves, a nonionizing form of radiation, will not make food and other materials radioactive. As in any cooking process, microwave cooking has some effect on the nutritional value of food. Most studies, however, have shown that there are no significant nutritional differences in foods heated by microwave radiation when compared to conventional cooking methods.

What does the word "imitation" mean on food labels?

Foods labeled "imitation" are nutritionally inferior to the product which it resembles and for which it is a substitute. Be sure to read the label to be sure of what nutrients the product will provide.

Potato salad is an enjoyable food item for picnicking but it spoils so readily. Does the particular recipe make a difference?

Acidity in salad mixtures helps prevent the growth of spoilage bacteria. When enough pickles and acid salad dressing are distributed in the mixture, the acid they furnish is an aid against spoilage. Some suggestions: 1) use as much pickles as you like because it helps to retard food spoilage, 2) marinate the cooked potatoes immediately after dicing, the addition of acid containing dressing discourages the growth of bacteria, or 3) decrease the quantity of ingredients which favor bacterial growth. Eggs fall within this category. You might want to keep cooked eggs separate from the potato-pickle-salad dressing mixture and add the eggs just before serving. When preparing the potato salad, keep utensils and hands clean and keep it cold when picnicking to reduce food spoilage.

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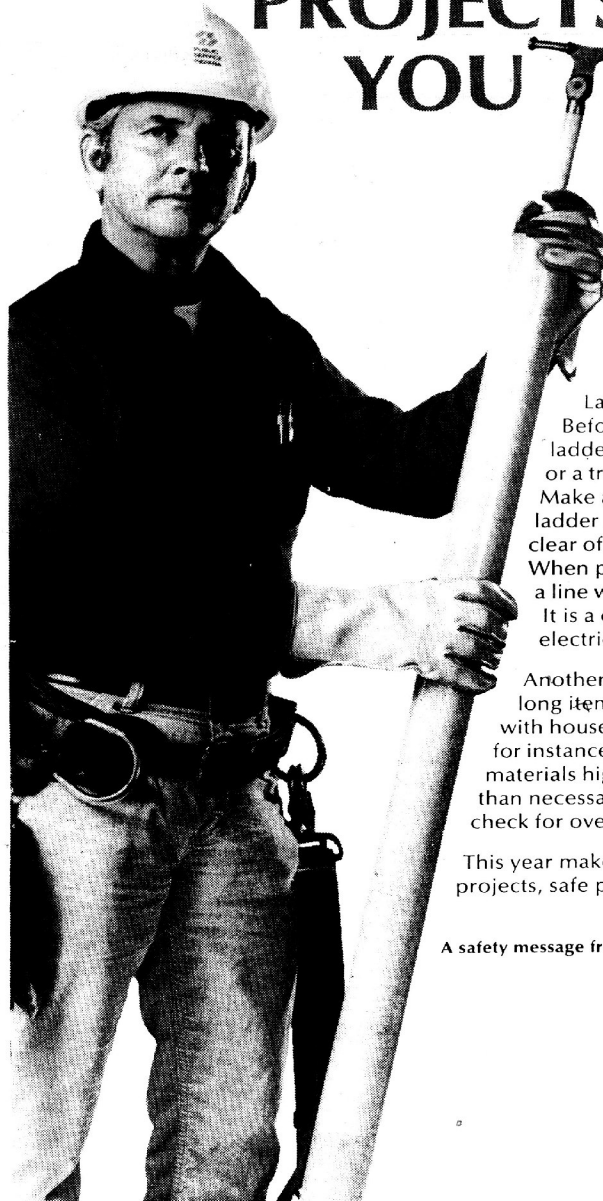

CONCORD CHEESE-CAKE DELUXE

(Makes 10-12 Servings)

1-1/4 cups graham cracker crumbs
1 cup sugar
1/4 cup butter, melted
1-1/2 pounds dry cottage cheese
1/4 cup unsifted flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
6 eggs, separated
1 cup dairy sour cream
Rind and juice of 1 lemon
1 cup peach slices
1 cup pineapple chunks

1 cup strawberry halves
1 jar (10 ounces) concordgrape jam

Combine graham cracker crumbs, 1/4 cup sugar and melted butter; press against sides and bottom of a 9-inch spring form pan. Bake at 325°F. for 5 minutes. Cool.

Press the cottage cheese through a fine sieve. Add half the remaining sugar, the flour, salt, egg yolks, sour cream, lemon rind and juice. Whip until thoroughly blended. Beat the egg whites until stiff, gradually adding the remaining sugar. Fold into

the cheese mixture. Spread mixture in prepared pan and bake at 325°F. for 1 1/2 hours or until cake tests done. Cool in pan.

Arrange fruit on top of cake. Stir grape jam until smooth. Gradually pour over fruit. Chill until ready to serve.

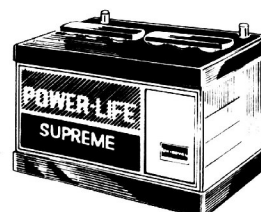
be published June 30, followed by a July 12 yield and production estimate. Estimates concerning hogs and pigs will be available June 23 and cattle information on July 25.

ODC helps people prepare for and locate jobs

People need jobs to become self-sufficient in today's society as in yesterday's. Today, however, people need training for jobs. The people in the Akron area can be helped getting this through the Occupational Development Center for Fulton Co. Mentone-area residents can turn to the Kosciusko Co. ODC. ODC is a six-county organization established to help find jobs and train prospective employees in the area. Indiana Vocational Technical College has a contract with Indiana's state Office of Manpower Development to operate this federally funded program.

The center is an employment readiness program available to the people of the counties it serves. Locally, offices are in the Civic Center, Rochester, and at 501½ No. Lake St., Warsaw. Other counties handled by ODCs in the area are Wabash, Marshall, Miami and Cass.

The overall purpose of the ODC program is to better prepare the individual to enter the job market. This is done with an Employability Plan, an individualized plan setting down career goals and listing steps to achieve those goals. There are several ways the agency can help the individual attain goals. These include:

1. Remedial education provides tutoring help for clients working toward the GED exam to attain the equivalent of a high school diploma. In addition, clients who have a high school diploma or GED are helped in "brushing up" on academic skills to prepare for further vocational training.

2. Job readiness offers learning sessions for each client. A client has the opportunity to explore a wide variety of career possibilities and the different jobs within a career area. In addition, the client is aided in exploring his interests, aptitudes and abilities.

3. Work experience allows a client to gain practical experience in a career choice or related job without being fully trained for it. Also, this is an opportunity to develop a positive work record. Job sites for this training are located in public or private not-for-profit organizations such as the Fulton Co. Historical Society. The client is paid minimum wage while involved in this learning experience.

4. Occupational Development offers on-the-job training positions. These can be very helpful to the local busi-

ness community. When an employer is seeking trained personnel for a particular job but can't find a suitable person, an on-the-job training contract might be the best thing.

The employer agrees to train the client who shows an interest in and an aptitude for learning the necessary skills. For the employer's effort, a monetary incentive is offered and a satisfactory employee is provided.

Vocational training is the fifth opportunity. This is for someone who wants to formally train for a career but hasn't been able to manage it. Assistance with tuitions and other school expenses, as well as additional living expenses usually is available. Often, a person spends some time on the program in another type of training before choosing and starting a vocational program. Vocational training can be the first step if the client is otherwise prepared.

Finally, job placement assistance is offered. The staff works hard to inform clients, who have received some training through the program, of job possibilities. The ODC works in conjunction with the Indiana Employment Office serving Fulton Co. in placement assistance.

To determine eligibility for the program, several factors must be considered. The most important is a strong motivation for self-im-
