School board grants Harrell \$2,000 increase, makes other salary raises

Tippecanoe Valley school superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrell was given a \$2,000 per year salary increase and his con-tract was extended one year at Monday night's school board meeting. This boosts his salary This

The action was taken after a three-hour ex-ecutive session called 20 minutes into the reg-ular monthly meeting. The board left the room for its secret discuss-ion at 7:50, returning at 10:50 to find most of the audience had become weary and gone home.

Unanimous votes were cast in favor of boost-ing the starting salary for beginning bachelor teachers to degree teachers to \$9,300 from \$8,981. Be-ginning master degree teachers will receive teachers will receive \$9,700, up from the pre-sent \$9,371. Teachers with bachelor degrees will receive \$250 per year increments the first five years; \$175 per year until ten years and \$125 per year be-tween 10 and 15 years. Master degree holders will receive \$300 per year increments the first ten years and \$200 year increments the first ten years and \$200 per year until 20 years. The salary schedule will become effective July 1, 1977 and will remain in effect until Dec. 31,

Also established were salary ranges for prin-cipals: \$22,000-\$24,000 cipals: \$22,000-\$24,000 for a two-year contract for high school; \$18,000 -\$20,000 per year for a two-year contract as K-junior high principal (Akron and Mentone) and \$17,500 for K-5 (Bur-ket.) Each will receive full family hospitalization benefits plus an additional day of sick leave for each month of work past nine months. Charlie Fellers, pre-sent building trades

Charlie Fellers, pre-sent building trades teacher, was named main-tenance director and supervisor of buildings and grounds at a \$17,252 yearly salary. His 12-month contract will en-tail bis being on call tail his being on call for emergencies in addition to his other duties.

Non-instructional persomiel granted raises included the central office secretary and

bookkeeper who will next year receive \$11,047.56 and \$8,741.87, respect-ively, under terms of a pay scale established. This calls for the pre-sent salary to be used as the base, increasing 2^k percent in six months and five percent after and five percent after

one year's service. For additional responsibilities, each position will pay \$750 and \$500, position the amount of this year's increases. This will not be added year-ly, according to Harr-ell. Each will receive Cont. on page 2



Yet they contributed to the interesting life of a growing and changing nation. PEOPLES OF THE SEA by Immanuel Velikovsky. This is a reconstruction of ancient history. THE TERM PAPER: STEP BY STEP" by Donald J.





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USDA announces dates and rules for beef referendum

The U.S. De Agriculture Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced June 6 as the beginning of a two-week registration period for the beef research and information order referendum and issued rules for the referendum.

Anyone who was a cat-tle producer during 1976 can register to vote, either in person or by mail, at local Ag-ricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices between June 6 and June 17. A list of those who regis ter will be posted daily at ASCS offices and a final listing will be posted five days after registration closes. Those registered can vote between July 5 and 15 at their ASCS office. For approval of the beef research and information

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order, at least 50 per-cent of those register-ed must vote, and two-thirds of them must favor it.

vor it. The order that produc-ers will consider in the upcoming referendum would authorize a.re-search and information program administered by a beef board of up to 68 producers. Board 68 producers. Board members would be ap-pointed by the Secretary of Agriculture from nom inations submitted by producer organizations. Each state or geograph-ic area would be repre-sented in proportion to its cattle production.



About 50 species of mosquitoes inhabit areas of Indiana at one time or another, says Ralph or another, says Ralph E. Williams, Purdue University extension ento-mologist. Almost any of these can be annoying to humans, and a few are capable of trans-mitting encephalitis viruses.

A strain of the virus, called St. Louis encephalitis, was present in the state during the summer and fall of 1975, causing illness and death.

Encephalitis is trans-mitted from birds to hu-mans by some, but not all, mosquitoes. The Culex mosquitoes are principal carriers alprincipal though of though others are also suspected.

Mosquitoes always de-velop in water, but the type of breeding place varies with the kind of mosquito. Breeding pla-ces include flood watwoodland pools, ditches, marshes, ponds, edges of lakes tree cavities, rain barrels, fish ponds, bird bathay old tires, tin cans, catch basins and other water holding sources. In these habitats the life cycle of a mos-quito can be as short as 10 days.

Around the home, the Around the home, the most effective way to control mosquitoes is to prevent them from breed-ing. This can be done by eliminating or altering breeding sites that may exist. Water holding containers such as cans, tires, basins, cans, tires, basins, etc., should be destroy-ed or disposed of.

discourage mosquito breeding. Rain gutters should be kept clean and flat roofs should be

kept dry. Stagnant pools, puddles, ditches, or swampy places around the home should be drained or filled, and tight covers should be placed cover should be placed over cisterns, garbage cans, cesspools, septic tanks and fire and rain barrels. The margins of small ponds should be kept clear of vegetation.

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tion. After all steps are taken to eliminate breeding sites, adult mosquitoes may still be a problem if they move in from surrounding areas. Adults can be ef-fectively controlled by applying carbaryl (Ser-in) or malathion from hand sprayers and treathand sprayers and treat-ing areas around the yard where mosquitoes congregate, such as shrubbery, flower beds, and shaded areas around buildings. Commercial-ly available home sprays containing pyrethrins or slow release resin strips containing dich-lorvos (Vapona) can be used indoors to control mosquitoes. Before us-ing these insecticides, mosquitoes. Before us-ing these insecticides, it is essential that the label be carefully read and the directions followed.



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
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What effects do microwaves have on food? Microwaves, a nonion-izing form of radiation, will not make food and other materials radioactive. As in any cook-ing process, microwave cooking has some effect on the nutritional value of food. Most studies, however, have shown that there are no significant nitritional differences in foods heated by micro-wave radiation when com-pared to conventional cooking methods.

What does the word "imitation" mean on food

Foods labeled "imi-tation" are nutrition-

Foods labeled "imi-tation" are nutrition-ally inferior to the product which it resem-bles and for which it is a substitute. Be sure to read the label to be sure of what nutrients

the product will provide. Potato salad is an en-joyable food item for picnicing but it spoils so readily. Does the particular recipe make

so readily. Does the particular recipe make a difference? Acidity in salad mix-tures helps prevent the growth of spoilage bac-teria. When enough pickles and acid salad dressing are distributed in the mixture, the acid they furnish is an aid against spoilage. Some suggestions: 1) use as much pickles as you like because it helps to retard food spoilage, 2) marinate the cooked potatoes immediately after dicing, the addi-tion of acid contain-ing dressing discourages the growth of bacteria, or 3) decrease the quan-tity of ingredients which favor bacterial growth. Eggs fall with-in this category. You might want to keep cook-ed eggs separate from the potato-pickle-salad

might want to keep cook-ed eggs separate from the potato-pickle-salad dressing mixture and add the eggs just before serving. When prepar-ing the potato salad, keep utensils and hands clean and keep it cold when picnicing to reduce food spoilage.







ODC helps people prepare for and locate jobs

People need jobs to become self-sufficient in today's society as in yesterday's. Today, how-ever, people need train-ing for jobs. The peo-ple in the Akron area can be belowd setting can be helped getting this through the Occupational Development Cen-ter for Fulton Co. Mentone-area residents can turn to the Kosciusko Co. ODC. ODC is a six-county organization es-tablished to help find jobs and treat tive employees in the area. Indiana Vocation-Technical College jobs and train prospechas a contract with In-diana's state Office of Manpower Development to operate this federally funded program. The center is an

ployment readiness pro-gram available to the people of the counties it serves. Locally, offices are in the Civic Center, Rochester, and at 5012 No. Lake St., Warsaw. Other counties handled by ODCs in the area are Wabash, Marshall, Miami and Cass.

The overall purpose of the ODC program is to better prepare the individual to enter the This is job market. done with an Employabil-ity Plan, an individual-ized plan setting down ized plan setting down career goals and list-ing steps to achieve those goals. There are several ways the agency can help the individual attain goals. These include:

1. Remedial education provides tutoring help for clients working toward the GED exam to at-tain the equivalent of a high school diploma. In addition, clients who have a high school di-ploma or GED are helped in "brushing up" on aca-demic skills to prepare for for the woortimed further vocational for

training. 2. Job readiness off-ers learning sessions for each client. A clithe opportunity ent has to explore a wide vari-ety of career possibil-ities and the different jobs within a career area. In addition, the client is aided in ex-ploring his interests, ploring his interests aptitudes and abilities Work experience allows a client to gain practical experience in a career choice or related job without being fully trained for it. Also, this is an opportunity to develop a pos-itive work record. Jobitive work record. Job-sites for this training are located in public or private not-for-pro-fit organizations such as the Fulton Co. His-torical Society. The client is paid minimum wage while involved in this learning experi-ence. ence.

4. Occupational Development offers on-thejob training positions. These can be very help-ful to the local business community. When provement. Underemploy-an employer is seeking ed, as well as unemployiness community. When an employer is seeking trained personnel for a particular job but can't find a suitable person, an on-the-job training contract might be the

best thing. The employer agrees to train the client who shows an interest in and an aptitude for learning the necessary skills. For the employer's effort, a monetary incen-tive is offered and a satisfactory employee

vocational training is the fifth opportuni-ty. This is for some-one who wants to formally train for a career but hasn't been able to manage it. Assistance tuitions and other with school expenses, as well as additional living expenses usually is avail-able. Often, a person spends some time on the program in another type of training before choosing and starting a vocational program. Vo-cational training can be the first step if the client is otherwise prepared.

Finally, job placement assistance is offered. The staff works hard to inform clients, who have inform clients, who have received some training through the program, of job possibilities. The ODC works in conjunction with the Indiana Employ-ment Office serving Ful-ton Co. in placement assistance. assistance.

To determine eligibility for the program, several factors must be considered. The most important is a strong motivation for self-im-
