In the Viking Relays, field relays begin at 6 p.m. with running relays at 7 p.m.


Teams participating in the conference meets are TVHS, Caston, No. Miami, Whitko,

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Tornado test alert for Mentone

A county-wide tornado test alert is planned for today, May 4, in all portions of Kosciusko County by the county's Civil Defense officials.

Sirens will blast for three to five minutes in all towns in the county, and an "emergency operation plan" will go into effect.

According to Mentone's Marshall, Earl Beattie, he will receive a call sometine Thursday that a tornado has been spotted ed near Mentone, and it will be his responsibility to sound the siren and contact local schools, businesses, etc.

The purpose of the countywide test is to check the county-wide communications; test various organizations emergency operations, to be able to cooperations, to be able to co-ordinate all organizations into a single working body provid-ing aid to the public in the event of a disaster; and to edu-cate the public to the county emergency plan and its func-tion during a disaster. In addition to the CD direc-

tors and police, fireman and emergency medical service or-ganizations will be participating

Town Board acts on necessary road repairs

The Mentone Town Board met in regular session Monday evening, May 1, at the Town Hall. It was reported that several applications have been re-ceived for employment on the Mentone Water & Street Departments and will continue to be accepted.

In regards to the request by Sally Smithson for outside dancing in front of the Broadway Cafe, the Board voted against the request. Their de-cision was based on their feelings that the noise would create a disturbance to residents, and extra policy help

would be required.

In other action, the Board members decided to hold a special meeting to set up al-ternative funds for pollution control since the Environmental Protection Agency has rejected the latest grant. They also stated that an EPA official would be invited to at-

tend a future board meeting.

Bids for the cost of materials for street repairs will soon be taken as it was discussed that the repairs are immediately necessary. A list of the streets has been drawn up, but the cost is not yet known. Mentone has received \$8,614 for its street and road fund, and the town will be eligible for other governmental monies.

After much discussion, the Board decided not to continue as part of the Area Planning Commission, as they felt Men-tone could handle its own needs, and no one knows the town's needs as well as the town representatives themselves.

And it was reported that insurance claims for the town's dump truck that was damaged have still not been settled. An insurance adjuster will be contacted.



The month of May is bicycle safety month, and it is important to all of us that bicyclists know how to ride

As an automobile driver, I am very concerned when I approach people on bicycles because I never know what they are going to do. They legally should obey the same laws: as auto drivers, but many do not. And it really scares me when I see children riding with no hands, etc.

So here are some safety tips, sent to me by Lucille Teel, that will make cycling safer. Perhaps you will read them to your children so they'll be aware, too.

- 1. Obey all applicable traffic regulations, signs, signals and markings. Also avoid congested and heavily traveled streets.
- 2. Observe all local ordinances pertaining to bicycles. It is your responsibility to know them and follow them.
- 3. Keep to the right; drive with the traffic, not against it. Ride single file and stay close to the curb.
- 4. Be careful of loose sand or gravel on corners. Watch out for other road surface hazards.
- 5. Be careful of car doors opening or cars pulling out into traffic.
- 6. Don't carry passengers or packages that interfere
- with your vision or control.

 7. Never hitch a ride on a truck or other vehicle.
- 8. Most accidents happen at intersections. Be very careful at intersections, particularly when making a left turn.
- 9. Let motorists know what you plan to do by using hand signals to indicate turning or stopping.
- 10. If you are going to ride after dark, use maximum protection, use lights and reflectors.
- 11. Make sure that your bike is safe. Be sure it fits you and see to it that brakes, pedals, lights, reflectors, shifting mechanisms, tires, spokes, handlebars, and all nuts and bolts are checked regularly.
- 12. Drive your bike defensively. Watch out for the other guy, especially those in cars.

Safe cycling is fun, and every year, more and more people are discovering that bicycling is an economical way to travel and enjoy the fresh air.

But please remember these tips - they may prevent an accident to you or someone you love!!

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



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Legal Notice

AN ORDINANCE TO CONTROL AND PROTECT ANIMALS IN THE COUNTY OF FULTON, INDIANA, AND PROVIDE FOR THE PROCEDURES AND PENALTIES IN VIOLATION THEREOF: Be it Ordained, by the County Commissioners of Fulton County, Indiana,

SECTION I. For the purposes of this Ordinance the following terms shall

SECTION I. For the purposes of this Ordinance the following terms shall mean:
ANIMAL: Any living creature domestic or wild,
ANIMAL CONTROL COMMISSION. The Fution County Humane Society
Animal Control Commission organized for the purpose of representing a viable, animal control and rescue program in Fution County.
ANIMAL SHELTER: The Fution County Humane Society animal shelter to the state of t

SECTION II, Animal Control

1) All animals shall be kept under restraint at all times.

2) No owner shall fall to prevent his or her animals from molesting passerby, chasing vehicles, obstructing traffic, attacking other animals or people,
tresspassing onto school grounds, or tresspassing onto private or public property in such a manner as to damage or defacate on such property.

3) No owner shall fall to confine a female dog in heat within a building,
veterinary hospital or boarding kennel in such a manner that the female cannot come into contact with male dogs except for planned breeding. Sald confinement of the female shall be maintained at all times during the heat
period.

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SECTION III, Impoundment: Fees and Disposition of Unclaimed Animals. 6) Impounded animals shall be kept for not less than 5 days, unless reclaimed by the owners. Any injured, sick or diseased animals shall be exempt from the 5 day holding requirement and at the discretion of the Humane Officer and/or attending vet immediately and humanely euthanized. 7) Any person claiming an impounded animal shall upon request of the Humane Officer provide proof of ownership by means of a rabbis certificate of such animal and pay all applicable fines and fees before such animal shall be released.

Town board met

Akron Clean-up this weekend

The Akron Town Board met in The Akton Town Board met in the regular monthly meeting, Tuesday, May 16 at the town of-fices. All members were present, except Dr. Chas. Miller, who was unable to attend.

Discussion was held on various town business including plans for this weekend's Akron Clean-Up Days, proclaimed in last month's meeting, for the days of May 19 and 20. The town of Akron will have 2 or 3 trucks on duty those days for pickup and hauling of all trash and debris town citizens want removed. Arrangement may be made for removal of old refrigerators. cars, and similar large items by contacting board members.

Other meeting topics included

Lessel Halterman, Macy, addressed the board, proposing various radar equipment for police speed control use, ranging in prices from \$750 to \$2495. Board president Ron Fenimore commented that Akron police officers have "kept the speeding problem pretty much under control" without use of such equip-ment, but said the members would take the idea under ad-visement. Mr. Halterman was asked by the board to submit quotes on different types of fire extinguishers for use in city buildings.

— Town Clerk-Treasurer Ernie

Smith commented on complaints that were brought to his atten-tion from citizens who believe their water bills are too high in their water bills are too high in error. Investigations made in the past on similar complaints, Clerk Smith mentioned, have shown that in "9 out of 10 cases," the higher bills were not in error, but to leaky pipes within the customers household, or caused by inefficient automatic water

Discussion was held on when road work to patch potholes and bumpy surfaces would com-mence and Ron Fenimore said road officials told him work would begin in the Akron area 'as soon as warmer weather

permits, and things dry up to a workable condition."

— Vernon Waymire brought up the possibility of doing some interior remodeling in the Akron Fire Station, as the station is used by civic groups and election facilities who have expressed to him their requests for improve-ments. Discussion was held and it was decided that since the station's primary function is to house the fire-fighting equipment and not serve as a Civic Hall, the remodeling was decided against. A wider garage door, however, is being considered to allow for faster dispatch during an emergency and to accomo-date the new fire truck the town has contracted.

- Various methods of re-sur-facing the sidewalks in Akron were brought up, but no definitive action was taken until fur-ther investigation was made by the board.

 A list of delinquent accounts of non payment of water bills was read by Clerk Smith. Board members will personally contact those on the list who have not made any attempt to pay, and have not contacted the town for explanation of non-payment Water service disconnection will begin, under town ordinance, if non-payment without satis-factory reason continues.

- Clerk Smith mentioned that complaints of non-pickup of trash on collection days have been voiced to him. Board mem-bers agreed that they will contact the proper personel and dis-cuss ways of improving the service with them.

- Discussion was held and a re-— Discussion was held and a request was expressed by the board that Akron residents please not dispose feminine hygienic.products in the town sewer system as the accumulation of such products clog sewer lines and cannot be properly decomposed in the lift and waste systems.

The Akron Town Board meets the third Tuesday each month in the Town Offices.

History of first Memorial Day

Memorial Day, inspired by a dedicated schoolteacher and the anguish of the Civil War, had its beginnings in the ceme-tery surrounding a peaceful little brick church in central Virginia.

Virginia.

In early June, 1865, exactly one year after Petersburg, Va, was staggered by a surprise Federal attack during the Civil War, Miss Nora Davidson led her students in what has now be-come a national observance. She

and her students went to the cemetery surrounding the Old Blandford Church to decorate the graves of fallen Confederate soldiers. Each year after that, citizens of Petersburg, led by "Miss Nora" decorated the

church's Confederate graves. One visitor to the church and cemetery, Mrs. Mary C. Logan, wife of Gen. John A. Logan, noticed while passing through the rows of graves "that many of them had been strewn with beautiful blossoms and decorat-

ed with small flags of the dead Confederacy." On May 5, 1868, her husband, head of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued the order appointing May 30 of that year "for the purpose of strewing with flowers the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion." This was the first nationally recognized observance of Decoration Day, later renam-ed Memorial Day.

Telephone project begins

Construction crews from General Telephone Company of Indiana recently began work on three cable installation projects at a combined cost of \$67,000 to complete phase three of its Service Upgrading Program, providing Akron rural customers with their choice of one-, two-, or four-party service by the end of this year.

According to Ed Knafel, district

service manager for the company, these cable installation projects represent a small portion of the central switching office projects and cable installations required to upgrade the exchange. "Being able to provide all customers in the Akron exchange the opportunity to choose the type of service they desire has required the installation of immense amounts

of telephone cable and switching facilities. By the end of this year, General Telephone will have spent more than \$300,000 during 1977 and 1978 for upgrading projects," said Knafel.

The three cable installation pro-

jects currently underway in the Akron exchange will require more than 11 miles of buried and aerial cable. Approximately 4 miles will be used during the first project which involves placing cable along sections of County Roads 50 North, 925 West, 1200 East, and State Road 14. This will provide facilities to upgrade customers in the northeastern portion of the exchange.

The second project will provide for cable along a section of County Road 1075 East and West Rochester Street. New cable placed during the third project will be placed along State Road 14 west of County Road 1075 East to County Road 800 East. Knafel said that most of the

Malei said that most of the cable placed during the three projects will be buried to protect it from adverse weather conditions and to maintain the natural appearance of the landscape. He stated that the three projects will be completed this fall.

The projects are part of General Telephone's \$8.5 million expansion and construction program for the company's North Central Division during 1978.

Since Monday, May 29 is Memorial Day, we thought it would be interesting to reprint the following letter written in 1918 by a Mentone soldier stationed in France during World War I. It gives a brief idea of what our men had to go through back in '18.

Somewhere in France. June 19, 1918.

Dear Father and sisters:-

This has been a dismal old day; it has rained all day. When I hear anyone speak of Sunny France I sure think it is a joke. We can wear a coat all day and wish for about ten more when it gets dark.

It was very quiet here all day until about an hour ago when the shells began to burst about us. A piece of shrapnel bit one of the fellows in my squad on the leg. Did not burt him; only stung a little. We sure dig for protection when they begin to whiz over our heads. There seems to be more fighting in the air in this section than any place else. Have seen three or four battles overhead here today.

I will be entitled to a seven day furlough about the first of August. If I am not broke I am going to look up the Motor Mechanics and try and see Foster Jones and Doc. Cook. If I am as near broke as at present I may spend my vacation with the company. We can't tell over here when we are likely to be paid.

I received three home papers last week and was sure glad to get them. Of course the news was a little old, but it never gets too old for over here. The advertisements even look good. Mentone has a bunch of fellows in the service and I sure feel proud of her. When they all get over here they will know what real soldiering is, but not until then. Hope they can all get some of this experience if they want it, for it is great and will be worth lots to us if we come out alive, and most of us will. I cut out the list of names in the paper and will keep it for reference.

Hope I can spend Christmas at home but am afraid that will be a

Hope I can spend Christmas at home but am afraid that will be a little soon. Nearly everyone I have talked to over here believe it will be over by then, but we cannot tell. I don't believe the Germans will ever be able to make any more advances, as they have failed in the last two drives. They can never whip us. All we need is men and money over here. Of course it takes lots of money, for this is a moneyed war, but Uncle Sam has that.

I wouldn't mind having a good feed at home, but will get that later. We are fed on French rations here. Hope this finds you as well as it is leaving me.



hunters beware Mushroom

Going for a mushroom hunt in the woods? You'll especially want to watch out for poison ivy, oak and sumac. But, being out of the woods doesn't make you safe from poison ivy and oak. They can flourish in very dry soil on even the most exposed hillside. Heed the advice of the old saying "leaflets three, let it be," and you'll go a long way in avoiding the nuisance and discomfort these plants can deliver.

Poison ivy and oak grow in

Poison my and oak grow in three different forms:
--woody vines attached to trees or other objects for support,
--shrubs trailing mostly on the ground, and

erect woody shrubs that stand

without support.
They're most often abundant along old fence rows and edges of paths and roadways. They ramble over walls and climb trunks of trees. Often they grow

trunks of trees. Often they grow within other shrubs or vines so that you might overlook them. Although leaf forms vary, there is one characteristic to watch for-the leaves almost always consist of three leaflets (although some harmless plants have this trait too,--seeing this pattern will at least caution you.)

Poison sumac grows as a coarse woody shrub or small tree, and never in the vinelike form of its poison ivy relatives.
It doesn't take much of the

poisonous substance to give you

trouble. A small amount can cause severe inflammation of the skin. The poison is easily trans-ferred from one object to another. For instance, clothing may become contaminated and is often a source of prolonged infection. Don't wear contaminated clothing until it is thoroughly washed. And don't wash it with other clothes. Another source of contamination may be the family pet. Dogs and cats may brush against the plants and carry the poison to children

or other unsuspecting folks. The poison can remain on the fur of animals for a considerable time after they've walked or run through poison ivy plants. Ani-mals can be decontaminated by bathing but be careful to avoid poisoning while you're washing them

And keep in mind that smoke from buring plants carries the toxin and can cause severe cases of poisoning.

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Family Life

Millions of Americans are poisoned by foods prepared at home and eaten at picnics, work or school. The National Sanitation Foundation (NSF) notes that two families of bacteria are the principal villains - salmonella and staphy-lococci ("staph"). The sickness may only last a day or two and be mistakenly blamed on a "bug", a "virus" or on

Mayonnaise, salad dressing, egg sauces and custards need to be kept cold until just before eating. They are excellent culture mediums in which microbes can multiply and produce intestinal poisons known as enterotoxins.

NSF scientists offer these suggestions:

1. Do not let foods containing moisture or fat stand around for long periods of time in a warm kitchen.

2. Sandwiches, salads and desserts intended for picnics or other away-from-home consumption should be stored in a refrigerator until just before leaving. The same rule applies to meats that are to be cooked at a picnic.

3. Carry picnic meals in a portable food chest which contains ice or frozen freezer cans.

4. When possible, store brown bag lunches in a refrigerator at school or work until just before lunch.

Never eat food from a bulging can or a food container that squirts upon opening. The contents may contain C. botulinum, the cause of botulism, and deadliest of all food

6. Observe this rule about suspicious foods: "When in doubt, throw it out,"



In addition, a person 18 or over who is applying for a number for the first time, must apply in per-

The best evidence of a person's age and U.S. citizenship is a birth certificate. This should be submitted if possible. But, if it is not available, other documentary evidence can be used.

Evidence of identity should include documentation which shows the person's picture, signature, date of birth or age, or other identifying information.

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
