


Spring concert Sunday

Tulips are favorite sign, but rhubarb means Spring

by Patricia M. Braman

Tulips get the credit as a sure Trunps get the creent as a sure sign of spring. But rhubarb is just as certain an indication. When this pink ribbed plant with the frillaro and the edges is in the market, it's a sure sign of spring.

Rhubarb, often called preplant, is a herbaceous perennial. The edible portion of the plant is the large tender leaf stalk. The leaves of the rhubarb plant contain oxalic acid and therefore are not edible, either

raw or cooked.

There's been much confusion in regards to classifing rhubarb as a fruit or vegetable. Actually, rhu-barb is a vegetable and is the only vegetable that replaces fruit in our diets. Its primary use is in dishes such as pies and tarts. It is relative-ly high in calcium and Vitamin A, utritionally speaking it's a good buy.

When selecting rhubarb, look for firm, crisp, fairly thick stalks that are either red or pink in color, depending on the variety. Avoid flabby stalks. Fresh rhubard should be refrigerated and used within 3 to 5 days for optimum quality. When preparing wash and trim discolor-ed ends; cut off and discard any

For those who want that nippy rhubarb flavor to add to winter

months, rhubarb is easily canned or frozen. To can, select young tender stalks. Trim, wash and cut into half inch lengths. Young stalks should not be peeled. The stanks should not be pecieta. The skin gives the blush pink color that is so appetizing and it holds the pieces in shape so they do not cook down to mush. Add ½ cup sugar to each quart of rhubarb and let it stand to draw out the juice. Then bring it to a boil, pack hot, and cover with hot juice. Process pint and quart jars 10 minutes

in a boiling-water bath.

To freeze rhubarb, pick young tender stalks that are firm, wellcolored with good flavor and few fibers. Wash, trim and cut into one or two inch pieces. Do not peel. Heat rhubarb in boiling wa ter for one minute and cool promptly in cold water helps retain color and flavor. It can be frozen with or without sugar de-pending on individual preference.

RHUBARB BROWN BETTY Mix 3/4 - 1 cup sugar, 1/4 tea-spoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Grease a 1½ quart casserole. Put in ½ cup soft bread crumbs, then 1 cup chopped rhubarb. Sprinkle with ½ of the sugar mixture. Repeat a layer of bread crumbs, rhubard and sugar mixture. Mix ¼ cup wa ter, juice and grated rind of 1 le-mon; pour over layers. Put on remaining crumbs and dot with 3 T. butter. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 1 and 3/4 hours. Serves

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Don't be overly concerned with brown tips on evergreens

Don't become overly concerned if your broad-leaved and needled evergreens show some brown tips at this time, sayd Paul Pecknold, Purdue University extension plant pathologist.

Most often this is injury caused

by winter desiccation. During winter months evergreens continue to lose water through transpiration and evaporation. And while soils are frozen, evergreen plants are not able to replenish this loss, the specialist explains.

This loss causes evergreen needles and leaves to dry out, brown and become a worry to homeowners. Pine, taxus, hemlock, spruce, holly, and rhododendrons are ornamentals most often involved

'Most frequently damage is confined to or most severe on that side of the plant directly exposed to the sun and prevailing winds," says Pecknold. "There is little that can be done at this time in the way of control, for the damage has already occurred," he adds.

Pecknold suggests that pruning of these parts be delayed until new growth begins. Often there is no need for pruning, as stem and bud tissue are not injured. Thus, damage is confined to the needle or leaf tissue.

Once growth begins, you can in-spect the plant and determine if stem injury has occurred. If there is injury, you can prune out the stem at that time. It would also be wise to prune out small dead twigs at the same time, as these can be-come sources of canker diseases, the plant pathologist says.

In cases where much or all of your evergreen has turned brown, winter injury may be too severe, and recovery then is unlikely.

To prevent winter desiccation, take precautions in the fall, says the specialist. Deep watering, mulching, windbreaks (burlap, cardboard), and antitranspirant sprayed on foliage in late fall can help prevent winter desiccation.

Salt injury is often difficult to distinguish from winter desiccation, Pecknold adds. White pine, taxus and arborvitae are some plants prone to salt injury. Examine your plants to see if injury is on the side next to the roadway, sidewalk, driveway, or steps where de-icing salt would have been applied. To leach salts from the soil, water

Searching for replacement

Mentone Marshall resigns post

In what appeared to be a surprise to members of the Mentone Town Board, Marshal Earl Beattie read aloud his letter of resignation at Monday evenings regular session of the trustees.

Board president Frank Hardesty indicated after the reading that he was not completely surprised by Beattie's action, however, Gerald Romine and Wayne Tombaugh seemed at a loss for words.

In his letter, Beattie stated that he had enjoyed working in Men-tone, and appreciated the support of the residents and the Board, but had decided to continue with his college education. He did not say where he would be residing in the future or where he would be going to school. He expressed his appre-ciation to Deputy Marshal John Hart and reserve officer Jay Secrist, and stated, "I would like to take

this opportunity to publicly thank the citizens and businesses of Mentone for their support of the Police

Department...and I would like to extend my thanks for having had the opportunity to serve the Town of Mentone..."

President Hardesty stated that he was reluctanly accepting the resignation, to which Tombaugh stated "so here". Hardesty then told Beattie, "I want to wish you the best of luck".

Beattie's resignation is effective June 1, and the Board will now be accepting applications for a replacement. Anyone interested should see Marshal Beattie or Wayne Tombaugh for an application form.

Clerk-treasurer, Catherine Whetstone, informed the board members that Norman Noe, of the Leary Construction Company, had con-

tacted her in regards to the repair work that is to be done on the wa-ter tank. Noe told Whetstone that the new OSHA approved ladder has been put on the tank, and actual repair work should be com-pleted within the month. The Leary Construction Company was contracted to do the work at a special session in March.

In other action: *Attorney Lee Bazini told the trustees that most of the ordi-nances he has reviewed from 1968

will still be effective today. However, a few changes will be neces-sary, and further study is essential before the ordinances are accepted.

He also stated tht he received a letter of complaint from a town resident, regarding the board ap-pointments of local BAZ (Board of Zoning Appeals) members. Pre-sident Hardesty reminded every-one that no appointments have been made at this time, but Town Roard members will near the Board members will most likely be three of the seven.

Tragic accident claims life of Valley sophomore

A Tippecanoe Valley High School sophomore was killed as a result of injuries she received in an accident on State Road 25 last Saturday evening on the dangerous curves known as the "Devil's Backbone

Theresa Schoettmer, age 16, of R. 1, Silver Lake, died in Kos-ciusko Community Hospital several hours after the accident of internal injuries and a skull fracture.

She was a passenger in a car driven by Jeffrey Ferguson, age 17, of R. 2, Silver Lake, when the vehicle, apparently traveling at high rate of speed, crossed the road and traveled along the berm on the left side of the road, then recrossed the road, went through a fence, careened between two trees, and then hit a tree head on.

Two other passengers in the auto Two other passengers in the auto, Tammy Hawkins, age 17, R. 2, Akron, and Robert Kline, age 15, R. 1, Silver Lake, were unable to tell what had happened to cause the accident. Mentone Marshal Earl Beattle and Winona Lake Marshal Marlin Rose investigated. Ferguson was taken to KCH by

Multi-Township EMS, and was later transferred to Parkview Hospital in Fort Wayne. He was listed in fair condition with lacerations and contusions. Hawkins and Kline were treated and released from KCH for lacerations, contusions and abra-

The accident occurred at 11:07 p.m., and Ferguson's 1967 auto was totaled, with damage set at \$300. Also damaged was a fence with estimated damage at \$75.







Let's Talk About

Capital Costs, Energy Supplies and Earnings

What do utility capital costs and earnings have to do with adequate energy supplies? Actually, quite a lot. Let's look at the facts:

Utility Capital Requirements

Electric utilities are more capital-intensive than any other industry, including steel and oil. They require between \$3.50 and \$4.00 of investment for each dollar of revenue received. Other industries require only about 75 cents of capital investment for each \$1.00 of revenue.

As a regulated industry, utilities are only allowed to earn a return on their investment sufficient to pay for their cost of money. This rate of return is a ceiling and not a floor.

About 60 per cent of the money needed to add plant and equipment each year must be obtained from the money market through the sale of securities-stocks, bonds, de-

To meet the energy needs of consumers, utilities cannot postpone construction and replacement just because the cost of money is high.

Most of the \$1.9 billion NIPSCO has budgeted for new facilities in the next five years will have to be raised in the money market. And NIPSCO must pay whatever the

Our success in obtaining this money depends upon earnings since earnings determine our ability to pay our debts.

If a utility's earnings are inadequate in the eyes of the lender, money becomes hard to obtain and interest rates go up. 

WHERE EACH NIPSCO DOLLAR CAME FROM



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The great American pastime...

It's garage sale time again!!

Going to, and giving, garage sales, is one of the favorite pastimes of men and women in the Akron

Mentone area during the summer.
They are also called rummage sales, yard sales, basement sales (when it rains) and occasionally

What it all boils down to is this: you clean out all your closets and extra rooms - don't forget the garage - fight your impulse to keep things one more year (just in case), clean it, stick a price on

it and put it up for sale.

Many, many people, including lake weekenders, start out early Friday or Saturday morning with their tearsheet of ads from the paper and spend the entire morn-ing going from sale to sale.

Why? Everyone has a different reason and they couldn't possibly be covered here but here are a few tips for a successful sale.

One of the major problems with having a sale in the rural area is that it is difficult to find people's

om ent ity is re-

If you live on an out-of-the-way road, borrow someone else's garage. Customers won't seek you out if you're too hard to find.

A good idea is to put directions in your ad. For example, "Take Hwy. 19 1 mile north of Akron, turn left onto Division Road, first road on right, green house."

Another good idea is to include your phone number in the ad. That way, if someone gets lost on the way, you can give directions. Or if someone has seen but not bought something at your sale, she can call back later to see if it's sold. She may have changed her mind.

Just saying "John Smith's house, Akron or Mentone" is not enough. Even if you've lived in this area since 1902 many visitors and many local people do not know where you live so don't assume everyone

Two days should be enough for your sale. Many people figure almost everything will be gone after two days and won't bother to come. They're usually right. You'll two days and won to bother to come. They're usually right. You'l find the first couple of hours will be extremely busy as all the bar-gain hunters want to get in on the "goodies" first. Thursday and Friday or Friday and Saturday sales attract crowds of people.

Set up your display the day be-fore the sale. Use picnic tables and benches, folding tables, boards laid across sawhorses. This way, you'll be able to scatter the items so each one will be easily seen, and can be picked up without disturb-ing other items. Open your doors promptly at the advertised time and don't be surprised if there are 30 people standing there waiting.

A lot of different items is a key to any successful sale. The more variety, the more interest you will generate among lookers and buy-ers. Some people will come strictly to buy clothes - or dishes. Others will be attracted to everything you display. You may also have pro-

desional buyers from resale shops.
Use psychology. Put toys and children's games close to the floor. Have a basket or box of small items people can rummage through.

Lookers will know the cost and will not bother you constantly. In some cases, you may have to haggle over the cost of an item, and it's up to you whether to reduce the price. When an item is sold, take the tag off and put it in a box. Total of the tags and total receipts should balance.

Some items you may not want to tag individually. Have a sign saying, all records 50 cents or jewelry, \$1. When a nontagged item is sold, make out a tag with the price on it and put it in your box. If you resale, have different colored tags or marking pencils for each family. This way you'll be able to know who made how much.

If you have the time, it's a good idea to write a short description of the item on the tag, such as 'Green blouse - 75 cents.' This

will alert you if you run into a

tag-switcher. It does happen. Don't overprice. To you, many items may be priceless because of sentimental value. But to a buyer it's just another item. If you're in doubt as to what to charge, don't put a price on the item, but fix a price in your head, then let the interested party make an offer.

Some of the most successful sales are put on by several people along a road who put on sales at the same time. This brings more people be cause they can visit a number of sales in the same area.

If someone asks you to hold an item, do it. But take down the person's name and phone number in case they don't show up to buy the item. If someone else expresses interest in an item you're saving for someone else, take that per-son's name and number. Tell them you'll call if the first party doesn't show up to claim the item.

When you're down to maybe a third of the items you started with, consider marking everything left half-price. Tell people this when they come. After all, you don't want to cart everything back into the house. You're holding your garage sale to get rid of things. And half price is better than giving it away.

command, I don't think it was Please comment. —G.S. What constitutes a "direct command"? In instituting the Supper, Jesus told His disciples: "Take, eat; this is my body," and "Drink ye all of it." (Mt. 26:26-27.) Mark and Luke also record this event, saying the same thing, except Luke includes: "This do in remembrance of me." (Lk. 22:19). To me, this constitutes a direct command from the Lord, who later told those men to make disciples, "teaching them to observe all this real things and the same to the same all this real thin to absent all this real thin to the same to the s

whatsoever I have commanded you." (Mt. 28:20).

With this background, you can better understand Paul's writing in 1 Cor. 11:23-30. He states that Jesus said, "Take, eat:" and also taught proper observance! It is true that Jesus did not say how often they were to observe it. But apostolic example makes it abundantly clear that they met on the first day of the week for this memorial observance (Acts 20.7). It is because they met to observe the Lord's Supper that they chose I believe there is a direct command to "eat and drink" as the Lord commanded!

His disciples would bind them in that church to be. Much of the teaching Jesus gave was looking forward to the full proclamation of the gospel.

The church could not have been established at that time for Jesus had not then died. He purchased the church with His blood (Acts 20:28), and He did not use a "credit card," or purchase the church on time! Rather, the law of Moses held sway until it was nailed to the cross with the death of Jesus Christ (Col. 2:14). Christ's will and testament could not be in force until His death (Heb. 9:15-17). The first covenant was first removed, and then the second established (Heb. 10: 9-10). If the church had been established during the personal ministry of Jesus, then two sets of priests would have been vying against each other (study Heb. 8:3-7). So, during His ministry on earth, Jesus taught His disciples of those conditions that would hold after they were set in the church as charter members on that Pentecost after His resurrection. 



Let's Talk About

Capital Costs, Energy Supplies and Earnings

Nhat do utility capital costs and earnings have to do with adequate energy supplies? Actually, quite a lot. Let's look at the facts:

Utility Capital Requirements

Electric utilities are more capital-intensive than any other industry, including steel and oil. They require between \$3.50 and \$4.00 of investment for each dollar of revenue received. Other industries require only about 75 cents of capital investment for each \$1.00 of revenue.

As a regulated industry, utilities are only allowed to earn a return on their investment sufficient to pay for their cost of money. This rate of return is a ceiling and not a floor.

About 60 per cent of the money needed to add plant and equipment each year must be obtained from the money market through the sale of securities-stocks, bonds, debentures, etc.

To meet the energy needs of consumers, utilities cannot postpone construction and replacement just because the cost of money is high.

Most of the \$1.9 billion NIPSCO has budgeted for new facilities in the next five years will have to be raised in the money market. And NIPSCO must pay whatever the

Our success in obtaining this money depends upon earnings since earnings determine our ability to pay our debts.

If a utility's earnings are inadequate in the eyes of the lender, money becomes hard to obtain and interest rates go up. When money is not available to build facilities, the bottom line is an inadequate supply of energy and deteriorating service.

Here in northern Indiana, the need for electric energy both in peak demand and kilowatt-hours-is expected to grow at a rate of about six per cent per year between now and 1985.



WHERE EACH NIPSCO DOLLAR CAME FROM



ever, that any or all of the land would be returned to the town of Mentone at any time if the board finds it necessary to expand the cemetery.



Board members give okay on survey recommendations

Members of the Tippecanoe Valley School Board listened intently Monday evening, as Dr. Lloyd Harrell, Superintendent, recommended his proposals under the "Project Do Something" item on the agenda

agenda.
Dr. Harrell explained to trustees
Con Shewman, Don Snipes, Everett
Besson, Vernon Meredith and Lee
Norris that he felt there are three
choices in dealing with the structural and facility needs of the
school corporation.

Harrell's first recommendation was to follow the survey plans of Doctors Norbert Nelson and Merle Strom, which would include the construction of a new junior high school and extensive renovation at the elementary schools and high school; the second was to omit the new junior high with even more extensive renovations at the existing schools; and the third was to leave things as they are, but as Harrell stated, "the third is really no alternative at all".

Doctor Harrell then presented brochures and pamphlets to the Board that he has collected regarding the construction and/or renovations in a school corporation. He encouraged them to decide quickly on their course of action, as time delay is an important factor, especially where cost is concerned.

A motion was made by trustee Meredith to follow the recommendations of Strom & Nelson, and seconded by Snipes. With unanimous approval the Board elected to begin with the survey recommendations, and Dr. Harrell will now begin contacting architects to begin the plans. All necessary legal steps will be followed, of course.

There was some discussion as to what to do about the heating problems at Mentone School, and the Board directed Dr. Harrell to contact the maintenance supervisor and see what must be done before next falls school opening. If it is necessary to hire a contractor to do the repairs, then they feel the work should be contracted out.

Seven bids from contractors were opened by Board president Shewman for the nine new school buses to be purchased by the school corporation. All were for 1980 models. Shewman addressed the contractors who were present, stating that a decision will be forthcoming within seven to ten days, and the bids were taken under advisement.

Dr. Harrell reported to the board that he had received a letter from the Indiana State High School Athletic Association, stating that all tracks for track and field competition at the high school level must be measured in metric by 1980. According to the letter, this must be done if the track athletes at TVHS wish to compete with other schools.

An additional appropriation for the work will be filed for early this summer, upon the Board approval, and Dr. Harrell estimated that the cost will range between \$14,000 and \$18,000.

In other Board action:
*The Board approved the TVSC budget of \$26,793 for 1979-80 for their share of the five-way funding for the special education Co-op at Warsaw. Dr. Jim Daiker, Director of the Co-op, explained that the TVSC portion is figured on the number of TVSC students enrolled in the program, and by the total number of students in the Tippecanoe Valley Corporation.

*A special meeting was scheduled for Wednesday, May 23, to begin at noon, for the purpose of opening bond bids on the buses. The meeting will be held at the high school lecture room.

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TVSC trustees accept bus bids; approve bond bid for \$150,000

Members of the Tippecanoe Valley School Board accepted two bids for nine new school buses at a special meeting of the Board on Wednesday May 23, at the high

Sealed bids submitted by seven companies, had been opened at the Monday, May 21, meeting of the Board, but were taken under advisement for consideration.

A bid of \$86,435.64 for the bus bodies, submitted by Jack Chaillie Co., of Indianapolis; and a bid of \$96,718.14 for the chassis; submitted by Kerlin Bus Sales & Service, of Silver Lake, were accepted as the lowest bids.

The total cost of \$183,153.78 includes the alternates of 52-ounce upholstery, middle section heaters, and a citizens band radio for the athletic bus.

The bids were accepted by attending trustees Don Snipes, Vernon Meredith, Con Shewman, and Everett Besson.

A \$150,000 bond issuance and \$32,289.55 in the school corporation's bus purchase fund will be used for the purchase of the buses once approval is received from the State Board of Tax Commissioners

Dr. Harrell, Superintendent of Schools, reported to the Board. that a State Board of Tax Commission field representative, who presided at a local hearing tentatively

approved the corporation's \$150, 000 additional appropriation Wednesday morning. However, as Har-rell explained, he was at the meeting when the representative called one of three state tax commissioners and learned that the commissioner would not approve the appro-priation until he has studied it.

Bids for the \$150,000 bond sale were submitted by the Akron Exchange State Bank, and City Securities of South Bend.

Akron bank officials projected a net interest cost of \$23,259.86 with a 5.70794% average interest rate, and City Securities a interest cost of \$23,192.25 at 5.70% interest. If approved, the bonds will be retired within three years.

The Board members approved the lower bid of City Securities. however it is subject to the final approval of the State Board of Tax Commissioners.

In other Board action: The trustees authorized Dr. Harrell to send applications to archite-cural firms in regards to building renovations and the construction

of a new middle school. The trustees will then review the applications of three firms, and lish a cumulative building fund



Specialist gives tips on lawn mower safety and precautions

A few weeks ago the first cro-cuses and robins were forecasting that spring was near. Now the hum of power mowers is convicing all of us that spring has arrived.

This leads Bill Field, Purdue University extension safety specialist to remind that last year more than 50 million lawn mowers were in

operation in the United States.
Field says it is estimated an additional million mowers will help trim the nation's turf this year... and five million new mowers will be sold!

"With this tremendous number of mowers in operation, accidents are bound to occur, especially where safety is neglected," the safety specialist stresses. "Therefore, a word about safety and po-wer mowers needs to be re-empha-sized at the outset of the season,"

Field says that common sense, as well as the following safety remind-ers, can make mowing "a safe way to keep both dandelions and waistline under control."

-When buying a mower, look for the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI) certificate or seal. This will tell you that the mower

has met specific safety standards.
--Before mowing, take time first to rake up wires, cans, rocks, branches and other litter cluttering the lawn. Keep an eye out for children's toys.

-- Always turn off the mower and disconnect the spark plug or elec-tric plug before unclogging or ad-

Field says that most serious injuries stemming from lawn mower

accidents are caused by:
--objects such as stones, wire, cans
and bottles that are run over by the mower and propelled at high speed from the discharge, striking a bystander or the operator.

--riding mowers overturning when operated on steep slopes.

-operating riding mowers in reverse, thus striking unseen bystand-

-hand or finger contact with the mower blade when cleaning plugged grass from the discharge chute. adjusting riding or push mowers when the blade is still turning.

justing the machine. Even a slight rotation of the blade could start the engine.
--Do not refuel when the engine

is hot, and refrain from smoking when near gasoline. Both actions could result in a flash fire.

--Mow across slopes if using a push mower. With a riding mower, drive up and down steep slopes. If areas of the lawn are too steep to mow safely, convert these areas into flower beds, rock gardens, or other uses which do not require mowing.

--Keep children and bystanders out of the area being mower.

There's no one way right to discipline, but be consistent

Is there one right way to discipline a child? What can you do if your child cries every time you leave for work? How can you make sure your child develops his or her uni-que abilities? Let's face it, being a parent isn't easy. But there has been a lot of research on child development that can help you as a

Much of this research has been Much of this research has been used in putting together a new public television show called "Footsteps." The suggestions on parenting presented in these shows have been expanded into a 44-page book from the U.S. Office of Education. Called Footsteps: A Parenting Guide the book gives suggestions on everything from preparing your child to start school to different styles of discipline for children. For your free copy, write your name and ad-dress on a postcard and send it to the Consumer Information Center, Dept. 648G, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

Here are some of the hints: First of all, there is no such thing as the "average child." Each child is an individual with unique abili-ties. But sometimes it's easy to forties. But sometimes it's easy to forget this. Don't try to push your child to be exactly like you or someone else. Try not to compare one with another. Avoid comments like: "Why can't you be polite like your sister?" And let children use their energies to be what they weally went to be really want to be.

Second, the more your child trusts you, the easier it will be to learn how to say goodbye for a little while. Separation is one of the most difficult adjustments for a young child. But separation need not be a nightmare. Prepare your children when you leave. Let them get used to the baby sitter or day care teacher gradually. Provide a routine they can count on, so they'll feel secure about your return. And let your child take some thing familiar to a new place, like a favorite book or toy.

Finally, when your child misbehaves, remember: there is no one right way to discipline. In the long run, you want your child to learn selfcontrol. But when your child is about to hit a friend over the head with a baseball bat, you can't wedding wait for the load terms of the load terms wait for the long term effects to take place.

Whatever style or discipline you choose, be consistent. You don't have to like or tolerate your child's behavior at all times. But by under-standing the cause of each misbe-

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
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Tranquilizers cause high rate of addiction **OBITUARIES**

The term drug addick doesn't usually bring to mind someone taking a legally prescribed medica-tion. And yet abuse of prescription medication is a serious problem for

The Food and Drug Administration says this is a more serious pro-blem with women than men. There are approximately one to two million women drug abusers. They are from all walks of life - housewives, business executives, city and country dwellers. All could be among the "junkies" you'd least expect.

The biggest problem is the so-called minor tranquilizer. It's often prescribed to relieve minor tensions and is also valuable in treating alcoholism and epilepsy, as well as painful muscle spasms. But when taken in combination with other drugs -especially alcohol -- the result can be deadly. And, overuse can lead to dependency, producing withdrawal symptoms similar to those from barbiturates. Symptoms may include delirium, trembling, psycho-

DORMANT SPRAY -- pesticide applied to a plant before growth starts (late winter or early spring) to control insects and diseases.

HEELING IN -- temporary stor-ing of bare-rooted trees and shrubs by placing the roots in a trench and covering with soil or sawdust.

RESISTANCE - ability of a plant to restrict disease or insect damage or withstand severe climatic condi-

SEED BED -- garden soil after it has been prepared for planting seeds or transplants by plowing and disking, rototilling, spading or
