You may have been asked recently, by family or friends, to invest in a financial project going around the area called the Circle of Gold. The first time I was approached about this, I was unable to attend the meeting, and I didn't think too much about it. But within two weeks time, I was contacted by four other friends who wanted me to buy into the plan. Curious, I listened the set-up of how the Circle of Gold operates, and it sounded wonderfully simple. In fact, it sounded too good to be

Most of the actually investing is conducted at Circle of Gold meetings. For an outlay of \$100, you have an opportunity to receive back an incredible amount of money. \$50 of your money goes to the person you buy from. The seller gives you two identical lists with 12 names on them, and your other \$50 goes to the first person on the list. If John Doe is the witnesses) and mail it to Mr. John Doe

John Doe has now received \$50 profit from you, and his name comes off your list. Your name goes on the number 12 spot, and you once again have a complete list of 12. The theory of the Circle of Gold is that when your name reaches the number 1 spot on a list, you will be the next to re-

you will be the next to re-ceive \$50 profit.

To regain your original in-vestment of \$100, you sell two sets of your list to two people. You receive \$50 for each set of

spot. In theory, you could end

up with your name number 1 on 8,192 lists if everyone sells just two sets of lists the way they're supposed to. The inhe proble m with the Circle of Gold is that an area may run out of people before you get an opportunity to make much profit. After all, though the possibilities for making a profit seem infinite, there are only a finite number of people to deal with.

The Circle of Gold originated in California. A group of law-yers came up with the plan, one assumes they have all made fortunes off their project.
The television program, 60 Minutes has investigated the Circle Gold, as has the FBI and the IRS

One of the points everyone has mentioned in trying to sell has mentioned in trying to sell their lists is that you may make up to \$3000 profit tax free. This seemed a trifle unusual, so I called the IRS and spoke to Bob Branson, Public Relations Officer at Indianapolis. He knew about the Circle of Gold and confirmed that the IRS was watching the project. When I watching the project. When I inquired about the \$3000 tax free profit, he emphatically responded, "This is absolutely untrue! There is no truth to this. The first penny you make is taxable.

Alan Burke, Fulton County Prosecutor, was also aware that the Circle of Gold was spreading in the area, and he said that the postmaster and the FBI have checked into the matter in Rochester. When I asked if the Circle of Gold was operating legally, he stated, "It does not violate Indiana law, but it does violate Federal laws which prohibit using the mails for this type of scheme." When I asked if any action would be taken, he replied, "They will probably not do anything." have checked into the matter in not do anything."

ed. "only a limited number of people will make money. People don't take time to realize the merry-go-round will come to a stop." The Rochester-Akron-Mentone-No. Manchester-Peru area is not the first area in Indiana to get in on the plan. It is just now filtering down to rural areas from Indiana cities that were glutted by the Circle of Gold.

The Circle of Gold is not a sham, albeit it may not be en-tirely aboveboard. If you get into it early enough, you may realize a small profit, but remember any money you make IS taxable, regardless of anything said to the contrary.

What we should not lose sight of here is that we're not talking about a criminal ele or activity. We're talking

about decent, honest, ordinary people who have been hit hard by inflation over the last three years and who are merethree years and who are mere ly trying to make a little extra cash. Who can blame them? If there is any blame to be laid at someone's feet, it would be the lawyers in California who started it and have probably made millions by now. Clever fellows by now. Attorney General Theodore L. Sendak warns Hoosiers of ads which promise instant earnat-home riches. "Our Consumer Protection Division and the U. S. Postal authorities receive complaints about these almost daily," he states.

The most common ads are aimed at housewives and shutins. They usually offer payment in advance for addressing and stuffing envelopes. But when you answer them, instead of you answer them. Instead of receiving, money, you often get a pamphlet offering a 'success kit' priced from \$5 to \$15. "Those who fall for this pitch either receive nothing or they

receive additional copies of that receive additional copies of that same pamphlet along with in-structions on how to work the same trick on others by start-ing a new mail order business. "Other earn-at-home ads pro-

mise big profits for making cos-tume jewelry, artificial flowers, toys or other items which the company promises to buy. The catch is that the work must meet unspecified company standards, which it seldom does, or the company can't be found when it comes time to buy the product.

"The best way to avoid being taken by these schemes is not to answer their ads. But if you do, and you feel you have been cheated, contact our Consumer Protection Division of the U.S. Postal authorities," Sendak concludes.

Local businessman has unusual hobby

You've heard of people collecting all kinds of things; keys, matchbook covers, credit cards, stamps, but-tons. But Kirk Robinson, funeral director at Sheetz Funeral Home in Akron, has a unique hobby; he collects prizes from cereal boxes. Robinson has been collecting his 337 item assortment for over seven years, though his oldest items are ten years old. He has three small button stickers of the Jackson 5 that have a copyright date of 1970, and he remembers that they came from a box of Honeycomb cereal. When he was 11, he had stuck them on a mirror in his room, but he successfully retrieved them later for his collec-

Most of the items he has haven't been opened, as he believes this

will increase their value someday. And Robinson laughingly added that he has eaten most of the cereal himself, although about 15 of the items in his collection were given to him by his brother-in-law, Brian Duzenbery.

Robinson has written to a couple of cereal companies for informa-tion. To date, neither company has heard of anyone else who collects cereal box prizes, and they have not compiled a list of what prizes they have offered over the years. Kirk probably knows better than they, because with few excep tions, he can remember which prizes came from which cereals

"They don't put as many prizes in cereal now as they used to," Robinson concluded. "Maybe in five or ten years they won't put things in at all. I think it (his collection) will be worth something





TVSC School Board Trustees hold meetings - put building plans on hold

by Diana Streevey Bucher

The Tippecanoe Valley School Board retained the services of a committee of state university placement officials to screen ap-plications for the position of superintendent. Dr. Everett Nicholson, Director of Placement at Purdue University, chairs the four-man committee. Other members man committee. Other members are Dr. John Wright of Ball State, Dr. Alex Moody of Indiana State and Dr. Dean Berkley of Indiana University.

Dr. Nicholson explained that his

committee provides the screening service for expenses only (gasoline and meals), and they can complete the process in one day. TVSC al-ready has received approximately 20 applications, and he recom-20 applications, and he recommended the board extend the deadline for applications to May 31. He anticipated the corporation would receive 40 applications for the job by that time.

The committee will meet at TVHS on June 2 for a luncheon with the School Board, and at that time they will confirm what qualifications the board members reflections the board members re-

fications the board members require in the new superintendent. In the afternoon they will screen all applications, choosing the five to seven that are most suited to the corporation's needs. Board members will probably begin interviewing these people the same week, and a choice will be made before June 30, the day present superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrell

Extensive design-development plans were presented by Chuck Posthumus and Meredith Donahoe of Daverman Associates architec-tural firm at the May 15 special meeting. Posthumus has worked with the small building advisory committees (BAC) at each of the three grade schools in the TVSC to develop the plans that were produced. With the aid of slides, Posthumus outlined specifications for the schools, including insulation plans and other energy-saving measures, basic room design, ex-terior finishes and plumbing and heating layout.

neating layout.
Donahoe said that Daverman
tentatively could have working
plans by September 30, and that
February 1981 was a realistic date
for construction to begin.

Individual specifications included razing the old Akron High School, but using some of the brick and the architectural style to finish the old gym and establishing separate entrances at Mentone for junior high and elementary stu-

One item that was added to the Akron project is a greenhouse-botany court in the center of the remodeled building. This 'art court' would be between the media center and the new gymnasium. (After the meeting, the NEWS approached Mr. Donahoe about the art court. Responding to questions, he informed us that greenhouse was included at the recommendation of the Akron BAC and that the trustees had no prior know-ledge of it's inclusion in the designdevelopment plans.) In other business:
*Mark Striebel, representative

from ProMacon, the building management firm for the project, presented their current estimate for the project. He stressed the fact that this estimate is maximum figure, and that as plans are defined costs will begin to recede. The estimates were: Burket, \$1,727, 800; Akron, \$4,028,500; and Mentone, \$4,163,000, for a total projected cost of \$9,916,300. These figures include educational and library casework, kitchen equip ment and site utilities, but it does not include legal fees, architectural or construction management fees,

EDITORIAL

Compromise: a settlement of differences by mutual concessions; an adjustment or consession between conflicting courses, ideas, desires; to adjust or settle by consessions. So says the dictionary, and I think it's time the TVSC School Board of Trustees, the professionals hired by the board, parents, teachers and patrons of the Valley system stop and consider this carefully.

At Monday's meeting of the board, the extensive work and planning for the renovation of the Valley's grade schools came to a shuddering halt. The trustees had studied the design-development program presented by the architects and construction managers on May 15, and they had had time to consider their options. Following an emotionally charged discussion, the board split their vote to put the project on "indefinite hold."

I don't think that's good enough.

In following the building project since early last November, I have watched everyone concerned demanding their positions be followed. The board members all had separate ideas on the scope the project should take; in my opinion, the architects' attitude at times bordered on haughtiness as they made their recommendations; teachers clamored for the optimum improvements and conditions for the schools; and many taxpayers of the system complained that they couldn't bear the load of a new building project. I have heard suggestions ranging from the sublime to the ridiculous; but rarely have I heard anything resembling a compromise.

We need to establish certain facts if anything positive is to be achieved. First we should accept the fact that No One is going to get Everything they want in this matter. Compromise, compromise.

Another basic fact is that the elementary schools are in deplorable condition and need major improvements. I have heard no one dispute this. We need to consider the children here, because if we're not doing this for them, what are we doing it for?

I applaud trustee Lee Norris for his approach to the situation. He has attempted to compromise by suggesting possible ways to tone down the scope of the project (to satisfy the taxpayers) while still maintaining an acceptable margin of improvement to the buildings and school program (to satisfy teachers, parents and students). He has done this in an inobtrusive, rational manner; unfortunately, no one has picked up the gauntlet he has thrown down, and we have now reached an impasse. Let us not forget we have already spent close to \$100,000 on the project; is it all for naught?

It's time to forget about politics, fame, glory or profit. It's time to seriously think about the state of the schools and our children's educations, tempering these thoughts with the knowledge that taxpayers already have a heavy burden to carry. It's time to





because of the state of the economy and because the corporation will be changing superintendents. He stated there was, "the possibility of destroying a new administrator by dropping him in on a project

Trustee Lee Norris said possibly it would be best to make the decision before the new superintendent resumes responsibility, so the per-son could avoid the controversy that would surround any decision the board makes.

He suggested providing the architect with alternate, reduced guide-lines, and he had suggestions that intes, and he had suggestions that he had worked on since last Thurs-day's meeting. He proposed they could eliminate the new gymna-sium at Akron and only add five new classrooms. They have already voted to move students from Akron to Burket, so another five classrooms would be freed, giving Akron an increase of ten class Akton an increase of ten class-rooms. He also said they could re-duce the new square footage from the proposed 35,000 sq. ft. to 27, 000 sq. ft. at Mentone. The total cost reduction for just these changes would be over \$2,500,000. and other changes could be examined to hold costs down.

Meredith Donahoe said the board should remember Daverman Asso-ciates had developed the plans with the BACs and using state require-ments as guidelines. He read the minimum state requirements, but it was pointed out that state requirements could be waived slightly if there were existing build-

ings.

Vern Meredith moved to put the total project on hold indefinately, and the vote was Norris and Don Snipes, no, Meredith, Everett Bes-son and Con Shewman, yes.

Meredith then said he felt all contracts concerning the building project should be cancelled. Norris stated there wasn't must to be gain-ed by cancelling the contracts, as they would then be forced to start from scratch if and when they decide to pick it up again. After much discussion, they voted to direct the architects to wait for further instructions, with Meredith and Besson dissenting.







Plans to build apartments and paint the city water towar were studied May 20 at the monthly meeting of the Akron Town Board, and Joe Boswell inquired regarding availability of town sewage services for his home

President Ron Fenimore presided over the meeting at the Akron town office. Town Clerk Ernest Smith and Board member Vernon

Waymire were present.

Jo Ann and Ned Schuler, R. 2, North Manchester, reported on the garden apartments they will build on a two-acre plot northwest of the Akron Park, between

Sixteen unit modular garden apartments will be available to all age groups, beginning next year or sooner. The Schulers are conducting a renting survey to determine the needs of the community Mr. and Mrs. Schuler invited the

Akron board members to drive around the proposed site in the near future.

Norman Noe of the Leary Construction Company, Greenfield, Indiana advised the town board regarding maintenance of the Akron water tower. Noe said the company has been in business for forty-four years. They have paint-ed water towers in Rochester, Roann, Mentone, Silver Lake and

Etna Green. In the event of an emergency, Noe said the company's repair crew could be in Akron within three hours. He said the inside of the water tower is ten times as important as the outside, and should be painted this year to keep the tower in good condition. Ac-cording to Noe, the exterior of the tower should be painted every ten years, and the inside should be painted every five years

Akron's tower was painted on the inside in 1974 by another firm. After work began, the contractor discovered what he termed "additional needed repairs"

to \$7500. The current board members explained to Noe that they don't want to be caught in that kind of situation this time. Noe assured the board that Leary Con-struction Company does not operate in such a manner, and there would be no hidden costs if they received the contract to paint

Akron's water tower. Leary's bid is \$5295.00 to paint both the exterior and interior, and \$3,450.00 to paint the interior of the tower. Their work carries a three year guarantee.

Noe suggests the interior of the tower be painted around Labor Day. The work would require two to three days. Painting the exterior of the tower would require five to seven days. Sway rods would be painted also.

The Board signed a contract to paint the interior and next fall they will make a decision about painting the exterior of the water

Joe Boswell advised the board that he may want to solve his sewage problem by hooking on to the town sewer line. He was told that costs would have to be negotiated, but he would be able to re ceive benefit of the town sewage system for a reasonable fee.

The next board meeting is sched-uled for June 24, at the Akron town office.

There was one public indecency law that anyone over 14 who made an indecent exposure of his person in a public place or used or uttered any obscene or licentious language in the presence or hearing of any fe-male, was guilty of public indecency. The fine: not less than \$15 nor more than \$100, and possibly up to six months in jail. We could put away 9/10th of the population with that one.

There were two ordinances pertaining to Sabbath break. ing that I particularly liked also. The first stated that who ever was found on Sunday rioting, hunting, fishing, quarreling, at common labor or engaged in their usual avocation (except travelers, keepers of toll gates, ferrymen or news-persons) would be fined not more than \$10. It was also a misdemeanor to watch or play baseball, football or any other game where a fee is charged or profits gained on Sunday. I think I'll head the drive to reinstate this law, and maybe I'll see 3ill on Sundays again.

One other code that really caught my imagination concerned a traffic law. Anyone operating a motor vehicle had to have a suitable bell, horn or other signal and had to, upon approaching anyone, signal with horn or bell. I have met a lot of drivers on the road that I would love to shake a bell at and I'll bet you have too!
