Wind storm causes local property damage

High winds which began picking up at about 10 p.m. Sunday evening and continued throughout Monday, nipped through the area leaving heavy property damage in their wake. The winds, which occasionally gusted up to 55 mph., caused power outages in many sections of Fulton and Kosciusko counties and resulted in the closing

of Tippecanoe Valley High School and Burket Elementary on Monday. Akron and Mentone Schools began one hour late.

Property damage reports began trickling in late Sunday evening and continued Monday, according to Akron Marshal Dave Kruger and Mentone Marshal Russ Hart, but no personal injuries were reported.

The Gene Hughes' home, Mentone, perhaps suffered the worst damage locally when a blast of wind literally lifted its roof, trusses and all, and deposited it in their back yard at 8 a.m. Monday. The family of five was together in the living room when the damage occurred, and no one was injured.

The Dave Bussard residence and

the home of Linda Rager, Akron, were also damaged when trees fell on their homes, but rapid response by local crews kept damage

to a minimum. Several streets in both Akron and Mentone were also temporarily blocked by fallen trees, limbs and branches.

Valley band makes final preparations for Shenandoah Apple Blossom Fest

The company, located on SR19 N. just south of town, handles a custom paint line, including coat liquid paints, vinyls, epoxy and polyester.



Is It Wrong To Cry?

When a friend or loved one dies, it is only natural for your emotions to give way to grief - and for you to cry.

At the realization that the love one is gone, tears may come easily for both adult and child - and this is good! Children may even be encouraged to let out their feelings of grief by crying.

Most do not need extra encouragement since it is so natural to weep in sorrow. It is not unmasculine to cry at the death of a loved one or a dear friend. It's a misconception that "big boys shouldn't cry." This is all a part of the early 20th Century training in the old school of the "stiff upper lip" and "grin and bear it." If there is an emotional hurt, then the pain should be recognized, acknowledged, and expressed - in this case, through tears.

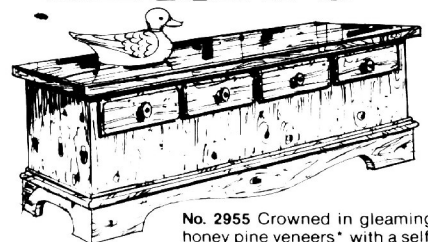





FCHS receives grant

The Fulton County Historical Society has been awarded a "Meet the Composer" grant from the Great Lakes Arts Alliance, Cleveland, Ohio.

The grant is for \$150 to be paid to a composer to perform and be available to meet the public informally, perhaps over a cup of coffee.

The composer FCHS applied for is George Schricker, Plymouth, who will perform his songs of Potawatomi history at the Trail of Courage Rendezvous Sept. 15 - 16.

Schricker has made a special study of the Potawatomi Indians in northern Indiana before the Trail of Death removal in 1838. His songs include "Aubbeenaubbee," "Menominee," and "Father Pettit the Blackrobe," which tell the story of these men and the part they had in local history. Another song he wrote about the Potawatomi is "The Game of Wink" which describes a game the Indians enjoyed and bet on.

After singing his songs in the arena at the Trail of Courage, Schricker will be found at the Indian taco booth where the public can sit at a picnic table and meet the composer.

This program is made possible in part through a grant from Meet The Composer with support from Great Lakes Arts Alliance, National Endowment for the Arts, AT&T, ASCAP, Avon Products Foundation, Bristol-Myers Company, BMI, Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, Exxon Corporation, Ford Foundation, Fromm Music Foundation, Paul Foundation, Helena Rubinstein Foundation, and Warner Communications.

The Trail of Courage Rendezvous is a living-history festival held annually in Kern's pine woods three miles north of Rochester on the corner of the Tippecanoe River and New U.S. 31. It features muzzleloading shooting contests, Indiana and pioneer dances, period music, canoe landing and fur trading skit, frontier fashion show, pre-1840 crafts and foods.

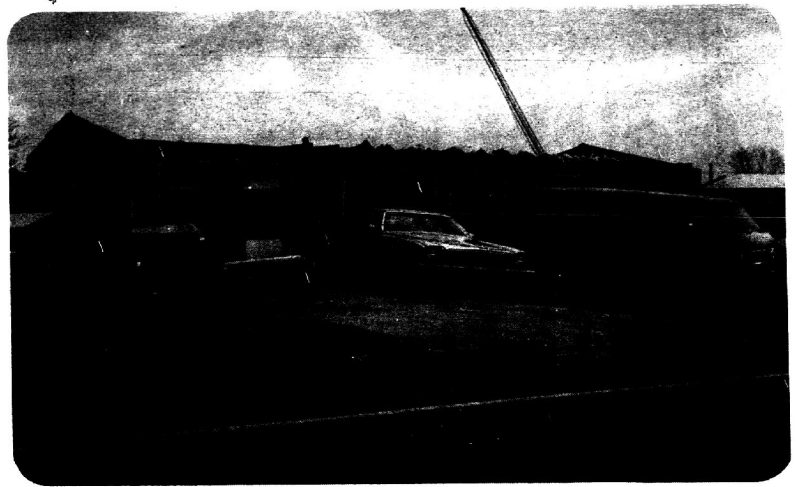

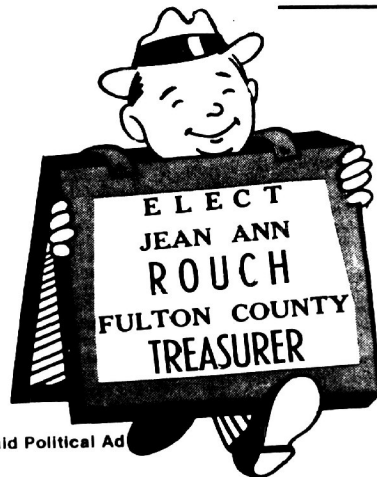

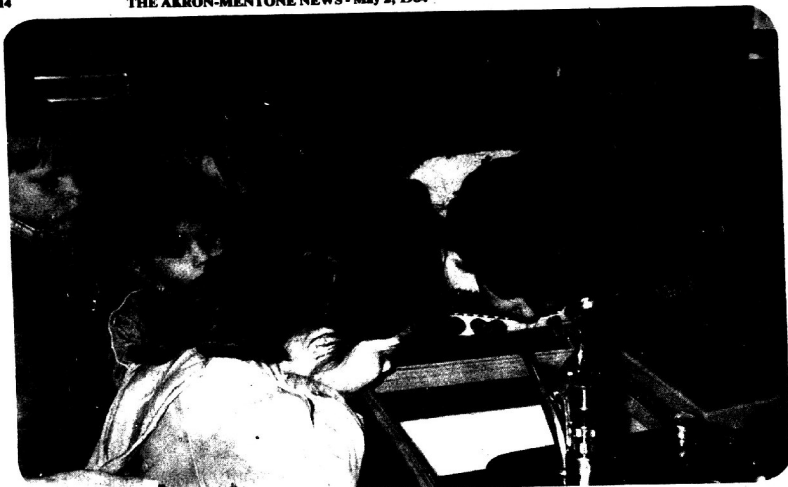

quois constitution.

Her son, Rex, read the Indian version of the 23rd Psalm. Several other Miamis accompanied her: Ray White, Louise Hay, and Shirley Biddle.

The Miami Indians are the only tribe recognized by the state of Indiana, having been recognized in 1937 and again in 1980 by resolution by the state legislature. They

are working to become recognized by the federal government.

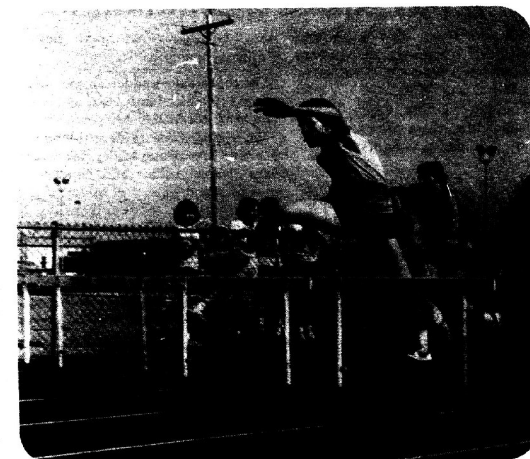

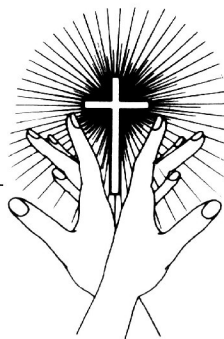

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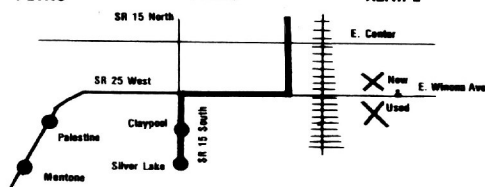

Board firms water-billing policy

Citizens attend meeting after dog attacks

Half a dozen citizens from the northeast part of Mentone attended the regular monthly meeting of the town board last Monday, May 7 to request something be done about a dog that attacked two people on Sunday morning.

At 10 a.m. on May 6, Patricia McIntire, Elkhart, was attacked and bitten on the leg by a dog who'd broken its chain. McIntire was visiting her mother, Pauline Starr, Mentone, at the time of the incident. During the commotion immediately following, the dog bit Keith Cornet, son of Carol Cornet, who was walking by Starr's home.

The six citizens who attended the meeting asked if new ordinance 249 concerning unrestrained animals hadn't been violated. Marshal Russ Hart, although sympathetic to their situation, replied the ordinance

didn't cover the situation. The dog's owners, he explained, had complied with the ordinance by chaining up the animal, even though the chain had broken. He pointed out the two people who were bitten could bring charges against the dog's owners, however, and he advised the neighbors that any other complaints would have to go through the county prosecutor's office.

Mr. and Mrs. Everett Long brought a complaint about their water bill to board members. Although they'd spent the last six months in their Florida winter home, they'd received two quarterly billings for the minimum billing amount. (Minimum quarterly amount is \$25.07.)

Board president Jim Miller pointed out that any water used

during any part of the quarters would entitle the town to payment, but the Longs insisted they'd completely missed two entire quarters.

Clerk treasurer Kate Whetstone explained that a representative of State Board of Accounts had advised her that whenever a water meter is in place during a billing period, the minimum charge should be billed whether any water is used or not. Miller added that the Longs and all residents had the option of having their meters removed before they left for the winter and then paying a \$10 re-installment fee upon their return.

Although trustees Miriam Boardman and Wayne Tombaugh were reluctant to set a precedent by excusing the Longs from paying the

entire bill, Miller felt they shouldn't be penalized because they were unaware of the option of having the meter removed.

"Maybe the board failed to make people understand the policy of the town under the new system," he stated. "If that's the case, they (the Longs) shouldn't have to pay."

Boardman said she wouldn't oppose Miller's thoughts as she wasn't one of the board members who'd initiated the present policy, but she insisted the policy be defined and that no exceptions be made in the future. (See related notice below.) Board members finally agreed to waive one billing for the Longs and credit them \$15 on another billing so they'll end up paying only the \$10 they would have paid for meter re-installation.

Resident Jay Secrist attended the meeting on behalf of himself and his neighbor Mary Borders. He brought with him clothing of Borders that had been ruined by rust in her water.

Rust in Mentone's waterlines has long been a problem, but Superintendent Rod Holloway pointed out that the fact Secrist and Borders are at the end of a waterline contributes to the severity of their problem. Trustees instructed Holloway to flush the hydrant on that line weekly for the next few weeks to see if it helps the situation.

Secrist also reported a possible broken waterline near his home, and Holloway assured he'd check into the matter.

Miller reported to the trustees that the Summer Youth Employment Program (SPEDY) will be available this summer. The local program, supported and promoted by the Cardinal Center, Warsaw, is open to economically disadvantaged youth which offers work experience and educational programs while earning minimum wages of \$3.35 an hour.

The board agreed to check into the possibility of hiring one or two SPEDY employees during the summer.

Marshal Hart turned in his April report. It included a log of 2734 miles patrolled, and 22 calls. The department handled two dog complaints, two accidents, one public assists, one power outage, two gun permits, one runaway and four information calls. Eleven traffic citations were issued and there was one felony arrest.

The cemetery board released an updated list of regulations to the trustees. (See list on page 10.)

The next meeting of the board will be held on Monday, June 4 at 7 p.m. in the town offices.

In the future, residents of Mentone who are leaving the area for an extended period of time must make arrangements as to how their water billing will be handled.

If a water meter is in place during any portion of a quarterly billing period (Nov., Dec., Jan., Feb., March, April, May, June, July, or Aug., Sept., Oct.), the resident will be billed the minimum fee or \$25.07, regardless of how little water is used. If the resident will be away for one or more quarterly billing periods, it is their option and responsibility to decide if they'd like their water meter removed from their property. Upon their return, a \$10 fee will be charged to install a new meter.

The Dandelion: Friend or Foe?

Drive by an open field on a Sunday afternoon in springtime and you are likely to see people of all ages on hands and knees gathering dandelions. Drive by the front lawns of homes in suburbs and you are likely to see a similar sight but the objectives are not the same. To most home owners, the dandelion is an enemy while to the gatherers in the field, the dandelion is a friend.

The loyal followers of the dandelion date back to the 17th century. It was valued then as an important ingredient in many ointments, salves and tonics and recommended as cures for every kind of illness from gallstones to dropsy. In early America the Pilgrims and Indians depended on "greens and grasses" to keep them alive when other foods were not to be had. While the medicinal value of the dandelion is no longer honored, dandelions are appreciated for their tart but not unpleasant taste. Young dandelion greens add something extra to salads and they can be boiled to make a spinach-like vegetable.

All of the wonderful versatility of dandelion means little if you are striving towards raising the greenest, most plush lawn on the block, but getting down on hands and knees to dig out dandelion is not the answer. Because dandelions develop deep taproots it is virtually impossible to get rid of them either by pulling or digging. Even if you cut a root with a knife far below the dandelion crown, you still will not eliminate the weed. As a matter of fact, a circle of new sprouts will grow from the root, producing plants which will be as vigorous as the old.

MENTONE CEMETERY REGULATIONS

Burials

An outer container is required for burial and the cost of this container is to be paid by the persons involved with the burial, such as relatives, the estate of the deceased, or the funeral director, and will not be paid by the cemetery. The outer container can be either a vault or grave liner with solid sides and top and made of concrete, steel, fiberglass, copper, stainless steel, or approved plastic.

Exceptions to above rule

1. A casket-vault combination may be used if approved first by a representative of the Cemetery Board.
2. Infants. Many casket-vault combinations may be used if comparable in quality to those manufactured by Wilburt Co. or McCord Co. No styrofoam units may be used as an outer enclosure.
3. If for religious reasons a rough box made of wood is used as the outer enclosure, a maintenance fee of \$200 must be paid on or before the day of burial.

Foundations for monuments

1. Made only of concrete with a minimum of 4 in. margin on all sides of stone and minimum of 18 in. depth.
2. The hole for the foundation must have straight sides and a flat bottom; no rounded corners.
3. Landscaping must be done to allow the wheel of a lawn mower to run across the foundation, which is to be no higher than 1 inch above ground.
4. The sexton must be contacted before a foundation may be installed.

Plantings, Flowers, and Shrubbery

1. All flowers must be placed within the line of the headstones.
2. Before planting all shrubbery and plantings must be approved by the Cemetery Board.
3. All shrubbery shall be maintained or will be removed at the owners expense.

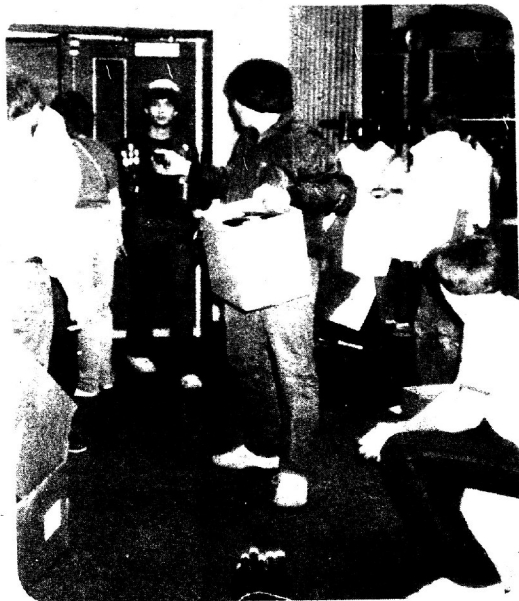

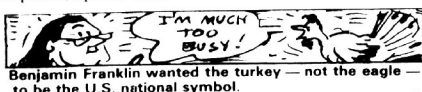
Language students take field trips

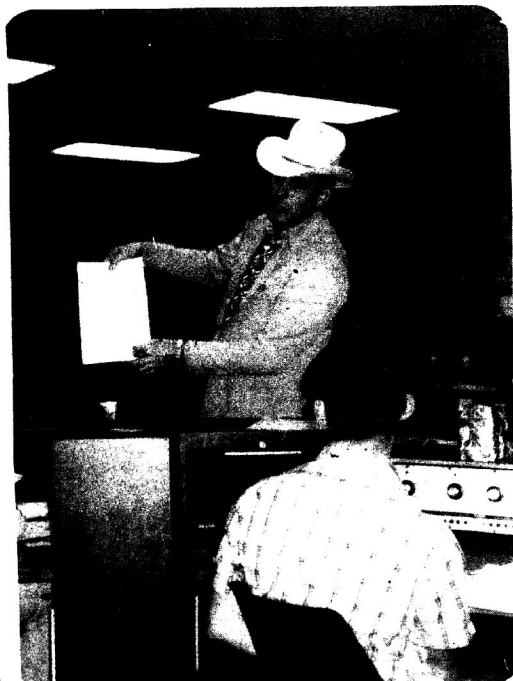

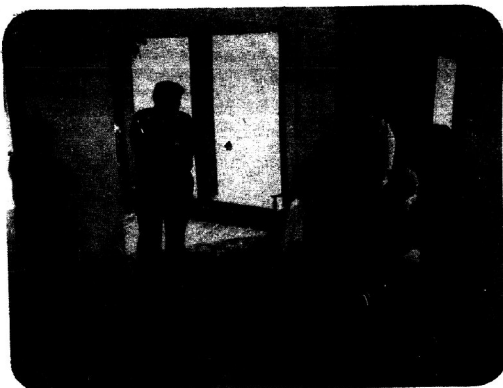

Despite the fact that the current members of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation board are beginning to tentatively consider expansion/remodeling and building plans, incumbents Fred McSherry and Richard Long won easy victories over their challengers Lewis Goodwin and Linda Oden.

In District 1, Long, Rt. 1, Etna Green, defeated Oden, Mentone, by a total of 1389 votes to 526. In Kosciusko county, Long garnered 883 votes as opposed to 273 for Oden, and in Fulton county he took 506 votes to 253 cast for Oden.

In McSherry's first win at the polls (he was appointed to fill the

unexpired term of Vernon Meredith in 1982), he collected a total of 1242 votes against Goodwin's 675 votes. McSherry won 826 votes in Kosciusko county and 416 votes in Fulton county, against Goodwin's 341 and 334 votes, respectively.

During the last hotly-contested election for the Valley school board, Cecil Miller, Jim Royer and William Rogers were elected on a platform to slow down the then-current plans for extensive building and remodeling of the elementary and middle schools. Since then, Rogers has also resigned and was replaced by appointee Joseph Crill.

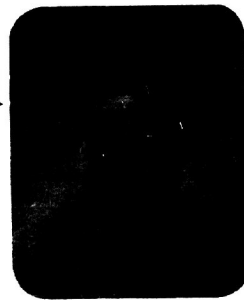

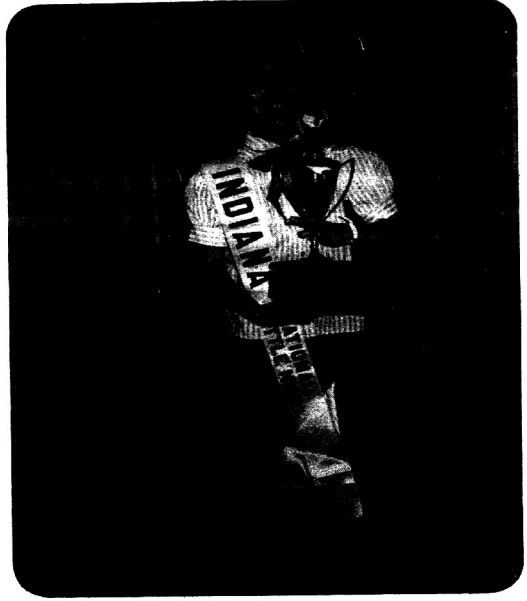

State Police

The Indiana State Police at the Peru District have announced the following end of the month report for the month of April, 1984 on their activities in Fulton County.

County troopers spent 817 patrol and criminal hours; 12,630 miles patrolled; investigated 7 accidents; made 104 arrests; issued 127 warnings; 3 driving while intoxicated charges; made 9 interrogation reports; and assisted 76 motorists.

One person has been fatally injured in rural accidents in Fulton County during the four months of 1984, as compared to zero persons during this same period of 1983. Urban accidents have accounted for zero fatalities, compared to zero persons for the same period of 1983. For the six county district, six persons have lost their lives in traffic accidents as compared to seventeen persons this same period last year. This is a decrease of eleven lives.

Farm produce guide ready for spring distribution

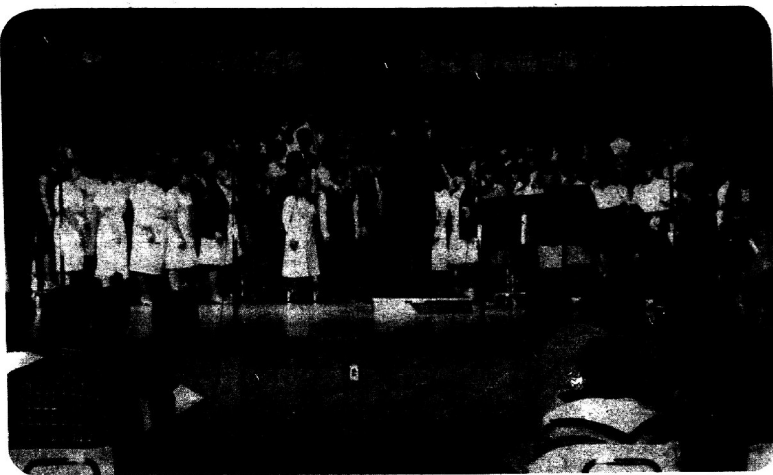

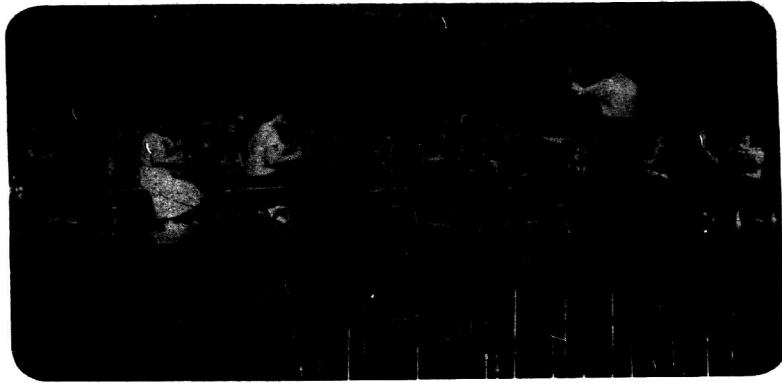

The Rochester Heymakers will present a program of historic music and dance at Riddle School May 18 at 7:30 p.m. This is the program the group will take to Rochester, England, and perform in the Dickens Festival. The public is invited.

The Heymakers is composed of over 20 members but only 17 are going to England. Those going to England include the director - Jean Sandos, Lori and Shaunn Lybarger, Shirley and Bill Willard, Tammy Pfeiffer, Patsy Clark, Linda Sawyer, John Reed, Catherine and Lou Hanert, Charles Rathburn, Clifford Wamego, Tulsa, Oklahoma; Shannon Drake (cousin to the Lybargers), Decatur, Ind. Each person paid for his own airfare.

Members of the Heymakers will stay in private homes as guests of the British, the same way local persons housed the British visitors in 1978 and 1981, when the Western Saddle Club from Rochester, England, came to perform in the Round Barn Festival.

Founded in 1983, the Rochester Heymakers first performed in the Round Barn Festival last year. With the Fulton County Historical Society acting as fiscal agent, the Heymakers applied for a grant from the Indiana Arts Commission and received a grant for \$1,250. This is matching funds and must be matched dollar for dollar in

the local community. These monies are for costumes, musicians, printing, etc. and are to enable the Heymakers to become a permanent performing group to preserve historic dance and music of Indiana.

To earn money to match the grant, the Heymakers have been giving programs for local groups for a donation. They have performed for the First Christian Church chili supper, Home Circle Club, Manitou Shriners, Rebekahs, Green Oak Club, Plymouth Library, Busy Belles, and Lutheran Arms for mother-daughter banquet. They will perform for the Kiwanis May 23.

The program to be given Friday night will be different from that given to local clubs. This program will be the one the Heymakers will perform in Rochester, England. The script was researched and written by Leanna Krick, Rochester, and tells what Charles Dickens would have seen when he came to America in 1842, when he travelled by steamboat on the Ohio River to St. Louis. While there is no record of Dickens coming to Indiana, he surely must have met some Hoosiers and this is an imaginary skit in which he meets a party of travelers from Fulton County who dance on the steamboat "Fulton."

Dickens heard and wrote about

the Indian removals, so the skit includes the Trail of Death removal of the Potawatomi. Bill Wamego, a Potawatomi Indian whose ancestors were on the Trail of Death will be with the group and will recite Chief Menominee's speech to the treaty council in which he refused to sign the treaty and sell his land. George Schricker, composer and songwriter, will sing his songs about Menominee and Father Petit, the priest who accompanied the Potawatomi on the Trail of Death in 1838.

Jimmy Hodge, editor of the Chatham, Rochester and Gillingham News, England, has published several articles about the coming visit of the Heymakers and Bill "the Red Indian." Hodge was instrumental in arranging the first visit between citizens of Rochester, England, and Rochester, Indiana. He suggested that Rochester, Indiana, organize a group and come to perform in the Dickens Festival. The local group was organized in response to his invitation.

The group will leave here May 29 and arrive in London May 30 at 7:30 a.m. They will be met by a coach company from Rochester, England, which will provide them free transportation from London to Rochester, a three-hour ride. The Mayor of Rochester and a delegation will welcome them when they arrive at the Guild Hall in Rochester.

The Rochester Heymakers will perform once each day at the Dickens Festival, performing at the Castle Gardens at 11 a.m. May 31 - June 2. Their program is about 40 minutes long.

The public is invited to see this same program May 18. A free-will offering will be collected to help the group match the funds from the Indiana Arts Commission.

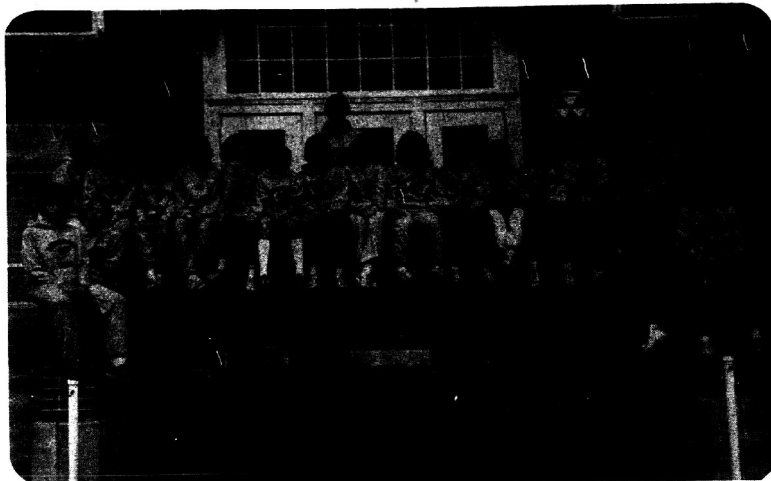

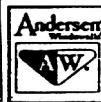

Do not force the child to attend, though. If the youngster often tends to be hysterical, keep him home and have him join the family later. Each child may react differently, but if you anticipate any problems, feel free to discuss this with us fully at your convenience.

Woodlawn plans expansion

Woodlawn Hospital is taking the first step toward what it hopes to be major building addition which would expand this 49-bed facility to a 70-bed hospital.

Representatives of URS Company of Kansas City, Missouri, an architecture, engineering, and planning organization, will be visiting Woodlawn May 23 to aid hospital officials in developing the application for expansion which must be approved by the Indiana State Board of Health.

According to Robert Kelsey, Executive Director of Woodlawn Hospital, the hospital's preliminary intent is to add 21 private patient rooms on the east wing of the hospital by adding a third floor to that wing. Other needs being studied are a proposed expansion of the intensive care area, the establishment of a pediatric unit, and the possible development of a minimal care unit.

"Our original hospital design was for a 75-bed facility, but state health planning officials, looking backward over the census figures of the old Woodlawn, would not approve additional bed beyond 49. That was one of the reasons for designing all private rooms, so that each of our 49 beds could be utilized at all times.

"Over the five years we have occupied the new Woodlawn, our patient census has been increasing -- we are simply treating more patients and are in need of more space. The addition of Drs. Grant and Musselman to our medical staff has increased admissions, and we would expect continued growth

of our medical staff because of our fine facility."

Kelsey further observed, "Health planning guidelines suggest a community needs 4 hospital beds per 1,000 population. Indiana University School of Business projections estimate our county population at 20,200 in 1985. According to that theory, that's an 80-bed hospital needed to serve this community."

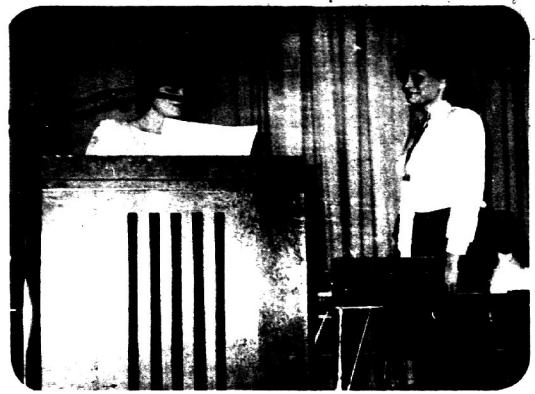
The URS Company is the same architectural firm that designed the existing hospital. "I believe most everyone in the community will want to see the existing successful design duplicated and the exterior matched in any additional construction," states Kelsey. "Also, this helps us capitalize on their design work and minimize our costs."

Woodlawn Hospital was designed for potential growth with a foundation laid to accommodate a third floor. Ancillary services -- lab, X-ray, emergency -- were all sized for a 100-bed hospital.

"A hospital addition involves three major steps -- planning, design, and financing," Kelsey comments. "In the important area of financing, we are pleased to note that the hospital has ample funds in its depreciation fund to afford this expansion with no additional expense to taxpayers, no loans, and no bonds. Furthermore, we see our possible expansion as a benefit to the community in terms of employment. Currently Woodlawn employs 217 people. That's an infusion of nearly \$3 million in wages alone into our Fulton County economy."

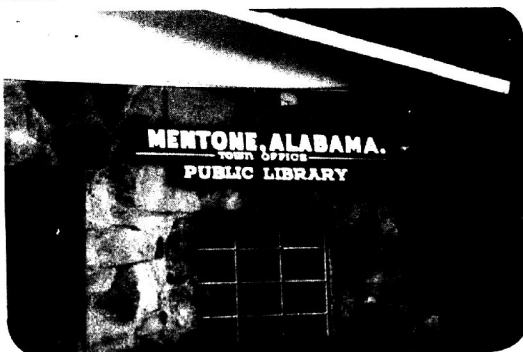

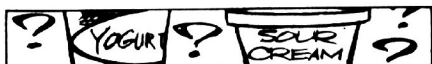

Signs summer school contracts

TV board okays temporary loan

Members of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation board met in a short session on Monday, May 21 and unanimously agreed to take another temporary loan, this time for \$684,000.

Board members Richard Long, Fred McSherry, Cecil Miller, Jim Royer and Joe Crill agreed to borrow a total of \$460,000 for the general fund, \$153,000 for the debt service fund and \$71,000 for the transportation fund. The loan, which will be accepted by bid at an interest rate of not more than ten percent per annum, will be payable on December 1, 1984, after the school receives its 1984 fall tax allotment.

Akron board to accept insurance bids

Members of the Akron town board met in special session last Tuesday, May 22 to consider a new insurance plan for the town. Trustees Jack Miller, Dick Drudge and Jerry Hudson listened to proposals from local agents Norman Tinkey, of Tinkey Insurance, Dennis Helvey, Insurance I, and Wilkie Parrish, a field man for Insurance I.

Currently, most of the town's properties are on separate policies, with some items not insured at all. The agents requested specific information on all town property. After this information was provided, trustees scheduled another special meeting for tomorrow (Thursday), May 31 to accept their

final bids.

Board members voted to purchase a new pump for the well at the lagoon. Paul Cox, well contractor, advised trustees it would be as costly to repair the old pump as to buy a new one, and he recommended a submerged pump be purchased and installed to prevent freezing in the winter.

In other business: Employees were presented with a personnel policy code on which board members have been working, and discussion was held with employees. A manual will be printed after minor changes are made and the policy will be adopted at the June meeting.

Marshal Dave Kruger requested to have a bicycle auction and the

board agreed he could, although no date was set.

Marshal Kruger and deputy Jim Spangle were instructed to follow-up on a complaint by residents who said their neighbors were piling trash in their back yard instead of properly disposing of it.

President Miller and trustees discussed several complaints they'd received concerning the attitude of the town marshals when arrests are made. Kruger and Spangle were given the opportunity to reply to the complaints.

A special meeting to accept the insurance bids will be held tomorrow, and the next regular meeting will be held on Tuesday, June 19 at 7 p.m. in the town offices.

American youth grade education

Students in today's secondary schools believe that their teachers are competent, think that math and English are the most important classes, give their schools a grade of B, and feel that drugs are today's worst influence on young adults.

Those were some of the findings released recently in *The Mood of American Youth*, a national survey sponsored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP).

"This survey, which includes the opinions of 1,500 students in grades seven through 12, is one of the few sources of information about the attitudes of young people available during this year when just about everyone else has expressed an opinion about education," said Terrence J. Giroux, director of NASSP's Division of Student Activities.

Administered by National Family Opinion, the poll tested student beliefs on parents, their futures, music, and national and international problems in addition to education.

"Amid an intensifying national debate about the quality of education in the United States, students themselves appear relatively satisfied with their schools," said

Janis Cromer, author of *The Mood of American Youth*. "Based on a scale of four points, with a rating of 3.5 to 4.0 equal to an A, the overall average grade students gave their school was 2.95—a solid B."

Seventy percent of the respondents reported that their teachers are competent, and 80 percent indicated that the teachers are up-to-date in their area of expertise. The key quality of the best teachers is that they "explain things clearly," according to the survey. Students also ranked teachers highly for taking time to help students, and having a sense of humor.

The best way to improve courses was to have "More discussion" in class, according to the students, and the number one reason they like school was that it gave them a chance to be with their friends. Other reasons for liking school, in order, were sports, learning, social activities, teachers, classes and co-curricular activities.

Students in *The Mood of American Youth* confirmed reports by the National Commission on Excellence that little homework is required of students, according to Cromer.

"Sixty percent of the students indicated that they spend eight

hours or less per week studying or doing school work," she said. "Those students making A's reported that they spend 10 hours per week, while those making D's spend less than 4 hours per week. Apparently, the amount of time students devote to studying at home relates directly to their success."

The four most important courses to these students are math, English, computer science and driver's education. Science finished fifth and foreign languages 13th on a list of 18 courses.

The Mood of American Youth also looked at student attitudes in areas outside of education.

Students today respect their parents, according to Cromer.

"Students were asked to indicate the amount of respect they have for their parents on a five-point scale with five being highest," she commented. "Mothers received a 4.3 rating, and fathers were given a 4.2."

Mothers are by far the most likely parent to whom students will bring problems. About 73 percent of the students reported they could discuss problems with their mothers; 35.6 percent said they could discuss them with their fathers."

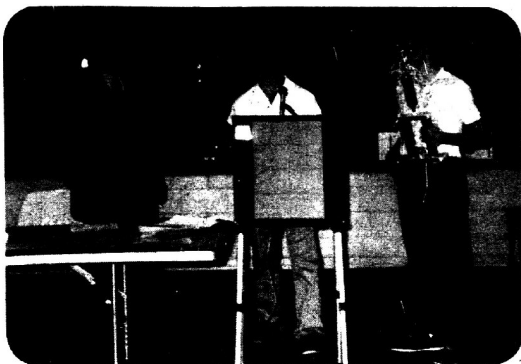

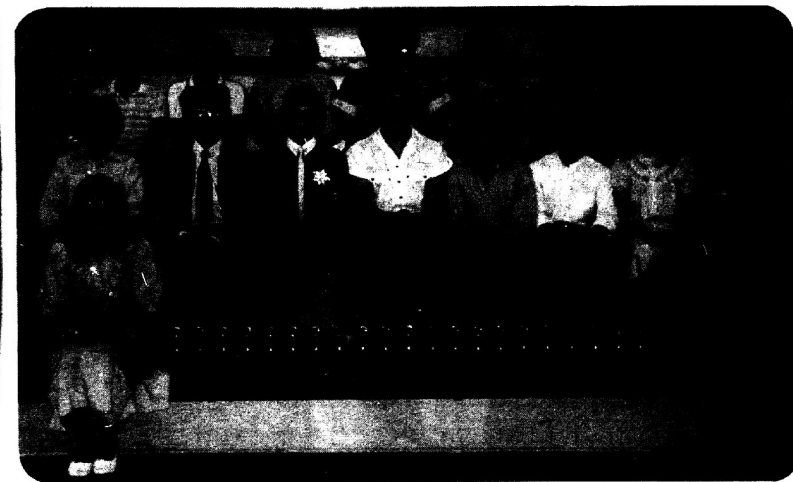
