Students create newspaper; reap rewards

The students of Mentone, Akron, and Burket Elementary in the Gifted and Talented program were involved in creating their own newspaper using computer word processing skills and graphic programs. The unit involved setting up each class as a newspaper office. Each student had to write their own creative story for the newspaper, conduct an interview, and write articles for other sections of the newspaper. Each class chose the name for their newspaper along with the various sections they wanted to include to complete their newspaper. Students were paid token money according to the quality and amount of work they put into the unit. When the newspaper was complete, they took the money they had earned and spent it at an auction. The LAMP program is in

its second year at the Tippecanoe Valley School and is taught by Risa Young. It is a pull-out enrichment program. Each of the students

are pulled out of class for three hours a week for enrichment activities. LAMP stands for Learning Accelerated Motivational Program.

Board hires architect

The Tippecanoe Valley school board met in special session on Thursday, to discuss the hiring of an architect to do work on the high school roof. The Odle-Burke architectural firm of Indianapolis has been hired for the job.

Other firms considered for the project were Fanning-Howie of Michigan City; E.I. Brown of Indianapolis; Martin-Riley of Fort Wayne. Fanning-Howie is the current architectural firm working on the new buildings and remodeling projects at the elementary schools.

Fanning-Howie was not awarded the bid because of the time factor involved. The school board hopes to have a new roof put on the high school this summer, and with the other large projects Fanning-Howie is involved with, the board felt the need to go to a different firm.

Town meetings in Washington

Fifth District Congressman Jim Jontz, is holding several "town meetings in Washington" in the upcoming weeks.

Actually, Jontz is available to talk with constituents this month by way of phone. Jontz, who is in his Washington D.C. office, plans to talk with callers from 6-8 p.m. on May 12 and 19. The program actually began on May 5.

People can call toll-free, 1-800-544-1474, to speak with Jontz. The number is directed to his Kokomo office, which then relays the message to Jontz who then returns the call, according to press aides.

The phone calls are expected to provide a more personal means of communication, compared to regular town hall meetings where some people may be too shy to discuss matters in public, an aide remarked.

Victory for future means higher taxes

Calling it "a victory for our people of the future", the Indiana General Assembly approved a \$460 million package of new educational spending and tax increases.

The House voted 74-26 and the Senate 31-18 in favor of the bill, which would boost individual income taxes to 3.4 percent from 3 percent.

The measure includes many of the recommendations Orr made in his 31-point, \$306 million "A-Plus Program for Indiana Educational Excellence."

Among the Orr-suggested proposals included in the bill are:

*Expanded statewide proficiency testing and required remediation in English and mathematics for up to 16 percent of students who do not meet state standards.

*A new school accreditation system that takes into account student performance on the standardized proficiency test, graduation rates and other factors.

*A \$10 million rewards system, started in 1988-89, to give financial awards to schools that show improvement.

*A five-day addition to the school year, beginning in 1988-89. Orr had originally asked for 10 extra days added to the current state minimum of 175 days of

school.

*Makeup of school days lost because of snow or other factors.

Rep. B. Patrick Bauer, D-South Bend, said Democrats also played a role in fashioning the bill.

Democratic initiatives in the bill include:

*\$20 million for programs for students considered at risk of failing academically because of socio-economic factors.

*Higher state reimbursement for schools that participate in Project Primetime, which is designed to reduce class sizes in the lower grades.

*\$6 million a year to pay for textbooks for poor students.

The bill will also guarantee every school corporation about 6.5 percent a year in additional tuition support from the state. That figure includes the cost of the five extra school days, which will be paid for 100 percent with state funding.

The total price tag for the bill tops \$4 billion.

At the close of the Indiana General Assembly, Gov. Robert D. Orr signed the following new laws:

House Bill 1010: This measure deals with the tracking of a number of communicable and dangerous

diseases. It institutes procedures to monitor and record cases of AIDS in Indiana. The measure would also encourage the development of preventive procedures for these diseases. The law is effective September 1.

House Bill 1012: This law, effective September 1, requires the Department on Aging and Community Services to develop training programs for people who care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or senile dementia.



Motorcycle skills tests scheduled

Bureau of Motor Vehicles Commissioner Michael M. Packard announced that motorcycle skills testing began statewide on May 2, 1987. The skills test, a requirement in the licensing process of motorcycle operators, will be offered in 39 locations on alternating Saturdays between May and October.

Motorcyclists wishing to obtain the required motorcycle endorsement must apply for a motorcycle learner's permit at their local license branch and hold it for 30 days. During that 30 days and until the actual motorcycle endorsement is obtained, the operator must adhere to the following restrictions:

1. The motorcycle may be operated during daylight hours only.
 2. A helmet must be worn at all times.
 3. The rider may carry no passengers.
- Even if an operator has passed the skills test, these restrictions apply until the endorsement is placed on his driver's license at the license branch.

Commissioner Packard stated, "The Bureau of Motor Vehicles has received

numerous telephone calls requesting the specific date when skills testing will begin. May 2nd began the fifth session of tests conducted on outdoor obstacle courses. I recommend to individuals who are anxious to take the skills test to obtain their motorcycle learner's permit as soon as possible. Motorcycle endorsements may only be issued after the permit has been held a minimum of 30 days."



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

Valley won the junior varsity match 197-229. Craven Lynn led Valley with a 43.



DRUG QUIZ

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Nearly 12% of high school students are reported to take "uppers" and 6% take "downers" probably because they are generally affordable and accessible. How about other drugs?

QUESTION: How many 14-18 year olds use drugs such as LSD and PCP at least once a week?

ANSWER: LSD and PCP are classified as hallucinogens by the Drug Enforcement Administration. Both produce distinctive chemical "highs." LSD is odorless, colorless, tasteless, and touted as the most powerful drug known (ounce for ounce). It is produced as a liquid and a crystalline solid. LSD produces symptoms which mimic some psychoses (such as schizophrenia). PCP is one of the most unpredictable drugs, producing bizarre behavior and often intensifying psychotic tendencies of the user. It is produced as a white crystalline powder. Both LSD and PCP are mind-altering drugs and should be avoided.

Life styles and learning

This past summer, several teachers from Akron participated in a week-long seminar on Learning Styles. Learning styles theory says there are 18 elements that affect a student's learning and their studies have shown that teachers can be more effective if they accommodate the student's individual needs as much as possible. Some of the needs or elements that affect a student's learning include sound, light, temperature, structure, working alone or in a group, intake, and room design.

To begin, the students must fill out a questionnaire called the Learning Styles Inventory to determine their individual needs. These inventories are then processed and returned with a detailed account of what type of learning style each child has.

Once a teacher has this information, he/she can begin to accommodate his students by teaching in the way they learn the best. A few of the teachers at Akron have incorporated these

elements in their own classrooms and found the technique to be very successful.

One teacher has used room design with much success in her classroom. Some students work best alone in corners, others in a group at a table, and some in a pair. It has helped her students to be more task-oriented and lessens many discipline problems.

All in all, it seems that both teachers and students are enjoying the benefits of Learning Styles.

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

current Indiana law, a teen-aged girl can get married without the knowledge of her parents if she is pregnant and petitions a court for permission. Under the new law, parents would be notified prior to a court hearing that their 15 or 16-year-old daughter is going to court to get married after becoming pregnant. The law is also effective September 1.

House Bill 1007: This statute restricts smoking in any building in which state or local governments hold office space. Superintendents of such buildings are required to designate non-smoking areas, but they may establish smoking areas if they want. Persons caught smoking a cigarette, pipe or cigar in a non-smoking area commits a Class C infraction which carries a maximum \$500 fine. The law goes into effect September 1.

House Bill 1290: Under the new law, a minimum age for kindergarten children will be phased in by 1992. A child must be 5 years old on June 1 for all school districts in the state. The law will aid in eliminating marginal age differences in children starting kindergarten. The law goes into effect immediately.

Senate Bill 185: This measure creates the Corporation for Indiana's International Future. The board of directors for this new enterprise will be engaged in strengthening Indiana's ability to compete in the global economy. The corporation will also encourage educational and cultural exchanges between Hoosier citizens and citizens of other countries. The law establishing the corporation is effective July 1.

Citizens asked to pick-up and clean-up in Mentone

The town of Mentone has given its residents until the week of May 17-23 as the deadline for picking up trash, mowing grass and pulling weeds before an ordinance, requiring this work to be done, will be enforced.

Blacktopping the alley behind the United Methodist Church is also under the consideration of the board.

Other streets may be added before repair work begins, and the possibility of putting in new curbs was also discussed.

The board has received approval from the State Highway Department to close off one block of State Rd. 15 (Main Street) on May 15 for the parking of about 40 antique cars, which will be in town for about two hours.

In other business, the board voted against the request to close one parking space in front of the drug store so that people could enjoy the flower arrangement there. According to Miller, the parking space is needed on the weekends and it would mean relining the rest of the street.

A motion was made to have a consent signed to block off the street on June 4, 5 and 6 for the Mentone Egg Festival.

In executive session, which immediately followed the regular meeting, the board was to interview a possible candidate for the position of superintendent of water, to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Rodney Holloway on April 17.

The board is still taking applications for the position of town marshal.



"Help-me-but-not-yet"

The phone call came on a spring morning of bright sunshine, but the voice was glum, ragged and full of despair.

"I need help. Can you help me?"

The defiant man had been proud of his ability to "hold it" but now the loss of control was tearing him apart.

"When's the last time you were on the job?" he was asked.

"Christmas," was the muffled reply. "I don't remember the last time I ate. If I don't get off the stuff, I'll be dead."

The friend paid him a visit. Cigarette butts littered the table tops. Empty bottles made walking precarious. The drinker slumped in a chair and muttered, "I figured I'd better call you before I walked out in the traffic on the way to the liquor store and got killed."

"Have you gone to Alcoholics Anonymous meetings?" he was asked.

"No," said the unshaven man. "I called a place here in town and they said I needed a psychiatrist and A.A. I need more than that right now."

Treatment was suggested. He said, "Okay, make it day after tomorrow." The visitor tried to get him to go that day but failed. Two days later the drinker postponed treatment again. Then a third time. This help-me-but-not-yet syndrome is as frustrating and baffling to the alcoholic as it is to professionals in chemical dependency.

His boss finally put an end to the delays. He went to a judge, explained that his employee was killing himself and endangering others by trying to cross streets while drunk. He signed some papers, the judge talked to law enforcement people and the drinker was taken to a treatment center.

The boss took this action minutes after the alcoholic, trying to get more to drink, left his home, fell down on the sidewalk on his way to cross the street to the liquor store. He is 80 years old. It's a miracle he's still alive.

In another city, a 60-year-

old man sits in a nursing home waiting to get out and resume his life. Everyone in his family knows he has a drinking problem. Most of them want him to get treatment. He keeps repeating, "I'm not an alcoholic. I KNOW a lot of them, but I'm not one."

His wife is filing for divorce. He says, "I don't need treatment. I just need to feel stronger." A miracle -- and a family intervention -- is needed here. He hasn't even arrived at the help-me-but-not-yet moment.

A third alcoholic, 52, phoned an alcoholism counselor said, "I need help. Today. Right now." All the way to the treatment center he griped about the policeman who stopped him a few days before for "no headlights on my car" at 8 p.m. "It was just a lousy fuse," he complained. "Then he asked me if I'd take a Breathalyzer test, and I said 'sure'. I only registered .13. I'm of no use to me or anybody. I've even thought of suicide. I gotta kick this booze. I gotta."

Mixed messages. Cries for help. Denial. All part of the alcoholic's makeup. When and how to get them to the help-me-no-butts point? Only God knows. All we can do is try.

Registration scheduled for Mentone nursery school

Pre-registration for the 1987-88 school year will be held on Thursday, May 21, from 6:30 -8:00 p.m. and on Friday, May 22 from 8:30-10:00 a.m. at the nursery school, located in the basement of the Mentone United Methodist Church.

The non-denominational nursery school is the combined effort of the Mentone community and the Mentone United Methodist Church to provide a Christian atmosphere for social, physical, and emotional development of the three and four year old child.

The three year-olds meet on Mondays and Tuesdays from 8:45 a.m. - 11:15 a.m. Classes for the four year-olds are offered both in the morning and afternoon; the morning session is from 8:45 a.m. - 11:15 a.m. and the afternoon session from 12:30 p.m. - 3:00 p.m. The four year-old classes meet on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

Class time is spent in both structured and non-structured play at various activity centers. Some of these include puzzles, blocks, paints, a puppet theatre and a housekeeping center. Social skills are fostered by the child by learning how to share, pick up toys and materials, listening and following simple directions.

A daily lesson, reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, snack time, story time and the use of the Weekly Readers are part of the structured classroom time. Emphasis is placed on the child as an individual and preparing the child for kindergarten. Learning the child's address, phone number, colors, numbers 1-10, using paste and scissors, and recognizing the alphabet are included in this area.

Activities such as games, singing, finger-plays, exercise and outdoor play, as weather permits, help develop gross motor skills. Special activities include short field trips and holiday parties for both classes while the four year olds enjoy hosting a Thanksgiving Feast, Easter Breakfast and the year end highlight of graduation, complete with cap and gown.

Parents play an important role in the Jack and Jill program. Bake sales from the past few years have enabled the nursery school to purchase a child-sized, four-piece housekeeping center, a camera and a record player/tapeplayer which can be utilized by the entire class of four individual children by using earphones.

A Cannon copier was

recently purchased with money from the fall fund raiser and past bake sales. Throughout the year parents are encouraged to participate in class outing, parties and coffee klatches with various board members.

Children must be 3 or 4 on or by August 1, 1987 for enrollment and class size is limited. Speech and hearing screening is provided during the school year by the Tippecanoe Valley speech and hearing therapist, Susan Kinney. Who feels more pain?

Over 60 percent of all patients suffer from pain. However, studies indicate that young, white females who work outside the home are more likely to complain of stomachaches, headaches, toothaches, back pain and menstrual cramps than women who work at home.

According to the Indiana State Medical Association (ISMA), stress is the main cause of pain. Today, over 48.6 million American women must meet the demands of a job as well as that of maintaining a family and a home. In fact, one study indicates that a married woman with children may expect to spend approximately 85 hours a week on a career and family while a married man may spend only 65 hours a week. Such a heavy demand may leave a woman with a feeling of limited control which creates stress.

Pain suffered by women also has an economic impact. One study reported that pain-caused losses of at least \$55 billion to the economy and of 550 million work days for those women employed outside the home. Those not employed brought the total to 4 billion person days lost.

Senior citizens fear crime

Since the month of May has been designated as Older Americans Month, it is appropriate to examine one of the major concerns shared by the elderly - the fear of being a crime victim.

The impact of crime is greatest on older persons because they often have limited budgets, frequently live in inner-city neighborhoods where crimes are more common, and may be injured more easily in the course of a crime.

Also, physical handicaps, such as a vision or hearing loss, can make the elderly easy prey. With diminished strength, older people are less able to defend themselves or escape from threatening situations.

Sometimes the fear of crime can be as harmful as crime itself. The ISMA believes fear is useful if it encourages appropriate protection. But experiencing needless fear over a long period of time can be harmful to one's physical and mental health.

The most common type of crime against older Americans is "health quackery." This includes schemes such as:

*Health insurance policies that appear to pay gaps in Medicare coverage, but don't. Always check the

policy with the state insurance commission, an attorney, or the Better Business Bureau before spending any money.

*Glasses or hearing aids sold at bargain rates by unlicensed salespersons. Ask your doctor's advice if you need to purchase a low-cost appliance.

*Products advertised as miracle cures. Each year, millions of dollars are spent on products and devices advertised as cures for arthritis, cancer, baldness, and insomnia. Don't buy a product advertised to treat a condition for which medical science has not yet found a cure.

Using a little common sense is one way to prevent crime. Take precautions such as:

Locking doors and windows; asking a visitor for identification before unlocking the door; avoiding dark parking lots or alleys; leaving purses at home; and carrying as little cash as possible.

Above all, never feel embarrassed or frightened to call the police if you fall victim to any type of crime. Reporting crime can let authorities know where there are problems and will encourage better protection in the future for everyone.

Sign up for funds available

The ASCS office announced this past week that they have received additional funds to apply various conservation practices on the land. Since there is a limited amount of money available, landowners need to come in as soon as possible to sign up. Basically the funds are to help control erosion and thus preserve environmental quality by cost-sharing with the landowner to get the conservation practices applied.

Some of the more common conservation practices cost shared on include permanent vegetative cover seeding (usually a grass/legume mix), terrace systems, diversions, field windbreaks, winter cover crops, no-till, sod waterways, and forest tree plantations. The cost-share rate can vary anywhere from 45%-65% depending on the conservation practice applied.

If you are interested in obtaining technical assistance and/or cost-share funds to apply conservation practices, contact the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office (ASCS) at 267-7445 or the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) at 267-5726.

Washington, D.C.—Major League baseball isn't really facing the drug problem, and the continued coddling of Dwight Gooden is a good example of this cynical policy.

The players union has refused to accept the commissioner's common-sense plan for random and regular testing. So, after some publicity, and argument, nothing much is in place.

When Dwight Gooden, who had been rumored on cocaine for over a year, tested positively recently, the big story was that he was entering a rehab center. (Tests were part of the contract agreement he signed.)

What did entering a rehab center mean? It meant that Gooden missed maybe four starts. Papers carried the news April 24th that he

was rejoining the Mets in a few days. The season was three weeks old!

Gooden, of course, should have been barred from the game for a year. All players hooked on cocaine should be similarly dealt with. Without stiff penalties, the game will never rid itself of widespread drug abuse.

For players making more than a million dollars a year, a three or four-week suspension means little. They can be put on the disabled list for a sprain for that length of time.

Leininger serves as page Remodeling of Mentone gym approved

Serving as a Page recently for State Representative, Musselman was Lael Leininger, P.O. Box 123, Akron. She is 14 and the daughter of J. Randall and Alona Leininger. Lael attends Akron Jr. High and is in the 8th grade.

Pages are volunteers for one day during the session of the Indiana General Assembly. They are excused from school without being counted absent and are awarded a certificate signed by the Speaker of the House

and their sponsoring legislator to commemorate the visit.

Helping deliver messages for the representatives, who must remain on the House floor for debate and vote, and performing a variety of clerical duties for legislative staff are typical Page responsibilities.

The experience gives students a chance to observe the General Assembly in action, to meet and work for their elected officials and to tour the State House.

During the regular monthly meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley School Board, a decision to do remodeling work at the Mentone gymnasium was agreed upon. Renovations will include refinishing the gym floor, with a complete stripping of existing layers of sealer and paint. Floors of Indianapolis, estimated the project to cost \$6,290. Along with the gym floor being made anew, the stage area will be resurfaced at the same time adding an additional \$700 to the cost.

As with any remodeling project, the list continued to grow with the board voting to purchase new bleachers at an estimated cost of \$9,554. The gym will seat 212 after the completion of the project.

Not wanting to leave anyone out of the corporation's facilities, the board voted to purchase two-way radios for each school bus as well as an extra radio. There will also be a radio in each school building and the administration building and one hand held device to be used when needed in emergencies. Superintendent Baxter Paige reported he had received a quote of \$24,665.56 from Lectracom of Bourbon, for the entire package. The board voted to take the money out of the transportation fund for the radios.

A salary of \$18,250 was set for the new position of maintenance person for the

corporation. The new position will be filled by the current high school custodian.

A temporary loan is being sought by the corporation to meet the rest of the year expenses until the December taxes are collected. The temporary loan will be made payable Dec. 31, 1987 in the following amounts: \$506,800 in the general fund; \$227,000 in the debt service fund; \$216,900 in the cumulative building fund; \$112,500 in the transportation fund. Sealed bids will be accepted

until June 8 at 1:30 p.m. in the administration office. The board will make a decision on the bids at the regular board meeting that evening.

Textbook adoption committees recommended the following science and health books for the school corporation. For science in grades kindergarten through sixth, Silver Burdett; for 7th and 8th grade science, Merrill and for all grades health book by Merrill.

High school text recommendations include Allyn

and Bacon for General Science; Holt, Rinehart and Winston, Inc. for Earth Science, Modern Biology and Modern Physics. Laidlaw Brothers for Health and Wellness. Saunders College Publishers for Human Anatomy and Physiology, and Addison; Wesley Publishing Company for Chemistry.

In other business:

All three elementary building site projects are on schedule. Demolition of the old Akron building is

Woodlawn honors employees




A Touch of the Past

Legal reminders for couples who marry

June is the most popular month for weddings and Fulton County Circuit Court Clerk Harriet McAllister has listed the following reminders for the prospective bride and grooms.

Both persons to be married must come into the County Clerk's office to obtain the marriage license. If both applicants are out-of-state residents, they must apply for a license in the county in which they are to get married. Hours that marriage licenses may be obtained at the County Clerk's Office are 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Friday.

The legal age for marriage without parental consent is eighteen for both male and female. At age seventeen, parental consent is required. Both applicants for the marriage license must have the results of blood tests before they may apply. The results must be on official Indiana blood test forms. All Indiana physicians will automatically put the results on these forms. Out-of-state physicians may perform the tests. The Indiana form may be obtained for out-of-state tests from Woodlawn Hospital Laboratory. The marriage license must be applied for within thirty (30) days of the day the blood is drawn.

Both applicants must present proof of birth date, either by birth certificate,

driver's license or baptismal record.

If both applicants are age sixty or over, no blood test is required.

The waiting period for the marriage license is three full days or seventy-two hours. The cost of the license is \$18.00 a couple and is valid for sixty days.

Average High School Class analyzed

There's an old joke, usually attributed to Mark Twain, about "lies, darned lies, and statistics" plus "you can make figures do just about anything."

Maybe so, but the following statistics and figures are, to me, terrifying. See what you think.

In the average class of 30 high school seniors, three are daily marijuana users, two are daily alcohol users, and six are half-a-pack-a-day cigarette smokers.

Three of the 30 are frequent users of stimulants, hallucinogens, barbiturates, sedatives, and over-the-counter substances. One will withdraw from school. Fifteen will have had at least one sexual encounter. Twelve will have had a sexually transmitted disease at least once.

Four of the females will have become pregnant at least once (assuming 50 percent of the class are females). Six are in need of long-term psychotherapy. Ninety-three percent have tried alcohol. Seventy-one percent have tried cigarettes and 60 percent have tried marijuana.

Thirty-two percent of the 30 seniors have tried stimulants, 17 percent have tried cocaine, 16 percent have tried sedatives, 15 percent have tried hallucinogens, 15 percent have tried tranquilizers, and 1.1 percent have tried heroin.

These figures are from the Indiana Department of Public Instruction, the U.S. Surgeon General's Office, and the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

In New York State, a survey of the state's secondary schools showed that 26 percent of the students (400,000) can be classified as "alcohol misusers" and 11 percent (170,000) feeling they are dependent or "hooked" on beer, wine or distilled spirits.

The New York State report noted that "the vast majority of secondary school students drink alcoholic beverages." Seventy-five percent reported they had their first drink at age 13 or before.

The New York report added that "a significant proportion of secondary school students use alcohol on school days" and that 53 percent - or 817,000 7th-12th graders had been drunk in the past year, while 10 percent or 154,000 got drunk once a week or more.

Combine the above figures with the startling fact that there are 500,000 children between the ages of 9 and 12 who are alcoholics and you have some glimmering of the picture nationwide.

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



BUCKLE UP FOR LIFE!

Chances are, at some time in your life, you will be involved in a vehicle accident. You don't think so? Statistics, used by the insurance industry to base your premiums, tell a different story.

The average American can expect to be in at least one traffic crash in his lifetime. You have a 50/50 chance of suffering a disabling injury. There is also one chance in 50 you will become a fatality.

Due to the huge human and financial toll, Indiana has enacted a mandatory seat belt law for front seat passengers. The law goes into effect on July 1, 1987.

Every crash involves two separate collisions. The first is when the vehicle slams into an object and comes to a sudden stop. In less time than it takes to snap your fingers, one-tenth of a second, the first crash is over.

Unbelted occupants and loose articles continue to move forward at the same rate of speed. These objects are usually stopped by the dashboard, windshield, steering column or other occupants. This second impact is referred to as the "human collision."

An unbelted occupant, crashing at 30 miles per hour (MPH), slams into the surface with the same impact as falling from a three story building. Put another way, the person is thrown forward

with one and one-half tons of force.

Safety belts help occupants "ride down" the force of the crash by holding them in place and slowing them down with the car. During the second collision, belts help reduce the possibility of contact with either the interior or other passengers. Sudden crashes often throw unbelted occupants into others at great force, causing injuries to both.

One myth says it is better to be "thrown clear" than to stay in the vehicle. Thrown clear into what? Traffic? A light pole? Trees? Hard concrete or asphalt?

A visit to a junk yard will give you an idea of the safest place to be in a crash. Among all the twisted metal, crushed trunks and bent hoods one part of the vehicle remains relatively intact - the vehicle's interior.

Seat belt use works. In Canada, vehicle fatalities dropped 16 percent after a law requiring seat belt use went into effect. Likewise, Australia's fatalities fell 23 percent and Great Britain's 25 percent.

Projections show that if all Indiana passengers wore their safety belts each year 290 lives would be saved and 7,900 injuries would be prevented.

KNOW THE WEATHER

Is it true that the darker the cloud the more dangerous the storm? Does the color of a cloud really mean anything or is it just the condition or reflection of light in the sky at the time?

Since water particles that make up clouds really have no color, the darkness often exhibited by a rain or storm cloud actually results if there is a lack of light reflection inside the cloud—and not any color of the cloud particles themselves.

A dark cloud is likely to have greater moisture content and, therefore, greater potential for rain, wind and electricity (lightning). In the summer, dark clouds which reach down almost to the earth are often the squall line front of a thunderstorm and highly dangerous for aircraft and all those they pass above.

These clouds usually feature a downdraft, and contain lightning—though the greatest lightning danger from a thunderhead comes during the second half of the storm, not the first.



BUSINESS OUTLOOK

Many investors who want to take advantage of such funds as the Dreyfus Ginnie Mae fund, a hundred percent government guaranteed, or the T. Rowe Price high yield fund (10.43 percent return in recent months) find they are limited.

If seeking to buy these funds with IRA money, some institutions who handle IRAs tell their clients they can't buy them. That's because these funds carry no loads and many institutions won't buy them.

Seems the institutions should, or could, be forced to, if a test case was pushed (maybe one has somewhere) even if a fee was charged. But some IRA managers tell clients they must order these funds direct.

One can do that all right, but not for an IRA held by an institution. And that brings us around to the point. Some institutions handling clients IRAs are too greedy. They limit, or try to, what the IRA holder can buy so that they can earn a commission.

Those with IRAs who are told this or that fund can't be bought, because it's no load, should consider moving their IRAs.

Help with weeding

Wouldn't it be nice if there were a magical spray we could apply to our garden in the spring, plant the vegetables, and sit down to drink lemonade while the crops flourished and the weeds didn't grow?

"Many people would like to avoid the time and labor of hoeing and weeding by using herbicides," says Jeff Kissick, Fulton County Agriculture Agent. Although this is not completely possible, certain herbicides can give excellent results in home gardens if used with knowledge and care. Some rules to follow:

- 1) Always read the label carefully before opening the package and using it on a home garden.
- 2) Use at proper rates - small amounts may be enough to suppress weeds in an entire garden while large amounts may guarantee that nothing will grow --including the vegetables!
- 3) Herbicides must be used only on plants they are approved for and only at the stage of growth recommended. Any other usage is in violation of federal pesticide laws and can kill or damage the plants.

Herbicides that can be used with care on the home garden are trifluralin (sold as Trellan, Ipersan, and other trade names) and DCPA (sold as Dacthal, DAC 893, and other trade names). Look at the active ingredients in the container to determine if the material is appropriate for garden use. Atrazine can

be used on sweetcorn, but carry over could be a problem if other plants are planted in that area the following year.

Another method of garden weed control is the use of a fumigant such as Vapam in the fall. This will kill all weed seeds in the soil and you'll have a fresh start with a clean garden.

The best and surest way to a clean garden with healthy plants is still regular hoeing, weeding, and mulching.



Caution tips on home equity loans

If low interest rates are encouraging you to buy a home, several considerations should be made before committing yourself to financing what probably will be the largest expenditure in life.

If you already own a home and are thinking about home equity loan, you may want to think twice.

Attorney General Linley Pearson says two consumer groups have issued a warning to homeowners, advising them to use caution when assuming a home equity loan.

"The Consumers Union and the Consumer Federation of America say banks offering home equity loans are not telling homeowners everything they should know about the transaction," Pearson says.

A home equity loan is a line of credit based on the amount the real estate is worth on the market as opposed to the amount still owed on the property, Pearson says.

Banks advertise home equity loans as a way to finance college tuitions, swimming pools, boats, vacation homes, home improvements, vacations and reserve funds. Financial institutions say the loans offer larger amounts than available through other loans, with lower interest rates and longer repayment plans.

Home equity loans will provide homeowners with tax

savings under the new tax laws because interest paid on such a loan will be deductible.

Homeowners should read between the lines if they sign a contract for a home equity loan.

The consumer groups have alleged that often times, banks will write contracts allowing changes in interest rates, without limits on the amount.

Often times, homeowners can be taken in by advertising offering low rates that might only be good for 90 days.

Initial fees can range from \$150 to \$2,000, Pearson says, virtually diminishing any tax savings for that year. Annual fees can range from \$15 to \$100.

Homeowners should be

advised that a home equity loan is similar to a second mortgage on their property. Banks can foreclose on the house if the homeowner is unable to meet his obligation.

If the time to buy a house has come, consumers are advised to study the many methods of financing before making a decision.

The most common method of borrowing money for a house is a fixed rate mortgage. This mortgage has payments which remain constant over the life of the loan and sets a maximum on the amount of principal and interest paid.

Flexible rate mortgages offer buyers mortgages with interest rates that can increase or decrease over the life of the loan, based

upon market conditions. These also are referred to as adjustable or variable.

Balloon mortgages have a series of equal monthly payments and a large final payment. The interest rate is usually fixed, but the equal payments may cover only the interest. The final payment, often the original amount borrowed, comes due in a short period and must be paid in one large sum.

Assumable mortgages allow buyers to assume the present owner's mortgage and make additional financing arrangements for the amount needed to buy the house.

Consumers should study real estate contracts carefully before committing themselves to buying a house.

Akron board will enforce ordinances

Everyone must pay when a few are careless. Since repairs and upkeep expenditures are paid with tax dollars, each resident is paying for the repairs of the town property. This was the consensus of the Akron Town Board at its monthly meeting held Tuesday, May 19, at the town hall. Men from Rochester, who have the proper equipment, have had to come into Akron and unplug the sewer lines due to the negligence of a few citizens. Articles of clothing, styrofoam cups, and grease have all been cleaned from the sewer lines in just the time period of one week. All citizens are being asked to be more careful as to what is put in the sewer lines. Also, grass cuttings which are blown or placed on the street eventually clog to the inside of the lines and cause clogging.

Residents are also reminded that the town has ordinances regulating the mowing of weeds, accumulated trash and abandoned vehicles. The board has decided to give residents until June 1 to take care of

these matters. After June 1, ordinances will be enforced. The ordinance books for checking on these regulations are available at the town office, police office, and the library.

Because both the EPA and the Indiana DEM are requiring much more testing at the waste water treatment plant and the need to monitor the stream flow has intensified, the operator must spend considerable more time at the plant. Superintendent Gearhart reported these facts to the board during the meeting. The board then voted to allow Gearhart to hire an employee on a part-time basis to help with the work.

It was also reported to the Akron Board that the Plant-A-Tree committee planted thirteen trees in the park. Tom Haupert has also trimmed the bushes near the flagpole.

New lights are being installed in the downtown area by PSI at no cost to the town. It was reported that the new lights will be somewhat cheaper to operate.

Silver Lake Days set

The Annual Silver Lake Days Festival will be held June 18-21 at Silver Lake. Flea Markets, antiques, carriage house tours, steam engines, softball tournaments, parade, and a talent show are just a few of the events scheduled for the four day celebration. The festival is sponsored by the Silver Lake Days Festival Committee and the Silver Lake Lions Club. All proceeds will be donated to local emergency services and other volunteer services.


Open House announced

DOES FLOSSING WORK?

Flossing may be a new subject for many persons. Most people seem to believe that a good brushing is sufficient, just as they may believe that a six-month checkup can prevent cavities. As most adults (who display their dentist's handwork when they open their mouths) can attest, cavities still appear even though the teeth are brushed and a dentist is seen on a regular basis.

One of the best solutions to persistent cavity problem is to floss. Here's why. Even the best brush cannot completely remove plaque BETWEEN the teeth and beneath the gumline. Regular flossing does remove plaque and debris from between the teeth and below the gumline -- areas where decay often starts.

Those of you who think your teeth do not require flossing should test your teeth for plaque by purchasing a "disclosing agent." After placing the disclosing agent on the teeth, the plaque will be stained a bright red. This reveals where brushing is not adequate.







Himes leads in Netters split matches track sectional

The Tippecanoe Valley girls track team made a strong showing at the Rochester Sectional held Tuesday, May 19. Much of the impressive showing was attributed to junior Deona Himes.

Himes collected two individual titles and helped the Valley 400 meter relay team win and produce a record-setting performance.

Himes was placed fourth in the 100 meters, but her season-best time of 12.9 seconds was only two-tenths of a second behind top placed Dina Rowe of Triton. Himes recovered from her slow start and started pulling away from the field over the last third of the race to win in 12.9 seconds.

Also winning in the long jump, Himes narrowly gained the victory by out-jumping Stephanie Westphal of Winamac by 1/4 of an inch. Westphal jumped 15 feet 6 1/4 inches while Himes surpassed her with 15 feet 7 inches.

Valley placed more than a second ahead of second-place Peru, and only one one-hundredth of a second off the sectional record set in 1978 by Rochester, in the 400-meter relay team race. The squad of Becky Hughes, Jennifer Secrist, Lisa Minnick and Deona Himes broke the Valley record twice during the regular season and again on the Barnhart Field with a time of 51.3 seconds.

Sparked by the trio of first-place finishes, Valley finished fifth in the meet with 45 points. Other Valley scorers were Amy Swick with a second in the 800 meters, Danita Boggs with a sixth in the 3200 meters and the 1600-meter relay team of Minnick, Swick, Secrist and Hope Hoffman with a third place.

Swick advanced to the Highland regional with her 800-meter finish. Himes and the Valley 400 relay runners also advanced with their victories.



Strawberries to be early

The month of June, not May, usually indicates it's time for strawberries. This year however, local producers are reporting that strawberry picking will start about one to two weeks earlier.

Grown-in-Indiana strawberries cannot be surpassed and the prices are very competitive. In general, conditions for growing and picking strawberries have improved over recent years.

The first bountiful berries will ripen around May 23 and 24 due to the warm and fairly frostless spring. Producers are predicting that this year's crop will be ready throughout southern and central Indiana by Memorial Day weekend.

This bright red fruit is a leading crop in direct farmer to consumer marketing. There are more than 100 strawberry producers in Indiana and the crop generates as much as \$5 million in primary and supplementary income for these growers.

When buying strawberries from a u-pick farm, it is important to remember:

*The fruit is fragile and should be picked with care, leaving the cap intact.

*Avoid using deep pans and pails because the fruit on the bottom may bruise.

*Store in a cool, dry place (33-40 F).

*Do not wash berries until ready for use. Moisture hastens mold.

*Strawberries will deteriorate quickly after removal from the refrigerator.
