## Phyllis Gearhart to Retire This Spring

After teaching for 36 years, 26 of them at Akron, third grade teacher Phyllis Gearhart plans to retire at the end of this school term. The Parent Support Council will host an open house in her honor on Sunday, May 5, from 1 to 3 p.m. at the Akron Elementary School Cafeteria.

Surprisingly, Phyllis has no regrets about her decision to retire. "I really, really love my job, but I think there comes a time when you need to think about doing other things," she says. Phyllis is looking forward to spending more time with her family and catching up on some of the things she has put aside while teaching. "Like working in the yard and maybe cleaning house," she says with a smile.

Born and raised in Warsaw, Phyllis attended Taylor University and graduated from Huntington College. She earned her Masters degree at St. Francis College. Her teaching career began in 1955, in Huntington, where Phyllis taught for nine years. She was then at Royal Center for a year before coming to Akron in 1965.

While Phyllis has worked with first, second and sixth graders, she has spent the past 24 years teaching the third grade. "I teach children, but in fact, the children teach me everyday," Phyllis says.

During her career Phyllis has witnessed many changes in education. "Due to a lot of outside influences, children today are more knowledgeable," she says. "Each class has a computer now, which we use as much as we can. A lot of our kids are very good with the computers, more knowledgeable sometimes than I."

One change that caused Phyllis some apprehension, in the

beginning, was the addition of teachers' assistants through Project Prime Time. "At first, I didn't want an assistant, because I'd taught all those years without one," she says, "but they have been just great! My assistant, Mrs. Simons, is excellent. They also help the community to realize the responsibilities that teachers have."

While the test results have not yet been received, the third graders have taken their ISTEP tests. Phyllis feels this change in the education process has brought both advantages and disadvantages for the students. "There is nothing wrong with testing, but I feel the ISTEP tests cause a lot of pressure on children. So many students have skills that cannot be expressed on the test," she explains. "I think it could be a supportive test tool to help determine the skills and problem areas of the child, but I feel the pass-fail aspect might not be as helpful, because of the pressure it puts on children."

But the biggest change Phyllis has seen through the years, is in the home life of the children, with the enormous increase in single-parent families. "Split families cause a lot of frustration for children," she says.

Phyllis encourages parents to supervise the television shows their children watch. While she feels the educational programs are good, "T.V. is not a good influence. It shows so many things children should not be exposed to." She also encourages parents to read to their children and provide them with a good place to study. "But the biggest thing parents can do is to listen to their children," she says.

One hears so much these days about the failure of our education system and the discipline problem within our schools. A visit to Phyllis's classroom quickly dispels these concerns, at least where her students are concerned. All 23 children seem motivated, well-behaved and excited by the learning process. They appear to be especially eager to please Mrs. Gearhart.

When I visited the classroom, the students recited the Gettysburg Address from memory. Not merely reciting the words, but doing so with enough feeling to indicate that they understood the meaning of the words they were saying. Remember, these students are just eight and nine years old. Begun several years ago, when the seventh grade teacher complained that his class was having trouble learning the speech, this has become an annual project for Phyllis's classes.

For the last 15 years, Phyllis has had her students write to the President of the United States. "We used to write to movie stars and football players, but with the increases in postage, we didn't always get responses. So we figured the President had enough money to answer our letters," she says. The students usually receive the answers to their letters during the summer, at home.

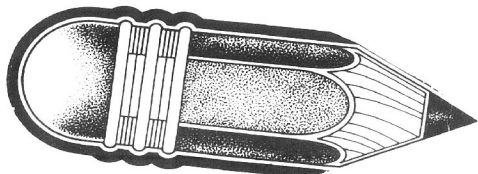
Another project that has been particularly popular with the kids is the hatching of chicken eggs each spring. The eggs are placed in an incubator and each child is responsible for turning their own egg each day. Patty Schultz, of Akron, helps with this project each year. The day I was there, the first "cheeps" were heard from the incubator and the excitement in the room was very impressive. The incubator had to remain closed for another day to complete its 21 day cycle and the children could barely contain their enthusiasm.

One teaching tool that has worked especially well for Phyllis is papier-mâché. Each year her classes use it to make Halloween masks and a Christmas piñata, in addition to other applications. This year's piñata was over four feet tall. "It's really a class project, so it gets everyone working together," Phyllis says. "I have found papier-mâché very challenging to children. It's a medium where they can't make mistakes and they are excited by the results."

Many of the students Phyllis has taught have been so influenced by her that they have gone on to become elementary teachers themselves. One former student even returned to do her student teaching in Phyllis's classroom. She has had several nieces and nephews and her granddaughter in her classes through the years. Two of her three daughters have chosen to follow in her footsteps: Jan (Mrs. Jim) Saner teaches third grade in Wabash County and Patti (Mrs. Rob) Newman teaches fifth grade at Akron. Her third daughter, Lynn (Mrs. Larry) Kline is employed at Donnelley's in Warsaw.

Phyllis chose to make teaching her career because she enjoyed working with children and felt it would be challenging. "To see children grow and to achieve goals that they have set for themselves has been the most rewarding part of teaching for me," she says.

Phyllis has certainly succeeded in meeting the challenge provided by teaching. She has had a great influence on all of the children who have passed through her class and, therefore, on the community as a whole. Akron School has been privileged to have a teacher of her caliber and she will be greatly missed.

**T.V.H.S. Schools Share \$3,826.20 For Library Improvements** - Under Title II of Public Law 89-10 the Federal Government is giving school corporations funds for improving school libraries.

All six schools of Tippecanoe Valley are receiving library funds according to enrollment. These funds will be used to make improvements in the libraries according to staff re-recommendations. The corporation's applications and plan of expediting the program has been approved.

**Jack Slaybaugh Named Detective** - Jack Slaybaugh, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louise Slaybaugh and a 1950 graduate of Akron High School, has been promoted to the rank of detective sergeant by the Indiana State Police at its Peru post.

Slaybaugh will assume his new duties on May 1 and will serve a five-county area which includes Fulton county. He joined the State Police in 1958 and has been a trooper at the Peru post since 1960.

Slaybaugh and his wife, the former Martha Dague, of Rochester, formerly resided in Akron but now live with their two children, Kristina, 13 and Kevin, 10, on R.R. 1, Wabash.

**Roann Couple Receive Long Terms** - Mr. and Mrs. Lester L. The sentence was handed down Friday by Judge S. Hugh Dillin in Indianapolis.

The Hughes pleaded guilty to conspiracy in eight specific transactions involving sale of late model cars stolen from Chicago area commuter train parking lots.

The Hughes were arrested in Tucson, Ariz. on February 24 and the FBI said at that time that 117 stolen cars were recovered and the couple admitted handling 200 since 1962.

FBI Agent Charles R. Keifer said the couple received \$107,500 for 72 cars sold through a used car lot in Indianapolis.

**TVSC Salary Schedule Is Set** - A new teachers' pay scale was recently established by members of the Tippecanoe Valley School board which calls for a base salary of \$6,000 for first year teachers holding a B.S. degree. Increments of \$150 per year will be added until the top pay at the end of twelve years is \$7800. Teachers with the B.S. degree and a year of advance schooling will begin at a base of \$6100 which will increments yearly until a top level of \$9400 is reached after twenty years. Teachers holding the EdS degree will begin at \$6700 and advance to a top of \$9900 in twenty years. Non-degree teachers will receive \$5600 per year with no increments.

The recent legislature raised beginning salaries \$700 for teachers with the B.S. degree and \$1400 for teachers with a masters degree.

Members of the school board met in public session Monday night and discussed routine business matters. Some teachers' contracts were negotiated, but a complete list of teachers will not be available until all contracts are returned to the superintendent's office.

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## Who's Who in Mentone

### Profile of Ethel

Ethel Whetstone, who celebrated her 87th birthday March 2, believes she is the only living person in her generation who has lived in the town of Mentone her entire life. The many memories of her life are inextricably intertwined with memories of the town as it used to be. "Mentone has made such a drastic change since I was a girl," she says.

Ethel was born to Frank and Julia Fisher in a house, since destroyed by fire, just west of Dave and Eileen Bowser's present home.

School was fun to Ethel. She has good memories of all her school teachers—all names familiar to Mentone oldtimers. She had Mrs. Cretcher for first and second, Leah Blue for third and fourth, Von Jenkins for fifth and sixth and Raymond Lash for seventh and eighth. "They were a good bunch of teachers," she says.

The school house, where Dr. Wilson's office is now, was a big square building with one through six grades downstairs. "We studied Reading, Writing and Arithmetic, and I'll tell you, we got it, too!"

Ethel describes how the school sat back, with a wide walk leading up to it, "about five feet wide," and a pump near the street. "There was a big playground in front of it to play games on. 'I always liked to have fun,' she says. It was on this playground that Mentone's Chataqua was set up. Ethel remembers the first theater in town. It was the evening gathering place on election day. "I would babysit with my younger sisters, Grethel and Evelyn, while my parents went to the theater to get the election returns.

The theater was adjacent to the Livery Barn, owned by Del Meredith, which occupied a long building where Hersch Linn's filling station was. Horses, buggies and carriages were available for rent there.

Before her marriage, Mrs. Meredith, nee Mabel Doddridge, had a photo studio above a Mr. Smith's Print Shop on the south side of Main Street, in the present parking area of the United Methodist Church.

When Ethel was around eleven years old, Mentone had a "event" she's never forgotten. An evangelist, Mr. Steveson, came to town and set up a tent in the vacant lot where Teel's Restaurant now sits. His evangelistic meetings continued for three to four weeks. "There was sawdust all over the meeting site. But, the thing I remember so well, is they had a big horse tank set up before the platform for baptism." Among those who were baptized, she recalls, were Hank Mills and Harve Poulson, who owned a barbership in partnership across the street. "It changed them," she says.

A business Ethel remembers well was the Forest and Clark Department Store located on Main Street where The Pillbox is now. "It had two doors and they had everything. On one side was dry-goods, on the other groceries, and down the middle aisle were boots, shoes and overalls. You could buy anything there you wanted. They had everything."

After Forest and Clark closed and William Clark, half-owner, had died, his widow, Broda and her son, George, opened a much smaller dry goods and grocery store across the street in the present office space of Farmer's State Bank.

Mentone's second theater was in the block across the street from Teel's Restaurant, just west of the Mills and Poulson Barber Shop. East of the shop, on the corner, on the property owned today by the Seaman Corporation, sat Frank Warren's Hotel.

"I can tell you a story about that hotel," Ethel laughs. "I had always attended the Methodist Church. Frank Warren's daughter, Neva, and her older sister, along with June Aughinbaugh, Winifred Clark, Thelma Blue, the Dawson girls and me, as well as some others, were in an all girls' Sunday

School Class. Our class was invited to the hotel for a costume party. I went disguised as a boy, and they wouldn't let me in to the all-girl party until I identified myself!"

The space on Main Street's south side now occupied by Max Flenar's Barber Shop was once Aughinbaugh's Harness Shop, where all kinds of leather work was done. With the advent of WWI, the Red Cross set up in the building west of the harness shop. Young girls could be excused from school to go there to knit white wash cloths and roll bandages. "That's where I learned to knit," Ethel says, beginning a life-long love for knitting, crocheting and crafts. She's still doing those things very actively today.

At age fourteen, following eighth grade, Ethel went to work as Mentone's telephone operator.

"We had three doctors in town in those days," says Ethel. Dr. Heffley's office and home were in the former Ralph Beltz house on N. Tucker Street. Dr. Bennett had his office in the present Church of Christ parsonage and Dr. Yocum's office was in today's Boggs and Nelson building. L.P. Jeffries was an undertaker and had a furniture store on the north side of Main Street.

"They used to call me Secretary," she laughs. When the doctors and undertakers went out of town, they depended on Ethel to take their messages. When the boys came home from WWI, she would put through calls to their families to pick them up. Ethel especially remembers the excitement when a local farmer lost his arm in a compicker. She had to get a doctor to him in the field.

Ethel had always known Dewey Whetstone. Their parents were friends, often enjoying Sunday dinner in each other's homes. "We went together about two years," she says, "before we were married on October 13, 1921." Some of their dates had taken them to Mentone's third theater, located where Bernice Jones is today. Ethel remembers she wore a brown georgette hat at her wedding, made by Sylvia Harris, in her millinery shop near the theater.

Upon their marriage, Ethel quit working and devoted herself to raising her family. She soon had three little girls, followed by a son, Lowell D.

Lowell D. was just a week old when one of Mentone's most memorable events happened—three businesses on Main Street's north side were destroyed by fire. The Shaffer and Goodman Drugstore, which had occupied a building near the center of the block, had moved to the former Forest and Clark site on the corner. Next to it, east, was the Jone's Grocery and L.P. Jeffries' Furniture Store was next east.

It was a bitterly cold night, "way below zero." Rhoda Jones and her husband had been thawing frozen pipes in their store, accidentally igniting the building.

Fighting both the "fire and ice," as ice formed on their hoses, the valiant firemen exerted every effort, but couldn't save the buildings. Mildred Friesner, whose husband, Arlo, was a fireman, served hot coffee to them through the long ordeal, and someone provided donuts.

Two more girls joined Ethel and Dewey's family circle, although they lost the last one, Mary Lou, at age two and one-half.

After Ethel's family was raised, she returned to work at the telephone company in 1943, and worked until Mentone was switched to dial, about 1952.

She also did all the mending for the dry cleaners, opened by Phillip and Elizabeth Blue about 1952, then owned by Lyman and Jeanette Mollenhour and finally by the Fuller family.

When Lowell D. entered the service just after WWII, Ethel joined the War Mothers, an organization that has been important to her ever since. She held state office for six years, and was State President in 1980. She would still greatly enjoy attending state conventions, but her health won't allow her to. On the local level, they support four V.A. hospitals: Fort Wayne, Marion, and two in Indianapolis. Putting in a plug, she says, "Any unneeded clothing, both men's and women's, is welcome at the Soldier's Home in Lafayette." Call Ethel for details.

Tragedy struck just four days before Ethel and Dewey were planning to celebrate their golden wedding in 1971. Their son, Lowell D., succumbed to a heart attack and died. Dewey lived only about a year longer.

Today, Ethel, whose hip has been broken and is deteriorating, enjoys Mentone's nutrition site, the War Mothers, her handiwork and, most of all, her family. She is a member of Harrison Center Church and does what she can for them.

Reflecting on her many years in Mentone, she says, "I had my children and went through the depression—you can't tell me anything about hard times. I've been there. Young people think it's bad today. It's nothing like we went through in the late thirties."

Ethel's living children are: Doris Linton, N. Webster; Lois Walsh, Mentone; Edna Cowen, LaPaz and Mildred Grindle, Warsaw. She has thirteen grandchildren, twenty-four great-grandchildren, nine great-great-grandchildren and another on the way. "I try to do everything I can for my family," she says. "They are very important to me."

Remembering the many businesses that Mentone used to have besides those already mentioned: a baker, seamstress, tailor, ice cream parlor, three drugstores and two hardware stores, besides the many dry goods and grocery stores, as well as eggs, butter, milk, and cottage cheese delivered fresh from the farm, Ethel regrets that there's no place here now to buy as much as a "yard of material or a spool of thread."

## INBV warns against misleading claims in financing source book

The Indiana Institute For New Business Ventures Inc. (INBV) is warning Indiana small business owners to ignore claims by Offenbach Inc. of El Cajon, California concerning the availability of low cost grants and loans. Offenbach is televising commercials promoting the sale of "The Source Book: Government Grants and Loans," in a series of ads with at least two independent television stations. The book, which is priced at \$59.95 plus \$10.00 for shipping and handling, purports to assist purchasers in locating free or low cost sources of money to finance a business venture.

INBV president, David Clegg, maintains that Hoosiers will find no magic solutions in the publications. Clegg indicated that INBV is listed in the book, and that its employees have fielded hundreds of calls from purchasers in search of money. "Unfortunately we have the sad task of informing people that the representations made by Offenbach are misleading. There is no source of grant money that is available to start a small business."

The Institute, a private not-

for-profit corporation funded by the state, works with new and emerging businesses across Indiana. Capital access is a major concern for many Institute clients, and Clegg maintains there are no easy methods to fund a business. "Long hours, a good business plan, and an ability to work through numerous rejections are the requirements to finance a business," according to Clegg.

INBV notified the Attorney General's office last July that Offenbach was communicating misinformation when prospective book purchasers called the company's offices in La Jolla, California. Shortly thereafter Offenbach's telephone number was disconnected. A new round of ads has just hit television stations in Indiana, this time listing Offenbach with offices in El Cajon. The Institute has again brought this information to the attention of the Attorney General.

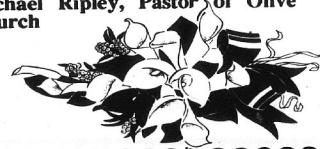
enjoyable.

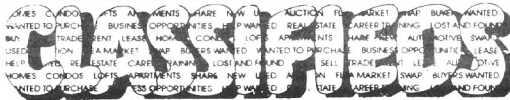

## Community enthusiasm can make a difference

The Henry Township residents are so fortunate to have the Akron Public Carnegie Library, which currently provides 25,294 books, video tapes, stereo records, a genealogy department, summer reading clubs for children and story hour and crafts for the very young. It all began with one man's dreams; his enthusiasm infected other spirited people of the community, and the first tiny public library opened in Akron on August 19, 1912 with 260 books. Two years later the corner stone was laid for the Akron Carnegie Library which opened in October, 1915. Last fall the Akron Library celebrated its 75th anniversary of service to the people of Henry township with an open house.

The Akron Public Carnegie Library has had a profound effect on many people. You have only to watch a class of grade school students enter the Library to understand the influence books can make on young lives. Their faces are full of anticipation as they search the shelves for another book to read. Sometimes they ask at the desk, "Will you read us a story, Miss Bright?" She, or one of the library staff, is glad for the opportunity; children who learn to enjoy reading will be better able to comprehend their school lessons than those who do not read books.

Adults, too, show eagerness as they pause before book shelves to find a book to take home to read, research a paper or search through genealogy records for information on a relative. The Library is a quiet place to study, a place to learn, a place where daily pressures are temporarily forgotten. It is the books that makes the difference. Sir Frances Bacon wrote, "Some books are to be tasted, others to be swallowed and some few to be chewed and digested."

Dedicated librarian, Velma Bright, continues to seek ways of improving the Library services and implementing new programs approved by the Library Board. In 1983 she organized the Friends of the Library, a State Library auxiliary to assist and aid in funding new programs. Their creed is as follows:

"We believe in the Library for its Nurturing of our children and youth, opening doors to the wonder and excitement of the world of ideas; Dedication to literacy, giving to all a key of

fulfillment; Commitment to diversity, a foundation of pluralism, democracy and peace; Reservoir of memory, linking the records of yesterday with the possibilities of tomorrow; Continuum of knowledge, ever open to the changing form and flow of information; Treasury of reading where muse and spirit enrich the soul and dreams excite discovery. For these reasons the Library is central to our lives, and we pledge ourselves steadfast in its support."

In the spring of 1990, Miss Bright informed the Friends of the Library that the Library needed a Video Projector with a VCR unit to provide new educational video programs for children. The Friends of the Library responded and immediately began plans to raise the necessary funds. The projector would cost from \$2,500 to \$3,000. They applied to the United Way, held a bake sale and a book sale. At the April, 23, 1991 meeting the treasurer reported that \$1,600.52 had been raised plus \$375 from the United Way payable in July (second payment), making a total of \$1,975.52 raised for the video project. Hopefully enough dollars can be generated this year to make the proposed Library video programs a reality. New officers elected were Mary Lukens-president, Jennie Moore-secretary/treasurer, Bonnie Dunbar-activities director and Margel Craig-publicity.

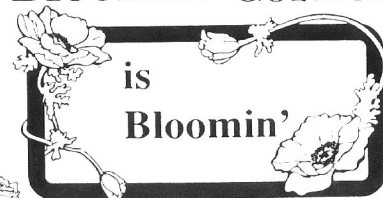

## Akron receives PTRF payment

Town of Akron Clerk-Treasurer Jean Conner was greatly relieved this week when the May property tax relief fund (PTRF) payment of \$22,897.50 from the state was received on time. In a letter sent to Fulton County Auditor Lola Riddle and forwarded to the Town of Akron, the Association of Indiana Counties, Inc. had indicated that the conference committee on the state budget had considered withholding the PTRF payment until July. This would have allowed the disbursements to be shown in the next fiscal year, thus showing a stronger budget this year.

The Association of Indiana counties is an organization that monitors state legislative action that will affect Indiana counties.

According to Mrs. Conner, in 1991 Akron will receive \$45,795. from the PTRF in two payments, one in May and the second in November. This money goes into Akron's General Fund to cover salaries, group health insurance, gasoline for the town's vehicles and many other expenses. If this payment had been withheld, many of the town's operations would have been affected.

"This money is figured into the budget," Mrs. Conner said. "The town is run like a business. We depend on that money for day-to-day operations. You can't spend money you don't have." She added, "It seems to me, on the state level, the right hand doesn't know what the left hand is doing!"

The Indiana General Assembly adjourned last week

after failing to pass a budget or a redistricting plan. Governor Evan Bayh is expected to call a special session which could cost Indiana taxpayers as much as \$50,000. per day.

## Wilsons retire after 37 years in Mentone

After thirty-seven years of serving the town of Mentone and surrounding community, "Doc," Dr. Wymond and Arleda Wilson have announced plans to retire July 1, 1991.

Doc says, "I knew from the beginning I wanted to be a doctor. I didn't want to milk cows!" A Dr. Swandich from Angola, who often hunted on the Wilson farm, had become Doc's idol, "and his new car inspired me." He goes on to describe an incident when Dr. Swandich's new shiny, black Auburn-Cord attracted the Wilson's Jersey bull. "He saw himself in the shiny paint and really made a mess of that new car!"

Doc and Arleda both grew up on farms in Steuben County. Doc recalls how his mother prepared him for school by teaching him the ABC's and numbers while he snapped beans and shelled peas. "She might have been trying to divert my attention from what I was doing," he laughs, "but she had me ready for school."

Doc played basketball and baseball at Pleasant Lake High School. But one of his favorite activities there was ciphering matches. He and Van Manahan, a classmate, always won, but their toughest competitors were Doc's younger brother, Wilbur and Van's younger brother, Dean. "We always had trouble beating them," he remembers.

Arleda, the middle sister of three girls, who lost her mother at age eleven, says they had to work at home and didn't have much time for outside activities, but she did find time to "be a cheerleader some" at Metz High School.

The Wilson's first date was at Arleda's high school prom, held at Hamilton Lake. "We'd known each other a long time," Doc says. "We knew everybody in the county." As for the basketball rivals, "It was fun because we knew everyone we played against. We played those guys all summer in the barn." As both Doc's parents came from big families, Doc, adds, "I was always playing against cousins."

Doc entered junior college at Van Wert, Ohio, following his 1939 graduation and Arleda went to Tri-State College, where she also worked after her 1941 graduation. She went on to work, first for REMC, then for ten years at the First National Bank in Fremont.

Although Doc was a member of the Air Force Reserve, a broken arm disqualified him from active service and he was

drafted into the Army Coast Artillery. After two years at Camp Davis, North Carolina, training 2nd Lieutenants to be Coast Artillery officers, a Warrant Officer friend helped him pass the color chart, something he couldn't do on his own, and Doc transferred to the Army Air Corps.

After training at Kerlin AFB in Salt Lake City, he went with the 8th Air Force to Theirley, England, about seventy miles north of London. As a flight engineer, he flew thirty-three missions over Germany. Before coming home, various missions took him to Edinburgh, Scotland; Belfast, Ireland; Gibraltar; Marrakech, N. Africa and Paris. "We saw the entire European Coast by air," Doc says.

Back home in November, 1945, Doc entered I.U.'s 1946 spring semester at Bloomington. He graduated with a A.B. in chemistry in 1948 and entered I.U. Med School in Indianapolis, graduating from there in 1953.

Doc remembers the dangers of those days in Indianapolis. The Med Center was surrounded at that time by city slums. "We didn't dare leave anything locked in the car," he says, "or it would be broken into and stolen." The buildings had to be connected by underground tunnels, because it wasn't safe to go out at night. But, part of his training included going into the area homes to make home deliveries. "We had a big case with all our equipment in and we wore white clothes. Someone living there would be assigned to guard our cars and we never had any trouble--as long as we wore our whites! I delivered lots of babies in little old one-room shacks, and the people there always took care of us."

After a one-year rotating internship at Edward Sparrow, a five-hundred bed hospital in Lansing, Michigan, managed by U. of M. at Ann Arbor, Doc passed State Boards for both Michigan and Indiana.

Through a Detail Man at the Lansing hospital, who knew the late Dr. Dan Urschel, then a heart specialist in Mentone, Doc and Arleda learned that Mentone needed a doctor. Since they wanted to return to a rural area, they came to look at the town. "Dr. Urschel, Jack Van Gilder and Kenny Riner were the first people we met," they remember. "Dr. Urschel let me fly his airplane," Doc says. Arleda adds, "We liked it here and we've been happy ever since."

The Wilsons' first office was in the house now occupied by the Jake Stutzman's and Towne House Beauty Salon. Housing was scarce and they lived one year in the present Boganwright home on County Line Road. July 4, 1954, Doc and Arleda moved into their present home on Harvard Street. They constructed and moved into their present office, the site of the old Mentone High School, in 1958.

For many years, Doc allowed patients a choice of hospitals in Warsaw or Rochester, making rounds each place everyday. But, a crisis one night, with an acute coronary patient in Warsaw and a patient with a bleeding ulcer in Rochester at the same time, precipitated the decision to practice in the Warsaw hospital only.

When Doc's med school classmate, Dr. Pierson, came to Silver Lake in 1956, he and Doc covered for each other's patients. But, Dr. Pierson moved to Oregon in 1971, and Doc, at that point, ceased taking OB cases. In those seventeen years, Doc had delivered 759 babies including four sets of twins.

Through the years, Doc has made many house calls, sometimes late at night in freezing weather. Yet, he's always up and out to make 5:00 a.m. hospital rounds the next day.

One of the big events Doc remembers during his practice in Mentone was the day at the Mentone gym when over 600 children were given sugar cubes with polio vaccine on them. Doc and Arleda have been very active in medical and community affairs since coming to Mentone. A member of the County Health Board since 1965, Doc has served a chairman four years. He is a member of the State Medical Assn and American Medical Assn. He has served as delegate from Kosciusko County to the House of Delegates at least ten years. He is a past president of the State Flying Physicians and was treasurer of the National Flying Physicians for many years. He

served one term on the Tippecanoe Valley School Board. He also belongs to the Mentone Lions Club.

Arleda is a member-at-large of the State Medical Auxiliary and a charter member of the Kosciusko Community Hospital Auxiliary.

Both Doc and Arleda worked hard to help establish KCH and both worked actively in the Mentone Flying Club, which they helped to organize. Since coming to Mentone, both have been active in the Mentone Methodist Church holding many offices through the years.

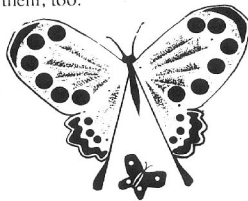

**E-L Train Derails Here Today**-Eight cars of the New York 100, an eastbound Erie-Lack-Awanna freight train, were derailed here at 3 a.m. this morning. The derailment occurred as the train passed through the cut behind the Pike Lumber Company drying yards.

All of the cars, the 26th to 33rd of the head cars, were carrying "piggyback" loads of Semi-trailers, tow per railroad car. The cargo from the loaded trucks is strewn along the right of way and the wreckage from the cars and the semi-trailers has stopped all east and west bound rail traffic through Akron.

An official of the Erie-Lack-Awanna said this morning that the company hopes to have the eastbound track open by 9 a.m. tonight. He said, however, that was an optimistic appraisal.

Crews began work early this morning and will continue until the debris is removed. They are hampered in their work by the wind which is blowing much of the paper products around as well as showering them with fine bits of dirt and sand.

The cause of the derailment has not been determined.

**Fire Equipment Orders Awarded**-Henry township has ordered new fire fighting equipment with delivery anticipated in October.

South End Motors of Akron received the chassis bid. Their bid was \$4,273.00 while Bahney Chevrolet bid \$4,302.77 and Hammel Chrysler-Plymouth bid \$4,088.40. The Hammel bid did not include the transportation charges and was deemed incomplete.

American LaFrance will furnish the fire fighting equipment. They bid \$11,490.00 plus \$64 optional equipment (flood-light and fire swatters).

The only other bid was received from Midwest Fire Equipment Co. who bid \$16,862.46 for the truck and fire equipment or \$12,523.46 for the fire equipment only. They allowed trade-in on the old Dodge at \$1,050.50.

The contracts for the equipment were signed April 29.

**\$80,000 Loan Will Aid Airport**-Members of the Fulton County Board of Commissioners met Monday and signed a voucher for an \$80,000 loan to be used for improvement of the Rochester Airport. The money will come from the State Industrial Development Fund and will be paid back over a ten year period at two percent interest.

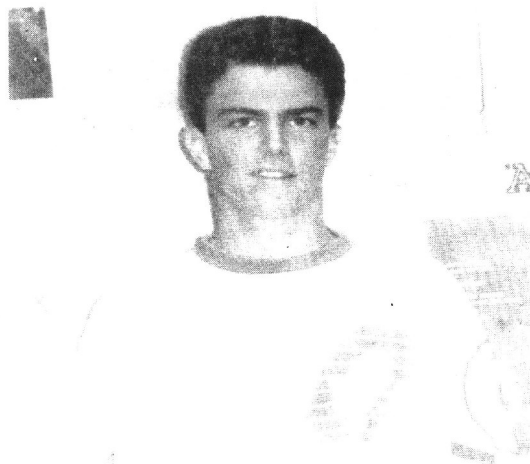

### First Bank

For nearly 100 years First Bank, under one name or another, has been serving the banking needs of the Akron community. The Akron Exchange Bank, as it was then known, first opened for business on July 6, 1891. Founded by Fletcher Stoner, Martin Patterson, Norman R. Stoner and William A. Patterson, it was a private institution with capital of \$10,000. As the bank grew, it relocated, first to the brick building later occupied by the Winona Cafe, and then later to the front portion of the furniture store and undertaking establishment operated by Hoover and Shoemaker on the Fleck corner. This was followed by a move to the northeast corner of Rochester and Mishawaka Streets. After a fire destroyed the building at that location, the bank's directors purchased the lot and built a new building. In 1911, the bank consolidated with the Citizen's Bank and in 1922, the institution became a state bank and that change was reflected in its new name, Akron Exchange State Bank. It continued to prosper and eleven years ago, a new modern facility was constructed at the current location on West Rochester Street.

Lincoln Financial Corporation, based in Fort Wayne, purchased the Akron Exchange State Bank on June 6, 1986. On September 6, 1988, Lincoln Financial Corporation also purchased First National Bank of Rochester and simultaneously merged it with the Akron Exchange State Bank to form First Bank.

Lincoln Financial Corporation owns 13 banks with 63 banking offices. Of the 13, 11 banks are located in Indiana, one in Ohio and one in Michigan. J. Randall Leininger, who had previously been President of Akron Exchange State Bank, was made Chairman of the Board of First Bank and Manager of the Akron Office. Dick Day, John McKee and Fred Rakestraw, who had served on the board of the Akron Exchange State Bank, now serve on the Board of Directors of First Bank. Another Akron resident, Dr. Kerrick Deardorff, is also a director of First Bank.

The Akron office is open to serve customers from 8:30 to 3:00 on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays; from 8:30 to noon on Thursdays and Saturdays; and 8:30 to 5:00 on Fridays. The drive-up window is open 8:30 to 6:00 Monday through Friday and 8:30 to noon on Saturdays.

Randall Leininger stresses that First Bank of Akron continues to support the same principles that the Akron Exchange State Bank was founded on. Among these is the firm conviction that the bank should always serve the best interests of the entire community. First Bank still offers the same courteous, efficient service and knowledge of the customer's and the community's needs that originally made the bank a success.

Raised in the Akron community, Randall Leininger graduated from Akron High School. After graduating from Indiana University, he returned to Akron and on January 1, 1963, began work at the Akron Exchange State Bank as a bookkeeper. After spending 27 years working with the people of Akron, Mr. Leininger has come to know and understand the financial needs of the community. "The main thing is that we still know our

customers here by name," he remarked. "Decisions are still made locally on loans," he added.

All eleven employees of the Akron Office, including Assistant Manager Penny Hisey, are from the Akron area. "One teller, Alice McFarland, has been with the bank for 45 years," Leininger says.

Leininger feels the acquisition of the Akron bank by Lincoln Financial Corporation has been very beneficial to its customers. "We are now able to give our customers a larger lending limit because of the capital of Lincoln. We have a research department that develops different products that we're able to offer our customers. When we were smaller, we didn't have that capability," Leininger says.

While First Bank is a full service bank and offers a complete range of accounts, Leininger feels one in particular needs singled out. "We have a unique account now called the "Rate Riser CD." He says, "It gives the customer one opportunity to raise to a higher interest rate if the rate goes up during the term of the CD."

Depositors at First Bank need not be concerned by recent publicity concerning the failures of Savings and Loans and certain banks according to Leininger. "First Bank has had an extremely good earning record since we've been with Lincoln Financial Corporation," he says. "With the added strength of the other 12 banks, we can weather tough times as they come and go. With assets of \$2,335,000 and stockholders' equity of \$175.5 million, at the end of 1990, Lincoln Financial Corporation provides safety and soundness to its customers."

An interesting bit of history on the bank involves Randall Leininger's grandfather, Roy Leininger. It seems Roy and the bank's night watchman, Harry Showalter were playing cards one fall night in 1902. Two strange men came in and bound and gagged the two local men and proceeded to attempt to blow open the bank safe. Their efforts failed and the resulting explosion woke the whole town, creating such a disturbance that they had to flee. The robbers stole Ed Arter's horses and buggy and escaped. The bomb caused considerable damage to the bank, but the robbers didn't get even a penny for their efforts. "So I've got a history with the bank, through my grandfather, even though he wasn't a banker," Leininger laughs.

Leininger feels the future looks solid for Akron. "We are very fortunate to have nearly 400 industrial jobs in a small community of 1000 people. Our cost of living versus the cost of living in outlying communities is very low," he says. "Akron is a good place to live, and because it has a good school district, it is a good place to raise children." He goes on to say, "Lincoln Financial Corporation plans to stay in Akron, Indiana and provide banking services to the community as we have done since the original bank was founded."

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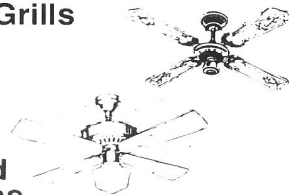

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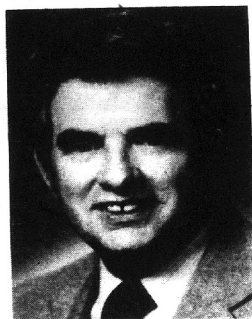

## Community Corner

### Measles vaccine required for sixth grade students

All students entering sixth grade in Indiana schools in the fall of 1991 will be required to have received at least two doses of Measles vaccine, preferably M/M/R, and both doses must have been administered after the first birthday. The second dose may have been administered anytime during the child's life, as long as there were 30 days between doses.

In 1990 there were 412 cases of Measles reported in Indiana. This is the highest number of reported cases since 1977. 60 deaths were reported nationally during last year. Measles vaccine has been licensed since 1963. Unfortunately, not all individuals who receive Measles vaccine (or the combination Measles/Mumps/Rubella vaccine) develop protection against disease. Both the American Academy of Pediatrics and the Immunization Practices Advisory Committee at the Centers for Disease Control recommend that every person born since January 1, 1957, receive two doses of a measles containing vaccine, preferably M/M/R, and both doses be given after the first birthday.

Parents are urged to seek the vaccine for their child now, from their family physician. If they cannot obtain it from a physician, they should contact their county health department. The personnel there can administer the second dose of M/M/R to students who are currently in the 5th grade, but their supply is limited. The school should be notified of the administration of the second dose of Measles vaccine.

### Single Parent Family Camp to be held

Single parents and their children are invited to attend Family Camp May 25-27 at Pine Creek, 20 miles west of Lafayette. Pine Creek Camp is a rustic wooded camp with dormitory cabins and tent cabins.

The camp is sponsored by

the North Indiana conference of the United Methodist Church and is open to all single parent families. Children from age 5 through teens are invited along with their parents.

There will be discussion groups for young children, teens and adults, Bible Study, hiking, campfires, group cooking, crafts and recreation.

Participants should bring a sleeping bag, pillow, rugged outdoor clothes and shoes, flashlight, mosquito spray, swimsuits, towels and washrags and a Bible.

## Scenes Around Town

I love meetings in Indianapolis. Through the years in Indy, I've met people like Liz Carpenter (Lyndon Johnson's White House secretary) and Robert Newton Peck (author of *Soup and Soup and Me*) in such places as Fort Benjamin Harrison and the Convention Center by the Hoosier Dome. One year, on race weekend, Akron's Ann Allen and I attended an Indiana Press Women's meeting at Columbia Club on the Circle. The decorations all related to the Indy 500 and some race drivers' wives were special guests. Marilyn Durham (author of *The Man Who Loved Cat Dancing*) was the speaker that year.

Twice, when IPFW colleagues and I attended Indiana Teachers of Writing conferences, held in Hilton on the Circle, a friend and I took Saturday morning communion in the Cathedral on the Circle. At breakfast one of those mornings, we noticed Admiral John Poindexter sitting at a nearby table. Another time, in Houlihan's Old Place, a friend and I realized bandleader and sportsman Phil Harris was seated at the next table to us. (Not that we eavesdropped, or anything, but I can tell you he likes jalapeno peppers.) When I got home, all excited about seeing him, my kids responded with "Who is Phil Harris?"

Just two weeks ago, I was privileged to attend the fourth annual Indiana Center for the Book reception for Hoosier book authors held at Indy's Riviera Club, and consequently was invited back to the Riviera Club last week for the first Riley Read Around. What a special evening that was! Three people were there who have presented interpretations of James Whitcomb Riley's poems publicly for many years. Various aspects of Riley's life and poetry were discussed. Riley was one of the most revered public figures in the history of Indiana, especially by children, and perhaps one of the most colorful. Reading about Riley's real life is as much fun as reading his poetry. It was noted that, although when thinking of Riley, we usually think of his dialect poems, he wrote much beautiful serious and nature poetry as well.

Riley's poetry and characters inspired Indianapolis' Johnny Gruelle to create *The Orphan Annie Story Book* and the Raggedy Ann and Andy characters and stories. A reprint of *The Orphan Annie Story Book*, 1921 edition, published by the Bobbs-Merrill Company, Indianapolis, has recently been issued by Indiana Center for the Book, Inc.

Alice Jane Hessler and Jean Jose, both of Indianapolis, who organized the first Riley Read Around, hope a genuine desire among Hoosiers to reawaken awareness and enthusiasm for Riley's poetry will result in monthly Riley Read Arrounds, around the state as well as in Indianapolis, with many interested people attending. He was a great Hoosier who left us a rich store of timeless, historically informative perceptive poetry. Riley is worth remembering.

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## Who's Who in Akron

### Jennie Michael Akron Nutrition Site Manager

After being closed for approximately six months, the Akron Nutrition Site is open for business under the direction of site manager Jennie Michael. Located in the Akron Lions Den, the program serves well-balanced, nutritious meals to as many as twenty of the community's senior citizens each Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The Nutrition Site reopened in February, but Jennie says, "I missed my very first day on the job because of a snow storm."

"According to Jennie, 'The program was originally designed to provide a balanced meal for the elderly who could not cook for themselves and was on a carry-out basis. Then they realized that having a place for the people to come in to, actually made them healthier also, because it got them out to socialize. Through the balanced meal and the socializing you meet two needs at once.' The program, which is under the direction of the government's Area Five Nutrition agency, was started in the Akron area about 15 years ago. The meals are served on a donation basis only. Diners pay only what they can afford."

The meals are catered by a food service in Kokomo. They are delivered to the Nutrition Site and hot items are placed in a steam table and cold items are refrigerated until use. The temperature is checked on delivery and again before serving to ensure safety and quality. Kenny Bright, Geraldine Hill, Erda Rogers and Dorothy DeLong help Jennie to set the tables, serve the coffee and water and dish up individual portions.

The meal is served at 11:30 a.m. and participants are encouraged to remain afterward to play cards, work on crossword puzzles or just visit with one another.

The Nutrition Site holds several monthly special events, including a carry-in dinner the second Wednesday of each month. "The carry-ins are wonderful," Jennie says. "They are all such good cooks!"

Once each month, a representative for Area Five comes to the site to share information of interest to the senior citizens, such as housing, how to fill out a living will, where to report adult abuse and special nutrition information. In addition, Gerry Hill, Akron's representative to Area Five, attends a monthly meeting and then brings back information to share with the others. Debbie Clark, from Woodlawn Hospital's EMS also visits once a month to check the blood pressure of the participants.

In the summer months, those with gardens bring in produce to share with the others. In the near future, Jennie hopes to get Congressman Jim Jontz to attend one of the lunches to answer questions on matters of importance to the elderly. So there is always something going on at the site.

Jennie is eager to schedule more special events and encourages anyone who would be willing to give a program on any topic that would be of interest to the elderly to contact her.

In the past, the Nutrition Site sponsored a craft program and Jennie would like to revive this activity if she can find

volunteers to teach the crafts and to assist with the project. Dorothy DeLong, who attends the Site regularly and makes lovely craft items, used to help with the craft project and feels it was very beneficial to participants. Having suffered a stroke several years ago, Dorothy has trouble with her hands shaking. "Some people would say, 'Oh, I can't do that' and I would say, 'I have two shaky hands and if I can do it. You can too.' Dorothy adds, "Too many people feel sorry for themselves. They need to stay active and see that if they try, they can do things."

Jennie would like to see as many people take part in the program as possible. The menus are published in The News in advance and those wishing to attend the lunches should call 893-7322 at least one day before to make a reservation. It is not a problem if you make a reservation and then are not feeling well enough to attend. Jennie urges anyone who is interested in joining the group for meals, but has a problem with transportation, to contact her. "We can probably work something out," she says. "Kenny Bright has been wonderful about providing rides and I'd be willing to provide transportation."

For people who are unable to leave their home, the Akron program still has a couple of openings for in-home delivery. "This has to be arranged through Area Five," Jennie explains.

Although Area Five plans the menus, each month Jennie meets with other site managers to discuss the quality and choice of food offered. This allows the participants to have some input in the selection process. As for as other activities Jennie says, "I want the people who come here to feel they're in control. We try to do what they want to do. It's their program."

Because funds are not available, the Nutrition Site no longer has a telephone. This fact causes Jennie a great deal of concern, not just as a matter of convenience, but from the standpoint of health and safety. "One day a woman had forgotten her heart medicine and I ended up needing to call an ambulance. I had to run next door to a neighbor's to make the call," she says. It is hoped enough money can eventually be raised through donations to replace the phone.

Jennie enjoys her job a great deal. "It seems like I always end up working with the elderly," she says. "I enjoy them so much. They have so much to share and they really enrich your life a lot." When Jennie is not working at the Nutrition Site, she spends a good deal of her time caring for her mother and mother-in-law.

She and her husband Phillip live northwest of Akron and between them have six children. Only the youngest, Millie, is still at home. The Michaels attend the Akron Church of God, where Jennie sings in the choir.

She also enjoys oil and tone painting and this summer she and Dorothy DeLong plan to share a craft booth at the Akron Fourth of July Celebration.

Although the Nutrition program is primarily for those over 60, guests, such as children or grandchildren are always welcome to join the regulars for lunch by paying for the cost of the meal.

Jennie is very thankful to the local Lions Club for donating the use of their building to the Nutrition Site.

She is also very thankful for the wonderful group of people she gets to work with. "They are all real concerned about each other. It's nice to see that. You don't think of mankind today as being concerned for their fellow person. Then you come here and see these people and their genuine concern for everyone involved in this fellowship plus other people they know. It may be that as they grow older they get the good sense to think of what is important. We kind of take things for granted at our age."

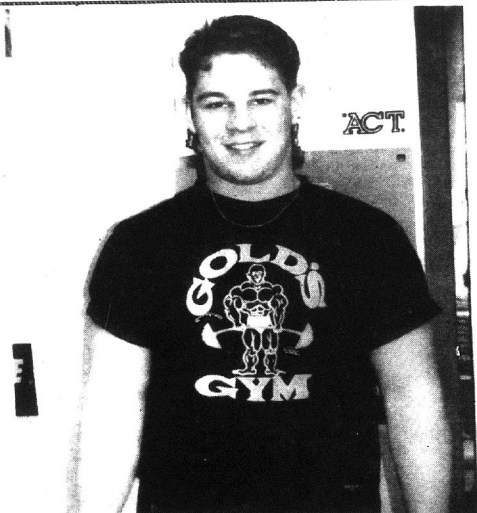

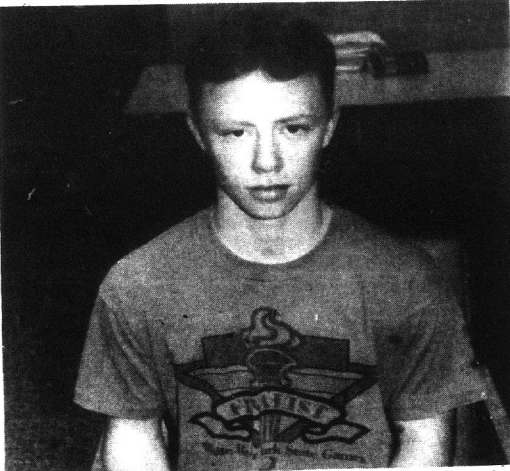

### From the Pastor's Study

### Conduct Worthy of the Gospel

As I remember it, a gospel song of years ago had these words:

"Some people go to church on Sunday and stand up and shout. Then they go to work on Monday and leave their Savior out. They think they have done their duty and to the Lord they have been true. But they'll find when they get to the judgment, their one day religion won't do. You've got to live your religion every day. On Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and all day Saturday. You've got to live your religion everyday."

The Christian faith must be a part of every day of the Christian life. It's not an occasional Sunday, only, one isolated, worship service experience or for one area of life. It's a citizenship. One's whole lifestyle. The Philippians associated it with citizenship, they took pride in Roman citizenship. Paul appealed to their sense of duty and challenged them to be worthy of the gospel. In Philippians Ch. one, verse 27 and Ch. 2-4 and 12-17, they are given several steps necessary to keep these standards of Christian behavior. Family standards are less than Christian. Privilege, entitlement, sexual promiscuity are values of our culture. Church standards are sometimes less than Christian. Everyone looking out for number one, is accepted as normal. The conversion of our standard of conduct begins with information on Jesus' and Paul's teaching. Conversion that honors God is more than knowledge. It's the divine act of God in one's whole life—cleansing, purifying, forgiving, accepting, loving. Our life is worthy of the gospel only as we are converted from former ways and continue conversion to Jesus' way.

Conduct worthy of the gospel requires courage. The Philippian Christians were urged to be as one man, challenged to stand firm, suggesting an aggressive rather than a defensive posture. Have courage without being frightened by those who oppose you. Suffering isn't to be avoided. Struggle and suffering are part of Christ's life and the Christian's life. Foundations of Christian behavior mean being "united in Christ", fellowship with the Holy Spirit and tenderness and compassion. It means to be like-minded, no selfishness and conceit, mutuality in joy and sorrow. A life worthy of the gospel in the life of the church means salvation isn't taken lightly. Do everything without complaining or arguing, living a pure life, different from a crooked and perverse generation. The Christian life is to shine like the stars, illuminating the darkness, rejoicing in good and bad times because you know God. A Christian should be like a sheep dog, when the shepherd wants him to do something, he lies at his feet, looks into his eyes and listens without budging, until he understands his master's mind, then jumps and runs to do it. He never stops wagging his tail. A life worthy of the gospel is a challenge to us all. It's a possibility set for us in God's word. Let's commit ourselves to do it without protest and with courage. All the time, let us do it with joy.

## Who's Who in Mentone



Mentone's Pauline Riner talks about changes in her lifetime. "People can't believe what few appliances we had. And I picked for 1¢ a quart. I could easily make 25¢ in a morning!"

### A Profile of Pauline

Pauline Riner, who will soon be 85, has lived in Mentone since 1956, but she has many memories of happy childhood days on a farm situated in a semi-circle of the Tippecanoe River, Crystal Lake and Trimble Creek. "I learned to swim in all three," she says. "Trimble Creek had a beautiful place to swim. The water was clean then. I was baptized in Trimble Creek."

Each evening was an adventure to Pauline then, as she either walked with her dog, or rode her horse bareback, back the one and one-half mile lane to "the tamarack" to get the cows. She laughs about the night a gate was left open and three cows crossed the creek. "When they crossed the creek, they were in Etna Township," she says.

Pauline especially enjoyed the flowers along the lane. "There were bottle gentian, cardinal flowers, Indiana beads, trillium, lots of violets, asters, Turk's cap, columbine, wild geraniums, bee balm, cowslips and bluebells. There was one clump each of pink and white lady slippers along the tamarack. Each year we used them to decorate the church on Children's Day in June."

She also enjoyed the birds. "There would be 20-30 goldfinches on the barbed wire fence, with bluebirds nesting in an old fence post. Whippoorwills lived in the huckleberry marsh around my home. We used to whistle to the Bob Whites and they would whistle back. I'd see flocks of wild canaries, cardinals, redbirds and hummingbirds."

In some ways, Pauline could identify with Gene Stratton Porter's *A Girl of the Limberlost*, a book she loved to read.

A self-taught swimmer, swimming was always a favorite activity for Pauline. One particular day she remembers, with Kyle and Geneva Gibson following her in their boat, Pauline swam across Crystal Lake.

Always a music lover, Pauline had 18 piano lessons as a child. When Miss Cashel Crawford came into the neighborhood in a horse and buggy, giving piano lessons to all the neighborhood children, nine year old Pauline took six lessons from her. Later she walked about two miles to the home of Gladys Meredith for twelve lessons. "I didn't dig music lessons," she laughs. "I was already ear-trained, playing everything by ear." Much later, when she taught school, Pauline picked out a tune, "I'll Always Be In Love With You," for her students. She was delighted when she found the music and learned she had played it right on her own. She says, "The World Is Waiting For the Sunset" is the hardest music she ever played.

Pauline went to Harrison Center, a one-room school, then attended Atwood High School. In those days, each student was responsible for his own transportation. So, her dad installed a bench in his 1915 Buick Touring Car, converting it to a nine-passenger "hack." "And when it got bad, we went in a surrey with the fringe on top."

The next year, Pauline and a friend, Mabel Kintzel, drove a horse and buggy to school, a joint effort. The horse belonged to Mabel's parents, the Fred Kintzels, and they borrowed the buggy from Pauline's sister and brother-in-law, the Walter Eckerts.

"We could see Summit Chapel from the Atwood School," Pauline reminisces, speaking of the church on Road 10 that was recently made into a house.

Pauline's principal, Mrs. Carey Longfellow, graduated her in December of her senior year to help her get a head start at Manchester College, with the promise of teaching at Harrison Center School when she finished. "I couldn't have gone to

college if I hadn't known I had a job waiting," she says. "I took care of a Mrs. Reppa's children, who stayed at the lake, from Chicago, for \$1 a day to pay for college."

After three semesters at Manchester, Pauline taught in the Harrison Center School four years, also attending summer school in Winona Lake.

Although she like teaching, marriage to Curt Riner, whom she met at a dance at Lake Manitou's Fairview Hotel, ended her teaching career. They became farmers and raised three sons, Jack, Kent and Larry Kay. Through the depression years, Pauline says, "I cooked and laundered for three hands who stayed with us, as well as cooking for the crew who helped on the farm throughout the summer."

In 1946, Pauline returned to work as Kosciusko County's Attendance Officer, a job she held for many years.

Pauline began attending the Mentone Methodist Church in 1939, when Reverend DeWitt was pastor. She sang in the choir until recently, often singing solos and in duets in her younger days. She also led Sunday School singing.

Curt and Pauline retired to town soon after he became ill in 1955. She nursed him faithfully until his death in 1961.

Pauline enjoys collecting antiques. "I always like old things," she says. In 1969, she took a booth at a flea market in Mishawaka, continuing there as a dealer until 1973.

Pauline has lots of praise for her parents, Charles and Mary Elizabeth Casner, who she says were good and kind people. "My dad loved flowers," she says. "Mother taught a young people's Sunday School class for many years."

Pauline has received two very special awards she is justly proud of. The first is a gold medal awarded her by the Mentone United Methodist church for incorporating her love of flowers into faithfully arranging flowers for the worship service for twenty-five years.

The second was a state award presented in 1986 for fifty-seven years of membership in the Psi Iota Xi Sorority. "Her perfect attendance, enthusiasm, support of officers and members and dependability generate feelings of closeness and cooperation among members of the chapter." She says "When they got about half-way through that, I thought, 'Gosh, who are they talking about!'" She now has sixty-two years of membership.

Pauline's other memberships include Indiana Retired Teacher's Assn. and Kosciusko County Teacher's Assn. She enjoys her sons, her eleven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Of Mentone, Pauline says, "It's just okay. I like its friendliness, safety and kindness--all my nice neighbors."

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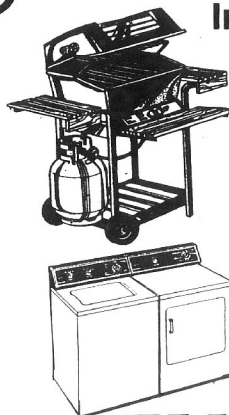

## 3 more teaching positions cut at Valley

Superintendent Baxter Paige announced the termination of three more teachers' contracts at the May 13 meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley School Board. The cuts were blamed on declining enrollment and reductions in the state education budget.

The teachers whose contracts were canceled and their positions are: Jo Manwaring-part-time high school business lab, J. Kirby Stearley-Akron 6th grade and Deborah Whistler-Akron home economics.

Chad Secrist, a Valley senior from Mentone, asked that the board reconsider its decision in the case of Jo Manwaring.

Paige stressed that the cuts were being made due to finances and not the quality of the teachers' work. He said the terminations might be reversed should the state provide more funding than is currently proposed.

Three other teachers were notified earlier that their contracts would not be renewed.

The board approved 107 teaching positions for the 1991-92 school year.

The resignation of Bruce Gaylor, assistant principal at TVHS, was accepted by the board. Gaylor will take the position of principal at Edinburgh Junior-Senior High School.

In other matters, the board:

- \*Approved a schedule for summer school classes. The classes will be offered as long as 15 students are pre-enrolled and at least 10 attend each day, with the exception of a special education class which will require six students.

- \*Planned a special public meeting to discuss the findings of a feasibility study conducted by ISU on a building program. The date of the meeting will be announced later.

- \*Granted permission for the corporation to apply to the state to use teachers aides in the 1991-92 school year.

- \*Approved a GED diploma for Lily Saner.

- \*Appointed Trent Stone, Jean Best, Joyce Toetz, Phil See and the Rev. Jim Malbone to the AIDS Advisory Council. They replace Steve Dunnuck, Heidi Smithson, Greg Sciarra, Dan Hauser and the Rev. Robert Jarboe. School nurse Patricia Hoover chairs the council.

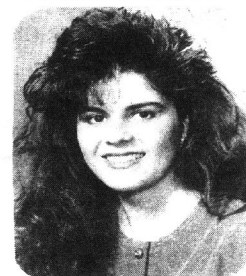
- \*Adopted social studies textbooks for next year.

## Miss Kosciusko Appears at Local Schools

Miss Sheila Watts, Miss Kosciusko county, 1991, made the rounds of the Tippecanoe Valley Schools Friday, talking to children and signing autographs.

The lovely beauty queen, a senior at Warsaw High School, held the children in wide-eyed wonder as she emphasized that each one of them can control his or her own future. "The choices you make today will determine who you become tomorrow," she said.

Sheila went on to tell them, "Anyone can choose to be a winner if he wants to, by following the necessary steps and giving it his all, to make it happen."

As an example, she described how, after she had decided to become Miss Kosciusko, she had to exercise faithfully daily, regardless of how much she would have preferred, some days, not to.

### Denton and Harriet Abbey

Denton and Harriet Abbey, now residents of Fayetteville, PA, will be well remembered by most Mentone people for the many years they lived here, working first in the Urschel Clinic and later for Warsaw's Dr. Thomas Keough.

Denton was born in the "jerkwater town" of Hamlin, PA, moving to Honesville for high school. "We walked two miles to school barefoot," he remembers. "I did too," she chimes in. "We never had any problems during the depression," he adds. "We wore hand me down clothes, but we always had enough to eat." Denton's proud of his Pennsylvania heritage. His great (times four) grandfather, Jeremiah Osgood, migrated to PA, built a log cabin near Hamlin, planted a pear tree, then returned to England for his family. They came back to find the cabin burned by Indians, but the pear tree intact. That tree still stood until about ten years ago.

Another ancestor, Abraham Knepper, built a stone house in the 1800's that still stands, less than ten miles from the Abbeys' present home.

Because of contracting TB in his senior year, Denton missed his last two months of high school. He was still able to graduate in 1928, although he had to spend the next two years in a sanitarium.

Denton and Harriet met in 1939 in an anatomy class at a tech school in Philadelphia, where they were both students and Denton taught some classes. Harriet had graduated from Houston Town High School, Houston Town, PA, and had attended the University of PA before enrolling in the tech school. Following graduation, Harriet with a major in medical technology and Denton with a major in medical technology and radiology, they needed to find jobs.

Drawn to Indiana because of relative in Upland, Denton says, "I wanted to live in a rural area. So, I sent postcards to the postmasters of little towns with less than 5,000 population, asking if they needed a technician." The Rochester, Indiana, postmaster answered, saying they did indeed need a technician in their town. So, Denton came out the fall of 1941 and worked at Rochester Hospital for the next five years.

A vivid memory of that time for Denton is December 7, 1941. "Dr. Herendeen and I had come to Mentone to see Dr. Urschel for some reason. We sat in the car in front of the Urschel Clinic (on Main Street) and listened to news about the Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor."

Harriet and Denton were married in 1942 and she joined him here. At first, she worked part-time for Dr. Stinson and volunteered at the Rochester Hospital. In late 1942 and early 1943, she worked for Dr. Urschel.

Having joined the Army in 1943, when Dr. Urschel returned in 1946, he hired both Denton and Harriet.

In 1949, the Abbeys bought a lot east of town, from Bert and Gertrude Holloway, and they built a lovely home on Road 25, where they lived until 1988. Their daughter, Pam, was born just after they moved in 1950.

Harriet hadn't planned to return to work after Pam's birth, but when her "substitute" became ill, she tried it. "I had such good babysitters, I could," she says, naming Agnes Rans, Ethel Snider and Bessie Bybee.

During their years in Mentone, the Abbeys were very active in community activities.

In the Mentone Church, Denton served as Sunday School Superintendent, lay leader and lay speaker. He preached many times in Mentone, and at churches in surrounding communities, as well as the Peabody Home in North Manchester.

Determined to finally fulfill a long standing need, Denton requested to be made chairman of the furnace committee. He

then solicited pledges of \$200 from several church members and not only saw a new furnace installed, but a trash burner as well. He also served as chairman of the Parsonage Committee for the present parsonage. He and Harriet remodeled the church nursery, installing walls of shelves in the basement room.

Always active in church, a past president of WSCS, and a 38 year member of Mentone Reading Club, Harriet was also a Girl Scout leader for ten years.

When Pam was a Brownie, Harriet complained because there was no place near to take the scouts. So, Denton volunteered to superintend the park. "It was a dump in those days," he says. "But I told Harriet I would fix it up so they could take the children there."

While Denton, Art Kendall, Bill Rathbun and Doc MacFadden did lots of heavy work with Art's tractor, Harriet, Pam and the other scouts picked up stones. "We developed this side of the park," Denton says. "We made a walking bridge of old light poles and planted trees on Arbor Day. C.O. Eiler, Bill Schooley and I put the present shelter up."

Denton got his pilot's license in 1954 and flew for ten years. "I had to quit flying," he laughs, "to have time to chase around after Pam."

After Dr. Urschel closed his office, about 1967, Denton and Harriet worked in Warsaw for Dr. Keough until their retirement in 1974.

Finding their beliefs had changed through the years, Denton and Harriet joined the Mentone Baptist Church in 1963. They had also attended the late Oscar Baker's Bible Class near Mentone for some time. Now, since having made the move back to Pennsylvania, they return to Indiana each year, around May 1, for the annual meeting of the Truth for Today Fellowship in Lafayette. It is the organization which carries on the work Mr. Baker began.

A contributor of articles to Mr. Baker's publication, *Truth For Today*, since 1957, Denton has developed one of his articles, "The Quick and the Dead" into a full length pamphlet entitled *Evolution Versus Creation*. This pamphlet is now going into a second publication.

Both the Abbeys enjoy retirement in their new home. They enjoy traveling and have visited every state but Alaska and Hawaii. Denton hopes to continue writing, planning a biography of Pam, who is a Methodist Minister in California. Harriet is planning to become a volunteer in a nursing home.

The Abbeys enjoy coming back to Mentone. "We're glad to see the banks, The Pillbox and Teel's are still here," they say. "And we especially enjoy the beautification of Main Street." It is a joy to welcome back a couple who devoted so much thought, time and effort to Mentone in the past.

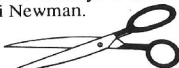
## Engery Poster Contest winner

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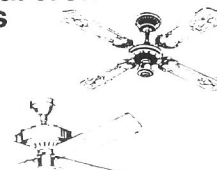
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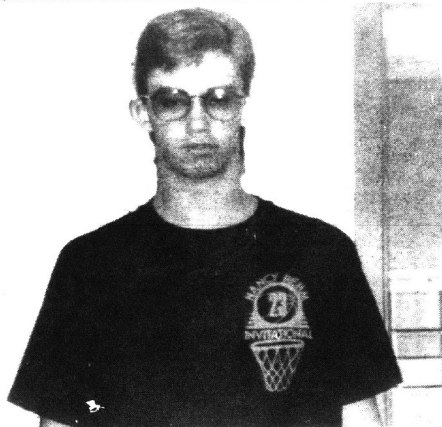
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## Viking of the Week

### VINCENT'S INFECTION



Most gum infections trouble people over thirty-five, are of long duration, and involve little pain most of the time. This is not true of VINCENT'S INFECTION -- also called ANUG, acute necrotizing ulcerative gingivitis, or trenchmouth. It strikes all ages, frequently the young; it may be accompanied by severe pain; and other symptoms may include bad odor, sore throat, swollen glands, and fever. Onslaughts of the disease often occur during times of severe physical and psychological stress.

Cleanliness is very important in combatting Vincent's Infection. The teeth should be gently cleaned by the dentist. Oxygenating agents, such as dilute hydrogen peroxide, may be useful. Antibiotics may be necessary.

After the infection has passed, scrupulous oral hygiene must be continued. Vincent's infection tends to recur, and repeated bouts can cause permanent damage to the tissues supporting the teeth.

### ACTION PEST CONTROL

Although Action Pest Control has only been in operation since January, owner Joe Sears has many years of experience in the pest control business. He began working for his father, Cliff Sears's Anvil Pest Control business while still in high school. After graduating from Maconaquah H.S. in '79, Joe began working for the company full-time.

When his father decided to retire last year, Joe went out on his own forming Action Pest Control. Based in Joe's home on Rochester Street in Akron, the business serves a wide area, including Peru, Wabash, Huntington, Marion, Warsaw, Rochester, Winamac, Culver and North Manchester.

The business is certified and insured, and Joe holds a category 7A State Pest Control License which covers residential, commercial and industrial pest control. While he has several years experience dealing with termites, Joe has shifted the emphasis of his business to eradicating other common pests such as fleas, roaches, spiders, flies, bees, centipedes, carpenter ants and ear wigs.

In addition to eradication services, Action offers problem solving advice, building inspections and free estimates. He will even advise on dealing with raccoons, squirrels, rats and skunks.

According to Joe, the general public has some misconceptions about cockroaches. "If people hear someone has a cockroach problem, they automatically think the house must be filthy," he says. "But it doesn't mean a thing. I've been in multi-million dollar homes with infestations of roaches. They'll live anywhere they decide to." Leaving food around and poor housekeeping can make a roach situation worse, but it isn't what causes the problem. Joe says roaches can be brought into your home from a grocery store or a neighbor's house.

Joe says, "A single roach can produce a million babies in a year's time. And they never come alone!"

People can have a roach problem and not even be aware of it. The most common German Roach comes out in daylight but the Oriental Roach, which is black, 1 1/2" long and favors sinks and bathtubs, only comes out at night.

Another variety of roaches people need to be aware of is the Wood Roach, which likes wooded areas and foliage. They are also very fond of the wood chips and ground bark that people so often use in flower beds. While all roaches have wings, the Wood Roach is the only one that actually flies.

It is important to tackle a roach problem quickly. The insects carry disease, cause respiratory problems and leave fecal droppings that resemble fly specks. These brown specks have been found to emit agents that cause allergic reactions in many people and they are almost impossible to remove.

People are frequently concerned about the chemical insecticides being used in their homes. According to Joe, they need not be. A licensed pest controller "knows exactly where to apply, how to apply and how much to apply." He explains that

Indiana is one of the ten toughest states in terms of restrictions and regulations. In order to maintain his license, Joe must earn a specific number of points each year by attending classes and seminars sponsored by the chemical companies. In addition, he

must attend two education and training conferences every five years. He explains that in Indiana the manufacturer's direction label becomes the law. The instructions must be followed exactly.

Pest control companies are subject to spot inspections by the State Chemist's Office to make sure there are no leaks in their sprayers and that the chemicals have been mixed and applied properly. If any deviation from the printed directions is found, operators can lose their licenses and be charged with a Class D Misdemeanor. "We're watched pretty closely," he states. "It's just as bad to use too weak of a concentration as too strong, because that's ripping off the consumer."

The biggest portion of Joe's business comes from monthly maintenance programs for commercial customers, such as grocery stores, restaurants, hospitals, nursing homes and food processing plants. Summer is the busy season for the pest control business. Last summer fleas were a particular problem and Joe says, "If we have a hot summer, they'll be bad again."

Joe and his wife, the former Donna Ruff, have been married 11 years and have lived in Akron since 1983. Donna was raised in Akron and graduated from Tippecanoe Valley High School. She is employed at Wabash County Farm Bureau Credit Union in Rochester. The couple has two daughters; Kristy, 9 and Amanda, 6. They are very active in the Sweetwater Assembly of God Church in North Manchester, where they are in charge of the Children's Ministry.

Joe is an advanced EMT with the Akron EMS. Recently, along with Cindy Bucher, Les McFarland and Kelly White, Joe earned the Stork Award for his assistance in the delivery of a baby.

With the help of remote call forwarding, a telephone answering machine and his computer, Joe is able to run his business very efficiently from his home. Being an independent operator, he is able to offer his customers reasonable prices along with friendly helpful service.

## It Happened In Akron

50 YEARS AGO

**Comment...by The Editor**-THESE ARE busy days for managers of the local tomato canning factory-and the interest in tomatoes as an important 'defense' food has created new enthusiasm. Acreage contracted is up considerably over last year, with more than 300 acres already signed up.

WITH MORE than 300 acres contracted, Mr. Overdorf and Mr. Scott will be very busy this spring getting the fields all set in good time-but the real busy time will come from late August until the first killing frost.

THE PACKING season this year should be a real one and there should be plenty of work here at the factory and in the field for every girl and woman, and man and boy who wish to help.

HOOSIER CANNERS have been urged by Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard to expand production of tomatoes by 50 percent. Much of the increased tonnage will be purchased by the government to be sent to England under terms of the lease-lend bill. The high vitamin content of tomatoes makes them an important item of 'defense food'.

THE AAA committee has removed tomatoes from the soil depleting list, and farmers who are cooperating with the agriculture program can now plant tomatoes without reducing corn or wheat acreage.

PRICES FOR tomatoes paid Hoosier farmers from 1928 to 1939 averaged \$11.20 a ton. This represents a trend that has been upward, compared to prices of other Indiana crops. The average yield over the same period was four tons an acre.

INDIANA CANNERS have been assured by the government that they will experience no labor shortage during the canning season due to the thousands of boys who are now in the army, and therefore not available. If necessary, they will bring in WPA-CCC help to see the canners through the season.

**My Column-by the Editor's wife**-Was He Shot Or Half Shot-Some years ago Harper's Weekly gave their version of a mystery involving a celebrated duel between two respectable citizens. ## Who's Who in Akron

### Crafts and food co-op keeps Arlene Lytle busy

Arlene Lytle has always been interested in art, and after working for a time in a ceramic shop, in Rochester, in 1971, she decided to give ceramics a try herself. When the opportunity came along to purchase a kiln and some molds from an elderly woman who was giving up the hobby, Arlene took it and has never been sorry. "I love it," she says. "I can come down here in the morning and start working, work all day and forget to eat and everything else. I just enjoy it so much."

Her workshop and showroom, located in the basement of her home east of Akron, are now filled with beautiful examples of her work and the molds and tools necessary to create them.

Because Arlene travels frequently with her husband, Vance, who repairs firetrucks throughout the Midwest, she does not keep regular hours at her shop. However, she says people are always welcome to call and make arrangements to view her work. Each November, Arlene and her daughter, Sheryl Ruegner, who also makes ceramics and other crafts, hold a two day bazaar at the Lytle home. Besides ceramic items, they also make and sell hand-painted sweatshirts, wooden items, hand-painted greeting cards, barn wood clocks and painted china jewelry.

Creating the beautiful ceramic pieces requires many different steps and processes. First, Arlene selects one of her 367 plaster of Paris molds. She then pours slip, or liquid clay into the mold and lets it set for five to fifteen minutes. The length of time determines the thickness of the finished product. The remaining unset slip is then poured out of the mold, leaving a shell. After setting overnight, the two parts of the mold are separated and the piece is removed. Any excess clay is removed and if the piece has several parts they are joined together with slip. It is then set aside until completely dry, usually two or three days. "You must be sure the piece is completely dry, before it is fired, or it might explode," Arlene says. Before firing, a moistened sponge and special tools are used to smooth the crease from the mold and to write the name of the maker and date, if desired. At this point the piece has reached the stage known as "greenware". The greenware is fired in a kiln for one hour on low, one hour on medium and for at least four hours on high, at temperatures up to 1900°. The kiln is then shut off and left closed to cool for ten hours. "If you open it too soon, they break," Arlene says. The greenware has now reached the stage known as "bisque".

At this point, Arlene selects from the hundreds of colors and types of glazes she has on hand. The selection is made from fired color samples because the fired color is much different from the way they appear in the jars. There are many glazes that produce special effects and the colors can be mixed to provide an endless variety. Some glazes have crystals that produce spots or sunbursts. There are also solutions called "cascade" and "spill and spell" that cause the glazes to run or streak. "You can't predict how the finished product will look," Arlene says. "It's always so fun and exciting to open the kiln because you never know exactly how it will look ahead of time."

Most pieces require three separate coats of glaze, each applied only after the last has thoroughly dried. When ready to be fired again, the piece is placed in the kiln on stilts, which are bits of ceramic with nichrome wires, that keep it from touching the shelf or any other pieces. The second firing usually takes about three hours.

Arlene used to keep a sample of each piece she could make in her shop. Lately, however, she has been making up a catalog to show prospective customers, in order to cut down on her inventory.

Some of the more unusual items Arlene has made include checkerboards, dolls, table tops and jack-o'-lanterns, but her favorites are lamps, both hanging and table. She recently purchased a potters wheel which will enable her to try new techniques.

Arlene and Sheryl have a booth at Borkholder's Dutch Village and have sold their crafts through the Farmer's Daughter Cafe.

Also a talented painter, Arlene created almost all of the oil paintings decorating the walls of her home.

When traveling with her husband, Arlene carries paint, brushes, ink, stamps, stamp pads and other tools in a large plastic tackle box so she can work on her greeting cards and other projects while Vance works. "I keep busy," she says.

For the past twelve years, Arlene has also run the Twin Acres Food Co-op from her home. Several years ago, because of health problems, she began buying food with no additives, preservatives or refined sugars, but found health food stores to be very expensive. Forming the co-op allowed her to buy the items wholesale, be assured of their freshness and have a larger selection. At the present time, the co-op has 12 members, although in the past there have been as many as 20.

Members pay an annual fee and receive a large catalog of the products available from the Harvest Day Company of Madison Wisconsin. Once a month, they turn in an order to Arlene, who then turns in one order for the whole co-op. The items are delivered to the Lytle home where Arlene sorts the orders for the members to pick up individually.

"I don't buy much at the grocery anymore," Arlene says. The company offers just about everything, including breads, flours, grains, pastas, spices, juices, cereals and cheese. There are even natural potato and tortilla chips and soda pop sweetened with fructose or fruit juices. "You can even buy organically grown carrots," Arlene says. "They're so good!" The company also offers natural cosmetics and vitamins.

While you can join the co-op at anytime, a year's membership now, will run through July of 1992, making this an especially good time to consider joining.

Arlene, who was raised in the Silver Lake area, and Vance, who was raised in Akron, have three children. Sheryl lives in Warsaw; and her twin sister, Sharon, lives in Mansfield, Ohio; their brother, Randy, lives in Kansas. They have two children each making a total of six grandchildren. The Lytles recently visited Randy and his family, and friends in Texas.

When not busy with her many craft projects, Arlene enjoys working in her three acre yard which contains a large pond where she and her family enjoy swimming. Arlene is also very active with the Akron Church of God.

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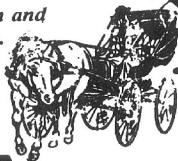


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## Academic Student of the Week

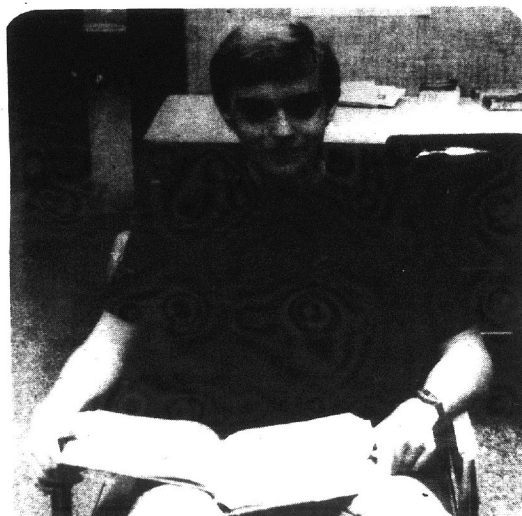

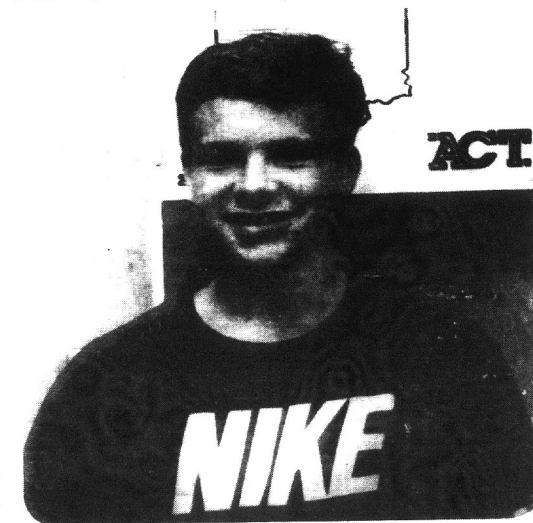

## Mentone Business of the Week

### Lewis Motors

Raymond Lewis, who has been in business in Mentone forty years, is an Army veteran of World War II.

Raymond started his own car repair and wrecker service in April, 1951, later adding used car sales to the business. His wife, Grace, has always worked alongside him, going for parts and keeping books. "I'm the flunky," she laughs.

A native of Walnut, Indiana, about ten miles west of Mentone, Raymond was a farm boy who started school in a four room country school with just eight grades. "J.O. Wilson was the principal," he remembers. "He was Merle's dad. We got the 'best' education there." From Walnut he went on the high school in Argos, graduating in 1939.

As a young "kid," Raymond always liked to fix things. "My dad could never depend on me to do a job," he laughs, because I'd be spending the time repairing the equipment."

Raymond's first job after graduation was at the Maxinkuckee Inn at Culver. Then he worked for Lake Shore Garage in Culver. From there he came to Mentone and worked for Clyde "Shorty" Nettrouer. In the fall, 1941, he started working for Max Smith, whose garage was located where the east bay of Hersh Linn's filling station was.

Grace Rans moved to Mentone in the seventh grade from Fulton, graduating from high school in 1942. She worked in the Lake City Machine Shop, later Frank Manufacturing, after graduation.

Some of the things Raymond and Grace remember from those earlier days are the festive Saturday night free shows. "Clark's held a drawing for five pounds of sugar after the show, and that always drew a crowd," Raymond says.

Grace especially remembers when her friend, Mary Esther Smith (Romine) worked the soda fountain at Shaffer and Goodwin Drugstore. "I'd go in to see her and have a 'green river,'" she says.

When Raymond and Grace dated, she remembers, her had an old 1930 Chevy. "All the other girls' boyfriends had slinky cars," she laughs. "But," he counters, "it had bucket seats and a stick shift. I thought it was great!"

The proud owner of one share in the Co-op Feed Mill, Raymond sold it to Doc Anderson for \$25 and used the money to buy an engagement ring for Grace. They were engaged and, in 1942, he was drafted. "We planned to marry in September, after my eighteenth birthday, when he returned from basic training," she says. But Raymond's return was postponed three and one-half years. He went straight to California, and after only three and one-half weeks in the Army, was on a ship headed for Hawaii and other islands in the South Pacific.

Raymond was a member of the 115th Combat Engineers, whose job it was to build roads and bridges for the infantry. "It was dangerous," he says, "but we didn't think so at the time!"

Raymond was wounded on the island of Mindanao in the Philippines, and received the Purple Heart.

But, he has many good memories of those years. While stationed on Oahu, Hawaii, he built a washing machine. "It had a crank to stir the clothes. The other guys 'took a number' to use it." Another time, "for something to keep busy in the evenings," he made a lamp of brass pieces of Japanese artillery shells. Halfway up the base of it is a P-38, fashioned of smaller brass shells. "We still have it at home," Grace says.

The best things that happened were surprise visits from both Mervin "Porky" Jones and then Major Leroy Norris, who each

happened to be stationed near Raymond for a short time.

Raymond also spent time on Guadalcanal, New Britain and he participated in the invasion of Luzon.

Grace remembers the thrill of a Christmas morning when, although Raymond wrote to her every day, she hadn't had a letter for several weeks. Ray Rush, Mentone's rural mail carrier, found a stack of letters to her from Raymond in the mail Christmas morning and took them to her house before he ate Christmas dinner. "I thought that was special," she says, teary-eyed.

Raymond returned in November, 1945, and they were married five days later. "We lived with my parents about four months," Grace says, "then bought the house on N. Broadway that is still our home."

Raymond returned to work for Max Smith for about two years, worked for Wayne Love about two and one-half years, then bought their present business property and started his own business. "We were in debt for it, with almost no money in the till," he remembers. "It was frightening."

The garage, bought from Tommy Stanford, was an old church building that had originally stood near the present Harold Lucht home. Before Raymond acquired it, it had housed the Wayne Nellans and Bud Todd poultry processing plant.

In 1958, Raymond had Glen Secrist build his present shop. "People thought I was nuts for erecting such a big building," he says. "But, it isn't big at all by today's standards." He remembers the thrill everyone received when Jerry Secrist, helping his dad, fell off the uncompleted building. "But, he wasn't hurt."

Another accident happened when Raymond was working on a Model A Ford. The car slipped off the jack, pinning Raymond's face between the creeper and the car. Ollie Smith lifted the car off him with his bare hands, saving his life. He was taken to Dr. Dan Urschel, who found only a slight concussion and advised him to rest two days. He still bears a scar from that incident.

Raymond went out with the wrecker all hours of the night and in the worst winter weather. "Sometimes there would be snowdrifts as high as the wrecker," he remembers, "and I'd come in with icicles around my face."

Raymond is slowing up these days, but he intends to continue working. "This is his life," Grace explains. Their grandson, Carey, helps him in the garage, now.

Raymond and Grace have two children, Steve, a hog farmer north of town, and Sharon Crievison, who lives in Ohio. They have five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

About Mentone, they say, "It is a great place to raise a family, live and be in business." They have added a great deal to Mentone, to help make it a great place!

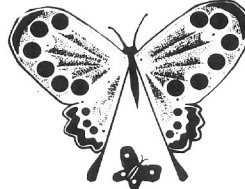

"Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents" ranks fourth in total sales of publications by the U.S. Government Printing Office.

More than two million copies have been sold.

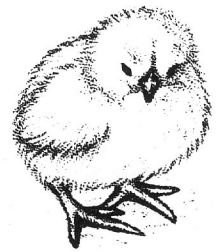

## From the Pastor's Study For Me To Live in Christ

Two priority considerations are: (1) Jesus of Nazareth lived, was crucified and (2) His body wasn't in the tomb when His followers went there on the Jewish Sabbath. Historians raised no serious question about the historicity of Jesus Jewish Historian Josephus wrote, "His disciples then and now believe He was resurrected. Life and death are important to all of us. Persons facing death are the most interested, whether they're old, youth or children. A ten year old boy asked, "What happens when you die? Paul equated life with Christ and believed death was a way to something even better. Some look on life as good and death as bad, other see life as bad and death as something to be grasped. A way to end life by pressing a button, simply and easily was invented by a doctor. Paul insists that both life and death have great possibilities and this is the Christian difference. It's not an abstract consideration for Paul. He's in prison, facing trial and will probably be executed. Paul lived in Christ and Christ in Paul. Death was desirable, not to escape suffering, but because he'd go to live with Jesus. To be alive in Christ is to have a life encounter with him. The simplicity and profoundness of Jesus' teaching impresses most people. To see him only as a teacher and wise, isn't much more than we would do for Shakespeare, Walter Scott or Homer. Only Jesus asks the reader to make a fundamental change in his life. To be alive in Christ means something has happened to me. I know about Jesus. God has spoken to me through a sermon, hymn, scriptures or being called to a different type of life, a life of righteousness. Alive in Christ means I've responded to what I've learned and heard and felt and decided to follow Christ. I am alive in the spirit of Christ. My spirit attended to his spirit. I pray in Jesus' name, about my needs, and dreams and others' needs. Through Jesus, I have hope, I'm lifted out of a spirit of defeat and fear. My spirit's inspired and instructed by the Holy Spirit.

Christ's spirit leads my life in prayer. The scriptures, my source of instruction and information, The Holy Spirit, directs my purposes and goals. The Christ is the body of Christ. Each believer has responsibilities to other believers, determined by recognized spiritual gifts. It means being active in Christian fellowship, where you worship. Alive in Christ means being alive in the body, the church. Resurrection power means "I want to know Christ and the power of His resurrection," (Phillippians 3:10). It says that things are no longer as they were. The women at the tomb, were no longer as they were.

Eight year old Philip, a Downs syndrome child, in a Methodist Sunday School Class of ten students, was excluded from the friendship of the class. One Sunday, before Easter, the teacher gave the class panty hose egg shaped containers, asking them to go outside and find a symbol of new life, put it in the egg and bring them in. Then they'd mix them up and see what they found. It was a wild time, one found a flower, a beautiful butterfly, with oohs and ahhs. One sharp little guy defended his choice, "I knew you'd get flowers, butterflies. I picked a rock, because it's different."

The fourth egg was empty, they protested. Philip said it belonged to him. They said "Oh, Philip, you always mess up." Philip insisted "I did it. It's empty because the tomb is empty." They were silent, from then on Philip was part of the class. He died that summer from an illness that wouldn't have affected a healthier body. At the funeral the class marched forward to the altar and placed on it an empty egg, an old panty hose container. Resurrection Power. Do you need resurrection power in your life?
