

The Democrats won the Sénate seat as Birch Bayh was re-elected, and John Brademas, incumbent Third District Congressman, defeated Will Erwin for the House Congressman, defeated Will Erwin for the House

Elsewhere, it was all Republican and for the first time in eight years, the state will have a Republican gover nor, as well as a full slate of Republican of-

Richard L. Roudebush, Noblesville, was elected to his fifth term in Congress. Representing the Third District, of which Fulton county is now a part, Roudebush has represented three different Congressional districts because of reapportionment.

Thames Mauzy, Ralph Heine, and Arthur Cob-lentz were re-elected, Thames defeating Gary Nordmann, the only Democratic can-didate seeking the off-

Virghia" during the Virginia during the Revolutionary War. He was my great-graet-grand-father. His son, Isaac Fowler, my great-grand-father, served in the War of 1812 at the age war of 1812 at the age of sixteen years. I served in the Army of the www.l in the army of occupation in Germany al-

so.
I have a medal from the U. S. Army for faith-

ful and dedicated ser-vice with five bars for combat in five offen-sives. Also a medal of recognition from my home county of Wabash for faithful and dedicated service in time of war.
Our son, H. K. Fowler,
served 14 months in Korea, was on Heart Break Ridge and Pork Chop Hill the 2nd Infantry with the Division.

My good and faithful wife had three brothers in W. W. I with active combat service in France. All three are long since passed away. Mo-ther also had a brother in WW II, also passed, on. Two of her grandathers were injured in he war of 1861-1865, an uncle in the Phillipines in 1898. Several nephews are now in service , and one served in WW II.

I have an honorable discharge from the U.S. Army as an enlisted man. It states "Character Excellent," No AWOL. That's the kind of life I have lived before our children and what I call



#### **Crowded Calves** Make Poor Mothers

Final unofficial county vote analysis for 1968

Dairy calves forced to compete for space and feed from the day of their birth to six mon-ths of age tend to beome poor mothers.
This is a finding from

a three-year study in Purdue University's deof partments animal partments of animal sciences and psychology. The animals were observed until they became cows and had their first calves.

Miss Sue Donaldson, graduate student, took 36 heifer calves from heifer calves their mothers a hour after birth then raised them half under experimental sys four

tems until the calves were six months old. One group of calves was raised seperately and fed together; the second group was raised together and fed togethtogether and fed together; the third group was raised seperately and fed seperately. The fourth group corresponds to typical management schemes of raising calves on most dairy farms. Cows which had been raised and fed seperately as calves developed the most docile temperaments, were easiest to

Flower centers are thread pompons, and the bowl and leaves are outlined and shaded on the machine with free-motion stitching.

# Stitch A Picture For Holiday Giving

You can be artistic with your sewing machine and create a wall hanging that's handsome enough to give for Christmas or put in the holiday bazaar.

The basic design is done with free-motion machine stitching which requires no attachments. Strips of cotton has tape and fluffy pompons made from cotton thread complete the picture.

tachments Strips of cotton bias tape and fluffy pompons made from cotton thread complete the picture.

To make the hanging, cut two 20 x 21-inch rectangles from cotton homespun. Across the top of these pieces, cut out four 2 x 3-inch sections evenly spaced. These will form loops for the rods.

On right side of one fabric piece, sketch flower arrangement design. The bowl and leaves are outlined and shaded with free-motion stitching.

To adjust your machine for free-stitching, set stitch regulator in neutral position; remove presser foot; and lower feed dog. Clamp fabric in an embroidery hoop, centering portion to be stitched in the hoop.

Each time you begin to sew, draw bobbin thread through fabric. Hold thread ends, lower presser bar and needle into fabric, and then stitch slowly at an even rate while moving hoop back and forth. Coordinate machine speed with movement of hoop. This method allows stitching to be made in any direction—in straight or curved lines.

curved lines.

Flower stems are made from single-fold cotton bias tape. Fold tape in half, wrong sides together, and pin into position. Blind-stitch stems to fabric. Flower petals also are made from single-fold tape. For each petal, cut a 1's-inch strip of tape and press bottom fold out flat. Hold tape horizontally, wrong side towards you, and overlap folded edges to form a cone. Gather bottom raw edges and secure stitches. Arrange five petals at end of each stem to form flower, and sew in place.

Flower pompon centers are made from cotton mercerized thread. One spool makes two centers.

centers.

Before making pompons, cut about 40 inches of thread from spool and fold in half repeatedly for pompon ties. Then slash spool lengthwise with a razor blade, cutting through all layers of thread. Remove thread from spool in one complete section and tie securely

# Sewing For The Bazaar?

Every woman needs a little something to carry a lot of things in, and a roomy cotton tote bag is the answer.

Make one for yourself to find out how easy it is, and then stitch up several for Christmas gifts or bazaar items.

Christmas gifts or bazaar items.

All it takes is a yard-length of any bright, colorful cotton fabric; some cotton cording for a drawstring; and bits of fringe, fabric scraps, and buttons for trimming.

Cut a 15x36 rectangle for the bag. Pold fabric in half, right sides together, and seam on each side. To give the bag a squared-off base, make an inverted tuck at the bottom. Do this by turning the bag inside out, folding the bottom up one inch, and stitching in place.

place.

Make a casing for the draw-string by turning the open end of the bag under about two inches and hemming. Then

make another row of stitching an inch higher to slip the cord

make another row of stitching an inch higher to slip the cord through.

There are dozens of ways to decorate the carry-all bags. For example, add a simple flower design to a bright yellow cotton duck bag by appliquing on red petals and green leaves cut from fabric scraps. Sew on a big white button for the flower center.

Or applique the bag with a design appropriate to its use. Mark a shoe tote, for instance, with a shoe applique cut from contrasting cloth. Appliques are easy to add with a zigaag machine stitch.

On printed cotton totes, keep trims simple. Circle the bag with a single row of thick cotton fringe, flat braid, or jumbo rick-rack.







#### **Farmers Union To Petition** For Major Tax Change

Petitions are being roulated throughout circulated state which call for swithching a major por-tion of public school costs to non-propery, non-propery, taxes, according to Har-old Wright, president of Indiana Farmers Union. Mr. Wright also indicat-ed many other groups had voiced an interest in the effort

The farm leader stated that property taxes in excess of 800 million excess of oou militon dollars was squeezed out of taxpayers in 1968, of which over 60% is being used for the financing of public schools, and that substantial property tax replacement must be made or we will lose the incentive for home and business ownership. Mr. Wright pre--dicted a 40% increase increase in property taxes during the next four years, un-less the method of fin-ancing schools is chang-

Wright indicated Mr. property owners were fed up with lip service to property tax relief and he felt a petition asking for a drastic change in school financing was one way of showing the elected legislators and other state officials of wide-spread support for

The petition calls for a 50% increase in the a 50% increase in the adjusted gross and sales taxes and proportionate increases in corporation taxes, to be used as a appropriation for distribution to schools.

Indiana Farmers Union has historically wanted at least 75% of the to-tal cost of public schto come from tax es other than the sources property tax. The or-ganization claims farmers must pay property taxes at the disparity ratio of 7 to 1 as compared to the average non-farm home owner living the same taxing dis-ict and that farmers trict two major groups of our society that cannot to any extent, incorporate their property taxes into the price of their the price product or and he price of their uct or their labor pass them along to

Souts of Binfiton's Explorer Foct 2146, is being readied for its 1898 trip down the Ohlo and the Mississippt to New Orleans.
Last summer the 3½ ton raft took its crew of 18 Souts and their four adult leaders to Thronville, Tennessee, on the Mississippi — a trip of approximately 600 miles.

An abandoned rock quarry near Bluffton, fooded by rains and seepage, is the testing basin for the 16 by 30 foot craft, on which the Soutie erected the enclosed gallery, storage area and pilot house.

The forty-four 55-gallon drums which provided flotation, are being replaced by steel pontoons, according to Explorer Advisor Mile Thoele, of the news staff of the Bluffton News-Banner.

The twin outboard motors are being replaced by an inhoard power plant, and paddle wheels. And, Thoele said, he hopes to add an LP-gas refrigerator to the galley equipment, which already consists of a full-sized LP-gas kitchen range, including an oven. "Chief" of the galley was Bob Spaulding, a former Navy quartermaster and veteran camp cook, and one of the four adult leaders aboard the Scimitar. The Scimitar, after its "maiden cruise" on the quarry pond, was disassembled and trucked to Marion, Indiana, where it was launched on the Obio.

Ohio.

Next year, said Thoele, it is planned to truck the raft to the Ohio river at Evansville, Indiana. The LP-gas equipment was furnished by the Blue Flame Gas Corporation of Shuffton, which also trucked the Scouts' vessel from Bluffton to Marion, and from Tiptonville back home.

# Earthquake Brings Memories of Past Tremors

Saturday's earthquake evoked memories of past tremors. One of the most nteresting was one that Clancie McSherry, Mentone found in an old history book. It described the found in an out the foot of the Great Earthquake of 1811, which shook the Mississippi valley to its center, vibrated along the courses of the rivers and villages, and passing the center of the Allegnany mountains, died away along the shores away along the shores the Atlantic Ocean. People described hav-

ing seen undulations of the earth that resembled the earth that resembled waves, increasing in elevation as they advanced, and when they had attained a certain height, the earth would burst, and vast volumes

of water and sand and pit coal, would dis-charge as high as the tops of the trees. In the precess lakes were formed, some of which were shallow, others so deep that conoists could see lifeless trees und-

er water.
The noise was describ-The noise was described as being so intense that it frightened man and beast equally. Birds lost all power to fly and retreated to the "bosoms of men, their fellow sufferers in this general convulsion." A bursting of the earth just below the village of New Madrid arrested the mighty Mississippi the mighty Mississippi in its course and caus-ed a reflux of the waves.

The book says, "In the midst of those scenes of terror, all, Catho-lics and Protestants, praying and profane, be-came of one religion and partook of one feel-The cattle much terrified, crowded about the people seeking to demand protection or community of danger."

The people, says the book, had the general impulse to run, but at every step were thrown to the ground.

The people, described as "unlettered backwoodsmen," were unaminous in agreeing that the earth had swallowed men

in agreeing that the earth had swallowed men and houses in chasms that occurred frequently within intervals of half a mile.

The people of the area passed the winter in ane people of the area passed the winter in bark booths and camps, like those of the Indians, of so light a texture as not to expose

the inhabitants to danger in case of their being thrown down. The people along the river had much to eat as many of the boats of provisions were broken unions.

of the boats of provisions were broken up in
the quake and the supplies of bacon, meat,
butter, apples, etc. was
taken by the people.
The general government
passed as act allowing
the inhabitants of the
tountry to locate the
same quantity of lands
that they possessed there
in any part of the terin any part of the ter-ritory where the lands had not yet been covered by any claim. These claims passed into the hands of speculators and were never to any sub-stantial benefit to the possessors.

While Saturday's quake While Saturday's quake bore no resemblance to this one, it was something that had not happened in these parts since 1937. Saturday's quake was felt by many local people and was un-noticed by others.



Leon J. Urben, manager of the Council's Farm Department, estimates that three of four per-sons now killed in tractor upsets could be saved if their tractors were equipped with protective frames or crushresistant cabs and safe-

belts.
Urben suggests buying equipment equipped with the protective frame, using a seat belt, and following these rules: I. Read and be famil-

iar with the instruction manuals for your equipmanu. ment.

2. Keep yourself in good physical and mental condition by getting enough rest, dressing enough rest, dressing comfortably, working at a pace within your physical abilities, and taking mid-morning and midafternoon rest brakes.

1/2 teaspoon salt butterscotch morsels Cream together butter and sugar. Beat in eggs, one at a time, add almond extract, beating until very light and fluffy. Sift in flour and salt, stir until blended. Divide mixture in half. To one half of mixture add semi-sweet chocolate morsels and ½ cup walnut halves. To other half, add butterscotch morsels and remaining walnuts. Spoon chocolate mixture over crumbs in one baking pan, spreading gently to cover. Spoon butterscotch mixture over crumbs in other pan and spread gently. (If one pan is used, spread chocolate mixture over one half of crumbs and butterscotch over other half.) Sprinkle tops with remaining crumb mixture, pressing in lightly. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) 35 to 40 minutes. Cool. Cut in 1¼-inch squares.

The Federal Aviation Administration, saying \$17.1 million will be needed for new or improved airports for use by scheduled airlines and general aviation, and \$19.8 million for airports used by general aviation only, has recommended construction of 18 new airports in Indiana and improvement of 58 others within the next five years at an estimated cost of about \$37 million.

New airport construction projects included in the FAS's 1968 revision of its five-year National Airport Plan

are:
Columbia City, Crown
Point, Decatur, Elwood,
Greensburg, Hobart, Indianapolis, Jeffersonville, Lawrenceburg-Aurora, Lebanon, Linton,

Cost extimates for individual construction projects were not given.
