Christmas Mail Deadlines **Listed By Post Office**

The suggested deadlines for mail to all members of the Armed Forces ov-erseas are as follows: Parcels weighing more an five pounds sent surface postage rathan

SAM Parcels up to 5 pounds in weight and 60 inches in length and girth combined, plus letters and greeting cards sent at surface rates. These go by air on a space available basis. air on a

peadline is Nov. 22.
PAL Parcels, regular parcel post rate plus a flat charge of \$1 for air service on a space air service on a speak available basis, parcels up to 30 pounds and 60 length and length girth conbined. Nov. 29

AIR MAIL parcels and

air mail greeting cards deadline is December 13 TIME OF MAILING: The importance of mailing Christmas parcels before the designated deadline cannot be emphasized too strongly, the earlier the better. If mailed by the deadlines indicated the public can be reasonably assured that parcels will reach their destinations before

Christmas. SIZE AND WEIGHT: The maximum size and weight limits for surface parcel post and air parcel post vary according to Military Post Office to which the parcels are



Perennial Posies From Fabrics

For perennial posies that bloom all year long, try your hand at making flowers from colorful cotton fabrics.

Make a set for your own table, for gifts, or for the holiday bazaar. Use the same fabrics in one bouquet, or vary them with a mixture of calicostons.

The same of the simplest designs a fullip. For a striking effect, use striped black and white pique for the outer petals and solid white pique for the inside.

To form the basic sevenpetaled flower, start by cutting a 5x10-inch rectangle from
each fabric. These are to be
glued together—print side out



Join fabric and interfacing

product—a web of fibers on
transfer paper that fuses materials together with the aid



According to the National Cotton Council, the trick is to make simple items ... then apply cotton rick rack in imaginative new ways. Take placemats, for example. Cut simple rectangle shapes from bold-striped cotton denim or sailcloth, allowing a half-yard of fabric for each mat. Play up the stripes by stitching on rows of rick rack in varying sizes and contrasting colors.


Apply the rick rack rows directly to the stripes, using jumbo size trim on the widest stripes and medium-size on smaller stripes.



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

Hoosiers' concern with education is revealed

Nine of ten persons think seveducation in the schools is desirable, one of three feel that prayer should be allow-ed in school despite the Supreme Court ruling, and two of three believe and two of three befreve that the people them-selves rather than their elected representatives should decide on taxes for schools, according to a recent survey in southeastern Indiana.

Students at Indiana University Southeast at Jeffersonville also discovered that teachers (96 percent) speak out loud and clear in their belief that the school curriculum should in-teaching of clude the moral and humanistic values—and the belief was echoed by 89 percent of the students and 86 percent of the other adults.

It is absolutely necessary that all articles for overseas delivery be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fiberboard, or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. Boxes should contain sufficient cushioning materials othat the contents will be tightly packed to prevent any rattling or loosening of the articles within the parcels. It is also desirable that all fiberboard boxes be securely wrapped in heavy paper. Each box should be well tied with strong cord.







OLDEST DRUGSTORE CASH REGISTER? When Mr. and OLDEST DRUGSTORE CASH REGISTER? When Mr. and Mrs. Glen Denton, Mentone, purchased their drugstore 25 years ago today from C. W. Shafer they found the old cash register pictured above. The unusual cash register is wooden and has two drawers that opened toward the clerk's side of the counter. One of these was a cash drawer that rang a bell when it was opened. The other drawer had a row of six company to the counter of the co ened. The other drawer had a row of six compartments, one for each denomination of American coins and one for dollars. On the top was a row of six holes, each connected to one of the compartments in the drawer below. A box of marbels was kept close by but out of reach of the customers. When a sale was made, the correct number of marbles was dropped in the proper holes. A 90c sale would be "rung up" by dropping one marble each in the 50c, 25c, 10c and 5c holes and placing the 90c in the cash drawer. At the end of the day it was necessary to count the marbels in each compartnecessary to count the marbels in each compart-ment, multiply the coin amount and add for the total of the day's business."







AN ORDINANCE REGULATING TRAFFIC, ESTABLISHING A FOUR-STORM OF THE RESECTION IN A HE WAY STOP INTERSECTION IN A HE PROVIDING PENALTY FOR VIO-LATION THEIROF, AND PROVID-ING THE TIME WHEN THE SAME STILLE TAKE EFFECT.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Mentone, Indiana:

SECTION 1.

That the intersection of High and Morkan Streets be and the same is hereby declared to be a four-way stop for all vehicles in all directions of traffic approaching said intersection.

SECTION 2.

That it shall be unlawf₁₁ from and after the passage, according to law, for any vehicle approaching said intersection either upon High Street or upon Morgan Street to proceed into and through said intersection without first coming to a full stop prior to entering said intersection.

That suitable signs designating said intersection as a four-way stop intersection shall be erected upon the approaches to said intersection so as perating a motor vehicle into add intersection.

SECTION 4.

Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, he fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars for each offense.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect, from and after its passage according to law.







ORDINANCE REGULATING FIG. ESTABLISHING A FOUR-TRAFFIC, ESTABLISHING A FOUR-WAY STOP INTERSISTION IN AHR TOWN OF MENTONE, INDIANA, PROVIDING PENALITY FOR VIO-LATION THEREOF, AND PROVID-ING THE TIME WHEN THE SAME SHALL TAKE EFFECT.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Mentone, Indiana:

SECTION 1.

That the intersection of High and Morgan Streets be and the same is hereby declared to be a four-way stop for all vehicles in all directions or traffic approaching said intersection.

That it shall be unlawful from and after the passage, according to law, for any vehicle approaching sald intersection either upon High Street or upon Morgan Street to proceed into and through said intersection without first coming to a full stop prior to entering said intersection.
