



Kauffmans Report From Africa

Gordon Kauffman, a former Mentone teacher now living with his family in Choma, Zambia, Africa, writes that the cost of living is high there. For instance:

"Potatoes are 24 cents a pound, eggs 7½ cents each, corn flakes \$1 a box and dressed chicken 95 cents a pound. Other 95 cents a pound. Other items are expensive, such as gas at \$1.20 per U.S. gallon; a four-door Fiat at \$5,000; a wringer washer \$900 and shirts \$12 each. A short wave radio that would be nice for listonian to world news tening to world news could cost \$75-\$120 and one has to buy a license to listen to any radio. Ice cream freezers cost between \$60 and Anyone who complains about prices in the U.S. and who thinks merchandise is inferior ought to come here. It really doesn't take very long doesn't to see how no nice Ameri-

Wages for the Zambi-

ans are very low, but beggars are also few. A common construction laborer makes about \$1. 30 per day and a mason makes \$1.50 per day. Many people have left the farming villages to seek fortune in the cities. However, the often disappointed However, they are cause there are not e-nough jobs and the gov-ernment would like for them to return to farm-ing. The land is generally fertile and with a little clearing of the bush could be a "gold mine" for people. Any-one with a bit of "Yan-kee ingenuity" could do very well growing maize,

tobacco or cotton. Many people in rural areas are content to grow on-ly enough food for their immediate family needs although they could sell additional quantities. As a result, they don't need to worry about thieves stealing their possessions. Europeans who have taken advant-age of their skills, be they farming or other-

people

they farming or other-wise, have plenty of money and they also have dogs to guard their pro-perty. If they own Peu-geotcars they frequent-ly need to take someone along who can remain along who can remain with the car while they go shopping, especially if they go to Lusaka. Thieves there are very clever and Peugeots get ripped off.

.."Only one person in 21 has any person in his family who ever used credit. This boy's father had purchased fertilizer on credit. I about blew their minds when I showed them cred-

it cards.
"The children are adjusting to school quite well. They have really discipline. One boy got shambucked (whipped) for events where an admission is charge having lint in his hair. Others regularly receive raps on the knuckles with a stick for missing exercises. exercises in homework.

"Only about 70 percent of all children ever enter school and only 20 percent go on to secondary school. After another three years, another test is given and only 40 percent of the students go on to complete 12 years of school.



nove will have to content them-selves to basking in the sunlight that filters through the filigree of the wire enslosure of their loft, because if they were turned loose, they would eventually make their way back to West Virginia. West Virginia.

The homing instinct is so strong in these birds that 70 to 80 per cent of those he releases

eventually return. While it took one bird three months to fly 135 miles, one he gave to a friend near the Atlantic Ocean returned to West Virginia in two days. The pigeons can average 40 to 60 mph with a good tail wind, but the one he considers his best flew 500 miles in one day. Such a pigeon is scarce, but, like the others that made the move, this one will not be given the opportunity to repeat its feat.

Kevin has worked with pigeons for three years, forming some definite likes and dislikes in forming some definite likes and dislikes in that time. For instance, he does not like white pigeons because they cannot fly as well as the others and hawks find them easy prey.

Racing pigeons can cost anywhere from one to \$18,000 and in a successful season one bird can earn its owner as

can earn its owner as much as \$1,600. None of Kevin's 16 pigeons fall into the high-priced category, and the only pedigreed one he owned was killed before he moved.

Raising most of his own birds, Kevin starts own birds, Kevin starts their training as soon as they leave the nest. Learing to "trap in" is their first order of instruction. The trap is a one-way door on the side of the loft that permits them to reenter. After they have learned to operate the trap, they are taken a to operate the ey are taken a m home and retrap, they are taken a mile from home and re-leased, then five miles on two different occasions. Advancing to 15 miles and then 25 miles, they have the distance reduced to 15 and then increased to 50, 75 and back to 50 and then to


100. It's pretty much up to the bird to set his flight speed, but some inducement can be made by racing one of a nesting pair. The male and female traditionally alternate sitting on their sees. their eggs, and although the one that remains will continue to do so, the one that is flying knows when it is his turn to be there and flies as fast as possible so he can relieve his mate.

Kevin has yet to find any pigeon fanciers in the area and, therefore, has been unable to race his birds here. He describes the races in West Virginia as a lot of fun. Each fancier had a box clock and was given rubber hands to put en rubber bands to put on his pigeon's feet. The pigeons, as many as 200 at a time, were put on trucks and taken to a station for release. The man releasing the birds called in the time and weather conditions.
As soon as the bird
trapped in, the owner
took off the rubber band and put it in the clock box, automatically starting it. He then starting it. He then took it to the clubhouse for verification. It didn't matter which bird came in first, the important thing was the speed with which it made the trip from the release to its trap, a distance calculated to the inch. the inch.

Lacking races to at-Lacking races to attend, Kevin is currently concentrating on training the two birds he hatched this year and has already taken them five miles from home, and he's even had some drop-in visitors, pigeons from other states that trapped in with his. his.

Ruth Richardson Honored By FCHS

Souvenir spoons de-leting the Fulton Co. picting the Fulton Co. courthouse and the Round sourthouse and the Round Barn Festival were pre-sented to Ruth Richard-son, who is retiring as treasurer of the Fulton Co. Historical Society after ten years, at a recent dinner meeting.

Attending the banquet were 29 members of the FCHS who saw a program of slides of historic Fulton Co. sites from Gilbert Enyart's collection, shown by Shirley Willard and a set of in-fra red aerial slides taken by Bruce Hess in an attempt an attempt to detect iron ore at the exact an attempt iron ore at the exact site of Moore's Iron Works, a foundry operated at the north edge of Rochester on Mill Creek from 1839-46 when it was moved to the banks of the Tippecanoe River near the crossing of the Michigan Road. It continued there until 1854 or 55.

Hess also showed the Indian medal found on the banks of Chippewanuck, which means Chippewa burial ground. The medal was given to Jane Miller by her grandfather, Omar B. grandfather, Omar B. Smith, and is the only one in Indiana. It was presented by George III, King of England, to the Pottawatomi Indians for defeating the Chippewas in a battle thought to have been waged in 1800.

have been waged in 1800. Hess described the Trail of Death procession when the Indians were marched at gum point from Fulton Co. to Kansas in 1838. He said Army officers on horse-back led the procession, followed by Pottawatomichiefs in a wagon, then the Indians in single file--approximately 850 of them--and then the supply wagons and finally, a sick wagon for ly, a sick wagon for those who fell by the those who rell by the roadside. The latter had a tarp over the top and was like an oven, making the ill feel even sicker. Over 150 Indians died on this forced march.

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News Of Interest To Homemakers

What nicer Christmas gift could there be than what inter thristmas gift could there be than something you baked in your kitchen. It means so much to get a gift that you know the giver made especially for you. And since most baked products can be frozen, they can be made weeks ahead of time. It is so easy to go out and buy a present; this year take the time to put a little bit of yourself into each gift. Holiday nut breads are especially nice for gift giving since they can be baked in unusual shapes and sizes. Quick breads.

shapes and sizes. Quick breads are exactly what their name implies -quick. Yeast bread must be kneaded and al-

dust be kneaded and allowed to rise but quick breads don't. Baking powder and baking soda provide the leavening agent for quick breads so all you have to do is stir them up.

There are several important principles involved in preparing a good quality product. As with any recipe, follow it very carefully. When the dry ingredients are added stir just enough to moisten the flour. Over mixing causes large air tunnels, poor texture, and small volume. flour. Over mixing causes large air tun-nels, poor texture, and small volume. Be sure and grease the pan for

easy removal. After pouring the batter into the pan allow it to rest fifteen minutes before putting it into the oven. This gives the baking soda and powder time to begin working. After baking allow the bread to cool on a wire rack for ten minutes then remove from the pan and remove from the pan and continue cooling. You will find that nut breads cut better after twenty-four hours. Or freeze them for unexpected guests during the pected gue holidays. ected guests during the

Nut breads can be baked in loaf pans, co-ffee cans, juice and soup cans. Be sure to oil the cans well so that the bread will be easy to remove. Always cool them completely cool them completely out of the can or pan to prevent a steamed soggy product. To de-corate nut breads for corate nut breads for gift giving dribble some icing over the top and add some quartered red and green margarity and green maraschino cherries.

As if sus-pended in glass, the stones, polished and of similar sizes and shapes, reveal their true colors and textures, providing an interesting back-ground in the table top.

The tops, which are heavy, require care and patience. He first makes patience. He first makes a form, using heavy glass for the smooth, solid base and any material that the plastic will not easily adhere to for the sides. Into this form is poured a layer of casting plastic. After it has hardened, the stones are arranged in

and topped by a second, thicker layer of plastic. As soon as this layer has hardened, the forms and glass are removed, and the top is ready for use although the bottom may have to be smoothed a bit.

The casting plastic can be used to form ashtrays and coasters, and the stones can be re-placed by seeds or oth-er small objects.







want to hurry the transfer and would probably wait a few weeks before making it.

The agenda for the slightly less than two-hour meeting contained only nine items, but the one alloted for audience filled most of the time.

Phyllis Gearhart, president of the Tippecanoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association (TVCTA), thanked the board for having met with teachers Monday. She said they felt any difficulty experienced was caused by lack of communication and thought the meeting had been a step towards bridging the gap. Indicating the teachers had been asked to consider having another election to determine their bargaining unit, she said they had not reached an agreement yet as all of the teachers could not be contacted. She asked an extension of at least one week and said she would notify the board later as the decision, closing her remarks by saying, "We just want to do what is fair and honest."

fair and honest.

Steven Utter, now a senior at Rochester High School, asked for a transfer from TVSC to Rochester in order to finish his senior year there. Utter, who will graduate at the end of the first semester, has attended Rochester on a transfer for three years and has been active in FFA. He expressed a desire to complete the program there in order to be eligible for a degree in dairy. After some hesitation about whether the newly formed FFA chapter has a charter and whether advanced dairy is offered this year, the first TVSC has had vocational agriculture, members unanimously voted to grant his transfer.

In reply to Doug Mappin's question concerning plans for a fulltime guidance director at the new school, Forbes said he felt something should be done to give all students a guidance person now. Determining there really was no guidance person at the south campus inasmuch as Forst Dunnuck is principal of the new school and is seldom at Akron and because Dean Rager, grade school principal with more than 900 students to supervise in two buildings and five relocatable classrooms, is too busy, members approved reassigning George Welch as halftime guidance director at the south campus. Currently working at the north campus, he was principal of the Talma school and is a fully qualified guidance person, according to Forbes.

Steve Fleck apologized for losing his temper at the last meeting and asked the board to apologize to him for "making him lose his

temper by smarting back." McKee told Fleck a letter he had written to the NEWS did not indicate he was willing to make amends. Fleck protested he had since changed his mind but agreed it was "probably best the subject be dropped."

Jeff Morris questioned the lack of a school nurse. Forbes said so far there has been little need for one although there is still money appropriated for a parttime nurse. He said hearing tests were given by the speech and hearing therapit, innoculations by a county health nurse and examinations by doctors. Morris said the school he formerly attended in Lafayette had two guidance directors and a full-time nurse for an enrollment of 500. Forbes said his school was also at the top of its tax rate and was verging on bankruptcy. He added, "I just haven't had that much demand for a nurse." Board member Richard Goshert said a rough estimate was that with a half-time nurse only 12 to 15 per cent of the students would be benefited and that perhaps when the new school is completed "we can"

is completed "we can look at it differently."
Mark Swick's questions also pertained to a school nurse, and he was told nurses are mostly limited to giving first aid. Forbes, said all the coaches are qualified to give first aid as well as the principals who had been coaches. One parent suggested it might be wise if all teachers were given first aid training.

Forb-es replied, "A teacher es replied, "A teacher textbook committee reads the books which are given to them by Mrs. Bech-tol (Merdena Bechtol, corporation reading ed-ucation specialist) and then votes on the books to be used." He said he had heard of instances of later editions not being the same as first ones of a particular series and that at one time he read a corporation literature book and found 86 phrases that he felt could have been left out. He said there is always a question of what constitutes profanity and always a possibility of a legal hassle if much censorship is imposed. As an example of the former, he asked, "Is 'My God' a prayer or is in profanity?" Mrs. Roberts said she felt rules pertaining to text books should be more stringent than those applying to lithrary books since one was required reading and the other was elective.

Turning to the rest of the agenda, the board approved a revised contract for David Creighton for \$9,765, which Forbes described as being what the principals felt was "the thing to do." No other explanation was made.

Transfer of appropriations between accounts was approved, and tentative plans were made for board members to visit corporation schools Wednesday. Dr. McKee requested a list of those claims turned in by the time the board members received their advance agenda be included so they could have time to study them prior to the meeting.

After the meeting ad-

After the meeting adjourned, board members went into the second executive session of the night, the first having preceded the public meeting.

The next meeting will be Dedember 16 at 7:30 p.m. in the superintendent's office, Farmers State Bank building, Mentone.



Persimmons, as tradi-tional in Indiana as basketball or new-mown hay, are the basic in-gredients in Darlene Bolinger's favorite recipes, and when she pre-pares persimmon pudding or persimmon bread, she or persimmon bread, she never has to wonder if anyone will eat it. Husband Jerry and her four children from a previous marriage love every bite, and on holidays, when his four children join them. she always your them, she always serves one of their fav-orites, either freshly baked or prepared ahead of time and frozen.

Although persimmons grow in this area, the Bolingers do not have a tree and usually obtain their yearly supply on visits to Jerry's parents near Coalmont in Clay County. Persimmon trees flourish there in an area dotted with strip mines and provide easy

an area dotted with strip mines and provide easy picking, often growing at the edge of the road. The Bolingers' most recent trip in early November netted them two five-gallon buckets of the fruit, sweet if ripe but guaranteed to give the eater a permanent

the fruit, sweet if ripe but guaranteed to give the eater a permanent pucker if picked green. Persimmons are very seedy, and the Bolingers have discovered the seeds each contain tiny silverware-shaped centers, some having forks, others spoons or knives. Darlene Bolinger prepares all the persimmons in a day, making pudding and bread with some of the fruit and freezing pulp from the rest in one cup packages. The pulp, which she obtains by putting the fruit through a food mill to separate skins and seeds, will thaw within an hour, a boon since she works fulltime in the family business and has little free time. Unexpected guests or the need for iness and has little free time. Unexpected guests or the need for a dessert for a carryin supper are easily handled since the rest of the ingredients are basics with which most hitches are stocked. kitchens are stocked.

And for those holiday meals ahead when all meals ahead when all eight children will be there? She's already anticipating these, and puddings and bread will join packages of persimmon pulp in her freezer.

SINCE THE DAWN OF HISTORY MAN HAS CONSIDERED THE WELFARE OF HIS SOUL

When the curtain first rises upon the stage of history in the valley of the Nile we find there a civilization venerable with age—a civilization already far advanced in the arts and sciences, and much of this culture may be directly or indirectly traced to their religion. 

NIPSCO asks rate hike

Northern Indiana Pub-lic Service Company fil-ed a petition Friday with the Public Service Commission of Indiana asking to increase rates to a majority of its residential customers between nine and 12 per cent, depending upon usage.

Under the proposed increase, a residential customer who uses 500 kilowatt hours of electricity per month will experience an increase of about \$1.90 per of about s month, and rates for small industrial and commercial users would increase about 14 per cent while those for industrial power customers would go up about 33 per cent. The overall in-crease requested by the utility will average 26 per cent.

In making the announcement, Dean Mitchell, NIPSCO chairman and nifecto chairman and chief executive officer, said "The cost of pro-viding service to our more than 334,000 elec-tric customer has risen at an alarming rate and is threatening our ability to continue to pro-vide the electric ener-gy needs of industry and the people living and working here in the norof third




