it as a delicacy on her table. Most people kept four cows from which to get milk and have plenty of cream and butter for mashed potatoes, even cream gravy. No one dieted. We had a milk dieted. We had a milk house with a long wooden trough along one side in which we placed gal-lon crocks of milk for the cream to rise. Ev-erything was washed and scoured. The crock lids were scoured with ashes because we had no other scouring powder. They were maple wood and white and clean. My old potato masher rolling pin and the butter paddle Grandfather fashiondle Grandfather fashion-ed on a lathe are maple too. The cream from some Jersey cows was thick enough to roll back off the milk, but most of the cream had to be skimmed off with a dipper. It was plac-ed in a tall jar to be churned after it reachdegree of ed the right sourness to make good butter. Grandma always knew just when to churn. She took care of the cream, but WE did the turning of the crank. You can't churn very fast or the dasher or blade of the churn will flop all the cream cut flop all the cream out on the floor. Our churn was called a bentwood churn. The bottom and two sides were of one piece of lumber bent to make the churn round on the bottom. It takes about 20 minutes until butter comes, then it is taken out of the butit termilk and placed in a big wooden butter board and washed. Some people didn't wash their butter but Grandma had special customers for her butter and it was very good and very clean. She didn't use a butter print but made it into rolls with her butter paddle. paddle. The churn was such a good place to hide und-er when we played hide and seek, especially when Grandma threw a table cover over it to hang down all around. One day I decided to hide there, not realizing the churn was being scalded. It had to be scalded and cooled with cold water so the but-ter wouldn't stick to ter wouldn't stick to it. The other half of WE decided it would be a good joke to open the stopper and let all the hot water out as I crawled between the less crawled between the legs of the churn. It wasn't as bad as it might have been. The water had cooled somewhat and it didn't go through all my winter clothes, but can remember the cooling sensation when Grandma put cool soda packs on the blisters. I had scars in places for a long time.

There is nothing bet-ter than a tall glass of buttermilk with some flecks of butter on top when one has spent the morning hoeing in the garden or mowing fence corners.
