#### New program designed to stop hardwood thefts

A new program to com-t the theft of high-lue hardwood trees value has been implemented, according to the Indiana Department of Natural Resources.

Resources.
Joseph D. Cloud, Department Director, explained that the prothe pro "Indipartment Director, ex-plained that the pro-gram, called the "Indi-ana Timber Theft Alert Program," is a coopera-tive effort among volun-teers from the timberteers from the timber-using industries, state and county enforcement agencies, the Department of Natural Resources and the Extension Service.

When a timber theft is secretained, the person iscovering it should discovering it should contact either the State Police, the county sheriff or the local conservation office. The enforcement agency contacted will then assign a volunteer from the timber-using industry to make an on-the-site investigation of theft and make a des-cription of logs stolen based on evidence at the site.

The description of the cut trees and logs stolen will be relayed to the Division of Forestry of the Indiana De-partment of Natural Resources, which in turn will relay this infor-mation to all potential buyers of these logs in Indiana and surrounding states. The potential buyers will be asked to buyers with investigating enforcement agency if they locate suspect

State Forester Datena said that because each tree grows under different environmental conditions and has its own generic characteristics, the logs cut from these trees can be i-dentified just as an in-dividual is identified by his finger prints.

"It is important for the landowner to know where his high-value where his high-value trees are located and trees are located and to periodically check on these trees," Cloud said. "One landowner can be a good neighbor to another if he would alert his neighbor to



any suspicious logging activity within the ar-ea. This is especially true if the neighboring farm has an absentee owner."

The Indiana Tree Farm Committee and the Indi-ana Hardwood Lumberman's Association in cooperawith the Division tion of Forestry of the In-diana Department of Nat-

due University Cooperating Extension Service, the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, the U.S. Forest Service, the Fine Forest Service, the Fine Hardwoods-American Wal-nut Association, and the American Forest Insti-tute, will soon be pub-lishing a brochure en-titled "The Problems of Timber Theft" and what landowners can do to prevent the problem and what to do if a theft occurs.



Tips on turkey preparation By Patricia Braman Home Extension Agent



purchased the You've purchased the big bird, so now you ask yourself what you're going to do with it. Don't despeir. You now get to prepare it for the big feast.

First, the turkey must be the word.

First, the turkey must be thawed. Thaw the bird in its original wrapping on a tray in the refrigerator for two to four days. For more rapid thawing, place the bird in its original wrapper in cool water. Change the water frequently until the water. Change the water frequently until the turkey is just pliable enough to handle. This will take approximately one to three hours for small birds and six to eight hours for large ones.

Never allow the turkey to stand in water after thawing. Refrigerate or cook it immediately. It is also an unsafe practice to thaw your turkey in the oven with the pilot light or in a 200° oven. It is not necessary to they comm-200° oven. It is not necessary to thaw commercially frozen stuffed The only reason unstuffed turkeys are thawed is to remove the giblets and neck from the body cavity. Turkeys may be roasted

with or without stuff-ing. If not stuffed. ing. If not stuffed, rub salt generously in the body cavity, about 1/8 tsp per pound. An unstuffed turkey requires about ½ less quires about roasting time as compared to stuffed.

For stuffed turkeys, allow ½ cup stuffing per pound of purchased weight. The bird should be stuffed loosely due to allow for the expansion of the stuffing. Home stuffed turkeys should be roasted immediately to avoid bacteria growth. Do not store it overnight in the refrigerator with your stuffing in.

up. Insert a meat thermometer in the stuffing mometer in the stuffing or in the thigh. The exact cooking time will vary with the size of the bird, temperature of turkey at beginning of cooking, size of oven, accuracy of oven temperature regulator, whether turkey is stuffed or unstuffed, covered or uncovered. When the turkey is done the ther-mometer will register 180° to 185°F in the inner thigh or 165°F in the stuffing. Roast at 350°F.

To prevent over browning and drying out, cover the bird partly with aluminum foil when the thermometer reaches 150° or if the turkey begins to get too brown. Place the turkey on a warm the turkey on a warm platter and allow it to stand 20-30 minutes to aid in carving.







# Indiana farms had \$2.6 billion in 1974 sales, census report shows

Indiana farms sold almost \$2.6 billion worth of agricultural products in 1974 compared with \$1.4 billion in 1969, according to a prelimi-nary report of the 1974 Census of Agriculture released this week by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce. Total production expenses were \$1.7 billion in 1974 and \$1.0 billion in 1969.

There were 92,349 farms in Indiana in 1974 occupying about 72 percent of the state's total land area. Places of less than 10 acres were counted as farms if sales of agricultural products amounted to or normally would amount to at least \$250. The value of sales from crops, including nursery products and hay, almost tripled between 1969 and 1974, increasing from \$557 million, to \$1.5 billion, lion to \$1.5 billion, while sales of live-stock, poultry and their products acounted for \$1.0 billion of 1974 sales, rising almost \$225 million from 1969.

The average size of an Indiana farm increased from 173 acres in 1969 to 180 acres in 1974, while the number of while the number of farms with 500 acres or more rose from 5,931 to 

land on which corn was harvested for grain in-

number of acres rose from 4.4 to 5.0 million, but output dropped from 430 to 362 million bushels, and the total of farms harvesting corn for grain declined from 63,000 to 59,000.

The number of farms harvesting wheat de-creased from 39,000 to creased from 39,000 to 37,000, while acreage rose from 830,000 to 1.2 million, and production jumped from 32 to 43 million bushels. Fewer farms harvested soybeans in 1974-51,000 versus in 1974-51,000 versus 53,000--but soybean ac-reage rose from 3.1 to 3.7 million. The total number of farms harvest-ing oats fell from 17,-000 to 11,000 and the amount of land on which oats were harvested was recued from 277,000 to 156,000 acres.

and calves increased from 1,794,000 to 1,810-000 with beef cow inven-000 with beef cow inventories growing from 661,000 to 751,000 head and milk cows declining from 227,000 to 202,000 head. The number of farms with cattle and calves dropped from 52,000 to 48,000. Fewer farms raised hogs-24,000 versus 35,000-and hog inventories deand hog inventories de-creased from 4.4 to 3.3

The number of farms raising sheep fell from 10,000 to 6,000 and sheep inventories were cut from 283,000 to 156,000. Fewer farms had laying hens--9,000 versus 11,-000--but inventories of hens and pullets of laying age increased from 11 to 13 million birds.

The number of full owner-operated farms deowner-operated farms decreased from 64,000 to 59,000, while the number of part owner-operator farms dropped from 24,700 to 24,300. Tenant-operated farms declined from 12,000 to 9,000. The average age of farm operators increased from 49.8 to 50.6 years. Almost 45

The number of cattle percent of all farm operators reported that farming was not their principal occupation.

Data for farms with sales of \$2,500 or more are shown for both 1974 and 1969 in the report. There were 70,175 of these farms in Indiana in 1974 and they represented 76 percent of all farms. Moreover, these farms accounted for 99 percent of the value of agricultural products sold and averaged \$36,sold and averaged \$36,-139 in sales. This com-pares with 67,264 of these farms in 1969 with an average of \$20,218

Dear Editor, The Trail of Death commemoration which began here Sept. 4 was completed with a commemoration Nov. 4 at Paola, Kansas, right on schedule at 3:30 p.m., the exact time the Potawatomies arrived there according to the diary kept by Jesse C. Doug-las, the enrolling ato the diary gent.

The Fulton County Historical Society wrote to all the counties from here to Kansas last sp-ring, telling them of ring, telling them of our plans to commemorate and inviting them to take part. Sister M. Charles McGrath, presi-dent of the Paola Bicentennial committee, answered and expressed great interest. We told her of the documents and historical records here in Indiana. She told us of the Potawatomies as and what they after they arrived Kansas did

The authentic part of the whole thing was having the Potawa-tomi Indians from the part of northern part of Kansas descendents of those who made the trip in 1838, come to take part in the event. There was one who can remember his grandfather telling him about the trip, a little boy who remember-ed crossing a big river-and riding in a wagon. Eighteen Indians, men, romen and children, from was one who can remember

women and children, from the Indian reservation in northeast Kansas came to Paola Nov. 4 at the invitation of the Paola Bicentennial committee and followed a wagon trail to Osawa-tomie, where they were met by people at that town near the site of their original crossing of the Osage river. Originally they follow-Bull Creek to Osage and then to Potawatomie Creek, where they ended their two-month-long trek, called the Trail of Death because of the large number lost by death and sickness on their way from Indiana.

Arriving in Osawatomie, the group was taken to the city auditorium where a short program commemorated the event. The Rev. Thomas Bowdern of Kansas City, representing the "blacksenting the "black-robes", missionaries who robes" missionaries who established a mission for the Potawatomies near the present site of the city of Osawatomie, gave the opening prayer. Sister McGrath gave the history of the Trail of Death and the Methodist and Catholic missions to the Indians. The Potawatomi presented a program of song and dance. established ed a pro and dance.

Pictures of the Indians riding horses and wagons into town were printed in the Paola newspaper, along with an account of how the an account of how the residents of Fulton County and Rochester, Ind-iana. began the event





# Indiana in danger of losing local school control, says IAPSS offical

Citizens of Indiana are in danger of losing control of their local public school systems, according to Dr. Charles E. Fields, executive secretary of the Indiana Association of Public School Superintendents School Superintendents (IAPSS).

(IAPSS).

In making this statement Monday, Dr. Fields said the warning note was sounded in anticipation of the strong push to expand the collective bargaining process that will be made by school employee lobving groups during the

by school employee lob-bying groups during the 1977 General Assembly. Dr. Fields said eff-orts were made in this direction throughout the 1976 Indiana General Assembly when House Bill 1395 was introduced. The legislation called for mandated bargaining of "fringe benefits; procedures for the promotion, demotion, trans-fer, assignment and refer, assignment and re-tention of employees; school calendar; class size; pupil-teacher ratio; curriculum develop-

ment and revision, preparation time, extra
curricular activities,

and general working conditions."

Dr. Fields said, "This
bill passed the House of
Representatives by the
vote of 65-30, but, fortunately for the people
in Indiana, died in the
Senate Education Committee. Unfortunately, tee. Unfortunately, however, similar legislation will be introduced during the 1977 session."

"National and state school employee groups have pushed hard for legislation that will expand the scope of colexpand the scope of col-lective bargaining, be-cause such legislative action is in line with their major objective of 'self-governance.'" he said. "This concept basically calls for 'self-governance. ne said. "This concept basically calls for teacher (professional) control of our public school systems and would seriously erode public control." He added, "Self-governance means 'professional (or teach-'professional (or teach-er) governance."

The executive secretary said IAPSS believes staff members should have input into the areas that will effect their ability to carry out their responsibili-ties as school employ-ees. He said, "The pre-sent collective bargain-ing law (Public Les 217) ing law (Public Law 217) provides for such input through the 'discussible' process. All of the areas cited, with the exception of agency shop, are, under the present law, mandated areas for discussion be-tween local teacher groups and local school officials. They are not, however, mandated as bargainable items."
He continued, "Local

He continued, "Local school boards must re-tain the final decision making authority and de-termine whether or not they will bargain over these important areas. If the public is to re-tain control of the educational process in Indiana, this is absolutely essential."

Fields stated, "School board members are elected or appointed representatives of the peo-ple; they must have the authority to act on behalf of the citizens of each local school comeach local school com-munity. Local public control of our schools is the keystone of the American public school system."

"School officials have voiced their opposition to this erosion of public control for many years. Their unified voice in opposition has not, however, been loud enough to hold back the forces lobbying for ex-pansion of the collectpansion of the collective bargaining process for school employees. The general public must become concerned and vocal in opposition to expansion of that process," Fields said.
