The purpose of "Town Meeting Indiana" is to bring people together to think positively about their community and its needs.

During the meeting, participants will be asked to list some of Mentone's accomplishments, and then to list their hopes for Mentone in the next five to ten years.

The group will then meet to discuss the problems blocking the fulfillment of these dreams in terms of economic, political, and cultural issues.

It is hoped that this meeting will get the people of Mentone together to work out problems concerning them.

ICA will prepare a document after the meeting, summarizing the ideas, goals, and solutions, and will then distribute them to the participants.

More than 4,000 Hoosiers have already attended "Town Meetings". Governor Bowen, U.S. Senators, Congressmen, corporations, teachers, and common folk have all expressed support for these town meetings.





As a group, these nations pay less than one-sixteenth the amount contributed by U.S. tax-payers. Yet, they make up a maj-ority of the votes in the UN General Assembly." Mrs. Troutman adds that "this is only the tip of the iceberg. Besides the regular budget, there are also separate budgets for a number of UN agencies. Most of our contributions to the United Nations go

to help finance these separate budgets. In fact, during the two year period of 1976 and 1977, we gave the United Nations a cool \$1 billion, which was about 40 percent of total UN spending." -Rachel Templeton



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How about those apples?!

Welcome to the Doud Orchard in Denver, Indiana. Lorne J. and Betty M. Doud are the proud owners and the fourth generation in the "apple business".

"My great-grandfather planted the first commercial orchard here in 1894," says Lorne. Where the building stands used to be a one room school house. And in 1843, the land was purchased. So, it is quite a family heritage. David, their son, works with them and is the fifth generation to follow on the apple tradition.

A lot of work goes into an orchard, and the beautiful apples at the Doud Orchard were proof of all the right techniques for a good crop. Most replanting done, is to replace old trees or obsolete varieties, which could be both on the same tree. Doud figured they've probably replanted one-third of the acreage in the last ten years, and in the next ten years, will replant another half of the crop.

Doud explains, "We're going to the dwarf trees for high density and we get 200 trees to an acre." "Before, with the larger or standard trees, we only got 30 to an acre." This some areas of the northwest, they plant 600 to an acre." This is much easier for the apple pickers to reach, with the new dwarf trees, not to mention the amount of work done in less time. A lot of the heavy work is eliminated by using huge crates that can be lifted and moved around with a fork lift.

"The most difficult problem right now," says Doud, "is the hiring of labor, especially since it's seasonal work."

When it is time to pick the crop, nipeness is usually the middle of September. This early bunch consists of Grimes, Jonathon, and Red Delicious. In October comes the "Rome Beauty" and some later maturing kinds such as Golden Delicious, Stayman, Wine Sap, Melrose and Idared. These usually keep till the 1st of May in their refrigerated building kept at 33 degrees.

Pruning is done mainly for size control and thinning out the dwarf trees. Along with other care of the trees, comes spraying, which is mild and completely safe insists the Doud's. Lorne

has't fertilized the last few years, and he explains, "It can cause the trees to be over 'vigorous'." The main damage to trees is probably insects and disease, which spraying controls. This is an all summer job.

Of course other damaging factors are winter injury, hail, drought, or too much rain, not to mention the threat of a Spring frost. Also, very interesting, is how a wild grape vine can completely take over a tree. This happens when the birds drop seeds in-

to the orchard.

How long does a tree live? Well, the average tree is 40 years on the standard size tree, and 20 to 30 years on the dwarf size. But would you believe the Doud's have a tree that their great-grandfather planted? It's 80 to 100 years old!

As a final quote, and evidently a family saying, is "There's nothing worse than an old man with an old orchard." I don't think we can say that about the Doud Orchard, after testing a few apples the flavor is out of this world! (not to mention in my stomach!)





Four Mentone residents recall WW1

It was sixty years ago on Nov-ember 11, 1918, that bells ring out loudly in Mentone to celebrate the end of the war to end all wars, and at least four veterans of World War I still live in this

Roy Rush was a member of the 16th Engineering Regiment, whose job in France was to build railroads and bridges. Roy work-ed in the office paying the troops.

The United States government took over the railroads during World War I, and at first Ralph Arnsberger served his country as a fireman on the New York Central from Cleveland to Buffalo. A fireman's job was to scoop the

coal that kept the steam engine running properly. Later he entered the service and was stationed at Camp Beauregard, Louisiana.

Earl Shinn was one that was not stricken when the influenza epi demic reached his unit. After he returned to Mentone, he went out with the doctor to help with flu cases here.

W. E. Fowler, a Mentone resident for twenty years, was born in No-ble Township, Wabash County. He kept a diary during his service in World War I which began when he enlisted at Indianapolis on December, 1917, and was assign ed to the Aviation Section of the Signal Corps.

He spent a few weeks at Fort Thomas, Kentucky; Kelly Field, San Antonio, Texas; and Camp McArthur, Waco, Texas. In March of 1918 he left Newport News, Virginia to go overseas.

For awhile he was in the 648th Aero Squadron, where the com-pany was split into three sections. In France he was in the Headquarters Company of the First Pursuit Group, and later in the 94th Aero Squadron which was commanded

.

for a time by Captain Eddie Ric-kenbacker. "He was a splendid fellow!" Mr. Fowler said.

He also remembers Capt. Cook from Anderson - Wier Cook Air-port in Indianapolis was named for him - and Lt. Quentin Roose velt, a member of the 95th who was killed. The First Pursuit Group was made up of the 27th, 94th, 95th, and 147th Aero Squadrons.

After the Armistice was signed, the 94th made their way, step by step, to Fort Alexander at Cob-lenz, Germany. The progress was slow because of the destroyed roads and bridges. They moved by truck, train, or convoy

On the 12th of December, Fowler had a 24-hour pass and went to Paris with a truck driver to get supplies. He particularly remembers the two huge captured German guns, Big Berthas, that were on display near the Eiffel Tower. on display near the Effel Tower. "It seems like they were one-half block long, although actually they weren't," he stated. When queried about Paris night life, he replied that he didn't

know, because this trip was made in daytime to pick up food.

At that time he was a cook and thinks they had proper food, so they "fared very well." Christmas of 1918 was spent

moving. That night they stayed in a private home in Luxem-

One day a boy he went to school with dropped in to visit. This young man, Albert Mattern, was a motor cycle dispatch rider. After delivering messages in the vicinity, he located Fowler, who, until that time, had no idea where Mattern was.

They were deloused at Coblenz

to get ready to go home. Shortly before Memorial Day, 1919, the 94th Aero Squadron, under the command of Major Reed the command of Major reed Chambers, left Brest, France and in about two weeks arrived in Long Island, New York. After a three-week delay, due to mea-sles quarantine, they were divided into groups and sent to the camp nearest home to be dis-charged. W. E. Fowler was discharged from Camp Sherman, Chillicothe, Ohio with two other Wabash men and one from Indianapolis. On June 2 , 1919.

World War I brought back me mories to Mrs. Fowler, too Three of her brothers were in the service. The oldest, a lieutenant, was in Argonne Forest, ready to go over the top when word came about the Armistice He came home in March, but the next Armistice Day was killed, falling from a frosty roof that he was repairing.

The government sent a message to her family that her second brother was lost and presumed dead. Later they received a letter from him telling that he had become lost, and lived three days on raw red beets before he got back to the company in the 5th Division. He was gassed three times, which left him an invalid

and later caused his death.

The third brother was injured when his truck hit a mine.



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Mentone mourns for crash victims

A tragic plane crash on Saturday morning, November 4, took the lives of Jerry A. Howell, 30, and his son Jeffrey, age 6, of Mentone, when the 1938 Monocoupe they were flying crashed into a cornfield southwest of Mentone. Both were pronounced dead at the site by Kosciusko County Coroner Kenneth Wyman

According to a neighbor, Guy Alspaugh, Jerry and Jeff had taken off in the single-engine plane, and had made a wide sweep around the Mentone Air-port, covering the city of Men-tone, and had then headed south towards the Rochester Airport Roger England, 32, of R. 2,

Rockester, told police he heard the sputtering of an engine, and looked to see the plane plummet

to the ground. The plane crashed in a comfield on the Dale Ladsen farm, R. 2, Rochester, about one and one-half miles south of the Mentone Airpect, near the intersection of Kecciusko County Roads 1300 west and 800 South.

The Mentone Fire Department and EMT's were called to the scene, and England and Ladson had hurried to the site where they believed the plane had crashed. They found the plane with its nose in the ground, and the tail pointing up.
It is believed that the engine

began to sputter as Howell was flying about 500 feet above ground, and over a line of trees. Apparently, Jerry, was trying to glide to a clearing to make an 'emergency landing after the engine had stopped. Authorities believe he had to raise the nose of the plane to clear the trees, when he lost air speed and crash-ed into the field.

Witnesses who heard the plane at take-off, and as it made the wide sweep around the airport said that they did not hear the plane sputtering as if it was going to stall. One observer stated that the plane was running well. The accident occurred at approximately 9:30 a.m.
The airplane, owned by Herbert

A. Marsden, R. 2, Rochester, was scheduled to be sold, according to police. Authorities confirmed that the antique plane was owned 30 years ago by singing cowboy star Gene Autry.

Jerry and his wife Betty (Ulbricht) bought the Mentone Airport from Chick and Dorothy Herendeen in April of this year,

coming from Argos. He operated Howell's Spraying Service and held a commercial pilots rating and an aerial application license.

Richard responded by stating that residents often leave hearings in a huff when their requests are denied, and fail to wait to listen to the Commissions reasons for



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Reeses enjoyed their South American

In the last five years, Wayne and Bernice Reese of Akron have had three exchange students from South America and one from Japan. Each student has spent eight

pan. Lach student has spent eight weeks with them. Last February, "as soon as we could get plowed out," says Wayne and Bernice, "we were on our way to Miami!" Their arrival in South America marked one of the "greatest re-unions" they've ever had, when they became re-acquainted with the three girls who had become a big part of

The taxi took them to a town called Bello Horizonte, which was in the mountains. Everyone treated Wayne and Bernice so kind, thinking they must have been dignitaries since they knew the Secretary of State.

Arriving at a gorgeous mansion, the Reese's were greeted at the door by Flavia's mother, who spoke no English and Flavia was not home. Until 7 p.m. that even-ing it took a lot of hand motions to get everyone acquainted. Finally Flavia arrived and was joyfully

After a 9 p.m. to 6:20 a.m. flight, their dream came true. They arrived in South America Their first stop was Brasilla, the capital of Brazil, where Flavia Brasil lived, Flavias the girl who stayed with the Reeses' in 1974. Flavia's father is Brazil's Secre tary of State, but the Reese's had no idea how important a man he really was. A telegram had been sent to Flavia, so she would know when Wayne and Bernice would be arriving and ready to be pick-ed up at the airport. Much to their dismay, when they got off the place, there was, "no Flavia anywhere," said Bernice. Plus, no one spoke English. After quite a search, a man speaking English, helped them out of their predica-ment. When the Reese's explained who they wanted to see, and that they were guests of this family, the man called a taxi and they were on their way.

re-united with her American family. It seems Flavia did receive the telegram but no date of arrival had been put on it. So for weeks, Flavia's parents had sent a chauffer and limousine to the airport everyday until they final-ly gave up on the Reese's.

The house as Bernice described, "had all marble floors and walls." "Two maids waited on us and we were treated like kings." A town in the mountains was a little different, mainly because of the steepness of the roads. The roads are so steep, that many of them are one-way only, and that's down! "You really can't go up them in a car," explained Wayne. The sidewalks are really a sight, they are nothing but stair-steps. As you can imagine driving can be pretty wild. Wayne will vouch for this, as he often gets car sick. So a little trip uptown was not the fun he'd expected.

The Reese's were taken to a farm near Flavia's, where dignitaries are entertained. They sure were surprised at this "farm". It was 150,000 acres. Of this, 40,000 was tapioca, and another 40,000 was tapioca strictly used for petroleum. Bernice says, "it was the White House for sure!" The own of the farm was the mayor, but no one lived there, it was for entertaining guests only. As if in a hotel, the Reese's were given their own room. Wayne said that he was already impressed, then the mayor had to explain how he got his Mercedes. Would you be-lieve he traded one Holstein cow for it? That's right, a cow for a Mercedes. I wonder what Henry Ford would say.

Open air markets are downtown, and you can buy your meat and vegetables, but the selection is nothing compared to what we have to choose from here in the states. But with the Brazil temperature 75 to 80 degrees year round and no flies, who needs

Wayne and Bernice were lucky, they were told, because they got to see the carnival. It's a big event that thousand's from all over Brazil and the world come to visit. Every year this dancing parade is staged by the black people. With drums pounding and women, men and children dance ing, the celebration goes on for a week, Only one thing made it rather unusual, none of them were wearing any clothes, as they danced the samba!

Next stop was Rio De Janero for a brief visit there with Flavia's relatives, then the Reese's were

off to Sao Paulo.
At the Sao Paulo airport, they were met by Ediliza Cozerta. Ediliza stayed with Bernice and Wayne in 1973.

From the airport, the Reese's then journeyed for 400 miles. This was to visit more friends and relatives of the family. "They sure take good care of you when you are friends of the family," you are freeness of the family, says Wayne. Ediliza's boyfriend, Ricardo, took Wayne and Bernice to meet his grandpa and grandma. They were in their 80's and owned 100,000 acres, and if that wasn't enough, grandma flashed a 15 carat diamond on her finger. By now the Reese's figured they must be in the middle of a wealthy family. As of yet it doesn't seem that they've met anyone too shab-

Bernice recalled a strange experience in a South American beauty shop. "As they started on my hair. I noticed something funny going on beside me. The lady next to me was having the hair on her legs removed with wax and wax-paper." In back of her she heard constant snapping sound behind a petition. Women kept going around this petition and you couldn't see what they were do-ing behind there. Later Bernice found out that the women went around and got undressed. They, too, were getting a wax treatment, only all over. The skimpy bikinis in South America make our American ones look like a gunny sack. So, that's why there is 8

bringing the morning supply of milk door to door was another unusual experience. "She pours in trom her pan to your pan," says the Reese's. It took some persuading, but the old woman finally let Wayne take her picture. Visiting a nearby Catholic con-

vent proved to be a story in it-self. This 200 year old relic sup-posedly imprisons young girls for life. Parents bring their daugh-ters, usually between the ages of 14-21, and give them up, never to see them again.

Each girl is given a personal maid, so no work is involved. just a life of prayer and dedica-tion to the Lord. As large as a city square block, this convent

is said to house women who usually live to be 80-100 years old. The parents pay a dowry for their daughters imprisonment and may only speak to her through a blanket covered hole in a wall. Closely guarded, no one is allowed to come out once they are taken in. The girl only leaves through death, which is not known to the family. The Reese's have many me-

mories and stories to remember and enjoyed sharing them with me. They found out that good friends will take good care of you, which is very helpful in a foreign country.

Mentone town meeting success

Forty-eight enthusiastic citizens of Mentone were present at the town hall last Wednesday even-ing, November 8, to participate in a unique town meeting. Spon-sored by the Institute of Cultural Affairs, the event was called

"Town Meeting, Indiana".

The purpose of the meeting as director John Bengel stated, "is to bring people together to think positively about their community and its needs". According to Paul Haist, spokes: man for the Chamber of Commerce who hosted the meeting, seventy-five invitations were sent to residents of Mentone and he was very pleased with the enthusiastic turn-out that occurred.

The evening began with residents introducing themselves and listing a past accomplishment for Mentone. Some of these included: the clean atmosphere of the town, the way neighbors and friends cooperate and work to-gether, the money raised for the ambulance service, the good loambusance service, the good to-cal schools, the stable businesses, well behaved youth, great volun-teer fire department, and so on. Present and future accomplish-ments included: additional hous-

ing, cultural improvements, com-pletion of the Bell Museum, Cen-tennial party in 1982, bring in more industries related to farm-ing, and to do more for the youth and Senior Citizens.

Bengel then asked the group to list their "hopes and dreams" for Mentone for the next five to ten years. These were grouped into "challenges", and the large group of people was divided into smaller groups to discuss these

The six "challenges" were:
—"the fact that elders do not have adequate housing and canhave adequate housing and can-not get from place to place easi-ly ... this is illustrated by no bus service, city utilities are confined ... and lands are not available for sale to housing interests".

—"the fact that people do not attend meetings with their com-plaints and ideas for positive ac-hievements. There is not enough

hievements. There is not enough rural involvement...."

—"the fact that mental attitudes

fixed incomes and the tax freeze indicates the underlying block... is a lack of time and money and the need for expert counsel..."

"in the arena of Economic Development, the fact that lack of industry, shopping out of town, dis-use of airport, indicates ... a lack of personal and group involvement and coordination. This is illustrated by the need for acquiring land for industrial park, promoting new industry, coalition of Town Board and Chamber of Commerce and other groups towards this goal.

-"the fact that there is lack

of full time staff ... in getting government money."

"in the arena of speeding, parking, alleys, (etc)... w

haven't worked enough with state officials..

As each small group discussed the challenges, another small group, under the guidance of Jackie Speicher, a volunteer with Jackie Speicher, a volunteer with ICA, was in another room writing a brief history of Mentone, developing a motto, and creating a song entitled "Mentone, Mentone" (sung to the tune of Daisy, Daisy"). The ongoing slogan of "Mentone - Egg Basket of the Midwest" was kept, but added was "we hatch goodwill".

A robust singing of the new town song was rendered by all at the end of the 31/2 hour meeting.

After a short coffee break, the

groups presented their proposals

for the future of Mentone.

Regarding "safer traffic flow", it was proposed that "in order to have a safer traffic flow ... a second full time police officer be obtained through: town budget and/or CETA funds

For "services for the elderly" ... in order to create space for new housing and means of transportation ... propose voluntary call and services through: mini-van service for various activities for the elderly managed by the youth".

In "economic development ... we contact state Chamber of Commerce and Indiana prospects through (our) Chamber of Commerce and a special committee,"

Under "participation in town affairs ... in order to help people see that their participation ... is need and appreciated, propose that we involve more people (in-cluding those in outlying agricultural community) in town meetings through recognition of their efforts by public notice of appreciation.

And with "funding ... in order to acquire skills in obtaining go-vernment funding for youth, park, etc., propose that we (1) get a survey of retired persons who have skills; and (2) send them to service training in "grants" ...





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Family Life

According to Joseph F. Donnermeyer, community development specialist at Purdue University, most property crimes such as burglary, theft, and vandalism are crimes of opportunity committed by amateurs and not profes-

He says that "the amateur criminal is seeking opportunities, not challenges, and more often than not, he does not have to look far"

According to Donnermeyer in a release from Purdue's Dept. of Agricultural Information, the victim of such crime is often the one who provides the opportunity by not practicing simple, basic, prevention techniques.

Here are a few suggestions for preventing criminals from 'getting'' you:

First, place ladders under lock and key, and make sure your lawn furniture can't be used for climbing in windows. Put them away if you're out.

Secondly, use the window locks on your windows, and have deadbolt locks on all of your outside doors - but NOT the type which require a key from the inside.

You should also keep your doors locked during the day. I know that everyone thinks this is silly, but It's easier for someone to walk in while you're vaccuming, or running the wash downstairs than you may think.

I got used to doing it in Jackson after a terrible incident happened to a co-workers daughter.

The daughter was working in the kitchen when she heard her washing machine in the basement start up. Fortunately she didn't investigate - she went next door and called the police. They found a man waiting for her

Of course, Akron and Mentone are a lot different than Jackson, Michigan, but it doesn't hurt to be careful!

The most effective deterrent though, is something we're all lucky to have here - good neighbors! Donnermeyer states that "cooperation among trusted neighbors - watching out for each other's property - can be a big factor in helping to reduce any opportunity for the amateur crimi-

Showing a little concern at the right time, or calling the police when you suspect something can often prevent a burglary or vandalism.

And even though we here are luckier than most, it's "better to be safe than sorry".

I attended the Mentone Town Meeting last week, and thought it went really well. Everyone present participated enthusiastically and some of the challenges to be met were very interesting.

I think the Chamber of Commerce is to be commended for sponsoring such a great event, and a thank you is in order for everyone who participated.

Let's hope the solutions will be seen through to their goals of accomplishment!

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

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TVSC Board to comply with state request

At Monday evenings regular ses-sion of the Tippecanoe Valley School Board, it was decided by a unanimous vote of the trustees to comply with a request made by the State Board of Accounts regarding payment of mileage for extra-curricular activities.

Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Lloyd Harrell reported to the Board members that he had been in contact with attorney Fred Rakestraw of Rochester, and stated that Rakestraw had re-iterated what he had stated before regarding the payment.

Dick Worley from the State Board had expressed his distress at the School Boards decision in September to continue payment of expenses and mileage for ex-tra-curricular activities from the general fund. State Board of Ac-counts auditors had found that the payments were being made

during their recent audit. Worley had called Harrell regarding the payments, and informed him that unless the practice

was discontinued, an extra audit would be ordered, and the State Board would have to file suit against the Treasurer of the Tip pecanoe Corporation.

At Mondays meeting, Harrell informed the Board that Rake-straw had told him that he felt the Board could go either way in their decision, and that they had the option of questioning the State Board's decision. He stated that a court case would "cost several hundred dollars for the Corporation, depending on the time and effort spent in that

cause", according to Dr. Harrell.
After hearing Rakestraws position, Board President Con Shewman asked the trustees for their feelings on the matter.

Without further discussion without turtner discussion, trustee Lee Norris stated, "I make a motion that we change our policy the first of the year". The motion was seconded by Vernon Meredith, and passed with a unanimous decision.

Dr. Harrell reported to the Board that in most probability the assessed valuation for Tippecanoe Valley, of \$31,449,470.00, would be approved by the Tax Commission.

This would mean that a total amount of \$977,909.00 would be raised for the general fund, and \$273,610,38 would be raised for the debt service fund for 1979.

The tax rates in Fulton County will most likely be set at \$3.11 for the general fund and \$.87 for the debt service fund with a total tax rate of \$3.98, down \$.26 from 1978. In Kosciusko County, the tax rate will be \$3.06 for the general fund and \$.87 for debt service, brining the total to \$3.93 for 1979. This is down \$.10 from the 1978 rate.

Rick Ralston, head of Adult Education at Valley, reported to the Board that this years enrollment is the largest since the beginning of the program. One hundred two persons are enrolled in the Community Education classes, and twenty-five adults are participat-ing in the Adult Basic Education

Ralston also reported that his recent attendance at the national conference in Oregon was very educational and profitable. He stressed that he had learned a lot and that many of the ideas could be implemented at Valley. The Board approved the accep-

tance of a hearing booth present-ed from Sonoco Products in Ak-

ron to the School Corporation as a gift. Akron School principal, Mark Barker, reported that all kindergarten students at Akron have been tested, and the trustees expressed their thanks.

In other Board action: *Elementary school principals

reported that the parent-teacher conferences were highly successful, and each school is now planning for Christmas programs. Bar-ker also gave a report on the suc-cess of the "Fall Festival" held last month at the Akron School. Money raised will be used for school projects.

*Upon Dr . Harrell's request, the Board approved an increase in professional leave money for teachers from \$2,000 to \$3,000. This total amount of money is used by teachers for attending conferences, and such

*Approval was granted for Dr. Harrell to attend the American Association of School Superinten-dents conference at New Orleans from February 10-17.

*Approval of "CAPPS" (Comprehensive Assessment Program Planning Systems) was requested by Dr. Harrell and granted. This is a State mandated plan, formulated by teachers, counselors, parents, and principals from Tippecanoe Valley, to program the goals and objectives for the School Corporation, Thirty-four local residents participated in writing the plan, and it will now be sent to the State. State approval, however, is not necessary according to Harrell.

A resolution commending the

Viking football team, Coach Charlie Smith, and his assistants was approved as read. *Sarah Boggs was hired on a temporary contract to replace Vonda Ryman at Mentone School while Ryman is on maternity leave. A new, revised contract was also signed for ABE teacher Merdena Bechtol. Ralston described her "as one of the best (ABE teachers) in the state"

*Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read, and claims totaling \$50,030.49 were paid. Net payroll for October 31 of \$54,667.52 and November 15 of \$53,641.99 were also approved.

All members of the Board were in attendance at the meeting held at Akron School. The next regular session for the Board is scheduled for Monday, December 18, at the Burket Elementary School beginning at 7:30 p.m.



south.

comes Then there are the experts,

the climatologists, who look at such things as the jet streams, those mysterious high speed winds at altitudes of over 30, 000 feet. Still others look at sun spots, believing those out burst of gasses from the sun's surface somehow affect the amount of solar energy reaching earth, triggering weather changes

And some "know" it's the Russians. They say the Russians who could stand better weather, are shifting the jet streams by electrical impulses.

There are also arguments when it comes to the question of weather the "mean" average global temperature is rising or falling. Even a tiny change could have catastrophic results. A drop of just 1 or 2 degrees hurts the wheat crops of Cana-

Depending on how you look at it, 2 substances which are on the increase could affect future weather. Or they might cancel each other out.

Some scientists say dust from industry and volcanoes and poor farming methods could cool down the atmosphere by reflecting the sun's energy away from earth.

Others say higher concentrations of carbon dioxide caused by cutting the forests and by furnaces, is preventing the escape of heat radiated by the earth and will thus increase the world temperature. This could melt the polar ice caps and raise ocean levels, flooding our coastal areas.

But Fred Ringlet, Canadian weather official, says "We can't really come out and tell people to start worrying. We don't know that much.

Even with the best of computers and other forecasting equipment, we're kidding ourselves if we try to forecast more than 5 days in advance.'

That brings us back to the Farmers Almanac, which has been publishing its forecasts for 162 years.

For the coming winter, editor Ray Geiger puts it this way: "We wish that we could give encouragement but we feel in our bones that another formidable winter will be with us, colder and snowier than normal."

Get out the woolies. Here it comes.

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

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

George Black was born in the house where he now lives — just a hop, skip, and a jump from Tip-pecanoe Valley High School. He thinks of Valley as his "second home." Years ago, his great-grandfather owned the land where the school now stands.

As an avid sports fan, George devotes much of his time to TVHS. He attends every sports event, and if there is one night that there is no game -- he goes to watch the practice!

At 74 years of age, George says "I'm never lonely, guess that's why I feel so great!" "I really don't feel my age, in fact I wouldn't realize how old I am, if I didn't look in the mirror." When I didn't look in the mirror." When I asked George what his secret of good health was, he replied, "Dr. Herrick, I guess. He's taken good care of me."

Three years ago, however, George wasn't well at all, and after a rough surgery, he was told he'd probably never come back home. But he made it and is went thenkful.

made it, and is very thankful.

In 1969 Vera, his wife died, and he lost his mother too. He also went through three surgeries --

all that in one year. So it hasn't always been easy, but sports helps fill the void and gives him a zest for life.

With the football season just finished, George commented how

proud he was of the team this year, and at every game you could spot him a mile away, clad in green and gold from head to toe, and a huge smile for every passer-

by.
At home George is surrounded by a jungle of plants as he sits in his favorite chair and watches out his picture window. From here he says he can see all his farm land. Pictures decorate the house. friendly photos stare at you from every knook and cranny, and on the table is an album full of Senior pictures, along with name

George said, "I get a lot of pictures, and I even get invited to many of these kids weddings, and I kinda like that!" The Valley youth bring much happiness to

The Valley students think very highly of George, too. Last year, just before the state football finals, a special pep session was scheduled. George, though a little hard of hearing, says this was one place he turned up his hearing aid to pick up the loud confusion. At to pick up the loud confusion. At one point in the pep session, everyone kept pointing at him and telling him to go down onto the gym floor. George said, "I had no idea what was going on," but he "very bashfully went down". He said he couldn't believe it, as he was presented a green and gold letter veneter. To green and gold letter sweater. To top it off, a large poster was pre-sented to him, which had every sport named on it and was assign-ed to him as a lifetime pass to any sports awant. He also received sports event. He also received a small one for his billfold, which would be a little more convenient to present to the admissions gate at each game. George sure lives up to the honor -- "Tippecanoe Valley's most loyal fan".

After some of the ballgames, George stops with Devon and Wil-ma Tucker to get a bite to eat. You can imagine the looks he gets as he sports his brand new letter sweater. George just grins and says, "I've been a little slow gett-ing through school."

When asked which was his favorite sport, George replied, "Girls basketball ... of course boys, too ... and volley ball. Didn't miss a baseball game either, swimming too, then there's cross country.... oh Leniov symmatics tennis oh, I enjoy gymnastics, tennis,

What's it look like in a sports' enthusiasts home? Not the way a average 74 year old persons' home would be imagined.

When you come to the back door,

the jungle of beautiful plants in the window makes one wonder if there is a passable route through this way. Above his kitchen sink is another tropical garden, that looks almost as dense as the one by the other window. But according to George, "that one above the sink

looks a lot better since I cut some of it down."

Being a plant lover myself, I felt right at home. As I walked on into the living room, I was sure George had a rock band stashed some-where. Not your expected music in an older persons' home. I was somewhat surprised until I saw the huge speakers and stereo set. Opening up into the living room was the brightest room I think I've ever seen. A teenagers dream - not just seen. A teenagers dream - not jus a bedroom but a sight for sore eyes! Red velvet wallpaper sets off the blinding black and white striped curtains and matching bedspread. The bed is so huge, bedspread. The bed is 80 nige, I was sure it must be a couple of water beds on top of each other. I couldn't figure out why it look-ed like rolling hills. George ex-plained that it was all feathers! Oh, I forgot to mention, the carpet is red too.

There's a story behind it, but I'm not sure I understand it yet. You have to realize that George is not your average 74 year old, he seems to have more energy than most people!

One of George's hobbies is playing the organ, which sets right outside the open bedroom. It seems that late one night when he is usually sleeping, George

was still wrapped up at the organ. All of a sudden he heard a crash and as he peeked around the corner, he saw that the plaster and

ceiling had caved in -- on the bed. So he had to re-decorate anyway,

so why not go all out?

As George sat down in his favorite chair for a picture he stared at a family photo. He said,

"They're all I've got left." Just

before that he'd named a list of all his close relatives and friends that had passed on from this world. The picture is of his only son, Brook Black, and his wife

Loretta, and their five children. Brent, Cheryl, Rhonda, and Todd, are very lucky to have such a beautiful human being for their grandfather. And to think that George didn't want to do a newspaper story. He said, "I don't think I would make a very good story ... Why don't you wait till after I'm gone." No vay, George!

Black's country store, south of Mentone, was one of those nos-talgic places where time had seem-ed to stand still.

It was a quaint little store cluttered with a little bit of every-thing! George Black and wife, Vera, ran the store for 45 years. George delivered his groceries three times a week, and owned one of the last grocery huckster trucks in the area.

George and Vera grew up on nearby farms and were wed after

finishing high school - she at Ak-ron and George at Beaver Dam. For a few years they lived in Flint, Michigan, where George learned his trade in a fancy gro-cery. He had assistance from Geo. Grochel, a "retired Bohemian mil-lionaire" who clerked for fun, according to George.

In 1927, the Blacks came home and paid Byron Spitler \$2,500 for the Doran Station, which was then a stop on the old Goshen-to-Peru, Winona interurban and the com-

munity's social center. In the busy years ahead Vera tended the store and George tratended the store and George tra-veled the region buying eggs, poul-try and cream, and also selling gro-ceries to his clients from his "husk-ster" truck. The train being the only supply to them, another need was coal, so they started a coal

was coal, so they stated a 1-1-yard too.
In the late 30's, their son, Brook, arrived. After World War II the Winona line died and so did the Black coal yard. After George's father died, he took charge of the family farm, raising cattle and

Three days a week George still would serve his 50 to 75 patrons

in a 30 mile radius.

If you close your eyes and imagine cookies and candy in bulk boxes overalls, workshirts, ga-loshes hardware, ammunition, iosnes ... naroware, aminumon, and drugs ... papers and magazines ... groceries and meats ... all cram-med into a small, comfortably clut tered room, then you've been ta-ken back through yesteryear, a time the years have melted away.



regular monthly meeting. The Board received bids for a new police car from the two lonew ponce car from the two for-cal Akron automobile dealerships, Bahney Chevrolet, and South End Motors. Meeting the town's re-quired specifications, South End Motors submitted a bid of \$6876. 00 for a 1979 Ford, while Bahney Chevrolet quoted \$7280.25. South End Motors allowed a \$1500. trade-in allowance for the 1976 Chevy currently used by the police and Bahney's allowed \$1770 in trade. The net result of the bids were: Bahney's, \$5510 with trade, and South End Motors, \$5376 with trade.

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
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MACRAME : Ancient interest in knots

An interest in knots has come from the Renaissance and Victorian eras. Many cultures, ancient and contemporary, have used and contemporary, have used knotting as a means of fabric con-struction or decoration. This in-cludes ritual masks of tribal Afri-ca and fringes on Mexican-shawls. Perhaps the most vital heritage, however, has been that of the sailor. Sailors, who have spent their lives with rope, twine, and cord and their interlacings and fastenings, have named countless num-

There are two basic knots in macrame', - the half knot and the half hitch - but the endless variations on these two knots is what generates the excitement of mac-

Macrame', like many other crafts, suffered a loss of popularity for a time and became almost

The earliest form of "square knot" work is said to have origi-nated in Arabia during the thir-teenth century - macrame' comes from the Arabic word, Migramah, which means ornamental fringe and braid. The Spainards after learning the art from the moors spread it to southern Europe.

Also popular in Italy around the fourteenth century, macrame' was introduced to a school where five and six year olds learned from their teacher, a stitch similar to the "double half hitch."


